EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Taken from the State of the Province Address (SOPA) of Gov. Edgardo M. Chatto

The year 2016 was a year of change in national leadership and significant achievements in our local governance that were brought about by thinking outside the box and institutionalizing innovations. Under the leadership of His Excellency President Rodrigo Roa Duterte, the NEDA Board approved two very important projects for Bohol: the Change in Scope of the New Bohol Airport Construction and Sustainable Environment Protection Project (NBACSEPP), with an updated project cost, and the Modernization of the Gov. Celestino Gallares Memorial Hospital Project, costing P2.2 Billion. This early, the Duterte administration, through the facilitation of Cabinet Secretary Leoncio “Jun” Evasco, Jr. and NEDA Sec. Ernesto Pernia, has already granted Bohol more than P3 Billion worth of projects.

Major Socio-Economic Indicators: Results of our Continued Strategic Collaboration for Bohol’s Development

Provincial legislative support to local executive initiatives is all-important. Equally important is legislative support at the national level, where the three congressmen: Cong. Rene Relampagos, Cong. Aristotle Aumentado, and Cong. Arthur Yap, as Bohol’s most valuable allies at the national government level. They will institutionalize, through national laws, gains at the provincial level.

At the local front, thinking outside the box through innovations is essential in addressing the growing challenges of governance, as an indispensable tool to further push Bohol to inclusive economic growth and sustainable development.

The core indicator, the most important metric on how governance is done, is the Poverty Incidence statistic regularly measured by the Philippine Statistics Authority. In 2000, Bohol was among the country’s Top 20 Poorest Provinces. Reports show the decreasing incidence of poverty among Boholano families. Bohol has gone down to an unprecedented level of 21.7%, lower than the regional average! NEDA Dir. Efrén Carreon pointed out that Bohol has had the fastest drop of poverty incidence among families with an average of 3 percentage points every year or (8.9 percentage points for the last three years).

Tourist arrivals have increased, well beyond pre-earthquake levels, to its highest ever, as of November 2106, of 820,640!

This is mirrored by the Increasing number of Accommodation Establishments and Rooms where establishments in 2016 reached 432 with 6,370 rooms, which is higher by 29% compared to the 2013 level.

Business registration from Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) has reached 4,304 marking a 20% increase from the 2015 figures. MSMEs generated 11,850 employment for 2016, higher by 35% from the previous year.

As of November 2016, investments from MSMEs have surpassed the PhP 1 Billion annual target with PhP1.4 Billion actual investments.

This has resulted in very positive changes in employment, with employment rate at 96.3% in October 2016, posting the highest rate in four years. In fact, Bohol's employment rate is higher than the national average of 95% and the regional average of 94.95 as of Oct. 2016.

Bohol has recorded increases in inventory levels of hog, goat, carabao and chicken. The reduced inventory of cattle is due to the El Niño phenomenon. However, even with the decrease, sufficiency level of cattle still remains high at 413%.

The volume of municipal and commercial fishery production has gone up by 22% and 77%, respectively.

As a testament to all of this, the province has a thriving bank industry. The number of banks is now at 88 from just 65 in 2011. Total bank accounts have reached 590,103 with total deposits reaching P36.84 Billion.

The number of cooperatives has increased by 12.5%, with total assets reaching P2.71 Billion in 2016.

Overall, there is a 12% reduction in crime volume, and a decrease in crimes against persons and properties.

The number of registered vehicles has increased by 14.5%. This means that this will also have traffic implications that the provincial leadership will need to address together with the city and municipal governments.

In 2005, provincial roads totaled 971.351 kms. Due to nationalization through legislation and administrative approval, provincial roads are now at 832.603 kms. This has freed up more resources for the Provincial Government. As a result, concrete/asphalt roads increased from 159.947 kms in 2005 to 295.477 kms in 2016. Now, at the rate that the Province is concreting its Provincial Roads (thru convergence programs with DPWH, DOT, and DTI), all provincial roads will be concrete in five years! Other local roads will also have the same support.

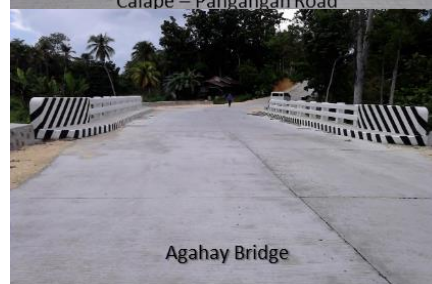
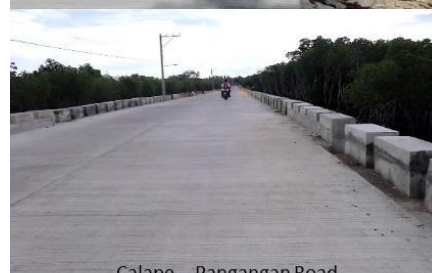
As another indicator of a vibrant economy, it has been noted that there is an increasing activity throughout Bohol's seaports, with the number of ship calls up by 16.9% and Passenger traffic up by 18.2%. For the city airport, the steady increase of passenger traffic at the Tagbilaran City airport has averaged at an annual increase of 20%.

HIGHLIGHTS OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS PER DEVELOPMENT PILLAR IN CY 2016

This section highlights the accomplishments in each of our development pillars. It is worthy to note that Bohol's programs and projects are guided by its Overarching Development Framework: InSPIRED HEAT-IT Bohol towards the BIG LEAP.

Infrastructure

- The Upgrading and Maintenance of Provincial Roads and Bridges continues to be well-funded and supported with consistent funding from the 20% Development Fund, DRRM Fund, and other sources.
- Under the Bohol Earthquake Assistance (BEA) Projects, the Provincial Engineer's Office (PEO) upgraded 36 bridges with total length of 433 linear meters.
- The Provincial Government of Bohol (PGBh) – Department of Agrarian Reform– Department of Public Works and Highways Bridge Project is ongoing.
- There is now an Ongoing Feasibility Study (FS) on the Construction of the Tagbilaran City – Panglao Island 3rd Bridge with P25 Million DPWH funding. DPWH expects the indicative figure of total cost (based on the FS) by March 2017, with Regional Development Council (RDC) approval in the same month.
- The only Cluster Landfill in the country, Alburquerque Sanitary Landfill Project, is wholly funded by the Department of Tourism – Tourism Infrastructure and Enterprise Zone Authority (TIEZA).
- Construction of school buildings provincewide is ongoing.
- The province continues to upgrade roads leading to tourist areas, under Republic Act 9593: Tourism Act of 2009 (Chatto-Gordon Law).



- The province counterparts for Farm to Market Road Projects under the World Bank Philippine Rural Development Project (PRDP) thru the Department of Agriculture.
- Conceived in Bohol, the National and Provincial Government converged through the Conditional Matching Grant to Provinces (CMGP/KALSADA Program), and it is now adopted as a national policy.
- Significant work is already ongoing at the site of the New Bohol Airport Construction and Sustainable Environment Protection Project (NBACSEPP).
- Improvement has been done in Terminal and Base Ports in Tagbilaran, Ubay, Catagbacan, Tubigon, Jagna, Talibon and Getafe.
- There are other port development projects, notably the Loon Port Development Project (an International Cruise Ship Port).
- To improve Bohol's resiliency in terms of power supply during natural calamities, transmission lines upgrading and development of new power sources have been fast tracked, including expediting the link to Cebu and the One Bohol Power (1BP) Aggregation with the signing of the short and medium-term power supply agreements.
- Enhancement of Malinao Dam and other Irrigation Facilities is ongoing. The long-time plea and hope of rice farmers for free irrigation services from government is now among the priority thrusts of Pres. Duterte.
- The feasibility study on Bohol Bulk Water Supply and Sanitation Project is now finished and is awaiting for investors.



Social Well-being and Shelter

- The Provincial Social Welfare and Development Office continues to sustain its Aid to Individuals in Crisis Situations (AICS).
- The whole range of programs for Persons with Disabilities, in partnership with the Bohol Federation of Disabled Persons (BFDP), is still



regularly implemented.

- The Bohol Stimulation and Therapeutic Activity Center for children with disabilities is currently being operated, as well as the Bohol Crisis Intervention Center for women and children who are survivors of domestic violence and abuse.
- The Comprehensive Local Integration Program (CLIP) has facilitated the release of assistance for reintegration and livelihood for rebel returnees.
- The provincial government promoted Child-Friendly Local Governance, most notably through giving the Seal of Child Friendly Local Governance Award by the Provincial Government to deserving Local Government Units.
- A major aspect of the post-earthquake rehabilitation and recovery, the ongoing Shelter Program granted housing units modeled after a resilient design, as well as resettlement sites throughout the province.



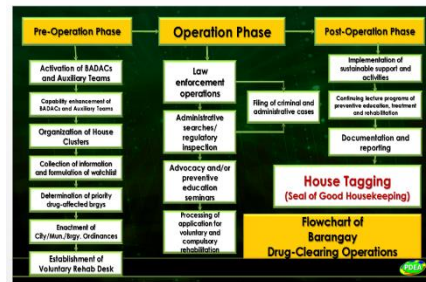
Peace and Order

- To ensure peace and order in the province and pursuant to the anti-criminality and anti-illegal drugs thrust of the national leadership, the dynamic Provincial Peace and Order Council (PPOC) and Provincial Anti-Drug Abuse Council (PADAC) are ready to act at all times. The province has an all-out Budget and Logistic Support from the Provincial Government for Peace and Order Programs.
- Bohol Joint Task Force Dagon is an ideal example of inter-government and inter-stakeholder collaboration for peace and order.
- The PGBh has strengthened its Anti-illegal Drugs and Anti-Criminality Campaign with Law Enforcement Agencies. First, it established the Center for Drug Education and Counseling (CeDEC) Operation. Then there is the Community-based Rehabilitation Program Without Walls (CBRP WoW) which is being pursued under the motto of "Church and State As One", the CDP-PPM Approach to Barangay Drug Clearing Operations, including a



first for any LGU throughout the Philippines: the first-ever Drug-free Household Sticker. Bishops Abet Uy and Danny Parcon led the way in recent PPOC and PADAC joint Meetings with other faith-based groups.

- Some more of the multiple peace and order programs being implemented now are the iProTeam and ProTokTeam, maintenance of internal security, and internal security initiatives.
- Additional internal security initiatives, together with a multitude of other government and private sector services, are delivered by the HEAT-IT Bohol Caravans, together with surgical, medical, dental and other missions. The valued partner in the missions are the Philippine Gift of Life, Inc. and other volunteer partners.
- The province is also working towards the Construction of Additional Jail Buildings and Cells, to ease the congestion in jail facilities.
- And the PGBh is looking forward to the Construction of Bohol Drug Abuse Treatment and Rehabilitation Center, in partnership with the DOH.



Interconnectivity

- The Provincial Government is continuously converging with National Government Agencies (NGAs), Local Government Units (LGUs), Civil Society Organizations (CSOs), Private Sector and Official Development Assistance (ODA) Organizations, exemplified by the Provincial Government of Bohol – Civil Society Organizations Partnership Covenant.
- The current leadership spearheaded the creation of the Panglao Island and City of Tagbilaran Executive Committee (PITEC), a collaborative mechanism between Provincial Government, Tagbilaran City, Dauis and Panglao LGUs on tourism, environment management and other development initiatives, in collaboration with the Strengthening Urban Resilience for Growth with Equity (SURGE) Project funded by the USAID.
- The Partnership with LGUs was recently launched: Bohol – Palawan/ Tagbilaran-Puerto Princesa Tourism and Environmental Programs and Policy Development



Exchange for PITEC, under the auspices of USAID-SURGE. Through this partnership, PITEC is thinking outside the box through inter-LGU collaboration on tourism and environmental management.

- There is the ongoing partnership with the Bohol UP Advisory Council, who offer their technical expertise *pro bono*, all for the love of Bohol.
- The province continues to pursue Local Economic Development through Investment Promotions and Business-Friendly Environment.
- Bohol is regularly promoted as a learning Destination for LGUs, National Government and Private Organizations.
- Official Development Assistance (ODA) partnerships are maintained, such as the Philippine Rural Development Program (World Bank – DA), Advancing Philippine Competitiveness (COMPETE) (USAID), Integrated Natural Resources and Environmental Management Project (ADB-DENR), partnership with the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) for our major infrastructure projects, and the aforementioned (SURGE) Project with USAID.
- The Partnerships with Local and Foreign Institutions for Arts and Culture are also carried forward.
- Information dissemination is done through print, broadcast and other modes of communication and the current leadership's Synergy with Provincial Employees' Union and Cooperatives.



Reforms in Local Governance

- Strategic Human Resource Management and Development, particularly through the Strategic Performance Management System (SPMS), introduced reforms in local governance by capacitating the provincial personnel and strengthening the system in performance management.
- Participatory Spatial and Development Planning was the approach highlighted in the updating of



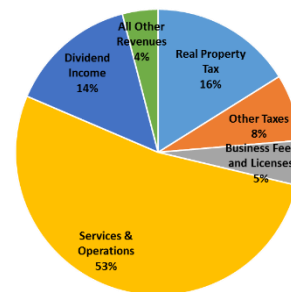
the Provincial Development and Physical Framework Plan (PDPFP). This is a legacy plan that was formulated to guide Bohol's development for the next 12 years, so that Boholanos can actively chart the development path and not be overtaken by events.

- At the start of this term, the executive and legislative branches of the provincial government formulated the Executive-Legislative Agenda (ELA) and Updated Development Framework.
- Periodic consultation is done with LGUs, NGAs, and CSOs on development plan formulation and implementation.



- Revenue-Generation and Fund-Sourcing is geared towards increasing revenue from Local and External Sources. Dividend income from the Joint Venture Agreement is the third largest single source of local revenue of the PGBh. This is another unique strategy, a non-traditional source of revenue, which required a lot of risk-taking and brainstorming to go outside the box. It reflects the Provincial Government officials' strong will and leadership amidst legal battles (the Joint Venture cases), and credit goes to Cong. Rene Relampagos, Bohol's Governor at the time, for his vision and courage. If current trends continue, our dividend income may soon even exceed real property taxes.

• Sources of Local Revenues (2016)



- Implementation of revenue-generation initiatives is continued with the creation and institutionalization of the Public Economic Enterprise Management Unit (PEEMU) and establishment and operation of provincial public economic enterprises.



- Local Government Systems and Processes are enhanced, such as the Electronic New Government Accounting System (e-NGAS) compliant with the Philippine Public Sector Accounting Standard (PPSAS).

- Other reforms in local governance are improvements in the Procurement System, effective operation of the Provincial Internal Audit Office (PIAO), active and dynamic Local Finance Committee, which innovations are always supported by honorable SP members through legislation.



- Multiple awards validated Bohol's innovations in local governance:
 - Seal of Good Local Governance (SGLG)
 - "PAGASA Award" conferred to yours truly by the Civil Service Commission
 - Our inclusion in the DILG's Honor Roll, a list of the 10 Outstanding Governors with relentless efforts in waging war against Illegal Drugs and for exemplary leadership in promoting good governance, transparency, business competitiveness and disaster preparedness
 - Gawad Tugas Award for Land Patent Issuance
 - Sustained ISO 14001:2004 Accreditation
 - Outstanding Project Monitoring Award for our Local Project Monitoring Committee

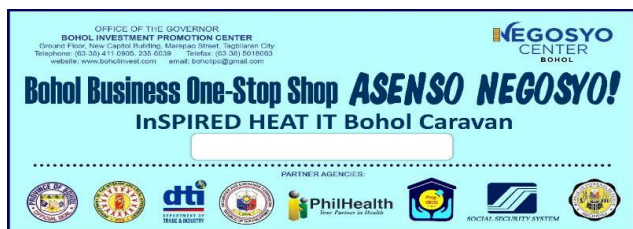
- Provincial Government Facilities are continuously improved, such as the New Provincial Capitol Building, which is expected to be completed in the 1st Quarter of 2018, and its attached projects.



- Vigorous Post-Earthquake Rehabilitation is done through the Bohol Earthquake Assistance (BEA) project: Of the total 1,063 sub-projects, 940 (88%) are completed, 105 (10%) ongoing, 17 (2%) on procurement process.

Equitable Economic Growth with Environmental Sustainability

- Bohol One Stop Shop (BOSS) continued its *Asenso Negosyo* Caravans, in partnership with the DTI and other national government partners. It launched 7 Negosyo Centers in 2016.



- Bohol's BEST (Basic Entrepreneurship for Sustainable Transformation) Program has also been implemented together with the following: Trade Event and Expos: *fusion nights* and OFW Expo, Young Boholano Entrepreneurs Support and Enhanced Investment Promotion Program.

- Information Communications Technology - Business Process Management (ICT-BPM) Development were made with major events such as the Digital Bohol Summit and Geeks on a Beach.



- The province also established the Tourism Enterprise Zone through the Panglao Bay Premiere Flagship Tourism Enterprise Zone (PBPFEZ), which will be the first of its kind in the country.

- For environmental sustainability, the province will be implementing the following: Integrated Management System (ISO 14001:2015 for EMS & ISO 9000:2015 for QMS), establishment of Cluster Sanitary Landfill, Biodiversity Conservation and Management Program, with the Bohol Biodiversity Complex (BBC) as Center for Biodiversity Conservation and strengthening of Coastal Law Enforcement.
- There was also the recent launching of the book “Bohol: A Window to the Philippines’ Natural History” by the University of the Philippines. There is also the prospect of establishing the first UNESCO Global Geo Park in the Philippines, right here in our beloved island of Bohol.

Disaster Risk Reduction & Management/Climate Change Adaptation (DRRM-CCA)

- To address concerns on DRRM-CCA, the province institutionalized the Provincial Disaster Risk Reduction Management Office (PDRRMO), with a duly appointed department head. Furthermore, it strengthen Local DRRMOs and BDRRMCs with numerous capacity-building activities that were undertaken to improve community resiliency throughout Bohol.
- Community-Based Information and Awareness Campaign was regularly done with upgrading of DRRM Services, Facilities and Equipment, especially the Completion of the PDRRMC Operation and Relief Center and procurement of additional ambulances for the expanded TaRSIER 117 stations and Upgrading of Other Rescue Equipment.
- The operation of TaRSIER 117 was strengthened, as well as its replication in the strategic municipalities of Ubay, Jagna and Carmen. There was also the launching of the TaRSIER 117 Quick Response Mobile Application and continuing partnerships with NGAs, Private Sector, Civil Society Organizations, League of LDRRMOs, Business for DRRM-CCA.
- DRRM-CCA was mainstreamed in Local Development Plans, through the Updating of the PDPFP and assistance to LGUs in the preparation of Hazard Maps at the Local Level to be used as bases in the preparation of Local Contingency Plan and Evacuation Plan.



- Relief and rescue operations were made in partnership with the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) and other agencies and volunteer groups.
- Other initiatives were also done to improve Bohol's resiliency to disasters and climate change. As a result, the PDRRMO was recognized for notable programs encompassing the four thematic areas of disaster management and unparalleled commitment to disaster resilience in the Region.

Health and Sanitation

- As part of our continuing rehabilitation and recovery efforts, as well as our continuing commitment to improve the quality of our health services, we have sustained the Construction/rehabilitation/upgrading of Hospital Facilities and Equipment – again there are several slides showing the results of our efforts.



- Construction of the New Cong. Castillo Memorial Hospital in Loon is ongoing and the Gov. Celestino Gallares Memorial Regional Hospital Modernization Project is ready for implementation.



- Human Resource augmentation capacity development and incentives provision were done that includes the Master's Degree program for Hospital Management, to enhance the ability of hospital chiefs' ability to manage their respective hospitals. As a result, our bed occupancy rates consistently increased.

- The province had also sustained the implementation of Effective Health Programs that resulted to garnering awards, notably the Best Practice Award for Renal Disease Control Program given by the Department of Health – Regional Office VII.



Education and Skills Development

- The current provincial leadership continues to give full support to its President Carlos P. Garcia Scholarship Program, and the Bohol Educational Subsidy Program.
- Partnership with relevant National Government Agencies and Stakeholders is strengthened. Just recently, the Country's first Senior High



School Tourism Learning Facility in Lourdes, Panglao, Bohol, and the Agri-Entrepreneur Senior High School in San Pascual, Ubay, Bohol had the Blessing, turnover and unveiling ceremonies.



- The province continues to enhance competencies of applicants to match with the skills requirements/standards of hiring agencies and industries and have also institutionalized Programs to support Education and Skills Development.
- And still more of the provincial innovations in education: Special Program for Employment of Students, Student Recognition Program, Classroom Building Needs Validation, and Anti-Drug Abuse Awareness Program.

Agriculture and Food Security

- To ensure food security, the Provincial Agriculture Office continues with its major programs in Crops Productivity, for rice, corn, high value commercial crops, and the BAHAY KUBO FAITH, HOPE and CHARITY, together with our Gulayan sa Paaralan.
- Production of palay in 2015 and 2016 decreased due to El Niño that started in 2014. Vulnerability of some low-lying areas to flooding also affected production. However, the PGBh implemented mitigating measures to lessen the impact through rounds of Cloud Seeding operations, enrollment to crop insurance, and distribution of climate-resilient seedlings. Without these mitigating measures, which lessened the impact of El Niño, production could have decreased even further. Still, even with these challenges, Bohol remains the highest producer of rice in the region, compensating for the losses of other provinces.
- We continue to support Organic Agriculture Development as well as the production of a Special Rice Variety in Bohol. Farm Mechanization Support is also a major form of assistance together with Enterprise Development, Fishery Resources Development and Management, Development of Livestock Commodity Champions, under which we have many initiatives, most notably under i-REAP component of the PRDP.



- We have sustained our Effective Veterinary Health Programs, our Canine Rabies Prevention and Elimination Program, the Enforcement and Review of Existing Laws and Policies, for which, once again, the Province of Bohol received a plaque of recognition for the implementation of Rabies Program towards the national goal of a RABIES-FREE PHILIPPINES.
- And for our Meat Safety and Control Program, Bohol was awarded as the “Best LGU on the implementation of Meat Inspection and Safety”.



Tourism and Livelihood

- Bohol is going full speed ahead with our Tourism Development Program as well as its aggressive Marketing and Promotions, which has already generated concrete results.
- The distinct Bohol brand is very well exemplified by the “Behold Bohol” tagline, logo and overall theme. Just recently, the province launched in Manila its new tagline: BEHOLD Bohol.
- Bohol was the the only province featured in the coronation night of Miss Universe, thanks to Ms. Pia Wurtzbach, Ms. Ashley Graham and the Miss Universe organizers for visiting our island province of Bohol and helping promote Bohol.
- Through the Bohol Tourism Office (BTO), the province continues to enhance its tourism services towards barrier-free tourism.
- There is the forthcoming direct flights from Korea to Bohol (from Incheon & Busan) later in 2017, and even the short-distance flights from Bohol to Cebu and Cagayan de Oro in early 2017.
- The province continues to support Boholano graduates through the Employment and Placement Program under the Bohol Employment and Placement Office (BEPO), which continues to enhance Labor Market Information, Mobile Services, and look after the OFW and Migrant Workers Welfare, should unfortunate or tragic circumstances befall them.



Information Technology



- IT advancement is largely private sector-driven, and the province through the Bohol Information Communication and Technology Unit (BICTU) coordinate closely with the service providers who will give realization to our long-held dream of participating actively in the BPO industry. Philippine Long Distance Telephone Company (PLDT) and Globe Telecom have completed upgrading Bohol's connectivity to the national fiber optic node into fully-protected submarine cables that go through different routes and are ready for commercial use.

- For the PGBh part, we continue the Development and Enhancement of our Information Systems, which includes the updating and improvement of PGBh and Department Websites.



- The Enhanced Tax Revenue Assessment and Collection System (ETRACS) implementation in the municipalities is generating good results for component LGUs.

- We continue to conduct Capacity Development to increase competencies and productivity of IT staff and increase lifespan of IT Equipment.



- The provincial offices are becoming more and more GIS-savvy as an LGU, as the PGBh pursue more GIS capacity development.
- Even the ten province-owned hospitals are benefiting from IT, through the iHOMIS System.
- And the PGBh continues to strongly support our Bohol ICT Council.

Boholano Culture and Heritage Preservation

- The Arts Program managed by the Center for Culture and Arts Development (CCAD) had hosted a good number of provincial, national and even international arts and culture events.



- Soon to be completed, the Old Provincial Capitol will be re-opened as the Bohol Branch of the National Museum.
- The rehabilitation and reconstruction of Bohol's damaged churches and heritage buildings continues at a careful and deliberate pace, with the guidance of heritage experts.
- The province also holds its regular arts and culture celebrations – such as the series of events the PGBh is currently hosting, in celebration of February as Arts Month.

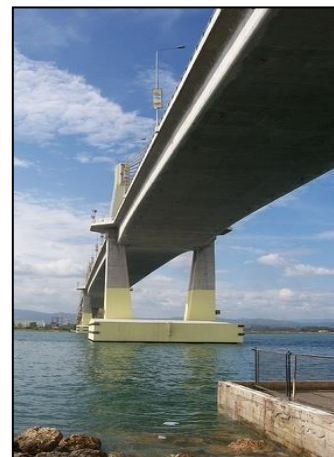


Forthcoming Major Programs and Projects

- The first batch of forthcoming projects consists of those which are already in the works, or have been given assured funding, or have been identified as urgent:

BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF THE PROVINCE

Location

Bohol is an island province of the Philippines located in the Central Visayas Region (Region 7) consisting of Bohol Mainland and 75 minor surrounding islands. Its capital is Tagbilaran City. Bohol is the tenth largest island of the Philippines, with a land area of 4,117.26 square kilometers (1,589.68 sq mi) and a coastline of about 261 kilometers (162 miles) long. To the west of Bohol is Cebu Province, to the northeast is the island province of Leyte and to the south, across the Bohol Sea is Mindanao.

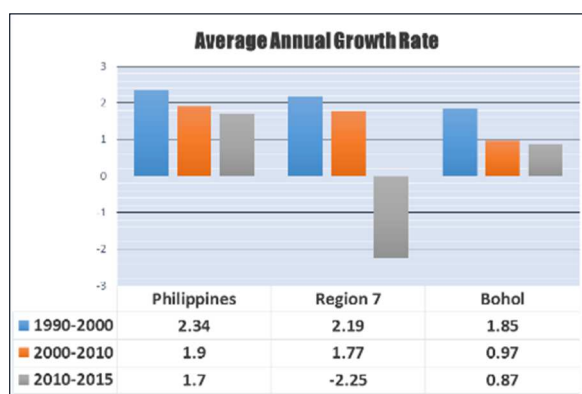
Population

Based on the latest 2015 Census on Population, Bohol's population reached 1.313 Million, showing a 0.87% average annual increase from the 2010 population count. Such annual growth rate is higher than the Central Visayas' growth rate of negative 2.25%. Bohol's population growth, however, is lower than that of the 1.70% national annual growth rate. With this growth, estimated population of the province in 2018 is at 1.348 Million and will further increase to 1.432 Million in 2025.

Among the 48 localities, Tagbilaran City has the highest population with 105,051, followed by municipalities of Ubay, Talibon, Carmen, Tubigon, Inabanga, Daus, Loon, Jagna, and Panglao. Sikatuna is the least populated municipality with only 6,726 population.

While population of Bohol has steadily increased, the pace of increase, however, slowed down from 1.85% average annual increase (1990-2000) to 0.97% (2000-2010) and further to 0.87% (2010-2015).

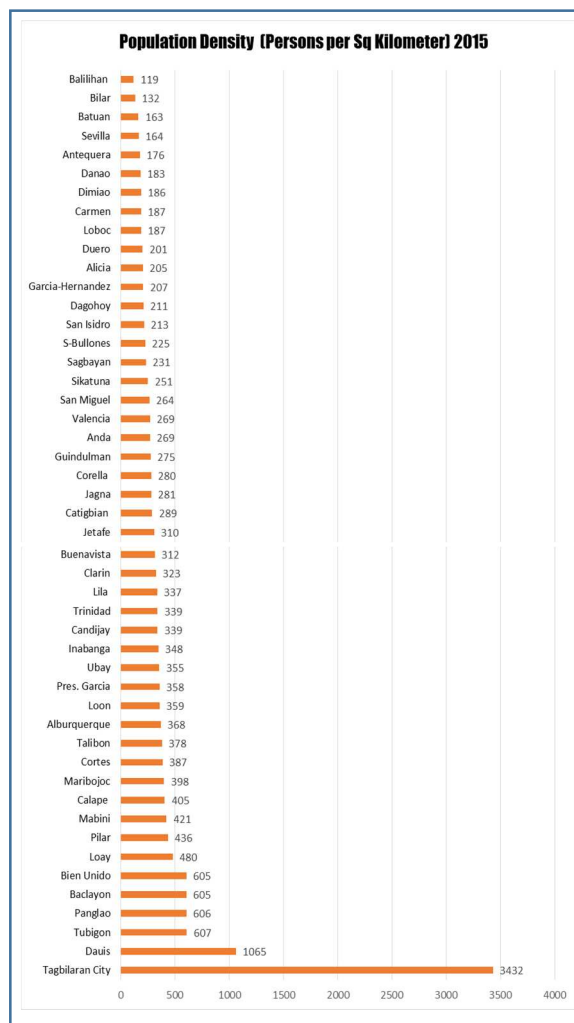


The municipality of Panglao has the highest growth rate in the Province (3.08%). Among the top 10 localities with high growth rates include Daus, Jetafe, Sagbayan, Cortes, Trinidad, Baclayon, Corella, Talibon, and Tagbilaran City. The municipalities with

negative growth rates include Dimiao, San Isidro, Mabini, Anda, Loboc, Valencia, Danao, Antequera and Catigbian.

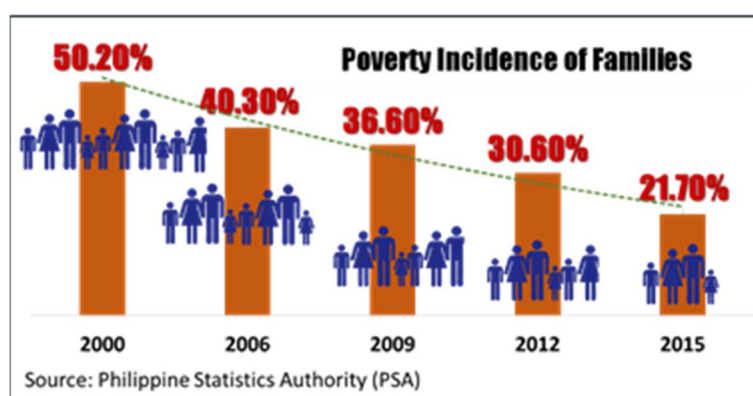
Based on the 2010 Census, the population structure of Bohol shows bigger group of younger people (with 34% belonging to age group under 15 years old). Female reproductive Age (Child-bearing age) comprised 23%. Males outnumbered females in the 0-54 years old. Females outlived the males in the older age groups. Those aging 60 and over comprised 10% of Bohol's Population. During such Census, it was established that the median age is 23.7 or 24 years (meaning half of the population was younger than 24 years). This is higher than the median age of 22 years in year 2000.

Bohol's population density is 315 persons per sq. km in 2015, which is higher compared to the 305 persons per sq. km in 2010. In 1990, the province's population density was only 230 persons per sq. km. Most of the densely populated areas in the province are found along the coast, concentrated along the north to northeastern part of Bohol. Among the top 10 most densely populated areas in the province include Tagbilaran City (3432/km²), Dauis (1065/km²), Tubigon, Panglao, Baclayon, Bien Unido, Loay, Pilar, Mabini and Calape. On the other hand, the least densely populated areas include Balilihan (119/km²), Bilar, Batuan, Sevilla, Antequera, Danao, Dimiao, Carmen, Loboc and Duero.

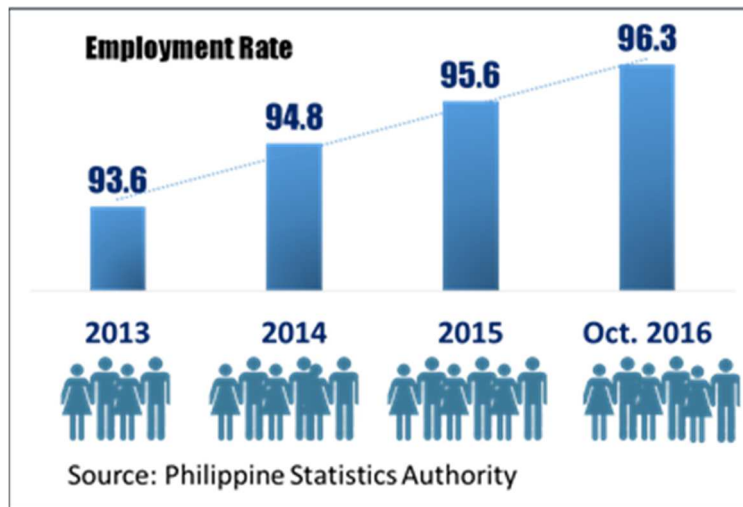


Poverty

Bohol's poverty incidence has consistently decreased from 2000 to 2015. From a high 50.2% in 2000, poverty incidence significantly improved to 36.6% in 2009 and then to 21.7% in 2015. The 2015 poverty figure is even lower than the Central Visayas' 23.6% poverty



among families.



In terms of employment in the Province, employment rate has improved over the past four years. Based on the Labor Force Survey of the Philippine Statistics Authority (PSA), employment rate of Bohol sustained its increase from the 93.65 in 2013 to 94.8% in 2014 and further to 95.6% in 2015. Latest figure for 2016 (as of October), has already posted a 96.3% employment rate, which is

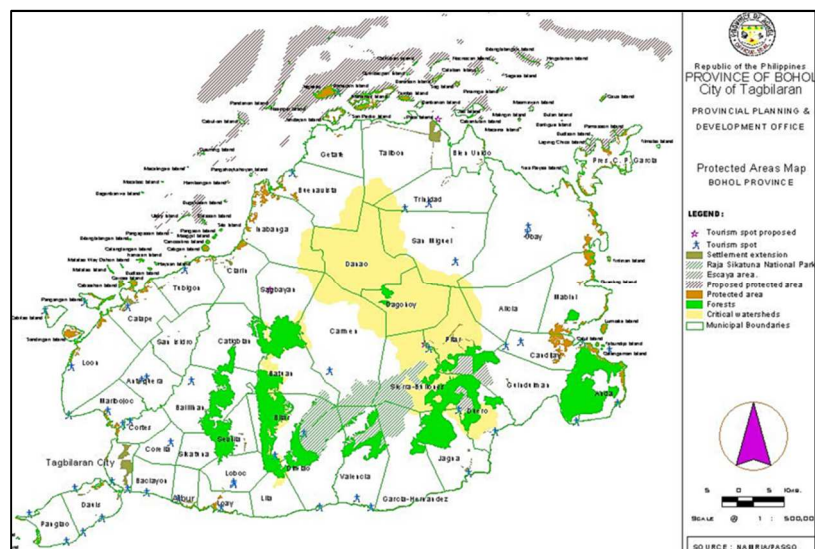
higher than the regional average of 94.9% and national average of 95% during that period.

Physical Resources

Bohol is endowed with a rich biodiversity and natural resources that play an essential role in guiding its future development for agriculture, industry, tourism, settlements, culture and infrastructure in both the medium and long-term time frame. It has a high diversity of flora and fauna found in the different ecosystems of the island such as its forests, reefs, farmlands, in zones along creeks and rivers, caves and marine areas. The quality of life in any given area is extremely dependent on the vibrant condition of these ecosystems and biological resources.

Bohol has a total land area of 411,726 hectares with 654 kilometers of coastline and 6,245 square kilometers of municipal waters covering its major islands and islets. The province is within four major resource boundaries, i.e., upland/forestry, lowland/agriculture, coastal/marine and water boundaries.

Bohol's water supply system for domestic, agricultural and industrial uses is mainly based on 2,224 springs, 59 rivers and 200 creeks. There are 22 rivers basins/watersheds that are valuable sources of water for drinking and irrigation. Surface



Almost one-half of the province total land area is covered by grassland / shrub land, while one-third of its total area is utilized for agricultural activities. The province has a larger coverage of woodland (10.69%) compared to Cebu and some other provinces in the region. Wetland constitutes 4.92%, which includes mangrove, nipa, beach sands and fishponds while built-up areas comprise 10.22%.

Bohol has 2,224 springs, 59 rivers and 200 creeks.

The primary sources of water for domestic irrigation, industrial and tourism are coming from springs, deep wells, and shallow wells.

In terms of biodiversity assets,

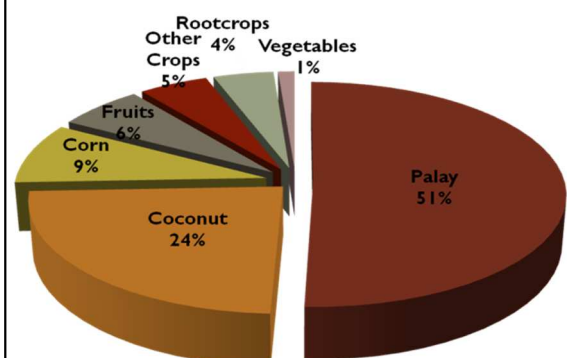
Bohol has a high biodiversity level of plant species categorized as: upland, mangrove, coastal areas, cave entrances, cultivated cropland and intensively used lands. Several plant species noted to be abundant before are already extinct, others are becoming rare.

The Province has the biggest mangrove forest in Southeast Asia located in Banacon, Getafe. There are about 1,200 species of crabs and shrimps with over 6,000 mollusks species found in 15,000 hectares of Baclayon, Dauis and Panglao (Bohol Marine Triangle). Bohol has one of the the six (6) World-renown Double Barrier Reefs - the Danajon Double Barrier Reef, covering 13 municipalities. The province has a total of 1,920 hectares of coral reefs and its coastal ecosystem provides the major source of animal protein for the populace.

Economy and Priority Industries

The economy of Bohol is largely agri-based with agricultural activities focused on the cultivation of crops on its vast agricultural land. With this, home-based industries, which are mostly of the micro and cottage types, play a vital role in the economy. The government continues to provide support to sustain the development and production of major crops such as palay, corn, high value commercial crops, fisheries through upland

Area Harvested to Major Crops

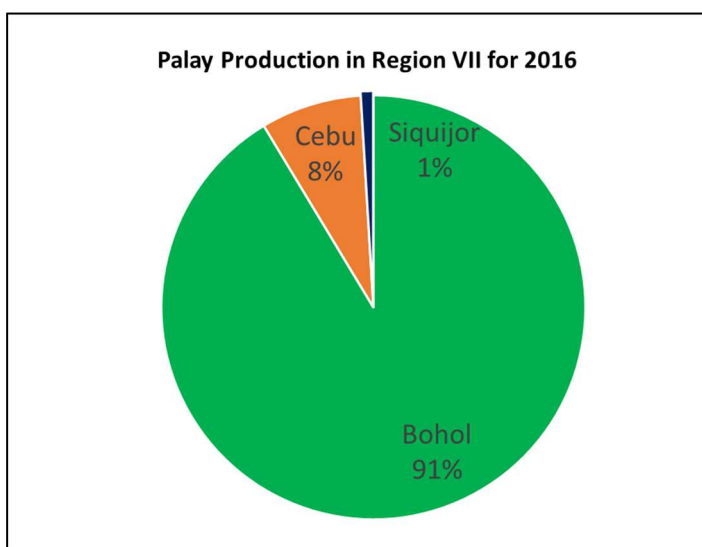

and marine aquaculture, organic agriculture and livestock. The development of dairy products is also being pursued in collaboration with appropriate government agencies and livestock farmers' groups. Support for this program would allow further value-adding processing of cow and carabao's milk, which in turn, will provide higher income for farmers.

Agriculture is the largest sector in terms of providing employment as well as in land use. Of the total land area of the province, 273,950 hectares (66%) are available and use for agriculture. 148,673 hectares or 54% of this area is planted with and harvested of major crops. Among the major crops planted in the area include palay (51%), coconut (24%), corn (9%), fruits, rootcrops, and vegetables.

The El Niño has taken its toll in the rice production of Bohol, as the province experience a generally decreasing trend of rice harvested for the past 3 years. Palay production in 2013 posted 256,405 metric tons, which, reduced to 252,816 metric tons in 2015 and further to 161,003 metric tons in 2016. The effects of El Niño could have been more severe without the mitigating measures implemented by the government through cloud seeding operations, distribution of weather resilient type of seeds, and provision of agriculture support services. It can be noted that despite the El Niño, the Province of Bohol still remains to be the major rice producer in Region VII, accounting about 91% of the total production of rice in Central Visayas in the year 2016.

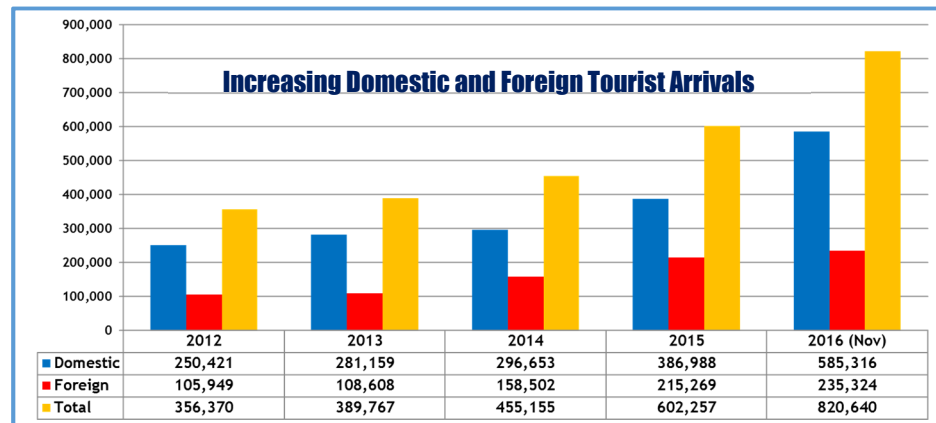


In terms of livestock production, there is generally an increasing inventory of hog, goat, and carabao in the province of Bohol for 2016. Among the livestock inventory, hog remains to be the largest in number with 306,292 in 2016, which has increased by 7.5% compared to 2015 inventory levels. This is followed by goat, cattle and carabao. Both goat and carabao production also increased in 2016 by 3.6% and 1.5%, respectively. Cattle inventory in Bohol for 2016 decreased by 1%, with the El Niño being the main reason for its slight decline. Meanwhile, chicken inventory in the Province is up by a significant 13.6% in 2016 compared to inventory levels in 2015.

For fisheries, catch from aquaculture activities remains to be highest contributor to the volume of fishery production in the province. In 2016, aquaculture posted 84% share in total production. Municipal fishery shared 13% of the production, with commercial fishing contributing 3%. It is worthy to note that catch from municipal and commercial fishing has increased for 2016.

Tourism is another industry, which is sustained by both the private sector and government. It has been noted that Bohol's visitor arrivals has increased throughout the years and such trend has significantly contributed to the province's economic growth.

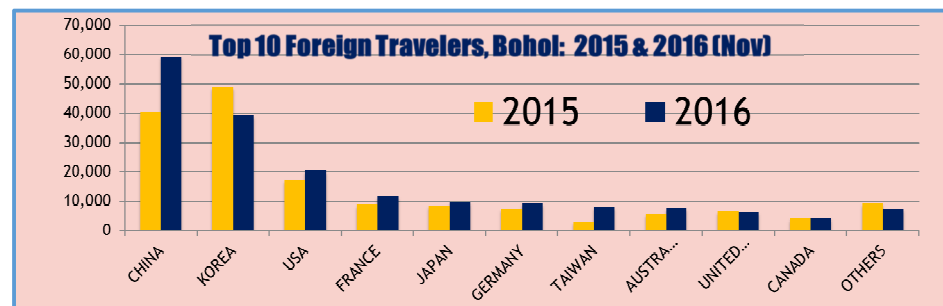
Based on tourism data, for the period 2012 to 2016 (up to November), visitor arrivals has increased by 130%, comparing the 2012 arrivals of 356,370 and 820,640 in 2016. It can be noted that after the 2013



earthquake,

visitor arrivals has increased further with 16.7% increase in 2015. This further increased by 36% in 2016. Domestic visitor still accounts the majority share of the total arrivals with an average of 69% for the period 2012-2016. Foreign visitors, meanwhile on average shared 31% for the period.

Among the foreign visitors in the province for 2016 (as of November), Chinese dominated the tourism



market, sharing 32%. It is followed by the Koreans accounting nearly 22% of the foreign visitor during the year. Other top foreign visitors include Americans, French, Japanese, Germans, Taiwanese, Australians, British, and Canadians. It is worthy to note that for the period 2015-2016, the Taiwanese posted the highest increase in visitor arrivals with recorded 159%.

As to the regional scene, Bohol has the highest increase in the number of tourists among the provinces of Central Visayas for the year 2016 (as of November). The Province posted an increase by 46.1% in 2016 from its 2015 figures. This is significantly higher than the 39.8% of Siquijor and 11.6% of Cebu province.

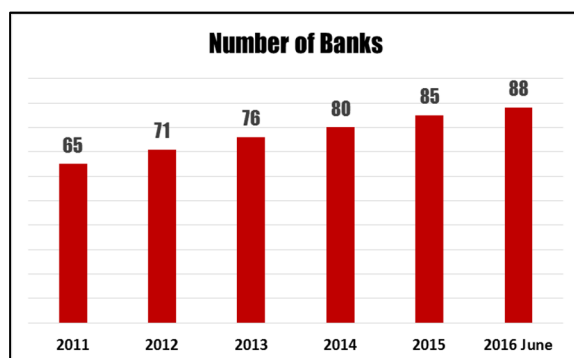
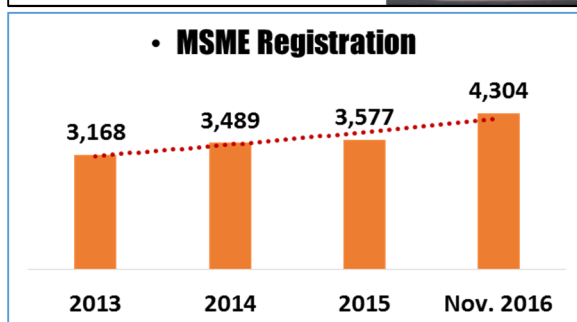
Local and foreign industry players continue to pour in investments in this sector considering the consistent and stable growth of the tourism industry in the province and bright outlook of the future. Improvement of infrastructure and support facilities in the province has also entice larger investments through the years. For accommodation services, for example, the number of accommodation facilities as well as the number of rooms has doubled for the period of six years.

In terms of trade, investments and livelihood, an estimate of over P6 Billion from large investments are poured in the province for new hotels, resorts and malls (for the period 2013-2015). Another P8 Billion investments were capitalized for agri-business from private sector sources.

Also, micro, small, and medium enterprises (MSMEs) in the province sustained its increasing trend over the last 7 years (2010-2016) with a total of 4,304 businesses registered in 2016 (as of November). Such number is notably 20% higher compared to the 2015 figure of 3,577. These MSMEs provided significant number of jobs from 7,520 in 2013 to 11,850 in 2016. Investments from MSMEs in 2016 reached to P1.4 Billion.

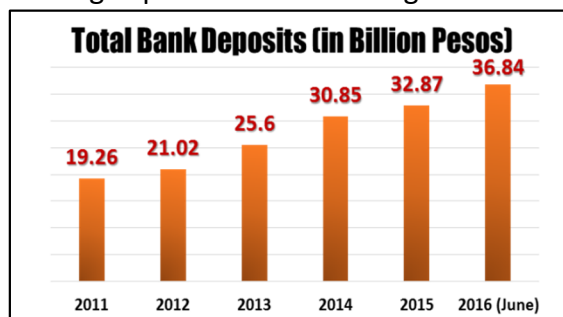
Furthermore, the operation of cooperatives in the province is also thriving to provide socio-economic benefits to its members. In 2016, there were already 322 CDA-compliant cooperatives in Bohol, operating with P2.71 Billion total assets.

The banking industry in the province has also shown a stable and growing economy with an increasing number of banks established in Bohol. For a span of 6 years, a total of 23 new bank branches were established in the province, making the total number of banks to 88 in the year 2016. Total number of accounts also rose from 399,269 in 2011 to



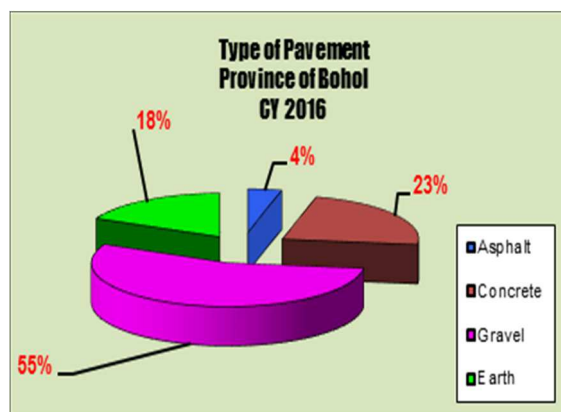
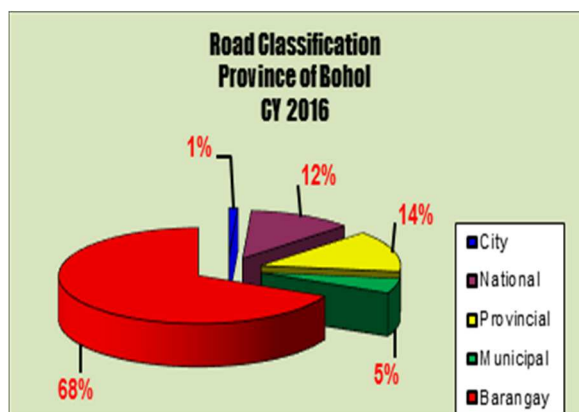
590,103 in 2016. Total bank deposits grew from just P19.26 Billion in 2011 to P36.84 Billion in 2016 (June).

Another new but promising industry in Bohol is the sector on Information Technology, particularly for business process and knowledge process outsourcing. With the improvement of information technology highway, following the installation of fiber optic technology in Bohol by private telecommunication firms, the province may soon provide significant employment opportunities for its capable workforce for such related services. This will be pursued by both the private and public sector thru the development of IT Buildings/ Park in suitable areas of the province.

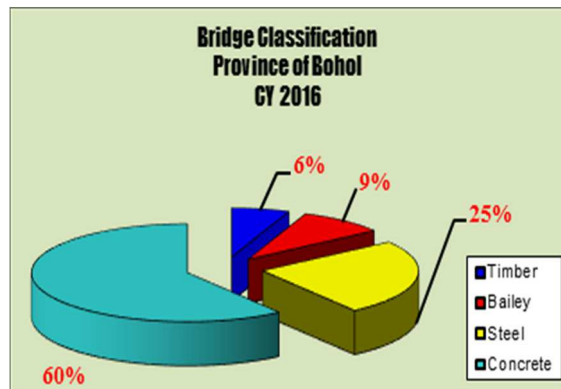


Infrastructure Support

As of 2016, Bohol's **total road** length is 6,131.40 kilometers. Of these roads, 14% is classified as provincial roads and 12% as national roads. The city road only accounts 1% while municipal road 5%. Barangay roads have the longest stretch of roads, accounting



68%. In terms of type of pavement, most (55%) of the province's roads are still gravel, which may be attributed to local roads. Concrete roads account 23%, and continue to increase in length as both national and local governments sustain their projects for road concreting. Asphalt road, on the other hand, shared 4% of the total road length. Meanwhile, 18% of the province road remains to be earth roads, which are mostly classified as barangay roads.

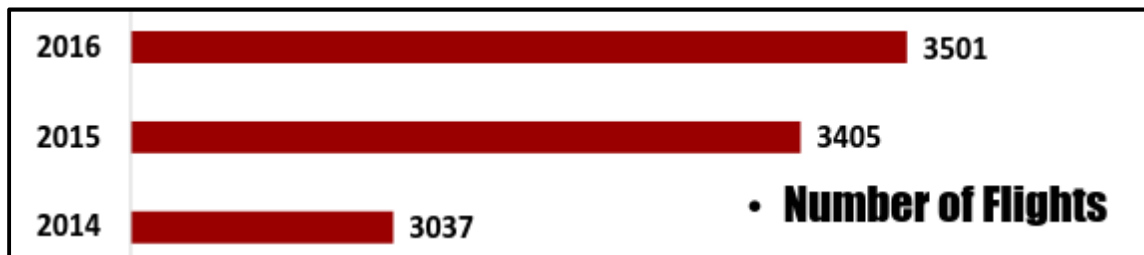


As to bridges, there are 8,199.35 linear meters of bridges within the road network in the province. 60% of this total length is concrete. Steel bridge accounts 25% while bailey 9%. There are still timber bridges in the province, which shared 6% of the total length.

Majority of the bridges in the province are under the jurisdiction of the national government, which accounts 56%. The Provincial Government is maintaining 1,633 linear meters or 20% of these bridges. The rest of the bridges are managed and maintained by the city/ municipal and barangay local governments.

There are several **ports** in Bohol, serving as the gateways of people and goods to and from the province. Of these ports, there is only 1 baseport, located in Tagbilaran City. There are 4 terminal ports, 2 outports located in several coastal municipalities. The Port of Tagbilaran is considered a major port of entry while the Port of Tubigon, the busiest among the terminal ports, offer more than ten daily round trips plying the Cebu-Bohol route. The Port of Jagna offers services that ply between Bohol to Cagayan, Nasipit and Camiguin with roll-on, roll-off route. Shipcalls in these ports are increasing. For 2015, total shipcalls recorded was 23,480. This has increased significantly to 27,447 in 2016, equivalent to 16.9% uptrend. Passenger traffic correspondingly increased from 4,340,214 in 2015 to 5,129,869 in 2016.

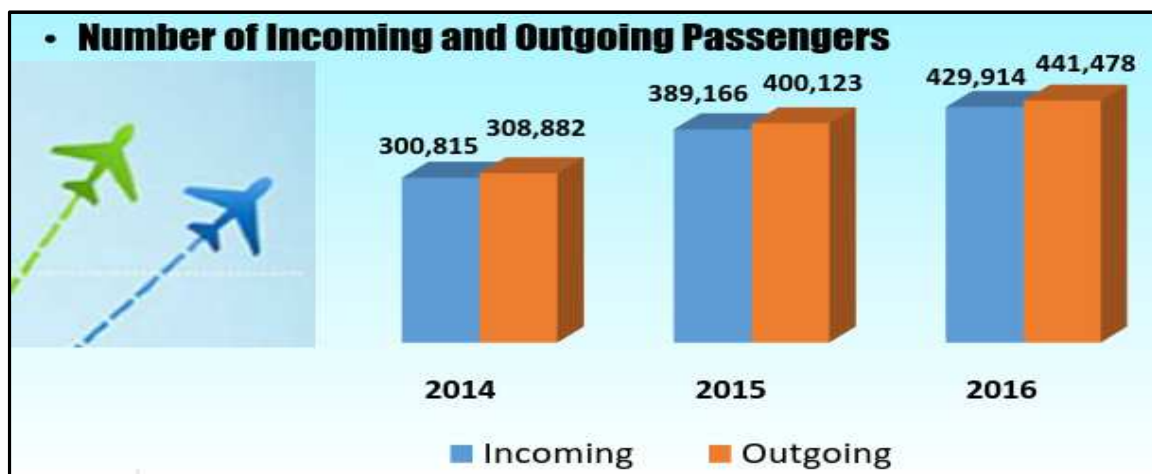
For **air travel**, the Province of Bohol is being served by only 1 domestic airport located in Tagbilaran City. Number of flights to the province has been increasing for the past 3 years brought about by airline competition and level of demand for air travel.



For 2014, flights recorded reached to 3,037. This increased to 3,405 in 2015 and further to 3,501 in 2016.

Air travel passengers, both for incoming and outgoing, have also increased for the last three years. Incoming passengers for 2016 has posted a total of 429,914, significantly higher than the 300,815 in 2014. Meanwhile, outgoing passengers in 2016 have reached a total of 441,478, posting a 43% increase from the 2014 figures.

For **land transportation**, an increasing number of vehicles in the province has been



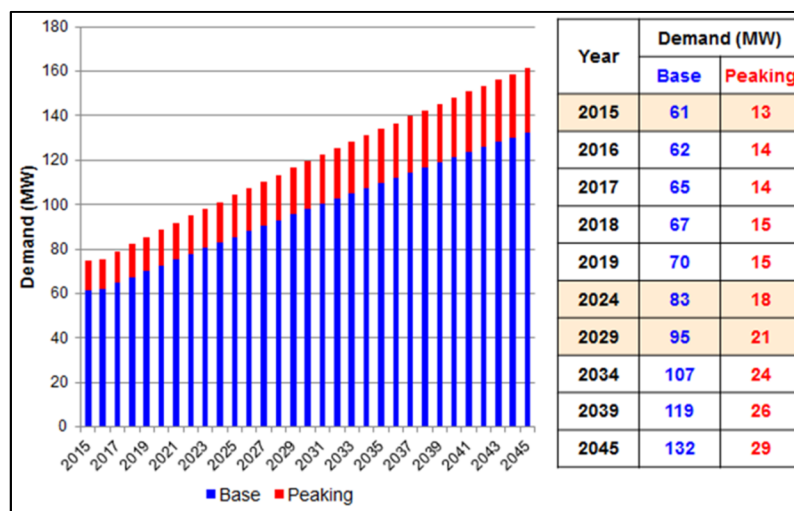
reported. For 2016, total number of registered vehicles has reached to 84,287, which is significantly higher than the 73,644 in 2015. This is translated to 14.5% increase. Such increase poses great challenge for land transportation managers and planners, on how to ensure a smooth and seamless travel within the province.

In the area of **energy**, majority of the power source of Bohol is coming from the Leyte-Bohol Power Interconnection thru submarine cables with power sources from the Geothermal Plant of Leyte and other sources from Cebu province. Bohol has three (3) Hydropower plants with total capacity of only 3.9 MW. A diesel plant is located in Tagbilaran City with capacity of 16.2 MW.

In CY 2016, the Dependable Capability Profile for Bohol is 100.10 MW, forecasted demand of 70 MW and net reserve of 40.7 MW. All municipalities in the province are already provided with electricity and 100% of all barangays are also energized as covered by three (3) distribution utilities: Bohol Light Company Inc., Bohol Electric Cooperative I and the Bohol Electric Cooperative II.

The province's projected base demand in 2017 is estimated to reach 65 MW and this is expected to increase to 83 MW in 2024 and further to 132 MW in 2045.



Projected peak demand, on the other hand, is estimated to reach 79 MW in 2017. Anticipating the growth of local economy, demand is projected to reach 100MW in year 2024.

The government, with the participation of the private sector and key players in the industry is pushing for the development of new power sources in the province, most preferably thru renewable energy, as well as building facilities for a second transmission line linking Bohol and Cebu Province. These initiatives are being pursued to ensure the

reliable, affordable and sufficient power supply to support the continuing socio-economic growth of the province.

Income Classification

The Province of Bohol is a First Class Province in terms of income classification. Its municipalities, however, have varied income class depending on income levels each LGU has generated and raised.

Of the 48 city/ municipalities, 50% was classified as 4th Class, while 25% (12 LGUs) classified as 5th class. There are only three (3) municipalities that have reached the income levels for 1st class, which include Talibon, Tubigon and Ubay. Two (2) Municipalities – Carmen and Loon were classified as 3rd Class. Seven (7) LGUs, including Tagbilaran City, were classified as 3rd Class.

Raising revenues as well as reducing the dependency to the Internal Revenue Allotment (IRA) has been a common goal of LGUs in order to have sufficient level of financial resources to fund priority development programs and support the operations of local governments.

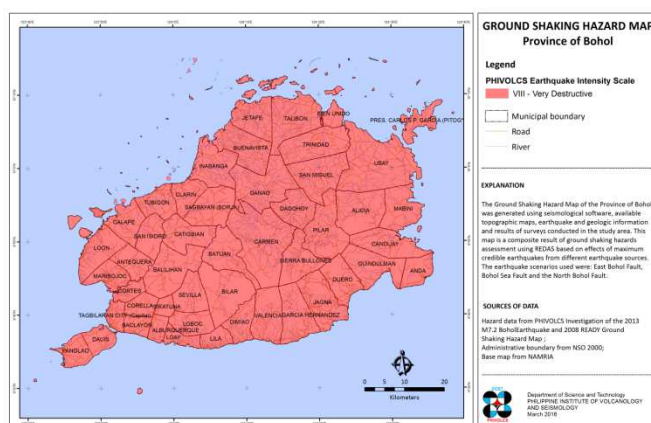

Natural Hazards

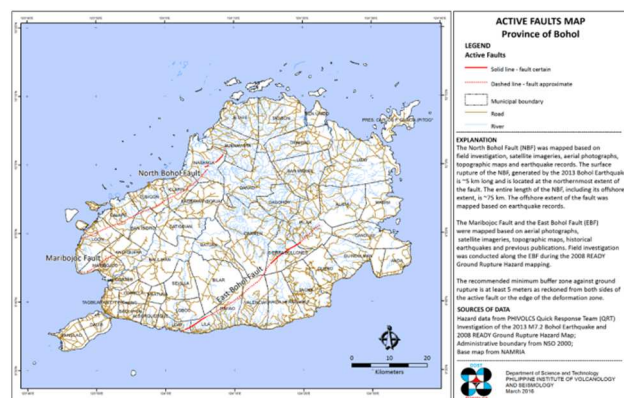
The Province of Bohol is prone to several hazards. Its inhabitants are vulnerable and at risks for natural calamities such as typhoons, earthquakes, flooding, tsunami, storm surges, wind wave, landslides, liquefaction and drought.

Based on the Hazard Susceptibility Study conducted in Bohol, eight (8) of the 48 towns/city are vulnerable to all types of hazards (Cortes, Duero, Guindulman, Inabanga, Jagna, Loay, Maribojoc, and Valencia) while the rest of the municipalities are prone to 3 to 7 hazards.

After the Great Bohol Earthquake and strong typhoons in in 2013, which caused the lives of Boholanos and destroyed Billions worth of properties, the public and government have strengthened their awareness and readiness for better disaster risk reduction management at the local level. Capacities are continually being improved not just for emergency responders and the government but also down to the household and purok level to ensure that the risk for people are reduced and/or



prevented.

STATE OF ADMINISTRATIVE GOVERNANCE

Various innovations on governance have been sustained by the Provincial Government. Building on and learning from the accomplishments of past years, effective programs and initiatives have been continued and supported taking into consideration on how these programs have improved the lives of Boholanos and enhanced the efficiency and effectiveness of the bureaucracy in delivering basic services.

Among its leading programs is the InSPIRED H.E.A.T. – IT Caravan that has been recognized to directly provide the needed services to constituents most especially those that are living in rural areas. In 2016, two (2) caravans have been undertaken in the Municipalities of Batuan and Maribojoc. Such initiative

has provided assistance in various forms to 10,825 beneficiaries. The caravans have gone a long way and has reached and touched the lives of many Boholanos. From the first time I was held in 2010, which benefitted a total of 8,807, total beneficiaries by the end of 2016 has already reached to 277,649 individuals covering 564 barangays in the Province. It is worthy to note that such caravans were undertaken in partnership with various government, non-government and private organizations totaling to 104, from just 39 organizations since its implementation.



For the year, medical outreach missions were also conducted with the assistance and partnership with foreign and local medical associations and practitioners, other government agencies. During the year a total of 5 International Humanitarian Missions were held in coordination with the Philippine gift of Life, Inc.

and other volunteer partners that provided 700 major surgery and 5,500 medical and dental services. A total of 44 local medical, dental and wellness missions were also held: 29 Regular Outreach Missions benefiting 6,729 individuals; 9 CDP-PPM missions



benefiting 2,524 individuals; 3 Peoples day with 292 individuals benefited; and 3 medical missions for Senior Citizens serving 1,260 elderly

Also being sustained is another innovation of the Provincial Government, which is the Countryside Development Program – Purok Power Movement (CDP-PPM). Such initiative have provided constituents, down to the purok level, livelihood assistance, agriculture and fisheries development services, health services, infrastructure support and even assistance in the resolution of local conflicts such as of land disputes. The CDP-PPM is also an effective strategy to promote disaster risk reduction management at the purok level as well as in the sustaining peace and development in the province. In 2016, the CDP-PPM has implemented capability building for barangays and puroks on crime prevention and enforcement. Other activities during the year include: special Sustainability Team deployment, needs assessment deployment, iProTeam and ProTeam deployment, ProTokTeam Deployment, CDP-PPM Medical, Dental and Agri Caravan and Hand-over / Induction of SWC volunteers, Peace Advocacy Symposium on CARHRIHL and CLIP, Provincial and International Day of Peace, provision of Sustainable Socio-Economic Livelihood, Kauban sa Reporma (Former Rebel) engagement and evaluation.

To bring government closer to the people, the Provincial Government continued the conduct of People's Day every Monday of the week, wherein people can directly air their concerns to different departments as well as to the Provincial Governor. Further, schedule for a People's Day is also being assigned in the various Sub-Offices of the Office of the Governor in Carmen, Jagna, Talibon and Ubay.

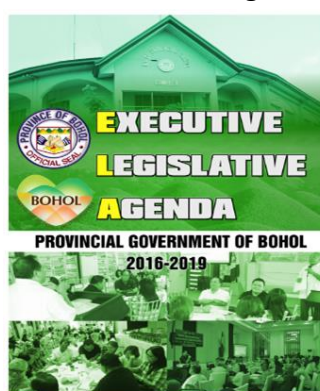
For **local legislation**, the Sangguniang Panlalawigan (SP) of Bohol has approved a total of 21 Ordinances and 671 Resolutions during the year. These legislative measures are supportive to the InSPIRED HEAT-IT Bohol development framework and in line with the Executive-



Legislative Agenda (ELA). The SP has conducted 47 paperless Legislative Sessions, 57 Committee Meetings, and 3 marathon budget hearings. 12 investigations were also held in aid of legislation. Among the notable accomplishments with regards to local codes are the amendments related to the Environment Code, Tourism Code and Revenue Code.

Participatory governance has been sustained by the Provincial Government of Bohol through the implementation of consultative mechanisms in policy and decision-making. Meetings and consultations with department heads and key officials have been appropriately lodged through the Management Executive Board (MEB), that regularly meets to discuss policy formulation, implementation and priority directions. The Cluster approach is also being continued now with 5 development clusters (Infrastructure, Health, Social-Economic-Environment Management, Finance and Administration). With new set of Provincial leaders after the May 2016 general elections, the Provincial Government has revisited its overarching development framework and crafted its

Executive Legislative Agenda (ELA). The process went through series of participatory workshops and consultations. At one setting, the executive branch through the governor, chiefs of offices and key personnel, and the members of the Sangguniang Panlalawigan, gone through actual identification and



discussion of the priorities of the Province for the next three years. The gathering was also attended by the Congressmen of Bohol, who signified their utmost support. The outputs of the workshop has been presented for discussion and comments from other stakeholders of Bohol – the LGUs, civil society organizations, private sector and development partners. For technical inputs, the framework and ELA were also presented to the UP Advisory Council, which is a group of UP professors who provide pro bono advice and assistance to the Provincial Government. To ensure wide coverage and understanding of the framework, such were disseminated to various gatherings here and outside Bohol. Both development framework and ELA were adapted and approved by the Sangguniang Panlalawigan.

Meanwhile, partnerships with the Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) are also

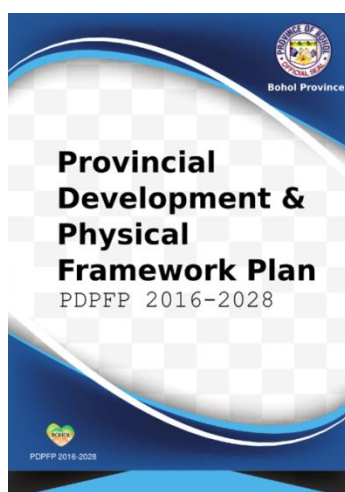


being sustained to pursue common and aligned development priorities in the Province. Through counterparting arrangements and collaboration, harmonized activities are undertaken to achieve greater results. Such partnerships are also being strengthened with the conduct of CSO Week celebration every year.

The active operation of local special bodies in the province also provides mechanism for a more participatory process of **planning, development** and **decision-making**. For **development**, to cite an example, the operation of the Provincial Development Council (PDC) allows various stakeholders to participate in decision-making related to the project prioritization, fund-sourcing and monitoring. For the year, the PDC conducted 2 Full Council Meetings and 5 Executive Committee meetings that deliberated, among others, the priority programs and projects of the Provincial Government, NGAs, and LGUs.

Another major accomplishment of the PDC is the updating and approval of the Bohol's Provincial Development and Physical Framework Plan (PDPFP), which sets the development direction of the province for the next 12 years. Series of workshops, through the PDC-Sectoral Technical Working Groups, were undertaken, including the integration of Disaster Risk Reduction and Climate Change Adaptation strategies.

Other activities made for the PDPFP updating include consultation and validation processes, spatial planning and mapping and the approval by the PDC and Sangguniang Panlalawigan.



The Province of Bohol has maintained its strong cooperation and convergence with NGAs, LGUs, CSOs, Private Sector and ODA Organization in various development initiatives. Among the notable engagements is the creation of the Panglao Island and City of Tagbilaran Executive Committee (PITEC). The PITEC is a collaborative mechanism between Provincial Government, Tagbilaran City, Dauis and Panglao on tourism,

environment management and other development initiatives. This is in collaboration with the Strengthening Urban Resilience for Growth with Equity (SURGE) Project funded by the USAID. The convergence also brought about another partnership with LGUs, this time between Bohol Province and Palawan/Tagbilaran-Puerto Princesa on tourism and



Environmental Programs and Policy Development Exchange.

Pursuing local economic development through investment promotions and business-friendly environment has been sustained with clear partnership and complementation of efforts with the private sector. Among the initiatives include the operation of the Bohol Business One Stop

Shop and the Negosyo Center, which is spearheaded by the Bohol Investment Promotion Center. Major activities conducted were the Digital Summit, Investment Forum, several Power Investment Forum, tripartite partnership for investment promotion and promotion for Business process outsourcing opportunities.



In partnership with other local government units not just within but also outside the province, Bohol has become a learning destination for LGUs, National Government and Private Organizations. Among the best practices that the province can share are those related to disaster risk reduction management and good local governance.

Convergence with national government agencies and even Official Development Assistance (ODA) organizations remained strong as the Provincial Government implement various development programs.

Among these ODA-funded programs include the Philippine Rural Development Program (WORLD BANK – DA), Advancing Philippine Competitiveness (COMPETE) (USAID), Integrated Natural Resources and Environmental Management Project (ADB-DENR), and New Bohol Airport Construction and Sustainable Environmental Protection Project funded by JICA. Other ongoing cooperation with foreign support are the



Strengthening Urban Resilience for Growth with Equity (SURGE) Project, and partnerships with local and foreign Institutions for arts and culture development/preservation.

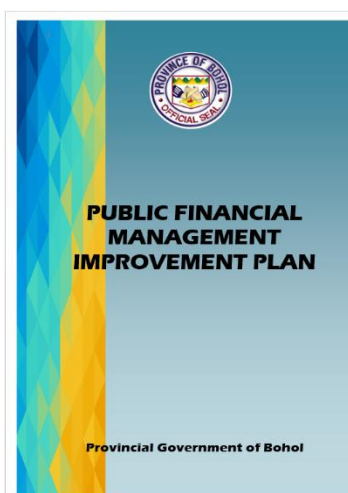
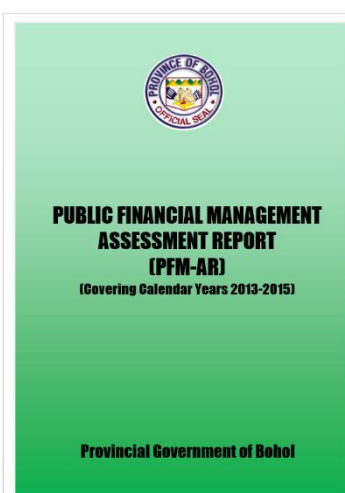
On **revenue generation**, the Provincial Government has posted total collection of **P1.819 Billion** for year 2016. These financial resources came from external and internally-generated sources, with the Internal Revenue Allotment (IRA) and share from national wealth accounting 85%. With this revenue level, collection for the year posted a 8.4% increase from the 2015. While the IRA share may still be the majority source of revenues, locally-generated collection, however, has increased compared to 2015. During the year, revenue collection from internally-generated sources reached to P245 Million, which translates an increase of 9.4% from the 2015 figures. Local revenues accounts 14% of the total collection for the year and the increase in collection was attributed from the uptrend collection from non-tax and tax revenues. Revenue generation powers of the Provincial Government needs to be maximized by operating economic enterprises using real property assets. The Public Economic Enterprise Management Unit (PEEMU) has been established to spearhead the study, analysis, development and operation of these enterprises.

Updating of the Revenue Code will continue to be pursued, to update and or introduce new revenue measures for collection by the Provincial Government. Other revenue-generation strategies implement include the implementation of ETRACs version 2.2 in 44 Municipalities, with all municipalities targeted to be completed in 2017, updating of ETRACS to version 2.5 in 5 pilot municipalities, intensified tax campaign/ strategy to improve collection efficiency on locally generated revenue, amendment of the Local Revenue Code and the conduct of 2016 General Revision of Real Property Assessment

In the area of **resource allocation**, the 2016 Provincial Budget has been operated through an Appropriation Ordinance, enacted by the Sangguniang Panlalawigan. The Annual Budget provided allocation for priority programs and projects as well as the regular operations of the Provincial Government, aligned and supportive to the overarching development framework and financial requirements of the Annual Investment Program for 2016. The budget conformed to all necessary statutory and contractual requirements set in the Budget Operations Manual and other pertinent guidelines and directives. The Annual Budget went through a review process (executive review) conducted by Governor with the members of the Local Finance Committee (LFC) through series of budget hearings. As mandated, the Sangguniang Panlalawigan conducted their own separate legislative budget hearings before the approval of the Appropriation Ordinance.

In terms of budget execution, the E-Budget System is utilized by the Provincial Budget Management Office (PBMO) in the processing of various claims, payrolls and vouchers. These services are necessary to ensure that all activities and corresponding expenditures are covered by appropriations. During the budget year, the PBMO conducted consultative fora for all offices to ensure that guidelines in budget utilization are followed.

Also sustained is the operation of the LFC that regular meets to discuss matters on fiscal management as well as recommend policies to the Governor and the Sangguniang Panlalawigan. Aside from the regular meetings, the LFC also conducted assessment and planning workshop, with the end view of tracking implementation of priority programs and activities identified in the Strategic Financial Management Plan. The LFC also conducted the assessment of the fiscal management of the Provincial Government thru the Public Financial Management Assessment Tool (PFMAT), as espoused by the Department of Budget and Management (DBM). During the year, the LFC prepared the Public Financial Management Assessment Report using the PFMAT as well as updated its Public Financial Management Improvement Plan.



To improve revenue generation and reduce IRA dependency, the PEEMU has already lined up specific activities for the initial operation of identified economic enterprises of the Provincial Government. Among these projects include the enhancement of facilities at the Bohol Biodiversity Complex (BBC) in Bilar and the completion and operation of the Café Caloy near the CPG house in Tagbilaran City.



In the area of improving internal control system, the operation of the Provincial Internal Audit Office (PIAO) as a full department has strengthened the fiscal management practices and control of the Provincial Government. Among the major accomplishments of PIAO during the year include the Creation and designation of internal



control system focal person in each PGBh offices, conduct of regular, special, mini and follow-up audit engagements, provision of Internal Control System Seminar and financial policy formulation.



Supportive to the drive of enhancing systems and processes within the organization, the Provincial

Accountant's Office has implemented the Electronic New Government Accounting System (e-NGAS) compliant with the Philippine Public Sector Accounting Standard (PPSAS). The office also exerted efforts for the conversion of e-NGAS to PPSAS, preparation and generation of Journal Entry Vouchers (JEVs) as well as updating the submission of Financial Reports to COA compliant to PPSAS and enhancement of the e-NGAS and e-BUDGET System Version 2.0.

In 2016, the Province of Bohol has also been awarded the Seal of Good Local Governance (SGLG) by the DILG. This means that the organization has also passed the standards for good fiscal management, which is one of the core requirements of the SGLG. Having been a recipient of the SGLG entitles the Province of Bohol an award of P4 Million from the Performance Challenge Fund that can be used for priority development projects.

Human resource management and development has been given priority by the Provincial Government of Bohol, through the Human Resource Development and Management Office (HRMDO). Among its accomplishments include the updating of Competency-based HRD Plan/ HRD Priorities, development of competency-based positions profile, and conduct of in-house capacity development trainings. The Human Resource Information System (HRIS) has also been enhanced the HR Core systems and functions were updated.



The Strategic Performance Management System (SPMS) continues to be implemented by the Provincial Government of Bohol as a means of setting performance targets and assessing actual accomplishments. During the year, the Civil Service Commission (CSC) certified the SPMS Functionality of the province. Also in the same year, the SPMS Internal Rules and Regulations were updated and cascaded to different PGBh offices.



During the year, the efforts and good practices of the Provincial Government of Bohol has been recognized by various oversight national agencies. The Provincial organization has been given the Seal of Good Local Governance by the Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG) for its sustained practices of good governance such as fiscal administration, disaster preparedness, social protection, business friendliness and competitiveness, peace and order and environmental management.





Governor Edgar Chatto has also been conferred with the “PAGASA Award” by Civil Service Commission (CSC). The governor is also among the DILG’s recognized 10 Honor Roll Governors in the Country with relentless efforts in waging war against Illegal Drugs and for their exemplary leadership in promoting good governance, transparency, business competitiveness and disaster preparedness.



Meanwhile, the Department of the Environment and Natural Resources has awarded the Gawad Tugas Award for Land Patent Issuance to the Province of Bohol, for the innovations and investments in environmental protection, conservation and management.

The ISO 14001: 2004 Accreditation has been sustained by the Province. The Teodoro B. Galagar District Hospital has also been awarded the ISO 9001:2008 with Certificate for Quality Management System (QMS) issued by TUV SUD last September 13, 2016.



The Province was also given the Outstanding Project Monitoring Award - Local Project Monitoring Committee by the Central Visayas Regional Development Council.



The Provincial Disaster Risk Reduction Management Office has been recognized for notable programs encompassing the four thematic areas of disaster management and unparalleled commitment to disaster resilience in Region VII.

In the area of public health, the Province has been accorded with the Best Practice Award for Renal Disease Control Program by the Department of Health – Regional Office VII.



At the same time, the Provincial bureaucracy has received a plaque of recognition for the implementation of Rabies Program towards the national goal of a Rabies-Free Philippines.



The Provincial LGU has been awarded as “Best LGU on the implementation of Meat Inspection and Safety”.

BUDGET PERFORMANCE AND FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

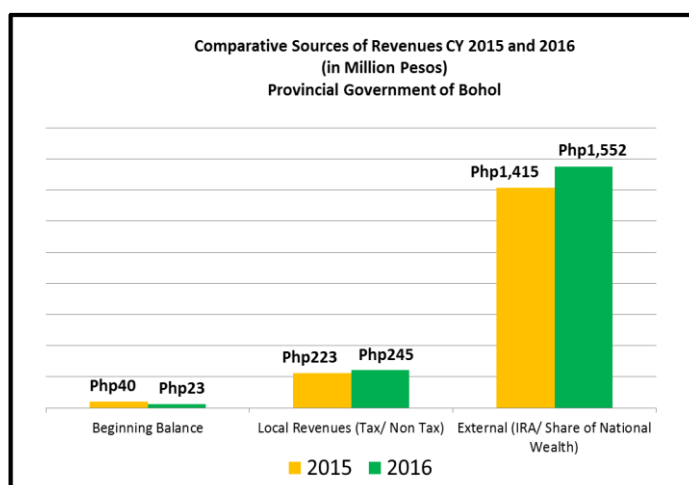
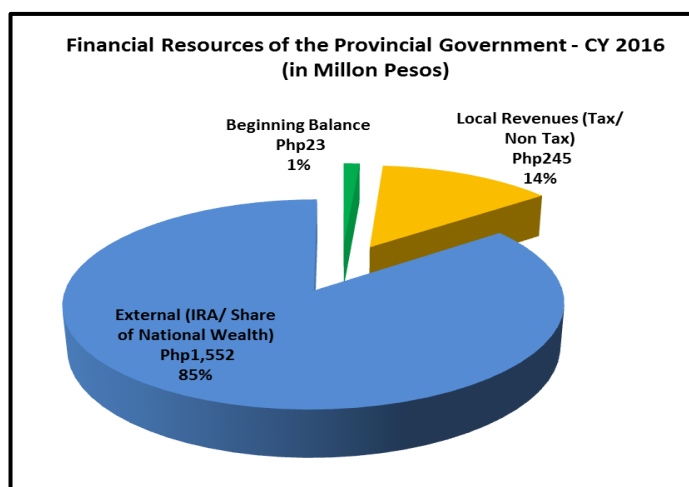
Highlights on the 2016 Financial Performance of the Provincial Government

Financial performance of the Provincial Government in 2016 has shown encouraging results, which reflected the organization's sustained efforts to improve fiscal management. With Internal Revenue Allotment (IRA) dependency still sharing most of its revenues, the Provincial Government is determined to raise local revenues from various sources, with the end goal of reducing such dependency and raise significantly its collections to fund priority programs and projects. In fact, the updated development framework of the Province has underscored increase in revenue generation capacity as one of the strategies under the Reforms in Governance development pillar. It is essential for the Provincial Government to have the adequate resources to fund and pursue its development priorities for Bohol's socio-economic growth and development.

Revenue generation, however, is not the only priority of the Provincial Government. Equally importantly is the improvement of public financial management systems and processes, enforcing the principles of transparency and accountability in government spending and financial transactions.

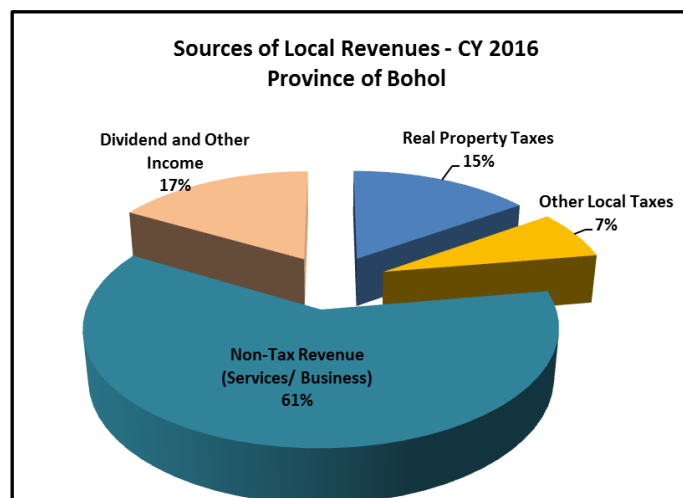
Examining the revenues of 2016, the Provincial Government has raised a total of **P1.819 Billion** from locally-generated revenues and external sources. This posted an increase of 8.4% from the collection level for the year 2015. In terms of revenue sources, the bulk of the Province's collection and financial resources is coming from the external resources (IRA and Share of National Wealth) which accounted 85% of the total available resources. Income from local tax and non-tax revenues accounted only 14%. Beginning balance shared only 1%.

In comparison to the 2015 collections, total financial resource from external sources in 2016 has reached to P1.552 Billion, which is higher by 9.7% compared to the previous year. It is worthy to emphasize that collection from locally-



generated sources has also posted a 9.7% increase from the 2015 collection of P223 Million to P245 Million in 2016.

Details of local revenues from 2016 financial reports revealed that a substantial share of the total collection was attributed from the non-tax revenues. As shown in the table and chart below, collection from non-tax revenue posted P148.7 million, which accounted to 61% of the total local revenues of the Provincial Government. Non-tax revenue includes collection from the operation of the 10 hospitals, share from Chocolate Hills complex operation, secretary's certification fees, and rent income of government office spaces, facilities and equipment. It can be noted that of the non-tax revenue, income from hospitals accounted 90%..

Collection from dividend and other sources, meanwhile, has provided a total of P40.8 Million, which is equivalent to 17% of the total local revenues. Another major source of local revenues is the collection from Real Property Taxes which posted a collection of P37.3 million, accounting 15%. Other local taxes, which posted total revenue of P17.4 million, shared about 7% of the total local revenue. This is composed of revenues from, among others, sale of accountable forms, property tax transfers, franchise tax, tax on delivery trucks and vans, sand and gravel tax, amusement tax and environmental tax.

Looking into the actual collection versus the set targets for 2016 for local sources, the Provincial Government has fall short of meeting its targets by 13.5%. The Statement of Income Sources of the Provincial Treasurer's Office showed that collection from locally-generated revenues did not meet targets. Actual collection from tax revenue has posted a 12.4% under collection while non-tax revenue targets also fall short by 13.8%. It is interesting to note, though, that collection from other receipts (that includes dividend and miscellaneous income) has posted collection higher by 98% of its set revenue targets.

Achieving revenue collection goals remains to be a challenge for the Provincial Government especially for its locally-generated sources. A strategy being implemented is the establishment of a Public Enterprise Management Unit that will provide attention to the development of economic enterprises for additional revenue streams of the government. This will have to be pursued considering the high potential of the Provincial Government's assets and facilities for revenue generation. Other strategies will also

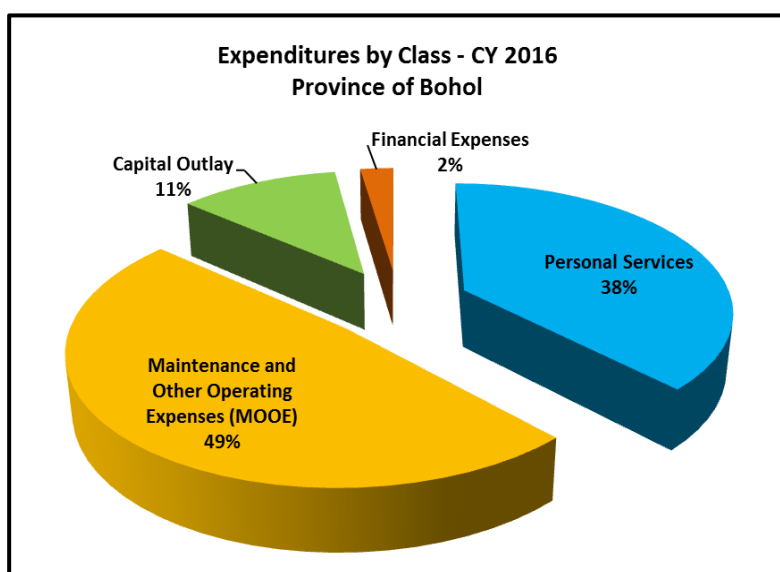
have to be continued, as identified in the public financial management plan, to increase further the local sources such as the collection from hospitals, real property taxes, and other non-tax revenues. It is notable that dividends earned and received from the operation of water and electric utilities thru the joint venture agreement with the private sector have provided considerable share in the yearly revenues for the last few years.

Moving into fund utilization, financial reports showed that in a total of P1.415 Billion was obligated/ spent in 2016. The figure includes all the operational costs of the Provincial Government including the programs, projects and activities implemented for the

welfare of the public.

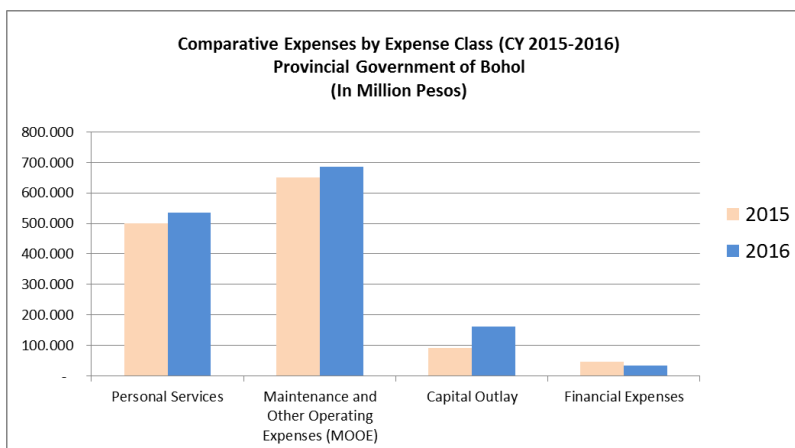
As to expenditures per expense class, Maintenance and Other Operating Expense (MOOE) account the highest share. As can be seen in the table and chart, MOOE posted P686.386 Million, accounting 49% of the total obligation/ expenditures for 2016. It can be noted, however, that this is slightly lower from the 51% share in 2015.



Expenditures for Personal Services (PS), on the other hand, reached to P535.029 Million, posting a share of 38%. This is slightly lower from the previous year's 39%. In absolute values, PS has increased by 7% which may be attributed from the implementation of salary standardization starting 2016.

On the other hand, Capital Outlay that basically includes procurement of equipment, construction of facilities, infrastructures and other related capital expenditures, posted a P160.477 Million spending, sharing 11%. This is significantly higher the 2015's 7% of the total Provincial Government fund utilization.

It can be noted that figures for MOOE and Capital Outlay already covered obligations under the 20% Development Fund, Non-Office and the Provincial Disaster Risk Reduction Management Fund (DRRMF). Financial expenses posted a total of P33.318 Million, which were spent for the amortization of loans of the Provincial Government. This accounts 2% of the total obligations during the year.

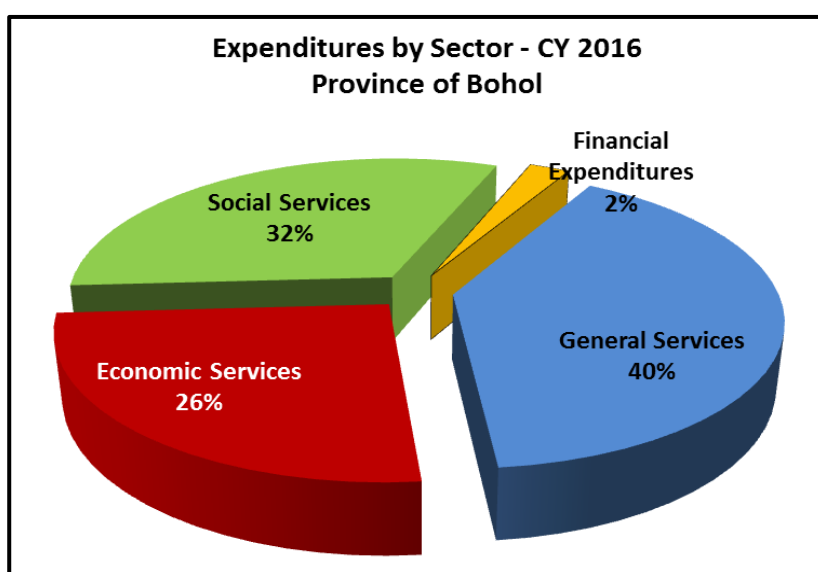


Taking a closer look at the 2015 and 2016 expenditures by expenses class, it can be noted that expenditure for MOOE has increased by 5%, while personal services, as mentioned, increased by 7%. Capital outlay, has the most significant change posting an increase by 73% from

2015. Financial expenses decreased by 26%, noting on the reduction of the required amortization for the government's loans.

For sectoral spending, data from the Status of Appropriations, Allotment and Obligations (SAAOb) of the Provincial Budget Office showed that a total P568.0 Million was utilized/ obligated for General Services. This sector, includes expenditures for programs and projects and office operations handling general administration, governance, legislation, treasury, financial management, audit, planning, budgeting, and property management. This also covered assistance and inter-government transfers to

other government entities and local government units. It can be noted that such spending accounted 40% of the total provincial expenditures, which is slightly lower

than the 43% share in 2015. Spending for Social Services, meanwhile, posted a total of P451.3 Million. Such obligation supports the implementation of projects and activities and operational services for health, social welfare, education, gender and development, culture and arts preservation, and other social services activities. Social services shared 32% of the total spending for the year, slightly higher than the 31% in 2015.

Meanwhile, Economic Services that covers expenditures for the development of agriculture, livestock, infrastructure, tourism, trade and employment recorded a total cost of P362.6 Million, sharing 26% of the sectoral spending. This is higher than the 2015's 23%.

Taking into account the Provincial Government's level of revenue collection, expenditures (obligated/ utilized) for operation, services, facilities and capitalized projects, and the continuing appropriations for priority programs and activities, the Statement of Receipts and Expenditures for 2016 shows the following:

Examining the figures above, it would show that the operation of the Provincial Government for the year 2016 resulted to an ending balance of P116.484 Million. Such a

result provides the Provincial Government additional financial sources which will then be used to fund priority projects and activities for 2017, as may be necessary. This is also where the beginning balances for the succeeding years may be taken.

The financial report showed that the Provincial Government has managed its financial resources by ensuring that there are enough resources to fund the year's priority programs and activities. However, it remains to be a challenge to fully utilize the available resources during the budget year especially in the implementation of development programs, as may be seen in the level of continuing appropriations. There is a need to fast-track the implementation of capital-forming projects, and improve further project programming, design and actual implementation. Also essential is the improvement of the procurement system, to facilitate the actual implementation of these projects.

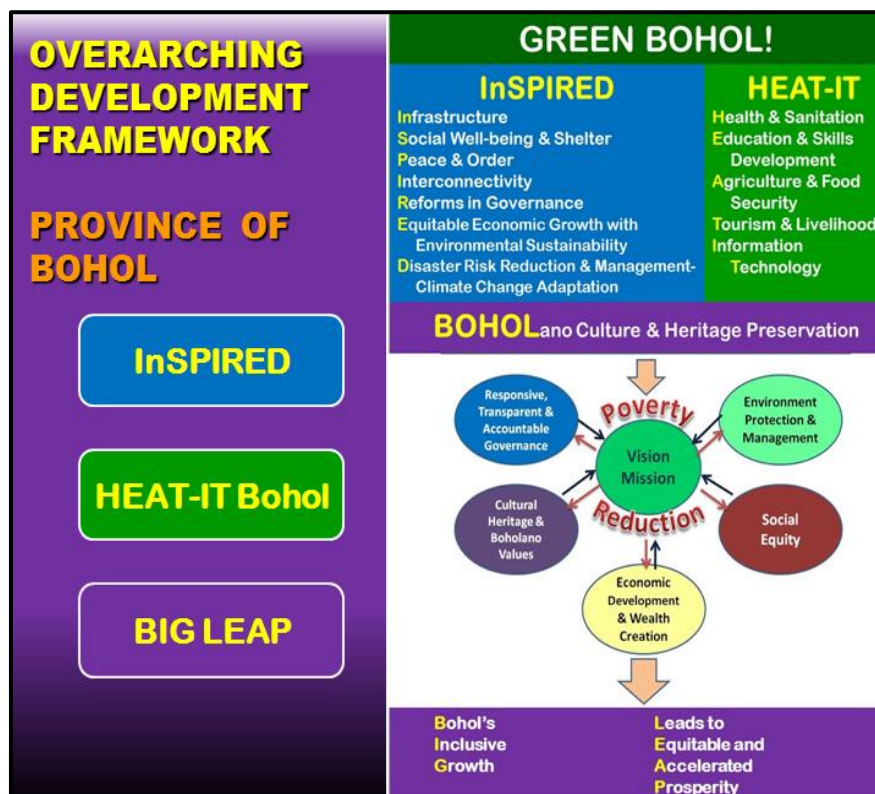
Fiscal Strategies and Measures

The Provincial Government of Bohol has implemented the following public financial management strategies to ensure that the resources are generated, utilized, managed and accounted for the year 2016:

- Observance of the updated guidelines for the prevention and disallowance of irregular, unnecessary, excessive, extravagant and unconscionable expenditures;
- Issuance of local financial policies as implementing guidelines by the expanded Local Finance Committee on certain transactions;
- Tapping of possible sources of revenues and income;
- Strict observance of the Procurement Law (Republic Act 9184);
- Sustain value for money concept and management by outcomes.
- Regular office audit in order to streamline systems and processes and to improve the internal control system in managing government assets;
- Implementing the critical dimensions of public financial management on policy-based budgeting, credibility of budget, predictability and control in budget execution, and transparency and comprehensiveness of the budget;
- Increase access to sustainable, improved and improved quality health services thru the hospital modernization program, and point of care program for Philhealth;
- Enhancement of delivery of education and information services thru school building program, dynamic learning center, Pres. Carlos P. Garcia Scholarship Program and educational subsidy program;
- Partnership with the national government and other development stakeholders for the continued improvement of infrastructure facilities in the province;
- Scrap and build method to create important and needed positions;
- Establishment of ceilings on appropriations for personal services, MOOE and capital outlay; and
- Implementation of reforms on procurement through systems improvement, bulk procurement and adoption of e-procurement system.

PRIORITY STRATEGIES FOR IMPLEMENTATION

In 2016, after provincial leaders have been given fresh 3-year mandate of serving the constituents of Bohol after the May elections, the Provincial Government updated its development framework to provide a more pro-active foresight of the province's development aspirations.



Strategies have been identified to encompass the implementation of various programs and projects directly supportive the development agenda and overarching development framework of the Province of Bohol now articulated in the **Ins.P.I.R.E.D. H.E.A.T.-I.T. Bohol development agenda**. Such agenda identifies development pillars that are key to the attainment of Bohol's vision and mission, taking into consideration the current trends and outlook of the province's socio-economic situation.

These development pillars include **Infrastructure**, **Social well-being and shelter**, **Peace and order**, **Interconnectivity**, **Reforms in governance**, **Equitable economic growth with environmental sustainability**, and **Disaster Risk Reduction and Management**, **Climate Change Adaptation**. I. HIGHLIGHTS OF 2016 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Over the years, the Provincial Government of Bohol has been steadfast in employing agri-based programs and projects and identified agriculture as one of the economic drivers of Bohol. This became the conceptual framework of the Office of the Provincial Agriculturist in developing its vision: "A sustainable agri-fishery sector with enterprising producers and processors engaged in the marketing of competitive products both in the local and overseas markets and enjoying a state of well-being". Mission: "To provide support services in the agri-fishery sector thru institutionalized government-private partnership, thereby enhancing environment friendly agri-industries" and goals and crafted its programs and projects for implementation.

All along, the guiding framework motivated and inspired the OPA personnel and staff to move and give action to the identified programs and projects with the aim of harnessing the agri sector towards enhancing agricultural productivity, increase livelihood of farmers and fisherfolks and improve their incomes and welfare.

Agri support services were extended in the production of priority crops like rice, corn, high value commercial crops, as well as fishery products (upland and marine aquaculture) in the province. In parallel to this is the implementation of organic agriculture program, aimed at enhancing production of safe foods through the promotion of indigenous and natural-based technologies.

More interventions were also focused on the capability building of farmers, fisherfolks, rural women, enhancing their entrepreneurial skills and pursue their livelihood projects.

Our accomplishment report shows a collaborative effort of OPA in coordination with the stakeholders in executing the various programs and projects for the year 2015.

- **RICE**

The past 2016 has been a challenging year for the Agriculture Sector not only in Bohol but throughout the entire Philippines. PAGASA forecasted the El Nino or extreme heat in our province and basically affected the production of our rice and other commodities. In view of all the projects and programs that were being implemented



and the degree of accomplishments it has achieved, Bohol suffered the effects of El Nino but still the most performing province in terms of rice productivity compared to other provinces in Region 7. This was made possible



by the Provincial Government through the committed work of each staff in the Office of the Provincial Agriculturist with the collaboration of the local leaders in all Municipal Local Government Units. Likewise, other Government Agencies like the Department of Agriculture (National and Regional), PhilRice, IRRI, PCIC, Landbank, Academe and Non-Government Agencies has been also instrumental in sustaining food security and rice self-sufficiency.

The province declared the State of Calamity due to the tremendous effects of El Nino to our farmers. Because of this, we had acquired hybrid rice seeds good for 2,222 hectares worth P10,000,000.00 and 261 units of water pumps worth P10,000,000.00 soon to be distributed to our farmers.



In the **RICE** Sector, the programs that were implemented were not only aimed at helping the farmers increase their income but as well developed themselves to be entrepreneurs and farmer scientists. It is also geared toward sustainable agriculture thru adoption of balance fertilization or organic farming. Among the accomplishments are the following:

1. Seed Production, Certification and Accreditation of Rice Seed Growers

This program aims to address the problem of availability of quality seeds and to develop the entrepreneurial skills of the farmers.



The province of Bohol has always been grateful for the strong collaboration and linkaging with the stakeholders in the Agriculture Sector. The presence of seed net and our local seed growers which was accredited by the Bureau of Plant Industry has continually planted not only registered seeds but also foundation rice seeds per

cropping season to secure available seeds for planting. For 2016, our seed growers planted 312 hectares of registered seeds from the target of 400 hectares. About 36 hectares were planted Foundation Seeds which resulted to 1,800 cavans of registered seeds. At present, for about 89 active seed growers were participating in the seed production of high quality seeds for farmers' utilization.



Only in Bohol, we had 6 hectares Japonica Seed Multiplication Project planted with 10 Korean cultivars and 10 local seed varieties. Included in our highlight was the 147 hectares Japonica Seed Production located in the different municipalities in the

province. Another highlight in the seed production was the Japanese Rice cultivars which started only in the last semester of 2016. Both Japonica and Japanese varieties of rice seeds had a promising yield and a target market already available not only in Bohol but in other Asian countries.

2. Rice Commercialization Program

This program aims to encourage the farmers to use quality and superior varieties of seeds aside from helping them reduce their cost of production, thus, increasing their income.



The Provincial Government of Bohol was distributing superior varieties of certified rice seeds for free during INSPIRED HEAT-IT Caravan, Agri-HEAT, Foundation Day, Fairs, and Special Projects. It is noted that Bohol's seed utilization comprises of 35% good quality seeds, 31% farmers saved seeds, 20% hybrid, 13% certified and 1% registered seeds.

For this year alone, together with DA RFO 7, we distributed to the farmers for about 15,711 bags of hybrid seeds and 19,341 bags of certified seeds which resulted to the total volume of production of 161,003 metric tons.

Some Municipal Government Units were subsidizing the same kind of seeds for their farmers use to mention were the municipalities of Talibon, Dimiao, Jagna, Mabini, San Miguel, Loboc, Dagohoy, CPG and Candijay. We encouraged other MLGUs to give attention and consideration in Agriculture by allocating annual budget for the procurement of rice seeds. Moreover, the presence of BOFAMCO as our seed consolidator, and other Seed Cooperatives like SIMPC, UBARCA and DALNEMPC made their commitment to support such endeavor of sustaining the rice productivity of the province.

3. On-Farm Rice Mechanization Program

This program aims to provide improved production facilities for efficient application of rice technologies to increase produce and preserve rice quality.

One of the provisions of the Agriculture and Fisheries Modernization Act of 1997 or AFMA was to prescribe urgent related measures to modernize the agriculture and fisheries sectors of the country in order to enhance profitability, and prepare said sectors for the challenges of globalization through an adequate, focused and rational delivery of necessary support services, appropriating funds therefore and for other purposes. Rice mechanization facilities and equipment to include hand tractor, four-



wheel tractor, drum-seeder, thresher, reaper, cleaner, harvester and shallow tube well were identified to support the law. Aside from the improved production and postharvest operations, income and employment was generated for farmer members and farmers from nearby location thru the services made out of the facilities and equipments.

Together with our technical assistance, we distributed for about 6 mechanical threshers, 2 floating tillers, 1 hand-tractor and 6 rice trans-planters to our farmer cooperators for free. The cooperators just need to submit a resolution and letter of intent and the Rice Team will do the field verification and validation.



4. On the Provision of Technical Assistance

This component of the program aims to enhance the capability of farmers that will contribute to increase their yield at the same time to promote new technology for adoption and transfer.

With 2 regular and 4 job order support staff working for rice productivity, together with our MLGU counterparts, among the activities conducted were the following: 6 trainings,



4 team buildings, 6 conferences, 3 field days, 5 demo on rice transplanter, 136 meetings, 4 planning and assessment, 25 coordination meetings, 2 fair, 1 radio eskuela, and 4,500 booklets, and other related activities extended to male and female farmers from January to December, production and distribution of information



materials, anchoring radyo eskuela sa panguma aired in the local radio station, distribution of bio control agents not only for rice but to include corn, and coconut and different

organizational and management control system. All these were facilitated to support our goal in sustaining the provincial rice self-sufficiency and food security for the province.

- CORN**

Corn is considered as the second staple food in the Philippines and in the Province of Bohol. It is treated as the second principal crops to substitute the absence of rice by the Boholanos. Some of the Boholanos today make corn as one of their major source of livelihood and income. PSA data shows that 18 % of the Boholanos populations are using corn as their major food with a per capita consumption of 4.62 kilos of corn grits.

With the rapid expansion of the country poultry and livestock industry, Bohol is one implementing Corn/ Cassava program thru the Office of the Provincial Agriculturist-Corn unit to help our Boholano people increase their income and uplift their living condition.

With the implementation of Corn/ Cassava program in the Province of Bohol, the Office of the Provincial Agriculturist- Corn unit, implemented the following programs and projects. Among the accomplishments are the following;

1. Seed Production

Facilitated OPV Corn Seed production from RS- CS for seed banking by providing technical assistance to Corn seed growers to produce quality corn seeds and ensure availability of corn seeds in the province.



2. Procurement and Distribution of Open-Pollinated Variety Corn Seeds

Program support under the OPV Corn production of the Provincial Government will greatly help in the implementation of Corn/ Cassava program in order to increase productivity and production of quality corn for human consumption, feeds and industrial uses as well as improve farmer's income and quality of life.



3. Trainings

In order to enhance the knowledge, skills and ability of our corn farmers and corn technicians and in coordination of the Department of Agriculture other line agencies and LGUs, we facilitated and assisted the following trainings:

a) Cassava Food Processing (April 26-28, 2016)



b) Bantay Peste Volunteer Brigade Training (June 21-23, 2016)



c) Corn Husk Utilization (October 11-13, 2016)



d) Season Long Training on Corn IPM FFS KASAKALIKASAN in 13 Municipalities



e) Retooling of Corn Seed Growers (November 7-9, 2016)

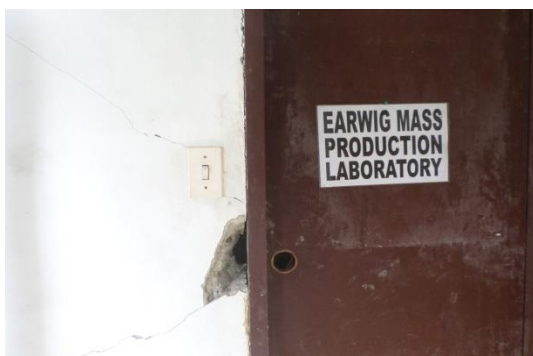

- **HIGH VALUE CROPS DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM (HVCDP)**

The Provincial Government of Bohol allocated fund for the implementation of High Value Crops Development Project (HVCDP), programs/ projects. The fund allocated was divided to the agri- materials, catering, office supplies and other purchases related to HVCDP.

The Ubi Pahulam Dispersal Project, was able to dispersed 1,000 kilos of ubi tubers (Kinampay and Baligonhon variety) to various ubi growers across the province through organization.

Distributed assorted fruit trees and industrial crops planting materials to various clients with total of **6,966 seedlings** (Guyabano-2,100 seedlings, Rambutan-900 seedlings, Grafted Mangosteen- 600 seedlings, Lanzones-500 seedlings, Grafted Cacao-1,000 seedlings, Coffee-666 seedlings, and Bamboo-1,200 seedlings) distributed to different municipalities. Also distributed 4,493 coconut seedlings to different municipalities of the province (various individuals/walk-in client, coconut farmers, LGUs request, PO resolutions HEAT and Agri-HEAT caravan and others).

This project was initiated by Governor Edgar Chatto. It encourages the Boholano people to do backyard gardening to ensure every family has **Food Always in the Home (FAITH)**.

The Bahay Kubo Project aimed to grow 17 kinds of vegetables and spices as mentioned in the song Bahay Kubo, which is a good guide to food self-sufficiency.

Among the vegetables and spices named in the song are singkamas (jicama or Mexican turnip), talong (eggplant), sineguelas (Spanish plum), mani (peanuts), sitaw (yard long beans), bataw (purple hyacinth beans), patani (Lima beans), kondol (white gourd melon), patola (sponge gourd), upo (bottle gourd or white pumpkin), kalabasa (squash), labanos (raddish), mustasa (mustard), sebuyas (spring onions), kamatis (tomato), bawang (garlic) and luya (ginger).



There were 9 municipalities participated in the **Best Bahay Kubo Garden Contest**. The awarding was done on October 15, 2016 during the Ubi Festival 2016 opening at Bohol Cultural Center, Tagbilaran City.

The project also pushed for a pocket herbal plot at home, the **Herbal Organic Plants Enhancement (HOPE)** - a model for organic herbal garden, which can be a source of treatment for common illnesses.

To complete the list for food sufficiency in the home, Bohol leaders picked up Chatto's formula of **Chicken Always Raised In The Yard (CHARITY)** which advocated the raising of free range (and thus, organic) chicken in the homes to help low income families earn a little and find another source of protein in their diet. Native chicken

costs a lot more compared to the commercial breeds, and the taste is simply incomparable.

The Modelong Gulayan sa Paaralan

The Modelong Gulayan sa Paaralan which is under the Bahay Kubo Program is also a contest open to all public primary, elementary, high school and technical vocational high school in the province. The contest has two categories namely Rural (at least 200 sq.m.) and Containerized category (using recycled containers). There were 36 participating schools that join the contest from City DepEd and Bohol DepEd Division. It aims to help the schools to have their own supply of fresh and nutritious and organically grown vegetable for their feeding program. Aside from the above mentioned benefits of the project, it also educates the children and enhances their interest the value of having vegetables in the yard and serve as learning site for their future endeavor both in schools and at home. Through this the collaborations may start a small income generating project. We have created the Provincial Technical Working Group (PTWG) with the composition of OPA as chairman, DA-7 and DepEd, City and Bohol Division as members.



Capability Development

Training and other form of technical assistance is conducted to various beneficiaries such as farmers, teachers and other interested individual for them to enhance their capability, skills and acquired new innovation in the production of vegetables, ubi, banana, mango, cacao and coffee.

- **ORGANIC AGRICULTURE DEVELOPMENT**

The accomplishments of the Organic Agriculture Development Section are based on the six (6) components of the Bohol Organic Agriculture Program.

- 1. Production Enhancement**

For this year 2016, organically grown vegetable production involve three hundred (300) farmers with an area of ninety five (95) hectares with an estimated volume of production of ninety six thousand (96,000) kilograms while seventy (70) farmers are engaged in organically grown rice production covered an area of fifty seven (57) hectares. Massive advocacy for organic farm conversion and continuous information campaigns were conducted.

Naturally grown vegetables are considered to be cash crops because of shorter growing period, hence, farmers can earn to support their daily needs aside from fresh and healthy source of food. In support to Organic Agriculture Practitioners, quality seeds were provided to start with their production. One hundred packs (100) of assorted OPV seeds, 150 bags organic fertilizers and 300 bags vermicompost were provided to OA Practitioners. Inputs for organic fertilizer preparation like molasses, wine, and other raw materials for NFS production were also provided. Facilitated availment of farm machineries and equipments for the upscaling of natural/organic farms: barrel, hose, vermin tea brewer, pipes and rice hull carbonizer. Technical assistance was also provided.

Conducted 9 trainings on Capability Enhancement on Organic/Natural Farming for farmers and technical farmers.

2. Research and Development

Techno-Demo/Model farms were established to promote and showcase production of organic inputs and organically grown vegetables by integrating natural piggery. One PO member from Santa Cruz, Sagbayan and another from Malitbog, Dagohoy is a beneficiary who has availed ten (10) piglets each. Redispersal will be implemented to the rest of the cluster areas with existing organic vegetable production. Beneficiaries from Cabog-Clarin, Poblacion-San Isidro and Cogon District, Tagbilaran availed the redispersal of piglets with five piglets each for the recipients.

The Kapunungan sa Bol-anong Organikong Mag-uuma (KBoOM) was the latest group assisted by the Office of the Provincial Agriculturist with very close coordination of the Department of Agriculture, RFO-7. Formally organized during the early part of 2015, the group is composed of organic practitioners, input producers, advocates and educators.

Significantly increased the membership of BANaLiG & KBoOM. The section also facilitated & assisted People's Organization, KBOOM & Organic Farmer to win the Department of Agriculture 2016 Regional Gawad Saka Award for Organic Agriculture Best PO & Best Individual Farmer Category with prize worth P100,000.00 & P20,000.00 respectively.

Organic Agriculture Forum was conducted during Sandugo Agri-Fair last July 12, 2016 at Bohol Cultural Center.



Conducted and hosted the Regional Organic Agriculture Congress last October 18-19, 2016 at Reyna's Haven and Gardens.



Issues and Concerns/ Recommendations:

1. Production of organic products is still very minimal; hence, support from the MLGUs is needed.
2. Implementation of the organic agriculture program poses many challenges since conventional agriculture is one the mainstream and the same implementers are involved in the municipal level despite the passing of the Bohol Organic Agriculture Code and RA 10068.
3. Most farmers are hesitant to engage in organic agriculture because of limited supply of inputs like seeds, organic fertilizers and pest control. Production is laborious enough; hence, heightened advocacy is needed and subsidy in mass production of inputs is necessary.

• ENGINEERING SUPPORT SERVICES

1. Farm Mechanization Support Services

The Provincial Government of Bohol through the Office of the Provincial Agriculturist allocated P5 Million Pesos under the 20% Development Fund. This amount was utilized in the procurement of 1 unit Rice Transplanter, 5 units Diesel Engine Water Pump, 2 units Solar Powered Water Pump, 1 unit Riding Rice Transplanter, 2 units Chain Saw, 1 unit Submersible Pump, 5 units Motorized Power Sprayer, 3 units Grass Cutter, 2 units Combined Rice Harvester and 1 unit Tractor.

Another allocation of budget for Infrastructure Component in support to Organic Agriculture Development Program in the amount of P 1,000,000.00 under the 20% Development Fund. This amount was utilized in the procurement of 10 units Water Pump (Gasoline), 10 units Motorized Power Sprayer, 4 units Power Tiller/Garden Cultivator, 5 units Solar Light Traps, 1 roll PE Pipe and 51 pcs. Plastic Barrel (Water Drum).

The said farm machineries/equipments were already bidded and to be delivered on the first quarter of CY 2017. The identification of farmer beneficiaries and distribution of the farm machineries/equipments will be done by the Crops Division Staff as the end user in support to the Food Security & Rice Self Sufficiency.

The RASS Division/Engineering Section conducted a two days training on Tractor Operation and Maintenance last September 21-22, 2016 at BOATech, Ubay in coordination with BISU Professor, Engr. Severino Salera and participated by the three Agricultural Schools namely: San Pascual National Agricultural High School (Ubay), San Miguel Technical Vocational School & Sikatuna National Agricultural High School (Talibon) with 20 school teachers as participants.

2. Postharvest Support Services

Twenty (20) units Ricehull Carbonizers were distributed to the People's Organizations and individual farmers in the municipalities of Catigbian, Dauis, Trinidad, Maribojoc, Batuan, Balilihan, Loay, Corella, Candijay and Albur, . Conducted six (6) demos on the production of Carbonized Ricehull (CRH) and monitored 232.5 bags CRH produced,

4. Irrigation Support Services

Major accomplishments for the year's activities were the following:

- Validated and identified forty three (43) sites of Small Farm Reservoirs (SFRs) with twenty five (25) sites of SFRs constructed
- Validated and identified two (2) irrigation project sites for rehabilitation with one (1) sites rehabilitated

The **Project MANA (Maunlad na Agrikultura sa Nayon)** of the Department of Agriculture that aims to alleviate the irrigated rice areas of additional 1 Million hectares by introducing the existing rainfed areas a Small Scale Irrigation Project (SSIP), either Small Water Impounding Project (SWIP) or a Concrete Diversion Dam (CDD). With the joint effort of the Regional Agricultural Engineering Division (RAED) of the Department of Agriculture and the Agricultural Engineering Section personnel of the Office of the Provincial Agriculturist, successfully validated feasible sites of more than twenty sites for SWIP that can irrigate more than 3,000 hectares rice lands.

● FISHERIES

Another year of challenge in the implementation of fisheries development programs and projects for 2016 due to various challenges like the El Nino phenomenon which lasted for almost six (6) months and this has grave impact to the resources where the development programs is depended upon.

1. Upland Aquaculture Development



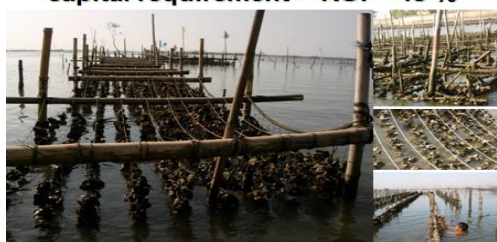
Changes in the hatchery management in the later part of September, 2016 has made a quite improvement although a minimal shortfall in fry production has been observed. The hatchery was able to produce **493,500 pcs of tilapia fry** against a target of 660,000 pcs or an accomplishment of **74.77%**. Income generated from selling of marketable tilapia and fingerlings totalled to **P95,472.00** against a target of P95,000.00 or an accomplishment of **100.49%**. Fry dispersal totalled to **548,750 pcs** versus a target of 594,000 pcs or an accomplishment of **92.38%**. **420** fish farmers have benefited of the fry dispersal as well as the technical assistance rendered by the staff. The support from the freshwater hatchery of BFAR located in Caluwasan, Clarin, and Bohol helped much on the need for fingerlings because of great volume produced by that the hatchery and the increasing demand for fingerlings seemed unlimited. Hito breeders produced **30,000 pcs** of giant African hito fry, however, there was a very low production of fingerlings due to high predation like other carnivorous freshwater species as well as predatory birds attacking the fingerlings at night. A minimal income of **P3,703.00 income** have been generated from selling hito fingerlings. For the

conduct of research trial on indigenous species like freshwater turtle, native farm frog and freshwater eel, this was not realized since the voucher for this purpose was cancelled due to unavailable bidder. For the conduct of tilapia skills training and technical briefing in the management and culture of tilapia in backyard fishpond, there were **4 trainings** accomplished out of a target of 4 with **100%** accomplishment. Technical briefings were also conducted both formal and informal setting particularly during the dispersal and during the monitoring of status where **86** briefings were conducted out of a target of 60 or an accomplishment of **143.30%**. Other staffs of the division also take part in contributing to the dispersal project because of the need of their respective P.O.s in their area of assignment.

2. Marine Aquaculture Development

There were five (5) regular staffs assigned to carry-out the implementation of Marine Aquaculture Development Programs with the Section head given an additional task in the Purok Power Movement or the CDD-PPM. There were the usual technical assistance rendered to seaweed, oyster growers which form part of the regular target of the division. For capacity development, 2 trainings were conducted on seaweed or eucheuma farming and another 1 training on the marine-based technology (gill net) assisted by our technician. For the yearly activity on SUHID sa Malampusong Maguuma sa Bohol, five (5) nominees were evaluated for their exemplary performance. The staffs were also active in the monitoring of agricultural prices in seven municipalities. Continuous monitoring of fish cage rehabilitation assistance in the municipalities of Candijay, Loon, Tubigon, Tagbilaran City, Talibon, Dauis and Panglao were also conducted to determine its usage and usefulness. Proposed bangus fingerlings distribution were not realized due to no bidder and lack of fingerlings production per feedback from small scale hatchery operator.

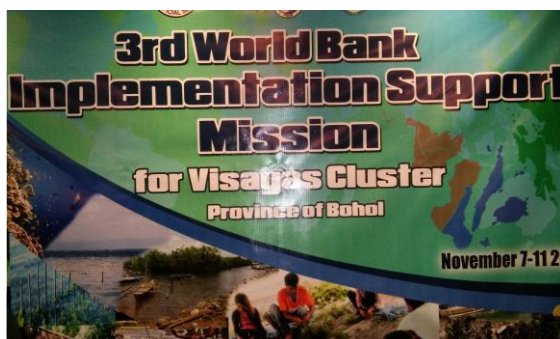
Oyster Culture Farming with less capital requirement - ROI – 48 %



In support to DA Special Projects of the Philippine Rural Development Project funded by the World Bank, eight (8) business plans on Seaweeds Small Livelihood Projects were submitted and deliberated by the Regional Project Advisory Board (RPAB) and awaiting for NOL issuance by the Project Support Office (PSO). Likewise eight (8) MPA proposals were reviewed and pre-RPAB for further enhancement. To further support the said project and through the I-PLAN PCPT, a Provincial Seaweed Investment Plan was indorsed by PDC to SP for approval and on June, 2016, the PCIP on Seaweeds was approved and served as the basis for investment through the I-REAP group. 3rd

World Bank Implementation visits to GEF sites in Ubay and BUenavista, Bohol were conducted on September 9-11, 2016 with positive feedback from the WB Consultant, Mr. Jim Hancock.

Another area of investment under PRDP which were recommended for funding are the support facilities to the enterprise like the seaweeds dryer equipped with bodega and working area as well as the corresponding landing area where the seaweeds farmer can accessibly land and dried their seaweeds. There were 72 seaweeds dryer identified which were all geo tagged with the assistance from the personnel from the Provincial Engineers Office. Although feasibility study and economic analysis were facilitated by the PPMIU and PEO for the 14 seaweed producing municipalities through a workshop on August 30-31, 2016.



3. Program Management Support

Approved budget of the division is P 1,729,000.00. The total workforce is fourteen (14) with nine (9) regular employees and five (5) casuals who are assigned in Purok Power Movement (CDP-PPM) while other staffs are assigned in the hatchery in Bilar to augment the workforce.



• OTHER FUNCTIONS

Philippine Rural Development Program (PRDP)

The Office of the Provincial Agriculturist is a member of the several Technical Working Groups, I-PLAN and the I-REAP that would coordinates/tackles on projects related to Philippine Rural Development Program (PRDP). Several workshops/meetings were participated for the success of the coming implementation of PRDP's projects here in the province. In fact the Officer in Charge of the Office of the Provincial Agriculturist is the I-PLAN component head of the PRDP.

CORE FUNCTION 1

- **Production Of Livestock & Poultry To Ensure Food Sufficiency**

GENETIC UPGRADING PROGRAM

The Program

Genetic upgrading is improving the heritable features of the existing livestock population. Two (2) approaches have been used by the office:

Provision of Livestock Breeders. Natural breeding for livestock is encouraged using selected breeders with superior genetic traits. These breeders maybe provided by government institutions like the Philippine Carabao Center (PCC), the Department of Agriculture (DA), the DA-Ubay Stock Farm (DA-USF) and the Provincial Government of Bohol through the OPV. The breeders are loaned out to interested raisers with the obligation to repay in form of offsprings. On the other hand, another scheme is for raisers to borrow the breeder at a certain period of time.

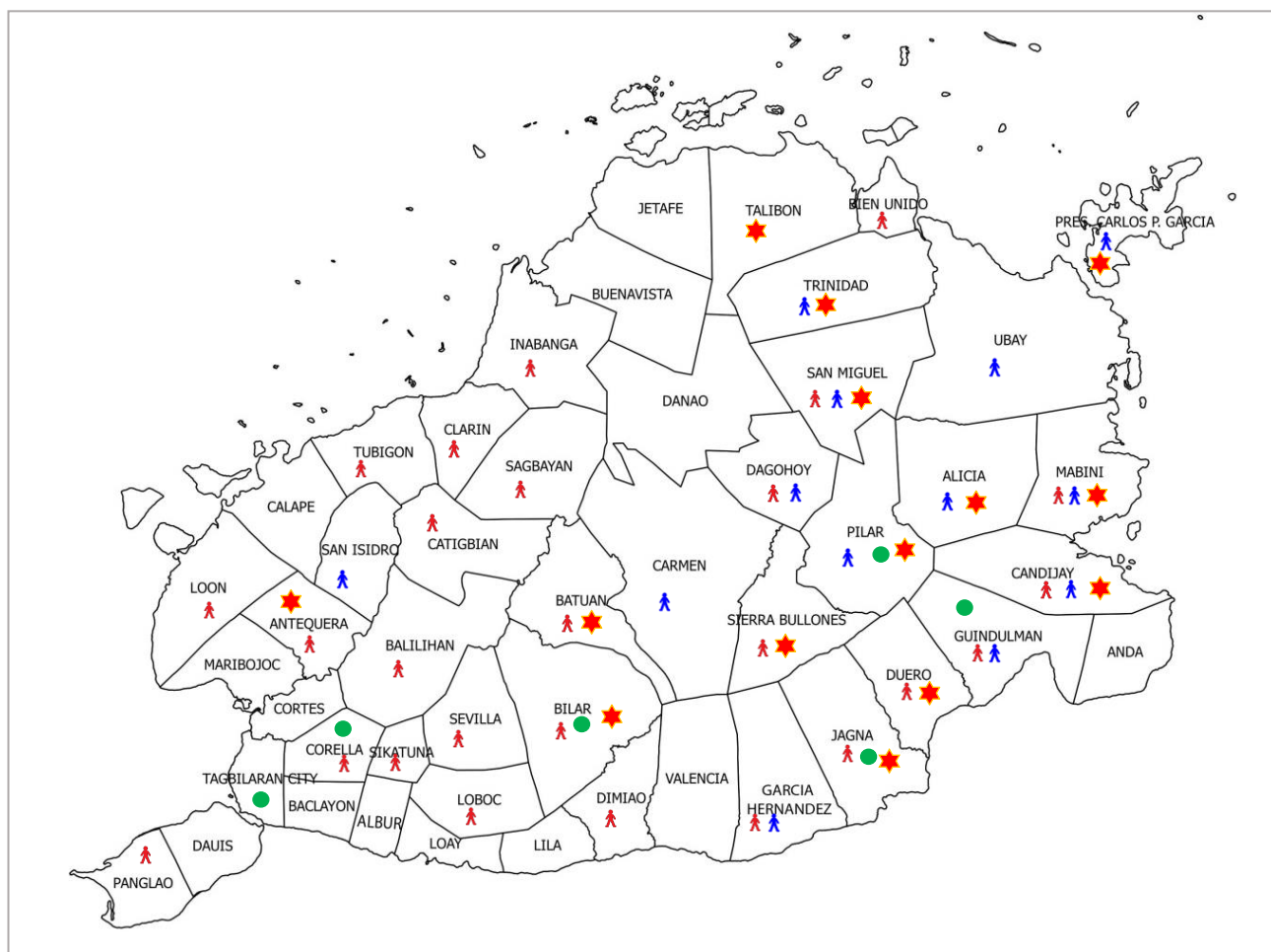
Artificial Insemination (AI) Services. The technology on artificial insemination in the province has been adopted for more than 4 decades now and proved to be highly acceptable by livestock raisers. This is mainly because of the economic advantage of the quality of offspring produced.

Under the Unified Artificial Insemination Program (UNAIP) of the national government, AI services in the province is implemented and performed by a total of 68 trained and active technicians as of year 2016;

Close coordination and support is provided by the Philippine Carabao Center (PCC), the Department of Agriculture (DA) RFO 7, the National Dairy Authority (NDA), the Office of the Provincial Veterinarian (OPV) and the Municipal Local Government Units (MLGUs) through its Municipal Agricultural Offices.

To ensure enhanced performance of AI, the following strategies are adopted:

- Capacity development of concerned technicians
- Provision of incentives for good performing technicians in form of cash crop based on validated number of live calves produced
- Provision of gasoline allowance and travelling expenses to active technicians to facilitate field mobility
- Assistance to MLGUs in the procurement of liquid nitrogen; and
- Adoption of heat synchronization and flushing of breeders

ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF THE YEAR

Provision of Breeders. In year 2016, the province through the Office of the Provincial Veterinarian (OPV) received a total of 196 animals amounting to P3,924,000.00 from the Department of Agriculture, Region 7.

Under the program “Upgrading of Production Centers”, swine and goat are provided to existing or actively operating production or breeding centers and through the Livestock Enhancement Assistance Program (LEAP), Peoples’ Organizations (POs) in different municipalities are considered as recipients.

Prior to animal distribution, a team from DA RFO 7 and OPV conducted validation of production centers, distribution sites and proposed recipient organizations to ensure that the beneficiaries are qualified and actively existing.



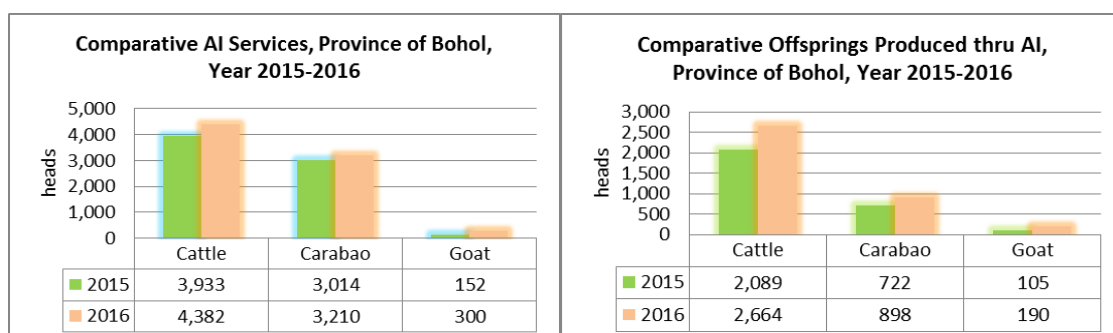
On February this year, the office facilitated the transport of 21 imported Brahman bulls from Masbate under Federation of Cattle Raisers' Association of the Philippines (FCRAP) to identified members of the Bohol Cattle Raisers Association of the Philippines (BCRAP) in the province.



Conduct of Breeder Inventory. The breeders distributed as dispersal animals are accounted and evaluated to assess its performance. Operators of boars for hire in the province are also accounted purposely to determine the animal health practices followed in its operation and the possibility of assistance in terms of breeder replacement. The office is very concern on the health aspects of breeders used to prevent disease transmission and possible inbreeding of stocks.

AI in Ruminants. Considered ruminants are cattle, carabao and goat. For year 2016, a total of 4,382 cattle, 3,210 carabaos and 300 goats were inseminated serving 5,588 ruminant raisers while offsprings produced recorded a total of 2,664 cattle, 898 carabao and 190 goats.

The amount of P53,430,000.00 for cattle and carabao and P475,000.00 for goat, represents the economic contribution of AI to the industry through the monetized value of the offsprings produced.



As a very vital component of AI, a total of 8,210 straws of frozen semen with an estimated cost of P2,607,700.00 were acquired from the National Artificial Breeding Center thru DA RFO 7, the Philippine Carabao Center and OPV-Negros. Breeds used are Bulgarian Murrah Buffalo for carabao, Brahman for cattle beef, Holstein for dairy cattle while Anglo Nubian for goat (Table 2).

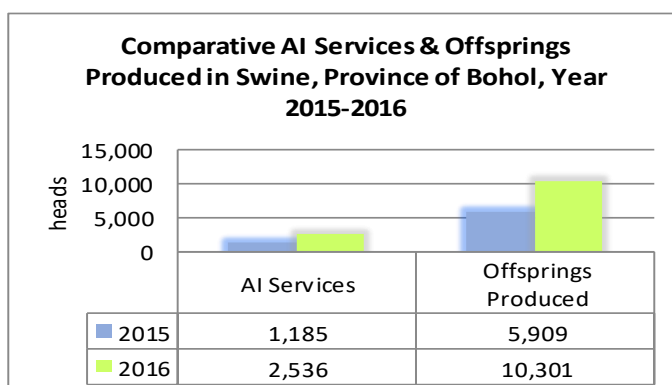
Heat Synchronization and Animal Conditioning. Heat synchronization and flushing is resorted with the main objective of increasing productivity especially carabaos which are silent heaters. Hormones are given to selected qualified animals to stimulate and synchronize heat allowing technicians to inseminate more animals as scheduled. This year, a total of 1,255 animals were served in close coordination with AT technicians.

Prior to the conduct of insemination, flushing is undertaken to condition the animals and increase the chances of early pregnancy and rate of fertility. For this year, 3,265 heads of cattle and carabao were subjected to flushing mainly performed by AI Technicians under the supervision of the office.

Eartagging. To identify breedable animals produced through AI, ear tagging is conducted in coordination with the DA RFO 7, NDA and PCC. For 2016, a total of 158 cattle and carabao were tagged covering the areas of Alicia, Catigbian, Corella, Clarin, Mabini, Panglao, San Miguel, and Ubay. Ear tagging is a continuing activity and performed by AI personnel from OPV and the Municipal AI Technicians.

AI in Swine. There are 14 Artificial Breeding Centers (ABC) for swine that are actively operating in the province owned and managed by the MLGUs through its Municipal Agricultural Offices. Six (6) privately-operated centers are also offering the same services which are being monitored and technically assisted by the office.

This year, a total of 2,536 heads are inseminated with total recorded piglets produced of 10,301 heads. AI in swine has provided an economic contribution of P25,752,500.00 in monetized value of its offsprings produced. The operation of the Municipal Artificial Breeding Centers is strongly supported by the office in terms of AI supplies, paraphernalia and technical assistance.



Capacity Development. This year, the office conducted four (4) trainings (*Table 3*) which focused on goat and swine AI facilitated by trained and skilled OPV staff.



Basic and advance trainings on large animals are also conducted by the PCC, NDA and the DA RFO 7 (*Table 4*). The office has facilitated the participation of MLGU Technicians to these trainings and provided assistance through the trained and more experienced office staffs who served as facilitators and trainers.

Assessments and Meetings. Regular consultations and program updating is carried out through meetings and assessments (*Table 5*). The office sees to it that issues and concerns from the field are given attention and immediate action. This year, 3 meetings and 2 AI performance assessments are conducted. Evaluation on the operation of municipal swine artificial breeding centers is also conducted to assess the status and identify areas that need immediate action.

LIVESTOCK FEED RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT

The Program

The productivity of any ruminant is greatly affected by the kind of feed alongside with good management and breed. It can be noted that a large portion of ruminant intake is forages, thus, low-cost, good and nutritious forages should be ample and always available to achieve high productivity.

The province has areas potential for feed resource development like under orchard, coconut and oil palm plantation, along irrigation canals and open range, yet, these have been heavily dominated by undesirable weeds like hagonoy, cogon, lantana and agingay. Over seeding and massive planting of improved forages utilizing these possible sites is a great challenge. Aside from nutrition, forages help improve soil fertility and have mitigating contribution to global warming.

Scarcity of grasses and forages is experienced after the onset of the El Nino phenomena and is greatly affecting the health of animals particularly ruminants. Recovery efforts include development of forage seedbanks and nurseries coupled with massive campaign and distribution of planting materials.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF THE YEAR

Maintenance and Establishment of Nurseries and Seedbanks. The office is maintaining 2 forage nurseries which are located at the Provincial Livestock and Poultry Farm in barangay Roxas, Bilar and at the OPV, Tagbilaran City. A variety of grasses and legumes are planted and distributed for free to interested clients. Newly established and existing municipal nurseries including private cooperators are also assisted in terms of supply of planting materials.



This year, a total of 61 kgs of legume seeds, 2,970 seedlings and 80,000 stalks/cuttings of forages of different varieties are distributed to the areas of Antequera, Alicia, Batuan, Carmen, Catigbian, Candijay, Danao, Dauis Duero, Jagna, Loon, Loboc, Pilar, Sagbayan, Sierra Bullones, Sikatuna, Talibon, Trinidad, Tubigon, and Ubay.

Forage development at farmers' level. Planting of improved grasses formed part of the requirements of farmer-beneficiaries in the LETS HELP Bohol Program. This year, a total of 1,731,639 square meters or 173.16 has non-contiguous areas are maintained. Additional 633,327 square meters or 63.33 has. are also developed covering the areas of Antequera, Balilihan, Batuan, Bien Unido, Buenavista, Catigbian, Dagohoy, Danao, Pres. Garcia, San Isidro, San Miguel, Sevilla, Sikatuna, , Sierra Bullones, Taibon and Ubay with napier grass as the farmers' preference.

Silage Production and Utilization. Massive and thorough promotion on silage production and utilization had been conducted through trainings of farmers, livestock technicians, BALA and even students to facilitate adoption. This year, trainings (*Table 6*) are conducted in Balilihan, Calape, Candijay, Catigbian, Corella, Getafe, Loon, Sikatuna, Sagbayan, , San Isidro, San Miguel, Tubigon, Ubay and Valencia (barangays Poblacion, Ginopolan and Anonang).



BOHOL NATIVE CHICKEN DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

The Program

The Provincial Government of Bohol has identified two commodity champions for the livestock and poultry sector, the dairy and the native chicken. With more than 90% of the production of native chicken coming from the backyard raisers, developing this industry becomes a major strategy to achieve inclusive growth in the countryside opening more livelihood as well as entrepreneurial opportunities for marginal farmers.

There is indeed a need to develop the competitiveness of native chicken as an industry by providing necessary interventions to the different segments of its value chain like providing input supplies, production, trading, processing and marketing support until the final product reaches the table of the consumers. Moreover, policy support shall also be provided to ensure sustainability.

This program envisions to attract more raisers and growers as well as small and big investors who are organized or privately operated to embark on native chicken enterprises. The Provincial Government of Bohol will take the lead in providing an investment friendly environment to ensure profitability of this industry through organization of key players, making accessible healthy breeder stocks, provision of policy support and technical assistance, support equipment and post-harvest facilities and providing linkages with financing institutions.

With its goal of commercializing native chicken in the province, the program specifically aims to:

1. To sustain and expand native chicken production province-wide;
2. To promote production and enhance productivity of naturally grown native chicken;
3. To make available healthy and enough supply of native chicken breeders for dispersal and enterprise purposes; and
4. To support nutrition program of the government.

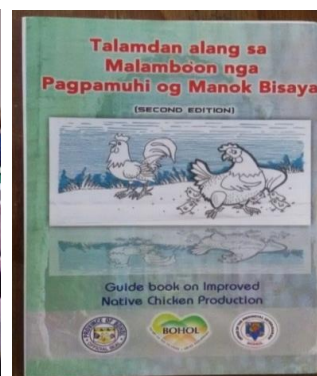
Its implementation is based on the 8 program components:

i) Social Mobilization/Program Management, ii) Breeder Production, iii) Disease Prevention and Control, iv) Enterprise and Marketing Development, v) Feed Development, vi) Research and Development, vii) Equipment and Post-Harvest Facilities and viii) Policy Support.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF THE YEAR

Social Mobilization/ Program Management. Program marketing and advocacy campaigns are conducted to increase appreciation and participation of local government counterparts and stakeholders. Activities for this year include: i)

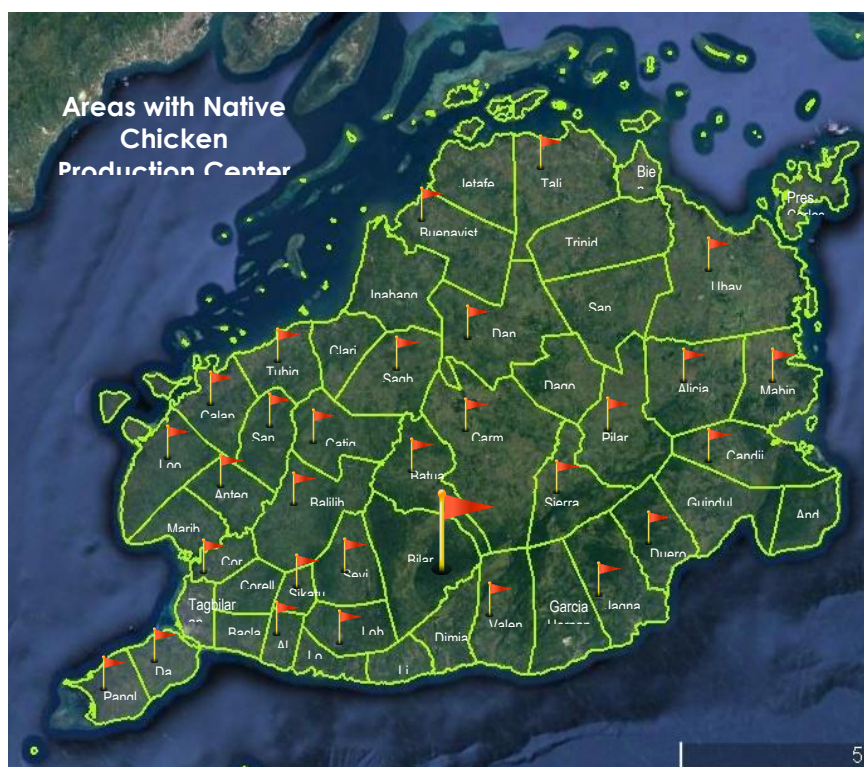
distribution of 1,074 pieces of “Guidebook on Native Chicken Production” to farmers, ii) strengthening the existing native chicken growers association and other industry players and iii) conduct of trainings at different levels.



Breeder Production. The office maintained the Provincial Livestock and Poultry Farm in Bilar, as an institutional farm that serves as demonstration of technology and learning center for farmers, students and technicians. It is primarily an institutional farm for the production of breeders to support the requirements of the municipal production centers, the Peoples’ Organizations (PO) and farmer raisers.

In order to facilitate the massive reproduction of chickens, 30 Municipal-based Native Chicken Production Centers (MNCPC) are also established to produce breeders that can be distributed to its municipal constituents.

For a start, the Provincial Government through this Office provided the MNCP Centers with 25 breeders, 1 roll net for fencing, feeds for the first 4 months of operation and an incubator while labor and feeds in the succeeding months are counterparts of the LGUs. In the course of implementation and as need arises, replacement breeders are also provided.

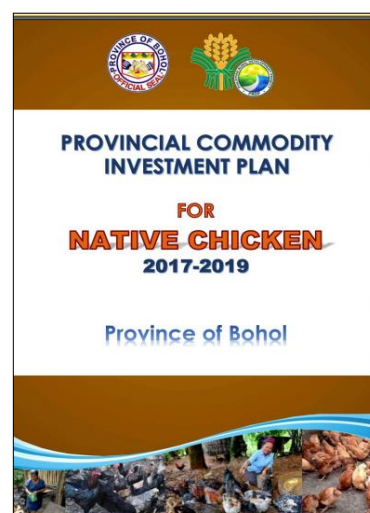


This year, the Office also extends breeder assistance to 18 private raisers, 21 POs/groups and 4 institutions - the Sunshine Home, Trinity Angels Care Home, St. Isidore Parish, Bilar, and BCIC and 7 schools in Tagbilaran City.

Disease prevention and control. To minimize chicken mortality due to disease and to ensure production of healthy quality birds, a unified animal health program for native chicken has been imposed in all production centers and promoted in all native chicken growers. These activities involve vaccination, deworming, observance of sanitation in the farm or production area, installation of bio-security measures, disease surveillance through blood sampling or sero-surveillance, regular monitoring and farm visits.



Enterprise and Marketing Development. The native chicken has been identified as a priority agricultural commodity by the Provincial Government for enterprise development. With our participation to PRDP, a value chain study is conducted to analyze the different segments from production of raw product up to the end market and come up with a Provincial Commodity Investment Plan (PCIP) for native chicken. This value chain study and PCIP is now a ready accessible guide for stakeholders in identifying areas for investment and assistance for government support and funding.



This year, 4 Small Livelihood Projects (SLP's) on native chicken with a fund of 1M per project, have been approved.

Research and Development. The Ubay Stock Farm in Lomangog, Ubay being a lead agency in the implementation of the Philippine Native Animal Development Program (PNAD) is on the forefront in the conduct of research on native chicken and came up to date with a an 100% purified Boholano breed. In year 2016, the provincial government extended its support to this research in terms of logistics and manpower to assist in project maintenance during the research period.

On the other hand, the OPV and student researchers from BISU-Bilar and Tagbilaran City Science High School are also conducting studies on native chicken, viz;

Learning Centers are also established in barangay Nueva Vida Sur, Carmen and barangays Janlud and Rosariohan in Batuan that served as demonstration area to showcase native chicken production practices of individual farmer-raiser. Documentation of these learning centers will serve as a guide for other projects in the future.

PROVINCIAL LIVESTOCK and POULTRY FARM (PLPF)

The Project

The Farm is located at the area owned by the Provincial Government in barangay Roxas, Bilar. It is part and parcel of the Bohol Biodiversity Complex which is approximately 600 meters from the highway.

For 20 years now, the Farm has sustained despite change of provincial leadership. In fact, the Provincial Government has maintained its budgetary allocation of P1,000,000.00 for maintenance and operating expenses.

Primarily, this is a pooling place of pass on animals under the LETS HELP BOHOL Program and eventually became a drop-off point and a learning center of visitors, farmers and even students from the nearby agricultural school of BISU.

The development of native chicken as one of the commodity champions, transformed the Provincial Livestock and Poultry Farm from a mere farm into an institutional production center for native chicken. Other projects undertaken include swine production which also showcase utilization of manure through biogas and vermi-composting, forage nursery and ethno veterinary seedbank and goat production.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF THE YEAR

Farm Management and Operation. With the aim in view of having a guide for project implementation in the next 3 years, a planning workshop participated by personnel from the production division and PLPF is conducted this year. A development map which laid out specific areas for utilization is now ready for implementation by the consortium of the Bio-diversity complex that will level up the farm into an eco-tourism site.

New structures, equipment and fixtures are constructed and procured which are now in use, viz: i) small bodega or warehouse that stores farm supplies and equipment, ii) an NFTS building purposely as production area and showcase of NFTS products and iii) tables, chairs and a television set for the visitors lounge that would be constructed in year 2017.



As a protocol, farm inventory is regularly conducted by project on a quarterly basis to ensure proper accounting of farm properties. This inventory is also necessary to identify animals that need to be culled or replaced.

The PLPF staff also had the opportunity last December to observe government operated farms such as Ubay Stock Farm, Philippine Carabao Center, National Dairy Authority (NDA) and the private farm of Mr. Ismael Tumanda in barangay Garcia, Batuan. This activity is intended to enhance knowledge and skills of personnel and learned management practices that can be adopted/replicated at the PLPF.



Native Chicken Production Project. As of December, the project maintained 95 hens and 15 roosters as breeders for the production of hardened chicks to support the establishment of municipal -based

native chicken production centers and the countryside development program of the Provincial Government. This year, a total of 720 hardened chicks, 35 ready-to-lay and 66 cockerels are distributed to 12 municipal-beneficiaries (Table 7).

The Unified Animal Health Program for native chicken is considered in the project thus assuring protection and high survival rate of chickens when released to clients.

Swine Production Project. The project produced piglets for breeder dispersal purposes. It maintained 5 sows of mixed bloodline and in the absence of boar, services this year are temporarily availed from a boar of a private operator within the municipality. A total of 4 male and 29 female pigs are released to the municipalities of Candijay, Albur, Trinidad, Balilihan, Talibon, Duero, Talibon and Corella.

Goat Production Project. The farm is a recipient of 9 hybrid Anglo Nubian goats (7 does, 2 bucks) for breeding purposes under the program “Upgrading of Production Centers” of DA RFO 7. As of December 2016, 2 kids are produced.



Animal Feed Development. A forage nursery and ethno-veterinary plots are also maintained in the farm. These served as source of planting materials for interested clients. For the year, a total of 168 seedlings and 570 cuttings are distributed to Lila, Dagohoy and Batuan. Production of planting materials has been affected by the El Nino phenomena and the project is still on its recovery stage. Mass production is targeted for 2017.

Feed gardens of alikway, kangkong, chili, alugbati and malunggay are also maintained with the aim of minimizing or reducing the cost and use of commercial feeds. Decoctions made from hot pepper (chili) mixed with molasses are also formulated and given in drinking water as prevention to diseases in chickens.



Livestock Waste Management and Utilization. Pig manure produced from the swine production project is utilized to maintain the concrete bio-digester in the farm. Manure from chickens and carabaos are also used for the vermi-composting facility that produced 5,954 kilograms of vermicasts this year. These vermicasts are utilized as organic fertilizer and potting media for the production of forage planting materials.

CORE FUNCTION 2

• Safeguard Public Against Zoonotic & Emerging Livestock Disease

BOHOL RABIES PREVENTION and ELIMINATION PROGRAM

The Program

The Bohol Rabies Prevention and Elimination Program is a locally-initiated comprehensive program which started in 2007 with the ultimate goal of eliminating rabies disease in the province.

Its multi-sectoral and participatory implementation is province-wide involving the 47 municipalities, the City of Tagbilaran, 1,109 barangays and the national, provincial and non-government institutions.

The program does not focus only on prevention of rabies but managing and controlling stray dogs as well.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF THE YEAR

Program Management. Program orientations and paralegal trainings are undertaken this year in 17 municipalities (*Table 8*) to refresh if not inform the municipalities and barangays on the implementation mechanics of the program emphasizing the principle of responsible pet ownership, the rabies law and the role of the participating agencies. Program advocacies through orientations are also undertaken with target



islands of CP Garcia, Cabilao and Balicasag for Rabies-free zones in CY 2017.

To further create awareness and promote the principle of responsible pet ownership, the month of March is dubbed as the “Rabies Awareness Month” in the province. As a form of celebration, the OPV held spay and neuter in the municipality of Balilihan. The “World Rabies Day” is also commemorated every September 28th and Jagna form part of that celebration through the conduct of “Usig sa Jagna” where a dog show is conducted by the LGU and a clinic conducted by OPV.

Dog Population Control and Management. To carry out the activities effectively, a Dog Control Officer is designated to supervise the implementation of dog population control.

Spaying and neutering of dogs including cats are performed by OPV in partnership with an NGO, the Humane Society International (HSI) with the municipal and barangays providing counterpart funds and in the case of Tagbilaran, coordination is made with the City Veterinarian.

The Office also facilitated the conduct of 5 spay and neuter trainings (*Table 9*) by HSI with a total of 15 participants from OPV and Livestock Technicians.

Aside from the services performed at the Provincial Animal Health Care Unit and Laboratory (PAHCUL), this year, a total of 1,613 dogs and 229 cats are spayed and neutered covering 16 areas: Anda, Antequera, Baclayon, Balilihan, Batuan Calape, Cortes, CP Garcia, Dauis, Dimiao, Lila, Loon, Maribojoc, Panglao, Sikatuna including the City of Tagbilaran and serving a total of 1,256 clients (*Table 10*).



Efforts are also geared towards disposal, management and clearing the streets with stray dogs that caused accidents particularly commuters on motorcycles. To enable the LGUs to implement this activity in their own pace, 5 dog catching and 1 dog pound management trainings are conducted with a total of 57 technicians trained. The Office still continue to support the dog impounding activities at the municipal level particularly those without trained dog catchers.

Dog Bite Management. Identified high risked personnel involved in the implementation of the rabies program are given protection by giving free pre-exposure prophylaxis (PEP) with support from the Department of Health (DOH) through the Provincial Health Office (PHO) in terms of vaccines and vaccinator staff. This year, the office particularly facilitated the scheduling of PEP of the 94 persons identified by the municipality of which only 89 completed the regimen.

Dog Vaccination. Massive dog vaccination province wide period is from March to May. However, vaccination saturation is conducted until December to accommodate dogs that are not vaccinated during the massive schedule. The office supervises the activities and provides dog rabies vaccines. This year, a total of 6,000 vials are allocated to the province by the Bureau of Animal Industry (BAI) through the DA RFO 7. The office on the other hand provides fridge thermometers to the MLGUs to ensure proper storage of vaccines through maintenance of recommended temperature.

Dog vaccination at the barangays is spearheaded by the Municipal Agricultural Offices through its Livestock Technicians with the support of the Barangay Livestock Aides (BALA). For those areas with no or the Livestock Technician is new, the Office provided technical manpower during the vaccination schedule.

This year, a total of 84,199 dogs are vaccinated covering all municipalities including the City of Tagbilaran (*Table 11*) achieving a provincial vaccination rate of 72%.

For every dog vaccinated, a corresponding dog card is issued as a proof of vaccination. This year a total of 44,800 dog cards are reproduced and distributed, however, some MLGUs opted to reproduce their own to facilitate issuance during the vaccination period.

The Office is also reproducing and distributing 3,675 sets of IEC materials that include copies of the Provincial Ordinance, Anti-Rabies Law, Dog Pound Guidelines, Animal Welfare Act and DA AO No. 13 - Guidelines on Euthanasia.

Disease Surveillance. To know the prevalence of rabies disease, regular surveillance is undertaken through collection and submission of 47 dog head samples from areas with previous history of positive canine rabies cases, from rabies suspected dogs that had bitten people and from areas with requests for dog impounding. These samples are sent to Cebu Regional Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory (RADDL) for examination in the absence of a facility in the province.

From the 47 submitted head samples, 3 are positive for rabies antigen thru Fluorescent Antibody Test (FAT). These samples came from these areas: 2 from Tinago, Dauis and 1 from Anislag, Corella. The results are relayed to the owner, the Barangay Captain and the Municipal Agriculturist for information and appropriate action.

As a reaction to the reported positive case of barangay Tinago, Dauis the following activities are held thereat; i) rabies program presentation at the same time conduct animal clinic, ii) spay and neuter and iii) forum. The Office suggested to the MLGU and BLGU to undergo immediate dog catching and saturation vaccination to stop the possible spread of rabies.

Disease case investigation through contract tracing is made in Tinago, Dauis, Anislag, Corella for canine rabies and Ubay, Talibon and Tagbilaran for reported suspected human cases.

Animal movement through reports from the Provincial Veterinary Quarantine Office is being monitored as well, to ensure that all shippers comply with the requirements for shipment especially for incoming dogs and cats.

Program Monitoring/ Assessment. The status of program implementation is updated and discussed during meetings and assessments. This year, 1 Rabies Program Assessment, 1 BRPEC meeting and attendance to 4 MRPEC meetings are undertaken in Loon, Calape, CPGarcia and Panglao.

MEAT SAFETY and CONTROL PROGRAM

The Program

This is a program that ensures food safety and quality standards for consumer products related to livestock and livestock by products.

Ensuring the safe flow of food of animal origin from the point of production to the food table of consuming community is one major issue that the Office is trying to address. Pending the enactment of a Provincial Ordinance for the establishment of the Provincial Meat Inspection Service Unit (PMISU), efforts at the moment are limited only to monitoring and coordination with municipalities with slaughterhouses. The PMISU being envisioned to be part and parcel of the office organizational structure shall be spearheading the implementation of all activities related to meat inspection.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF THE YEAR

Strengthening of Provincial Meat Inspection Service.

Attempts have been made by the office to have an enacted Ordinance for the creation of the Provincial Meat Inspection Service Unit (PMISU) in the previous year, yet until to date, only drafting of an operations manual has been done. One thing good is by the time the ordinance will be enforced, a reference or guide is already available for implementers.

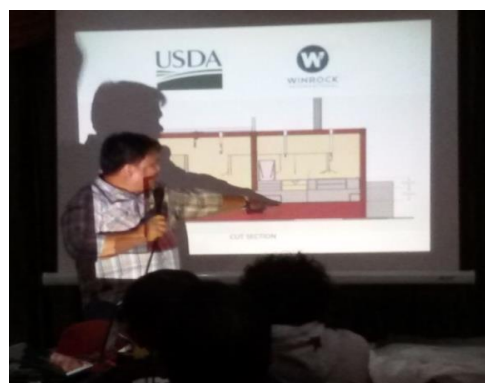
Despite this situation, preparations at the ground level are undertaken. Four (4) orientation seminar/trainings in the municipalities of Catigbian, Batuan and Alicia are conducted with 80 meat handlers and chicken growers as participants (*Table 12*). This intends to create awareness and ensure that all people involved in slaughter operation follow appropriate and hygienic procedures during slaughtering and carcass handling.



Basic equipment is also provided to 27 municipalities with operational slaughterhouses and these include : i) 29 stainless dehairing tables, ii) 29 pvc tank, iii) 1 electric hoist, iv) 195 fish basins or banyera and v) 1 pressure tank.



In 2016, the office has been fortunate to have been visited by representatives from Winrock Foundation and agreed in principle to assist in the structural and equipment upgrading of slaughterhouses. Thus, an orientation on standard designs and layouts for the construction of slaughterhouse is conducted on September 13. This is attended by Municipal Planning and Development Coordinators (MPDC), Municipal Engineers (ME) and Meat Inspectors (MI) with technical experts from Winrock Foundation giving the inputs.



Monitoring, Assessment and Evaluation. Program assessment, 3 consultative meetings and report review of Meat Inspectors (MI) are conducted with budgetary support from DA RFO 7. These activities are necessary to update the MIs on the policies and guidelines as well as the status of report submission. Inspection and monitoring are also conducted in slaughterhouse to evaluate the operation and ensure compliance to standards.

Slaughter reports from municipal-operated slaughterhouses are submitted to the office by the Meat Inspectors on a monthly basis. The consolidated provincial reports are forwarded to the National Meat Inspection Service (NMIS) Regional Office.

For private-operated slaughterhouses and dressing plants, data are collected by the provincial-based Meat Control Officer of the NMIS, who is monitoring these establishments.

For the year 2016, data showed a total of 67,548 animals are slaughtered with an equivalent dressed weight of 4,685,536 kgs., while 12,748,125 heads of poultry were dressed with an equivalent dressed weight of 13,586,145.2 kgs. *(Table 13)*.

CORE FUNCTION 3

- Enhance Livestock-Based Livelihood, Enterprise and Employment Opportunities

LET'S HELP BOHOL PROGRAM

The Program

LHB refers to Livelihood Enhancement towards Sustainable Human and Environmental Paradigm for Bohol. It is a 17 year old Program sustained by the principle of "Passing on the Gift" where program implementers and project participants commit to help Bohol in its fight against poverty by passing on repayment animals to the next in line family beneficiaries providing them livelihood and enterprise opportunities.

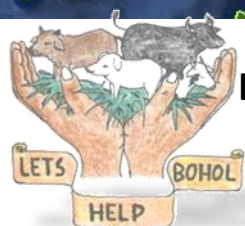
The Program originated in 7 municipalities with Heifer Project International (HPI) counterpart funds and expanded to 33 more areas benefiting 341 Peoples' Organizations (POs) to date, with support from the Provincial Government, CONBUSAC, DA and largely by POs.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF THE YEAR

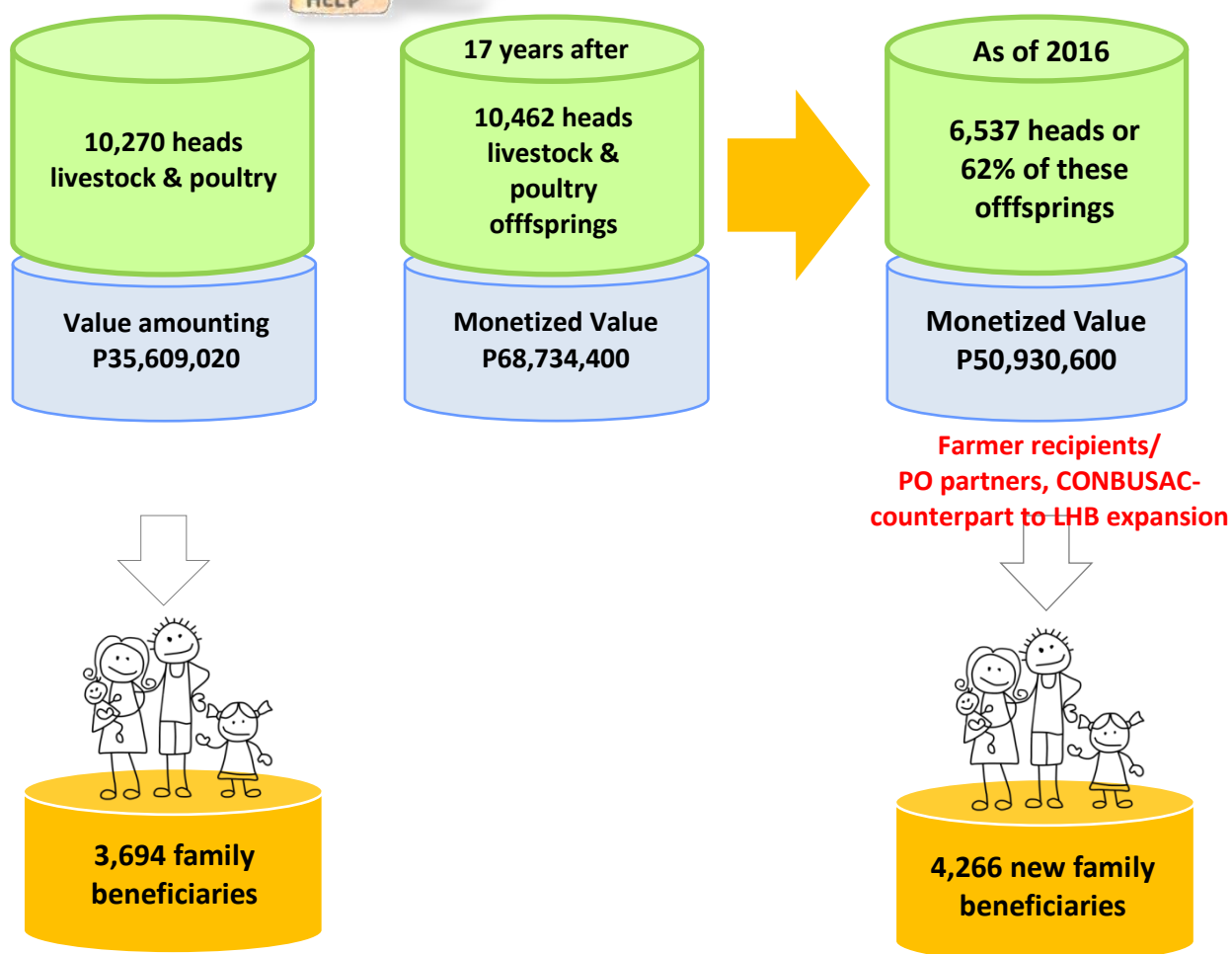
Building Partnership. The basic requirements for project partnership to LHB are the following; i) active membership in the organization, ii) completion of all required trainings, iii) a 200 square meters planted to improved forages and, iv) animal shed.

Since program inception in 2000, to date, there are 341 partner POs from 40 municipalities provincewide with 16,171 members benefiting 3,664 beneficiaries. For this year alone, 6 new POs with a total membership of 139 from 5 municipalities have forged partnership with LHB.

On the other hand, this year, the Confederation of Boholanos in USA and Canada (CONBUSAC) has continued its support as partner of LHB by providing additional 10 carabaos to Calatrava SCFO of barangay Calatrava, Carmen. It can be noted that POs from Alicia, Clarin and Pilar were also given support by CONBUSAC.

Livestock Productivity. For this year, the Program generated an estimated amount of P7,841,200.00 worth of offsprings: pass-on, non-weaning and personal share.

Trainings and Orientation. This year, 28 trainings are conducted to 7 new Peoples' Organizations (PO) in 6 municipalities attended by a total of 800 participants.

Discussions focused on cornerstone and values formation, animal health, breeding and nutrition as



well as program policy orientation. The POs with support from the Municipal Agriculture Office shoulder the costs of training as their counterpart to the program. These trainings enable the organization particularly the individual recipients to be cognizant on their responsibility of the animals, accountability to the organization and to the program, as well as built a strong commitment and honor, to help other families in need.

Monitoring and Assessment. One of the very essential features of program sustainability is a good monitoring system. Considering the number of participating organizations and families and the wide scope of program coverage, the built-in monitoring mechanism installed by LHB from the PO up to the program level facilitated generation of information and feedback.

Livestock Committee (LC) - The Livestock Committee (LC) serves as the monitoring body of every PO and renders report on the status of project animals. As of December, 2,326 LC reports are submitted by partner POs. These provided the Program Management a general view of the program and reference for planning the activities for the succeeding year.

Municipal Advisory Board (MAB) meetings - The Presidents of every member POs in a municipality comprised the MAB. This body convenes periodically to discuss the project status and the problems encountered through reporting. The Office sees to it that LHB is represented during meetings.



Family beneficiary interaction -

A direct interaction of the program management at household level facilitated the generation of actual situation of the project and its contribution to the economic standing of every participating families.

Municipal Assessment. As of December, the program has conducted 22 assessments at the municipal level involving 274 POs. Parameters considered include status of forages, animal health services, use of animal sheds, manure utilization, income and savings.

The consolidated status reports showed the following;

LHB Partners Congress. A Livestock and Poultry Partners Congress conducted on November 17 in Tagbilaran City is attended by 341 LETS HELP Program partner Peoples Organizations (POs) from 40 municipalities of the province. Other assisted POs particularly those with livestock projects are also invited to participate in the affair.

Highlights of the activity include the distribution of certificates of recognition for partner POs and the ceremonial turn-over of checks from DA RFO 7 to 13 proponent groups under the small livelihood projects (SLP) of the PRDP.



DAIRY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

The Program

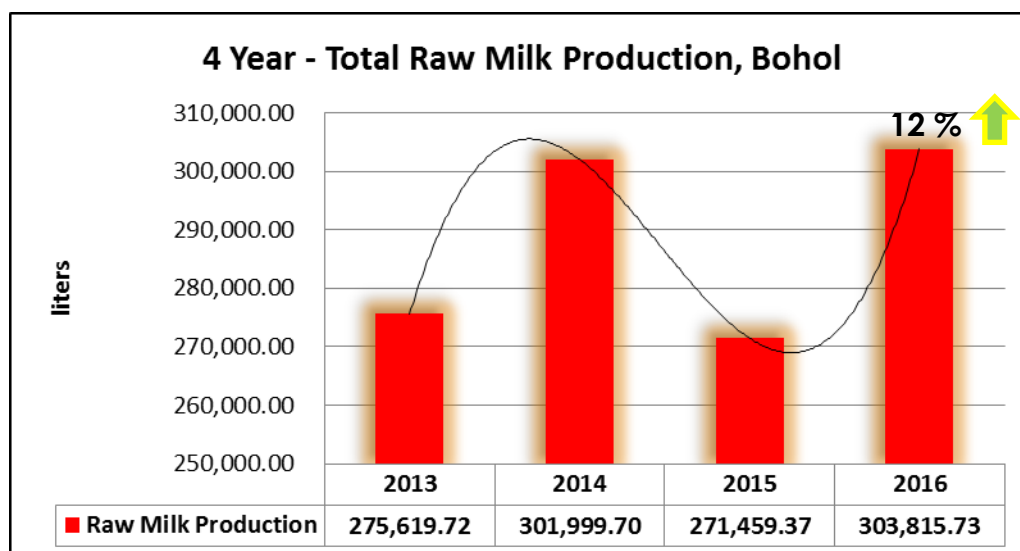
Developing the dairy industry in Bohol is a mandate of both national government institutions – the National Dairy Authority (NDA) for cattle and the Philippine Carabao Center (PCC) for carabao. The Provincial Government through the Office of the Provincial Veterinarian serves as the coordinating office for these institutions. Specifically, the office provides support in the areas of marketing, and strengthening the capacities of People's Organizations engaging in dairy production and processing. Technical support to dairy cooperatives is also provided in terms of technicians assigned in the identified dairy zones purposely to perform collection of milk from farmers, assistance to artificial insemination and animal health services. They also assist dairy coops during meetings to facilitate some of the concerns related to community-based dairy program.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF THE YEAR

Milk Production. Milk in the province is primarily of carabao and cattle. Production is done in 2 institutional farms of the Phil. Carabao Center and the National Dairy Authority (NDA) with the active participation of BoDPA which has 23 coops/ PO members in the municipalities of Alicia, Dagohoy, Mabini, San Miguel and Ubay.

This year, despite the occurrence of El Nino in the early part of the year, raw milk production showed a positive increase of 12% as shown in the graph. It is interesting to mention that production at the farmers' level has contributed much to its increase.

With the challenge encountered, the farmer members of BoDPA are provided by the provincial government, the PCC and NDA with technical assistance as well as logistical support like veterinary drugs, biologics, vitamins and mineral supplements as well as feed supplements. Veterinary health services are conducted timely by the provincial, municipal and PCC technicians.



Production of milk is expected to increase with the participation of new partner player in the industry, the DSWD, which provided for additional 500 heads of carabaos for dairying through its SLP dairy projects benefiting 500 4P's beneficiaries in the municipalities of Alicia, Dagohoy, Mabini, San Miguel and Ubay.

To ensure viability of this project, the provincial government is providing for the much needed animal insurance with the PCIC agri-insurance program.

Enterprise. Dairy is a new and promising enterprise in the province. Per BoDPA's report for CY 2016, milk sales are generated by the association in its dairy marketing enterprise. The Office continuously provide assistance in facilitating the release of a funding assistance worth 9.2 M under the PRDP-IREAP to enhance existing endeavor and maximize the enterprise potential and encourage the participation of ore farmers and association. Equipment and supplies are also provided as production and marketing support to community-based dairy producers.

Currently, dairy products are distributed and marketed in institutional markets like malls, hotels and restaurants, in individuals and households and schools. To date a total of 18 schools (Table 17) are implementing the "Gatas sa Eskwelahan para sa Kabataan ug Katawhan Project" where dairy products are made available in school canteens.

As a promotional and marketing strategy for carabao's milk, schools are tapped as partner of the project. This year, ten (10) new additional National High Schools are

participating in the project and are provided with freezers: i) Manga, Tagbilaran City, ii) Baclayon, iii) San Roque, Balilihan, iv) Katipunan, Carmen, v) Loboc, vi) Pilar, vii) Candijay, viii) Fatima, Cortes, ix) Hanopol, Balilihan and x) Hinlayagan, Trinidad.

Program Promotion and Advocacy. Promotional activities are conducted this year to increase awareness on the nutritional requirements of fresh milk at the same time encourage farmers to go into dairying as an enterprise.

A Bohol Sustainable Dairy Enterprise and Livelihood Project Stakeholders' Forum is held on March 22 in coordination with the PCC and DSWD at the Farmers' Center in Lomangog, Ubay with more than 500 program beneficiaries in attendance coming from the municipalities of Alicia, Dagohoy, Mabini, San Miguel and Ubay.



At this time also, the Office facilitated the distribution of the 500 carabaos under the SLP of the DSWD. The affair is graced by the Governor together with officials from the national, provincial and municipal government agencies.



On October 19, the second Dairy Festival with the theme "Stirring a Vibrant Industry from Every Drop of Milk" is also conducted at Lomangog, Ubay marking the raw milk production of 1,000 liters a day. The affair is also graced by the Governor, the Vice Governor, representatives from the different government institutions like PCC, NDA, DA RFO 7, municipal and provincial officials.



On the other hand, milk feeding is held in 5 schools within Tagbilaran City last July 15 in celebration of the nutrition month. With support from the PCC and NDA and coordination with DepEd, milk bars are given to students in Cabawan, Ubujan, Tiptip, San Isidro and City Central schools.

Farming and Agriculture in The Netherlands

The expansion in farming and agriculture of The Netherlands is geared towards agro-tourism.



Learning Insights

- Policy on agro-tourism is that 75% of activity should be in agriculture and farming, only 25% is devoted to tourism.
- Development of housing and farm tourism activities also includes for the elderly, persons with disabilities and children. Provision of the farming tasks to the elderly, PWDs and emotionally disturbed so that they will feel that they are still needed by the society and have regained their self-worth.
- The Netherlands Extension program is a concrete example of privatized extension system where private extension service providers took over the delivery of extension services.

Recommendations

- This initial collaboration between PTC+ and the DA-ATI be strengthened particularly on Capacity Building of the other important pillars of extension in (NGAs, LGUs and Private Sector) not only on farming but also on farm tourism. Very timely for the approval of the New Farm Tourism Law in the Philippines in May 2016.
- Land use planning in the Philippines should be strictly instituted and followed to reduce the conversion of farm/ agricultural lands into other uses.

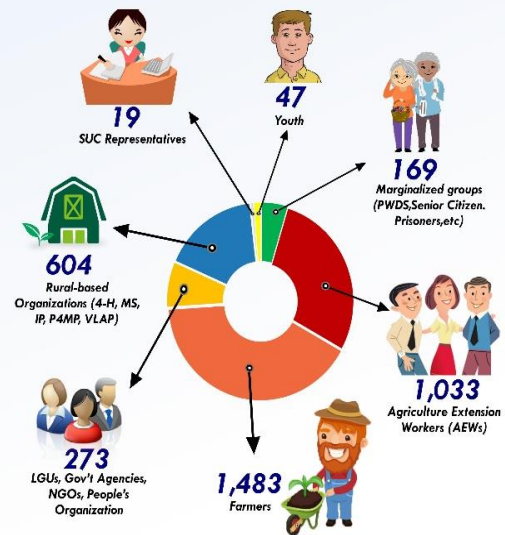

I. HIGHLIGHTS OF 2016 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

In 2016, the Department of Agrarian Reform (DAR), Province of Bohol pursued the implementation of the Comprehensive Agrarian Reform Program (CARP) under R.A. 6657 and Comprehensive Agrarian Reform Program Extension with Reforms (CARPER) under R.A. 9700. Though these enabling laws on agrarian reform had already ended, but the program must go on for the reason that it is explicit in Section 21, Article II of the 1987 Philippine Constitution that ““The State shall promote comprehensive rural development and agrarian reform program””.

In the last quarter of 2016, there was a tremendous change of management under the leadership of Secretary Rafael “Ka Paeng” Mariano with his new Undersecretaries and Assistant Secretaries. However, there were no comprehensive changes made in the operational directives for 2016.

DAR still focuses on its three (3) major final outputs namely: Land Tenure Services (LTS); Agrarian Legal Services (ALS) and Technical Advisory Support Services (TASS) in cooperation with the line agencies and other funding institutions.

1. LAND TENURE SERVICES (LTS)

Activities under LTS involve the Land Acquisition and Distribution (LAD) and non-LAD Schemes and Other Land Tenure Sustainability Activities. The Non-LAD scheme include Leasehold Operations (LHO); Stock Distribution Option (SDO), and Production and Profit Sharing Option (PPS). DARPO- Bohol has no scope on SDO and PPS. Other Land Tenure Sustainability includes the subdivision, redocumentation and distribution of individual titles to ARBs from the Collective Certificate of Landownership Award (CLOA), Re-documentation of Distributed buy not Yet Paid lands (DNYP) and Generation of Land Information Schedule (LDIS).

Land Acquisition & Distribution (LAD)

Land Acquisition and Distribution involves the redistribution of all public and private lands to qualified farmers and farm workers, subject to the retention limit and just compensation to landowners. LAD involves complex processes such as land identification and documentation, conduct of land survey, land valuation and

compensation, preparation of land distribution folder, Land title registration and land title distribution.

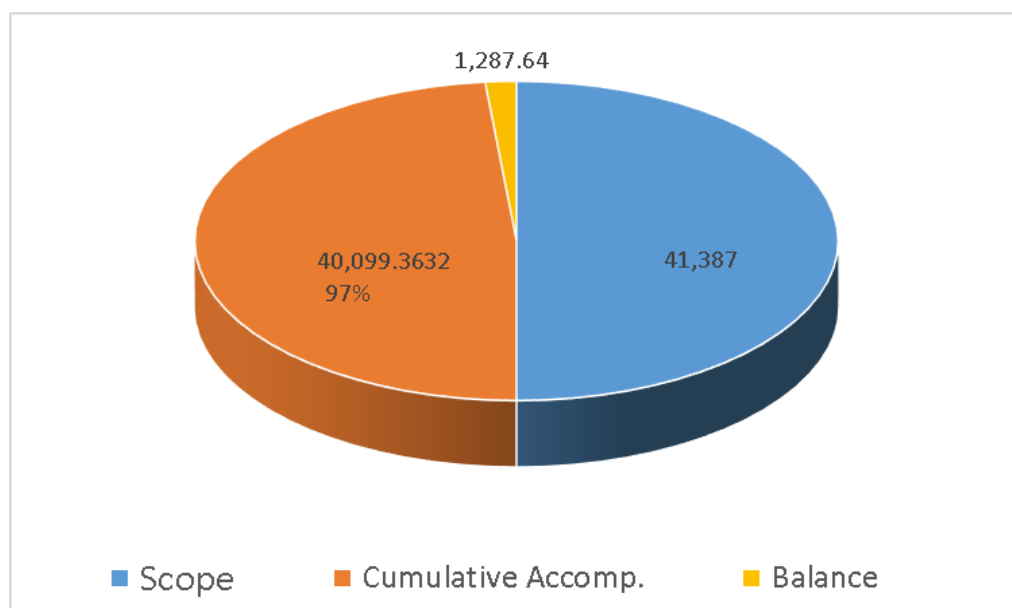


Figure 1. Land Acquisition and Distribution Accomplishment as of Dec. 31, 2016

Figure 1 shows the cumulative accomplishment on Land Acquisition and Distribution in terms of hectares as of December 31, 2016.

About 97% of the total working scope of 41,387 hectares in terms of area had already been accomplished. This is more or less equivalent to 40,099 hectares of agricultural lands distributed to 31,707 Agrarian Reform Beneficiaries (ARBS). Data indicated in figure 1 are acquired areas.

Figure 2 shows the accomplishment versus its target for the year. The Department's accomplishment on LAD is based on the gross area. DARPO-Bohol has accomplished 329.3652 hectares on Land Acquisition and Distribution equivalent to 37% against the target of 592 hectares. The actual area distributed is 156.2930 hectares which

benefited 170 ARBs. This accomplishment came from private agricultural lands. Since the implementation of the program is not the sole responsibility of DAR, it contributed a lot to the low accomplishment of the department. Problems and issues involved in the implementation are not easy to solve especially if the problem is already outside the jurisdiction of the department.

Leasehold Operation

Leasehold operation covers tenanted lands that are within the allowable retention ceiling of five (5) hectares per landowner. The share tenancy arrangement between landowner and tenant could be transformed into a leasehold arrangement. The tenants become agricultural lessees who, instead of paying the landowner a percentage share of the produce, will instead pay a fixed rental that is computed on the basis of historical production records.

Figure 3 shows the accomplishment for the year which is 106.0221 as against the target of 75 or an equivalent of 141% accomplishment involving one hundred thirty-seven (137) ARBs.

Survey of new lands and Collective CLOA is an indispensable activity of Land Acquisition and Distribution (LAD) process. Major final output of this activity is

approved survey plan for new lands while subdivision of Collective CLOA is survey transmitted to LMS.

Just like in the acquisition and distribution activities, Figure 4 shows that targets were not accomplished 100% due to complexities of data and underlying problems inherent thereto.

2. AGRARIAN LEGAL SERVICES (ALS)

This second major final output which is delivery of agrarian justice involves adjudication of agrarian cases and agrarian legal assistance.

A. Adjudication of Agrarian Reform Cases (AARC)

The DAR Adjudication Board (DARAB) through the Provincial Adjudicator is vested by law to exercise its quasi-judicial functions to hear and resolve agrarian reform cases. These cases mostly involve agricultural tenancy and land valuation.

DAR Bohol being a medium LAD Province resulted to the scarcity of cases. DARAB Bohol has accomplished 795 cases as against the target of 856 or a total of 93%.

B. Agrarian Legal Assistance (ALA)

Agrarian Legal Assistance is comprised of resolution of agrarian law implementation (ALI) cases, ARB representation before judicial and quasi-judicial bodies, and mediation and conciliation.

The DAR at present utilizes more aggressive alternative dispute resolution techniques in mediation to reduce conflicts maturing into court cases. The general objective is to persuade the contending parties to settle their disputes amicably or out of court before the DAR.

Table 2 below will show the accomplishments of all the components of ALA.

Table 2 reflects that most of the targets were accomplished except the resolution of ALI cases and representation in judicial courts because these are beyond the control of DAR.

3. TECHNICAL ADVISORY SUPPORT SERVICES (TASS)

Technical Advisory Support Services (TASS) is a support service delivery component of the agrarian reform program. It aims to capacitate the Agrarian Reform Beneficiaries (ARBs) and provide them access to necessary support services to make their lands more productive and enable them to venture into income generating livelihood projects and for ARBs to actively participate in community governance.

In order to attain its vision, TASS focuses on three (3) sub-major final outputs namely: Social Infrastructure & Local Capability Building (SILCAB); Sustainable Agri-Business and Rural Enterprise Development (SARED); Access Facilitation and Access Enhancement Services (AFAES).

A. Social Infrastructure & Local Capability Building (SILCAB): Laying the foundations of Rural Development

SILCAB focuses on the capacity development of ARBs, ARBOs and the community as well. ARBs are trained to equip them with the necessary knowledge especially on how to safeguard and sustain the coffers of every cooperative or agri-business enterprise.

It is in this component where community organizing activities are undertaken and initiate convergence initiatives with CARP Implementing Agencies (CIAs) for delivery of the provision of support services to ARBs.

B. Sustainable Agribusiness and Rural Enterprise Development (SARED):

Uplifting the Socio-Economic well-being of the ARBs through increased productivity

To empower and transform the ARBs into progressive entrepreneurs and to promote economic growth in the rural areas, DAR implements Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSME) development strategy. In this scheme, ARBs are given technical assistance and extension services to capacitate them with the skills and knowledge towards producing quality and competitive products and services.

DAR also provides marketing assistance with ARBs thru linkages with prospective agri-investors and other product buyers. Among these are the regular conduct of trade fairs and establishment of marketing centers.

C. Access Enhancement Services (AFAES) :Linking Viable Resources to the Community

Infrastructure is a key to creating a progressive economic environment and prosperity in the countryside. The provision of infrastructure projects in the province DAR Bohol is local and foreign assisted. For foreign assisted projects, it draws counterpart fund support from the provincial and municipal government units.

The province of Bohol is fortunate that aside from Agrarian Reform Funds (ARF) for CARP, there were also foreign donors, namely: the Belgian Integrated Agrarian Reform Support Project (BIARSP) from the government of Belgium; Agrarian Reform Support Infrastructure Project (ARISP) from Japan for International Cooperation (JBIC); the Philippine Australia Agrarian Technical Support for Agrarian Reform and Rural Development (PATSARRD) of the Australian government; and the Second Agrarian Reform Communities Development Project (ARCDP) from the World Bank. The latest foreign project that the province has is the Agrarian Reform Infrastructure Support Project Phase III (ARISP III).

Monitoring activities on all existing projects were also undertaken to ensure its sustainability.

The Department of Agrarian Reform (DAR) here turned-over the newly finished Potable Water System (PWS) Level II project funded under the Agrarian Reform Infrastructure Project Phase III (ARISPIII) of DAR with counterpart fund from the local government unit of Danao in the total amount of Php10,154,228, last June 29. It covers the Poblacion, Barangays Hibale and Sto. Nino with 300 household recipients in the said town. The scope of work includes the Improvement of the Water Source, Construction of 8 cu.m. capacity Reinforced Concrete Sedimentation Tank, Construction of 4.5 cu.m. capacity Reinforced Concrete Filtration Tank, Construction of 32 cu.m. capacity Reinforced Concrete Ground Reservoir with Drip Type Chlorinator, Installation of Transmission and Distribution Pipes and Valves and the Construction of 60 units communal faucets with consumption meters. Photo shows Danao Mayor Natividad R. Gonzaga (5th from left) and her officials, Eddie E. Manginsay, Acting Provincial Agrarian Reform Officer I, MARO Licenio Tinampay, Engr. D. Support Services to Rural Women

DAR also extended its support services to rural women. For CY 2016, Five hundred sixty-one (561) rural women were served out 210 target. This is equivalent to 267% accomplishment. The support services given were on livelihood trainings. (See table below)

E. Support Services for Landowners

Landowners whose landholdings were covered under the program are not being left out in the implementation of the program. The Department is extending support services especially in the facilitation for the payment of their lands. For CY 2016, DARPO Bohol was able to extend support to 63 landowners. This is equivalent to 158% accomplishment. (Please see table below)

1. Establishment of grass roots micro-finance in Agrarian Reform Areas thru Members Savings Operation (MSOs), (MICOOP) and DAR - CARD, INC. Capability Development Program or the Savings and Credit System which is a quasi-bank or bank like operation. The establishments of a quasi-bank particularly in areas where banks and other financial institutions are not available help a lot in terms of savings and loan accessing by our Agrarian Reform Beneficiaries. It started with a few thousands of pesos as operating capital and now, the pilot sites or the pioneering MSOs are already millionaires.

- The creation of Bohol Federation of Agrarian Reform Communities Cooperative (BFARCCO) is another milestone of the Department thru the ARISP III project. It is the sub-wing of the Institutional Development component of the project. The federation will manage the Agrarian Information Marketing Center (AIM-C) that will be established in Tagbilaran City which aim to provide marketing information of farm products; provide favorable prices, processing and transporting of farm products; provide better quality of farm inputs; provide agricultural extension and technical training services; provide financial intermediation services to member cooperatives enabling them to accumulate funds to implement new projects/ services, as well as to protect the member cooperatives from usurious money lenders.

In 2016, the constructed AIM-C building, a joint project of the Department of Agrarian Reform and the Provincial Local Government Unit of Bohol funded by the Agrarian Reform Infrastructure Support Project Phase III (ARISP III) thru JICA has been turned-over to the BFARCCO, and not long after the federation has opened its operation.

DAR considers organizations as key players in rural development. Assessing their viability, based on level of maturity is an imperative, thus the need to improve its tool in assessing the level of development of ARBOS is very necessary.

Information Technology Enabled Maturity Assessment (ITEMA) is an enhanced tool which seeks to come up with comprehensive and realistic results of assessing the levels of maturity of the DAR-assisted ARBOs. The ITEMMA also seeks to bring the development gaps or the interventions yet to be provided. On the other side, it also seeks to create a database of DAR-assisted ARBOs from which updated and comprehensive ARBO Profiles can be readily generated. This assessment is a portion of the ARC Level of Development Assessment (ALDA).

In 2015, the result of the ITEMMA was not reflected during the preparation of this report due to inavailability of the data since the processing of the result is done at the DAR Central Office. For information purposes, DARPO Bohol is including the 2015 ITEMMA summary result as shown on the table below.

Of the one hundred six (106) ARBOs subjected to ITEMMA in 2015, only ninety-six are operational and fourteen are declared non-operational.

ARBOS with level 5 ratings are those who have already reached maturity and can already stand alone in their operations. Most of these level 5 ARBOs are millionaire coops and are operating quasi-banking and Members Savings Operation (MSO) in their respective business area of operations. Some of them had been recognized as best cooperatives in the past years.

ARBOS with level 4 ratings are those who have reached lower medium level of development. ARBOS which belong to level 3 down to level 1 are the ones that need focus on provision of support services.

There are also identified ARBOs during the conduct of 2015 ITEMMA that were identified as non-operational which totaled to fourteen (14) and are subject for delisting upon completion of required documents. .

For CY 2016 the ITEMMA was conducted to one hundred thirty six (136) ARBOs in the last quarter. Again the provincial office is still waiting the result from the

Central Office as of this time. It is expected that the result will be included in the next annual reporting.

4. ORGANIZATIONAL PROFILE

For CY 2016, DARPO-Bohol has only seventy-seven (77) authorized plantilla positions, wherein sixty (60) are filled-up and seventeen (17) are un-filled. The personnel strength totaled to one hundred twenty-seven (127) warm bodies comprising sixty-two regular positions and forty-nine co-terminus to the incumbent (CTI).

Human Resource Development

Trainings and development programs were provided by the management to DAR personnel to equip them with the knowledge and skills for the attainment of their tasks. For CY 2016, DARPO Bohol was able to conduct three (3) kinds of computer literacy trainings to all DAR personnel and forty (40) trainings/orientations/briefings on support programs.



Data and information management have played a crucial role towards reflecting the needed information as basis for decision making by the management in the course of implementing a program/ project.

DAR Bohol is maintaining databases namely: EPIs/ CLOAIs which provides information of the data on PD 27 & CARP accomplishment; OPTOOL LAD balances; Legal Cases Monitoring System (LCMS) which monitors the status of case folders. This system enables the Secretary of the Department to monitor the case folders via online and Information Technology Enabled Maturity Assessment (ITEMA)

5. PUBLIC MANAGEMENT

Information plays a vital role to establish and maintain partnership with the key players in the implementation of the Department of Agrarian Reform's Programs. The key players include the agrarian reform beneficiaries, landowners, line agencies, foreign donors, academe, and people's organizations, among others. These stakeholders including the general public deserve to know what the DAR Provincial Office of Bohol has been doing through the years.

DARPO Bohol is also compliant to R.A. 9485 in order to provide quick response to the immediate needs of the clients.

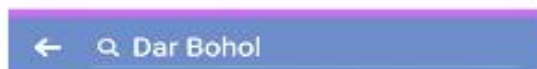

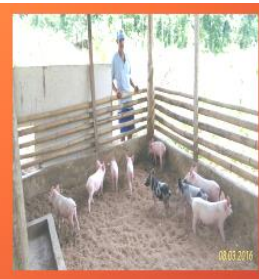

I. HIGHLIGHTS OF 2016 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

1. PROCUREMENT

NFA's palay procurement aims not only to boost its rice inventory, but also to provide farmers a Fair return of their investment should farm prices fall below the government support price of P17.00 per kilogram. Additional incentives include P0.20/kg drying fee, P0.20/kg to P0.50/kg delivery fee and P0.30/kg Cooperative Development Incentive Fee (CDIF). Ex-Farm prices of palay for 2016 ranged from P17.00/kg to P23.00/kg with an average price of P19.54/kg.

2. DISTRIBUTION

A total of 433,892 bags of rice were distributed in 2016 which marked a 94.23% accomplishment of the year's target of 460,000 bags. The smooth inflow of rice stocks to the province has provided an ample supply of stock inventory in all NFA warehouses to ensure regular rice distribution to accredited outlets, as well as the availability of rice during calamities/disasters especially that Bohol was also severely affected by the adverse effects of the El Niño phenomenon.

The total volume distributed during the year consisted of 391,009 bags regular sales to NFA accredited outlets, while 42,883 bags were distributed through the various government agencies and NGOs in support of the relief operations for Boholans affected by calamities which hit the province.

Prices of rice stayed at affordable levels during the year. Retail price of Regular Milled Rice (RMR) averaged at P37.29/kg, Well Milled Rice (WMR) at P39.85/kg, and corngrits at P31.00/kg.

3. INDUSTRY REGULATION

A total of 1, 832 grains businessmen were licensed during the year. The number of licenses exceeded the year's target of 1,824 at 100.44% accomplishment rate. Revenues from our garins license collection reached P2, 302,893.47 with an accomplishment rate of 113.73%.

Currently, Bohol has 252 NFA accredited outlets to ensure availability and visibility of NFA rice in all major markets province wide. Nine (9) non- traditional outlets were

accredited during the year to increase NFAs market presence especially in the provinces remote areas.

This year's industry interrelations consisted of meetings with local farmers through the quarterly conduct of PFAC meetings, farmers' ugnayan, attendance to Sikat Saka Program Implementation meetings, and attendance to cooperative general assemblies coordination meetings with other governments to advocate the agency's programs and activities. On the other hand, the agency also closely coordinated with the grains businessmen through the Grains retailers Confederation (GRECON) Bohol through PGSP reorientation seminar to constantly remind them to abide with the agency's rules and regulations.

NFA also celebrated the National Grains Industry Week (NGIW) and the 44th Anniversary which carried nationwide theme: *"Sa Kahirapan at Hamon ng Panahon, Seguridad sa Pagkain aming Tugon"* which was attended by the Cabinet Secretary Leoncio B. Evasco, Jr. as guest honor. One of the highlight activities was a signature campaign calling for unity among stakeholders to attain genuine food security for the country's poor, small farmers, fisher folks, workers, grains retailers, grain businessmen and food processors.

On enforcement activities, a total of 993 grains businessmen were inspected through regular market monitoring and surveillance resulting to 69 apprehensions. Total amount of collections and fines derived from enforcement totaled to P63, 875.00 for the year.

4. TECHNICAL RESEARCH & DEVELOPMENT

NFA Bohol strictly adheres to its policy of stock quality maintenance and good warehouse keeping. All its stored palay and rice were ensured of quality standards before they were released and distributed to our accredited retailer outlets.

The newly retrofitted biomass furnace located at FLCG II warehouse, Brgy. Katipunan, Carmen enabled the NFA to offer drying services to farmers. This provided an opportunity for the local farmers to avail of the agency's services at a minimal fee. A total of P1, 665.68 bags (83,284 kg) of palay have been dried with collections amounting to P35, 437.55.

Five major projects were undertaken by the office during the year under its Repair Maintenance & Technology (RMT) which include concrete walling/fabrication of steel swing door, canopy and raising of the floor elevation of GID warehouse storage extension. Other RMT's undertaken under the 2015 continuing fund includes retiling and replacement of doors/windows and cabinet of staff house, repainting of FLCG III warehouse in Carmen, and repair of GID warehouse storage extension. The repainting of NFA provincial office has been temporarily suspended while awaiting for the reroofing and improvement project of the said provincial office. The total RMT project cost amounted to P1, 991,230.00.

5. FINANCE

Total expenses incurred by the office this year amounted to P26, 998,362.41. The amount is 0.02% higher compared to 2015's expenses of P26, 449,816.50.

The office managed to maintain its financial portfolio. As of December 31, net income reached P36, 530,692.54 although lower as compared to 2015 net income of P64, 986, 141.05.

6. HUMAN RESOURCE MANGEMENT & MANPOWER DEVELOPMENT

The total personnel complement as of Dec. 31, is 30 employees with the hiring of four (4) additional employees under the plantilla position of Clerk III, Clerk IV, Cash Clerk III and Accounts Analyst. On employee benefits, the office was able to pay all salaries as well as state and corporate benefits on time.

Several trainings and seminars which were NFA sponsored or otherwise were attended by employees during the year.

The newly constructed NFA staff house was formally blessed and inaugurated last March and was attended by the Administrator Renan Dalisay after it was severely affected by the 7.2 magnitude earthquake in 2013. It is formally opened its doors and accepted a total of 67 guests and generated a gross income of P63, 775.00.

7. PUBLIC AFFAIRS

All of NFA's programs and activities were widely disseminated through the print and broadcast media and during various coordination meetings with its stakeholders.

The agency proactively addressed issues and concerns raised by the public through media interviews and consultative meetings with other government agencies to discuss the agency's plans and programs.

I. HIGHLIGHTS OF 2016 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The Cooperative Development Authority (CDA) was created by virtue of a Constitutional mandate particularly found in Sec. 15, Art. XII in the 1987 Constitution which states that, “Congress shall create an agency to promote the viability and growth of cooperatives as instruments of equity, social justice and sustainable economic development”. This paved the way to the enactment of twin laws, R. A. 6938 otherwise known as the Cooperative Code of the Philippines and R.A. 6939, an Act creating the Cooperative Development Authority (CDA).

Several attempts had been made to amend the Cooperative Code of the Philippines (R.A 6938) because of the so-called “gray areas” until finally after a period of almost 5 Congresses to amend the old Code, former Pres. Gloria M. Arroyo signed into law last February 17, 2009 the Philippine Cooperative Code of 2008 or R.A. 9520. The passage was so timely in respond to the new needs of the sector nationwide. This is a landmark legislation to reinforce and empower cooperatives as we gear towards progress and development. While it strengthened and vitalize the coop base, it is a shield against these trying times and help mitigate the adverse impacts of the present crisis.

CDA as a regulatory body envisioned to be an effective and efficient regulatory agency working towards the development of viable, sustainable, socially responsive and globally competitive cooperatives. While it endeavors to accomplish its mission of ensuring safe and sound operation of cooperatives, it also lives up to its Core Values of Excellence, Commitment, Integrity and Teamwork (EXCITE).

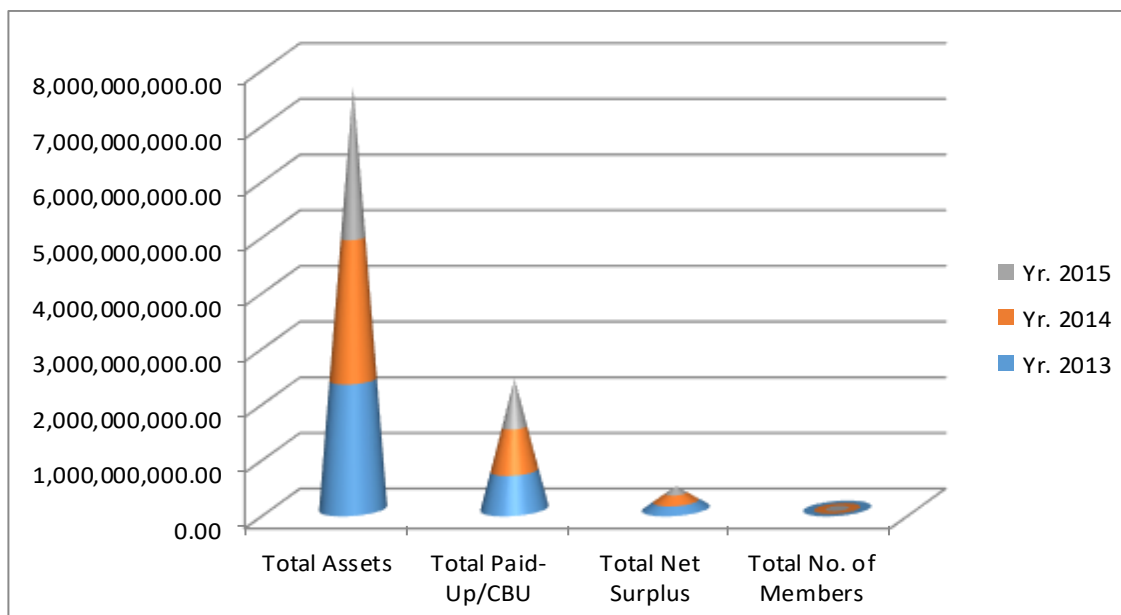

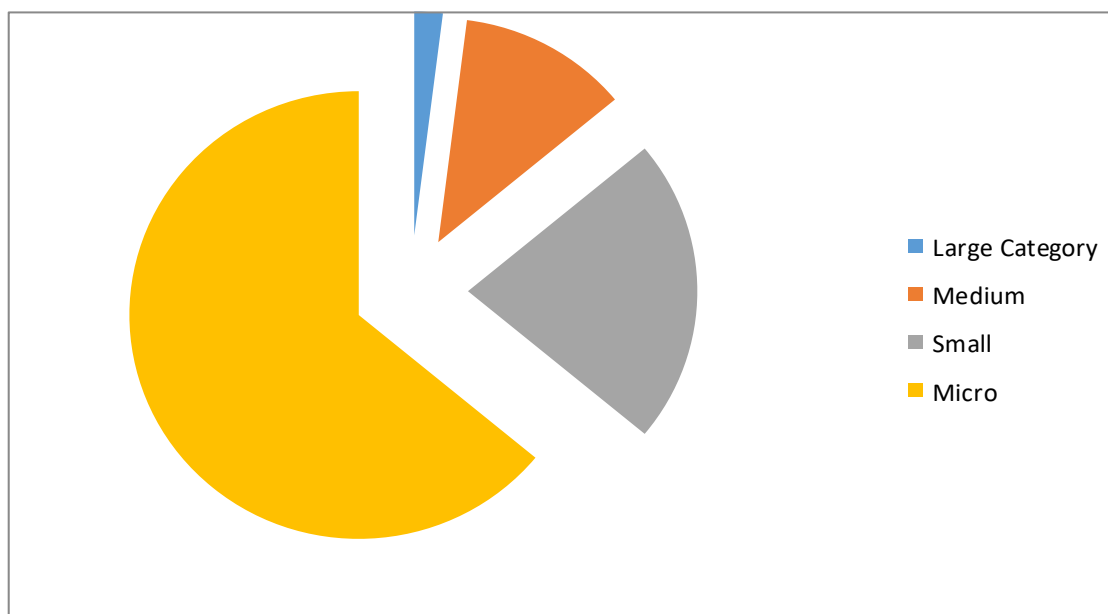

E. PCDC and CDA in action



The 3-point agenda focuses more on registration and regulatory function such as improved registration by using electronic means as well as enhanced policy guidelines, rules and regulations. Its main program is to conduct coop inspection and exit conference to all operating and even to non-operating cooperatives to ensure safe and sound operation. As part of regulation, the agency is also tasked to monitor and enforce coop compliance by means of collecting the mandatory reports submitted by coops as required under Art. 53 of R. A 9520.

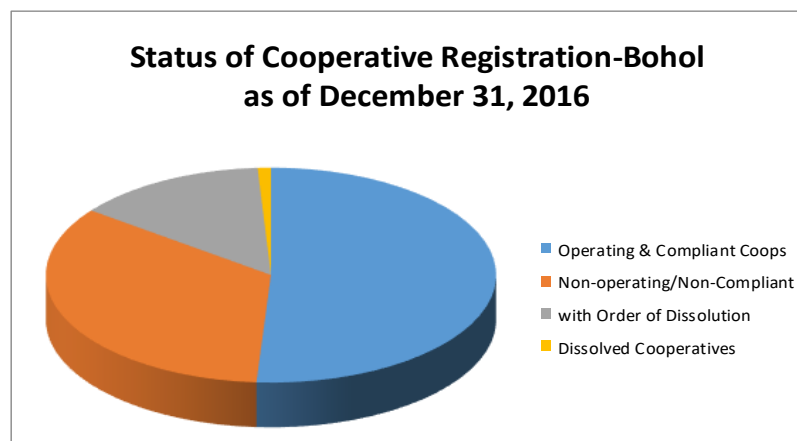
Equity-oriented development centers on regulation and development of cooperatives with the conviction that regulation should be viewed and appreciated as part of progress and development of coops. The mandatory trainings to be attended by all officers of the cooperatives capacitate them to become effective and efficient leaders of the organization. Because of the widespread clamor to reduce the number of trainings with the corresponding number of hours, a new Memo Circular had been issued so that for Micro Cooperatives or those coops with total assets of 3M and below, the officers shall only

required to attend two (2) mandatory trainings such as Basic Cooperative Course and Cooperative Management and Governance equivalent to 8 number of hours for each course. Officers of Small, Medium and Large Coops shall undergo the same subject matter or courses with 16 hours of each course plus the following mandatory trainings when the coop has a total deposit liabilities of 5M and above, to wit:

1. Financial Management;
2. Credit Management; and
3. Risk Management.

Hence, CDA-Bohol Field Office noted a total of 631 newly and re-registered cooperatives as of December 31, 2016. Of this number, 322 or 51% are operating/compliant coops and 216 or 34% are categorized as non-operating/non-compliant coops. CDA shall categorized cooperatives based on their compliance with the administrative requirements of the law. They shall be considered operating coops once they shall comply with the submission of the five (5) mandatory reports to the authority as provided for under Art. 53 of R.A 9520. While coops shall be classified as non-operating/non-compliant once they failed to submit the mandatory reports for a period of at least two (2) years from registration/ re-registration.

About 14% or 87 coops have already been issued with the dissolution order or in the process of dissolution and there are about 6 or 1% which are dissolved cooperatives as of December 31, 2016.

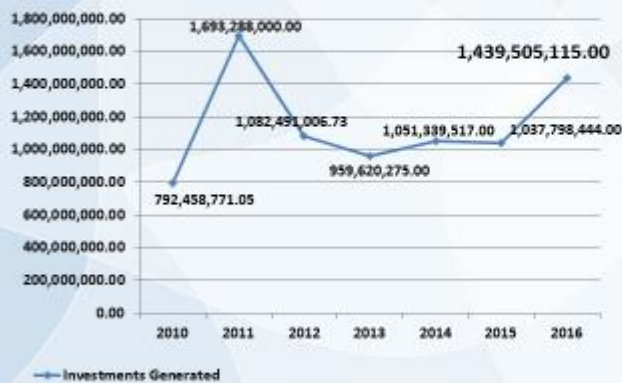
Making business, Creating jobs

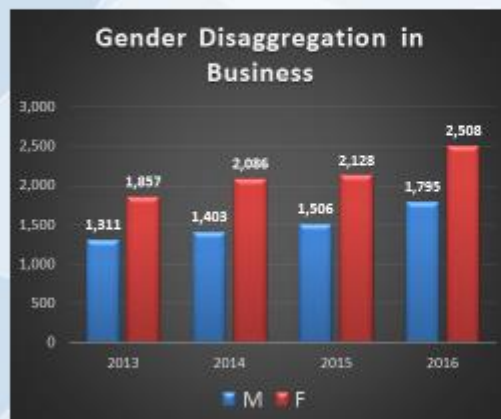

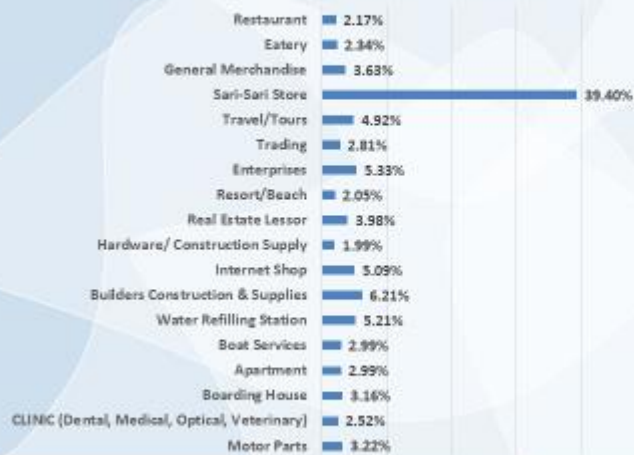

Housing projects for 2014- 2015 that added some 1, 500 new housing units by major subdivision, condotel and resort developers reported investment costs totalling PhP 1.7 Billion.

Retail business investments thru the Alturas Mall and Galleria Luisa Mall cost PhP 650 Million.

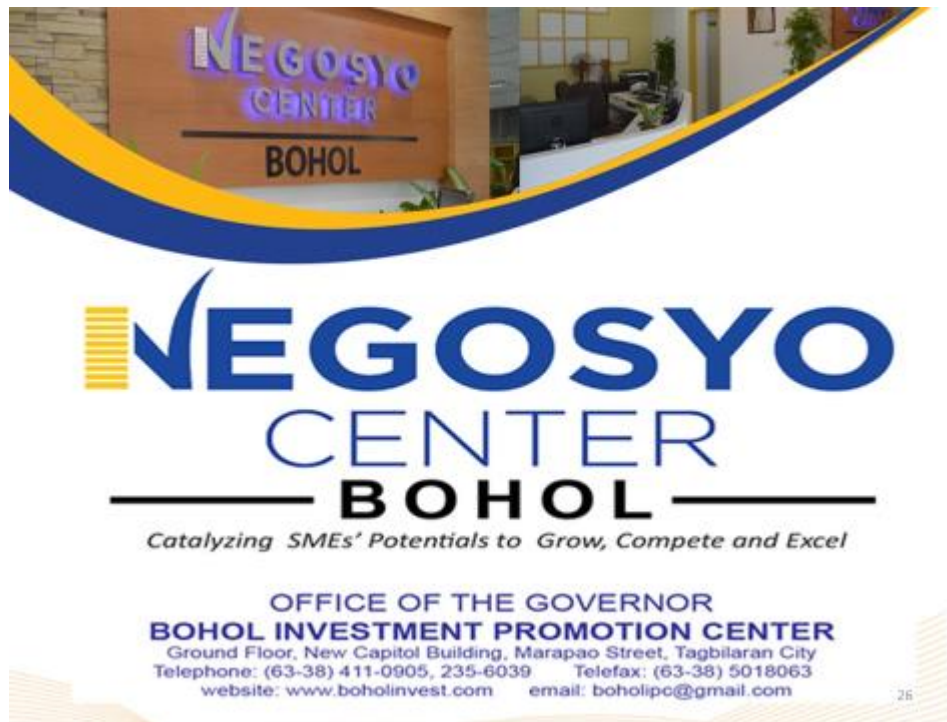

Figure 1. SPES Beneficiaries, DOLE Bohol January 1 to December 31, 2016

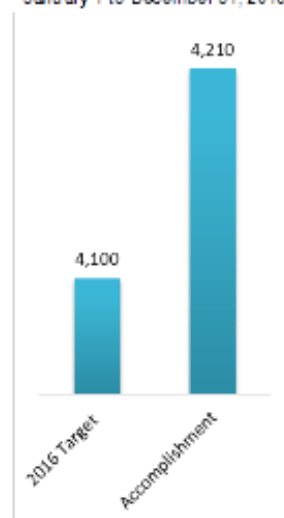


Figure 1 shows that DOLE 7 helped 4,210 Boholano students in 2016 through the Special Program for Employment of Students (SPES).

SPES is a program created under Republic Act 7323, series of 1999, as amended by Republic Act 9547 which seeks to encourage employment to poor but deserving students during summer or year-round. DOLE shoulders the 40 percent of the salaries and the partner employers (Government Agencies and Private Sector) will pay for the remaining 60 percent.

Government Internship Program (GIP)

GIP provides 3-6 month internship opportunity to high school, vocational, and college graduates. Salary is 75% of the existing minimum wage applicable in the area where the agency is located.

Figure 2. GIP Beneficiaries, DOLE Bohol

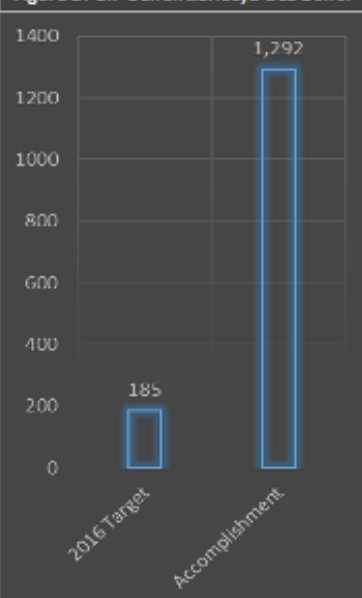


Figure 2 presents that DOLE Bohol had a total of 1,292 Government interns or 698.38 % accomplishment rate over 185, the annual target.

Labor Market Information (LM)

The DOLE Bohol strived to reach as many Boholanos as possible. This was to share about the timely and accurate signals on the current labor market by developing client specific labor market information, education and communication (IEC) materials. 4 office were made possible through the convergence of Government Agencies and Private Organizations throughout the province. It is evident that the office surpassed its targets on Labor Market Information as shown above.

Public Employment Service Office (PESO and Job Fairs)



The Department of Labor and Employment Bohol Field Office with its partners in the Government and Private Sectors conducted six (6) local and overseas job fairs.

With over seventy (70) establishments, 207 jobseekers were Hired-On-The-Spot (HOTS) from 1,880 registered applicants during the job fairs. There were 27, 594 job vacancies posted.

A total of 47,479 qualified applicants were referred for placement in 2016.

Institutionalized PESOs

Once again, another Public Employment Service Office (PESO) was institutionalized in Bohol. The objective of such institutionalization is to strengthen project financial concerns and employment facilitation in the LGU.

The DOLE Bohol strived to reach as many Boholanos as possible. This was to share about the timely and accurate signals on the current labor market by developing client specific labor market information, education and communication (IEC) materials. The office were made possible through the convergence of Government Agencies and Private Organizations throughout the province. It is evident that the office surpassed its targets on Labor Market Information as shown above.

MFO2-Employment Facilitation and Capacity Building

Skills Registry System (SRS) and Phil-JobNet



The Skills Registry System (SRS) orientations were done to fifteen (15) LGUs in Bohol. The implementation of SRS on LGUs who conducted the orientations is set this 2017.

LGUs will register their jobseekers to the system. The information the employers can view include the skills and educational background, among others. SRS is connected to PhilJobnet, the government's online job portal accessible to jobseekers, recruitment agencies, and local and foreign employers.

Career Guidance and Advocacy Program (CGAP)

Just last year, the Bohol Career Advocates Network (BoholCAN) was organized. In 2017, the DOLE Bohol with its partners conducted seventy-two (72) employment coaching activities to a total of 41,551 High School students.



JobStart

The JobStart Program was successfully implemented in the province and helped two hundred twenty-two (222) hopeful jobseekers.

This program gave big job opportunities to 18-24 year olds, jobseekers with zero to less than one year work experience, currently unemployed or not in training, and at least high school graduate.

Bohol surpassed its target of helping 200 jobseekers. This accomplishment were made through the two JobStart Rollouts in 2016 alone.

The Department of Labor and Employment Region VII is also preparing to fully implement the program. During the first rollout, the program was coordinated by Scopeglobal, specialist project management company. The DOLE Bohol Field Office is now undergoing transitional period with Scopeglobal's JobStart Coordinator Corina Ann Alicando.



DOLE Integrated Livelihood and Emergency Employment Program (DILEEP)



DOLE Bohol Field Office facilitated the release of P 21,080,270.25 to 24 Rural Workers Associations (RWAs) benefitting 2,243 Boholanos. This program provided them with Flat Bed Dryer, Hog Fattening Project, Meat Processing Project, Native Chicken Production, Farm Equipments, Organic Vegetable Production, Motorcycle Spare parts, and Vulcanizing Shop, among others.

Tulong Pangkabuhayan sa Ating Disadvantaged workers (TUPAD)

TUPAD Program had provided job opportunities to the victims of El Niño. With a budget of 11.9-M, 1,324 residents were given the chance to earn minimum wage of P 310.00 in exchange of engaging in community projects for 15 days. They were also given insurance premiums and Personal Protective Equipments (PPEs).



MFO3– Labor Force Welfare Services

Labor and Employment Education Services (LEES)

The field office strengthened its implementation of Labor and Employment Education Services (LEES) in 2016. Twenty (20) Labor Relations, Human Relations, and Productivity (LHP) seminars were conducted and four hundred (400) workers and employers were reached. General Labor Standards (GLS), work efficiency, and Human Resource pitfalls were just few of the topics discussed.



Moreover, there were forty-six (46) Continuing Labor Education Seminars (CLES) were made covering five hundred seventeen (517) companies in Bohol. These seminars also include special topics related to employment.

Labor Education for Graduating Students (LEGS) is also under LEES. This service is given to graduating college students. They are presented with Labor Market Information and tips in job hunting. 4,335 students were reached in 2016.



Child Labor Prevention and Elimination Program (CLPEP)

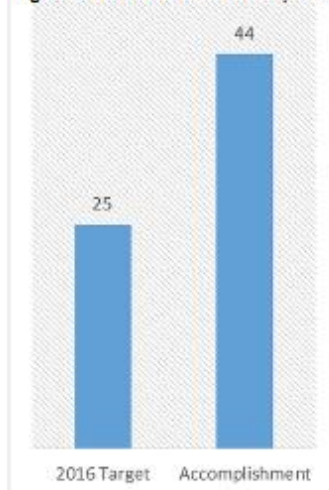

Tripartism



The Bohol Tripartite Industrial Peace Council (Bohol- TIPC) led by Tagbilaran City Mayor John Geesnell Yap, II. It is a body represented by Government, Labor, and Management Sectors.

The council actively supported the activities of DOLE throughout the years, specifically the Labor Day Celebration. In fact, two (2) more TIPC's were established at LGU-Ubay and LGU-Talibon in 2016.

Family Welfare Services

The Family Welfare Program aims to introduce the concept of addressing the welfare of the employees and their family to attain industrial peace at the workplace.

In 2016, 6,636 workers were serviced with the program from 9 establishments in Bohol.

MFO4– Employment Regulation Program

Single Entry Approach (SEnA)

The Department settle workplace disputes through the Single Entry Approach (SEnA) Program. This aims for the conciliation of both employers and employees.

The Single Entry Approach Desk Officers in Bohol disposed 100% of the 210 filed complaints. Out of the 210 complaints, 197 workers were restituted with a total amount of P4,236,749.10 in 2016 alone.



Labor Laws Compliance System (LLCS)

Under the Labor Laws Compliance System (LLCS), a total of six hundred fifty-one (651) establishments were assessed by the four Labor Laws Compliance Officers (LLCOs) of DOLE Bohol in 2016.

The said establishments were assessed of their compliance of the General Labor Standard (GLS) and Occupational Safety and Health (OSH).

2016 HIGHLIGHTS



Gov. Chatto lauds DOLE in his SOPA Department of Labor and Employment's programs in the province of Bohol were deeply appreciated by Governor Edgar M. Chatto as what he mentioned in his State of the Province Address (SOPA) successfully held last February 26, 2016.

He mentioned in his hour-long message that the sustained partnership of Bohol LGU and DOLE lead to the provision assistive devices for Persons with Disabilities (PWDs) and even attended the launching of the Assembly Center. The Bohol Federation of Persons with Disabilities which was the recipient was also a beneficiary of the department for the past years. Gov. Chatto also showcased the 10 Local job fairs and Overseas Job Fairs and 67 Special Recruitment Activities. A total of 6,467 applicants registered and 2,608 applicants were hired. These were duly organized and facilitated by the Bohol Employment and Placement Office (Provincial PESO) led by OIC Vilma Yorong. 4,250 applicants were also registered to the Bohol Skills Registry System (BSRS) and 4,523 applicants were registered to PhilJobNet. Moreover, a total of 11,922 students attended the Pre-Employment Orientation Seminars (PEOS) in 2015.

Since 2013 up to last year, with a close partnership with the Department of Labor and Employment the Provincial Government generated 24,579 jobs in total.



DOLE extends 11.9M assistance to 1,324 El Niño affected Boholano's

El Niño has extremely affected the country and displaced agricultural workers. With the financial assistance of the Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE) and the technical support of the National Irrigation Administration-Region 7 in identifying the beneficiaries the Emergency Employment Program was materialized.

In the Province of Bohol, there are 1,324 farm workers who benefited the program. They came from the towns of Ubay, Trinidad, San Miguel, Dagohoy, Pilar, Sierra Bullores, Alicia, Carmen, Bilar, Talibon, and Loboc.

With DOLE's Tulong Panghanapbuhay sa Ating Disadvantaged workers (TUPAD), the identified workers will render community work which focused on irrigation of canals and canal desilting and clearing in the thirty (30)-day emergency employment.

The budget of 11.9-M allocated by DOLE would shoulder not only the salaries and wages of beneficiaries but also their group accident insurance, personal protective equipment (PPEs), and orientation on safety and health before they would start working.

For Bohol beneficiaries' insurance premiums and PPEs, the DOLE set aside P 398,524.00. For the wages alone, the Department spend P11,518,800.00.



DOLE and Bohol Provincial Gov't Capacitates 2.4K Graduating Students
The Department of Labor and Employment-Bohol Field Office in convergence with the Provincial Government through its Bohol Employment and Placement Office intensified its program on Labor Education for Graduating Students (LEGS). With the said partnership, a Pre-Employment Orientation Seminar was conducted and reached 2,496 students from 15 different schools on February 4, 2016 held at Bohol Cultural Center, Tagbilaran City. Speakers from different sectors were invited to inspire hopeful students before they join the labor force. DOLE Bohol OIC German A. Guidaben represented by Mr. Victorico Nemenzo shared about the legal aspects and employment prospects in the labor market. Mr. Kim Chua of Jobs180 (a start-up job portal site) conferred about resume link and proper grooming of the jobseekers.

Pre-Employment Orientation Seminar is one of the many strategies provided by the Government to cater millions of graduating students. In Bohol, the Provincial Government engaged with the Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE), Department of Education (DepED), and (TESDA) and the business sector in preparing the fresh graduates of the province as they seek for gainful employment inside and out of the country.

DOLE Bohol was able to reach only 2,508 individuals under LEGS for the whole year of 2015. Furthermore, it is very evident that in 2016 the Bohol Field office will exceed last year's accomplishment with the help of its partners from different sectors.

2016 HIGHLIGHTS



DOLE amplifies laws on employing foreigners

The Department of Labor and Employment-Bohol Field Office gathered all establishments in Bohol employing foreign nationals and all other establishments planning for a specialized learning session at J's Seafood Village, Tagbilaran City on September 17, 2016.

OIC German A. Guidaben of DOLE Bohol gave some points on DOLE D.O. No. 146-16 or the "Revised Rules for the Issuance of Employment Permits for Foreign Nationals (FN)".

Around 40 establishments and 55 individuals participated the learning session. An open forum was also made which was actively led by OIC Guidaben and AEP Focal Person Victorico Nemenzo.

DOLE Bohol launches 2 new TIPCs

The Department of Labor and Employment-Bohol Field Office (DOLE-BFO) is on the move to promote industrial peace through establishing more Tripartite Industrial Peace Councils (TIPCs) at developing towns in the province like LGU-Ubay and LGU-Talibon. The Tripartite Industrial Peace Council is a mechanism to promote industrial peace. Furthermore, the places with growing economy require speedy disposition of labor disputes. After the orientation, they elected their officers. The BOD was represented by both labor and management sectors.



Boholanos benefited 23.5-M in livelihood grants from DOLE

Provision of flatbed dryers and other farm equipment. Hog Fattening. Native Chicken Production. Food Processing. Selling of motorcycle spare parts. Maintenance of vulcanizing shops.

Said projects were just a few of the economic undertakings supported and afforded by the Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE) Bohol Field Office to the Boholanos in 2016 under the Department's DOLE Integrated Livelihood Emergency and Bottoms-Up Budgeting (BuB).

DOLE Bohol office facilitated the release of livelihood grants amounting to P 23,557,330.25 benefiting a total of 2,493 workers in the disadvantaged and vulnerable sector.

DOLE optimistic on NPA Returnees' livelihood plans

About 60 New People's Army (NPA) Returnees were inspired by DOLE Bohol OIC German A. Guidaben to pursue creating livelihood projects in their community-level at Camp Rajah Sikatuna, Carmen, Bohol.

The event was organized by the Provincial Government led by Gov. Edgar M. Chatto.

The returnees were more than happy to give their suggestions, such as organic gardening, native chicken raising, and rice mill. They also said that once they organize themselves they will decide on the project proposal.



Jagna, Bohol showcases DOLE Assisted Livelihood Projects

Jagna, Bohol, Philippines. The economic activity at Jagna had catapulted over the years and alongside its success were the micro-entrepreneurs who actively promoted Jagna's culture and quality products.

The Department of Labor and Employment had always supported the livelihood projects of Jagna which are mostly based on food processing. In fact, DOLE-assisted projects in the said municipality were always featured or nominated to represent Bohol and even Region 7 on awarding or recognition ceremonies organized by DOLE.

During the Tabo sa Jagna, various associations were invited to exhibit their products with other commercial and agricultural exhibitors. Associations within the municipality showcased their Calamay, Salabat, Polvoron, Tableya, Longganisa, chips, cookies, and noodles among others. With customers from different places, the said associations did not just show and promote what they've got but they were also able to earn money.

Bohol celebrates Labor Day 2016

The Department Labor and Employment-Bohol Field Office with the Bohol Tripartite Industrial Peace Council (Bohol-TIPC), labor unions, company representatives, Rural Workers Association (RWAs), and National Government Agencies representatives celebrate the Labor Day together at May 1, 2016.

In line with this, different establishments and organizations joined the motorcade with their banners which showed the official logo design given by the DOLE central

office. The convoy drove along the Carlos P. Garcia Avenue to Galleria Luisa.

When they arrived, a holy mass was celebrated with Fr. Ruel F. Lero, SVD. Bohol TIPC officers coordinated for the mass.

Bohol Governor Edgardo M. Chatto graced the celebration and commended the efforts of the Boholano workers who in their own ways contributed to the development of the province. Mr. Isabelito Tongco of the Provincial Government also joined and gave a brief message.

Tagbilaran City Mayor John Geesnell L. Yap, II stated in his speech that Labor Day represent

the hard-earned rights and privileges of the labor force. Furthermore, he led the induction of officers of the Panaghiusa sa mga Gagmayng Magpangayon sa Tagbilaran (PagMaTa) which is a DOLE registered People's Organization (PO).

DOLE Bohol OIC German A. Guidaben lauded the Tagbilaran City Government for institutionalizing all of its barangays. With this, the monitoring of DOLE programs will be easier such as (SPES), (GIP), (DILEEP), (TUPAD), among others.

DOLE Bohol Staff entertained the participants with an acoustic session. Door prizes were also given to the raffle draw winners. The grand prize was an overnight stay in one of the best resorts in Bohol.

The Labor Day Celebration 2016 in Bohol was a simple but indeed a meaningful event. On that day, six (6) labor unions and 31 private establishments joined. The Bohol Association of PESO Managers (BAPESOM) and the Bohol Occupational Safety and Health Network, Inc. (BOSHNet, Inc.) also took part in the event. Moreover, the Panglao Masseuse and Vendors Association (PMVA) actively joined the

JobStart hailed a success in Bohol

JobStart is a partnership program of the DOLE, Asian Development Bank (ADB), and the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA).

The program helped a total of two hundred twenty-two (222) young hopefuls Boholanos throughout the two rollouts of the program in just one year.

JobStart reached out to 18 to 24 year olds with zero to one year work experience. High School, Vocational Course, and College graduates were accepted.

The first batch of identified beneficiaries or JobStarters had already ended their 6-month journey under the program and most of them were absorbed by the

I. HIGHLIGHTS OF 2016 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

• CORE FUNCTION 1: TOURISM DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

- A. Enhancement of the Bohol Ecotourism Program Circuits with PGBh-CSO partners to meet global standards and attract visitors

In its program to further enhance Bohol's Ecotourism Program Circuits, the office has targeted the Bohol Surprise Tour 3 with its five stops as its starting point. One monitoring tool has been created and 17 actual surveys conducted; along with three batches of trainings on *Customer Service Improvement, Physical Improvement, Hygienic & Sanitary Workplace, Alternative Activities in Unforeseen, Possibilities: Economic Activities, Ecotourism Appreciation*.

- B. Fiesta Tour - Conduct preparatory/ coordination meetings/ evaluation

Three coordination/ preparatory meetings has been facilitated by the office. The municipalities of Jagna, Sikatuna, Catigbian and city of Tagbilaran have been identified as tour destination. A dry-run has been done in Sikutana's fiesta together with the invited media.

- C. Tourism Product Planning Orientation/ Training for MTO's/ MPDC

During the fourth quarter of 2016, a Planning and Product Development Training has been facilitated, October 27 at Panda Tea Garden Suites. The training was not expedited earlier since the country had its national elections in May. Newly appointed tourism officers and planning and development officers were able to participate. The provincial tourism office was able to invite Ms. Gelina D. Asis from the regional office in Cebu. A benchmarking activity was then accomplished the following day on October 28 at the E.A.T. Danao Adventure Park. Participants and the BTO staff were welcomed by the Hon. Mayor Natividad Gonzaga. LGU Danao has been chosen, since its recovery and restoration programs is in progress after the 7.2 earthquake in 2013.

D. Geographical sites Information Development-Marker designing.

A unified "marker-design" has been proposed and considered to LGU's with geological sites. A miniature model has been produced with specifications in coordination with the Department of Trade and Industry and FabLab. This year 2017, the office is eyeing to carry out the proposal to the Sangguniang Panlalawigan to issue an ordinance for the implementation of the said project.

E. Tourism Summit Output Monitoring.

Out of the seven sectors, the cultural sector has been monitored. This was done in coordination with the Center for Culture and the Arts Development office of the province.

F. Tourist Drivers' Training

Two trainings among tourist transport drivers (van for hire) has been conducted. 80 DOT accredited tourist transport drivers were able to participate. Workshop held on **September 28 and 29 at Reyna's.**

G. Administer Bohol Tourism (Ecotour) Website (www.boholtourismph.com)

Constant updating of the office's official website is done. 85% completeness has been achieved as of 2016. The website www.boholtourismph.com was installed February in the same year at the cost of PHP 32,065.93 in collaboration with JICA Philippines.

H. Joint Task Force Tourism Security Monitoring

Together with the AFP and Bohol Tourist Police, the Task Group TURISTA, which the office is a member, four comprehensive tourism safety awareness workshops have been completed in the

municipalities of Jagna on March, Baclayon on April, and Tagbilaran on November as well as December.

I. Tourism data collection from accommodation establishments and LGU's.

The tourism database is monthly and yearly updated. Tourism data collection is being streamlined from the accommodation establishments in 32 LGU's identified as tourism areas in the province. As of November 2016, we have recorded a total of 820, 640 domestic and foreign tourist arrivals. In 2015, we had a total of 602, 257 tourist arrivals. All these are consolidated and validated data by the provincial and regional tourism offices.

As of December 2016, there are 360 registered accommodation establishments; 6370 numbers of rooms available. In terms of areas with major tourist attractions, there are 31 LGU's and a total 429 tourist attractions.

Ancillary tourism facilities encompass tourist transport services, tour guides, accommodation establishments, travel agencies, and restaurants. Thirty tourist transport services, 34 tour guides, 44 accommodation establishments, 15 travel agencies - all are accredited by the DOT.

For the year 2016, the office has supported several tourist attractions in these LGU's - Jagna, Alicia, Loon, Albur, Batuan, Maribojoc, Loay, Anda, Antequera, Bilar, Tubigon, Calape, Candijay, Mabini, Danao, Sevilla, Sikatuna, Dimiao, Talibon, Ubay, Loboc, Corella, Carmen, and Balilihan.

J. Recognition for compliance (Outstanding LGUs/ MTOs & Accommodation Establishments).

Nine entities have been awarded for their dedication in the industry. The municipalities of Dauis and Talibon along with the city of Tagbilaran were recognized. Each LGU's respective tourism officers have been acknowledged - Ms. Shobel Ligalig, Mr. Christopher Nistal and Ms. Rachel Sayson. Distinguished accommodation facilities were the Belian Hotel, Bohol Bee Farm and Berachah Inland Resort.

K. Evaluate service/s of trained tourism- services providers.

Tourist satisfaction and exit surveys are being facilitated by the office. Three satisfaction surveys in the Alona area, airport and seaport were done last May 25 to 27. Three exit surveys were done in major ports of entries, as well.

L. Technical/Secretariat services provided to Provincial Tourism Council (PTC), Sandugo Foundation and other tourism related bodies (Jan-Dec).

Among the major activities that the office has organized in 2016 were the annual Sandugo Festival and the province's participation in the Philippine Travel Mart.

Last year's Sandugo highlights were the Bangga sa Kuradang ug Subli sa Sandugo, and the Tigum Bol-anon Tibuok Pilipinas (TBTP). As secretariat, a total of 7,451,239.80 were raised for the event to be realized.



In the area of travel fairs, the province was able to participate in one national and another international travel fair.



The ASEAN Tourism Forum held in Manila on January 18 to 25 last year stirred the public and its coordinating private sector to further level up the standards of Bohol's tourism industry.

Ten local government units and private accommodation establishments participated in the ATF along with the provincial government. Among them were Tagbilaran, Anda, Danao, Bohol Beach Club, South Palms, Bellevue, Bluewater, BE Grand and Panglao Island Nature Resort.

The Philippine Travel Mart generated 1.4 million of sales for the Bohol booth. The involvement and synchronization of both public and private sectors boosted up the sales. The participants were, Tagbilaran, Panglao, Danao, Loboc, Chocolate Hills Adventure Park, BOFETTO, Belian Hotel, Sweet Home Boutique Hotel, Philippine Fun Divers', Rio Verde Floating Tours, Bohol Tarsier Foundation, Alona Tropical Beach Resort, Flushing Meadows, Bohol Sunside, Bellevue Bohol, Loboc River Resort, Ramyer Travel & Tours, and the Loboc Floating Resto Operators.

- **CORE FUNCTION 2: MARKETING AND PROMOTIONS**

M. The Ultimate Eco-Adventure Hunt (Bohol Passport)

In its unceasing drive to promote Bohol, the office together with the Provincial Tourism Council has conceptualized the Bohol Passport. A promotional material patterned as a traveler's handbook (passport) with the popular sites in the province. These will be distributed among travel agencies to entice tourists to maximize and completely visit the sites involved. Prizes and incentives will be given. As of 2016, the office has



produced 5,000 copies and launching of the material is set this year 2017.

N. Media Features/ Familiarization Tour Exposures

Out of the six media targets for 2016, the office has assisted 23 media outlets for Bohol features.



Other groups assisted were the ATF Visayan Charm, Ritchi Zamora, Hungarian writer, AirAsia Sonline-influencers, Toots & Mimi Jimenez, Sandugo Media Group, Sandier Pastures, windowseat.ph, and Janelle Almosora.

The office has also been assisting cruise ship arrivals in 2016. Three cruise ships have visited Bohol, namely, Caledonian Sky with 188 pax who went on a tour; M/S Hanseatic Cruise with 294 pax who went on tour; and M/S Pacific Venus with 500 pax who also went on tour.

O. Production of Tourism collaterals (Bohol brochures, maps & video of BTO programs)

In addition to media features, marketing collaterals were also produced. Forty thousand flyers in four categories, namely— adventure; nature and wildlife; culture and heritage; food, arts and crafts. Another 10,000 printed collaterals are Bohol maps.



Tokens have also been produced. These are 800 pieces of ref magnets given to guests and media personnel.

P. Culture of Tourism Enhancement

Social media as the easiest and widest area for promotions— also contains the biggest market of tourism at present. Last November, the office in partnership with the Holy Name University Tourism students AirAsia and other members of the private sector organized a Netizen's Convention last September 27. It's them, "Building Successful Relationship between Tourism and Media."

Participants were students as well as the different tourism stakeholders in the industry. AirAsia provided speakers such as bloggers, photographers, and online influencers for the input.

This was a whole day event at the Bohol Cultural Center participated by 560 people.

Q. Seaport / Airport Information Counter improvement

A. SITUATIONAL ANALYSIS, CY 2016

DOST-BOHOL PSTC's programs and Projects for 2016 were anchored on the Province's clear vision (eco-cultural tourism, agro-industrialization and light manufacturing) and the encompassing mission service slogan LIFE HELPS – *Livelihood and Tourism, Infrastructure, Food, Education and Technology, Health, Environment, Leadership Development, Peace and Order and Sports and Youth Development*.

Furthermore, DOST programs and projects are to support the InSPIRED (*Infrastructure, Social Well-being & Shelter, Peace and Order, Interconnectivity, Reforms in Governance, Equitable Economic Growth with Environmental Sustainability, Disaster Risk Reduction & Management-Climate Change Adaptation*) HEAT (*Health & Sanitation, Education & Skills Development, Agriculture and Food Security, Tourism and Livelihood*) – IT (Information Technology) the enduring advocacy towards poverty reduction of the present administration under the leadership of Governor Edgar M. Chatto and Vice-Governor Dionisio D. Balite.

As an offshoot of the Science and Technology Master Plan and as a response to the present administrations' Medium Term Development Plan, DOST has implemented as a banner program the Small Enterprise Technology Upgrading Program or SETUP which is also in line with the above-stated vision of the province. Priority areas under this program are food processing, furniture, GDH (gifts, decors and handicrafts), agriculture/marine/aquaculture/forestry/livestock, metals and engineering ICT, Health and Wellness Products, Halal Products and Services and other regional industry priorities -- all supportive of the said vision.

With the continuing trend of positive growth in the tourism industry as manifested in the increasing tourists' arrivals in the province, opportunities in developing *pasalubong* items are still having great potentials. Thus, for 2016, the situation still calls for projects that will upgrade our *pasalubong* item producers (food and GTH) both the production facilities and the quality of their products.

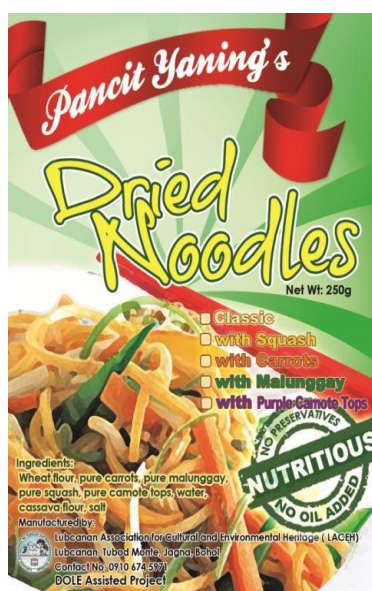
For this year, though firm level assistance is still on-going, focus is already being shifted to community-based projects for greater impacts. The implementation of the Community Empowerment through Science and Technology (CEST) is already ongoing. This Program has five components: (1) Livelihood Development; (2) Health and Nutrition; (3) Water and Sanitation; (4) S & T Education; and (5) Disaster Preparedness and Hazard Mitigation. Implementation of this program shall be through participatory approach.

I. HIGHLIGHTS OF 2016 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

• TECHNOLOGY TRANSFER AND COMMERCIALIZATION - SMALL ENTERPRISE TECHNOLOGY UPGRADING (SETUP) PROGRAM

A. Packaging and Labeling Services

To enhance the existing food products with potentials as *pasalubong* items DOST-Bohol has assisted 25 firms in designing and or enhancing their existing packaging as well as product analysis for nutrition labeling providing to them 49 packaging and labeling related services.

A total of **thirty one (31)** local firms were subjected to training on Food Safety and current Good Operating/ Manufacturing Practices.

C. Technology Training

For the year 2016, Bohol PSTC conducted 40 technology trainings participated by 801 trainees from 405 firms. The trainings include technologies related with the following: food processing, horticulture and agriculture, among others.

D. Innovation System Support

This intervention is a package of assistance that may include plant layout improvement, equipment upgrading, product development and enhancement, skills upgrading and consultancy services. Equipment acquired under this program is on a rent-to-own scheme.

For 2016, **eleven (11)** clients were added among the previous beneficiaries bringing the total number to **70** firms with a total assistance amounting to **P 41,935,547.00**.

E. Special Projects (Under the DOST7-Regional Grant-in-Aid Program)

E.1. Establishment of Science & Technology Craft Village to Empower Women in the Countryside (P895, 000.00)

This is collaboration between DOST 7 and Participatory Research, Organization of Communities and Education towards Struggle for Self-reliance (PROCESS) – Bohol, Inc. with an objective to establish and operationalize a craft village empowering women in the country side through science and technology. The target area is Pinayagan Sur, Tubigon, Bohol considering that several craftspeople are women who are involved in the production of handicrafts mostly out of natural fibers, bamboo, wood and other locally available materials.

F. Project NOAH (Nationwide Operational Assessment of Hazards)

The Nationwide Operational Assessment of Hazards (NOAH) program team will collaborate with government agencies to promote and integrate advanced science and technology to enhance disaster management and prevention capacity of the Philippine government. These include: the deployment of instruments and state-of-the-art methods to construct high resolution hazard maps that are relevant to the community and local government units; delivery of readily accessible, timely and accurate hazards information through various media and communication platforms; disaster research and development; integration of disaster efforts by the national government, academe and civil society organizations; and application of a bottom-up approach by communities to resilience against disasters.

This project aims to assure homeland security by reducing casualties and property loss from extreme hazard events and build disaster resilient communities in the Philippines by way of establishing research and development platforms and the promotion of frontier science and technology in disaster efforts and to become a world leader in

programs that leverage on advanced science and technology to mitigate the impacts of natural hazards.

As of the present, seventeen (17) Automated Rain Gauge (ARG), seven (7) Water Level Monitoring System (WLMS) and two (2) TDM (combination of ARG and WLMS) were installed in different municipalities here in Bohol.

G. Science & Technology Academic Research Based Openly-Operated Kiosks (STARBOOKs)

The Science & Technology Academic Research Based Openly-Operated Kiosks (STARBOOKs) is the Philippines' first digital science library. It contains hundreds of thousands of digitized science and technology resources in various formats and serves as information access portals in key areas in the Philippines.

The objective of this project is to maximize the use of S&T materials maintained at the DOST -Science and Technology Information Institute library by making them available to the general public.

Environment Management Sector EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Sustainable management of the environment is the right response to the present state of the different life support systems. Generally, our forest ecosystem, either in the upland or lowland, has succumbed to so much human pressure that other related ecosystems are also on the verge of collapsing. Others do not care about the importance of the existence of a tree, and our environment. We care and feel bad about having typhoons and flooding. We even hate the fact of water shortage in our homes. Yet, we do not know and understand the real causes and what we have contributed to these effects.

In the realm of achieving a bright future for the human race, the convergence of various social entities is a way to have it. Despite limitations, heightened consciousness and concerted involvement of the people especially in the hinterlands would bring about the realization of a sustainable forest management. It will not only be a dream but a future tasked to have it become a reality.

The updated development framework of **Provincial Government of Bohol**, Environment occupies a very special place. In fact, it is at the very top – our sustainable development call is for a “Green Bohol”. In addition to this, Provincial Government of Bohol (PGBh) is redefining the environment management to integrate Disaster Risk Reduction and Management, as well as Climate Change Adaptation (DRRM-CCA). The province is already implementing DRRM trainings throughout a cross-section of Boholano communities down to the *purok* level. Institutionalization of the Provincial Disaster Risk Reduction Management Office (PDRRMO), with a duly appointed department head. Strengthening of Local DRRMOs and BDRRMCs with numerous capacity-building activities that we have undertaken to improve community resiliency throughout Bohol. Among the major milestones for the **Equitable Economic Growth with Environmental Sustainability** are the following:

- ✓ Implementation of an Integrated Management System (ISO 14001:2015 for EMS & ISO 9000:2015 for QMS)
- ✓ Establishment of Cluster Sanitary Landfill. One of them is the on-going Albur Sanitary Landfill, funded by the Department of Tourism – Tourism Infrastructure and Enterprise Zone Authority DOT-TIEZA will address the solid waste concerns of the cluster LGUs. This is the **Only Cluster Landfill in the Country**; and as an added feature, it is wholly funded by the National Government through TIEZA.

- ✓ Institutionalized Coastal Law Enforcement
- ✓ Environmental Management System, With ISO 14001:2004 Certification

- ✓ On-going geo-hazard assessment for new building sites, in coordination with the MGB;
- ✓ Mineral Resource Management; and
- ✓ And the Integrated Natural Resources Environmental Management Project (INREMP), implemented in partnership with the Department of the Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) with funding primarily from the ADB. The INREMP will address unsustainable watershed management in the Wahig-Inabanga River Watershed that aims to reverse degradation of watersheds caused by forest denudation and unsustainable farming practices, and provide incentives to local communities for improving natural resource management, by generating tangible economic benefits, which is well in keeping with our focal strategy of poverty reduction.
- ✓ Mainstreaming of DRRM-CCA in Local Development Plans, through the Updating of the PDPFP and Assistance to LGUs in the preparation of Hazard Maps at the Local Level to be used as bases in the preparation of Local Contingency Plan and Evacuation Plan

Partnership and Collaboration for Environmental Governance

The Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR), thru the Provincial Environment and Natural Resources Office (PENRO), CENRO Tagbilaran and Talibon Bohol was able to deliver more than 100% of all its targets. The DENR thrusts and priorities adheres with and are consistent with the President's social contract with the Filipino people and are supportive of the five (5) key result areas (KRAs) of the President, particularly on 1) anti-corruption, transparent, accountable and participatory governance; 2) poverty reduction and empowerment of the poor and vulnerable; 3) rapid, inclusive and sustained economic growth; 4) just and lasting peace and the rule of law; and 5) integrity of the environment and climate change.

In line with the above mentioned Key Results Areas, the DENR is committed to continuously implement its mandate as the primary government agency responsible for the conservation, management, development and proper use of the country's environment and natural resources, specially forest and grazing lands, mineral resources including those in reservation and watershed areas, and lands of the public domain, as well as the licensing and regulation of all natural resources, as may be provided for by law, in order to ensure equitable sharing of the benefits derived therefrom for the welfare of the present and future generations of Filipinos.

The Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) six priority areas for 2016 are the National Greening Program, Balik Probinsya Program, Anti-Illegal Logging Campaign, Cadastral Survey, Clean Air and Water, and Geo-hazard Mapping and Assessment.

On its fifth year of implementation, a total of 16,206.12-hectares plantations of various commodities were established in 2016 comprising 1,809 projects under the National

Greening Program (NGP) in the Province of Bohol. Seedlings planted during the year were composed of commodities such as species of timber-producing and/or forest trees, agro-forestry (Coffee, Cacao) and/or fruit-bearing trees, bamboo, rattan, mangrove, urban forestry trees, and indigenous trees.

In support to the Anti-Illegal Logging Campaign, law enforcement has been sustained with the conduct of regular forest protection works, and with the strengthening of the Anti-Illegal Logging Task Force, which is composed of uniformed personnel from the Philippine Army, Philippine National Police, Philippine National Police-Maritime Group, Philippine Coast Guard, Department of the Interior and Local Government, and personnel from the Forest Management Services of PENRO Bohol and CENROs Tagbilaran City and Talibon. A number of individuals were hired as Bantay Gubat/Forest Protection Officers, who were assigned at municipalities within the administrative jurisdiction of the two CENROs. They assisted the organic personnel of DENR in the protection of forest lands.

In line with the department's thrusts and KRAs, the DENR is committed to continuously implement its mandate as the primary government agency responsible for the conservation, management, development and proper use of the country's environment and natural resources, specially forest and grazing lands, mineral resources including those in reservation and watershed areas, and lands of the public domain, as well as the licensing and regulation of all natural resources, as may be provided for by law, in order to ensure equitable sharing of the benefits derived therefrom for the welfare of the present and future generations of Filipinos.

To accomplish its mandate, the Department shall be guided by the following objectives that will serve as basis for policy formulation: a) assure the availability and sustainability of the country's natural resources through judicious use and systematic restoration and replacement, whenever possible; b) increase productivity of natural resources in order to meet the demands for forest, mineral, and land resources of a growing population; c) enhance the contribution of natural resources for achieving national economic and social development; d) promote equitable access to natural resources by the different sectors of the populations; and e) conserve specific terrestrial and marine areas representative of the Philippine natural and cultural heritage for present and future generation.

PHYSICAL ACCOMPLISHMENT

A.01 GENERAL ADMINISTRATION AND SUPPORT SERVICES (GASS)

A.01.a General Administration and Support Services (GASS)

All targets under the General Administration and Support Services (GASS) were accomplished more than 100%. The targets cover personnel management, procurement services, property management, communications, records management, budget and finance management, accounting, cashiering, and top level management and supervision that includes the works for the completion of the PENRO Bohol and CENRO Tagbilaran City building. Under GASS, it also takes into account activities relating to learning growth; actions to documents, implementation of good governance, budget utilization rate, submission of required financial statements per Section 41 of PD No. 1445, submission of budget and financial accountability reports (BFARs), and reconciliation of property, plant and equipment (PPE) data based on audit findings.

A.01.b Human Resource Development (HRD)

For 2016, all targets under HRD were based at the DENR Regional Office. However, learning events to capacitate DENR Bohol staff and employees and those under the Integrated Natural Resources and Environmental Project (INREMP) were closely coordinated with and facilitated by the Human Resources Development Section.

A.II. SUPPORT TO OPERATION**A.II.a. Data Management Including Systems Development and Maintenance**

Through the implementation of the DENR rationalization plan, one of the new positions created is that of the Information System Analyst, who is in charge of the maintenance and enhancement of the Information and Communication Technology (ICT) equipment and programs, 100% accomplishments were attained on targets relating to server system enhancement and maintenance, internet connections, voice over internet phone (VOIP), performance monitoring and reporting system (PMRS), and share point. Likewise, 100% accomplishments were attained on the development, maintenance and updating of ENR statistics/database; and on the maintenance of the Integrated Geographic Information System (GIS).

A.II.b. Production and Dissemination of Technical and Popular Materials in the Conservation and Development of Natural Resources including Environmental Education

Following the implementation of the Information, Education and Communication (IEC) Plan, IEC materials were produced and distributed. Out of these, 835 (334%) brochures/posters were produced and distributed over the target of 250; 27 (386%) tarpaulins produced and installed over the target of 7, including all environment and other related events; 3 (150%) exhibits conducted over the target of 2; and 35 (292%) orientations/forums/ conferences on ENR programs/projects/rules and regulations conducted over the target of 12.

Targets and accomplishments include the preparation and submission to the Regional Office of the F.Y. 2017 Provincial Work and Financial Plan (100%) during the workshop conducted last October 13-14, 2016; preparation and submission to the Regional Office of the F.Y. 2017-2019 budget proposals or forward estimates (100%); drafting and presentation of the draft Forest Land Use Plans (FLUP) of the Municipalities of Buenavista and Loon to the Regional Forest Land Use Plan Technical Review Committee (100%); updating of the Community Resource Management Framework (CRMF) (100%),

following the Community Resource Management Plans (CRMP), of two (2) people's organizations, namely: Imelda CBRM-SALE of Imelda, Duero, Bohol and KAMANACA of Kabasakan, Getafe, Bohol.

A.03.a.2 Monitoring of ENR Policies/Plans/Programs/Projects

The Office accomplished the targets on the preparation/evaluation and submission of monthly and annual reports, and conducted 16 (over the target of 12) monitoring and validation activities on ENR accomplishments/performance.

A.03.a.3 Environment Natural Resources Data Management

For the Forest Resource Assessment (FRA), three (3) (150%) accomplishment over the target of 2) sites were assessed: Barangay Benliw in Ubay, Bohol and Barangay Kauswagan in Trinidad, Bohol under CENRO Talibon, and Barangay Nan-od in Sierra Bullones, Bohol under CENRO Tagbilaran City. Activities involved were the re-establishment and re-measurement of established plots, with the use of PVC stakes poured with concrete cement, Total Station, and Global Positioning System (GPS). The site under CENRO Tagbilaran City has dense and closed vegetation. Corresponding targets and accomplishments on:

- forest production utilization, with submission of price monitoring reports - 192% accomplishment, with annual target of 12 and accomplishment of 16
- re-surveying and mapping of areas with existing tenurial instruments - 1,113 hectares accomplished over the target of 213 hectares, particularly the Community-Based Forest Management Agreement (CBFMA) areas of PO-Imelda CBRM-SALE of Imelda, Duero, Bohol and PO-MAMSA of Salog, Getafe, Bohol
- survey and registration of protected area occupants (SRPAO) - 100% accomplishment, with target of 3 barangays within the coverage of the Panglao Island Protected Seascape (PIPS), namely: Barangays Poblacion, Totolan and Songculan in Dauis, Bohol
- support to environmental events - 300% accomplishment, with annual target of 4 and accomplishment of 12, namely: World Wetlands Day (February 2, 2016), World Wildlife Day (March 3, 2016), International Day of Forests (March 21, 2016), International Earth Day (April 22, 2016), Month of the Ocean (May 2016), International Day for Biological Diversity (May 22, 2016), Environment Month (June 2016), Coral triangle Day (June 9, 2016), Philippine Arbor Day (June 25, 2016), Philippine Eagle Week (PEW) (June 4-10, 2016), International Coastal Clean-Up (ICC) Day (September 17, 2016), and support to the celebration of the Fish Conservation Week (October 17-21, 2016) as chairman of the Bohol Coastal Resource Management Task Force (BCRM TF).

FORESTRY

A.03.b Forest Development and Rehabilitation and Protection

National Greening Program (NGP)

Forests for people, poverty reduction, resource conservation and protection, productivity enhancement, climate change mitigation and adaptation.

For 2016, a total of 4,077,106 seedlings were produced out of the target of 3,357,000 seedlings (121%), all of which are timber commodity. On plantation establishment, 100% accomplished with 2,015 hectares. Over the target of 9,115 hectares, a total of 9,381 hectares of plantations established (103%) in 2014, 2015 and 2016 were maintained and protected. Out of 9,115 hectares total target, 4,067 hectares were established under C.Y. 2014; 3,033 hectares under C.Y. 2015; and 2,015 hectares under C.Y. 2016. The following were the additional targets and accomplishments under the Central Office-based fund:

- 2,832 hectares established plantations maintained and protected over the target of 2,692 hectares established under the Mangrove and Beach Forest Development Project (MBFDP), or equivalent to 105% accomplishment, including the maintenance and protection of the established demo plantations using closed spacing; and
- 40 hectares accomplished for site assessment and planning, site preparation and planting, and maintenance and protection of established plantation, and production of planting materials from the clonal nursery at the Bohol Island State University (BISU) – Bilar Campus at Zamora, Bilar, Bohol.

Another target under the expansion coverage of the National Greening Program was the survey and mapping of 4,545 hectares, with 100% accomplishment. Likewise, the downloaded target last December 2016 under the Enhanced National Greening Program (eNGP) Sustainable Integrated Area Development and Management (SIADM), with establishment of 1,000 hectares mangrove plantation and 500 hectares bamboo plantation, was accomplished. Of this, DENR Bohol awarded Letters of Agreement (LOA) to identified people's organizations and the release of the 15% mobilization fund to each of the PO with LOA.



Under the Community-Based Forest Management Program (CBFMP), particularly for the development project to support the partner people's organization for their livelihood and enhancement of the awarded area, two (2) LOAs were signed with and awarded to the Imelda



CBRM-SALE of Imelda, Duero, Bohol and Cainoy Integrated Social Forestry Association (CISFA) of Boctol, Balilihan, Bohol, each having an area of 50 hectares.

In support to the National Greening Program is the maintenance and protection of established arboretum, with activities such as brushing, ring weeding and application of fertilizer. The arboretum, planted with indigenous forest tree species, is located at Barangay Sta. Catalina, Sagbayan, Bohol. Another project is the maintenance and protection of seed production area (SPA) and individual plus trees (IPT) at Barangay Owac, Bilar, Bohol, which is within the coverage of Rajah Sikatuna Protected Landscape (RSPL). The seed production area had been planted with White lauan, then as pilot Dipterocarp plantation under the Ecosystems Research and Development Bureau (ERDB). For 2016, maintenance activities were conducted, such as cleaning and de-weeding, purchase of fertilizer, replacement of wooden posts to concrete posts for the perimeter fence with an interval of at least 10 meters, replanting of live posts, re-tagging and banding of plus trees, IEC campaign through attendance to barangay assemblies and Sangguniang Barangay sessions, monitoring of phenological calendar, and seed collection of individual plus trees.

2.2.4 LAND MANAGEMENT SERVICES

The land is the basic resource for man's existence thus it is the main concern in the delivery of services under the Land Management Unit of the Office. We can say that land is a limited resource. This is why it is mostly the subject of family conflicts, court litigations, and even international disputes. Concerning disputes over land claims and conflicts, 13 cases were investigated during the year 2016 over the annual target of 10 land related cases that is about 130% accomplished over the target.

Aside from that, the main focused of the unit is on the Land Administration and Disposition of Alienable and Disposable land. For land disposition 1,005 residential patents with an equivalent area of 21.6032 hectares were processed over the target of 1,000 residential patent or equivalent to 100% in term of percent accomplishment and all process application was endorsed to PENRO. Of the 1,005 residential patent applications, 488 are male and 517 are female.

Under the CARP Funds, 937 applications processed with final action over the target of 900 with an equivalent percentage accomplishment of 105%, consist an area of 272.8192 hectares. Of this application 415 applicants are male, and 522 are female.

On lot survey for residential, the unit accomplished 302 residential lots over the 125 lots targets making a 241% accomplishment. For the agricultural subdivision, a total of 119 lots were surveyed by the team with an equivalent area of 68.8496 hectares. For the survey and mapping foreshore areas, a total of 630.6275 has were accomplished covering ten (10) Municipalities of Alburquerque, Duero, Lila, Garcia Hernandez, Valencia, Loay, Baclayon and Dimiao, Bohol.

Moreover, the unit had generated total revenue of Php 1,515,624.09 as of November 2016 over the targeted amount of Php 350,000.00 for CY 2016. The said amount generated from the various fees listed hereunder, to wit:

Maintenance of land records was also of utmost importance. Records include the survey records and public land applications. Part of the maintenance and management of the Land records is the continuing computerization of the public land survey records. For CY 2015 activities involve on the validation of the encoded data of the Public Land Application documents with the accomplishment of 8,991 over the target of 8,991 or equivalent to 100%; on the scanned images validated a total of 98,091 scanned images of PLA document were scanned over the target of 98,091 or equivalent to 100%.

2.2.5 PROTECTED AREAS WILDLIFE AND COASTAL ZONE MANAGEMENT

The Protected Area covers the three (3) main component of the sector namely: the Protected Area Management; Wildlife Management & Bio-diversity conservation and the Coastal Zone Management.

Protected Areas (PA)

The Conservation and Development Unit (CDU) is responsible in the implementation and management of all protected areas (PA's). For CENRO Tagbilaran City a total of ten (10) Protected Area was maintained and protected, of which are the following:

- Rajah Sikatuna Protected Landscape (RSPL)
- Loboc Watershed Forest Reserves
- Alejawan-Cansuhay-Anibongan River Watershed Forest Reserve (ACARWFR)
- Chocolate Hill Natural Monuments (CHNM)
- Albuquerque-Loay-Loboc Protected Landscape/Seascape (ALLPLS)
- Cabilao-Sandingan Islands Mangrove Swamp Forest Reserve (CSIMSFR)
- Pangangan Island Mangrove Swamp Forest Reserve/ Calape Group of Islands Wilderness Area (PIMSFR/ CGIWA)
- Tubigon Group of Islands Mangrove Swamp Forest Reserve/ Wilderness Areas (TGIMSFR/ WA)
- Clarin Group of Islets Wilderness Area (CGI WA)

- Panglao Island Protected Seascape (PIPS)

The operationalization and strengthening of the 10 PAMB's were made possible through conduct of regular PAMB meeting. A total of 40 meetings conducted for the year in which the ten (10) Protected Area able to passed and approved 58 resolutions equivalent to 145%. Other accomplishment of the unit includes:

- Started preparation of the General Management Plan of Panglao Island protected Landscape and Seascape, Chocolate Hills Natural Monument (CHNM) and Loboc Watershed Forest Reserve (LWFR).
- Conduct of Biodiversity Monitoring System (BMS) of Rajah Sikatuna Protected Landscape
- Processing of PACBRMA application and endorsed to the Secretary for approval of Nagkahiusang Mag-uumasaGipanalipdangLasangsaAloja which is located within the Loboc Watershed Forest Reserve;
- Generate revenue from the five (5) Protected Area namely: RSPL, CISMSFR, PIMSFR, CHNM, ALLPLS amounting to Php 1,206,306.72 for the CY 2016;
- Assessment and establishment of the critical habitat for Green sea turtle hatching area at Panglao Bohol.

2.2.6 Bio-diversity Conservation Program

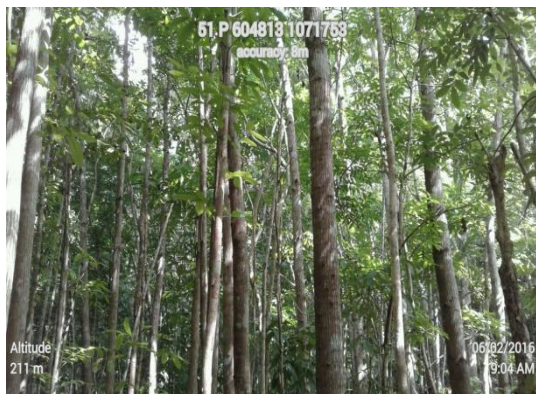
In line with the provision of the Republic Act No. 9147 or the Wildlife Conservation and Protection Act, the Office maintained three (3) wildlife monitoring stations at the Seaport of Tagbilaran City and Jagna, Bohol and Airport of Tagbilaran City. Part of the protection of the wildlife we also deputized and mobilized about 34 Wildlife Enforcement Officer (WEO). The WEO undergo several capability training before they were deputized to be able them to equip some knowledge regarding the RA No. 9147 and other related laws.

A composite team was created for the implementation of Biodiversity Monitoring System (BMS) in all Protected Areas of CENRO Tagbilaran City. The monitoring were conducted quarterly in Protected Areas through the collection of data on natural biological resources and their utilization and to improve the participation of the communities in PA management. Reports were submitted to the Regional Office in a quarterly basis.

2.2.7 FOREST RESOURCE ASSESSMENT (FRA)

The activity includes the conduct of re-location and re-measurement of FRA tracts. The area is located at Nan-od, Sierra Bullones where the FRA tract established. Actual validation of the area to ascertain whether there are changes in land use, forest species composition and forest destruction, and conduct inventory of forest trees existing in the area.

**Tarsier Conservation Project
Accomplishment for CY 2016
Enhancing and maintaining the habitat of Philippine Tarsier**



CENRO Tagbilaran City facilitated in the elimination of exotic flora like Mahogany and Gmelina in Corella-Sikatuna Biodiversity and Tarsier Conservation Area and to be replanted with trees which are identified roosting species for the Philippine Tarsiers. Some portions of the area are previously covered with Certificate of Stewardship Contracts (CSC) wherein planted invasive species of trees remains unharvested. Researches also reveal that Philippine tarsier is dependent on small-diameter trees as substrates for locomotion and the dense undergrowth that support a wide variety of food resources are vital for the survival of tarsiers. A total of fifteen (15) hectares are to be replanted with the preferred roosting plants for the tarsiers. Nursery establishment, seedling production, care and maintenance and plantation establishment were awarded to the three(3)

Peoples Organizations in the area namely: Advocates from Corella for the Conservation of Environment and Preservation of Tarsiers (ACCEPT); Cando-Canangcaan Integrated Social Forestry Farmers Association (CCISFFA); and Lasangnong Mag-uuma sa Abucay Norte, Can-agong ug Cancatac (LAMACC). Such project also provides livelihood assistance to the members of the organizations.

2.2.8 Communication, Education, Participation and Awareness

Lecture on tarsier conservation and other environmental laws was conducted on November 22, 2016 at Can-agong, Sikatuna, Bohol. Barangay Officials, P.O members and residents near the area were the participants of said activity.

IEC materials like brochures and research studies on tarsiers were also displayed at Visitors and Information Center in Sikatuna. In addition, tarsier conservation program



accomplishments were also posted at the center.

Engraved directional signages for eco-trails were also fabricated and installed.

Habitat Protection and Patrolling



Protection and patrol in the area was conducted regularly by the two hired contractual personnel. Tarpaulins were also installed for the awareness of the people and at the same time for the protection of the area.

Biodiversity Monitoring System (BMS)



A team was created for the conduct of biodiversity monitoring in the area. The monitoring was conducted quarterly using four methods. It includes field diary, transect walk, photo documentation and focus group

The community has been involved in the said activity. A Community Monitoring Group (CMG) from the four barangays comprising the area has been organized and involved in the Focus Group Discussion every quarter. Reports were submitted in quarterly a basis.



2.2.9 Maintenance of Ecotourism Facilities and Amenities

Facilities and amenities developed and constructed within the Tarsier Conservation Area which includes the Visitors and Information Center, rest areas, viewing deck, camping site, tarsier observation cage, rescue center, and canopy walk were maintained by the two hired contractuels from the site. On the other hand function hall has been improved and the guard post has been repaired. Established eco-trails within Tarsier Conservation

Area were also maintained and improved. A new trail with a distance of 150 meters has been established.

2.2.10 Empowerment and Mobilization of the Council

The Corella-Sikatuna Biodiversity and Tarsier Conservation Area Management Council composed of the MOA signatories (DENR, PTFI, LGU-Corella and LGU Sikatuna), 4 barangay captains, 3 Peoples Organizations BEMO, PTO, FTC and BISU conducted its regular monthly meeting. An Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR) for the existing MOA has been drafted to define and effectuate their individual role, obligations, and concerns in implementing its goals and objectives.

For the target on Monitoring of Protected Areas and Wildlife which include the conservation and protection of wildlife and Issuance of Permit, a total of 106 permits issued over the target of 90, this covers only the Local Transport Permit issued for both flora and fauna to be transported outside the province, with corresponding revenue collection of Php 10,600.00; The unit also conducted compliance monitoring to the holders of Wildlife Farm Permit (WFP), including those holder of gratuitous permit. For the enforcement of Protected Area, the wildlife and cave laws, rules and regulations, the unit accomplished four (4) bio-diversity related cases over the target of one (1). For the maintenance of the Wildlife Rescue Center at Magsaysay Park was provided with financial support for the food of the rescued fauna.

Coastal and Marine Management Services Unit

The unit is responsible in the management and conservation of coastal and marine areas and the resources therein pursuant to DENR Administrative Order No. 2002-08. For CY 2016 all targets of the unit with regards to the management of coastal and Marine Resources/Areas have successfully accomplished it includes the following:

- 1 LGU's Provided with Technical Assistance in ICM Planning at Loon, Bohol;
- 1 LGU's Provided with Technical Assistance in the preparation of the Municipal Coastal Environmental profile at Loay, Bohol;

2.2.11. Ecosystem Research and Development

The Ecosystem Research and Development activity which was handled by CENRO level is on the production of Quality Planting Materials (QPPM) of premium and indigenous spp. for the National Greening Program. The 100 hectares target was awarded to PO Rizal Upland Farmers Organization (RUFO) for the establishment of plantation of indigenous species. Seedlings will be taken from the Bilar State University (BISU), the recipient of the 2016 target for the seedling production.

2.2.12 ENVIRONMENTAL EVENTS AND WATERBIRD CENSUS COUNT

A. ENVIRONMENTAL EVENTS

Out of four (4) in the annual target, there were ten (10) environmental events supported and accomplished namely:

1. World Wetland Day (February 2) – conducted an IEC in Jimilian Primary School, Jimilian, Loboc.
2. World Wildlife Day (March 3) – conducted an IEC in Bilar National High School.
3. International Day of Forest (March 21) – conducted an IEC in Barangay Maitum, Catigbia
4. Earth Day (August 22) – conducted Green Schools Campaign, distributed IEC materials to 5 elementary and 5 highschoools.
5. Ocean Month (May) – there was motorcade and kick-off activity at ICM wherein an IEC was done thru presentations by the participating agencies. CENRO Tagbilaran City presented a Dance and Chorale presentation regarding Environmental Protection.
6. International Day for Biodiversity (May 22) – conducted a 1 day orientation for Wildlife Enforcement Officers (WEOs).
7. Environment Month (June) – conducted roadside Tree Planting (Arbor Day).
8. Coral Triangle Day (June 9) conducted an IEC in Macaas Barangay Hall, Macaas, Tubigon.
9. Eagle Week (June 4-10) – conducted an IEC in Dagohoy Barangay Hall, DagohoyBilar.
10. International Coastal Clean-up/National Clean-Up – conducted an IEC inPangangan Island National High School, Calape.



Tarps were installed within office premises, IEC materials were distributed and video clips on Climate Change and Environmental Conservation were shown. Reports on each environmental event were submitted to PENRO for indorsement to Regional Office with pictures and attendance sheets.



B. WATERBIRD CENSUS COUNT

Out of twenty-four (24) for the annual target, the same total was accomplished, conducted in two sites namely:

1. Panglao Island - in Sitio Daurong, Danao, Panglao.

- water bird spp. sighted were: Egrets, Herons, Terns, Kingfishers, Sandpipers and Plovers.

Cabilao Island, Loon - in Lanao Lake, Pantudlan, Cabilao waterbird spp. sighted were: Egrets, Wild Ducks, Terns, Herons, Kingfishers, and Sea Eagle. Reports on monthly waterbird count were submitted to PENRO for indorsement to Regional Office with tables and pictures.

III. GENDER AND DEVELOPMENT

The Activities on the Gender and Development is basically based on the mainstream activities from the different unit of the CENRO.

On Lands – Build awareness among women regarding property and land rights by having attending barangay assembly, SB session and even conducted “pulong-pulong” at Barangay or Puroks, regarding the issuance of patents with the coordination of the barangay officials. The main objectives of land title registration are to protect property rights, to facilitate transactions in land, and to enable land to be used as collateral for a loan. A system of land title registration identifies each individual land parcel and provides confirmation by the state that the person named in the register has specified property rights in that parcel. Land title registration is simple, reliable, prompt, affordable and well-suited to the society it serves. This was made realized by the people in the locality. Hanging of the streamer at the DENR-CENRO premises during the Women’s Month Celebration.

The DENR-CENRO, Tagbilaran City has implemented the Gender and Development (GAD) based on the policy of the government. The program and activities by the CENRO Tagbilaran City focused on the participation and involvement of the women particularly the People's Organization (PO's) on NGP. Mostly women had participated in the implementation of the National Greening Program (NGP) and Community Based Forest Management (CBFM), Forest Land Use Planning and Others.

Women's volunteer are trained and designated as Wildlife Enforcement Officer (WEO). We trained fourteen (14) and five (5) are women. We have hired two (2) women Extension Officer assigned in the National Greening Program.

On the other hand, twenty one (21) women participated in decision making in the different People Organization (PO's); namely Cambagui Women Association, Lumad Multipurpose Cooperative, San Vicente Mangrove Association (SAVIMA), Danao CBRM Farmers Association in OWAC, Cansumbol MPC, Rizal Upland Farmers Organization, Dagohoy Watershed Health Monitoring Association and Balili Kapamilya Womens Organization. In the NGP and CBFM activities, there are one hundred thirty five (135) women involved in the implementation. There are four (4) women participating in the preparation of the plan on FLUP and CRMF.

There are thirty (30) women attended training/workshop, seminars and Focus Group Discussion (FGD) on Forest Land Use planning, General Management Plan of Protected Areas and Updating Community Base Resource Management Framework Plan. (CBMF). (see attached picture).

On the Environment and Natural Resources Celebration three (3) women participated in the International Day of Forest and sixty one (61) in the World Wildlife Day. (see attached picture). CENRO, Tagbilaran City conducted consultation on stakeholders regarding on ENR policies on Protected Areas, Ecotourism and Sustainable Coastal Resource Ecosystem Management Program.

The CENRO Tagbilaran City joined the Women's Month Celebration by posting of streamer. And two (2) meeting assessment and updates on GAD laws/issues were conducted for GADFDS. San Vicente Mangrove Association (SAVIMA) showed best practices in the formulation of CRMF and WFP, mangrove planting, Tilapia pond for ecotourism, mangrove adventure tour on the 800 meters boardwalk, boat paddling, swimming, picnic site, cultural presentation (kuratsay) and imbaw and takla collection.

The PO members acquired additional knowledge to improve the living by attending the Farmers Business school. (please see attached picture).

Accomplishment Report 2016

Every Sector of the Society has taken interest on biodiversity conservation. Yet, some do not grasp the real meaning of the word and how much effort and extent of commitment are needed to attain it.

Almost, if not all, project undertaking or endeavours rely upon the existing natural resources. The environment and all its bounty never cease to appeal every so-called environmentalist or ecologist. This is the reality and the real picture from the upland going to the lowland down to our coastal and marine ecosystems. We still enjoy their benefits. The Boholano people enjoying the products for a healthy environment. It is the reality that continues to motivate the people of the CENRO Tagbilaran City to sustain the ecological balance.

Across the country, Bohol is the home of many endemic and indigenous floral and faunal species found within the jurisdiction of CENRO Tagbilaran City. The valued Molave and Dipterocarp tree species are in abundance while both resident and migrant birds feed and take shelter in the dense canopies. The underground reservoirs, springs and rivers are breeding ground of various freshwater micro and macro organisms. These are just one of the many wonders in Bohol.

Sustainable management of the environment is the right response to the present state of the different life support systems. Generally, our forest ecosystem, either in the upland or lowland, has succumbed to so much human pressure that other related ecosystems are also on the verge of collapsing. Others do not care about the importance of the existence of a tree, and our environment. We care and feel bad about having typhoons and flooding. We even hate the fact of water shortage in our homes. Yet, we do not know and understand the real causes and what we have contributed to these effects.

In the realm of achieving a bright future for the human race, the convergence of various social entities is a way to have it. Despite limitations, heightened consciousness and concerted involvement of the people especially in the hinterlands would bring about the realization of a sustainable forest management. It will not only be a dream but a future tasked to have it become a reality.

All programs and projects of the Department, including those implemented by its line bureaus and attached agencies must contribute to the attainment of the DENR Major

Final Outputs (MFOs) and their Objectively Verifiable Indicators (OVIs), thus, ensuring efficiency and effectiveness in program implementation and improved service delivery to the public. For CY2016, the following are the major programs and projects for CY 2016:

 - Forest Protection
 - Watershed Management

2. **Land Management**
 - Cadastral Survey
 - Patent Issuance

In relation to the implementation of GAD,

- activities shall be mainstreamed in the regular P/A/Ps of the Bureau/Region/Office within DENR. The GAD Focal Persons shall assist the sectors in identifying areas where GAD can be mainstreamed.
- A WFP summarizing all the GAD-related activities programmed in the various sectoral P/A/Ps within the region/office shall be prepared by the GAD Focal Person in coordination with the sector and Bureau/Regional Planning Officer.
- The total cost of the GAD Work Plan must be equivalent to 5% of net programmable amount.
- For FY 2016, all Focal Persons of GAD must ensure full attainment of targets as planned.

So far, activities under the GAD mainstream activities were accomplished in coordination with the different sector/unit of the CENRO Tagbilaran City operations. We may be looking into the very details of it all for it should be like this – putting value into our efforts, our works, and not just for the sake of accomplishing our targets year after year. From the previous years until now, the office has successfully provided services and extended technical assistance to our clients. The forest Management Service had accomplished more than 100% in some of its targets. There was a continued high

demand in scaling/rescaling activities in line with the harvesting of trees within private plantations. Likewise, monitoring of compliance of permits, licenses and agreements exceeded the annual target. Also under the Enforcement Unit, application processed with final action exceeded due to registration of chainsaw, with the help of an extensive IEC campaign conducted by the technical and field men and women of the office.

It is a welcoming idea that the Philippine Government has continuously implemented the National Greening Program, with the various government agencies banner their owned slogans. For now, we can see that almost all people from the different corners of the society are participating to join our cause. Planting a single seedling is just a start, and it will go a long way to global climate change. It is very ironic that we promote establishment of plantations to reforest idle and rehabilitate degraded public and private lands, to promote carbon sequestration and act as filter to air and noise pollution, promote microclimate, prevent soil and surface water run-off, and enhance ecotourism in the province. Still no matter how we try to avoid it, we can feel the rising temperatures brought about by global warming. Our microclimate has changed for the past several years.

For CY 2016, the CENRO Tagbilaran accomplished 100% of the targeted area for establishment under the National Greening Program including its seedling production and maintenance of the previous established plantations. A total 1,051,193 seedlings were produced of different species over the target of 957,950 seedlings making it 110% accomplished. For area development a total of 575 hectares planted of different indigenous tree species were developed.

On Forest Protection activity, the 6,500 hectares untenured forestland is effectively protected. The formulation of the IEC plan and continued conduct of information drive is a big help in the dissemination of the DENR policy regarding cutting and transporting of 110% forest product. Thus, help regulate or lessen the illegal activities within the CENRO jurisdiction. To ensure that our forest land and protected area are protected the LAWIN initiated programs were implemented.

With the extension of the Free Patent Law for Patent application, the LPD Unit of CENRO Tagbilaran City had process Free Patent Application (FPA) with final action 937 patents under the CARP Funds. For the Residential Patent a total of 1,005 Residential patents were processed under the Regular fund. And for Agricultural issuance of 569 patent processed and additional 311 processed under LGU-LED program.

Public Land Surveys (PLS) of the Department was funded under the regular fund to undertake the Survey of the Residential lot with an accomplishment of 421 lots, the PLS still commission to undertake the survey and mapping of foreshore areas, a total of 630.6275 hectares were surveyed. All other target under the Land Management was satisfactorily accomplished reaching 100 % over all the targets set for the CY 2016.

Biological diversity is not only threatened by the direct impact of man's activities but also with the change in temperatures, even in their own natural niche, that used to be conducive to them. Considering the area coverage of the administrative jurisdiction, the

Conservation and Development Unit (CDU) of CENRO Tagbilaran City extends extra effort in the over-all management of the 10 protected areas. Strengthening of the PAMB's was maintained through the conduct of quarterly meetings. Conduct capability training to PAMB member's in order to strengthen their knowledge in protection and conservation of the biodiversity and preservation of the different ecosystem. All targets of the unit for CY 2016 were successfully accomplished reaching more than 100% over the target. Another activity is the conduct of IEC and patrol of established critical habitat for tarsier in the Timberland area of Balilihan, Sevilla, Catigbian, San Isidro, Corella and Sikatuna.

On the Coastal component, conservation of the coastal resources is the main concerned, continues monitoring is being done. Re-planting and maintenance of the existing established mangrove plantation is one of the thrust and priorities. Patrol works and Information campaign on the existing policies particularly on RA 7161 and EO 23 was continuously done during assemblies and fora. Technical assistance in the development and formulation of Municipal Coastal Environment Plan and Integrated Coastal Management Plan was extended to the LGU Loay. And all activities under the unit are satisfactorily accomplished with a rating of 100%.

CENRO Tagbilaran City was able to generate revenue in the total amount of Php 3,105,787.46 from the issuance of permits, certification, collection of resource use fees and others which are broken down as follows:

Other significant accomplishment of CENRO Tagbilaran City is the operation of the CENRO Central Nursery in Haguilanan, Catigbian, Bohol. Clients are provided with seedlings needed for their personal use in their private land. Seedlings are forest tree (endemic and exotic) and we also have cacao and fruit trees. For the year, we able to raise 121,072 seedlings, even though we have no clear budget for the nursery yet CENRO Tagbilaran City able to manage and support the operation of the Central nursery to be successful in its operation for CY 2016.

We may count on our accomplishments at the end of the year. But the gratitude that we feel by the fact that we were able to extend our assistance to our clients – one of the reasons that we are employed in government service – and that we have the ability to do it as long as it is needed, just to show that DENR truly has a big responsibility in making our environment more worth living in.

With the afore-cited accomplishment based on the targets set and other activities listed under the approved Work and Financial Plan for CY 2016, the DENR-CENRO Tagbilaran City personnel deserves due recognition and appreciation.

Other initiatives through ERDB, a total of 40 hectares which was contracted by the People's Organization of Rizal Upland Farmers Organization located at Rizal, Batuan, Bohol. 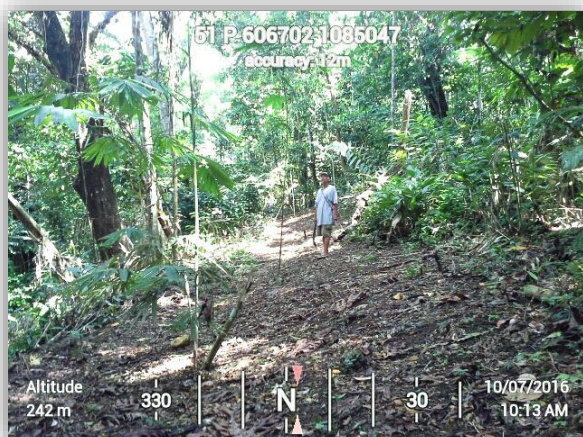

1.2 MAINTENANCE AND PROTECTION OF ESTABLISHED PLANTATION FOR CY 2014 AND 2015

The activities under the maintenance and protection of established plantation involves construction and maintenance of firelines, strip brushing, ring weeding, re-planting, application of fertilizers and patrol works. For the year 2014 a total of 842 hectares and 979 hectares for the year of 2015 were under the maintenance and protection. Mangrove and Beach Forest Development has a total of 141 hectares area maintained. For CY 2016, a total of 6 extension officers were hired to assist the NGP in implementing the program specifically by providing

technical assistance to People's Organizations and upland communities through extension services.

1.3 UPDATING OF COMMUNITY RESOURCE MANAGEMENT FRAMEWORK (CRMF). There are two upland Community Based Forest Management holders that had been successfully conducted an updating of their CRMF. The People's Organization of Imelda-CBRM SALE in Imelda, Duero and the CISFA of Boctol, Balilihan, Bohol. The updated CRMF and 5-year workplan were submitted to Regional Office for evaluated and affirmed.

1.4 SUPPORT TO ENVIRONMENTAL EVENTS. The activity aims to awaken the people and make them realize the importance of our natural resources, its development and conservation. This is done through the conduct of lectures, symposiums and meetings with the Local Government Units, People's Organization and students from different schools. Out of 4 targets, the office

accomplished 10 lectures/symposiums of different Environmental Laws on biodiversity conservation and protection.

2.1.5 MANAGEMENT OF PROTECTED AREA. CENRO Tagbilaran City has 10 Protected Areas. Its objectives are focused on the protection, conservation and development of the natural features and to introduce development in such a manner that resources are protected and conserved for the benefit and enjoyment of the people.

1.6 PAMB OPERATIONALIZATION / STRENGTHENING. For CY 2016, CENRO Tagbilaran City has a target of 40 Protected Area Management Board resolutions. Fortunately, the 10 Protected Areas submitted a total of 58 resolutions to the Regional Office for approval.

1.7 ECOTOURISM DEVELOPMENT. Facilities and amenities developed and constructed within Raja Sikatuna Protected Landscape were properly maintained by the hired contractual in the project. Please see attached RSPL accomplishment report.

1.8 TARSIER CONSERVATION PROJECT. One of the activities within the Tarsier Conservation Project is the enhancing and maintaining the habitat of Philippine Tarsier through the elimination of planted invasive species and to be replaced with preferred roosting plants as a source and support a variety of food for the survival of tarsiers. Conduct IEC by educating people within the community about the different Environmental Laws, specifically the Tarsier Conservation Program. Patrol Works in the area was conducted regularly in order to protect the habitat of Philippine Tarsiers. Biodiversity Monitoring in the area was regularly conducted in quarterly basis using four methods. It includes filed diary, transect walk, photo documentation and focus group discussion. The community has been involved in the activity to improve the participation in the protection and conservation of Philippine Tarsier.

1.9 WILDLIFE RISK MANAGEMENT AND EMERGENCY RESPONSE PROGRAM. The activity involved in the waterbird census and counting in two areas, one is located at Panglao Island and the other is in Cabilao Island. This was done every month to monitor the presence of different waterbirds in the area. The purpose of which is to monitor the species of the waterbirds and its population status in the identified wetlands. Some migratory birds were sighted during the month of winter season abroad. The data will serve as guide in Biodiversity Conservation and Management.

1.10 SUSTAINABLE CORAL REEF ECOSYSTEM MANAGEMENT PROGRAM (SCREMP). The activities under the Coastal and Marine Environment Comprehensive Management Program is the assessment of resources for baseline information and inventory of coastal and marine resources which includes the assessment of seagrass beds, soft bottom communities (mudflats), plankton communities, vertebrates' and invertebrates, biodiversity of reef cryptobiota and mangrove areas. Coastal barangays of Panglao and Dauis, Bohol will serve as baseline information in the assessment and inventory of coastal and marine resources. For seagrass beds assessment, accomplishment registered to 2,851.1 hectares, coral reef 243.7 hectares and mangrove areas with 305.5 hectares assessed and mapped against the 1,187 hectares target for the year.

1.11 PROVISION OF TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE IN INTEGRATED COASTAL MANAGEMENT PLAN. The Local Government Unit of Loay is the recipient in assisting and updating of their Integrated Coastal Management Plan. A workshop was conducted spearheaded by the DENR personnel together with the Municipal Technical Working Group in conducting EPCRA and updating ICM plan. The updated development plan was submitted to LGU Loay for presentation to Sangguniang Bayan for adoption.

1.13 COMMUNITY BASED FOREST MANAGEMENT. For CY 2016, CENRO Tagbilaran City awarded with CBFM-CARP project to the People's Organization of Imelda CBRM SALE of Imelda, Duero, Bohol and CISFA in Boctol, Balilihan, Bohol. Each site has a target of 50 hectares for rattan plantation and they have already produced a total of 60,000 rattan seedlings for plantation establishment.

1.14 Soil Conservation and Watershed Management

Loboc Watershed Rehabilitation Project. Rehabilitation of this watershed involves the application of appropriate engineering and vegetative measures to stabilize the soil and prevent surface water run-off, which may cause soil erosion and landslides in the process. For CY 2015, the Loboc River Bank Rehabilitation was given emphasis and funding support for the purpose. For CY 2016 the activity on structural measures was part of the continuing activity.

Records showed that the municipality of Loboc is frequently visited by floods due to river overflows. In fact, the municipality has experienced some of the worst floods in 1876 and 1964 wherein both floods resulted to huge loss of lives and properties along with heavy soil erosion and siltation of the river same incident happened in 2013. However, recent climatic change in rainfall events showed that soil erosion and siltation

due to scouring of the riverbanks during heavy rainfall and overflows have resulted to more siltation of the Loboc River. This flood prone condition of the Loboc River watershed within the municipality of Loboc was made even worse by the recent 7.2 magnitude earthquake last October 15, 2013 that struck Bohol province. This earthquake did not only destroy the historical heritage churches in Loboc and Baclayon but also the many infrastructures and vegetation in the Loboc River. Ocular inspection of the Loboc River in the municipality of Loboc indicated that the earthquake uprooted the vegetation along with chunks of soil that eroded along the Loboc riverbank.

For CY 2015, Funds from the Central Office for the rehabilitation of the Loboc River Watershed Project was given the emphasis on the construction of structural measures (Revetment) having an annual target of 1,017 cubic meters. The project implementation was delayed due to the following circumstances: the MOA was executed on November 2015; the Certificate of Availability of Funds (CAF) was issued to Loboc on November 2, 2015 and the normal transfer of funds from DENR's account to LGUs DBP account took more than a month; Posting of PhilGeps and bidding was differed due to Election ban; with the above reason's target on the structural measures was fully implemented this years with a total accomplishment of 3,002 cu.m. or equivalent to 295%.

On the other hand, the 100 hectares established plantation under CO-Based for the rehabilitation of Watershed area within the disaster stricken areas affected by typhoon was given another budget at the later part of CY 2016 for the maintenance and protection activity. The established plantation for the vegetative measure was properly maintained by Rizal Upland Farmers Association (RUFO), while the bamboo plantation for the bank stabilization was then maintained by BLGU Kabasakan, Sagbayan, Bohol in which the area was also located.

2.2 Forest Protection and Law Enforcement

One of the primordial function is to protect the remaining forest resources in our area of jurisdiction. Forest protection the unending punitive work of surveillance and detection, patrol, investigation, apprehension and prosecution. We have protected the total area of 6,500 hectares untenured forested lands, investigated 12 cases of different violations committed and have 5 on-going cases filed in court. (Please see attached cases filed in court). The unit have modernized and maintained monitoring station through Mobile check point. Also monitored transported forest product coming in and out of the Province within the jurisdiction. The unit also conducted LAWIN activity which main purpose is to conduct patrol in every area of our jurisdiction. The activity just started last September 2016 which was composed of four (4) teams; ACARWFR, RSPL, LWFR, and Mangrove Forest with the target area of 10km each team per month. As of September 2016, we had accomplished a total of Sixty Four Kilometers (64 km).

On disposition of confiscated forest products CY 2016, the office had disposed a total volume of 6, 422.33 board feet 15.14 cubic meters per Deed of Donation executed by the DENR and other government institutions. On the other side of operation, we formulated, conducted massive information and education campaign strategy to Local Chief Executives, Barangay Council, Association of Barangay Captains, Sangguniang Bayan, Forest occupants and Users. Forest Rangers and newly hired Three (3) Forest Protection Officers were tasked to attend different meetings in the community where they assigned for the public to be made aware of the various forest protection programs, objectives and updates forestry laws, rules and regulations. Apprehension & Administrative Adjudication and confiscation of Undocumented Product Forest.

Coordination and linkage with other law enforcement agencies resulting to the apprehensions of illegally transported forest products a total volume of 8, 090 board feet of lumber number of different species and locations, three (3) vehicles, two (2) tools (chainsaw) and recipients. (Please see attached annual confiscation report). We also issued two hundred seventy eight (278) chainsaw registration permit including renewal. Involvement of Forest communities in forest protection works . We issued two (2)

Memorandum of Agreement between the Department of Environment and Natural Resources to Taytay Eskaya Tribe and Cantaub Eskaya Tribe. Enforcement Unit has been given ample support by our management especially that the nature of work is now confined not only on the protection of our forest but it is extended to other concerns. They have been tasked to extend a helping hand in minimizing the incidence of all forms of environmental violations. Some personnel requested to

conduct inventory/inspection on trees requested to be cut, inventory of lumber stocks and assist the massive reforestation efforts on the implementation of the National Greening Program for the attainment of the management goals.

Forty four (44) of this is a holder of Wildlife Form Permit while Twenty four (24) are certificate of Wildlife Registration (CWR) and One (1) facility has no permit. We conducted orientation seminar last May 25, 2016 held in Reyna's the Haven and Gardens, Tagbilaran City for deputization of Wildlife Enforcement Officers. Environmental Laws were discussed by different speakers re: RA 7586 "NIPAS Act", RA 9003 "Ecological Solid Waste Management, RA 9072 "Cave Act", PD 705 Revised Forestry Code of the Philippines, RA 9175 "Chainsaw Act", Climate Change and RA 9147 "Wildlife Protection and Conservation Act". We have a target of 13 WEOs deputized and we have accomplished 20 or 154%. Operationalization of Wildlife Traffic Monitoring Unit: CENRO Tagbilaran City has two (2) Wildlife Traffic Monitoring Unit. Tagbilaran City Airport and Tagbilaran City Seaport. Last April 19, 2016 five (5) heads of Pit Viper snakes was intercepted in Tagbilaran City airport. We have an accomplishment of 100%. Biodiversity-related Cases Acted Upon: We have a target of fourteen (14) biodiversity related cases acted and we accomplished thirty two (32). These are wildlife which was voluntarily turned-over and we got 228 %.

2.2.1 Forest Utilization and Regulatory Services Unit

Being a regulatory unit, it is involved in the processing of different kind of application for permits, leases and licenses; monitoring of transported forest products, processing plants and related industries, and conduct of inspection/survey and verification of special land use applications. The Forest Utilization and Regulatory Services Unit conducted inventory/audit of lumber of registered wood processing plants/permittees and registered lumber dealers in order to determine that all lumber supply come from legal sources. In summary, the following are the accomplishments of the unit for the year.

2.2.2 Community-Based Forest Management Unit

Pursuant to the Executive Order No. 263 series of 1995, the Community-Based Forest Management Program is adopted as the national strategy to ensure the sustainable development of the country's remaining natural resources and to promote social justice and equity. Through this program, the government recognizes the capacities, capabilities and efforts of the local community to assist in the protection, rehabilitation, development, and in effectively managing the forestlands in the area including the coastal areas. For CY 2016 the major activity of the CBFM Unit is on the Assessment and evaluation of expiring CSC with an annual target of 3 and with a total accomplishment of 11 expiring CSC was evaluated and submitted to the Regional Office thus accomplishing 167% of the CENRO Tagbilaran target.

2.2.3 Forest Land Use Plan

Pursuant to Republic Act 7160, otherwise known as the Local Government Code of 1991, Presidential Decree 705 as amended, otherwise known as the Forestry Reform Code of the Philippines ; Executive Order No. 192 defining the mandates, organization, and functions of the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR), DENR Administrative Order No. 30, Series of 1992 prescribing the guidelines for the transfer and implementation of DENR functions; the following Manual of Procedures is hereby promulgated to effectively implement devolution of forest management functions and enhance partnership between the LGUs and the DENR.

In conformity with existing laws and in order to train LGU's in developing a sound basis for managing their Forest and Forest Land (FFL) assets through to the establishment of the best areas of these lands and allocate them to responsible resource managers under different forms of tenure, the CENRO Tagbilaran City Technical Assistance Team assist LGU's Loon, Bohol in the finalization and adoption of the FLUP to the Sangguninang Bayan as well as the signing of the Joint Memorandum of Agreement.



2.2.4 LAND MANAGEMENT SERVICES

The land is the basic resource for man's existence thus it is the main concern in the delivery of services under the Land Management Unit of the Office. We can say that land is a limited resource. This is why it is mostly the subject of family conflicts, court litigations, and even international disputes. Concerning disputes over land claims and conflicts, 13 cases were investigated during the year 2016 over the annual target of 10 land related cases that is about 130% accomplished over the target. Aside from that, the main focused of the unit is on the Land Administration and Disposition of Alienable and Disposable land. For land disposition 1,005 residential patents with an equivalent area of 21.6032 hectares were processed over the target of 1,000 residential patent or equivalent to 100% in term of percent accomplishment and all process application was endorsed to PENRO. Of the 1,005 residential patent applications, 488 are male and 517 are female.

Under the CARP Funds, 937 applications processed with final action over the target of 900 with an equivalent percentage accomplishment of 105%, consist an area of 272.8192 hectares. Of this application 415 applicants are male, and 522 are female. On lot survey for residential, the unit accomplished 302 residential lots over the 125 lots targets making a 241% accomplishment. For the agricultural subdivision, a total of 119 lots were surveyed by the team with an equivalent area of 68.8496 hectares. For the survey and mapping foreshore areas, a total of 630.6275 has were accomplished covering ten (10) Municipalities of Albuquerque, Duero, Lila, Garcia Hernandez, Valencia, Loay, Baclayon and Dimiao, Bohol. Moreover, the unit had generated total revenue of Php 1,515,624.09 as of November 2016 over the targeted amount of Php 350,000.00 for CY 2016. The said amount generated from the various fees listed hereunder, to wit:

Maintenance of land records was also of utmost importance. Records include the survey records and public land applications. Part of the maintenance and management of the Land records is the continuing computerization of the public land survey records. For CY 2015 activities involve on the validation of the encoded data of the Public Land Application documents with the accomplishment of 8,991 over the target of 8,991 or equivalent to 100%; on the scanned images validated a total of 98,091 scanned images of PLA document were scanned over the target of 98,091 or equivalent to 100%.

The CENRO-Talibon, an overall performance rating of 143% was accomplished. This figure represents the overall rating for the four (4) units under CENRO-Talibon namely: Conservation and Development Unit (CDU); License, Patents and Deeds Unit (LPDU); Enforcement Unit (EU); and Survey and Mapping Unit (SMU).

Year 2016 has been a crucial and challenging year for the department in terms of accomplishing its programs/projects/activities because of several constraints such as implementation of Rationalization Plan and recently the new administration brought by the 2016 Election. However, with constant monitoring and evaluation, the entire workforce of the department in the CENRO have actively exerted concerted efforts in carrying out the agency mandate, vision, and mission for which it was established. Working for the people with the aid of Divine providence and through the funds specifically allotted for each activity, these resulted to the attainment of accomplishment vis-à-vis the targets as follows:

On the National Greening Program (NGP) which is the banner program of the department, a total of 1,440 hectares or 100% was accomplished as area planted out of the 2,399,040 seedlings. For the maintenance and protection of plantations for CY 2014 and CY 2015, a total of 100% accomplishment was achieved. This NGP regular target has utilized a total budget of P 41,997,000.00 which include seedling production, protection and maintenance of established plantation, site preparation and planting activities and monitoring and evaluation.

For the year, maintenance and protection of mangrove plantations (MBFDP) were given importance due to the essential role that mangroves played in the lives of people along the coastlines, thus 100% accomplishment was achieved with an allotted budget of P 6,845,000.00.

Under Land Disposition/Distribution, a total of 234 or 117% residential patents were processed and issued under RA 10023 over the 200 target for the year. For the Comprehensive Agrarian Reform Program (CARP), a total of 1,732 or 124% agricultural patents were processed and issued. On the other hand, for the management of foreshore areas, applications processed with CSW, reviewed and endorsed to Region were 10 vs 6 target or a 167% accomplishment rate. While on the valuation/re-appraisal of foreshore areas yielded 52 or 130% accomplishment.

In terms of revenue generation, a total of P 479,996.29 was collected from the various fees, fines and penalties and forest charges. There were several facilitating factors that

influenced the implementation of Programs/Projects activities CENRO wide for CY 2016 among others:

- Strong partnership and collaboration with other government agencies, LGUs, POs, academe, private entities and other stakeholders in the implementation of DENR Programs/Projects;
- Intensive IEC campaign on the objectives and goals of NGP and other DENR Programs/Projects;
- Acquisition and use of technologically advanced gadgets, equipment and conveyances, (eg. GPS, tablets, and computers, motorcycles and automobiles for use in the operations, monitoring and supervision of projects)
- Close monitoring and supervision by project managers concerned;
- Hiring of Additional Extension Officers who provided technical assistance of People's Organization (PO) significantly facilitated the accomplishment of NGP targets;
- Continuous consultation, meetings/conferences conducted among the different stakeholders of the project, to include the NGP coordinators, PENROs, CENROs, Extension Officers, People's Organization leaders, and others helped iron out problems and provided solutions in the implementation of NGP;
- POs had already anticipated preparations like seedling production and plantation establishment for the timely out-planting during the 4th quarter of 2016;
- Mass media either from print and broadcast also help in the dissemination of vital information for active participation and empowered citizens volunteering and participating tree planting activities;
- The experience accumulated in conducting FLUP in the past years has resulted to more systematic approach in the formulation of FLUP. It was able to produce strategies that expedite the process without sacrificing the quality of the outcome;
- Most of the members of the FLUP team has months, if not years, behind them in working as a team. This background has significantly contributed to a more dynamic team work. Looking after each other and extending a helping hand to those who needs it and/or lagging behind;

However there were Critical Issues/Challenges Identified among them are as follows:

- Limited number of technical personnel in every units to focus on specific targets/activities;
- Unpredictable climatic condition in the province during first, second and third quarter which caused stagnant accomplishment of NGP targets (extended summer in the locality);
- Political intervention (changes of set of officers);
- Delayed payments of billings sometimes result to undue delay in the targeted timeframe to accomplished each NGP activities as reflected in the approved work and financial plan;
- Unit cost for the maintenance and protection of established plantation was relatively low, cannot suffice the prevailing operational cost of fertilizer, labor cost and other volatile market forces. A substantial increase would translate

effective plantation maintenance activity that would result to higher percentage of survival rate;

- NGP sites are not accessible to vehicles, hence volunteers hesitate to participate considering its rugged terrain and its relative distance from the accessible road;
- Informal settlers are profound in the forest land areas; contributing to the problem of the implementation of government projects;
- No sustainable livelihood for the fisher folks and farmers;
- Conflict schedules between the DENR and LGU would sometimes result to undue delay in the finalization of the FLUP. In many instances, the LGUs would either postpone them or unable to provide the needed personnel to assist the FLUP Team assigned in the area;
- Lack of interest by the people to apply residential patent because of the many requirements to complied;
- Minimal action or no actions taken in issues identified.

Measures taken to address the identified bottleneck/constraints to effectively implement the policies, programs and projects are the following:

- With the aforementioned constraints, the CENR Office addressed some issues and concerns through immediate reassignment of qualified and skilled personnel from the effect of Rationalization Plan. This somehow contributed in the attainment of regular targets of the CENRO for CY 2016. Additionally, the Office had deployed hired contractual employees to focus in the progress of the project implementation especially the NGP targets as one of the priority programs of the Department. Close monitoring and supervision were done to immediately address any problems and issues identified to avoid any difficulty in project implementation.
- Also, with the cooperation and support of LGUs, PNP, Military and POs, the implementation of environmental laws and protection measures from ridge to reef should be strictly abided and followed in order to protect and manage the mangrove and upland areas. Strategies that could be undertaken to address the issues are to conduct intensive Information Education Campaign (IEC) with the concerned communities, provide livelihood opportunities in order to minimize the impacts of illegal activities on mangrove stand, coastal areas and forest land areas. Moreover, provide fund for the conservation, management, maintenance and protection of the established plantations and existing resources.
- Finally, employees were encouraged to enroll further studies and attend local and might be foreign training/capacity building to enhance their capacity, knowledge and skills to deliver services required to accomplished targets and projects/programs activities. This would also improve their performance to be rated in the preparation and submission of their Individual Performance and Commitment Review (IPCR) form.

Assessment of Stakeholders' response: participation, compliance, application or utilization of outputs provided.

True enough to its mission as the driving force in the pursuit of sustainable development, enabling stakeholders' participation in the protection, conservation, and management of the environment and natural resources for the present and future generations, and, being mandated as the primary government agency responsible for the conservation, management, development, and proper use of the county's environment and natural resources, as well as the licensing and regulation of all natural resources as may be provided by law in order to ensure equitable sharing of the benefits derived therefrom for the welfare of the present and future generations of Filipinos, the DENR CENRO Talibon workforce has functioned all throughout the year towards achieving all of the foregoing objectives.

With the aid of the Information Education Campaign (IEC) activities conducted either through personal and written communications or through broadcast media for greater awareness pertaining to DENRs' programs and policies, stakeholders/clientele were encouraged to avail of the services offered such as the National Greening Program (NGP), Free Patent Application (FPA), or information as to being vigilant in reporting illegal activities, participation in Tree Planting activities, or actions how to help spread Wildlife Conservation, promote adoption of private tree plantations and other programs/activities geared towards environment and natural resources development and protection.

The office fostered transparency of transactions and safety of properties. Closed Circuit Televisions (CCTV) were installed and Citizens Charter were posted in strategic locations of the Office to provide guidance to clients and the general public pertaining to transactions with the office. The anti-Red Tape posters were made visible at the entrance doors of the office to ensure a credible service delivery. Bidding of contracts of the approved projects were done in PHILGEPS/electronic bidding.

The office had established linkages to Local Government Units (LGU), State Universities and Colleges (SUCs), Non-Government Organizations (NGOs), Civil Society Organizations (CSOs), People Organizations (POs) and other government agencies in dealing with Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation and Social Mobilization wherein they are encouraged to do their part individually and collectively in the conservation and protection of environment and natural resources. For everything that CENRO Talibon has accomplished vis-à-vis its mission and mandate, the same is offered for the benefit of its stakeholders/clientele.

MAJOR PROGRAMS AND PROJECTS IMPLEMENTED

The CY 2016 Programs/Projects/Activities under the Major Final Outputs contributed to the attainment of the Organizational Outcomes on the CENRO, PENRO, Regional and National level in achieving Efficient, Effective and Responsive Environment for Sustainable ENR Management. Implementation of its major programs/projects was guided by the provisions of some landmark legislations.

1.1 FOREST MANAGEMENT

Environmental problems become one of the global issues that needs the attention and cooperation of every nation in the world. The Philippines is not alone in its battle against illegal logging and other forms of activities that destroys the environment that causes extreme poverty hunger, and climate abnormalities.

Major Final Output (MFO) 1 (Ecosystem Policy Services)

A. Preparation and Updating of Climate-Resilient Plan

1. Forest Land Use Plan Preparation and Assessment

Under Executive Order No. 318, “re: Promoting Sustainable Forest Management in the Philippines. The Local Government Unit (LGU’s) are mandated to incorporate Forest Land Use Plan (FLUP) into their Comprehensive Land Use Plan (CLUP). Forest Land Use Planning (FLUP) activities for 2016 was in full swing towards the end of 3rd quarter to the target municipality of Buenavista, Bohol. Activities were geared towards LGUs that already have made commitment for the completion of their FLUPs. For LGUs who have signified their intention to formulate their own FLUPs, coordination was made and machineries were put in place in the collaborative process. The activities mentioned ranges from preliminary consultation and plotting of activities; data gathering and thematic mapping; conduct of situational analysis; writing workshops; FLUP drafting, presentation and subsequent adoption by the Sanguniang Bayan and endorsed to the DENR Regional Office thru PENRO.

The DENR-CENRO, Talibon provide technical assistance in the preparation and formulation of Forest Land Use Plan to LGU-Buenavista, Bohol and Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) signed by the



Local Chief Executive of Buenavista and DENR to formalize the respective responsibility and commitments. The Municipal Technical Working Group (MTWG-Buenavista) was created through an E.O. No. 05 dated March 21, 2016 to undertake the planning activity in coordination with DENR and the Provincial Government through BEMO.

Orientation on Governance Oriented Forest Land Use Plan conducted to MTWG-Buenavista last April 8, 2016 with the assistance of DENR-CENRO and DENR-Regional representatives to provides an overview of FLUP process and discussion of governance principles (functionality, transparency, accountability, and participatory decision – making) that needs to be integrated in the preparation and formulation of the plan.

In April 26, 2016 the DENR-FLUP Team provided technical training workshop to MTWG-Buenavista in preparation to field activity to reviewed and further clarified before they are deployed in the field. The MTWG are organized into three (3) groups (social preparation, community profiling and mapping). This is to prepared/initiate MTWG-FLUP team's in field activity particularly in data gathering and the required data and maps for the assessment of present socio-economic condition as well as the status of forest and forest land. The activity covers for the month of May to August 2016 (4 months) to all forestland barangays in the Municipality of Buenavista and complete the required data as based line information for the next module (Situational analysis).

Then with all data information, Situational Analysis & planning workshop was conducted with DENR-CENRO and DENR Regional representative last September 6-8, 2016 to introduces the MTWG the essence of conducting situational analysis and orient participants on policies and relevant criteria in prioritizing forest land and generating preliminary recommendations and identifying issues based on the validated socio-economic and cultural information and corrected/updated thematic maps.



In October 12-14, 2016, DENR-FLUP team provides technical assistance in Strategic planning workshop to MTWG-Buenavista to be able to formulate initial road map for implementation of Forest Land Use Plan (FLUP). The Forest Land Use Plan (FLUP) created by the MTWG with the assistance of DENR and agreed by the main partner & stake holders (LGU-Buenavista) will be the basis to start the journey towards the intended outcome/ impact and to include periodic assessment to transform the plan into

strategic process.

Finally, last October 10-11, 2016 with Municipal Mayor Ronald Lowell G. Tirol and MTWG-Buenavista, presented their initial FLUP output before the **Regional Technical Management Board (RTMB)** as chaired by Regional Director Emma E. Melana for refinement, suggestions and recommendations to be incorporated in the Forest Land Use Plan (FLUP) of Buenavista Bohol.

2. Community Resource Management Framework (CRMF) Updating

The office is continuously conducting Community Resource Management Framework (CRMF) updating to existing CBFMA holders and applicants for CBFMA. CRMF is plan with duration of twenty-five



(25) years. This is to give the POs a concrete set of activities that can become the stepping stones towards progress and development. This year, one (1) CRMF updated of PO- Malungtarong Mag-uuma sa Salog (MAMSA) located at Salog, Getafe, Bohol and 1 CRMF formulated of PO- Magsaysay Farmers Association (MFA) located at Magsaysay, Talibon, Bohol.

The Department of Environment and Natural Resources protects the environment and its resources by regulating the utilization of the major and minor forest products for personal and commercial purposes.

B. ENR Data Management

1. Forest Resource Assessment

We have also conducted Forest Resource Assessment (FRA) in two (2) Tracks namely: (a) Track No. 240 located Kauswagan, Trinidad, Bohol and (b) Track No. 241 located at Benliw, Ubay, Bohol. Series of activities to be done in assessing the established tracts areas such as relocation, re-establishment, re-measured and re-inventoried.

On May 24, 2016 the team conducted relocation of the plot points that was previously relocated and used by the Forest Resource Assessment Team for CY 2015 FRA. The team used the “Total Station” in relocating and at the same time re-measuring the distances of each plots. There are four (4) plots in every tracking areas which forms a perfect square all with 90 degrees angle. The four (4) plots must have a distance of 500 meters from one plot going to the next plot in order to achieve an area of 250,000 square meters or 25 hectares. That after relocating and re-measuring the precise plot points, the team re-established the said plots by burying boundary markers (*See Annex A for more Geo-tagged Photos on both Track Nos. 240 and 241*). The team re-numbered the said plots based on the accessibility of the first plot from the reference points of each Track Nos. The numbering of each plots are now different from its previous numbering. The Plot 4 of Track No. 240 is change into Plot 1 and the Plot 3 of Track No. 241 is changed into Plot 1. After the relocation, re-measurement, re-establishment and re-numbering of the Plots of each tracks, the team proceed to the re-inventory or re-assessment of the plots and the trees growing along its axis and 10 meters on both left



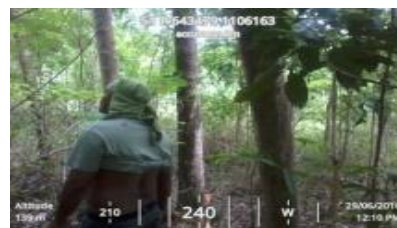
axis and right axis from the first 250 meters of each plot going to the next plot. These activities were done on both Track Nos. 240 and 241.



The said activities were all accomplished on May 27, 2016 using strategic actions such as division of labor and shared responsibilities based on each member's skills and specialization. The continued effort of the department to be of service to the citizenry and at the same time regulating the utilization of the country's natural resources will go on for the sake of the present and future generation.

2. Forest Products Utilization and Price monitoring

DENR-CENRO, Talibon is always proactive in implementing the prescribe guidelines and procedures in regulating the movement of the forest/natural resources within its jurisdiction. Our office has been flexible in implementing new guidelines in the utilization of forest products. One of the guidelines is the issuance of Tree Cutting Permits (TCPs) of the planted trees within the areas issued with Certificate of Tree Plantation Ownership (CTPO). For the forest products utilization and monitoring, a total of Eighty Seven (87) applications for Certificate of Tree Plantation Ownership (CTPO) have been approved and currently monitored (*See table 2*), together with the other approved CTPOs from previous years as one of the requirements in transporting forest products from the plantation owner to the lumber dealer or end user and the issuance of Tree Cutting Permits. Since the start of the implementation of the issuance of Tree Cutting Permits for Private Tree Plantations, our office has issued thirty-four (34) approved Tree Cutting Permits duly cleared by the DENR-7 Regional Office. The office has registered a total of one hundred twenty two (122) chainsaws, which consists of the newly registered chainsaws and the renewal of existing chainsaws. In order to prevent proliferation of chop-chop/assembled chainsaw, the office is conducting actual inspection of the chainsaw followed by a memorandum report from the inspecting officer (*See table 3*).



For CY 2016, there are eleven (11) registered Lumber Dealership establishments within CENRO, Talibon. Five (5) of it has and will operating this CY 2016 and the remaining six

(6) registered Lumber Dealers will be expire for this year and already filed applications for renewal (*See table 4*). In order to secure and monitor the movement of forest products particularly the major forest products, the office conducted on-site inventory and monitoring of lumber stocks in the lumber yards of registered lumber dealers. For the issuance of transport permits such as Self-Monitoring Form and Certificate of Verification the office has issued 492 (SMF-97, COV-395) in totality in reference to the different forest products (*Please see table 5*).

For CY 2016, computerized monitoring, assessment and reporting of forest conditions was put in place with the help of Forestry Information System (FIS) in order to boost up the management of tenured and untenured forestlands. Furthermore, FIS data maintenance and operation has been a regular task at the PENR and CENR Offices, a continuing target since the previous years. Given that account, the office accomplished one (1) FIS maintained and updated and populated with data since it is an amalgamated forestry application scheme that provides a capability for the efficient management of forestry data to support decision-making and policy formulation. It provides forest managers with the ability to view the profile, project area details, frameworks, plans, programs and accomplishments of tenured areas and their respective geographical information for proper monitoring, assessment and review of the area status and the performance of the tenure holders. With these, the office maintained two (2) tenurial instrument holders namely: (a) Balamban Aggregates & Construction Corp. Inc.'s Boat Landing Site located at Barangay Bagacay, Talibon, Bohol and forty five (45) CBFMA holders(*See Table 6*).

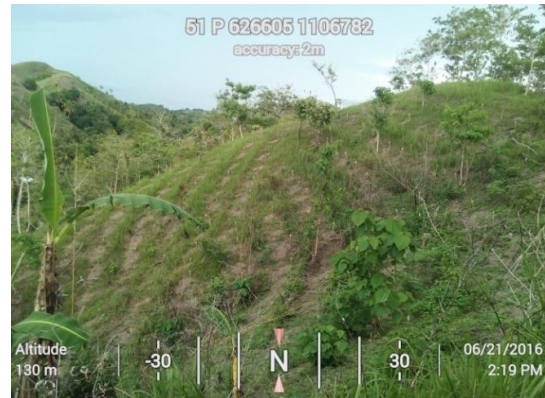
A. Forest Development and Rehabilitation and Protection

National Greening Program (NGP)

As time passes by, things become different. Most of the forest lands are sacrificed and forced to become subjects to man's domain and personal interest. What is more devastating is the widespread illegal logging of vast hectares of forest land in the mountainous areas and watersheds. With this situation, President Benigno Simeon C. Aquino III issued Executive Order No. 26 declaring National Greening Program (NGP) as priority program and now expanded through Executive Order 193 series of 2015 otherwise known as "Expanding the Coverage of National Greening Program (NGP)" in order to harmonized all forest development activities that will encourage and enhance the development of forest plantations. For the period under review, the implementation of the National Greening Program (NGP) for CENRO Talibon was a challenging and difficult one.



Once again, our office were not spared by the changing climatic conditions which brought havoc to our newly established mangrove plantation and upland reforestation. In effect, this phenomenon was considered to be part of our calendar event for the year. The sixth year of implementation of National Greening Program gave great challenge not only to the people directly involved in the program but also to the partner-peoples organizations (POs) as well as partner- agencies whose responsibilities commended to them were narrated in Executive Order No. 26.

However, the entire CENRO Talibon workforce was not embarrassed to regain, maintain and accomplished our mandated task. Before that, numerous LOA's were entered to various Peoples Organization, MLGU's, BLGU's (40 POs, 35 BLGU's, and 5 MLGU's) which translate to 3,118,773 or 130% seedlings produced against its target of 2,399,040 having 719,773 excess with has an equivalent area developed of 1,440.0 hectares (100%) under our NGP regular funded target and only timber commodity was involved. (Please see Table 7,8, 9, 10 & 11).



A total of 5,545 hectares of established plantations were maintained and protected in the year 2014 and 2015 which correspond a survival rate of 85% and 86% respectively. Project recipients continued to perform ring weeding, strip brushing, fertilizer application and constructed firelines for upland and removal of sea barnacles and algal bloom for the lowland areas to ensure 100% maintenance and protection of the plantation sites. Replanting was done to conciliate mortalities, patrol works was done regularly by the PO members and to strengthen forest fire protection, thus, a forest fire brigade were created (See Table 12 and 13).

Likewise, our office was also a recipient of Mangrove and Beach Forest Development Project (MBFDP) in response to the magnanimous destruction of our mangrove and beach forest during the previous years notwithstanding the current denuded state of aforementioned ecosystems. With that, a total of 2,691.0 hectares were reportedly



established in CY 2015 and a 100% accomplished for maintenance and protection this year with a survival rate of 88% respectively (See Table 14).

Overall, the office had protect and maintained for the year a total of 16,646.10 hectares established plantation including the Mangrove and Beach Forest, BFP and other vital watershed areas at various NGP sites under the jurisdiction.



On the other hand, NGP CY 2016 has a total projected job of 3,435 and actual job generated of 10,027 distributed in 17 municipality as describe in the (Table 15). The National Greening Program promotes POs' inclusion in all NGP projects by strengthening their participation in natural resources management, conservation, protection, enhancement of productivity and decision-making. This year, CENRO Talibon has been much focused to hasten the project. With this quarterly Consultative/POs meeting was conducted by the CENR Officer with the technical personnel together with the concerned peoples organizations (POs) to persistently update the status of the project.

Survey, Mapping and Planning (SMP) was conducted later in September in order to pave the way for the smooth implementation of the expanded coverage of NGP beginning 2017, accompanied with site assessment for accurate identification of suitable species/commodity. This should be the basis for instituting Letter of Agreement (LOAs) by the POs and other partner stakeholders.



Considering how a sound financial management would help further in the implementation and augmentation of POs livelihood, thus quarterly meeting was conducted to updates status and progress of each target activities correspondingly to each billings and to address issues and concerned. Additionally, Convergence Planning Workshop was conducted within Carood watershed sometimes in November. The workshop was intended to assess the seven (7) municipalities under Carood Watershed namely: Ubay,

Carood Planning Workshop on following SIADM Scheme @ Lake Sideview Restaurant, Guindulman, Bohol.

Pilar, Mabini, Guindulman, Alicia, Anda and Candijay, the area status and the prominence area subject for development. Enhancing NGP from ridge to reef approach is the main objective of the workshop following our DENR Secretary Regina Lopez paradigm "Sustainable Integrated Area Development and Management (SIADM). It was participated by the different sectors of the government inside Carood Watershed such as DENR, LGUs, DAR, DA, BFAR and DPWH. In connection, just this November, another 1,000 hectares of Mangroves and 500 hectares of bamboo was added to this year

regular target of NGP that covers 9 municipalities and the implementation start early next year.

To verify and came up a comprehensive assessment on the status of 2011-2016 NGP plantation, two (2) batches of validating teams came to conduct the said activity. One was the 100% validation on CY 2011-2015 established plantations conducted early this year by the regional office personnel together with our Extension Officers and other DENR personnel, of which some negative findings in the sites within 2011-2013 established plantations for having very low survival rate. Hence, the CY 2011-2013 has no budget for maintenance and protection, but CENRO Talibon was fortunate enough because in the last quarter of the year, savings from Capital Outlay amounting to P3,932,560.00 granted in 3,932.56 hectares more or less that covers 36 people's organization's (POs) for them to perform maintenance and protection activities such as replanting, brushing and fertilizer application. Because of this, the CY 2011-2013 plantation recovered an 85% survival rate.

Monitoring and Evaluation team from PENRO Bohol was deployed to account and verify the correctness of POs request for inspection of activities conducted, with corresponding amount based on Work and Financial Plan per periodic billing of the reported physical accomplishments, on area and seedlings planted, total seedlings produced, and maintenance and protection activities. To promote transparency, photo documentation were taken in actual locations from different plantations, geo-tagging was conducted in every POs and by polygon, and of course M & E Team was assisted by assigned PMs and Extension Officers, respectively.

Prior to its sixth year of implementation, intensified IEC still conducted to continually inform the local people on the vision and mission of NGP, address other issues and concerns encountered during previous implementation, and aware one's environmental responsibility to combat climate change. Several meetings, pulong-pulong, coordination and appearances to local officials were done during the first and second quarter of the year.

The attainment of the CENRO Talibon targets can be gleaned upon the active support of our CENR Officer, field officials, Extension Officers, various stakeholders foremost the LGU's, other government agencies, the SUC's, local media, PO's and private entity and other partners that rallied behind in support to the NGP. Without the full support, the implementation of NGP would be somehow difficult and struggling, hence, we would like to extend our appreciation to all those in one way or other helped in fulfilling our mandate.

Final output of our NGP 2016 are the collective efforts coming from various Peoples Organization, volunteers, private entities, students from academe and of course dedicated Forest Extension Officers including field personnel who advocate in restoring our once lush forest.

HIGHLIGHTS: DENR SECRETARY'S VISIT IN BOHOL

Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) Secretary Regina “Gina” Lopez finally came to Bohol last November 8, 2016 via chopper after her two (2) consecutive unrealized scheduled visit. Before she touched down to her target destination which is the Coffee Plantation established by People’s Organization (PO) of



Ubay Federated Tree Planters Association, Inc. (UFTPAI) located at San Pascual, Ubay, Bohol, Secretary Lopez conducted aerial survey with her team for NGP sites namely: PO-NASFIMAPA of Nasingin, POs-BAFMAPA, BAGSAMA and BLGU Banacon all from municipality of Getafe; PO-GGSSO of Guindacpan and BLGU Calituban all within the

municipality of Talibon, Bohol. After an hour of aerial viewing to the pre-identified areas they touched down at Mega Nursery DENR CENRO Talibon located at San Pascual, Ubay, Bohol. On the short prepared program, she gave her messages. Secretary Lopez emphasized that DENR intervention prioritized the benefits of the environment and the majority, not only to the few who have vested



interest. She also mention the importance of Sustainable Integrated Area Development and Management (SIADM) scheme in order to ensure success and to eliminate poverty. This can be done through convergence initiative of the key players following the science based approach of implementation. The DENR should not limit only on the regulatory functions but also leads in the development that helps to uplift the lives of the unfortunate or else making better difference of the community. Feeling the interest of the community in helping the environment and their necessity to have any source of income, planting of bamboo is recommended knowing that bamboo has a universal use. Because of this, an additional target was given covering an area of 1,500 hectares of which 500 hectare is bamboo and 1,000 hectares mangrove. The bamboo target will be implemented within Carood Watershed area covering seven (7) municipalities, to wit: Ubay, Alicia, Candijay, Pilar, Mabini, Anda and Guindulman, while mangrove targets will be implemented adjacent to it. This is such to hit the ridge to reef approach. She also articulated to everyone that failure is not an option, that we have to succeed and deed

gage would be happiness. Lastly, she imparted that the true essence of public service were truth, service, common good, passion and most of all love of GOD.

Major Final Output (MFO) 3 (Ecosystem Regulation Services)

1. Community-Based Forest Management

Community-Based Forest Management (CBFM) is a strategy for sustainable forestry development by implementing projects that provide livelihood support and opportunities to alleviate the beneficiaries' economic and social status. As stated in Executive Order No. 26 of 2011, CBFM/A is *"an agreement entered into by and between the government and the local community in a locality, represented by a people's organization as forest managers, for a specific period wherein the local community is allowed to develop, utilize and manage a small tract forest land consistent with the principle of sustainable development."*

This year, thirteen (13) People's Organizations (POs) that are, at the same, CBFM Holders were fortunate assisted and monitored and given a technical support to the project implementation by the office, hence the said project was a continuing activity because it was started last year CY 2015 that certainly aid the economic growth of its members or additional source of income for the stakeholders. Other activities were conducted in relation to the implementation of the CBFM program. For sustainable development of the different POs, a monitoring was conducted. A total of forty-five (45) active POs were monitored this year.

An assessment was also made to Certificate of Stewardship Contract (CSC) holders. This is to monitor whether the CSC holders are compliant with the terms and conditions stipulated in their contracts. This will also form part in their participation in the CBFM considering that renewal of CSCs are subject to the holders participation in a people's organization awarded with a CBFMA. The Office had targeted a total 3 Certificate of Stewardship Contract (CSC) holders.

Under this activity, the evaluation team conducted performance evaluation of CSC holder accomplishment on present area development, data gathering of beneficiary information using the pro-formatted questionnaire, perimeter survey and geo-tagging of plantation on expired SCS as basis for its renewal and/or cancellation.

Based on the actual area validation and computation derived from the pro-formatted questionnaire, the office rated the tenure holder and likewise endorsed the list of CSC holders for renewal and/or cancellation. Out of 3 target, the office had accomplished and assessed a total of 5 CSC which is 167% accomplishment (*See Table 16*). For this year, there are eight (8) people's organizations who applied for CBFMA. These PO's have



already conducted CBFMA orientation and assisted in the processing of the application and all of which are within the Integrated Natural Resources and Environmental Management Project (INREMP) site.

In order to come up with these accomplishments, strategies were undertaken. The Unit has prepared planned of activities every month so that all field activities performed by the People's Organization (PO) should be properly monitored/supervised and evaluated in accordance with the given targets. Attendance to POs meetings has been strictly observed in order to know the status and progress of all activities within the CBFM area particularly in relation to slippages/backlogs so that catch –up plan should be prepared. Immediate response of the PO's requested assistance for billing problems encountered in their field operation activities, forest protection like illegal cutting of trees, land conflicts and others and act as mediator with recommendation in accordance with the existing DENR policy rules & regulation. Also, conducted continuous Information Education Campaign (IEC) for awareness of the community.

HIGHLIGHTS UNDER COMMUNITY-BASED FOREST MANAGEMENT (CBFM)

The ASEAN Members States (AMS) and Republic of Korea (ROK) in consideration of the urgent need for closer cooperation on forests between countries in contributing to advance study of forests, forestry and forest rehabilitation and the strengthening of the capacities of states in coping with global climate change issues have established the ASEAN-ROK Forest Cooperation (AFoCo) with a mission to rehabilitate degraded forestland and to prevent forest degradation in the context of Sustainable Forest Management (SMF) as well as under the broader scope of addressing the impact of climate change.



Information Education Campaign (IEC) was conducted at Nueva Esperanza, Bien Unido Bohol and Malingin, Bien Unido Bohol.

The Office was so fortunate for the funding support from ASEAN-ROK Forest Cooperation (AFoCo), hence, Philippines as one of the ASEAN Member States (AMS) is a signatory to the Agreement on AFoCo and participated in the implementation of its programs, projects and activities in forestry sectors and as one of the implementing countries of the AFoCo Region Project Component 2 entitle as “Capacity Building on Improving Forest Resources Assessment and Enhancing the Involvement of the Local Communities to address the Adverse Impact of Climate Change” aim to enhance the involvement of the local communities in forest related activities to address climate change and strengthening their resilience through alternative livelihood. DENR 7 is one of the hosts of the training for Local Communities on Developing Alternative Livelihood to address the Impact of Climate Change

conducted on January 19-21, 2016 attended by the members and officers four (\$) People's Organizations (PO's).

Since, Malungtarong Mag-uuma sa Salog (MAMSA) is a DOLE-registered People's Organization (PO) and holder of Community-Based Forest Management Agreement (CBFMA) and is one of the participants of the training and submitted climate-change resilient livelihood proposal entitled "Fishpen Establishment and Mangrove Rehabilitation" was chosen as one of the climate-change resilient livelihood projects of AFoCo Regional Project Component 2 beneficiary amounting to P50,000.00, to developed 1 hectare of mangrove and 1 fishpen.

2. Forest Protection

The DENR is mandated to be the primary government agency responsible for the conservation, management, development, and proper use of the country's environment and natural resources, specifically forest and grazing lands, mineral resources, including those in reservation and watershed areas, and lands of the public domain and wildlife species, both flora and fauna, for the welfare of the present and future generations of Filipinos. Its core functions is to (1) formulate and implement policies, guidelines, rules and regulations relating to environmental management and pollution prevention and control. (2) formulate implement and supervise the government's policies, plans and programs pertaining to the management, conservation, development, use and replenishment of the country's natural resources and ecological diversity and (3) promulgate and implement rules and regulations governing the exploration, development, extraction, disposition, and use of the forests, lands, minerals, wildlife, and other natural resources.

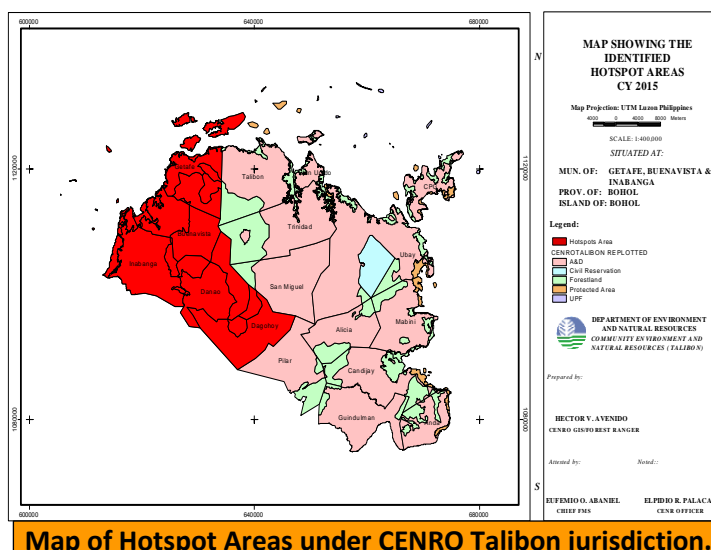
The Enforcement Unit of DENR CENRO Talibon is primary responsible for the implementation of the different Environment and Natural Resources (ENR) laws, rules, policies and regulations through conduct of patrol, monitoring, and surveillance of the different environmental related activities such as the exploration, development, extraction, disposition, and use of the forests, lands, minerals, wildlife (both flora and fauna), and other natural resources. For CY 2016, the Enforcement Unit were able to accomplish its target and even extended its service outside the approved work and financial plan for said year.

IMPLEMENTATION OF FOREST PROTECTION PLAN

In order to prevent further denudation of the remaining forestlands and other natural resources in our environment and as a support to the reforestation activities of the government and other stakeholders, CENRO-Talibon through the Enforcement Unit strengthens its campaign against illegal logging, illegal wildlife trading and other means of abuse and degradation towards the country's natural resources pursuant to the existing ENR laws, rules, policies and regulations particularly under CENRO Talibon jurisdiction.

CENRO Talibon through the Enforcement Unit was able to protect daily the 4300 hectares of untenured timberland areas covering the municipalities of Anda, Getafe, Buenavista, Inabanga, Guindulman, Dagohoy, Candijay and Pilar, all in the province of Bohol. CENRO Talibon even extends its protection to other municipalities under its jurisdiction who have timberland areas and protected areas also – the municipalities of Talibon, Trinidad, Bien Unido, Ubay, Pres. Carlos P. Garcia, Alicia, Mabini, San Miguel and Danao, Bohol and the rest of the timberland areas of the first eight (8) municipalities.

For a stronger implementation of the environmental laws and protection of the remaining forestlands, CENRO-Talibon conducted joint patrol works together with the deputized law enforcement agencies such as the Philippine Army, the Philippine National Police, and other agencies in order to neutralize or minimize the illegal logging and illegal wildlife trading practices of the people especially to the protected areas and watershed areas. CENRO-Talibon initiated intensive operations against illegal logging and transporting of forest products – and also illegal wildlife trading – which are common violations of the people. There is a constant monitoring on illegal shipments of forest products, wildlife species and other natural resources from in and out of the jurisdiction of the DENR-CENRO, Talibon, Bohol through the established mobile check points within its area of responsibility, especially in the identified hot spot areas.



MAINTENANCE AND PROTECTION OF 2011 – 2013 ESTABLISHED PLANTATIONS AND PREVENTION OF HOT SPOT RECURRENCE

Through the ongoing implementation of the National Greening Program through Executive Order 26, Series of 2011, CENRO Talibon has established thousands of hectares of plantation from year 2011 up to present. However, there are no budget for the maintenance and protection of the established 2011 – 2013 NGP Plantations under the NGP Budget. Per approved work and financial plan, CENRO Talibon hired seven (7) forest protection officers. (*See Annex B- List of hired Forest Protection Officers*) Their primary work is to conduct patrol, particularly of all the 2011 – 2013 NGP Plantations to prevent the occurrence of illegal activities and forest fires that would destroy and damage the newly established plantations. Moreover, in order for the hire forest protection officers to do their work, CENRO Talibon maintained three (3) motor vehicles namely the Nissan Pathfinder, Isuzu Dmax and Adventure that is used for the mobile patrol, surveillances and monitoring of the different established plantations. For CY 2016 a total area of one thousand five hundred forty-nine and 73/100 (1,549.73) hectares

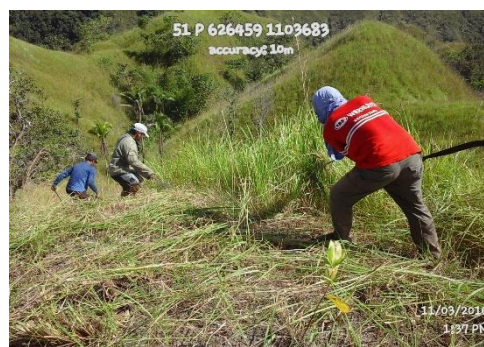
were reported damaged because of forest fire occurrence wherein CENRO Talibon was able to file three (3) cases against the identified suspects of forest fire burning that damages the newly established plantations. In addition, these motor vehicles are also used to extend the assistance of the forest protection officers in the conduct of mobile checkpoint, patrol, surveillance and monitoring of illegal logging, wildlife trading and illegal transport activities of forest products and wildlife species.

One technique to prevent forest fire occurrence inside the established plantations is to construct fireline. CENRO Talibon was able to established a total of two thousand hectares (2,000 has) of fireline in thirteen (13) people's organizations with CY 2011 – 2013 established NGP plantations with a total amount of P 688,000.00. Such activity is a great help to minimize the risk of forest fire occurrences. Twelve (12) POs out of thirteen (13) is contracted with Letter of Agreement (LOA) while the remaining one POs is managed directly by the department through hiring of labourers to construct fireline (*See Table 17 – Summary of Contract for Establishment of Fireline Construction*).

PROSECUTION OF CRIMINAL COMPLAINT

The forest protection and law had been vigorously and effectively implemented in the office and because of the unwavering environmental protection activities through constant monitoring, patrol, and surveillance of the different environmental activities and violations committed by private individuals, CENRO Talibon was able to file a total of seven (7) cases before the Office of the Provincial Prosecution, Tagbilaran City. Five of which are forest related cases – two (2) cases for violation of Section 77 (formerly Section 68) of Presidential Decree No. 705 also known as “*Forestry Code of the Philippines*” as amended and three (3) cases are for violation of Section 78 (formerly Section 69) of same Presidential Decree. The remaining two (2) cases are for violation of other environmental laws – one is for violation of Section 7 of Republic Act No. 9072 wherein the five (5) violators were convicted by order of the court and the other one is for violation of Section 103 of Republic Act No. 7942. (*See Table 18 - Report on Cases Filed in Court*)

Concerned personnel of CENRO Talibon attended the hearings, preliminary investigations of the cases that are filed in the Office of the Provincial Prosecution and proper court. In addition, CENRO Talibon personnel attended the other hearings of the others cases filed in previous years that are still ongoing. Because of the noble achievements done by the office particularly the Enforcement Unit, it yielded and

boosted the morale of DENR field operatives conducting anti-illegal logging operations thru a well-coordinated effort with the deputized law enforcement agencies such as the Philippine Army, PNP, Forest Rangers and other agencies.

ACTIVE COLLABORATION AND INVOLVEMENT OF FOREST COMMUNITIES AND OTHER STAKEHOLDERS IN FOREST PROTECTION AND LAW ENFORCEMENT UNDERTAKINGS

The Philippine Government acknowledges the major roles of the different communities, private and civic institutions for a better implementation of the environmental laws, rules, policies and regulations and protection of the timberland areas and remaining forest of the country particularly the existing forest communities such as indigenous people communities. For CY 2016, CENRO Talibon encourages the involvement for forest protection works of the indigenous peoples, particularly the Eskaya Tribe communities that are within the area of jurisdiction of CENRO Talibon. The DENR entered a Memorandum of Agreement by and between two (2) Eskaya Tribe Communities. Two (2) MOAs were issued. The first MOA was entered into by and between the DENR represented by PENR Officer Nestor M. Canda and the Chieftain of Eskaya Tribe Community in Lundag, Pilar, Bohol and the second MOA was by and between the DENR and the Chieftain of the Eskaya Tribe Community in Biabas, Guindulman, Bohol.

CENRO Talibon and the two (2) Eskaya Tribe Communities works together in order to protect and preserve the natural forests within their ancestral domains. Through a Memorandum signed by CENR Officer Elpidio R. Palaca, Forest Rangers Jefrey Datahan and Eugenio Lloren were designated as the focal person of CENRO Talibon to directly coordinate with the two (2) Eskaya Tribe communities. As a note, CENRO Talibon was able to conduct a meeting with proposed members of the joint Multi-Sectoral Forest Protection Council (MFPC) and Anti-Illegal Logging Task Force (AILTF) within the Municipality of Getafe, Bohol. However, the said organization of said council or task force was not push through because of no financial support and was removed from the approved work and financial plan. Despite of that, CENRO Talibon still continues to coordinate with the other government agencies such as the local government units and Philippine National Police for the protection and conservation of the country's environment and natural resources.

CENRO Talibon conducted and attended meetings to other government agencies for providing and promoting awareness of the importance of protecting and conserving our environment and natural resources against the abuse and destruction brought by vested interest of few private individuals. In addition, information materials were developed and distributed – 1133 pieces of brochures – to different people's organizations and communities.

APPREHENSION AND ADMINISTRATIVE ADJUDICATION AND CONFISCATION OF UNDOCUMENTED FOREST PRODUCTS

For CY 2016, a total of twenty-nine (29) cases of apprehension activities particularly in illegal logging and transporting of forest products without legal documentation were reported.

The said apprehensions were made through the assistance of the different enforcement agencies such as the Philippine Army, the Philippine National Police, Local Government Unit, concerned citizens and the DENR Personnel of CENRO Talibon. Ten (10) out of twenty-nine (29) apprehensions were issued with Confiscation Order by the DENR VII Regional Director. *(See Table 19- Report on Illegal Logging: Apprehensions, Seizures and Confiscations of Forest Products, Conveyances and Implements)*



The apprehended forest products, conveyances and implements were haul and transported to DENR CENRO Talibon Compound for proper disposition and safekeeping in accordance with the existing laws, rules, and regulations. However, other apprehended items were left under temporary custody of the barangay officials of the place where the forest products together with the conveyances and implements were apprehended and seized. Hauling activities were done by hiring vehicles such as trucks and/or using the office vehicles. The Office initiated the construction of lumber shade to be used as depository area within CENRO Talibon compound for the hauled apprehended forest products. The CENRO Talibon hired two (2) laborers to construct the said lumber shade that is functional but not yet fully accomplished because of limited budget.



Other Apprehensions Conducted

Aside from apprehending forest products and its conveyance and implements. CENRO Talibon



through the efforts of Enforcement Unit apprehended illegal transport of quarry materials. Per record, CENRO Talibon has four (4) apprehension activities involving transport of quarry materials. The same were forwarded to Bohol Environment Management Office (BEMO) under the Office of the Provincial Governor's Office.

TRAINING, DEPUTATION & MOBILIZATION OF WILDLIFE ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS (WEOs)

CENRO Talibon was able to train fourteen (14) participant last May 12, 2016 coming from the Philippine National Police, Philippine Coast Guard and Local Government Unit. Eleven (11) from the Philippine National Police, two (20 from the Philippine Coast Guard and one (1) from the Local Government Unit of Talibon, Bohol. After the training, the participants were deputized and mobilized in their respective assignment in concurrent capacity of their present assignment given by their higher authorities. *(See attached "Annex C" - List of WEOs for CY 2016)*

APPREHENSION/SURVEILLANCE OF BIODIVERSITY RELATED CASES

CENRO Talibon conducted thirty-one (31) activities through surveillance and Wildlife Mobile Checkpoints on biodiversity related cases particularly in three major entry and exit points located in the municipalities of Getafe, Talibon and Ubay, Bohol. In addition, CENRO Talibon conducted surveillance against illegal wildlife trading in the Municipality of Anda, Bohol where a Tarsier Habitat is being protected.

A total of seven (7) different wildlife species were voluntarily turned to CENRO Talibon from private individuals. Some of these turned-over wildlife species were already released back to the wild while the others are still temporarily deposited in the Wildlife Rescue Center of CENRO Talibon. *(See "Annex D" – List of Turned-Over Wildlife Species)*

OTHER ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Knowing that during summer season, there is a high risk of forest fire occurrences, CENRO Talibon conducted Forest Fire, Pest and Disease Management Training Workshop last March 3 - 4, 2016. Selected people's organization were requested to attend the said training workshop especially those National Greening Program sites that are fire prone areas. The said training was facilitated by the personnel coming from the Enforcement Division of DENR VII Regional Office. The training aims to equip the participants with the knowledge and techniques that can help improve their way of prevention forest fire occurrences in their respective established plantations.



Implementation of LAWIN Forest and Biodiversity Protection System

Pursuant to Joint FMB-BMB Technical Bulletin No. 2016-01, LAWIN Forest and Biodiversity Protection System came into existence to enhance the protection of forest and biodiversity using open-source technology for biodiversity and threats monitoring through a smartphone application. LAWIN Patrols were conducted by the Forest Rangers composing four (4) teams led by the CENR Officer Elpidio R. Palaca and For. Edgar L. Ricafort in the natural forest within CENRO Talibon jurisdiction.

Because of LAWIN Patrol, CENRO Talibon was able to apprehended illegal cutters of Mapsa or Bayokbok trees on September 28, 2016 in Almaria, Anda, Bohol and was eventually filed a complaint before the Office of the Provincial Prosecutor against the two (2) violator, the chainsaw operator and his helper.

One western philosopher has this philosophy that human being is part of one infinite substance together nature, time, space, etc. All of these parts are interconnected causal effect with one another. It can be concluded that actions that are undertaken by human beings towards nature – environment and natural resources – has an interconnected causal effect to all parts of what Spinoza claims to be one infinite substance, whether it is good or bad, life giving or life taking.

1.2 LAND MANAGEMENT

Major Final Output (MFO) 2 (Ecosystem Management Services)

The 1987 Philippine Constitution provides for the promotion of social justice to all citizens in all phases of national development Art. II section 10, one of which is to give equitable access to these resources, land for the landless. The land distribution program was revitalized to address the needs of the lowland poor communities in line with its mandate of managing and disposing Alienable and Disposable lands. As mandated, the CENRO Talibon processed and issued a total of 234 or 117% residential patents vs the target of 200 residential patents. On the other hand, for Comprehensive Agrarian Reform Program (CARP) under RA 10023, a total of 1,732 agricultural patents were processed and issued vs 1,400 patents targeted for the year or a 124% accomplishment rate. It shows 895 female applicants and 1,489 male applicants for free patent.

On the management of foreshore areas, applications processed with CSW, reviewed and endorsed to Region were 10 vs 6 target or a 167% accomplishment rate. While on the valuation/re-appraisal of foreshore areas yielded 52 or 130% accomplishment. Disposition of land cases is overwhelming accomplishment. The many applications generated, filed and processed at the CENRO are most expected that not all land claims are free from adverse claims which are all welcome at the office. A total of 100% accomplishment rate for this year. Issuances of Order of Investigation in these cases are all transmitted to PENRO for proper litigation.

On the other hand, Residential Lot Survey (RA 10023) was undertaken at Municipality of Candijay, Bien Unido, Dagohoy, Ubay, Anda, Danao, Guindulman, and Talibon, Bohol. A total of 163 resultant lots surveyed or 130% accomplishment rate vs. 125 targets for the

year. Aside from residential survey, subdivision of agricultural lots was also undertaken to generate more applications for agricultural patents. Pulong –pulong with the barangay officials together with the lots claimants and to those who are interested to avail the free residential survey is conducted before the survey executed to appraise their obligations and the manner of the survey. Priorities were given to lots with no public land application, free from conflicts and disputes and a certification from LGU that the area is within the residential zone and not needed for public use. It is agreed that they must apply for the subdivided lots only. The office hired two (2) Geodetic Engineers to assist in the verification of submitted survey returns respectively.

Moreover, Foreshore perimeter survey was also conducted and maps for ten (10) municipalities in preparation of the final base map of foreshore areas and submitted to the Regional Office, namely: Ubay, Pres. Carlos P. Garcia, Buenavista, Anda, Bien-Unido, Getafe, Mabini, Talibon, Gindulman and Candijay, Bohol. Unfortunately, for Land Records Management, targets on validation of encoded data and validation of scanned images were not fully accomplished because a private contractor will do the job, accordingly, there is already a winning bidder.

- Only 4,000 encoded data (5%) were validated against the 16,000 target for the year;
- 4,000 scanned images (5%) were validated over 16,000 target.

1.3 PROTECTED AREAS AND BIODIVERSITY CONSERVATION

Major Final Output (MFO) 2 (Ecosystem Management Services)

1. Management of Protected Areas

The outcome of this activity is very much necessary for this will ensure sound decision making in the light of an effective Protected Area Management. The Protected Area Management Board (PAMB) is the site decision making body as defined in RA 7586 otherwise known as NIPAS ACT of 1992 and its Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR) defined by DAO 26-2008.

The Protected Area Superintendent (PASu) and Assistant Protected Area Superintendents (APASu) of DENR CENRO Talibon together with the Protected Area Management Board (PAMB) of the six protected areas, mandated under the National Integrated Protected Area System Act (also known as R.A. 7586) convened for its quarterly PAMB meeting in their respective protected areas. There were 24 PAMB

meetings conducted for the year resulting to 30 PAMB Resolutions formulated as compared to the 24 target PAMB Resolutions with a performance rating of 125%. In particular, Ubay Mangrove Swamp Forest Reserve and Wilderness Area (UMSFR/WA) and Getafe Mangrove Swamp



Forest Reserve and Wilderness Area (GMSFR/WA) needed to conduct special meetings in order to cater the demands of their various stakeholders for the approval of several proposals, projects or development projects.



Conduct of IEC and Advocacy Campaigns

This activity is a regular objective per approved Work and Financial Plan. The main purpose of this activity is to raise the level of awareness of the Protected Area communities in an effort to mitigate the timber poaching and illegal hunting and trading of wildlife species.

Information Education Campaign (IEC) and advocacy campaign were mainstreamed to the regular activities of the office thru Barangay Consultation/Assembly, Pulong-polung, Capacity Building for DENR Employees and Stakeholders, Celebration of events such as International Day for Biological Diversity, Earth Day, Ocean Month, and others. The strategies employed were printed IEC materials (e.g. leaflets, posters, tarpaulin) and in the form of powerpoint presentation during lecture series, radio plugs, and even live interviews.



PA Management and Habitat Protection

Also, CENRO Talibon personnel and the PAMB members protected and managed a total area of 13, 949.47 hectares of the entire protected areas in its jurisdiction (*Please see Table 21*).

Implementation of Biodiversity Monitoring System

In order to enhance the management and habitat protection, the Biodiversity Monitoring System (BMS) was implemented



in the six (6) protected areas of CENRO Talibon. The protected area's biodiversity includes many life-forms so the purpose of BMS is to collect data on the natural biological resources occurring in the protected areas. Thus, for CENRO Talibon it serves as the tool in determining the baseline data on the existing resources in its protected areas particularly in the mangrove areas.

The outcome of this activity provides input for the Protected Area management Board (PAMB) in aide for policy issuance. In the conduct of Biodiversity Monitoring System (BMS), there were four (4) methodologies employed namely: Transect walk with PA communities as guide to described and show the location of the area and noting the flora and fauna; Focus Group Discussion (FGD) to qualitatively gather information from the community; Field Diary (FD) maintained by DENR personnel to monitor the trend uses of resources within PA and the day to day activities of the community; and Photo Documentation (PD) to monitor changes as to the extent of farm lots/areas within PA.

Also, the result of the transect walks expressed in individuals/km revealed that mangroves from family Rhizophoraceae and Acanthaceae had the highest density and that ants, birds, fiddler crabs and mangrove snails were the common fauna observed. The Biodiversity Monitoring System is conducted periodically in the same assessed area in order to monitor and ensure that the biodiversity of the protected area is maintained and that any changes in its biodiversity will be detected.

2. Protection and Conservation of Wildlife

Conservation and Protection of Tarsier

Brgy. Almaria, Anda, Bohol is located in the Northeastern part of Bohol Province with Geographical Coordinates, Latitude 9° 45' 50.11", Longitude 124° 33' 3.80". Approximately, it is 5 kilometers away from the town proper and can be reached through land transportation system such as motorcycle and other 4 wheel type vehicles.



The area has topography mountain ranges with variables valleys diminishing their height until reaching the flat terrain going to the town proper. The type of vegetation dominated the area are mostly secondary growth forest, some of which are open and relatively bared with patches of cultivation for some perennial and high valued crops. Secondary growth forest accredits the existence various wildlife species of the area particularly tarsier which has been considered as flagship species for biodiversity conservation in Bohol.

Conduct of Surveillance and Patrol Works

The presence of technical personnel and laborers in the area who have conducted regular surveillance and patrol works strengthen the protection not only for tarsier but also for other wildlife species both flora and fauna. With the assistance of Team Lawin of the Enforcement Unit about 250 bd.ft. of sawn lumber of Bayokbok tree species were apprehended and prosecuted two respondent in court Mr. Tiburcio Ligutan and Mr. Ryan Marinay both residents of Almaria, Anda, Bohol.



Information Education Campaign (IEC)

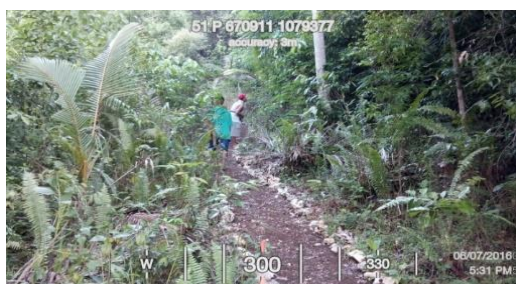
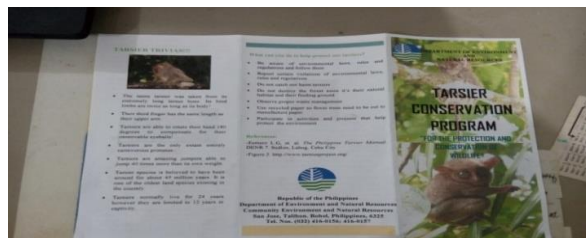
One of the effective strategy to promote community awareness regarding the importance and value of wildlife particularly tarsier is through IEC. About one hundred eleven (111) leaflets were distributed not only in the locality of Anda particularly Almaria but also within the adjacent municipality of Candijay.



Aside for leaflets, meeting was conducted on July 27, 2016 which was attended by 25 local stakeholders of Sitio Tinugdan, Almaria. Highlights of the meeting include the importance of tarsier in the ecosystem, its morphology, diet and other unique features. Moreover, the roles of the community for the effective management and protection of tarsier and other wildlife species in the area were discussed.

Establishment of Foot Trails and Conduct of Biodiversity Monitoring System (BMS)

To improve the conservation and protection aspect and promotes sustainable use forest resources, Biodiversity Monitoring System (BMS) was conducted in Sitio Tinugdan,



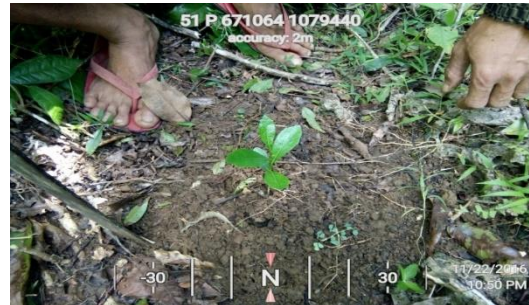
Almaria, Anda, Bohol. Its focuses on identifying/collecting data on wildlife resources present in the area including use, rate of utilization and treats. BMS trails were laid-out along patrol routes where tarsiers are mostly observed so they can be visited frequently as part of regular patrol works. For easier access during monitoring, permanent foots trails with a distance of 1.5 km were established through the efforts of hired laborers and technical personnel of the area.

Enrichment Planting

Considering the fact that Brgy. Almaria is largely dominated by mountainous terrain, majority of its inhabitants are dependent on the forest resources for livelihood resulting to



the cultivation of flat



terrain or valley sometimes reaching up to the middle slope of the hills. Along this line, the need for enrichment planting is highly observed. Hence, about 20,000 seedlings of host tree for tarsier were successfully raised during the first quarter and seasoned for about five (5) months in preparation for transplanting. These tree species include Alahan, Manalo, Mamalis, Bitanghol and Mag-itom. As the onset of rainy season started middle of September enrichment planting has been started and aimed to be finished first week of December 2016.

3. Wildlife Risk Management and Emergency Response Program

Water Bird Census

This year's a waterbird census was done simultaneously. The count was conducted by the CENRO personnel. The sites visited were the Mahaba Island in the municipality of Talibon, Bohol and Malinao Dam in the municipality of Pilar, Bohol. The same areas were revisited in order to monitor the trends in migration and number of species in every migration. The monitored sites have significant uniqueness when it comes to the physical and ecological attributes of the sites. Substratum characteristics is sandy muddy in Mahaba Island and muddy in Malinao Dam. These two areas are the permanent monitoring sites for migratory birds being monitored every month, thus, CENRO Talibon has undertaken 24 censuses endorsed to the Regional Office. Further, Mahaba Islet is also part in the protection and management

of the Protected Area Management Board of Talibon Group of Islands Protected Landscape and Seascape (TGIPL/S).

The migratory bird count was conducted on a fair weather condition. Highest count and number of species were observed in the months of January, February and March when the wetland is very exposed. Different species of

waterbirds in Mahaba Islet were observed and noted such as the sandpipers, whimbrel and Eurasian curlew with sandpipers as the dominant species observed, while in Malinao Dam, Pilar, Bohol native wild ducks were observed as the dominant species. Other waterbirds such as waterhen, egret, watercock and rails also thrives in the area. Wetlands serve as feeding grounds for the waterbirds. The rich and variety of vegetation aids in maintaining the food chain in the area. The maintenance and protection of the area helped in preserving the migratory bird area. However, protection of these birds need to be strengthened, imposed and implemented because of the rampant poaching in the area. The present number of species counted will still increase once protection of these species will be strictly implemented.

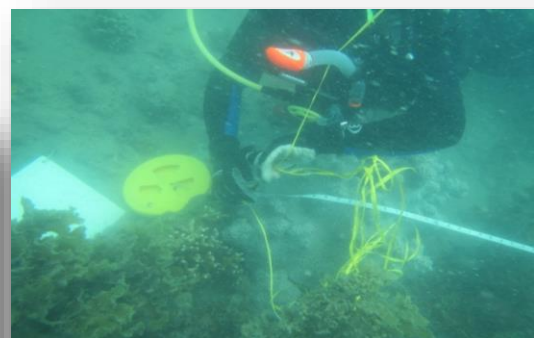
Consideration, Ecotourism is a big venture these days. The protection of migratory birds will open opportunities for livelihood in the communities. This can be a potential ecotourism area that will cater to the visitors who love to observe migratory birds, their behavior and patterns. Community-based ecotourism when best implemented, can provide benefits to the people in the community.

Management of Coastal Marine Resources/ Areas

The Department also provided technical

assistance in the conduct of the Integrated Coastal Management (ICM) Planning Workshop in Pres.

Carlos P. Garcia last September 27-30, 2016. There were 22 Barangay Captains who participated the activity along with the representatives of the other government agencies such as the Department of Agriculture (DA), Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) and Department of Health (DOH).

One of the preliminary activities before the ICM Planning Workshop is the Participatory Coastal Resource Assessment (PCRA) which was accomplished last July 5-8, 2016. PCRA serves as an important tool in gathering and analyzing information especially zoning and resource mapping. In Pres. Carlos P. Garcia, there were 22 coastal barangays with assessed mangroves, seagrass and coral reef ecosystems. Transect walks were also conducted in these barangays noting the flora, fauna and other significant observations in the area. Socio-demographic data were also gathered through the interview of local residents composed of the barangay captain, fishermen, barangay health workers, barangay secretary and members of the People's Organization.

The result of the PCRA revealed that the mangrove ecosystem of Pres. Carlos P. Garcia is in excellent condition. The seagrass ecosystem of the municipality was determined to be in fair condition. However, the coral ecosystem was rated in poor condition. Also, the socio-demographic interview revealed significant data in different aspects of the survey. There were various inputs given by speakers during the four-day ICM Planning Workshop especially the topics on Fisheries Management, Coastal Law Enforcement, Solid Waste Management, Livelihood Management, Protected Area Management and etc. Furthermore, the ICM Planning Workshop guided the participants in establishing their coastal zones and coastal resources at the same time focused on the plan of addressing and solving the concerns and issues occurring in their respective barangays.

Other Activities

In accordance to the Coral Triangle Initiative on Coral Reef Fisheries and Food Security (CTI-CFF), CENRO Talibon joined the annual Coral Triangle Day celebration. The Philippines being part of the Coral Triangle Initiative together with other five countries namely Indonesia, Malaysia, Timor-Leste, Solomon Islands and Papua New Guinea aims to raise awareness on the threat of plastic waste pollution on marine ecosystems as well as preserve the marine diversity brought by the coral ecosystem through promoting a clean coastal environment.

In line with this, CENRO Talibon conducted a coastal clean-up last July 9, 2016 in San Francisco, Talibon, Bohol which is also within the Sustainable Coral Reef Ecosystem Management Program (SCREMP) wherein Barangay Officials, local residents and about 47 DENR employees joined the said activity with a total of eight (8) sacks of garbage collected.

Major Final Output (MFO) 3 (Ecosystem Regulation Services)

Processing & Issuance of wildlife permit

The Biodiversity Management Section (BMS) has undertaken the DENR's thrust and programs and in compliance with the approved 2016 Physical and Financial Plan. It has successfully accomplished its targets as per quarterly target is concerned. There are 11 or (100%) CWR holder permits monitored and 52 or (130%) wildlife local transport permit issued. The mandate of the sector is the conservation of the country's biological diversity in CENRO-Talibon through: establishment, management, development and protection of the National Integrated Protected Areas System; conservation of wildlife resources; and information and education for nature conservation.

While, the Revenue collection under CENRO Talibon has continued to accumulating with a total of Php 479,996.29 of which represented to wit: FMA – 162,941.25, LMS- 309,995.04 and PAWS- 5,100.00 respectively. *(See Table 22 for details)*. The attainment of our CENRO targets can be gleaned upon the active support of our field personnel and of course thru the cooperation of various stakeholders, foremost the PO's, the LGU's, other government agencies, private entity and other partners that rallied behind in support to all the implemented targets especially to the National Greening Program.

Without the support of other stakeholders, the implementation of targets would be difficult and struggling hence, an expression of gratitude to all our partners-collaborators must be extended for we need to further strengthen our alliance and still looking forward for collective undertaking in the years ahead

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION AND SUPPORT SERVICES

The activity of General Management and Supervision involves the exercise of general management and supervision over the operations of the sectors and units in the CENRO – Talibon Office. It includes the provision of administrative, financial and security services necessary to carry out the substantive operation of the CENRO. The priority concerned of our office was the management of personnel, property and supply management, records management, budget and collection.

► On Personnel Management

On personnel management, under this activity were the preparation of papers and documents relative to employee's appointment, promotion, resignation, transfer, retirement and claims for disability and sickness benefits, salaries and allowances including other monetary benefits including CNA and bonuses. Another was the screening and/or evaluation of applicants for on the job training. It has also maintained personnel records and statistics of personnel complements. Finally, the Section has also performed liaison works with GSIS, PAGIBIG, PHILHEALTH, and BIR and to other official transactions. The entire indicator activities under this major task have been fully complied by the section and accomplishment are way ahead of the target.

During the year, the Office has transformed to a more efficient and effective way of monitoring Office personnel attendance thru digital Biometric System. This was done in order to impose personnel discipline and to practice honesty and integrity among the personnel of CENRO-Talibon as embodied in the Integrity Development Action Plan of the DENR. Likewise, in order to support the security requirements of the Office, the Officer of the Day has been revived and hired security guard for supplementary precautions. The Administrative Unit has also properly maintained Office Workplace and corridors by regularly monitoring the activities of janitorial services.

► On Property and Supply Management

Property and Supply Management has maintained and operationalized all the government vehicles assigned in the Office. It also maintained and secured the Office building and grounds by hiring a janitorial and security services. The Office has also conducted Property Inventory and conducted disposal of unserviceable properties thru public bidding/auction. The Office has also conducted repair and maintenance of office equipment's and procured goods and services following the Philippine Government Procurement Act (RA 9184). Finally, the communication services have also been managed by the Office in order to maintain easy access of official information inside and outside of the office.

In order to provide supports in terms of office procurement of goods and services in accordance with RA 9184, the Office was required to submit the Annual Procurement Plan and the organization of the Bids and Awards Committee. This has also been monitored by the Office. Likewise, assistance in the form of visit to different field units was done by the Regional Personnel's together with the Chairman of the Bids and Awards Committee. The Administrative Officer being the Chairman of the Committee has also actively involved in the monitoring of different infrastructure projects and other professional services being contracted by the Office before billing payment is made.

► On Records Management

In Records Management under this activity task is to ensure the proper flow of office communication be it outgoing and incoming communication as well as the proper dissemination of official issuances of the DENR and other government agencies. The office has also conducted certification and authentication of official documents. As far as the accomplishment is concern, the office has accomplished more than the target for the year.

► On Financial Management

Budgeting – the following activities were accomplished : Prepared and submitted the CENRO Talibon Financial Plan for CY 2016 and Budget Proposals for CY 2017 of the CENRO Talibon in coordination with the PENRO Planning Officer and Management Unit; processed payrolls/vouchers, requisitions, report of collections and disbursements.

SUPPORT TO OPERATIONS

The activities under the support to operations are services relating to planning coordination and programming (STO- A.II.a), monitoring and evaluation of programs and activities (STO- A.II.b). The Planning and Management of CENRO-Talibon were able to accomplish the activities expected during the year, like: Prepared the Office's annual work and financial plans for CY 2017 in coordination with the different sections and different line operating units of CENRO Talibon and PENRO.

On monitoring and evaluation of programs and activities the Planning and the counterpart personnel of each designated activities were able to accomplish the following: Consolidated the units monthly reports, prepared annual report, and monitored and validated all the projects that were implemented and maintained under CENRO-Talibon jurisdiction. On Management and Information services the Planning was able to update the data base of the CENRO-Talibon Office on ENR through the preparation of its annual statistical profile.

■ On the Formulation and Monitoring of ENR Policies, Plans and Programs and Projects.

The Planning and the Management and its counterpart personnel on the different units were able to accomplish the following activities expected of them for CY 2016:

- Prepared and submitted FY 2017 Physical and Financial Plans and 2016 work targets/budget proposals in coordination with the PENRO Planning and different operating units of CENRO Talibon. Prior to finalization of the PFP for 2017, a workshop was immediately done after the Regional Reprogramming Workshop. This was done to facilitate the finalization of the plan while at the same time to level-off with the field implementers on how to go over accomplishing their targets.
- Conducted two (2) consultation meetings with the Sector and PENRO Planning Officers, first consultation was called to discuss with the CENRO Talibon staff the budget and priority activities for the year while the last one was called in order to assess their performance at the same time level-off on what and how to go with the activities for the ensuing year.
- Monitored the submission of monthly reports of different operating units in the CENRO and consolidated those report for submission to PENR Office and other offices authorized to receive such report; and
- The reported accomplishments of the different units have been validated.
- Despite of the budgetary constraints and lack of permanent manpower of CENRO Talibon to carry out the tasks related to ENR, the Office, however, accomplished with a batting average of more than 100%. Other intervening activities were

rendered, particularly to walk-in clients, requiring legal advise on ENR utilization and public lands acquisition.

SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

Environmental awareness plays a vital role in understanding our surrounding, including the laws of the natural environment, sensitivity to all the changes occurring in the environment, and the cause-and-effect relationships between the quality of the environment and human behavior. It is also how the environment works as a system, and a sense of responsibility for the common heritage of the Earth, such as natural resources - with the aim of preserving them for future generations. While it is far from universal, more and more people understand that we need to sustainably manage our planet's resources and ecosystems. This awareness has been growing for about a century, but has picked up momentum in the past decade. Evidence of deep support as we celebrated some environmental events to aid our advocacy in the protection, conservation, preservation of such resources and as accompanied by an increased worldwide environmental awareness as well.

For 2016, CENRO Talibon celebrated various environmental events which grasp a total of eight (8) events against its four (4) target events. In pursuant to the Presidential Proclamation No. 74, series of 1999 declaring February 2 of every year as national wetlands day and is celebrated internationally as **World Wetlands Day**, a mangrove planting in Bacbacan, San Francisco, Talibon, Bohol was held. About twenty-four (24) DENR employees joined the said activity with a total of one thousand (1,000) propagules planted.

For this year's theme: Wetlands for our Future, Sustainable Livelihoods to demonstrate the vital role of wetlands for the future of humanity and specifically their relevance towards achieving the new Sustainable Development Goals. To reinforces the inextricable link between wildlife, people and sustainable development, celebration of the **3rd World Wildlife Day** on March 3, 2016 was conducted with the theme "*The future of wildlife is in our hand*". It is therefore, our responsibility to safeguard wildlife for the following generation. Relative to this, the DENR, CENRO-Talibon released 28 species of wildlife in various areas. Table below shows species distribution.

above issues on land degradation. Furthermore, one of the highlights for the event was the celebration of the **Philippine Arbor Day** which has been institutionalized to be observed every June 25 throughout the nation by planting trees and other forms of relevant activities. The necessity to promote a healthier ecosystem for the people through the rehabilitation and re-greening of the environment was stressed in Proclamation No. 643 that amended Proclamation No. 396, s. 2003. Proclamation No. 396 enjoined the “active participation of all government agencies, including government-owned and controlled corporations, private sector, schools, civil society groups and the citizenry in tree planting activity”. With this, CENRO Talibon conducted a *Simultaneous Tree planting* to various places within the jurisdiction. A total of **40.86** hectares were covered having **43,118** seedlings planted with a total **517** participants from different partners as shown in the table below (see attached photo-documentation).

The Environment Management Bureau (EMB) is one of the Line Bureau of the Department of Environmental and Natural Resources responsible for the protection, restoration and enhancement of environment quality towards good public health, environmental integrity and economic viability to protect our finite natural resources, attuned to the pursuit of sustainable development, for a clean and healthy environment that enhances the Filipino quality of life for present and future generation and specifically forest and grazing lands, mineral resources, including those in reservation and watershed areas, and lands of the public domain, as well as the licensing and regulations of all natural resources as may be provided for by law.

As a line agency, the Environmental Management Bureau (EMB) is responsible in implementing and enforcing environmental laws in the country. These laws includes Philippine Environmental Impact Statement (PEIS) System (PD 1586), RA 8749 known as The Philippine Clean Air Act of 1999, RA 9003 Known as Ecological Solid Waste Management Act of 2000, RA 9275 Known as The Philippine Clean Water Act of 2004, and RA 6969 Known as Toxic Substances and Hazardous and Nuclear Wastes Control Act of 1990 and RA 9512 known as Environmental and Education Awareness Act. This report is prepared to present the annual accomplishment of EMB-Bohol in 2016. This contains targets and accomplishments vis-as-vis the above laws.

Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) System Compliance Monitoring (PD1586)

The Philippine Environmental Impact Statement System (PEISS) (PD 1586) is implemented in the country as a requisite in obtaining the Environmental Compliance Certificate (ECC). EIA is a “process of predicting and evaluating the likely impacts of a project as well as the ensuing preventive, mitigating and enhancement measures to protect the environmental and the community’s welfare.” EIA is undertaken as a precursor to ECC issuance. The ECC contains sets of conditions that are necessary for the project to comply with the existing environmental regulation.

Under this, there are Seven (7) performance indicators set: 1) Project surveyed applied for ECC. 2.) ECC Compliance Monitoring. 3) Complaint Acted upon. There were Eight (8) acted complaints. 4) Firms monitored for those issued with Discharge Permit for waste water. 5) Firms monitored those issued with Permit to Operate (Air). 6) Beach Watch in the Municipality of Panglao (monthly). 7) MMT Monitoring. Presently there are four (4) MMT active in the province.

EMB-Bohol identified two (2) projects that started constructing, developing and operating without an ECC and Thirty five (35) monitored projects with an ECC subject to Notice of Adverse findings relative in their operation. These projects were subjected to imposition of the maximum penalty of Php 50,000.00. Moreover, there were One hundred fifty six (156) projects issued with ECC as to the compliance to their ECC conditions. Attached table is the list of ECC issued to the different establishment in the province of Bohol.

Pollution Control Division

Other main functions of EMB is to ensure that air emissions and water discharges of establishments would pass the standard set by law.

In the Clean Air Act implementation, there are Twenty five (25) establishments inspected in connection with the application for permit to operate such as rice and corn mills and power generating set and other production related operation equipment. In the Clean Water Act implementation (RA 9275), there were Twelve (12) establishments monitored with permit compliance and Twenty (20) surveyed without compliance to permit issued.

As regards hazardous wastes generator, there were Thirty Three (33) establishments monitored and registered to ensure that RA 6969 were being enforced. Hospitals have been included in the list.

As mandated by RA 9003, all LGU's in the province of Bohol should have practiced waste reduction, segregation, segregated transport, recycling, composting and finally using a sanitary landfill as disposal site for residual wastes. There were forty seven (47) municipalities and one (1) city monitored and evaluated for LGU's Best Practices.

Other related activities such as monthly water sampling conducted within Sea water of Panglao Island for about Ten (10) resorts, conferences, seminars, regular monthly meeting of the Provincial Mining and Regulatory Board (PMRB) were attended to ensure proper coordination and linkages with other line agencies and non-government organizations to pool manpower resources, to help implement environmental laws.

On Solid Waste Management Sector

One of the mandatory requirements under Republic Act 9003, known as the Ecological Solid Waste Management Act of 2000, is that all City/Municipal Local Government Units (LGUs) should formulate the 10-Year Solid Waste Management (SWM) Plan. It has been observed that only very few LGUs have submitted the plan to the National Solid Waste Management Commission (NSWMC) and these plans were conditionally approved since it did not follow the annotated outline prescribed by the NSWMC.

The Solid Waste Management Sector under the Bohol Environment Management Office (BEMO) is mandated to provide technical assistance to the City/Municipal Local Government Units (LGUs) in the formulation of the 10-year Solid Waste Management (SWM) Plan; to act as secretariat in SWM decision making bodies like the ESWM Provincial Board, Provincial ESWM Technical Working and the Albuquerque Cluster Sanitary Landfill. To professionalize the services rendered by the Sector, the staffs are sent to capability development. Hereunder are the accomplishments of the Sector.

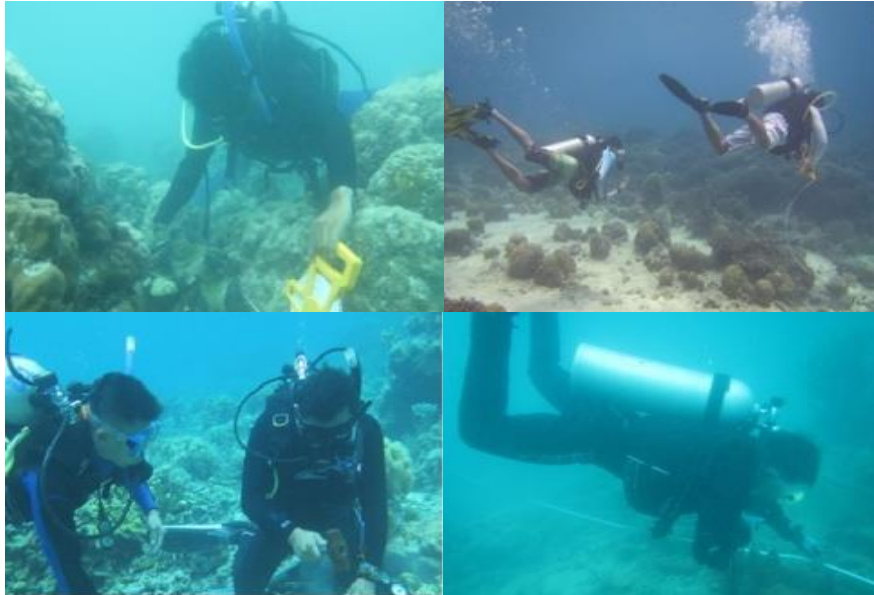

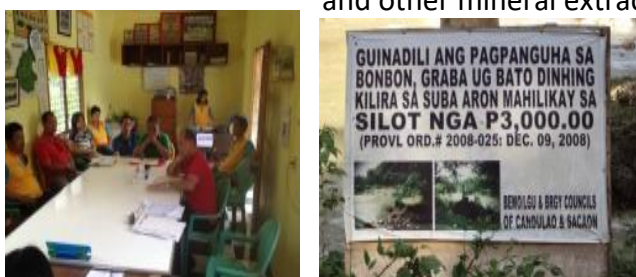

It has four (4) project components:

- **I-PLAN** (Investments in AFMP Planning at the Local and National Levels)
- **I-BUILD** (Intensified Building up of Infrastructure and Logistics for Development)
- **I-REAP** (Investments in Rural Enterprises and Agriculture and Fisheries Productivity)
- **I-SUPPORT** (Implementation Support to PRDP)

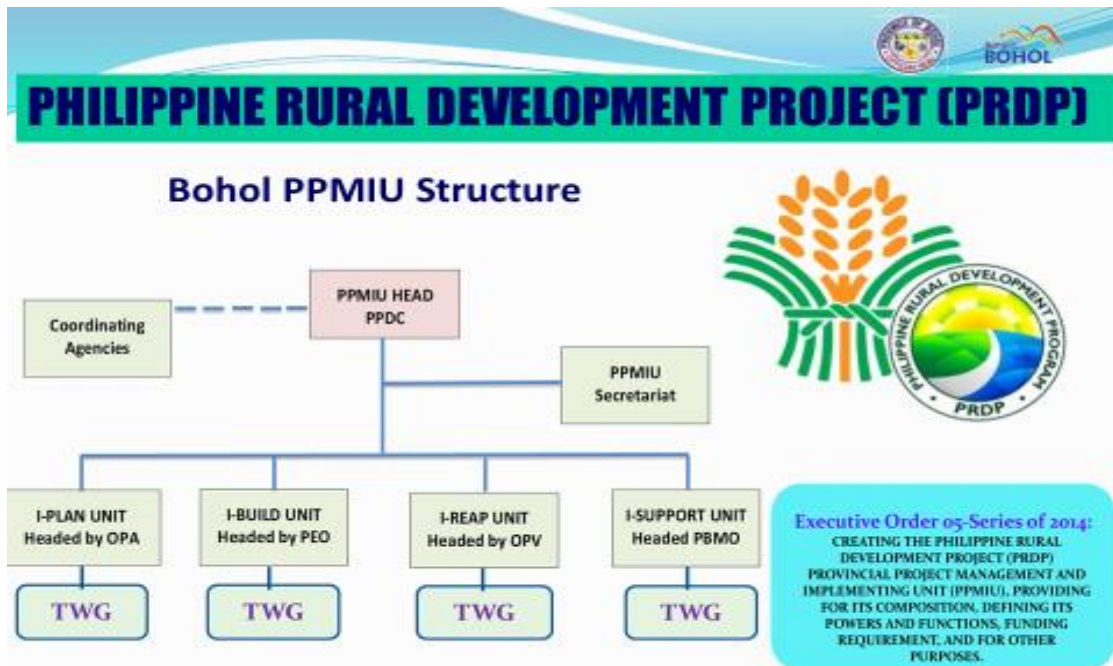

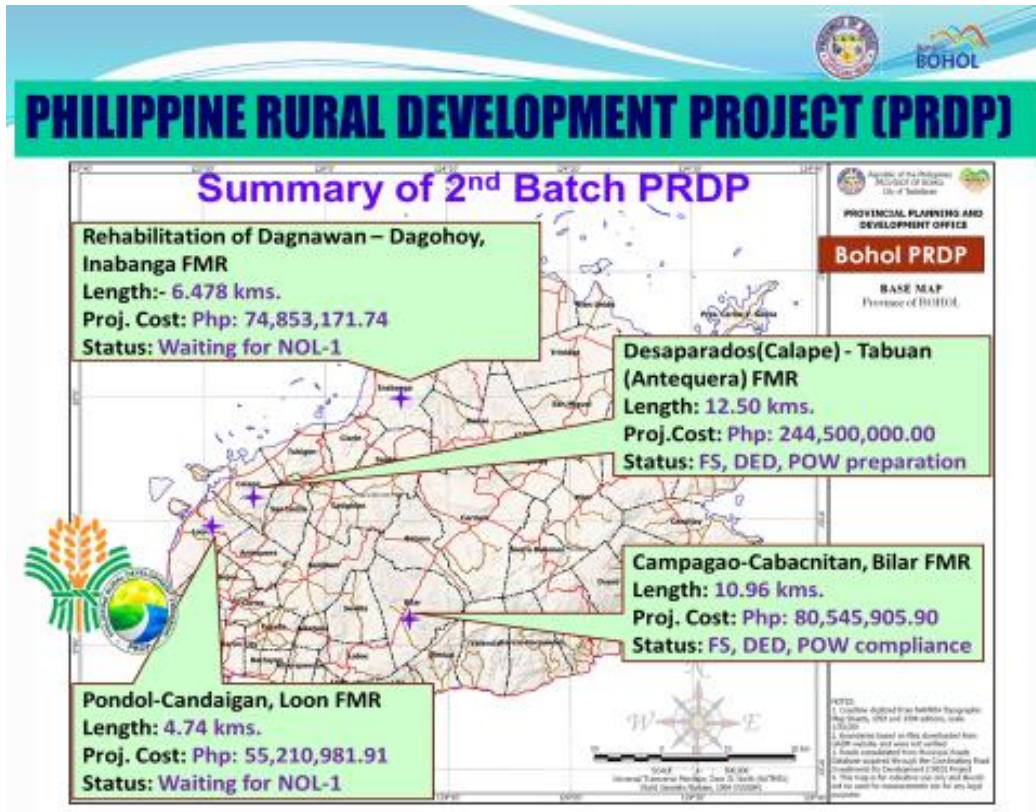

B) Ecosystems Improved for Sustainable Fisheries or (ECOFISH) Project a five year (2013-2017) funded by USAID

Ecosystems Improved for Sustainable Fisheries or (ECOFISH) Project a five year (2013-2017) funded by USAID. The project aims to conserve marine and coastal ecosystems through improved governance and ecosystem-based management in the country's eight (8) marine key conservation areas (MKBAs): Danajon Double Barrier Reef-Bohol Province; Calamianes Group of Islands; Lingayen Gulf; Ticao-San Bernardino Strait-Lagonoy Gulf; South Negros; Surigao del Sur and Norte; Sulu Archipelago and Verde Island Passage.

Major accomplishments:

- Participated in the series of workshop in the preservation and protection of the biodiversity in Danajon Double Barrier Reef on how the local government within the covered municipalities and provinces can implement to restore the productivity and profitability of the municipal fisheries within the area.

accordance with the Standard Registration System, which can be bundled with other services e.g. health education, disaster preparedness, governance, trade commerce and industry in the area of market development, market expansion, higher economies of scale and great utilization of big-ticket investments.

For Bohol, the Wahig-Inabanga Watershed has been identified for the implementation of the project considering that is a major and critical watershed due to its environmental and economic significance, covering almost 62,000 hectares (15% of Bohol's total land area of 411,726 hectares) and is host to important forest/timberland, water



resources, both surface and underground, agriculture, major eco-adventure tourism destinations and locations of some agro-industrial/commercial facilities in the province.

The implementation of INREMP is seen to attain the above immediately preceding paragraph of goals and objectives besides supplementing previously created mechanisms through Executive Orders like the creation of the Bohol Watershed

Advisory Council (BOWAC) (E.O. No. 51 s. 2005), Carood Watershed Management Council (E.O. No. 30 S. 2003), and the Bohol Integrated Water Resources Management Board (BIWRMP) (E.O. No. 10 s. 2007) for the promotion, conservation and protection of the various watersheds in the province;

The Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR), 17 member LGUs of the Wahig-Inabanga Upper River Basin and the Provincial Government of Bohol (PGBh) recognize the need for a strong partnership and collaboration to oversee the administrative matters and financial utilization of INREMP funds to ensure its accountability and transparency in the implementation of the project.

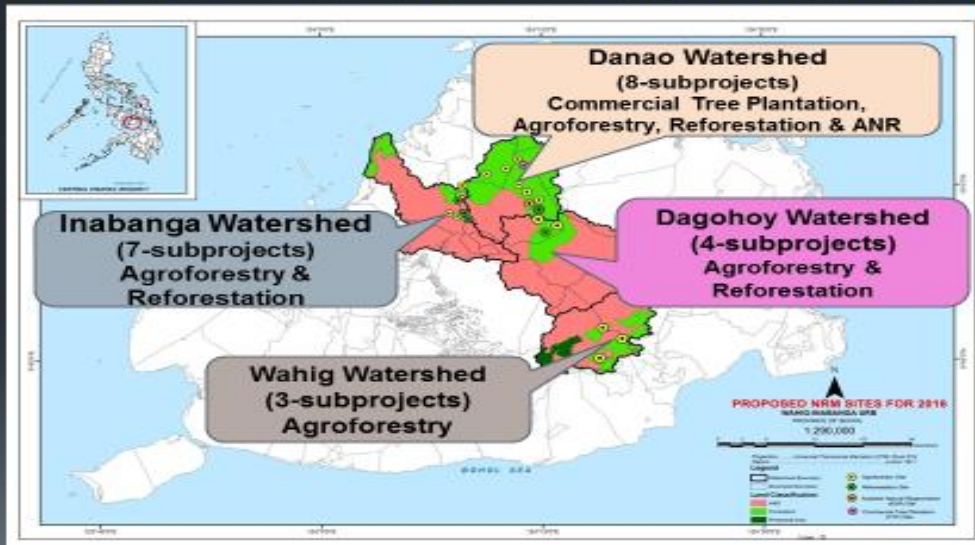

I. HIGHLIGHTS OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS

In line with the shared vision, mission and goals of the Provincial Government, guided by its overarching development framework -InSPIRED, HEAT-IT towards the (BIG LEAP), together with the Sangguniang Panlalawigan through the Vice-Governor's GO BEYOND advocacy and principles, the Legislative Year 2016 yielded 671 resolutions and 21 ordinances.

Team 2- or Dos Pares choose to conduct agriculture research particularly on new technologies on urban gardening and in developing possible replication mechanism in selected areas. This is composed of Engr. Vicente Loquellano and Mr. Margarito Narisma.

Team 3- G3 focused on grassroots organizing on reform movement through BAC or Bohol Advocates for Change to facilitate the delivery of services from the national and provincial government. This is composed of Ms. Divina Holcino, Engr. Vicente Loquellano and with CSO participation represented by Mr. Donald Sevilla and other municipal based CSOs. Ms. Ima Curiba is assisting them in administrative work. Mr Philip Aton of the Advocacy group is closely working with this team.

Team 4- Policy Research and SPU Coordinating Team composed of Dave Mar, Doris Dinorog-Obena and Junjie Daguplo is doing a combination of legislative research, public communications, SPU administrative and secretariat work and other resource mobilization assistance to barangays and CSOs. The team is also tasked in capacitating the SPU Team in terms of coaching and mentoring CSOs and barangay LGUs in accessing funds from the provincial government for better public service delivery. The team also organized and conducted capacity building activities for local leaders, and job order workers in CSO registration and accreditation and project monitoring. It also coordinates other special projects like skills training, medical mission and other possible policy workshop/consultation and policy proposal making for idea generation.

The **Bohol Law Enforcement and Communications Systems** transmits and receives messages province-wide, monitors peace and order and areas affected by typhoons and

other calamities, facilitates the repair and installation of VHF transceivers and power supplies for the different PNP stations, radio communication antennas in different municipalities of Bohol and conducts preventive maintenance of our repeater systems.

The approval of infrastructure project requests such as waterworks, energization, road development, among other are facilitated by our **Local Government Affairs Unit** through the receipt, approval, processing and endorsement of various Resolutions from the Local Government Units. The release of Burial assistance and barangay aid is the look out of the unit as well the processing, disbursing and turn-over of checks for Bohol Earthquake Assistance projects.

The **Provincial Security Force** constantly provides 24/7 round the clock security measures, security services PGBh activities, and maintains 30 regular posts/ area for security for PGBh-owned and managed facilities.

The **Bohol District Jail** awarded as Best District Jail of the Year and District Jail Warden of the Year during the 25th BJMP Anniversary in Cebu City this year upholds its mark of excellence through the proper custody, care and welfare of 887 Inmates,



with 837 Male and 50 Female as of this date. It also received a certificate of recognition as BJMP VII's Best District Jail Warden and Best District Jail for the 2nd and 3rd Quarter 2016 at BJMP Regional Office VII, Cebu City. JO1 Jarice Harah B Busano received a plaque of recognition as BJMP RVII District Paralegal Officer of the Year.



The **Telephone and Radio Systems Integrated Emergency Response (TaRSIER) 117** under the PDRMMO dispatched response to a total of 3,374 emergency calls. It conducted 48 Trainings and Seminars on Basic Life Support, First Aid, Emergency and Disaster Nursing, Basic Emergency Responder's Course, Water Rescue & Basic Life Saving Techniques, Ambulance Operations, Seminar on Disaster Preparedness, Skills Enhancement Training for Bohol Tour Guides, Five-day Disaster Quick Responders Training Course, Disaster Response and Rescue Operation Training, Symposium on Disaster Risk Reduction & Management, Evacuation Operations, Relief Operations, Rescue Equipment Training. It also conducted Earthquake, Fire, and Basic Life Support and First Aid Drills.

Alicia, Corella, Duero, Maribojoc, Talibon, Trinidad and Tubigon. The respective LCEs received a marker and the Performance Challenge Fund (PCF) of P7M for the province and P3M each for the municipalities.

To foster partnership and to involve the private sector in governance, DILG-Bohol gathered representatives from various Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) for the Orientation and Selection of Representatives to the Local Special Bodies. CSO activities collaborated by DILG-Bohol includes the celebration of the CSO Week, the “People’s Dialogue” the “DRRM Fund Watch Monitoring for LGUs”. An activity related to people participation in governance is the Training of Local Resource Institutes for the 2016 CSIS Fieldwork Implementation-Visayas Cluster which was hosted by DILG-Bohol.

Pertaining to the Katarungang Pambarangay (KP), the advocacies, trainings and other support from the city and municipal governments to lupons, as initiated by the field officers, resulted to a high 88.99% settlement rate of cases. In relation to this, DILG-Bohol spearheaded the search for best lupons to vie for the Lupong Tagapamayapa Incentives Award (LTIA). A total of 25 lupons were assessed to come up with 3 winners each for the first to third class and fourth to sixth class municipality categories. Awarding ceremony was hosted by the provincial government of Bohol with the distribution of prizes to the winners.

As regional finalists, the lupos of Can-upao, Jagna and Biingag, Dauis, Bohol were subjected to another on-site validation and interview by the members of the Lupon Tagapamayapa Regional Awards Committee on April 7-8, 2016. Considering their competence, dedication and high record of settlement which contributed to their peaceful situation of the barangay, the lupon of Can-upao, Jagna was adjudged as the Regional LTIA Winner for the first to third class municipality category and is Region VII's entry to the national search.

Fortunately, the Lupong Tagapamayapa of Can-upao, Jagna emerged as a National Finalist and was visited by the members of the National Validating Team last October 5, 2016. As a national finalist, the lupon must retain its spot for three consecutive years so as to achieve the Hall of Fame Award.

On **governance**, the field officers assisted in carrying out the Newly Elected Officials (NEO) program by ensuring the attendance of LCEs to the Basic Orientation. The 100% submission of the outputs of the Local Chief Executives' First 100 days and the Development Commitment: Executive-Legislative Partnership Agenda was likewise attributed to the efforts of field officers.

With the thrust of the present administration on the all-out war against illegal drugs, the field officers are very instrumental in the reorganization of the Anti-Drug Abuse Councils and the submission of regular monitoring reports on the Functionality of the Barangay Anti-Drug Abuse Committees. This accomplishment expedited the prompt compliance of the report on the identification of the levels of drug affectation of the barangays.

In support to this undertaking, DILG-Bohol participated in the motorcade spearheaded by PNP-Bohol with the theme "BATUKAN TA ANG DROGA, GUBATON TA ANG DUROGISTA", the Orientation-Seminar on the Management of Barangay Drug Clearing Operations under the direction of the Philippine Drug Enforcement Agency, the ALSA DROGA (Alyansa Laban Sa Droga) Program initiated by PNP Region VII, launching of the Center for Drug Education and Counseling (CEDEC) led by DOH in coordination with the Bohol Lions Club and the training on Community-Based Treatment Program for Drug Surrenderers also led by DOH.

On **providing exposure and to widen capacities of LGUs**, invitations for scholarship programs from national government agencies (NGAs) and even from other countries are e-mailed to the field officers which were disseminated to the local functionaries. The new program on the LGU Performance Scorecard otherwise known as Local TARGET (Transcending Accountable and Responsive Governance through Empowerment and Teamwork) is successfully implemented in the LGUs with the facilitation of the field officers who coordinated with the Local Chief Executives and heads of office to ensure the complete and timely submission of the Scorecard.

As regards **upholding good barangay governance**, for this year, the field officers continued their advocacy in the implementation of the Barangay Governance Performance Management System (BGPMS). To check the effectiveness of LGUs that are recipients of

Local Governance Support Program for Local Economic Development (LGSP-LED), DILG-Bohol assisted in the conduct of a two-day Evaluation Fieldwork through Focus Group Discussion (FGD) with project partners that include national government agencies.

In furtherance of this program, DILG-Bohol partnered with the Bohol Investment Promotion Center (BIPC) of the Governor's Office in the conduct of the Building Business-Friendly and Competitive LGUs (BFCL) Business One-Stop-Shop (BOSS) Caravan in selected LGUs. As of October 31, 2016, twenty-three (23) out of Forty-Three (43) LGUs that have implemented the Community-Based Monitoring System (CBMS) program have valid and clean data which are utilized for planning and other references.

Concerning **barangay governance**, all the 1,109 barangays of Bohol successfully conducted their respective barangay assemblies for the first and second semesters of CY 2016. Highlights include the Revitalization of BADAC and their role in drug clearing operations, presence and combating illegal drugs or illegal drug activities and IEC on Zika virus prevention.

Technical assistance and administrative guidance is provided by DILG-Bohol and field officers to a total of 265 demand-driven trainings, sixteen (16) benchmarking activities and coordinated six (6) benchmarking requests from out of the province LGUs, promptly disseminated central office directives through email to the Office of the Governor and to the respective field officers, processed and facilitated a total of nineteen (19) applications for travel abroad, (14) on-site fact-finding investigations, 360 legal opinions and advices to walk-in clients, seven (7) requests for authority to purchase motor vehicle and forty-three (43) death benefit claims. Still on LGU administrative guidance, Barangay Officials Information System (BOIS) are consolidated and timely submitted to the regional office for appropriate updating.

Considering the election year, the monitoring of the conduct of the May 2016 National and Local elections is facilitated by the Provincial Election Monitoring Action Center (PEMAC) established by DILG-Bohol pursuant to central office order to render services on a 24-hour shift and shall receive election related incidents and reports from field officers in coordination with the Election Officers and Chiefs of Police. Related to this, DILG-Bohol witnessed the Peace Covenant for a Fair and Safe Election 2016 and the presentation of the results of the Bohol Poll 2016 which is a locally-based initiative capable of conducting local public opinion polling institutionalized by Holy Name University in Bohol.

Contemplating on readying LGUs to Federalism, DILG-Bohol representatives attended the FEDEX: DILG Field Officers' Congress, the Regional Trainer's Training on Federalism and the Federalism Forum in Bohol. Regarding programs for newly elected officials, DILG-Bohol conducted a roll-out on the formulation of the Comprehensive Development Plan (CDP), Executive-Legislative Agenda and Capacity Development Agenda (ELA/ CapDev) to field Officers and staff to ensure a uniform process and unified presentation materials. All the forty-nine (49) LGUs including the Provincial Government crafted and submitted their respective Executive Legislative Agenda and Capacity Development Agenda on time.

Also about preparing for the new administration, DILG-Bohol actively participated in planning-related activities that include the updating of the Provincial Development and Physical Framework Plan (PDPFP) and the Provincial Development Council –Executive Committee (PDC-ExCom). Stretching the updated planning process at the barangay level, DILG-Bohol assisted the series of consultations on the different Barangay Development Planning processes participated in by MLGOOs, MPDCs and punong barangays who have been involved in the CBMS and BGPMS.

Programs implemented by DILG-Bohol that leads LGUs to become socially-protective and safe that address the well-being of the community especially the marginalized and vulnerable groups include the major program on Salintubig (Sagana at Ligtas na Tubig) carried out in 2012, 2014, 2015 and 2016. There are twenty-two (22) recipient LGUs with waterworks projects; eight (8) LGUs have projects which are on-going or completed and fourteen (14) are on the procurement process. Field officers of these LGUs facilitated the submission of required documents, the on-site validations of water sources, the punchlisting and the final inspections of the projects.

Other major program managed by DILG-Bohol is the **Bottom-Up Budgeting**. On the Provision of **Potable Water Supply Program** with funding under the Bottom-Up Budgeting (BUB) for 2014, 2015 and 2016, projects are monitored by field officers with the submission of weekly and bi-monthly monitoring reports. The Provincial and Regional Project Development Management Units (P/RPDMU) conducted on-site validation of projects to ensure the viability of the projects. In support to this project, DILG-Bohol provided an Orientation on Bottom-up Budgeting (BUB) for 2016 and the Preparation of Simplified Feasibility Study (SFS) for Municipal Engineers, Municipal Planning and Development Officers, and the MLGOOs of the 20 LGUs to capacitate them on the preparation of technical documents.

For **Bottom Up Budgeting (BUB) – Local Access Roads**, of the total fourteen (14), there are still four (4) sub-projects left unfinished as of October 25, 2016. On-site construction validations are also conducted and coordinated by the DILG- Bohol Provincial PDMU and concerned field officers. Technical capacity development activities that were facilitated by DILG-Bohol include the attendance of MPDCs, Municipal Engineers and other LGU functionaries and MLGOOs to the Seminar-Workshop on Detailed Engineering Design (DED), Seminar Workshop on Construction Supervision and Fund Management for BUB Water Program, Consultation/Dialogues on Locally-funded projects, Consultation Meetings on the Implementation of Locally Funded Projects.

For the **Bottom Up Budgeting (BUB)-Others and 2016 Evacuation Center**, DILG-Bohol conducted regular monitoring through the consolidation of the bi-monthly status reports submitted by field officers that show completed, on-going and on procurement process status of projects. Support to these BuB endeavors include the conduct of the Program Orientation and Workshop on Feasibility Study Preparation, the timely submission of the Revised and Final LPRAP FY 2017, Coordination Meetings attended by the BuB focal persons and with DSWD Municipal Links, and the Provincial CSO Forum that highlighted the

sharing of Best Practices in Public Service Delivery and CSO Engagement in Local Governance through BuB project implementation.

With the efforts and assistance of field officers, DILG-Bohol facilitated the prompt submission of quarterly Status Report for LGSF 2015-2016 Projects, the monthly Status Report for BuB-LGSF 2016 Projects and the quarterly reports of the Status of BuB project implementation through the Open BuB Portal.

To benefit the continuance of the BuB which is the **Assistance to Disadvantage Municipalities Program**, all the 47 municipalities of Bohol managed to submit their project list with the assistance of the field officers. Extending the BuB to the barangays, DILG Bohol activated its workforce and produced 100% accomplishment of the Barangay BuB requirements. This accomplishment is an offshoot of the Orientation for the DILG officers entitled “Roll-out of BuB4Barangays to DILG Field Officers” attended by all field officers at Subic Bay Freeport Zone, Olongapo City. For this purpose DILG-Bohol initiated preparatory activities which are the Provincial Orientation on Barangay BuB, the Dialogue on BUB for Barangays and BDC Planning Workshop. DILG-Bohol, through its field officers implemented the Ugnayan ng Barangay at Simbahan (UBAS) with the 100% organization of 1,109 Barangay Action Teams (BATs).

DILG-Bohol coordinated the creation of the **Bohol Comprehensive Local Integration Program (CLIP) Committee**, discussed issues and concerns and plan activities to ensure the welfare of the FRs. In support to this effort, DILG-Bohol hosted the CLIP Information Management System (CIMS) cum Local Reintegration Program Information System (LRPIS) and Orientation- Seminar on the Conflict Sensitive and Peace Promoting, Monitoring, Evaluation, Accountability and Learning System (CSPP-MEAL), participated in the Kauban sa Reporma (Former Rebel) Engagement and Evaluation, and the Countryside Development Program-Purok Power Movement (CDP-PPM).

In compliance to its mandate, DILG-Bohol continued to provide technical assistance in the organization as well as the functionality of the **Peace and Order Councils** at all levels. The conduct of regular monthly meetings, with the sending notices being the head secretariat of the Peace and Order Councils are ensured by the Provincial Director and field officers. Technical assistance is extended by DILG-Bohol in the formulation of the LGU’s Peace and Order and Public Safety Plan (POPSP) for CY 2017-2019 through conduct of an Orientation-Workshop on Peace and Order. DILG Field Officers likewise provided technical assistance in the organization and functionality of the Barangay Peace and Order Committees (BPOC). Other peace and order activities facilitated by DILG-Bohol included the Review of 2015 Peace and Order/Safety Plan (POPSP), Workshop on the Formulation of 2016 Integrated Area/Community Public Safety Plan (IA/CPSP).

In collaboration with the Provincial Government of Bohol, the **MASA MASID (Mamamayang Ayaw Sa Anomalya, Mamamayang Ayaw sa Ilegal na Droga) Program** was launched on October 27 and 28, 2016. For this purpose, all forty-eight (48) Local Government Units have created and organized its Expanded UBAS TWG.

With regard to the **Functionality of the Local Councils for the Protection of Children**, Bohol LGUs manifested a high level of functionality in terms of organizations, meetings, programs and projects. On the **Vigilance to Volunteerism (V2V) Program**, DILG-Bohol enlisted the active participation of Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) in local governance and monitored the establishment of Volunteer Citizenship Desk (VCD) with a designated VCD Office in the different LGUs.

About **Gender and Development**, PD Lucino, Cluster Heads and GAD Focal Persons attended the Roll Out on PCW-DILGDBM-NEDA Joint Memorandum Circular 2016-01 and they correspondingly conducted Orientation/Roll to the DILG Bohol's Field Officers. DILG-Bohol reviewed the 2017 GAD Plans and Budgets of the city and municipalities, while the field officers reviewed the 2017 GAD Plans and Budgets of the barangays and responded to different capacity development requests from LGUs.

As regards the compliance of LGUs to the **Magna Carta of Women**, all the 48 LGUs and the Provincial Government have reconstituted their GAD Focal Point System, submitted the GAD Accomplishment Report and established their GAD database. DILG-Bohol endeavored functionality of the LCAT-VAWCs in 47 municipalities, the City of Tagbilaran and the Province of Bohol.

As regards the **implementation of RA 9262**, a total of 520 cases were filed from the 1st to the 3rd quarters, CY 2016 and a total of 94 cases were issued Barangay Protection Order (BPO). The DILG Family in the province of Bohol is strengthened through the organized and functional Provincial, City and Municipal Management Coordinating Committees which led to the successful kickoff ceremony and observance of the 22nd National Crime Prevention Week.

On the **Child-Friendly program**, Bohol received the most number of awards in Region 7 for the 2015 Seal of Child-Friendly Local Governance Audit given by DILG in partnership with DSWD. Of the 47 municipalities and one city, Bohol bagged a total of 46 awards each for 47 local government units.

The **environment** is adequately and effectively protected, climate change and disasters are sustainably confronted through the conduct of seminars on Operation Listo (Listong Pamahalaang Lokal) and the Roles of LGUs Before, During and After Disasters Calamities.

One of the components under Operation Listo is the Organization of the Local Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Officers (LDRRMO). The organization of the Bohol Association of LDRRMOs (BALDRRMO) is facilitated by DILG-Bohol and is strengthened with the attendance of all the DRRM Officers to the activities like the Contingency Planning Training of Trainors, the Back to Back Pre-Disaster Risk Assessment (PDRA) and Rapid Damage Assessment and Needs Analysis (RDANA) Training, the Training on the Formulation of Local Climate Change Action Plan (LCCAP), the Provincial Planning Workshop on

Mainstreaming DRR/CCA in Local Development Plan, and the Orientation on the Climate Change Expenditure Tagging.

For 2016, the Disaster Preparedness and Environmental Compliance Audit was conducted from the period March to April, 2016 during the onsite validation of the Seal of Good Local Governance (SGLG); nine (9) LGUs passed the Disaster Preparedness Audit while forty-two (42) passed the Environmental Compliance Audit.

As regards the **Bohol Earthquake Assistance (BEA)**, a total of 1,063 sub-project with a total funding of Php 2,389,494,190.00 was allocated for the 44 LGUs & Provincial Government to pursue the rehabilitation and recovery efforts and to facilitate the return to normalcy of local government operations. As of this date, 82.19% projects are completed, 14.42% on-going construction, 2.92% on procurement process and .47% on pre-procurement and bid documents preparation. DILG-Bohol continuously conducted consultative meetings with stakeholders, monitoring and inspections to ensure that project implementation is on the right track.

On environmental concerns, DILG-Bohol joined the Bohol Coastal Resource Management Task Force in the 31st International Coastal Clean-up scheduled on September 17, 2016, the tree planting activity in San Vicente, Trinidad, Bohol with the Philippine Army, the Ecological Solid Waste Management Monitoring and Evaluation Team that conducted ESWM Best Practice Evaluation in all 48 LGUs, and the Albuquerque Cluster Sanitary Landfill Facility – Technical Working Group that observed the initial operation (Dry Run) of the said facility located in Dangay, Albuquerque, Bohol and the seminar on IEC.

Economic development of LGUs in Bohol is assisted by DILG-Bohol with the promotion and implementation of programs that enhance their business potential such as the National Competitiveness Program. DILG-Bohol is instrumental in the issuance of Executive Order No. 10, Series of 2016, creating the Public-Private Sector Technical Working Group on Bohol Competitiveness issued by Governor Edgar Chatto that enjoins all LGUs, government agencies and private sector to demonstrate commitment and provide the needed support and assistance towards improving Bohol's competitiveness ranking.

Allied to this are the conduct of the roll out the Jobstart Program through an Employer's Partnership Forum and the development of the Bohol Skills Registry System (BSRS) hosted at the official website of the Provincial Government.

On **Streamlining Business Permits and Licensing System (BPLS)**, all the 48 LGUs and the provincial government of Bohol are compliant with the standards set in 2010. To sustain this 100% compliance, DILG-Bohol and DTI embarked on a joint Business Permit and Licensing System (BPLS) Onsite Monitoring and Validation in the urban Municipalities of Tubigon, Talibon and Jagna and Tagbilaran City. Governed by the Department's support to Building Business-Friendly and Competitive LGUs, DILG-Bohol, DTI and DICT partnered with

the Provincial Government of Bohol, through the Bohol Investment Promotion Center (BIPC) and the League of Municipalities of the Philippines (LMP)-Bohol Chapter the conduct of the Provincial Rollout on the Revised Standards in Processing Permits and Licenses and the seminar on “Understanding the Approaches and Techniques of Investment Promotion through the Gender Lens”. With the able assistance of the field officers, all the 48 LGUs and this Province have designated their respective Local Economic Investment Promotion Officers and Business Permit and Licensing Officers who are expected to play marketing role in attracting more investments through promotion of the LGU as investment location.

In response to the call from this department, the City Government of Tagbilaran and the Municipal Government of Panglao promptly attended the three-day Workshop on Regulatory Simplification for Local Governments Orientation-Diagnosis-Design Phases of Implementation. The implementation of the **Special Local Road Fund** is also monitored by DILG-Bohol through the submission of reports as facilitated by the CLGOO of Tagbilaran City.

The key factor and the foundation in carrying out these programs and achievements is the enhancement of the competencies of the men and women of DILG-Bohol with these internal systems and process: The Local Governance Resource Center of the DILG-Bohol that provides reading materials to field officers and clients who need additional knowledge on governance.

DILG Bohol actively engaged in programs and projects spearheaded and implemented by various Provincial and National Government Agencies through its participation in a total of 64 collaborative trainings, seminars, and other capability building activities or even meetings. The collaboration efforts are made easier with the leadership of PD Lucino of the Association of Bohol Executives of National Agencies (ABENA) that tackles issues, concerns and other relevant matters on governance.

The **Programs and Project Monitoring System (PPMS)** which is an online web based application for monitoring and evaluating DILG Projects is regularly updated showing the status of the Sagana at Ligtas na Tubig sa Lahat (SALINTUBIG), Grassroots Participatory Planning (GPP) Potable Water Supply, Local Access and Local Government Unit (LGU) Infrastructure, Special Local Road Fund (SLRF), Bohol Earthquake Assistance (BEA) and Performance Challenge Fund (PCF).

Related to this, and focusing on legislation, DILG-Bohol through IT wizard Jacillo Orongan developed the 2016 DILG-Bohol Legislative Tracking System, a computer system that indicates the data on ordinance and resolution number, title, kind of ordinance, author, sponsor, status. For this year two (2) sanggunians availed of the system.

Still on providing easy information, DILG-Bohol is maintaining its website that indicates updates about the office including programs and services and projects like the full disclosure reports and the Bohol Earthquake Assistance (BEA) Fund. Annual accomplishments of DILG-Bohol and that of the two clusters are communicated to the LGUs and the province of Bohol through the preparation and provision of copies of the Annual Reports of D’One and M and M Clusters and of DILG-Bohol. Aside from the internet and print media, significant programs of the Department are also aired over radio station DYTR

via the regular slot with the Kapihan program of the Philippine Information Agency-Bohol. Program Coordinators disseminated information and updates regarding their concerned programs with reactions and comments from radio listeners.

Focusing on performance of the individual employee, the **Strategic Performance Management System (SPMS)** is implemented in DILG-Bohol in accordance with the process as indicated in DILG Memorandum dated June 29, 2015. To further improve the camaraderie and teamwork of its personnel DILG-Bohol conducted its annual Integrity Circle convocation on June 11, 2016 at Boffo Resort at Sandingan Island, Loon, Bohol with the theme "Together We Can, Together We'll Have Fun. Newly hired LGOOs II Karen Ann Beniga, Sarah Kristina Romanillos, and Joseph Ignatius Lustre attended an Orientation of DILG Programs initiated by DILG-Bohol for them to be familiar with the ins and outs of the office.

One of the most important programs of this office is the provision for the welfare of its personnel. An annual medical check-up is accorded to DILG-Bohol personnel every last quarter of the year. Medical services include blood pressure, urinalysis, ECG, cholesterol, triglycerides, and uric acid.

On **administrative and financial management**, semestral inventory of equipment is done by designated property custodian. Other properties like office supplies are likewise managed through the monthly updated report of procurement. Distribution of office supplies is based on the Project Procurement Management Plan or on request basis with corresponding recording of supplies balances. Procurement procedure is adhered to by DILG-Bohol with the conduct of a Procurement Planning Workshop on January 7, 2016 participated by all provincial staff. The workshop outputs are the Project Procurement Management Plan (PPMP) and the Annual Procurement Plan 2016.

For the year 2016, DILG-Bohol posted a total of twelve (12) advertisements to PhilGEPS and conspicuous places both for public bidding and negotiated procurement-small value procurement. As regards planning, budgeting and office operations enhancement, DILG-Bohol led the conduct of a consultative meeting with partner Civil Society Organizations with some local officials and congressmen representatives on February 22, 2016 at Panda Tea Garden Suites, Tagbilaran City.

On field operations enhancement, DILG-Bohol conducted bi-monthly conferences to thresh out significant issues and disseminate vital issuances to field officers. Cluster team meetings of the D'One and M and M Clusters are also held after conferences or out of town for a personalized supervision of field operations and bonding moments of field officers.

Compliance to administrative and reportorial requirements is also checked through the on-site supervisory visits by the provincial director, cluster heads and program manager. DILG-Bohol initiated and sustained the Provincial Management Committee Meeting or ProManCom as an opportune time to be updated as regards the programs of the department and to discuss concerns of mutual interests among program coordinators. A total of sixteen (16) capacity development courses are provided to the provincial staff and field officers that include the Refresher Course on Katarungang Pambarangay and the

Administrative Investigation of the Sanggunian. On LGOO Training, two (2) LGOOs II of DILG-Bohol are conferred Certificates of Completion after they successfully hurdled components I and II of the Induction Training.

For Capacity Development for Non-LGOO personnel, Administrative and newly hired personnel participated the “Orientation on the Department’s Programs, Projects and Activities (PPAs) and Locally Funded Projects for New Employees” at the DILG-7 Training Center. Continuously fostering partnership, DILG-Bohol assisted the League of Municipalities of the Philippines, Vice-Mayors League, Philippine Councilors League and Liga ng mga Barangay in the conduct of election of officers, strategic planning, coordination and other activities.

Aside from providing support to the leagues, DILG-Bohol also participated in various activities spearheaded by the provincial and national agencies like the Galing Pook Fair 2016, the Visayas Cluster Indigenous People Galing Pook Fair 2016, the Visayas Cluster Indigenous People Congress, Fun Run, Alay Lakad 2016, motorcade and opening ceremonies to kick off the celebration of the 38th National Disability Prevention and Rehabilitation Week. Youth, Gender and Disaster Preparedness are also joined by DILG-Bohol which includes Orientation on the SK Reform Law, “Great Filipino Workout International Women’s Day program, 2nd Quarter National Simultaneous Earthquake Drill.

On enhancing capacities to address HIV AIDS, DILG-Bohol through the field officers reported that all 48 LGUs have functional Local AIDS Councils determined in terms of organization, meetings, and program and projects conducted.

As a way of giving back the blessings received, DILG-Bohol conducted and participated in community outreach programs like the Brigada Eskwela at Basdio Primary School, Loon, Bohol, wherein the field officers painted the desks, arm chairs and tables of the school with colors blue, green and brown. D’ONE Cluster members visited the children in the “Arms Of Love” – a home for abused, abandoned and neglected children aging from two to twelve years old in De la Paz, Cortes, Bohol and provided them with sacks of rice, canned goods and used clothing. Cluster M&M assisted two day care centers in barangay Santa Cruz, Batuan, Bohol with thirty-five (35) children. The Cluster reinforced the practice of values and virtues through games and showing of talents. Bags with toys, coloring books and pencils and Jollibee snacks were given to the children.

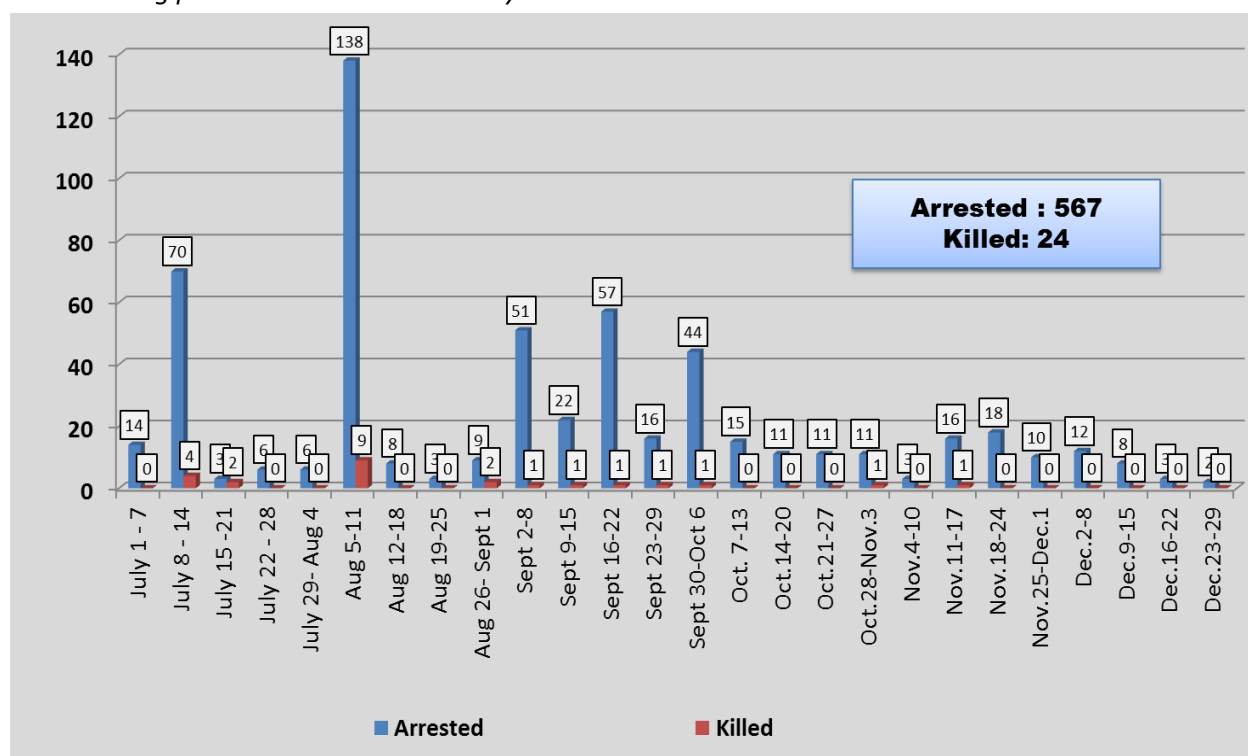
The Bohol Provincial Police Office (BPPO) eagerly embraced the nationwide implementation of the PNP Anti-illegal Drugs Campaign Plan – **PROJECT: “DOUBLE BARREL”**, a new challenge conceptualized by PNP Chief Ronald M. Dela Rosa, in line with the marching orders of President Rodrigo R. Duterte, to finally eradicate illegal drugs in the country



Barely two (2) weeks from the onset of the implementation of PROJECT DOUBLE BARREL on July 1, 2016, the BPPO police operations reached the highest peak of its house visitations (Oplan Tokhang) at 12,616 on July 14, 2016.



BPPO headquarters, reaching its peak at **23,680** by the end of the third (3rd) week on July 21, 2016, making PROJECT DOUBLE BARREL the most effective police program against illegal drugs ever. These surrenderers include those drug personalities who were subject of the house visitations as well as those drug personalities who voluntarily surrendered to authorities.



By the end of the sixth (6th) week on August 11, 2016, number of arrested persons and drug personalities killed in police operations reached its highest at **138 arrested** and **9 killed** respectively.

PROJECT DOUBLE BARREL ALPHA took over on October 26, 2016, the BPPO set a total target of **4,605** drug personalities, to include surrenderers (voluntary or through Tokhang, Taphang or Texhang), arrested or killed in police operations, within **67** days or until December 31, 2016.

As a direct effect of the Bohol PNP's aggressive and intensified anti-drug operations, a remarkable reduction in the supply of illegal drugs was seen as drug personalities are felt to have either stopped or abandoned their drug trade in the province

The Bohol Provincial Police strongly pursue preventive and offensive measures against lawlessness to ensure the maintenance of peace and order in the province of Bohol. The deployment of PNP personnel in the streets ensure the safety of the citizenry in the

province as they continue to conduct visibility to restraint criminal activities and lessen the incidents of crimes perpetrated by the motorcycle riding criminals and the use of firearms.

This office with our intensified anti-criminality efforts, achieved the following law enforcement accomplishments.

CAMPAIGN AGAINST ILLEGAL DRUGS:

The **628** anti-illegal drugs operations in support of the PDEA, consisting of buy-bust operations, search warrants and other operations resulted in the arrest of **824** pushers and users, confiscation of illegal drugs of 3,272.15 gms shabu with an estimated Dangerous Drugs Board (DDB) value of Php 38, 611,370.00, illegal drugs paraphernalia and **97** firearms. Further, 1,282 cases were filed in Court.

SAFE 2016 NATIONAL AND LOCAL ELECTIONS:

The Commission on Elections is recently coordinating with the AFP, PNP and other sectors in the province of Bohol to attain a safe and fair 2016 Election. Security measures are being organized by the Philippine National Police for the Election period which includes the validation and assessment of possible Election Watclist Areas. The COMELEC placed eight Bohol towns (Antequera, Tubigon, Buenavista, Clarin, Danao, Inabanga, Ubay and Bilar) under EWAs. With this, the top priority of this office is to ensure a peaceful campaign towards the May 9, 2016 National and Local election thus the need to augment the existing police officers especially in identified EWAs.

As additional force, this province was given a total of four hundred forty-one (441) AFP who were deployed in the entire province which was divided into teams with nine (9) members each and were distributed to the forty-seven (47) police stations. Another five

hundred Ninety-eight (598) RPSB7 personnel and One hundred One (101) PNP personnel from the Provincial Headquarters of Bohol PPO were deployed to the most clustered precincts and EWAS.

Another security plan was also created for the transport and movement of election paraphernalia within the province without any untoward incident happened.

On the Election Day there was no report on violent and Non-Violent incidents neither any problem encountered at the polling precincts.

This office had successfully safeguarded the just concluded National and Local Election 2016 despite the challenges encountered.

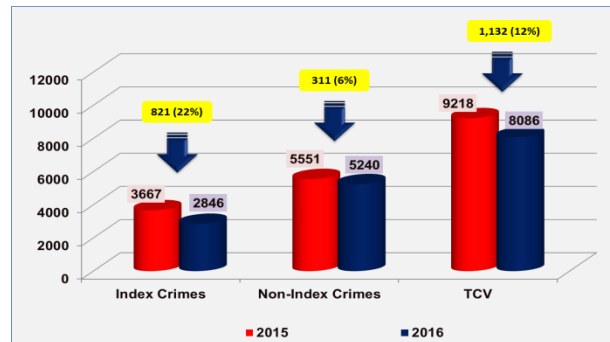

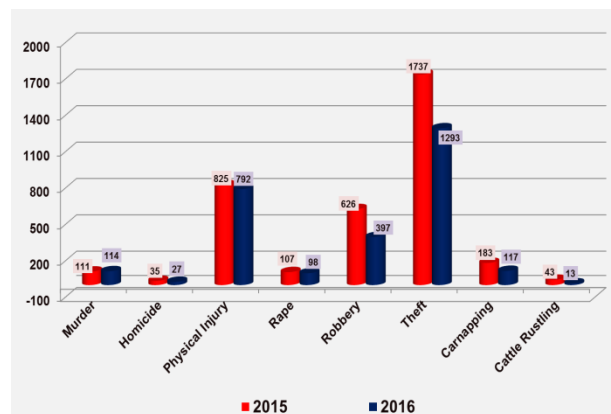
CRIME SITUATION UPDATE

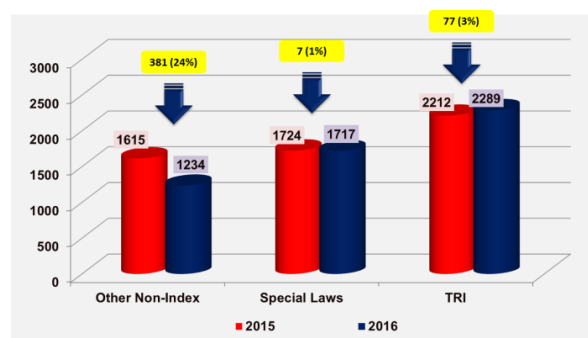
As shown in the graph, there has been a decrease in the crime volume for cy 2016 compared from the previous year, from 9,218 to 8,086 with a decrease of 1,132 or 12%



The comparative index crime by offense shows that the crime of theft still ranks as 1st with the most number of incidents (from 1,737 to 1,293), followed by physical injuries from (825 to 782).



NON-INDEX CRIMES registered 5,240 or 64.80% of the Total Crime Volume of 8,086 for the Calendar Year 2016. Of this figure, TRI recorded of 2289, while 1,717 are Violations of Special Laws and 1, 234 are classified as other Non-Index crime Violations

Best Practices and Success Stories

Considering the distance from the respective residences of the clients which include islands and mountain areas, it helped a lot in their attendance to rehabilitation activities the establishment of a reporting center at Talibon, Bohol, which is a good fifty-five kilometers from the main office. The supervising officers thus divided the clients according to the proximity of their residences and schedule their activities separately. This present set up likewise worked to the advantage of the VPAs in the Talibon reporting center area who no longer have to meet regularly with the supervising officers only at the main office.

Notable Accomplishment

As a result of the above best practice, the office garnered a 99.23 percentage attendance by clients in the Therapeutic Community rehabilitation program this year, clearly enhancing their chance and capability of imbibing the precepts and norms of the said program.

3. Notable Accomplishments Regarding the Principle of RJ

Restorative Justice (RJ) is the underlying principle behind the successful implementation of the rehabilitation program to our clients. The focus of RJ is to make our clients realize the extent of the damage that resulted from the offenses they committed and from that realization they would resolve to make amends by performing concrete acts of reparation like the conduct of community work service.

Since most of the clients committed offenses with no particular victims, their acts of making amends are dedicated to the general public. Many of the notable community work services rendered by our clients were undertaken in the barangays where they are residing. To ensure a successful conduct of these community work services, several conferencing sessions were held. These sessions were attended by the barangay officials, the family members of our clients, our VPAs, our clients and other stakeholders. Among the diverse forms of community work service performed by the clients are the several tree planting activities, clean-up drives, brigada eskwela, etc.

RJ aims not only at making our clients take full responsibility of their wrongful deeds, but it also seeks to stir awareness among the public that they too have, in a way, contributed to the existence of society's evils thus they have to play an active role in their prevention. This mutual realization is best achieved in the conduct of circle of supports, another RJ process that this office implemented. An example of an issue which was answered by a circle of support was about the inability of some clients to attend rehabilitation sessions because they do not have enough money for bus fares. This issue was immediately addressed after it was presented in the circle of support composed of barangay officials, VPAs and concerned community members. The members of the circle solved the problem by providing assistance to our clients so the latter could find stable sources of income.

4. Best Practice and Success Stories

Our office made sure that the public would positively recognize the efforts of our clients in making amends for the damage caused by the offenses they committed. In this manner, the public would recognize the importance of our agency's existence as well as appreciate the rehabilitation program implemented to our clients. To ensure public support and recognition, several agreements with Local government units, national agencies and non-governmental organizations were entered into by our office.

Consequently, the following activities were conducted:

- a) Mangrove planting at Can-icong, Macaas, Tubigon which was accomplished in coordination with the Municipal Environment and Natural Resources Office of Tubigon, the Bantay Dagat, and the Barangay officials of Can-icong, Tubigon.
- b) Tree planting at Macaas, Tubigon, Bohol which was carried out in coordination with the DENR, Philippine Army and the Junior Chamber International-Chocolate Hills (an NGO).

Best practice and success stories

The Volunteer Probation Assistants (VPAs) proposed for a livelihood opportunity for the clients in coordination with the National Irrigation Administration, Tubigon, Bohol. Probationers and parolees are given a piece of land for conversion into a fishpond in order for them to raise and propagate fish, specifically tilapia, as an additional means of income. The project is in its preparatory phase now, full implementation of the project will commence in the 1st quarter of 2017.

The best practice of VPAs of BPPO2 is their regular attendance to TCLP Sessions conducted by the office. It is also notable that VPAs regularly monitor their clients through home visits and extend help by assisting them in landing a job or introducing them ideas which may ultimately redound to their additional income. Advice –giving and Life Coaching activities are also conducted every month by the VPAs.

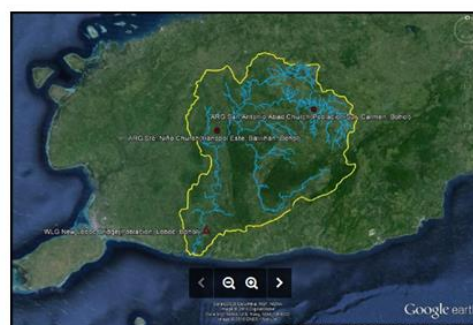

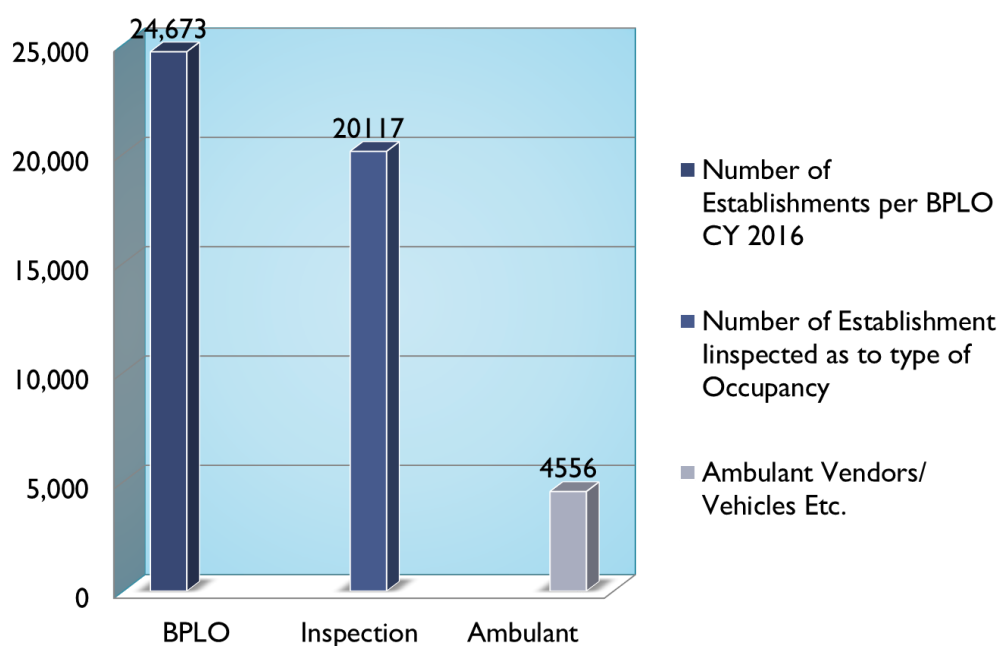

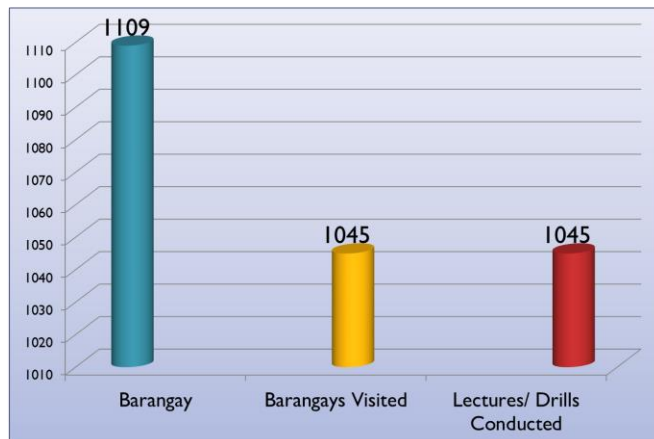

Name of Station: Coast Guard Station Tagbilaran

Area of Responsibility: Coast Guard Station Tagbilaran is a “Class B” Coast Guard Station under Coast Guard District Central Visayas. It covers the waters of Bohol Province with a total coastal length with a land area of 4,821 km² (1,861 sq mi) and a coastline 261 km (162 mi) long. It includes 75 minor surrounding islands and its capital is Tagbilaran. It has five (5) Coast Guard Sub-stations namely: CGSS Panglao, CGSS Tubigon, CGSS Talibon, CGSS Ubay and CGSS Jagna.

Accomplishments:

QUANTITATIVE CRITERIA

I. MARITIME SAFETY ADMINISTRATION (MARSAD)

1. Vessel Safety

A. SOLAS

In pursuit of ensuring the safety of life and property at sea, **25,929** regular intensive boarding inspections were conducted to vessels calling the various ports of Bohol.

B. PRE-DEPARTURE INSPECTIONS

CGS Tagbilaran was able to conduct **25,929** pre-departure inspections to domestic vessels engaged in domestic trade. Such inspections aimed to evaluate the status of safety in all aspects aboard domestic vessels (RORO,

passenger vessels, cargo vessels, bulk carriers, motor tankers, fishing boats and passenger bancas).

C. SPECIAL PERMIT TO LOAD DANGEROUS CARGOES ISSUED

This station seized to issue special permit to load dangerous cargoes as of 28 August 2013 by virtue of the command guidance to stop such issuances. Nevertheless, to ensure that passenger vessels departing any port of Bohol Province is not carrying dangerous or highly flammable cargoes onboard, we have conducted a total of 257 cargo inspections onboard thereby ensuring that this cargoes are packed in an appropriate containers and stowed in areas free from any source of heat thereby ensuring that these would not hamper the safety of the vessel and passengers.

D. MARINE PROTEST RECEIVED

This station was able to facilitate the filing of 16 marine protests for maritime accidents that transpired in Bohol Province.

E. NUMBER OF VESSELS DETAINED

As a result of a strict inspection being conducted by the personnel of this station prior every departure of vessels, this station was able to detained 14 vessels for lack of pertinent documents, insufficient officers onboard, expired vessel safety documents and certificates and other maritime violations.

F. PORT STATE CONTROL INSPECTION

Coast Guard Station Tagbilaran was able to conduct 15 port state control inspections to foreign vessels calling to ports within Bohol.

G. OTHER INSPECTION

To help the Provincial Government of Bohol in regulating small fishing boats, special inspections were conducted by the personnel of CGS Tagbilaran to ensure the seaworthiness of 87 small fishing boats who participated in the fluvial parade.

H. REVENUE COLLECTIONS

On the aspect of vessel safety, this station was able to contribute Php 30,000.00 to the revenue collection of the government in the form of fines for various maritime violations and fees for the issuance of permits. Breakdown of aforementioned collections is as indicated below:

2. Navigational Safety

A. LIGHTHOUSES

CGS Tagbilaran was able to maintain 100 % operational efficiency of our twenty two (22) lighthouses and seven (7) lighted beacons.

II. MARINE ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION (MAREP)

1. INSPECTION

A. VESSEL

To ensure that vessels calling on ports within AOR adhere with all laws, rules and regulations for the prevention of marine pollution, a total of **314** foreign and domestic vessels were inspected and supervised especially during their bunkering operations. Such practice entails the crew of the vessel to implement stringent proactive measures to avert the high risk of marine pollution.

2. COASTAL

A. PATROL AND INSPECTION

A total of **366** coastal patrol operations were conducted to inspect, detect and suppress possible marine pollution in the coastal areas of Bohol Province.

B. COASTAL CLEAN-UP

Despite of limited resources and budgetary constraints, all of the aforementioned coastal clean-up activities in Bohol Province were undeniably successful as a total **6.25** tons of non-biodegradable wastes and **6.25** tons of biodegradable wastes from the shorelines were extracted.

C. MANGROVE PLANTING

CGS Tagbilaran has developed good partnership with the DENR region 7, Office of the City Agriculturist and Office of the City Environment and Natural Resources of Bohol City, LGU's of Tagbilaran, NGO's, Special Forces of the PA and PCGA in the conduct of mangrove planting. Two (2) mangrove planting activities were conducted with a total of **3,500** mangroves planted.

3. LECTURES ON THE PROTECTION OF MARINE ENVIRONMENT

A. SCHOOLS AND UNIVERSITIES

- CGS Tagbilaran together with the Marine Environmental Protection Unit conducted MARPOL 73/78 convention on proper waste disposal lecture on marine environmental protection to Tagbilaran City Central Elementary School, M.Torralba St., Tagbilaran City regarding the ill-effects of improper waste disposal. Likewise, they were educated to segregate their garbage.

4. OIL SPILL DRILLS

To ensure the readiness and proficiency of land-based installations, this station urges them to engage in the regular conduct of oil spill response drills. As such, one (1) oil spill response drill was conducted within our AOR.

III. MARITIME SEARCH AND RESCUE (MARSAR)**A. NUMBER OF MARITIME INCIDENTS – 34****B. NUMBER OF RESPONSES**

All of the thirty four (34) reported incidents were immediately acted upon thereby led to a successful rescue of 198 survivors and recovery of 2 dead bodies within AOR.

C. SAR EXERCISES

This station together with SOU-CV, PCGA and CDRRMO has spearheaded and supervised the conduct of 2 water search and rescue competition and exercises in the City of Tagbilaran and Municipal of Ubay. Said exercises aimed to refresh the knowledge and skills and interoperability of the volunteer rescuers of LGU's, OCD units and CDRRMO.

D. WASAR AND RBOM TRAINING

Together with SOU-CV this station facilitated three (3) WASAR-RBOM training. One (1) was conducted for the PCG personnel and the rest is for civilian volunteers and also to the rescuers 302nd PA Carmen, Bohol.

IV. MARITIME LAW ENFORCEMENT (MARLEN)**A. SEABORNE PATROL OPERATIONS - 255****B. COASTAL PATROL**

A total of 25,815 coastal patrol operations were conducted by CGS Tagbilaran. Some of which were conducted together with the members of the Special Forces Company, Philippine Army and Philippine Navy.

C. NUMBER OF APPREHENSIONS

This station has recorded a total of 34 apprehensions of vessels and motorized bancas for engaging in illegal activities.

V. MARITIME OPERATIONS (MAROPS)**A. SECURITY/FLUVIAL PARADES**

CGS Tagbilaran participated in the conduct of three (9) security and safety patrolling operations to fluvial parades and related activities.

I. HIGHLIGHTS OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS FOR CY 2016

1. ADOLESCENT YOUTH HEALTH AND DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Research on sexual issues, especially on those focusing on youth, has remained one of the most undeveloped fields in the human sciences. While many scholars from various disciplines have contributed to the understanding of sexuality, their insights were limited by the difficulty of investigative work and the lack of data on the subject area. As a result, important questions regarding the youth's belief, attitudes and behaviors towards sex have largely remained unanswered. Despite the apparent trend toward greater openness on risk behaviors, the formulation and design of policies and programs are still constrained by lack of answers to questions that can lead to appropriate and effective action.

Majority of the youth mature successfully through adolescence without apparent long term problems. All adolescents should be considered at risk due to prevalence of risk behaviors, the inherent development needs of adolescents, and the risk factors for their initiation and maintenance. Adolescents experiment with new behaviors as they explore their emerging identity and independence. The concept of risk has been established as a characteristic that exposes adolescents to threat and well-being. During adolescence, young people begin to explore alternative health behaviors including smoking, drinking alcohol, drug use, sexual intimacy and violence.

In the province of Bohol, there's an increasing trend in teenage pregnancy for the last three years (2013-2015) as shown in the Table below.

2. Lack of skills for health and non-health providers on adolescent counseling

2. NATIONAL DENGUE PREVENTION AND CONTROL PROGRAM

Dengue has become a major global public health. In the province of Bohol a total of 637 cases with 3 deaths were reported from different reporting units for period of April 30, 2016. This is 60.86% higher compared to the same period of last year with 316 cases, 3 deaths, CFR (0.8%)

Ages of cases ranged from 5 months – 100 yrs old (mean = 15 years). Male has higher cases than female (Male = 50.9%). Most of these affected were 6 – 10 years old age group (22.1%). Majority of the cases were Tubigon (15.2%) followed by Tagbilaran City (11.3%), Talibon (8.6%), Loon (7.2%) and Daus (6.3%).

Environmental Sanitation is still considered the most effective strategy. The elimination and destruction of breeding sites of the vector is very crucial for the success of the program. These preventive measures can be achieved through the concerted effort of the different stakeholders that includes the LCE's, Municipal/Barangay Officials, barangay Health Workers, Health providers, NGO's, as well as the people in the community.

Gaps:

Dengue is a preventable disease but the occurrences of dengue cases in the Province have many factors like the poor health seeking behavior not only by the constituents

but also Municipal and Barangay Officials, they are taking the disease for granted. There are still lacks of information especially in the barangay level due to the weak implementation of the Integrated Vector Management. No budget for dengue program in the different Municipal Health Offices and no allocation of funds for the purchase of supplies for the elimination of vector mosquitoes. Some Municipalities have not formulated an ordinance in the prevention and control of dengue and lastly, the training on IVM to health workers with the barangay officials and other leaders such as teachers should be prioritized since they are considered front liners in the community.

3. PROVINCIAL DENTAL SERVICES PROGRAM (PDSP)

Oral disease (dental caries and gum disease) continues to be a serious public health problem in Bohol. The prevalence of dental caries on temporary and permanent teeth has generally remained high throughout the years. In the school year 2014-2015, eighty percent of the day care pupils in the province are suffering from dental caries. Despite these alarming statistics, people still have poor appreciation on the important role of the oral health in improving the quality of life and in socio-economic development of the country. Although preventable, these diseases affect almost every Boholano at one point or another in his or her lifetime. These have not given sufficient and enough attention since oral disease is considered a non-life threatening disease. However, these conditions can weaken bodily defenses and serve as portals of entry to other more serious and potentially dangerous systemic disease and infections. Serious condition includes arthritis, heart disease, endocarditis, gastro-intestinal disease, and ocular-skin-renal-disease. Aside from physical deformity, these two oral diseases may also cause disturbance of speech significant enough to affect work performance, nutrition, social interactions, income and self-esteem. Nearly all day care children have experience both tooth decay and they suffer from moderate to severe dental caries that cause toothache, infections, abscesses and swelling of the gums. In Bohol, toothache is a common ailment among schoolchildren, and is the primary cause of absenteeism from school. Indeed, dental and oral diseases create a silent epidemic, placing a heavy burden on Boholano schoolchildren. This alarming incidence needs immediate action. Poor oral health poses detrimental effects on school performance and marks success in later life. In fact, children who suffer from poor oral health are 12 times more likely to have restricted-activity days (USGAO 200). Access to oral health services is limited and teeth are often left untreated or extracted because of pain or discomfort. Loosing teeth is still seen by many people as natural consequence of aging. Except for few elite Boholano, many continue to live with their problems in ignorance, unmindful of its existence.

4. ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH and SANITATION PROGRAM

Environmental Sanitation is a big factor that will affect the growth, health, progress of our country. It is a big challenge for us health sector to improve or enhance our capability in the development or refinement of policies and programs towards the purpose of minimizing the risk of waterborne diseases.

Water plays a big role in it. We need not only simply water but what we really emphasize is Access to safe drinking water for the promotion and protection of public Health. Thru this access to safe water supply transmission of water- borne pathogens can be prevented and reduces the exposure of individuals to physical and chemical hazards. Diarrhea and other water borne diseases ranked 5th among the leading causes of illnesses in our province of Bohol.

Sanitation also involves dirt and infection especially to the drainage and disposal of sewage from households and other Government and Private establishments.

Disposal of excreta and waste water must be given attention because it will affect the health and welfare and also for the social and environmental effects it may have in the communities. For the year 2015 we have 240, 204 number of Households out of this only 211, 353 have existing sanitary toilet facilities so it is only 87.99%.

Solid waste disposal also contributes a big factor of our environment base on our data only 152,773 out of 240,204 Households with satisfactory Disposal of solid waste so it's a matter of 63.60%. Household should have complete basic sanitation facilities to have a healthy community.

With regards to water sources with Access to Potable water, level of water sources and percentage for the year 2015 are as follows:

For these current status indicators regarding Sanitary Toilet Facilities and Sources with access to potable water both indicators are far below the national objectives for health benchmark of ninety-one percent and ninety four percent, so more effort is needed to achieve or improve these two indicators to avoid certain illnesses to happen.

5. HEALTH REPRODUCTIVE PROGRAM - FAMILY PLANNING (HRP-FP)

Two of the Millennium Development Goal (MDG) are reduction in maternal and child mortality, which is a concern of FP providers. This can be addressed through Family Planning as it can help women who are at risk during pregnancy and birthing.

Using effective Family Planning (FP) method reduces maternal death by preventing high risk pregnancies among women who are too young, too old, too ill to bear children safely.

The Contraceptive Prevalence Risk (CPR) for the province of Bohol including its component city from the year 2013 until 2015 had shown an increasing trend for the past three years. The province CPR performance of 34 in 2015 is still lower than the regional performance of 40%(2014) and the nation performance of 65%.

Family Planning Program guarantees that the client's choice of the Family Planning(FP) method is used and based on well informed and well considered

decisions through giving of the correct and complete information, So in order for our Health Worker to provide universal access to Family Planning (FP) services and information, this office has conducted the following interventions:

Capacitate health workers on Family Planning (FP) services through FB CBT Level I training – 32% of the service provider province wide, needs to be trained, retained, refresh, re-oriented on FP CBI Level I.

Availability of Family Planning (FP) Commodities at all levels including Main Health Centers (MHC) and Barangay Health Stations (BHS) and Hospitals

Some Barangay Health Workers were oriented on the Family Planning (FP) so that BHWs can assist midwives conducting couple classes at their respective barangays.

Close coordination with the development partners on the conduct of the Family Planning (FP) activities.

6. HEALTH EDUCATION AND PROMOTION OFFICE (HEPO) PROGRAM

Health promotion is a process of enabling people to take action to improve health. Within the context of Primary health Care, health promotion is critical to improve outcomes in the prevention and control of both chronic and communicable disease.

For a decade, Health Promotion activities were conducted with limited budget. Health programs funded by USAID/UNIFPA are implementing health promotion activities in the form of advocacy during special events. IEC materials are reproduced under these projects. They have strengthened their networking with NGOs and other stakeholders that includes strong partnership with Media affairs. However, non-pilot municipalities requested their IEC materials from the DOH through the PHO and their activities depend only on the LGU who can consider that Health Promotion and advocacy plays a crucial role in the implementation of health programs.

Goal: To increase public awareness on Health thru Communication, Community Mobilization and the use of Mass Media in order to increase health service coverage thru and improve programs performance.

Specific Objectives (Performance Indicators):

1. Capacity health service providers on the strategies of health promotion intervention
2. Capacity building
3. Social Mobilization
4. Mass Media
5. Monitoring

7. PROVINCIAL EPIDEMIOLOGICAL AND SURVEILLANCE UNIT (PESU)

Disease surveillance is a process of coordinating, prioritizing, and streaming of multiple disease surveillance system into a unified national disease surveillance system that combines core surveillance activities and support functions into a single integrated activity for the purpose of making the epidemiological practice by which the spread of disease is monitored in order to establish patterns of progression. A key part of modern disease surveillance is the practice of disease case reporting. With the advent of modern communication technology, this has changed dramatically. Further, there is considerable public pressure to make this information available quickly and accurately. However, in the province of Bohol there is a need to strengthen disease surveillance and response system; thus, there are few points of loopholes that must be dealt with in order to hasten the disease case reporting system.

Gaps:

- Limited program budget by the Provincial government
- Since there is limited budget for PESU alone, the unit has been dependent with the conduct of trainings/ orientations/ seminars from RESU.
- Some of the members are becoming inactive.
- Some disease reporting units and MESUs are inactive or delayed in submitting reports due to unavailability of internet connections.
- PESU Office not conducive for work.
- No vehicle use for immediate response on case investigation and collection of specimen for laboratory confirmation.
- No proper planning on outbreak response.
- No proper place for specimen preparation to be sent to RITM for laboratory confirmation.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS:

8. RENAL DISEASE CONTROL PROGRAM

The tenth (9th) leading cause of mortality in the province is Kidney or Renal Disease. Due to alarming situation on the increasing incidence of Renal Disease/Failure, the

need to strengthen and redouble the effort in concentrating the best we can do in the prevention and control of kidney or renal disease must be done and hopefully be able to eliminate as apart in the leading cause of morality.

Chronic Glomerulonephritis in the past was the most common cause of Chronic Renal Failure, while today Hypertension ranks fourth (2nd) and Kidney/Renal/Urinary track Disease (10th) as the leading causes of morbidity respectively in the province. It also has taken center stage in the causation of the End Stage Renal Disease (ESRD). When both diseases are occurring together, they account for almost sixty percent (60%) of the dialysis patients and together both also accounts for 20/100 percent (0.2%) of the individuals who had undergone kidney transplant.

Prevention through “healthy lifestyle” plays a major role in reducing, if not totally controlling the epidemic of Renal Failure and this could be achieved through proper education and behavioral changes. Strengthening the campaign on the prevention, control, proper management and treatment of kidney/renal disease is geared towards achieving good health for the Boholano constituents.

A yearly screening through urinalysis, blood pressure monitoring, and blood chemistry determinations like blood sugar, cholesterol and creatinine determination, is indeed a must to all constituents. For the provincial government employees, cardiac panel is being encouraged to the employees without any expense from them.

Massive information dissemination on the disease, as well as training on the Renal Disease Prevention and Control Program for RHM, Orientation on the Prevention of Kidney Disease for BHWs, Big event (Kidney Month), Conduct lay forum to 5 municipalities (mass screening), Conduct information dissemination to students on Renal Disease Control Program.

There is a need to conduct consultative meeting or lay forum for LCE, Media, Traditional and Religious leaders, Service providers, Program Planners, Administrators, Parents and Teachers.

However, there is still the lack of logistics especially equipment and supplies for the program due to the limited fund allocated for the program.

- Lay Forum to the Municipalities/Health Education on Renal Disease Control Program/Laboratory Screening/ BP Monitoring/Free Consultation
- Monitoring on the Implementation of Renal Disease Control Program Services at the Different RHUs and the Barangay Health Station level

9. SCHISTOSOMIASIS CONTROL and ELIMINATION PROGRAM

Schistosomiasis is an acute and chronic parasitic disease caused by blood flukes (trematode worms) of the genus *Schistosoma* (WHO, 2016). People are infected during routine agricultural, domestic, occupational and recreational activities which expose them to infested water. Farmers, fisher folks, and school-aged children who are exposed to infested bodies of water or swamps and rice fields are among the vulnerable groups. Transmission occurs when people infected with Schistosomiasis contaminate freshwater sources with their excreta containing parasite eggs which hatch in water.

The control of Schistosomiasis is based on large-scale treatment of at-risk population groups, access to safe water, improved sanitation, hygiene education and snail control. Treatment with Praziquantel is done among school-aged children in the endemic municipalities. Major challenges include the refusal of some parents to participate the MDA despite the health teachings given. Improving the sanitary toilets among the households remains an issue, especially to households with potential snail site transmission. Control of snail colonies and regular surveillance among the snail sites should also be given emphasis. The SCEP of Department of Health required the conduct of snail site mapping and development of appropriate public health policies and interventions to control Schistosomiasis in the endemic areas or transmission sites in Bohol. In addition to the abovementioned challenges the province also lacks laboratory supplies for Kato-Katz examination and PPEs on performing clearing on vegetation sites. Thus, clearing and monitoring needs to be continued to achieve the goal of complete eradication of Schistosomiasis in the province of Bohol.

10. NATIONAL MENTAL HEALTH PREVENTION AND CONTROL PROGRAM (NMHPCP)

The province of Bohol for the past years has not identified mental health as an immediate issue, hence the occurrence of the Bohol Earthquake last October 15, 2013. With the introduction of the cluster Approach specifically the MHPSS cluster, Bohol's health sector for population Activities (UNFPA) provided Psychosocial Processing training to the 18 LGUs hardly hit by the Earthquake. In 2014 the World Health Organization provided trainings to Doctors and Nurses thru the Mental Health Gap (MH Gap) module. Regardless of the support received from various humanitarian agencies, the MHOs identify Mental Health as a concern for their locality. Thus, Capacity Building is identified a priority need for Mental Health in the rural health units. In addition to the abovementioned problem the province also lacks facilities that can cater Mental Health Cases, limited services providers that can address psychiatric cases, and the availability of drugs. Despite the assistance received from the World Health Organization and UNFPA to the province, the challenge in sustaining the initiated activities needs to be address for the years to come. Thus policy making, monitoring, meetings and yearly budget for the program need to be in place.

11. WASTE WATER AND SEWAGE ANALYSIS LABORATORY (WWSAL)

Preservation of Water Environment is inevitable to protect coastal resources. Supervision of quality of bodies of water are fundamental works for administrative water quality/coastal resources management. Water quality monitoring is process consisting of integrated task: sampling, analysis, data interpretation and reporting. Water quality monitoring consists of 2 types: 1) effluent quality monitoring, and 2) environmental water bodies monitoring.

The need of effective countermeasures to water pollution in the surrounding sea area of Panglao Island has been increasing day by day. Improvement of effluents from onsite Septic Tank Facilities and provision of public sewage systems are urgent and present.

Sewerage Master Plan shall be made for priority areas including city proper of Tagbilaran City, Municipalities of Dauis, Panglao as well as Alona Beach area.

12. BACTERIOLOGICAL WATER ANALYSIS LABORATORY (BWAL)

The Provincial Health Office Water Laboratory is the only government water facility performing bacteriological analysis in the Province of Bohol both drinking and non-drinking water source. Thus, our water laboratory answers or caters to the Environmental Policy Statement of the provincial environmental policy statement of the Provincial Government of Bohol envision to sustain an eco-cultural tourist destination and a strong agro-industrial province such that it is committed to conserve its natural resources and prevent pollution in air, land and water. Today most consumers are shifting from piped distribution network and household taps to finish products from refilling stations as their source of drinking water. Thus the proliferation of water refilling stations has contributed to the significant increase in our analysis of water samples yearly. This can be shown by the number of water samples we received from year 2011 to 2015 which is 4,684; 4,823; 5,219; 6,080; 6,964 respectively.

As we envisioned protecting public health by ensuring safe drinking water, early detection of contaminated water sources could minimize the risk of contracting water borne diseases to our Boholano communities.

13. NATIONAL TUBERCULOSIS CONTROL PROGRAM (NTP)

Issues and Challenges

Tuberculosis is a major public health problem in the Philippines. In 2010, TB was the 6th leading cause of mortality with a rate of 26.3 deaths for every 100,000 population and accounts for 5.1% of total deaths. In the Province of Bohol however, TB is not amongst the top 10 causes of mortality but it remains to be a public health burden. By 2016, the NTP should have achieved an Incidence Rate of 246 per 100,000 population, Prevalence Rate of 414 per 100,000 population and a Mortality Rate of

23 per 100,000 population. Two major indicators are used to achieve these goals and to measure the progress of TB control – the case detection rate (CDR) and the treatment success rate (TSR). Despite the current approach to case finding which includes passive and intensified case finding, the provincial CDR is only at 76% in 2015, 14% below the national target of 90%. On the other hand, TSR is maintained above the 90% target averaging at 96% in the same year. Factors leading to low CDR may be attributed to the “overloading” of programs to the local NTP coordinators handling not only TB-DOTS but also other implementations such as the operation of RHU Birthing Centers where midwives/BHWs are pulled out from their stations to render services in the said facility. The lack of medical technologists to operate microscopy centers in RHUs also contribute to low case finding and contribute to initial defaulters of presumptive TB patients. Other contributing factors include “stock-out” of anti-TB drugs, some laboratory supplies and other commodities, as well as the inactive TB Task Forces and other community partners referring presumptive TB to the local NTP, these amongst others. For the Programatic Management of Drug-resistant TB (PMDT), a TB initiative project, enrolment of cases continuously increased since the establishment of the two PMDT-Satellite Treatment Center in 2015 - the Gov. Celestino Gallares Memorial Hospital in Tagbilaran City and the Don Emilio Del Valle Memorial Hospital in Ubay where DR-TB patients across the province are treated on an out-patient basis DOT. The two STCs are in need of a “half-way-house” to accommodate patients, especially those infectious patients who utilize public transportation from residence to the STC site during the course of intensive treatment. Another TB initiative is the Enhanced Hospital DOTS wherein private and public hospitals are engaged either as a referring or a providing TB DOTS. Since the engagement is done with PhilCAT, an NGO organization whose project is set to expire this year, sustainability of the said initiative will be a major challenge. Strengthening the RHU and Hospital referral system is also a priority because hospitals are major providers of TB care. The 2007 National TB Prevalence Survey showed that 43% of patients with signs and symptoms of TB consulted hospitals. Hospital participation, however, in TB control efforts is limited and any studies shows that management of TB in hospitals is not consistent with the policies and guidelines of the NTP and the International Standards of TB Care (ISTC), thus the need for strengthening sustaining this initiative under the NTP.

14. NON-COMMUNICABLE DISEASE

The National healthy lifestyle program is an integrated community-based non-communicable disease prevention approach. The program includes slowing down or reversing the increasing trend in the prevalence of lifestyle related risk factors of NCDs, including smoking, unhealthy diet and sedentary lifestyle and creating a supportive environment for positive behavior change and healthy lifestyle.

The leading causes of mortality in the Philippines today are no longer communicable disease but more chronic, debilitating non-communicable diseases. These include cardiovascular disease like hypertension, CAD and stroke, cancer, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease and diabetes mellitus. These illnesses are so called “Lifestyle

Diseases” because nutrition, physical activity, smoking, alcohol drinking and stress contribute to their development.

In the province of Bohol, the top leading causes of deaths are mostly cardiovascular that includes cardiovascular diseases, cancer, cerebrovascular disease, heart failure, hypertension, myocardial infarction and renal disease. Hypertension which is also a major risk factor for the development of other cardiovascular disease in comparison with the five year average is among the top 10 leading causes of morbidity.

The prevention and control of non-communicable disease calls for an integrated community-based approach that will require and enlightened participation of community residents and primary health workers and we need to train our health workers to support prevention through setting an example by counseling and advocacy and through direct service supervision. Thus, it supports and contributes to the efforts to make this strategy a success not only among individuals and groups but more importantly, among communities

Gaps:

There are several factors that affect the implementation of this program, one of which is the allocation of funds for the training of health workers in the risk assessment and

15. NATIONAL LEPROSY CONTROL PROGRAM

Issues and challenges

The goal of elimination of leprosy as a public health problem, based on less than one registered leprosy patient per 10,000 population was achieved in the province of Bohol having a prevalence rate of 0.24%, but even though the leprosy burden has been reduced substantially, new cases of leprosy continue to appear in the province at a rate of 32 new cases notified to the National Leprosy Control Program in 2015. Pockets of high endemicity still remain in the province as in some areas in the country. Some of these areas show very high notification rates for new cases and may still witness intense transmission. New patients continued to be diagnosed and the evidence of recent transmission can be seen in the diagnosis of leprosy in children. Worse is the occurrence of grade 2 disabilities in newly diagnosed patients and in children in particular, which indicates the late detection of leprosy. The basic principles of Leprosy Control will continue to be based on early detection and treatment of leprosy patients. Health services should continue to provide quality and sustainable services for leprosy control to these communities over a foreseeable period of time. However, NLCP activities such as *KilatisKutis* are not done regularly due to the interrupted and insufficient supply of anti-fungal and anti-bacterial ointments and other commodities necessary for such activities. The effectiveness of multi-drug therapy in curing leprosy and intense advocacy activities in recent years have brought positive changes in public attitudes towards persons affected by leprosy in many communities. However, due to physical deformities acquired and inadequate community awareness activities providing accurate information about the disease, the age-old stigma associated with the disease wherein the impact of discrimination is particularly severe among female leprosy patients, remains to be obstacle to self-reporting and early treatment. The image of leprosy must be changed at the provincial and local levels in which patients will not hesitate to come forward for diagnosis and treatment at any health facility must be created ensuring no discrimination and promoting inclusion. There is a need to call for renewed political commitment and enhanced coordination between partners, and highlights the importance of program sustainability and improved data collection and analysis.

16. NATIONAL PREVENTION OF BLINDNESS PROGRAM

Blindness as a health problem leads to enormous human suffering due to the loss of functional ability and self-esteem. Blindness has profound human and socio-economic consequences in all societies. The cost of loss productivity, rehabilitation and education of the blindness makes essential contribution to a country's economic development. The prevention of Blindness Program is one program that needs to be strengthened to address the problem of blindness in the province. The third Philippine National Survey of blindness shows that about 3.5 Million (4.62%) Filipinos are visually impaired to one or both eyes. The program aims to reduce the current prevalence of bilateral blindness to less than 0.3% and ultimately to prevent

blindness in the long run. According to WHO estimates about 80% of blindness is modified that could have been prevented or controlled if the available knowledge and interventions had been timely applied or it can be successfully tested with the sight restored. With the continued implementation of the Blindness Prevention Program, the support of the government and non-governmental organizations, the prevalence of blindness is expected to be reduced to the WHO's goal of less than 0.5% in the next several years. Blindness prevalence was found to be greater with the increasing age because the most common causes of blindness are associated with diseases that are more prevalent in the elderly population. Blindness was also seen to be more prevalent among economically disadvantaged people. This may reflect the poor access to health care among the economically disadvantage section. The six common eye problems identified in the year 2015 in the province were: errors of refraction, cataract, pterygium, dry eye syndrome, glaucoma and pseudophakia. Blindness program requires a community-based strategy and information dissemination that focuses on avoidable blindness. The inability to deliver such information to the community level contributes to the gasps of the program. The limited or no access to eye care consultations in their locality, the lack of diagnostic proficiency are also identified which can be improved through trainings and updates. According to statistics there are about 100 children losing their eyesight every week. Almost half of these cases are either treatable or preventable. Early detection and treatment are the keys to saving the sight of these children and also with adults.

17. BOHOL PROVINCIAL DRUG TESTING/SCREENING LABORATORY

The illegal use of drugs was once considered a problem unique to residents of urban poor communities. Today, however, people from all economic levels, in both urban and rural communities, abuse drugs.

So in support to the Philippine Government's on-going battle against drug abuse and trafficking the Bohol Provincial Drug Testing/Screening Laboratory shares the responsibility towards effectively implementing the provisions of the Comprehensive Dangerous Drugs Act of 2002 (RA# 9165).. This DOH –accredited government facility complete with trained technical staff; is capable of testing urine specimen for dangerous drugs. It conducts:

1.) Mandatory Testing

For applicants of drivers' license and of firearms license, officers and members of the military, police and other law enforcers, and persons charged before the prosecutor.

2.) Random Drug Testing

For students of secondary and tertiary schools, and officers and employees of public and private offices whether domestic or overseas. Random Drug Testing shall remain confidential and anonymous.

Among the drug testing laboratories throughout the province, the Bohol Provincial Drug Testing/Screening Laboratory religiously follow the entire requirements adherent to strict standards set and compliant for the attainment of our ultimate goal – a drug free Boholano community... or better yet... drug-free Philippines.

18. NATIONAL VOLUNTARY BLOOD SERVICE PROGRAM

The province of Bohol is faced on the challenge to sustain our current demand for blood. It remained high due to the fact that there is no substitute for it except from that of another human blood donor. There is only few giving blood but almost every patient is consuming. This primarily underlines the importance of regular voluntary blood donation in order to maintain and ensure an adequate, safe, and accessible blood supply in the province. Adequate and available supply of blood and blood products to all is a great need among the Boholanos. Based on the Bohol situation, more than 500 units of blood per month answer the necessities. A provision of adequate supply of safe blood to all is our vision. We are still in the stage of transition and may take us several years more to really have 100% voluntary blood donation. We still find difficulty in changing the culture of the Boholanos on their dependence of blood from the commercial donors. However we are aware that people will be committed to donate as long as they understand and are fully convinced on voluntary blood donation as a humanitarian act. The program had been supporting the blood needs of patients with complicated pregnancy, dengue fever cases and other surgical/medical cases related to blood loss. The Governor Celestino Gallares Memorial Hospital (GCGMH) and Philippine National Red Cross Blood Bank all based in Tagbilaran City, are providing the blood supply requirements of the province. Their blood supply stocks are augmented by mobile blood donation activities in the different municipalities.

19. NATIONAL AIDS/STI PREVENTION AND CONTROL PROGRAM

Sexually Transmitted Infections remain to be among the diseases with public health significance especially in the marginalized and poor population, who may avoid or postpone the seeking of health care as the disease is largely associated with stigma and discrimination. Due to this, most STI cases remain undiagnosed and unreported to health authorities which makes scaling up of prevention and control initiatives very difficult. By the end of 2015, there are already 101 documented PLHIV (Person Living with HIV) of which 89 are asymptomatic and 12 are AIDs. But this figure does not give the true picture of the province as it is just like the tip of an iceberg wherein much were still hidden. Sequelae of undiagnosed and untreated STI are encompassing. Mental and social (oftentimes violence) issues accompany STI diagnosis on top of equally important medical and physical complications like premature labor, abortion, permanent damage to organs of both mothers and babies born to mothers with STI. The vulnerability of the youth to HIV AIDS is obvious. Although advocacy in the promotion of a supportive and enabling environment for HIV prevention is done, symposia and fora were done in most at risk groups especially among the young

adults in both secondary and tertiary level. Orientations on the basic facts on HIV were given to the general public focusing much on the targeted population-the most at risk population (MARPS). But these are not still enough. People's lifestyle attributes much to risky behavior. In consonance with the objective of Universal Health Care to achieve better health for all Filipinos, the provincial government of Bohol through the Provincial Health Office intensifies its efforts for faster and earlier results towards the attainment of the health related MDGs. Focus is given to the reduction of maternal and child mortality and the prevalence of HIV/AIDS. As STI affects the health of the mother and the babies and oftentimes are associated with HIV, it is imperative that the DOH included it as High Impact 5.

20. MATERNAL NEWBORN CHILD HEALTH AND NUTRITION (MNCHN)

As part as Philippines commitment to achieve the Millennium Development Goals or MDG 2015 particularly on MDG 5 which is to improve Maternal health. Maternal mortality ratio is an indicator of health care during pregnancy, childbirth and postpartum period. Maternal Mortality or Deaths of women during pregnancy, at childbirth or the period after childbirth is a very important indicator of the nation's health. It reflects to the health care given to the pregnant women. It was noted that maternal deaths were higher in the rural areas compared to the urban areas. Causes were poverty-related, such as: low educational level, poor health seeking behavior of the mother and inaccessibility to skilled birth attendants, birthing facilities and emergency obstetrical care. About two-thirds were home deliveries handled by unskilled birth attendants.

More pregnancies and deliveries, especially not properly spaced pregnancies, lead to higher risks on both the mother and her unborn child. Chronic diseases, iron deficiency anemia, hypertension and diabetes are also risks that contribute to higher mortality and unborn deaths. Another contributing factor to maternal death is poor prenatal and postnatal care. Untoward events which can lead to death may be prevented if these services are accessed and delivered.

Adequate and appropriate pre-natal care contributes much to the reduction of maternal and infant death and morbidity. However, healthy pregnancies could still end up in fatalities if problems arise during labor or during delivery which are not properly managed. Thus, along with a good prenatal care, the place of delivery and the birth attendant also play a major role in the outcome of a child birth.

21. PERSON WITH DISABILITY PROGRAM

Persons with disabilities (PWDs) according to UN convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, include those who have long-term physical, mental, intellectual or sensory impairments which in interaction with various barriers may hinder their full and effective participation in society on an equal basis with others. Globally, over 1 billion people or approximately 15% of the world's populations have some forms of disability. Also about 80% of the world's PWDs live in low-income countries, where in majority are poor and cannot access basic health services. In the Philippines based in the 2010 household populations of 92.1 millions about 1.4 million Filipinos or 1.57% are suffering from disability. Data also shows that about 3% of the population has some form of difficulty in functioning, such as, in seeing, even when wearing eyeglasses, hearing even with hearing aid, walking or climbing steps, remembering or concentrating and communicating. There are many factors which contribute to the increasing number of PWDs. Some of these factors are population ageing, increasing incidence of acute and chronic illness, and traumatic injuries resulting to disabilities. There are nine types of disabilities identified: psychosocial, mental, disability, chronic illness, speech and hearing impairment, learning, mental, orthodontic, visual impairment and those with multiple disabilities.

The DOH issued administrative Order No. 2006-0003, which specifically provides the strategic framework and operational guidelines for the implementation of health program for PWDs. Recently, the World Health Organization released the Global Disability Action Plan 2014-2021. The action plan identifies three major objectives: 1.

To remove barriers and improve access to health services and programs. 2. Strengthen and extend rehabilitation, assistance and support services, and community-based rehabilitation, and 3. Strengthening collection of relevant and internationally comparable disability data. PWDs should have access to health and wellness services to help them attain their maximum potential and become productive members of society. Information should be provided on the current actions and interventions being done to improve the health and wellness of PWDs, and to support our PWDs as we aim to provide them equal opportunities for them to become productive citizens and may actively participate in the growth and development of our country.

22. EXPANDED PROGRAM ON IMMUNIZATION

Philippines has committed to achieve the Millennium Development Goals (MDG) by 2015. The entire health sector is accountable to at least four goals such as: MDG 1: Eradicate extreme poverty and hunger; MDG 4: Reduce child mortality; MDG 5: Improve maternal health; MDG 6: Combat HIV/AIDS, TB, Malaria and other diseases. Immunization as the critical public health intervention and still the most cost effective strategy in reducing illnesses and deaths encompasses the four goals. While immunization saves lives of children, boys and girls and mothers, it also addresses the issue of poverty and hunger by improving the well being of the whole citizenry as a whole thereby making them healthy, nourished and productive. Hepatitis B as one of the major diseases and a public health problem in the country is the only type of cancer so far that can be controlled through immunization.

The performance of Expanded Program on Immunization from the 1980s up to the present has met its highs and lows for varied reasons. While immunization coverage has slowly improved in some areas of the country, recently, there is wide disparity between regions, provinces and cities. There have been difficulties observed in reaching the marginalized and disadvantaged populations. If these communities are not reached, disease control, eradication and elimination will never be sustained nor be on track.

23. RABIES PREVENTION AND ERADICATION PROGRAM

Issues and Challenges

- Rabies continues to be a public health problem in Bohol. Raising of dogs as a common practice is very much a part of the day to day life of the constituents in the province of Bohol. Henceforth, incidence of rabies is expected as this disease is commonly transmitted thru dogs.
- Programs have been initiated to control the disease in the island since the 1990's. However, less has been achieved and much has yet to be done. Reported animal bite cases has been increasing for the past years. At least 4,249 in 2012, 5,457 in 2013, 6,506 in 2014 and 7,812 animal bite cases in 2015. 59% of animal bites are among the >15 years of age, and 53% of animal bites are among males.

- Access to Post Exposure Prophylaxis has significantly improved with the establishment of more animal bite treatment centers but with 5% variable in the completion rate. None-compliance of the 4 doses / full course PEP vaccination (despite free doses given by all Government Initiated Animal Bite Centers). Only 54% of category III exposures are given RIG since bitten cases cannot afford the cost of the RIG.
- Population / General public unaware of the existence and/or the functions of a BALA
- BALA's poor and/or negligence to his/her assigned duties and responsibilities
- BALA's Pre-exposure Prophylaxis not continuous / new BALA personnel each year.
- MAO's delayed response and/or inability to take adequate and immediate action when situation and bite victims demands of them.
- No increase of budget despite the annual increase of animal bite cases
- Accommodation of free full course PEP vaccination by selected individuals (more often not indigent persons)
- Non-implementation of para-legal / ordinances during almost every animal biting incident. In most animal bite case, dog owners can easily deny ownership over their pet to escape accountability to the harm and damage done.
- Underreporting of animal bite cases due to unreported cases of bite victims seeking medical interventions / treatment at private hospitals.

24. PHILIPPINE POPULATION COMMISSION (POPCOM)

The Philippine Population Management Program (PPMP) is being implemented through its three main program components; Responsible Parenthood and Family Planning (RP/FP), Adolescent Health and Youth Development, (POPDEV) Integration. These three components deal the main population issues related to sexual and reproductive health, including fertility and family planning concerns. It primarily aims to help couples to realize their desired timing, spacing, and number of children in accordance with their socioeconomic, emotional, and psychological capacity.

The (AHYD) program aims to address issues related to adolescent and youth sexuality and reproductive health, including too early pregnancy. It aims to provide adolescent and youth with the appropriate information and life skills to enable them to cope with issues related to their sexual and full development into adulthood. And, POPDEV integration is a broad strategy of promoting the integration of population factors and dimensions in sustainable development initiatives. It aims to contribute to achieving population outcomes and processes in the balance with socioeconomic conditions and development patterns. Several reports and study shows that young Filipinos are besiege with challenges and problems rooted in various factors which are uncalled for. These result to health and other social issues which have great impact in the family, community and our nation.

In Bohol Province, our data shows that for the last two years (2013- 2014),the number of teenage pregnancy is growing rapidly then, 2015 it is it goes a bit down.

Fortunately, the youth sector is a great resource and part of the solution of every problem should they be given an active role in every aspect of program planning, implementation, and evaluation.

The Bohol Province in partnership and great support from POPCOM 7, (AHYDP) as one of its core components which aims to develop well-informed, empowered, responsible and healthy adolescents who are leaders in the community. Series of orientation with “CROSSROADS” film showing to peer educators ages 15 to 24 years old, school base/out of school youth. It is a situational dramatization of the risky behaviours of the youth such as premarital sex, teenage pregnancy, smoking, drinking, and drug abuse. After the movie is shown, focus group discussions are done facilitated by experienced peer facilitators to highlight the core messages of the movie including the importance of life skills. The next trainings will be the ladderized approach then, as they graduate from the trainings they are called Peer Advocates. They are the pioneer peer advocates and created an organization called BOLAAHD, BoholLeadersAndAdvocatesFor Health and Development.

Gaps and Issues

- No allocation of funds for all POPCOM activities
- Lack of knowledge on issues related to adolescent and sexuality and reproductive health, including too early pregnancy and childbirth of AHYD school base/out of school youth at barangay level.
- Lack of established adolescent friendly health services and youth centers

Strategies/Interventions

- Stakeholders meeting (The issues affecting the young people that should be addressed by all sectors in the community)
- Recruitment and screening of participants (The screening of process is a very crucial aspect of the program since it will set its direction and pace because all activities particularly the capability building will be customized to the participants)
- Capability Building (The Peer Ed program will follow the ladderized approach in capacitating the selected participants to become Peer Educators and eventually

Youth Advocates to ensure quality and continuity of learning and skills development.

25. NUTRITION PROGRAM

Protein-energy malnutrition (PEM) and micronutrient deficiencies remain the leading nutritional problems in the Philippines as well as in our Province. The prevalence of wasting and stunting among Filipino children noted in the past 2 years and past 3 years in weight for age, the prevalence of underweight and overweight slowly decreasing but still a problem due to big numbers of malnourished children.

Overweight and obesity are also prevalent in the province affecting a significant proportion of children, adolescents and adults which predispose them to certain nutrition and health risks. This evident in the rising trend in the prevalence of disease of the heart and vascular system.

The status of micronutrient malnutrition is likewise an important concern in the province. Vitamin A supplementation given to 6-59 months old and iron supplementation are among the important indicators in child health. Through Garantisadong Pambata campaign which is conducted every April and October, there

is a mass distribution of Vitamin A capsules. These are provided to the RHU's. Not all LGU's are purchasing Iron supplements for the preschool children. So they are all depending on the few supplies from the Department of Health.

Iodine supplementation through iodized salt utilization reduced the prevalence of iodine deficiency disorder from moderate to mild levels. Pregnant women were given Iodized oil capsules to prevent miscarriage and stillbirths.

Despite the availability of Vit. A capsules, the Province has only 84.5% coverage of Vit.A and 80.03 % coverage for deworming (based on April 2015 GP report) which is far below from thenational performance target of 95% for Vitamin A.

Iron Deficiency Anemia remains as one of the most common nutritional deficiencies, but efforts to address these situation continues, to treat and prevent the condition wherein extensive supplementation of Iron capsules to pregnant and lactating women and iron syrup to the preschool children in continuously implemented.

Malnutrition is caused by a host of interrelated factors-health, physical, social, economic and others. Food supply and how it is distributed and consumed by a populace have consequent impact on nutritional status.

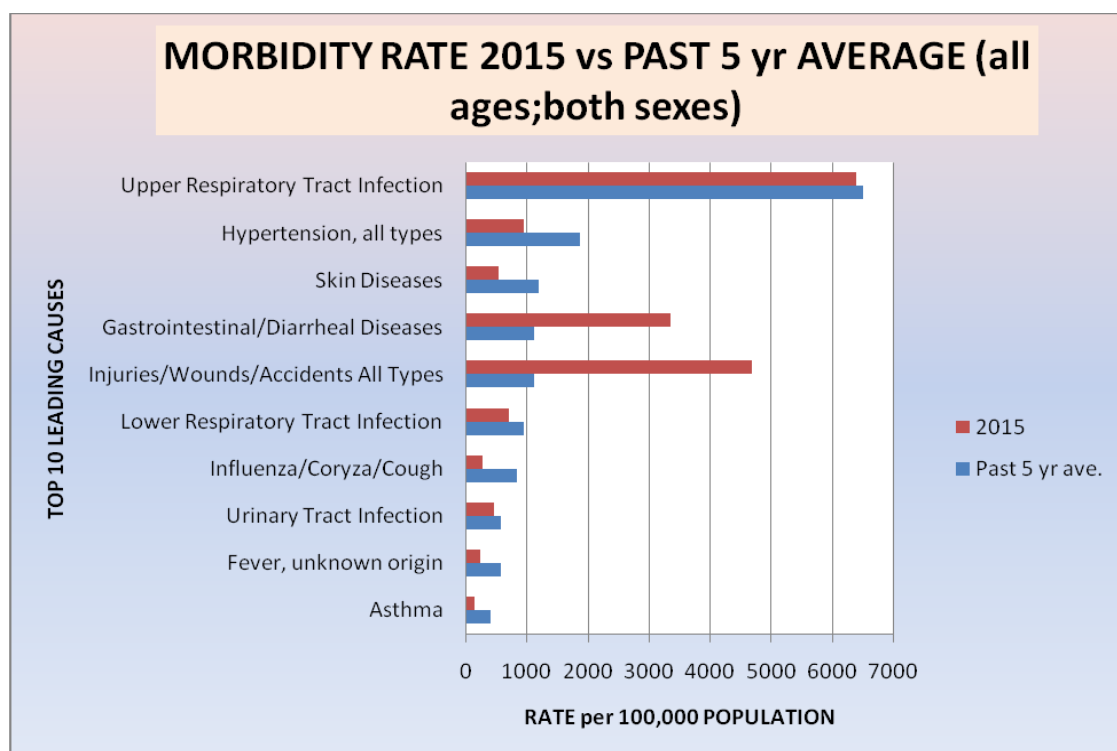

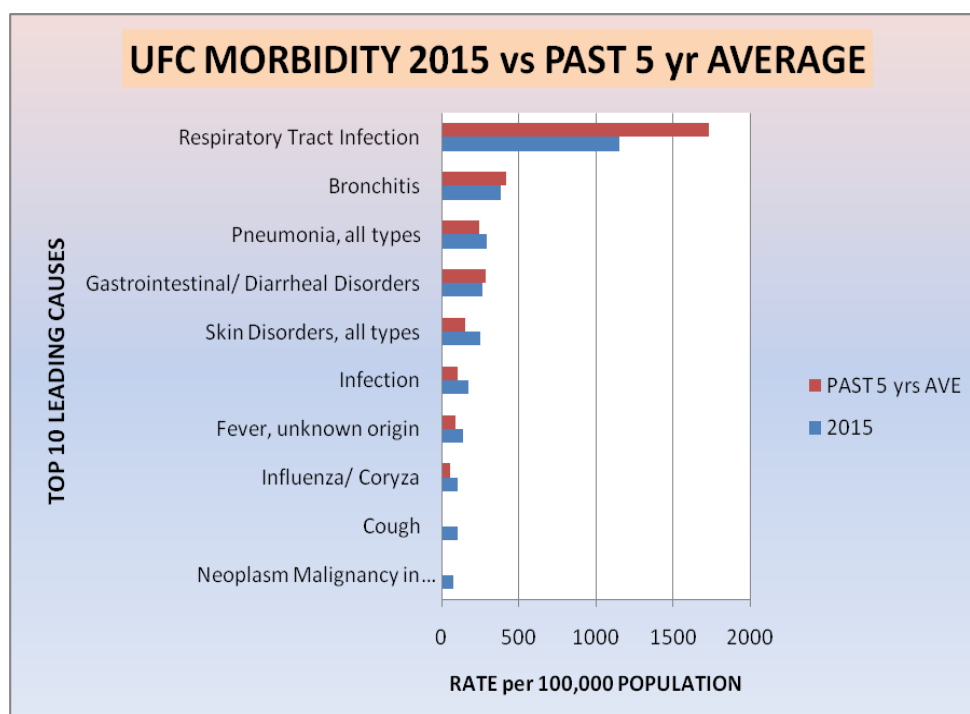
26. HEALTH INFORMATION

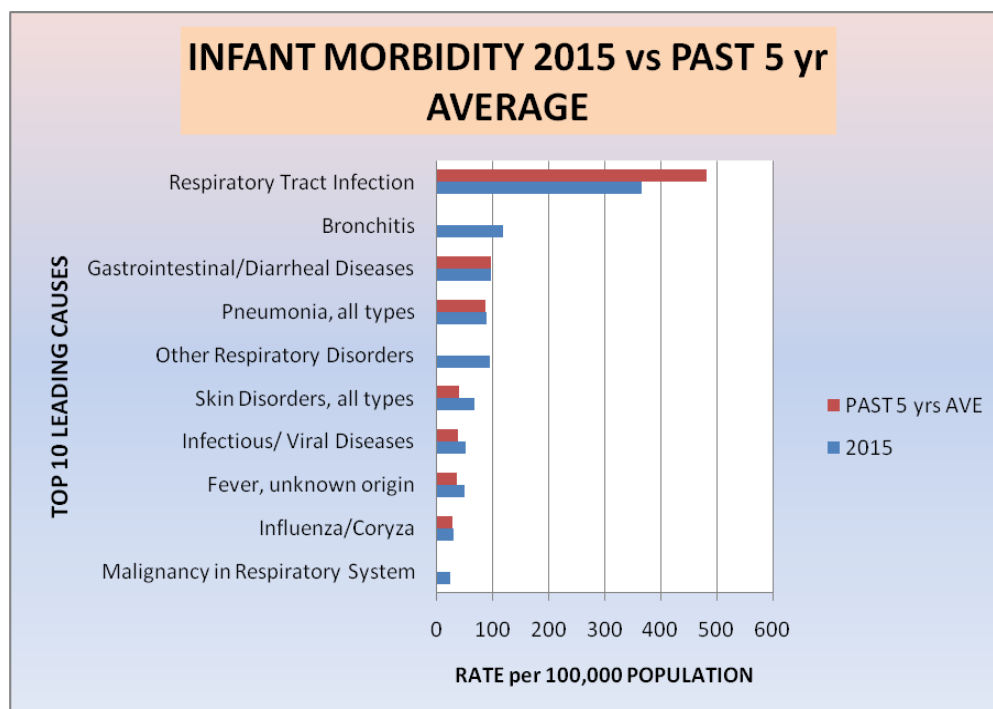
TOP TEN MORBIDITY 2015 PER 100,000 POPULATION



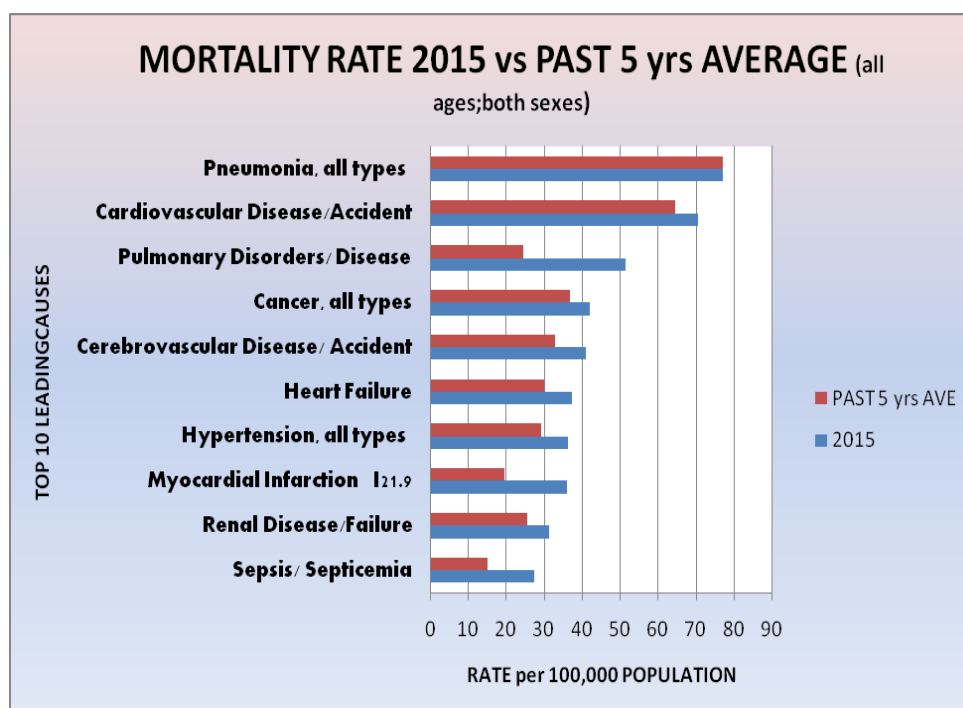
UNDER FIVE CHILD MORBIDITY RATE AND LEADING CAUSES 2015 PER 1,000 LIVEBIRTHS



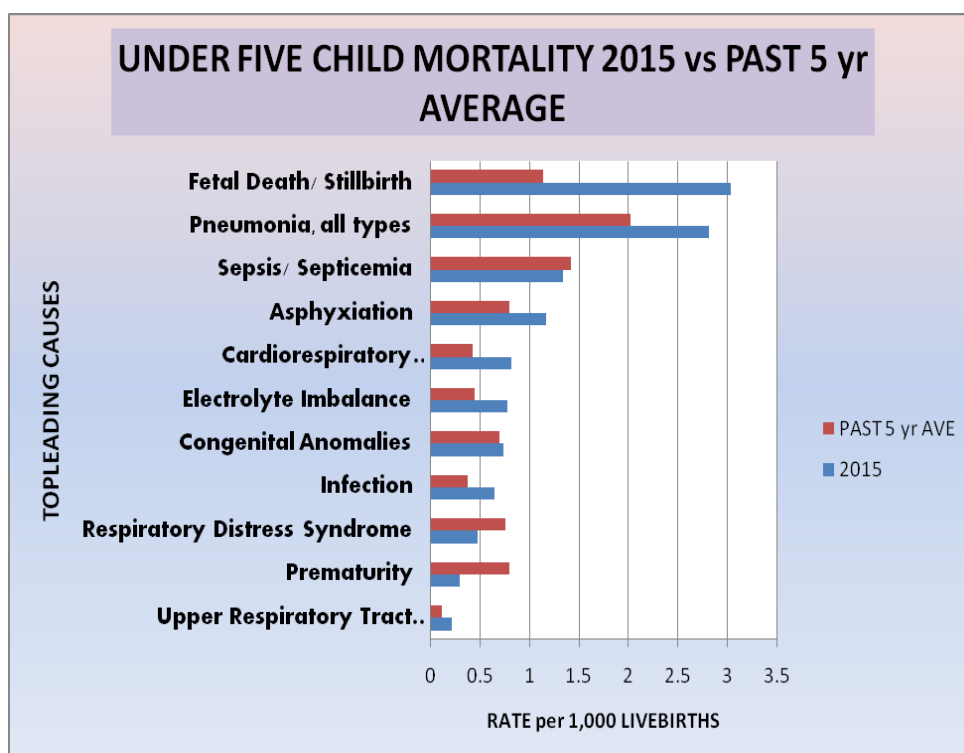
**INFANT MORBIDITY LEADING CAUSES AND RATE 2015
PER 1,000 LIVEBIRTHS AND PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION**



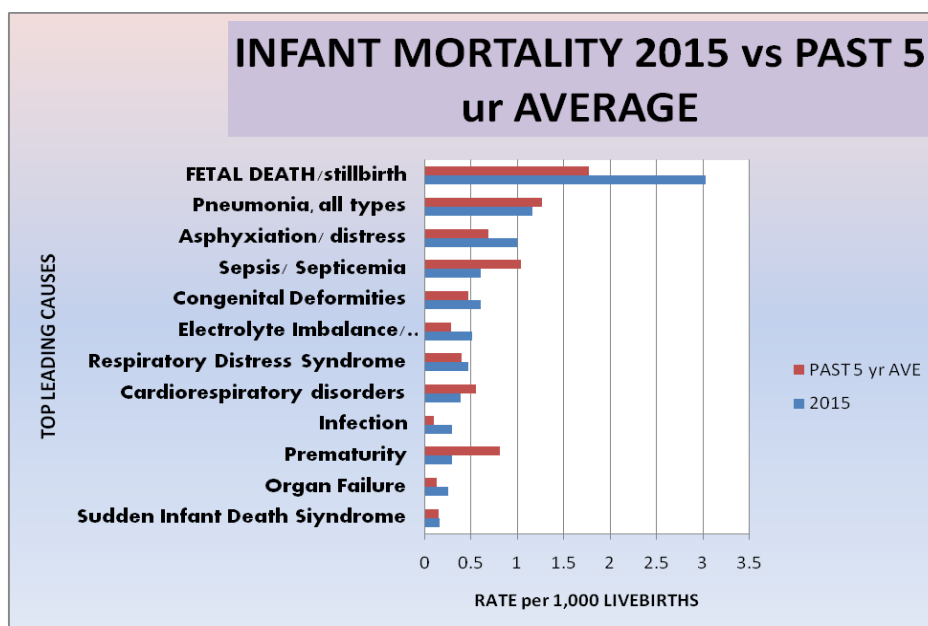
**MORTALITY LEADING CAUSES , NUMBER AND RATE 2015
PER 100,000 POPULATION**



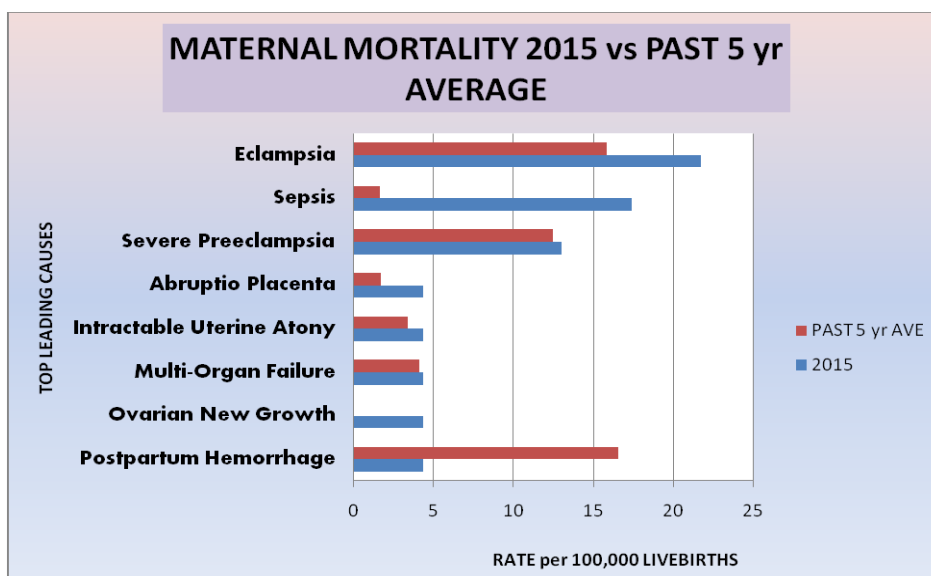
UNDER FIVE MORTALITY LEADING CAUSES , NUMBER AND RATE 2015 PER 1,000 LIVEBIRTHS

The leading cause of morbidity for 2015 is Respiratory Tract Infection with 85,585 number of cases and 6,499.47 occurrence rate per 100,000 population. This has also been the consistent number one cause of sickness for the last 5 years from 2010 to 2015 with an average of 81,760.00 cases per annum and 6,389.41 occurrence rate per 100,000 population. Respiratory Tract Infection is also the leading cause of morbidity among children under the age of 5 years as well as infants per 1,000 livebirths with 26,664 and 8,435 cases for 2015, respectively.

On the other hand, pneumonia (all types) ranks as the top leading cause of mortality in 2015 with 1,014 number of cases and 77 occurrence rate per 100,000 population, while in children under 5 years of age and among infants fetal death or stillbirth is the lead cause of death. Eclampsia, on the other hand, is the main cause of maternal death.

Also shown in the graphs presented are the comparative illustration of the top 10 leading causes of morbidity and mortality for 2015 among all ages, under 5 children and infants from the results in the past 5 years.

The Provincial Government of Bohol operates ten hospitals since the devolution from the national government in 1991. These are located in different parts of the province such that each of the six inter-local health zones (ILHZ) of the province has at least one hospital within it except for Tagbilaran ILHZ whose referral hospital is the Governor Celestino Gallares Memorial Hospital in Tagbilaran City which is a Department of Health (DOH)-retained hospital. Being province-owned hospitals, these are directly under the Governor as the Local Chief Executive through the Provincial Health Office.

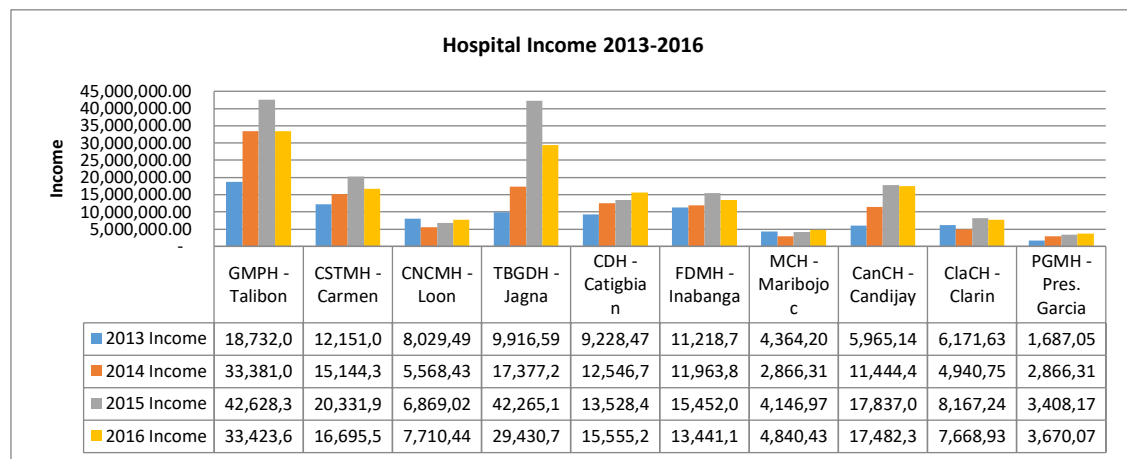
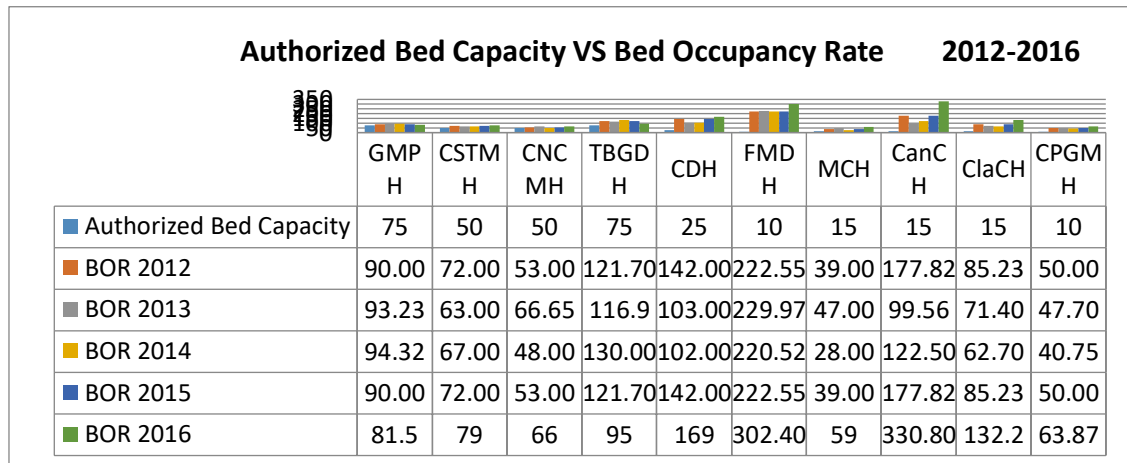

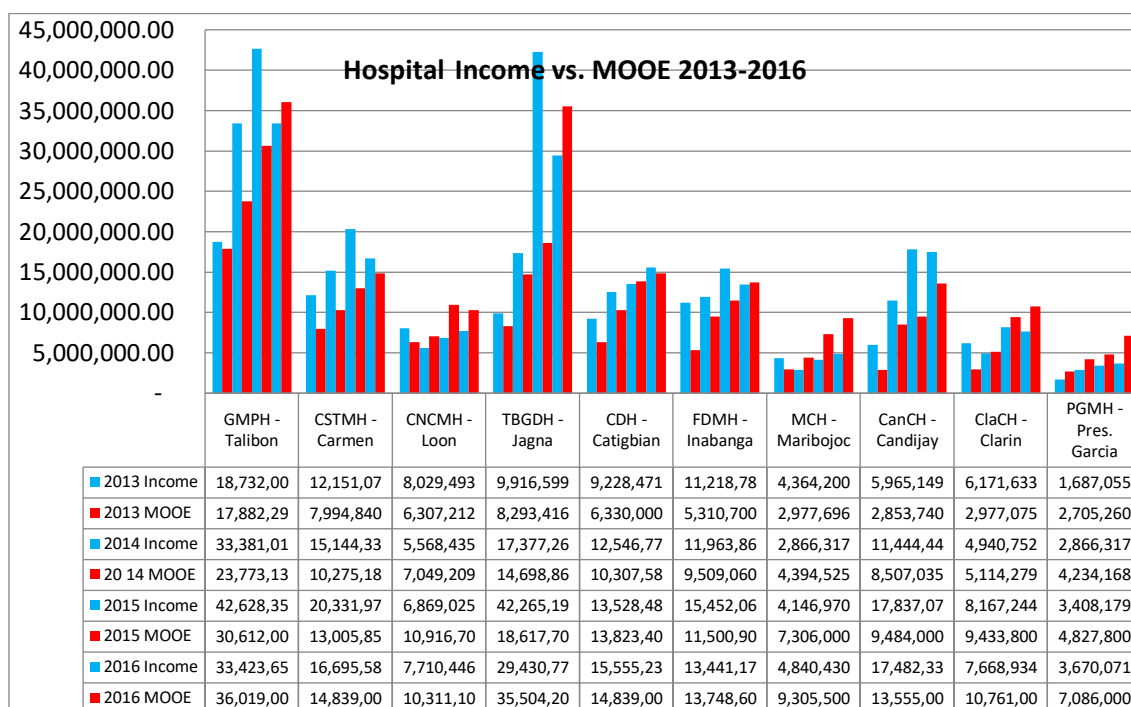

The preceding data showed that many of our hospitals have bed occupancies which are more than their authorized bed capacities over the past several years. Recently, we have applied to the DOH for expansion of the approved bed capacities of four of our hospitals as follows:

Among these four hospitals, only TBGDH had met the standard required for the bed capacity and was granted by the DOH as authorized bed capacity of 75. The three other hospitals still need to meet the requirements of the standards for the authorized bed capacities that they are applying for.

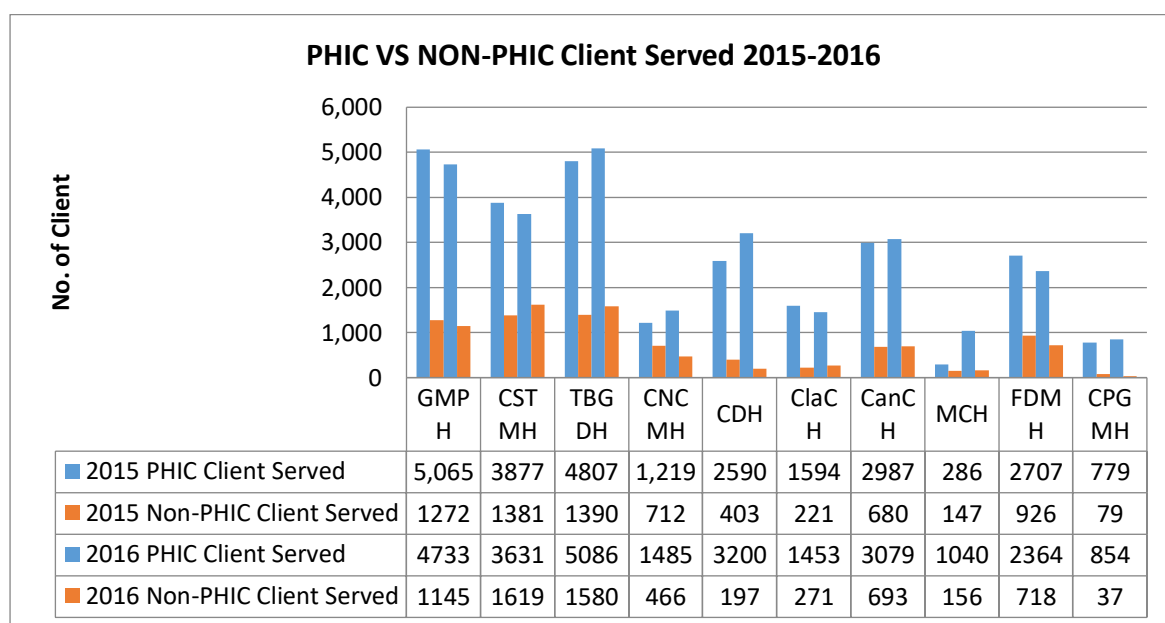

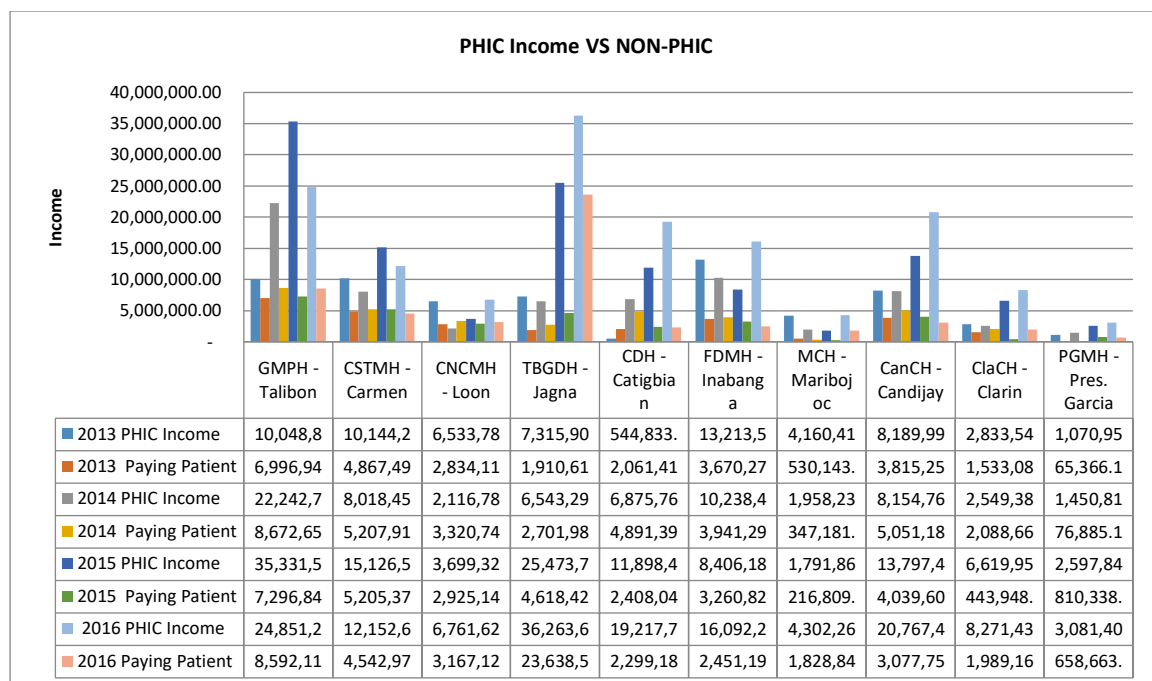

Aside from infrastructure and equipment, the provincial government also strived to strengthen other areas that affect health care such as health financing. It insured that utilization of PHIC programs and benefits are maximized and thereby established funding for PGB-sponsored PHIC enrollees and the Point of Care. As a result, most of the patients admitted in the hospitals are already PHIC members. The greater percentage of the source of hospital incomes also showed a shift from paying patients to PHIC patients.

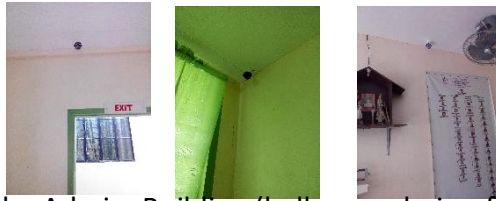

A. HIGHLIGHTS OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS FOR CY 2016

TESDA-BOHOL got a very satisfactory rating in the 2016 accomplishment report. The ratings in Profiled, Enrolled, Graduates, Assessed, Certified and Employed has gone up to more than a 100% vis-a-vis the target.

BUB and STEP scholarship trainings, which comprised the Community-based trainings, contributed much to the accomplishment of the targets.

TESDA-BOHOL is thankful for its partners and stakeholders, especially the LGUs in the province, partner Enterprises and Industries, as well as the private Technical-Vocational Institutions (TVIs), province-wide, for the support and cooperation in implementing and delivering our programs and services.

- **Bohol Peace Day 2016**

TESDA-BOHOL joins the Bohol Peace Day Celebration on February 11, 2016. The activity started off with a motorcade from Bool District to the CPG Sports Complex. TESDA PO staff, headed by Provincial Director, Engr. Samuel A. Jordan were among the attendees, along with the employees from the Bohol Provincial Capitol, City Government of Tagbilaran and from the different NGAs in Bohol including the Armed Forces of the Philippines and the Philippine National Police.

The said activity was done to declare the province as an insurgent-free province after almost 30 years of trying to find out the best approach and intervention to address the local communist insurgency that has gripped the country until today in many other provinces of the Philippines, according to the AFP and the PNP.

Freeing of the doves done by the participants, was among the memorable enactment which symbolizes Bohol's freedom and peace in the entire province.

- **Drug Test**

In compliance to TESDA Circular No. 52 series of 2016 entitled, "Guidelines in the Conduct of Mandatory Random Drug Testing of TESDA Personnel", all the thirty-three

(33) TESDA-Bohol employees underwent the random drug testing on December 20, 2016, at Gov. Celestino Gallares Memorial Hospital, Tagbilaran City. TESDA-Bohol adheres to the thrust of the present administration for the mandatory drug testing which aims to boost the public's trust in the bureaucracy and bolster the anti-drug campaign of Pres.Duterte. Results issued by the Gov. Celestino Gallares Memorial Hospital showed that TESDA-Bohol is drug free. It is the pride of TESDA-Bohol that all its men and women are in good state and serving the Boholanos in terms of technical education and skills development with utmost dedication and commitment.

- **Construction of GAD Building**

In compliance to Gender and Development (GAD), a building was constructed in TESDA-Bohol in December 2016. The ongoing construction of the building is an evidence of a being gender sensitive and responsive office. The building features a waiting area for clients, especially to women and PWDs. It has also a comfort room for men and women and a breastfeeding area. The said building is constructed adjacent to the TESDA-BOHOL provincial office, in Cogon Dist., Tagbilaran City, to better accommodate and serve our Tech-Voc clients in the province.

- **Women Empowerment thru GAD Fund of LGU-Tubigon**

PTC Tubigon was a proud partner of the Local Government of Tubigon headed by Engr. William Jao, Municipal Mayor and its GAD focal, Kag. Peluche Bergado, in its program on the empowerment of women and girls, leveling the playing field for female entrepreneurs and job creators and unleashing the potential of women in the workplace. A training in Candle- Making with 30 participants was conducted on October 24-29, 2016, a week before All Souls Day, at PTC Tubigon. The participants were solo parents, housewives, senior citizens, PWDs and drug surrenderers.

- **TESDA Bohol Holds Forum with Industry Partners**

TESDA-BOHOL hosted a consultation forum with its industry partners last August 9, 2016 in Tagbilaran City. The agency, headed by Provincial Director Francisca R. Opog, gathered representatives from its partners in the hotel, health and wellness, metal works, construction, dress-making, pastry and food industries for a one-day forum to talk about how to improve the quality of graduates from TESDA Training Institutions and private TVET providers with various training programs registered with TESDA. In her opening remarks, Dir. Opog expressed her great appreciation for the presence of industry partners to the forum. She added that the opinions of partners, who are the

end users of the graduates of the training courses, are essential inputs to realize the agency's goal of improving the curriculum of the trainings offered. The one-day workshop ended with a promise from the TESDA Provincial Director to bring all the recommendations from the participants to the regional and national levels so that policies can be made to accommodate the suggestions to improve the training courses offered by TESDA.

- **Negosyo Center In Talibon Bohol**

A Negosyo Center was launched by the Department of Trade and Industry in coordination with LGU-Talibon and as well as a MOA signing on December 27, 2016 at the Municipal Hall of Talibon, Bohol. The event was attended by Bohol Governor, Hon. Gov. Edgar M. Chatto. Among the officials who graced the affair were DTI R-7 Regional Director, Asteria C. Caberte, 2nd District Congressman Erico Aristotle Aumentado, Talibon Municipal Mayor and Vice Mayor, Restituto B. Auxtero and Cleto Garcia, Engr. Albert M. Uy, MSMED Co-Chair, DTI OIC-PD Maria Soledad Balistoy. Also present were, the provincial directors from the different NGAs in Bohol with TESDA Director Francisca R. Opog, with PTC-Inabanga Center Administrator, DOST, DILG, and DA. The Negosyo Center was launched as a One-Stop-Shop that caters to the entrepreneurs' needs and also to provide a venue for coordination and collaboration with the Local Government Units and other agencies and organizations.

- **Out-Reach Program**

The TESDA-Bohol celebrated its Christmas get-together with the ATI Tribe in Botoc, Loay, Bohol last December 21, 2016. The ATI Tribe is one of the indigenous peoples identified by the National Commission on Indigenous Peoples (NCIP) in Bohol. The group is headed by its Chieftain Vilma Pauden with nineteen (19) member families and 84 individuals at present. Each family received Christmas gifts (food packs), toys for the kids, souvenir for the women ATI and school bags with school supplies for high school students.

- **Trainees' Day Celebration**

August 25, 2016 marked TESDA's 22nd anniversary. The highlight of the celebration was the synchronized Trainees' Day. PTC-Tubigon came up with an activity that served as avenue for Cookery NC II TWSP trainees to showcase their talents, creativity and skills in decoration. A booth decorating contest with famous Philippine festivals as a theme and an Ala Carte Cooking contests were among the activities. The activity was graced by the presence of Ms. Eden B. Jao, First Lady of the municipality of Tubigon. PTC-Bilar also had their fruit-carving contest and zumba for health and

wellness. They also conducted a general cleaning in the surrounding areas for beautification. After which, socials were held by setting up a karaoke for all the trainees. PTC-Pilar started all their activities with a Holy Mass, followed by a blessing of the entire facility. A short activity with singing and dance presentations and a friendly basketball game were part of the program.

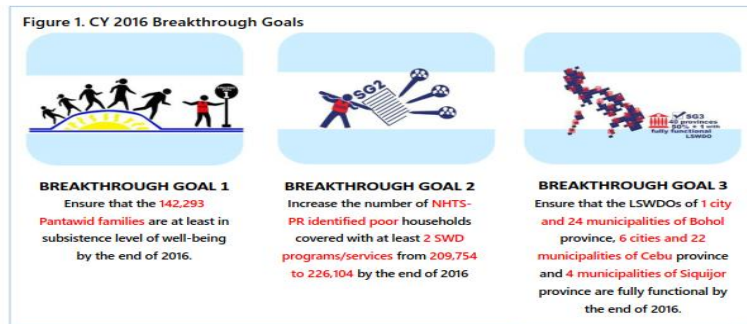
A. HIGHLIGHTS OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS FOR CY 2016

I. Introduction

CY 2016 was an exciting year for the Department of Social Welfare and Development as it celebrated its 65th year. As the year started, the Field Office staff had a homecoming with its former Director, Dir. Ma. Evelyn B. Macapobre, and she was warmly received and welcomed again to lead the Field Office. In the national scene, with the change of the political landscape after the 2016 Presidential Elections and the overwhelming expectation for a corruption-free governance under President Rodrigo Duterte's administration, Secretary Judy M. Taguiwalo, was installed as DSWD's leader during the midyear. Immediately, the new leadership re-orchestrated the DSWD brand of service delivery and steered its direction to Maagap at Mapagkalingang Serbisyo! and #DSWDMayMalasakit. Springing from these messages, the Filipinos, especially the poor, vulnerable and disadvantaged, were made empowered to expect better and faster service delivery from DSWD. Aside from the bandwagon of leadership, the highlights of CY 2016 included both strategic and programmatic vicissitudes. Major focus was on the achievement of the Department's Strategic Goals or the Breakthrough Goals for the Field Office. The inputs invested in the Field Office such as the installation of the modern disaster response facility, hiring of additional officers and staff, increase in the allocation for the indigent senior citizens' program and the review and revisions of the operational guidelines of selected major services/facilities had greatly improved the image of DSWD and strengthened its position as the lead agency of Social Protection. Cognizant that the work of decreasing poverty and advocating social protection is not doable without the support of the partners, the Field Office also held special activities for them and immediately respond to their needs. The accomplishments presented in this report reflected the win-win attitude and spirit that the Field Office and the various partners have forged throughout the year. This report forms part of the Regional accomplishment of DSWD Field Office VII.

II. BREAKTHROUGH GOALS' SCOREBOARD

Aligning to the department-wide Strategic Goals (SGs), the Field Office developed its Breakthrough Goals (BGs) at the start of the year (Figure 1). These were the share or contribution of the FO to the national goals. For the staff to retain awareness and to encourage goal setting and expectancy, the BGs and the DSWD's Vision, Mission and Goals were recited during the weekly convocation. Moreover, discussions on the BGs were also included in the agenda of the RMDC, URPMT and ManCom meetings and in the meetings of those units direct leading and contributing to the accomplishments. This report on the BGs scoreboard is an end line since the SGs at the national level ended on December 2016.



Breakthrough Goal 1

To ensure that there is available data to determine the well-being of the Pantawid families, the Field Office conducted the second-round of Social Welfare and Development Indicators (SWDI) assessment on August. The target for this round was 182,040 Pantawid families of which 56,098 families were from Bohol. The SWDI round 2 assessment took a lot of negotiations with the Central Office especially on the use of the SWDI-IS, the activity was not yet fully completed until the end of CY 2016. The administration of SWDI in hard-to-reach barangays, encoding and analysis of data, validation and spot checking of the SWDI round 2 assessment results will spill over until the first quarter of CY 2017. The data presented is the most recent by the end of CY 2016 which was processed by the M&E officers and Regional I.T. Officer (RITO) of Pantawid Pamilya Regional Project Management Office. Only 29,763 SWDI forms from Bohol were encoded in the FO-developed SWDI-IS by the end of December 2016 (see Table 1). Based on the encoded data, less than 1% are in the survival stage, 65% are in the subsistence level while 34% are in the self-sufficient level. These however are still vulnerable to shocks and their level of well-being may slide back anytime. Likewise, more focus is needed on the 125 who are still in the survival level.

Breakthrough Goal 2

Using the Social Protection Services-Information System (SPS-IS) developed and managed by the Listahanan Unit, the Field Office monitored the access to SWD programs/services of Pantawid and non-Pantawid households identified as poor during Listahanan-1. Table 2 displays the accomplishment of the Field Office for BG 2 wherein accomplishment greatly exceeded the set target. By the end of CY 2016, 70,028 poor households have already availed of at least 3 SWD programs & services. and 181,609 poor households (80.3%) already availed 4 or more SWD programs and services. No

household was able to avail of only 2 SWD program/service, 11% availed of at least 3 SWD program/service, 40% availed of at least 4 SWD program/service, and 49% were able to avail of 5 and above SWD program/service.

The various SWD programs/services availed are Pantawid Pamilya, Sustainable Livelihood (SLP), KALAHI (Maka-Masang Tugon, MCC, KC-NCDDP), Emergency/Core Shelter Assistance (ESA), Assistance to Individual in Crisis Situations- AICS (Medical/Hospitalization Assistance, Educational Assistance, Transportation Assistance, Relief Goods to El Nino affected families), Social Pension, Services from our Centers & Institutions, and various BUB projects. The various programs/services of DOH, PhilHealth, DILG, DOE, TESDA, DA, DAR, POPCOM, and those of the partner Provincial & City/Municipal governments and NGOs were also availed.

From the presented data in Table 2, no LGU in Bohol can be considered as fully functional as of 2nd Semester of CY 2016 assessment. Of the targeted 1 City and 24 municipalities, 24 LGUs are partially functional while only 1 LGU is considered fully functional. The provincial government was also assessed and functional status was attained. A greater effort is still needed for all target LGUs to attain full functionality.

III. Listahanan II

The NHTS-PR or Listahanan database served as the mechanism in selecting potential beneficiaries for any social protection programs/services that is being or will be implemented by NGAs, LGUs, NGOs and other stakeholders. The Listahanan is an important source of data to ensure that appropriate services and assistance is being provided to the targeted beneficiaries. The 1st round Listahanan was implemented last 2009. The Field Office spearheaded by the Listahanan Unit conducted the massive 2nd round household assessment of 843,275 households from June-December, 2015. Of these assessed households, 385,534 (45.7%) were identified as poor (see Table 4). Of the 246,631 assessed household in Bohol, 40.5% were identified as poor households. The launching of the Listahanan II database was conducted on June 27, 2016. This was a venue to inform the general public and various stakeholders that the updated database of poor households was completed and ready for sharing pending the finalization of its MOA for data utilization.

Given the intricacies of the RA 10173, the Listahanan Unit also carried out measures to ensure compliance to the new law. This includes digitizing and properly storing and disposing the Household Assessment Forms and Family Assessment Forms being used during the Listahanan I and II assessment, respectively.

The concerns encountered by the Listahanan Unit for the year were: a) having a greater number of unassessed ODA complaints which were already approved by the LVC due to the short duration of the validation phase; b) delay in the Listahanan II database data sharing MOA which consequently affected the prioritization of program/service beneficiaries in the LGUs and c) having a significant number of barangays with zero or very low percentage of identified poor. These concerns were already raised to the National Household Targeting Office and there are strategies identified for CY 2017 implementation to address them.

IV. MAJOR FINAL OUTPUTS (MFO)

MFOs are goods and services delivered to external clients based on the mandate of the agency. These are tools to evaluate performance vis-à-vis budget allocation. The succeeding sections highlight the accomplishments of the various units or programs organized by MFOs.

a. MFO I: Social Protection Policy Services

Social protection policy is integral in creating an enabling environment for inclusive growth, poverty reduction, convergence of service delivery, maximized synergies and active multi-stakeholder participation. MFO 1 (Social Protection Policy Services) provides data on policies, plans and programs formulated, enhanced, implemented and monitored by the Field Office. Social Protection handbook roll-out The SP Handbook serves as the primary reference in ensuring the adoption of the social protection lens for social protection programs and services especially among local government partners. Starting September 2015, the Planning Unit of the Field Office VII had conducted six roll-out trainings or orientation on the use of the Social Protection (SP) Handbook. Representatives (i.e. C/MSWD Officers, C/MPDCs, C/MLGOOs and C/MDRRMOs from 43 LGUs of Bohol have been oriented to the Social Protection Handbook (Table 5). The remaining LGUs of Bohol that are scheduled to be invited in 2017 SP Handbook rollout are Alburquerque, Antequera, Corella, San Isidro, and Sikatuna.

Social Technologies

The Department's social technologies are short-term, and relatively focused interventions responding to the emerging needs and trends that affect the lives of the poor, vulnerable and disadvantaged individuals, groups or families. These are developed based on the principles of holistic and community driven development and are harnessed from a multi-disciplinary and results-based perspectives. The social technology development starts with the process of identifying evidence-based social welfare and development gaps, emerging needs and trends and prioritizing a specific social issue that affects children, youth, women, family, older persons, persons with disability, indigenous peoples and displaced persons. Of the six social technologies implemented throughout the entire Region, only 1 was pilot-tested in Bohol which is the Comprehensive Program for Indigenous Peoples Especially Sama-Bajaus.

b. MFO II: Social Protection Services

Protective Services Program (PSP)

The Crisis Intervention Unit (CIU) of the Department of Social Welfare and Development under the Protective Services Program (PSP) comprises the 4 satellite offices namely the CIU Main, SWAD – Cebu, SWAD-Bohol and SWAD-Siquijor. In CY 2016, the total clients served by SWAD Bohol was 7,613, 9% higher than the 7,000 target to be served. Total amount disbursed amounted to Php 55,990,423.52 from its total allotment of Php 88,946,476.28 or 62.94%. Based on the submitted reports, assistance extended were medical assistance, educational assistance burial assistance, food assistance, transportation assistance and Cash for Work (CFW).

Supplementary Feeding Program (SFP)

With the continuing prevalence of malnutrition (i.e. undernutrition and over nutrition), the

Department continues to augment resources to the LGUs for the implementation of the Supplementary Feeding Program. This is one of the special programs of the Department mandated to provide timely supplementary food to identified beneficiaries to improve and sustain their nutritional status. The SFP does not only provide food to the enrolled day care children but imparts important nutrition concepts to parents and caregivers on how to prepare nutritious meals from locally available resources.

In CY 2016, the SFP implemented its Cycle 6 concurrently with the last phase of Cycle 5. For Cycle 6, SFP covered 2,585 child development centers (CDC) or 75% of the total CDCs. The number of children served in the entire region was 90,463 beneficiaries or 76% accomplishment from 75 out of 107 LGUs.

In Bohol, the program was only able to serve 78% of the targeted 33,072 children in Child Development Centers (CDCs). There were 10 LGUs which are not eligible for the Cycle 6 funds since they were still using their Cycle 5 funds including 5 from Bohol. These LGUs include: Minglanilla, Sibonga, Boljoon, Aloguinsan in Cebu; Sikatuna, Tagbilaran City, Trinidad, Ubay, Loboc in Bohol and Maria in Siquijor. Reasons for delayed implementation includes delayed submission of liquidation report by the LGUs thus funds were downloaded late. There were also LGUs with procurement problems (i.e. no PhilGeps registered, tedious bidding procedures, no suppliers, etc). There were some LGUs which did not implement during the Election ban even if we provided them the document showing that SFP is among the programs exempted by COMELEC. After the elections, there were also LGUs which changed the BAC members thus contributed to the delayed procurement process.

Social Pension for Indigent Senior Citizens

Social Pension for Indigent Senior Citizens is one of the many successful programs of DSWD. This is a provision of R.A 9994 the “Expanded Senior Citizens Act of 2010”. The programs aim

is to improve the living condition of our indigent senior citizens by providing a monthly stipend of P500.00 for their basic needs and medical needs. In addition, this program also aims to reduce incidence of hunger and protect them from neglect, abuse and deprivation.

The regular distribution of stipend to our indigent senior citizens increases their access to services particularly health care. The program also supports the family to provide care to their sick and disabled senior citizens. For this year, the region has a target of 67,567 beneficiaries. However, the Field Office had accomplished the 87% of the financial allocation for CY 2016 but exceeded its

target number of senior citizens served of 106% because of the replacements for those who died, transferred residence, with SSS and GSIS pension, cannot be located and with financial support from family. This same situation in physical and financial accomplishment applies to the province of Bohol (see Table 6).

Disaster Response Assistance Program

The Department continues to provide immediate relief and rehabilitation services to individuals, families and communities affected by disaster with proper coordination from various agencies as members of the Response Cluster.

In CY 2016, El Niño affected two provinces of the region and the Department immediately responded to El Niño affected families in the various municipalities by providing them with family food packs. More than Php 200,000,000.00 amount utilized in responding efficiently and effectively to the victims (Table 7). Response to El Niño stretched until the fourth quarter of CY 2016 since the farmers only yield limited harvest. In addition, assistance to fire victims was extended amounting to more than Php 2,000,000.00 in Bohol province.

The Department also continued with the release of the Emergency Shelter Assistance and the Core Shelter Assistance Program in the municipalities of Bohol and Cebu provinces (see Table 6).

Pantawid Pamilyang Pilipino Program

The Pantawid Pamilyang Pilipino Program (4Ps) is a human development measure of the national government that provides conditional cash grants to the poorest of the poor, to improve the health, nutrition, and the education of children aged 0-18. The 4Ps has dual objectives as the flagship poverty alleviation program of the Philippine government, which is for social assistance and social development. This program also fulfills the commitment to the Millennium Development Goals, and more recently, the Sustainable Development Goals. With the need to strengthen Social Protection services within the Region, the Pantawid program is one of DSWD's big ticket programs in poverty alleviation. Due to its need to be implemented in the Region, the

program has been implemented since 2008, covering Bohol, Cebu and Siquijor and its cities and municipalities.

In CY 2016, the Pantawid program has a target of 192, 980 households. Of these, the active, registered households constitute 190, 852 wherein 60,125 HHs are in Bohol province.

Kalahi-Comprehensive Integrated Delivery of Social Services (Kalahi-CIDSS)

With the completion of MCC and DFAT sub-projects, the region ended 2016 with 15 of the 177 municipalities that are expected to close by December 31, 2016; 41 of the 377 municipalities that are implementing cycle 2 and are about to transition to cycle 3; 1 of the 377 municipality that has just finished the enrollment process; and 27 of the 293 municipalities that are finishing up their 1st cycle (except for Balilihan, which has the same timeline as the 377 municipalities). Overall, the region ended the year with 83 municipalities from the 3 provinces of the region. These 83 municipalities cover 1,774 barangays with 486,596 direct household beneficiaries and 94,814 direct Pantawid household beneficiaries. All cycle 2 barangay assemblies for 377 municipalities and cycle 1 barangay assemblies for 293 municipalities were completed within the year. As of December 15, the regional barangay assembly participation rate is 71%, 9% shy of the regional target. Based on reported and encoded participation rates, none of the provinces reached the target 80% for both cycle 2 of 377 or cycle 1 of 293 areas (Table 24). Household participation rate in barangay assemblies is highest in the province of Bohol for both 377 and 293 projects of the entire region.

Sustainable Livelihood Program (SLP)

The Sustainable Livelihood Program aims to provide identified poor families with appropriate income-generating opportunities through microenterprise development or employment facilitation, to help improve their economic level of well-being. Eligible recipients under the program include Pantawid Pamilya family, NHTS-PR identified household, or vulnerable individual/family (PWDs, senior citizens, disaster affected, etc).

The program specifically targets the four economic sufficiency indicators of the Social Welfare and Development Indicators (SWDI) of the DSWD: a) employable skills, b) employment, c) income, and d) social security and access

to financial institutions. The program facilitates interventions that expand the livelihood asset base on the participants (human, social, physical, natural, and financial capital) to capacitate them in being able to either have gainful employment or successfully manage a microenterprise.

SLP targeted 24,732 households for the 2016 implementation with a corresponding allotted budget of Php 526,166,124.00 for the three provinces of the region namely; Bohol, Cebu and Siquijor. For Bohol, the program targeted to serve 10,992 households with an allotment of Php 221,603,248.00. By the end of the year, a total of 4,476 were served with fund obligated for submitted project proposals amounting to 245,344,509.32. However, cash utilization remained low at 40,492,884.83 by end of the year. This is so because some projects were still ongoing at the end of the year and payment or cash releases were not yet due.

c. MFO III: Capability-building Services

The Capability Building Unit of the Institutional Development Division is responsible for enhancing the competencies of staff and partners (intermediaries and stakeholders) of DSWD in performing and achieving its goals as lead in the social welfare and social protection sector.

For CY 2016, the Department set thrust and priorities on capacity building services which includes: 1) Fostering a culture of professionalism and excellence among its partners and organizational capabilities; 2) Provide technical and resource augmentation for responsive and efficient implementation of SWD programs and projects to ensure the protection of the vulnerable sectors; 3) Propose and host a learning institute for social protection; and 4) Strengthen capability of LGUs to implement disaster risk reduction strategies and delivers social protection services. A cumulative total of 3,258 staff were trained this year of which 42% is composed of male and 58% is female. There were 47 different types and categories of capability building activities conducted to address their competence. There were about 213 newly hired staff trained on DSWD's VMG, code of conduct, code of ethics, telephone etiquette and customer service. There were specialized trainings for Work Attitude and Values Enhancement and Organizational Effectiveness Seminar for special program staff based on training needs analysis. This is in line with the thrust to enhance professionalism and excellence in public service.

A total of 3,686 social welfare and development (SWD) workers and partner beneficiaries were trained in a total of fifty (50) capacity building activities. Of these, 36% of them are male and 64% are female. The total number of the participants has the following breakdown: 2,101 from the local government units (LGUs), 76 from non-government organizations, 151 from NGAs, 1,358 from volunteers and Parent Leaders, POs. Table 9 list down some of the Capability building and activities conducted by the Field Office for the CY 2016.

Technical Assistance (TA)

Workshop on the Crafting of Vision, Mission and Goals

The workshop was aimed at responding to the request of the LSWDOs to assist them in the crafting of their VMG anchored on the VMG of the LGU and on their mandate. The activity was held last November 10-11, 2016 in Cebu City participated by 30 participants from LGUs of Region VII. Initial VMG per LGU was crafted for finalization and approval of the Sanggunian.

Training on Family Preparedness and Camp Management and Camp Coordination One of the identified gaps among LGUs or LSWDOs for that matter is the lack of skills and capacity to provide immediate response during the occurrence of disaster. This can be attributed to lack or poor planning and preparations. Although mandated already by law

the creation and strengthening of the local disaster risk reduction and management councils, still for some LGUs this is of low priority.

To support this concern, Field Office through the DREAMU organized three (3) batches of the Family Preparedness and CCCM Training last August-September 2016 in the Provinces of Cebu, Bohol and Negros Oriental (for Cebu and Siquijor participants). The output of the training was the preparation of the LGU evacuation plans including identification of sites and personnel as well as budget for consideration in the LGU budget. A total of 65 LGUs were trained of which 25 LGUs were from Bohol province (see table below).

The provinces of Bohol and Cebu have very functional PDRMCS given their experiences in the 7.2 magnitude Earthquake and Typhoon Yolanda.

To note, our very own Holy Name University Chorale garnered a major prize during the first BICFC held in Tagbilaran City in March 2014.
- The Provincial Government of Bohol strongly encourage LGUs to put up their own chorale groups and the CCAD will provide the necessary technical support. Eventually, our citizens will be given the opportunity to express and excel their talents in a higher level. Starting in 2016 and every year thereafter, the Provincial Government of Bohol will organize the Bohol Provincial Choir Festival and Competition to bring all municipal choirs in one setting and give them the opportunity to perform and compete with each other. Eventually, they will represent the province in outside choral competitions in the future.
- The Provincial Government of Bohol will continuously promote, develop and create awareness among our constituents about the rich cultural heritage of Boholanos by conducting the InSPIRED HEAT IT Bohol Culture and Arts caravan in different localities in response to the clamour of our constituents demand for cultural presentations in their respective communities.
- Moreover, the Provincial Government of Bohol thru the Center for Culture and Arts Development (CCAD) has also established a comprehensive program to

support promising Boholano artists and talents who aspire to excel in national competitions or pageants, etc. The program also gives due recognition to Boholano leaders and exemplars who brought honor and prestige to the Province of Bohol in their respective area of expertise.

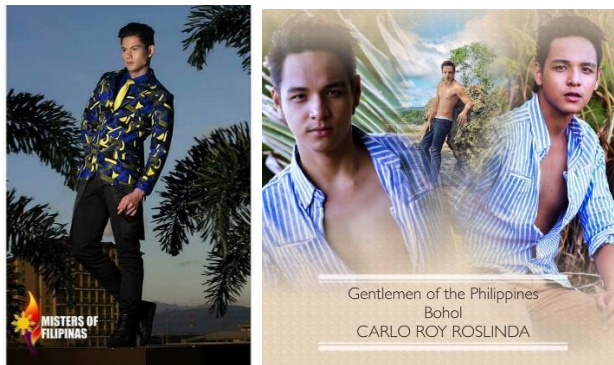

IP patients were referred to nearest Government hospital with Certification of Tribal Membership for zero hospital billing. Medical Financial assistance amounting to 6,800.00 was given to IP patients with serious cases.

2016 was normal working calendar year for the NCIP Bohol Community Service Center, however on the last quarter of the year we were able to implement two (2) livelihood projects/training. The Traditional Handicraft Project for the Eskaya Tribe in Barangay Taytay, Duero; Cantaub, Sierra Bullones and Lundag, Pilar, Bohol and Fashion Jewelry Making for the Badjao Tribe in Barangay Totolan, Dauis. They were able to make table runners and placemats out of buri and rattan sticks and produce crafted water pearls and crystals made into bracelets, earrings and necklace respectively.

These training were funded by the NCIP and in coordination with DTI-Bohol who provided us with trainers equipped with mastery on the crafts and technique to our IPs.

Responsive to the needs of its members, Pag-IBIG offers Short Term Loan Programs such Multi-Purpose Loan (MPL) & Calamity Loan (CAL) - a loan program that can be tapped by the members to provide immediate funds for their basic needs. The Multi-Purpose Loan (MPL) is being offered year round as a regular program bearing an interest rate of 10.5% per annum and the Calamity Loan (CAL) on the other hand shall be available within 90-days only from the declaration of the specific area declared under a state of the calamity, bearing an interest of 5.95% per annum. Both loan programs are payable in 24-intallments. The branch released P155.817 million loan value to 9,559 STL borrowers.

I. HIGHLIGHTS OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS FOR CY 2016

1. For the Month of January 2016

INTRODUCTION:

The year 2015 has passed and we are now starting the year 2016. Along with this, January connotes regular quarterly surveys for PSA. These are LFS and QSPBI wherein the rider for this quarter's LFS is the 2015 FIES-2nd Visit. Monthly statistics were as well gathered and submitted. Civil registration functions of the office were also accomplished for this month.

STATISTICAL:

January 2016 Labor Force Survey & 2015 Family Income and Expenditures Survey – 2nd Visit

The 3rd level training for the January 2016 round of the Labor Force Survey, with the 2015 Family Income and Expenditures Survey – 2nd Visit as a rider survey, was conducted on January 4-9, 2016 at Reyna's Haven and Gardens, Tagbilaran City. This was attended by twenty four (24) hired service contractors and SCO I Epifania H. Antopina. The trainers were Stat II J. Sarmiento and SCO II Colita E. Montoya. The enumeration phase then followed with 41 sample EAs for this quarter and a total of 609 sample households.

2015 Fourth Quarter Quarterly Survey of Philippine Business and Industry (QSPBI)

The last quarter round of the 2015 QSPBI was done this month. As of January 31, 2016, two out of twelve (16.67%) questionnaires were collected and submitted to PO.

Other Statistical Activities

Weekly Survey of Petroleum Products. For the month of January 2016, SCO J. Antopina was able to submit reports for all the weeks of January. However, only the second one was submitted on time.

Monthly Collection of Prices. SCO Jun Antopina submitted the Monthly CPI first and second phase data files on January 11 and 20, 2016, respectively.

Construction and Domestic Trade Statistics. The number of Approved Building Permits and the collected Domestic Trade Statistics for the month of December were as follows:

2. For the Month of February 2016

“Makisali, Makiisa sa dekadang CRVS” is the theme for the 2016 Civil Registration Month. In line with this, PSA Bohol has been active in the conduct of several activities for the month. The different LCROs of this province as well had organized different activities for the whole month wherein PSA employees never missed to participate. Aside from all these affairs, PSA Bohol still prioritized the statistical and civil registration activities of the office.

STATISTICAL:

2015 Census of Population (POPCEN 2015) Machine Processing

Next to the manual processing is the machine processing of the POPCEN 2015 Forms. This involves scanning, data entry, coding and editing. PSA Bohol hired eleven data encoders, three coders, three editors and one shift supervisor for this phase. These hired personnel, together with the PO Staff, attended a training on February 2-6, 2016. The trainers were Stat II Felixberto M. Sato, Jr. of RSSO 7 and Donna de Jesus of Central Office. There were also participants from PSA Siquijor, namely, OIC PSO Felicisimo Valios and DSO Joselito Maghanoy. As of February 29, the machine processing, in terms of number of barangays, is 67.5% done with scanning, 59.5% is already interpreted, 35% is done with data entry, 17.3% for coding, and 13.1% for editing.

January 2016 Labor Force Survey & 2015 Family Income and Expenditures Survey – 2nd Visit

After the enumeration, the January 2016 LFS questionnaires went through manual and machine processing. The raw and clean data files were submitted last February 6 and 12, respectively.

On the other hand, four manual processors were hired for the Manual Processing of the 2015 FIES 2nd Visit round. The processors, together with SCO Epifania Antopina, attended the 2nd Level Training on February 9-10, 2016 at PSA RSSO 7 Office, Cebu City.

Also, the POPCEN 2015 Machine Processing, one of the highlights of the year, is nearing to a point of denouement and is expected to culminate by the end of June. On the other hand, civil registration activities were still undertaken. In terms of the office's partnership with other agencies, four OJTs from BISU completed their internship at PSA. In addition, SCO Evangelista attended a mass wedding in Talibon this month.

STATISTICAL:

2015 Census of Population (POPCEN 2015) Machine Processing

As of April 30, the POPCEN 2015 machine processing, in terms of number of forms, is 100% done with scanning, 99.7% is already interpreted, 92.3% is done with data entry, 34.9% is done with coding, and 33.9% has been edited. Out of 48 municipalities, 12 were already transmitted to RSSO for certification pass.

April 2016 Labor Force Survey

The April 2016 round of the LFS now used the 2013 Master Sample. Four replicates from the 2013 MS, consisting of 384 sample households, and a parallel of one replicate from the 2003 MS, with 172 sample households, comprised the total workload for the province. The 3rd Level Training was conducted last April 4-5, with seven hired SRs and two trainers, namely, Stat II Jocelyn Sarmiento and SCO I Venus P. Gloria. The enumeration started on April 11, 2016 due to the delay on the delivery of the enumeration materials. The SRs then submitted the accomplished questionnaires on April 29-30, 2016.

2015 Annual Survey of Philippine Business and Industry/Survey on Information and Communications Technology

PSA started to conduct the 2015 ASPBI this month. The rider survey this year is 2015 SICT. The 3rd Level Training was conducted last April 6-8 with two hired SRs and 9 regular employees as the participants. The trainers were SCO II Colita E. Montoya and SCO I Epifania H. Antopina. For Bohol province, there are 201 ASPBI sample establishments. Out of this, only 57 establishments are samples for SICT. As of the end of the month, the distribution rates for ASPBI and SICT are 72.14% and 63.16%, respectively.

PSO Jessamyn C. Alcazaren discussed the revised IRR of RA 9255 among the PSA Bohol employees on August 15, 2016. In addition, some of the highlights of the Manual of Instructions as well as the FAQs were tackled.

9. For the Month of September 2016

It has been three years since the merging of four statistical agencies of the government into one, thereby creating the Philippine Statistics Authority. And last September 9, several activities were done by PSA Bohol family to celebrate its 3rd Anniversary. In addition to the statistical and civil registration functions, employees of the office actively participated in the CSC Month Fun Run and the 2016 Alay Lakad.

STATISTICAL:**2015 Annual Survey of Philippine Business and Industry/Survey on Information and Communications Technology**

As of the end of the month, the collection rate for ASPBI rose to 99.0%. On the other hand, the remaining one questionnaire for SICT was collected and submitted to PO.

2016 Updating of List of Establishments (ULE)

For the first month of the operation, more than 80% of the questionnaires of establishments for updating were distributed. Meanwhile, seven questionnaires

were already collected and submitted to PO. For the listing, a total of 515 establishments were listed out of the 305 barangays that were covered.

The 3rd level training, attended by seven SRs, was on October 6-7, 2016 and was conducted by SSS Jocelyn S. Sarmiento and RO Epifania H. Antopina. The enumeration of the 559 samples then started on the 10th of October and ended on the 28th.

2016 Field Updating of Maps and SSU Validation

The 5-Year rolling scheme of map updating and SSU validation started this October. This aims to develop dynamic digitized maps in preparation for the upcoming undertakings of the office. The office hired one Map Data Screener who attended the 2nd Level Training on October 17-21, 2016. The twelve hired Map Data Collectors

for the field work were trained on October 26-28, 2016. The field work was set to start on November 14, 2016.

2012 Census of Agriculture and Fisheries Encoding of Selected Data

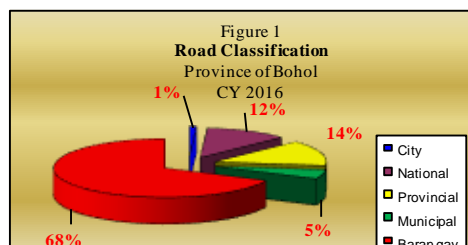

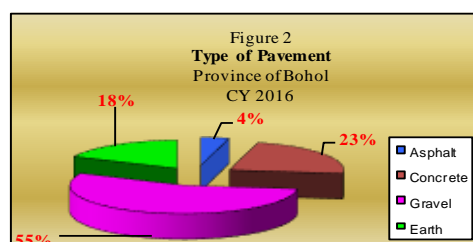
A. Land Transport

➤ A.1 Roads and Bridges:

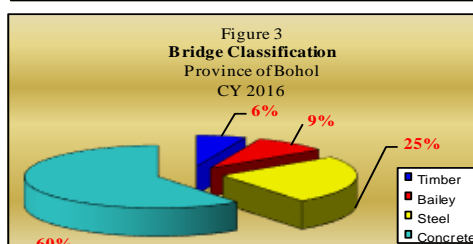
In the year 2016, the road network in Bohol has a total road length of 6,131.40 kms. of which 12% is classified as national road, 14% provincial roads, 1% city road, 5% municipal and 68% barangay roads.



Entire road network is composed of 4% asphalt, 23% concrete, 55% gravel and 18% earth.

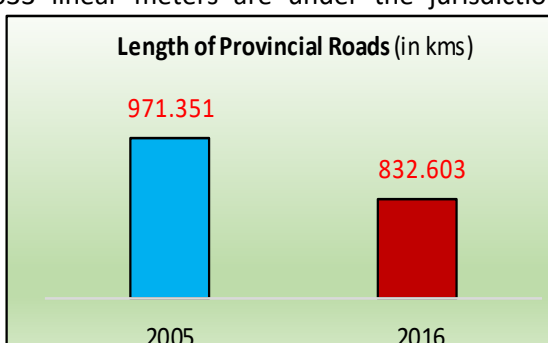


There are 8,226.24 linear meters of bridges within the road network in the province of which 64% are concrete, 22% are steel, 8% are bailey and 6% are timber bridges.



Temporary bridges such as bailey and timber comprises 14 percent which are already in bad condition and impassable to traffic due to poor maintenance. Some of the short span temporary bridges were converted to box culverts. There are also Box Culverts and Bailey bridges from the national which were also converted to RCDG. Eighty four (86) bridges or 1,633 linear meters are under the jurisdiction of Provincial Government through the Provincial Engineer's Office.

In 2005, the length of Provincial roads totaled to 971.351 kms. Due to nationalization of Provincial Roads converted to National Roads thru different Republic Acts (Chatto Laws) and Nationalized Road thru Administrative Approval by Secretary of DPWH, the Provincial roads now at 832.603 kms. There were four (4) provincial road sections converted into national roads in the total road length of 119.049 kms.



The length of concrete/asphalt in the Provincial Roads (in kms) increased from 159.947 kms in 2005 to 295.477 kms in 2016.

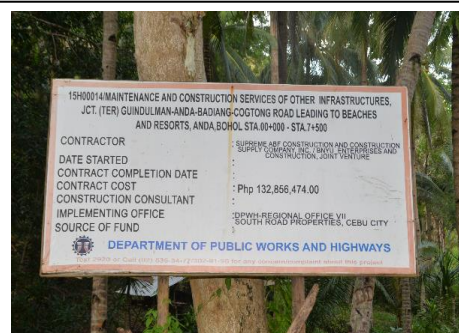

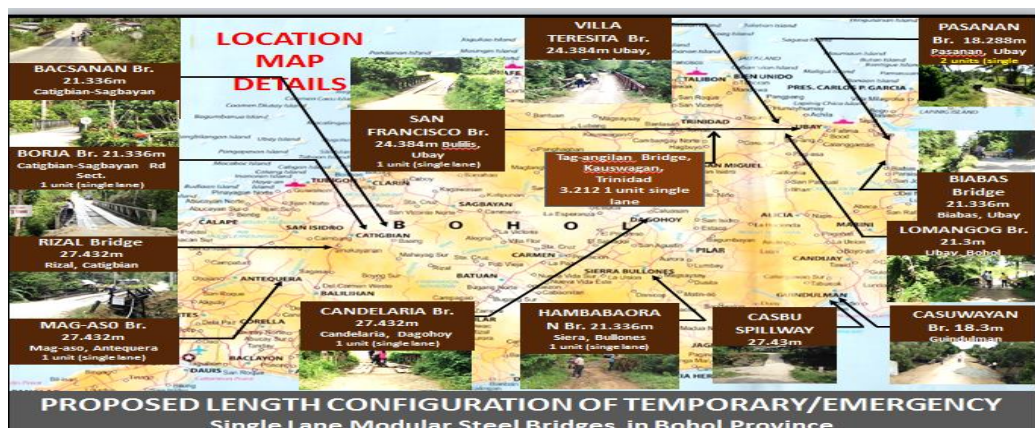

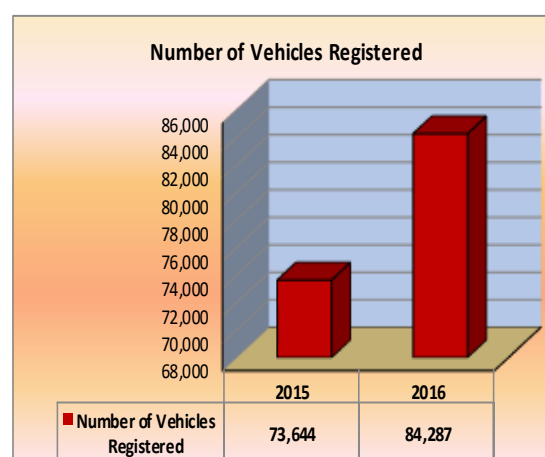


➤ A.3 Road Traffic

Based on the combined data from LTO-Tagbilaran, LTO-Jagna and LTO-Talibon, the province increased by 14.5% in vehicle registrations in 2015 to 2016.

Meanwhile, as to the type of vehicles registered in 2015 and 2016, it has been observed that motorcycles consistently topped the list for Bohol.

High registrations of motorcycles are indicative of people opting for motorcycles as means of transport than for four-wheeled vehicle because of its affordability and low maintenance costs. Moreover, more individuals now as compared a decade ago or so can now immediately purchase motorcycles because motorcycle dealers in Bohol now offer low down-payment schemes of payments.

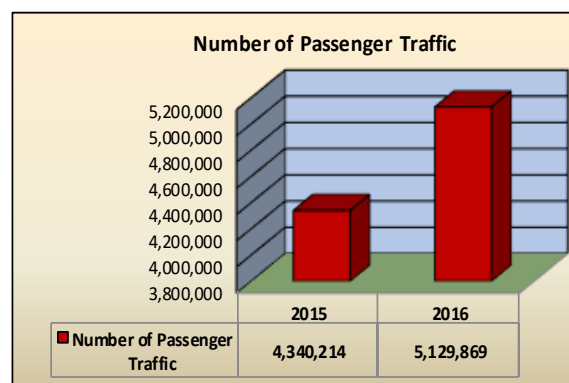
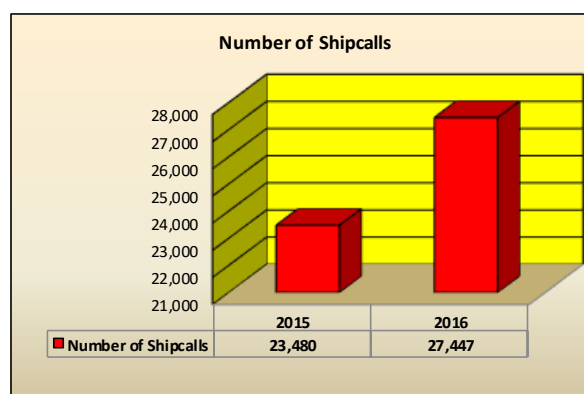

B. Seaport:

The province has 1 base port located in the Port of Tagbilaran, 4 terminal ports located in Tubigon, Talibon, Ubay and Jagna while 2 outports are distributed in strategic locations in Catagbacan, Loon and Getafe Port.

The total shipcalls have increased in 2015 to 2016 by 16.89%. While, the total number of passenger's traffic from the province's baseport, terminal ports and outports increased 2015 to 2016 by 18.19%.

The Port of Tagbilaran is considered a major port of entry. It serves not only passengers but freight and cargoes as well. In terms of cargo handling, the port caters to different types of cargoes whether in containers break bulk or transported in other forms. As of passengers, it caters to travellers to/from different locations around the country. Currently, it is the only port which caters to ships to and from Metro Manila. Also, there are available trips to other regional destinations primarily Cebu. In fact, for tagbilaran to Cebu and vice versa route, passengers have an option of taking fast crafts or the more conventional vessels. There are available vans and tricycle which caters to travellers from the port. The tricycles cater mostly to those going to downtown Tagbilaran and to the bigger public transport terminals in the city. The vans, on the other hand, cater to those going to farther destinations.



The port attends to more or less 5,000 passengers daily coming from Cebu on board fast crafts and regular ferries coming from Cagayan de Oro, Iligan, Dipolog, Dumaguete, Cebu and Manila; not to mention cargo ships. It is now referred to as the “Tagbilaran City Tourist Pier”.

The Port of Tubigon, the busiest among the terminal ports, it is served by 6 conventional vessels and 2 modern fastcraft with a total of 20 trips daily to Cebu City. A roll-on/roll-off ferry is also operational making two trips daily.

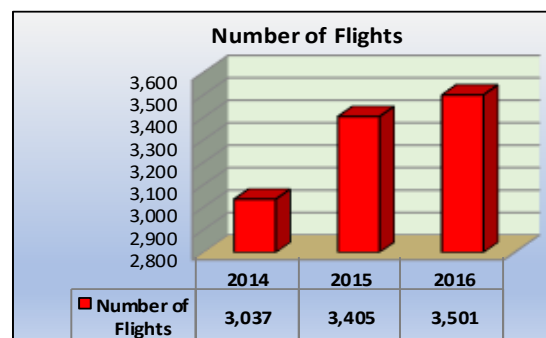
The Port of Jagna in the southeast offers docking facilities for vessels from Cagayan, Nasipit, and Camiguin (with ro-ro) in Mindanao. The PPA acknowledges the importance of the Port of Jagna with regards to the mobility of people from Bohol to Mindanao. The Port of Jagna is strategically located especially to support the development of Anda Peninsula and other areas in the wetern areas of Bohol. Feeder modes such as buses, vans-for hire, and motorela are available at nearby public market. Their terminal is approximately 500 meters from the port.

The Port of Ubay is the primary entry point from Leyte. Motorized Bancas withwith an average capacity of 60 passengers leaves for Maasin, Leyte at half an hour intervals from 8:30 am to 11:00 am. There are also regular trips to Cebu with an approximate capacity of 300 passengers departs 10 am and 10 pm everyday. Bus service to Pasay and Cubao also enters and leaves Bohol via Port of Ubay. There are two available trips per day for the RoRoBus.

The Port of Talibon is being serviced by V.G. Shipping Lines with a Talibon-Cebu City route and vice versa. It also plays host to countless outrigger boats coming from the 8 barangays namely: Busalian, Calituban, Cataban, Guindacpan, Mahanay, Nocnocan, Sag and Suba. Outrigger boats coming from neighboring towns of Getafe, Trinidad and Bien Unido also dock at the pier. The port is long with a 566 meters length, a width of 7 meters and the causeway having an area of 5,202 square meters. The causeway is directly connected to the main road of the town making it accessible to private and public vehicles. Cargo handling and checking is done by the Talibon Arrastre and Labor Company, Inc. (TALCI) while trucking and hauling is being serviced by Pengavitor Trucking. Mooring and unmooring services is done also by TALCI; bunkering is by Pilipinas Shell c/o Ngoboc Shell Station; and watering services by Pengavitor.

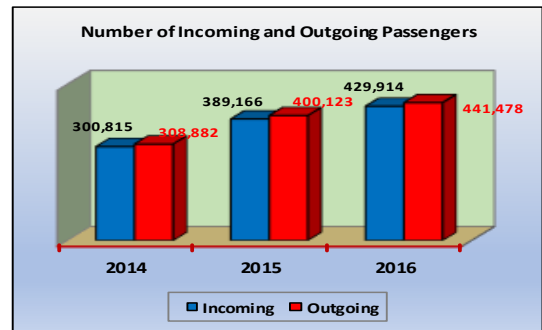
C. Airport

Bohol has two airports, the Tagbilaran Secondary Airport and the Ubay Feeder. Only the Tagbilaran City airport handles commercial and passenger traffic with dirtect flights to and from Manila through a number, making the province easily accessible to large



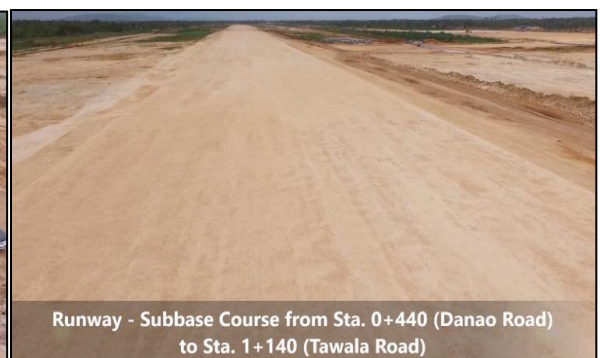
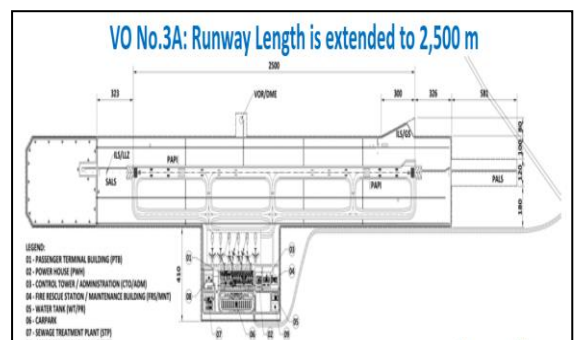
numbers of tourists and investors.

Tagbilaran City Airport was able to accommodate an annual average of 3,314 carrier flights including General Aviation and Military with an average annual increase of 15.27% in 2014 to 2016. While the number of incoming and outgoing passengers, there was a steady increase of passenger traffic at the City airport with an average annual increase of 20%.



➤ **The construction of the New Bohol Airport Construction and Sustainable Environment Protection Project (NBACSEPP):**

❖ Power and Energy

Bohol is supplied primarily by power plants located in Leyte and Cebu, with more than 50% for Bohol Electric Cooperative I (BOHECO-I), 100% for Bohol Light Company, Inc. (BLCI) and BOHECO-II. The province has indigenous Hydro Power resources, as evidenced by the existing 7.5 MW hydro power plant (about 11% of current total demand of the island). The Visayas Wholesale Electric Spot Market (WESM) supplies up to 29% of energy mix for BOHECO-I.

On the transmission system, Bohol is quite vulnerable owing to a single Bohol transmission interconnection with Leyte. There is also the problem of line congestion because the National Grid Corporation (NGCP) implements Manual Load Dropping (MLD).

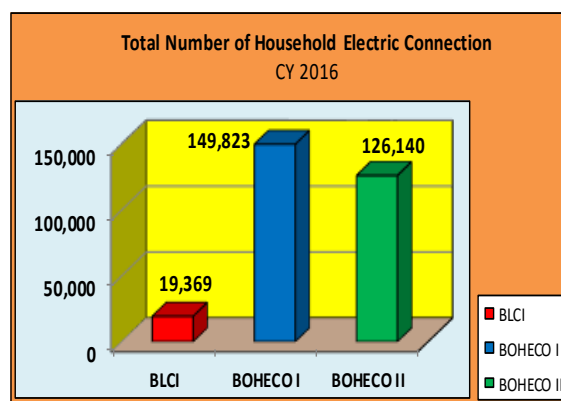
In the Calendar Year 2016, the Dependable Capability Profile for Bohol is 100.10 MW, forecasted demand of 70 MW and net reserve of 40.7 MW.

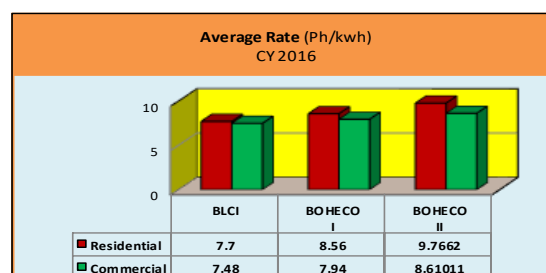
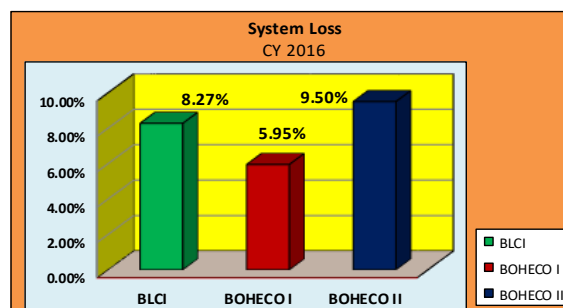


- The household connection for BOHECO I & II and BLCI increased every year for the period 2014 - 2016 with an average of 4.09 % per year.

- BOHECO I has the highest number of household electric connections.

- The BOHECO I & II and the BLCI have an average system loss of 9.38% per year which is 5.95% for BOHECO I, 9.50% for BOHECO II and 8.27% for BLCI.

- The BOHECO II has the highest average power rate both for residential and commercial followed by BOHECO I and then BLCI.

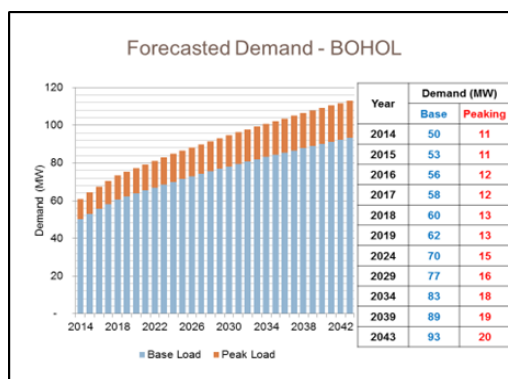
- Elements of the Bohol Island Power Supply Plan:

In order to come up with a credible Power Supply Plan, the BEDAG-TWG prepared Load (Demand) Forecasts and determined *the Least-cost Power Supply Mix* for the coming years. Both sets of information will enable decision-makers to identify the right/optimal power supply investments needed given the projected demand forecasts. Achieving a least-cost power supply mix would lead to attaining a reasonable electricity tariff.

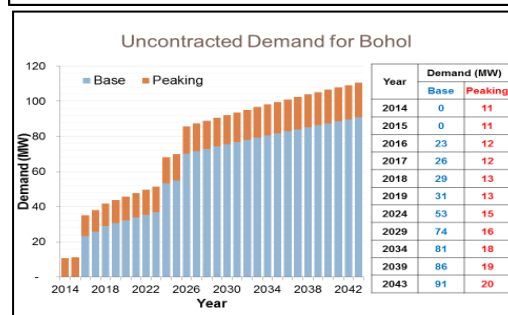
➤ Load Forecast/Demand

The BEDAG-TWG was able to come up with the following future demand forecasts:

The conservative forecast shows that the Province of Bohol will have a demand of 61 MW (50MW Base and 11MW Peaking) to 113 MW (93 MW for Base and 20 MW for Peaking) from 2014 to 2043. Below is a graph showing the future demand of the island:



By 2016, the Province of Bohol will have a shortage of 35 MW. Below is a graph of the un-contracted demand of the Province of Bohol based on the data provided by the three (3) Distribution Utilities:



➤ Optimal Supply Mix

Using the load profile of Bohol and relevant power plant and cost data from representative baseload and peaking power plants, the BEDAG-TWG was able to come up with an optimal power supply mix that, when Implemented, will ensure the least-cost power supply. For the combined requirements of the whole island of Bohol, the optimal power supply demand (in MW) should consist of 82% baseload and 18% peaking power plants. Practically all of its energy requirements (99.5%) shall be supplied from Baseload plants and only 0.5% shall be supplied from Peaking power plants. From these results, it can be concluded that contracting for baseload plants should be a priority. On the other hand, since the proportion of energy to be derived from peaking supply is very small, it may be sourced from WESM.

➤ Power Supply Requirements

Using the results of the load forecasts and the optimal power supply mix, together with data on existing power supply contracts of the three

Distribution Utilities, the BEDAG-TWG projected the total power requirements of Bohol up to CY 2043.

➤ **Power Supply Strategy**

In order to address the impending power supply requirements, the BEDAG has approved and endorsed the immediate contracting of short-term baseload power supply for the years 2016-2018 and long-term baseload power supply for 2019-2039 through a competitive procurement process similar and in conjunction with the transparent and competitive joint procurement process being done by the Electric Cooperatives in R1+CAR and Region 8 respectively.

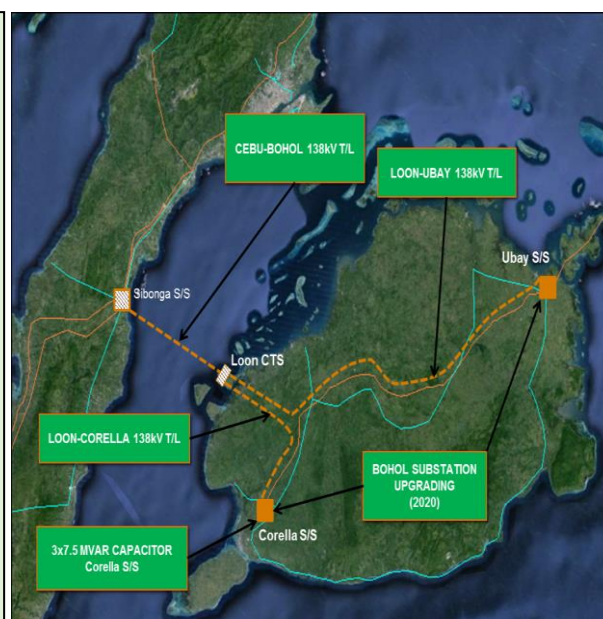
Concurrent with bilateral contracting of baseload power supply, the BEDAG will also undergo local resource assessment to identify possible natural resources that can be utilized for power generation. Increasing the power supply sourced from within Bohol shall contribute to self-sufficiency and climate resiliency of Bohol's power supply. The BEDAG has also endorsed the transmission plan presented by NGCP where an alternate Cebu-Bohol transmission link shall be provided to ensure connectivity of Bohol to the main Visayas Grid. This alternate transmission link will also allow export of excess power from Bohol if more generating resources are developed within the island.

The BEDAG has also resolved that all investments in power shall be subjected to scientific study and evaluation to ensure that they will be beneficial to the consumers of Bohol and are consistent with the goals, objectives and plans set out in the Bohol Island Power Development Plan (BIPDP).

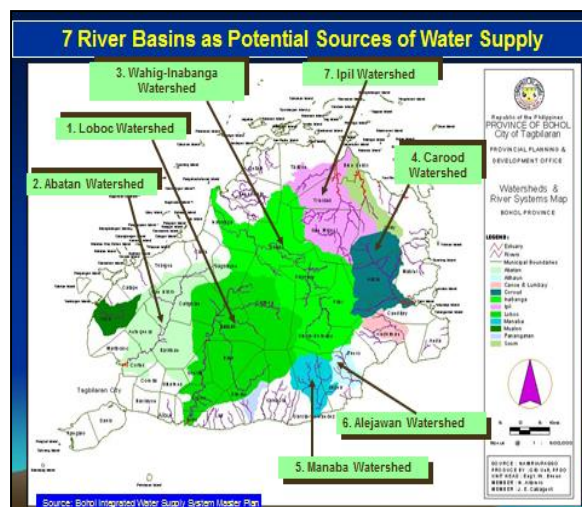

❖ Water and Irrigation

A. Water Supply:

Bohol's water supply system for domestic, agricultural and industrial uses is mainly based on 2,224 springs, 59 rivers and 200 creeks. There are 22 rivers basins/watersheds that are valuable sources of water for drinking and irrigation. Surface water from rivers and streams in these basins are impounded and distributed for irrigation, electric generation, industrial use as well as for domestic use.



The existing water supplies available in the province have a Level III (individual house connections) system which is being operated by the LGUs. Most of the rural areas like barangays outside the Poblacion are being served by Level I (point source facility) and Level II system (communal faucet system).

Groundwater is the main source of water for the Province, which are then distributed by municipal waterworks and private entities.

❖ **Communication**

➤ **On-going Development of Fiber Optic Network Facility in Bohol**

Philippine Long Distance Telephone Company (PLDT) and Globe Telecom have completed upgrading Bohol's connectivity to the national fiber optic node into fully-protected submarine cables that go through different routes and are ready for commercial use.



PLDT continues to implement its upgrading program to increase the number of working lines in Tagbilaran and Panglao. In 2017, expansion of coverage is expected to be completed in the municipalities of Baclayon, Dauis, Tubigon,

➤ Telephone Services

The province of Bohol is wired with the rest of the world through the state of the art telephone facilities that provide domestic and international linkages through three (3) service providers, namely PLDT/SMART, CRUZTELCO and Globelines where the public calling stations scattered throughout the province. CRUZTELCO concentrates their telephone services in Tagbilaran City, Jagna, Calape and Tubigon. PLDT and CRUZTELCO also provide payphones capable of international direct dialing. The Digital Telephone Exchange funded of the DOTC operates in the municipality of Tubigon, Talibon and Ubay.

➤ Mobile Phones

Smart, Sun Cellular and Globe Communications Incorporated have operated its cell sites in the entire province. With this mobile phone equipment, the connections can already avail of the efficient and convenient cellular telephone facilities. There are 192 units of cell sites such as 84 for Globelines, 65 for Smart and 43 for Suns Cellular located in some areas in the province. The people can make use of the regular services of the system such as domestic and international calls, text messaging, voice messaging.

➤ Radio Services

Radio using transceivers is still a widely used mode of communication in the province. It provides back-up system, to telephone service. The Bohol Law Enforcement Communications Systems (BLECS) plays a consistent role in assisting both public and private individual needs of communication. All local, provincial and national government offices have operational radios. The PNP/Military and civilian sector assist them especially during emergency cases like insurgency related incidents, commission of crimes and occurrences of natural calamities such as earthquake, typhoon, fire and flood and among others.

➤ Broadcast and Cable TV

There are four (4) broadcast media stations in Bohol namely: DYRD, DYTR, DYSD in Ubay and DYJP in Jagna. Two (2) FM stations (DYTR and DYRD) that are all operating and providing information and entertainment. The coverage for station DYRD is limited up to Clarin and Jagna with 5,000 watts capacity and DYTR has 10,000 watts capacity, has the widest coverage area equivalent to 80% provincewide. There is one relaying station based in Ubay, the station DYSD and one local station DYJP in Jagna, Bohol.

In the year 2016, Bohol has eleven (11) cable TV stations. The Bohol Community Cable Television (BCCTV) situated in Tagbilaran City, the Mantle Cable Station in Talibon, Alcyber Cable System which is located in the municipality of Loay, the Real Speed Cable TV Inc. in Calape, Southseas Vision in Tubigon, San Miguel Cable System in Jagna, Duero and Garcia Hernandez, Niña Cable TV System in Maribojoc, Zafra Cable in Panglao, Sto. Niño Cable TV System in Valencia and Dimiao, CCTN Cable System in Inabanga and DTV in Ubay.

➤ **Messengerial/Cargo Services**

There are messengerial and cargo services in the city, namely the LBC, 2GO, Air 21, Fast Cargo, Pambato Cargo Forwarders, AP Cargo, LIBCAP Super Express, JRS and DHL that handle package forwarding. Most of these offices are located in Tagbilaran City with branches in some major urban centers of the province.

➤ **Internet Access**

With the presence of facsimile machines and the internet, the patronage of telegram services has obviously decreased. There are three hundred ninety (390) internet café providers operating in the province.

For approximately twenty-six (26) years of existence as a separate department, the Provincial Motor Pool Office (PMPO) has been operating to carry out projects being undertaken by the provincial government including maintenance of provincial roads and bridges, repair and shop servicing of province-owned equipment, and provision of equipment assistance to activities of other provincial government offices. Further, this Office generates income through provision of equipment to LGUs (discounted rate) and private individuals in need of equipment under rental scheme.

PMPO is composed of three (3) divisions and the following are its accomplishments for the calendar year 2016:

Operations Division

In the Operations Division, you can find working coordination with PEO and other offices of the provincial government; Municipal and Barangay LGUs; government or private organizations and private entities or individuals who were at times in need of equipment support.

This positively indicates full implementation of our planned programs and activities under the 20% Development Fund.

For its special tasks, this division facilitated the following: Convocation hosting for the month of May; successful assistance to the EMS implementation; participation on the Tree Planting Activity of the PGBh; conduct of Midyear Assessment, Operational and Strategic Planning at Badjang Spring Resort, Valencia, Bohol; and participation in the PGBh Family Day in Roxas Park, Garcia-Hernandez, Bohol.

For its regular tasks, this division was able to facilitate the following: procurement of various goods and services for both equipment operation and office operations; preparation and release of 400 per diems/reimbursement vouchers, 168 wages payrolls, 7 differential payrolls, 4 bonus payrolls, 2 incentive payrolls and 37 vouchers of suppliers' claims and purchase orders and 4 contracts including Repair of Ceiling/Roofing, Repainting and Electrical Revamp at PMPO Main Building; preparation of various office communications and documents; and documentation assistance to various office activities and meetings.

As of December 31, 2016, BWUI has a total of 13,434 active consumers with average daily demand of 17,125 cubic meter per day. Under the Non-Revenue Water Reduction (NRWR) program, implementation of the following activities are on-going, with details as follows:

1. Metering Program (443 defective meters replaced & 258 transferred to stub-out)
2. Stub-cutting (90 stub-outs installed)
3. NRW Reduction Programs (repaired 29 leaks on transmission/distribution lines, 59 leaks on lateral lines & 521 leaks on service lines)
4. Delinquency Campaign

The main highlight of 2016 accomplishment is the reduction of Non-revenue Water (NRW) at 10.23% comparing to 13.62% in 2015 and 16.18% in 2014, which is very much lower to the 20% as stipulated in the Joint Venture Agreement (JVA). This is due to continuing efforts on: leak detection & repair works; replacement of defective water meters & its relocation to stub-outs; revamp of old pipelines, etc.

II. PLANS, PROGRAMS AND MAJOR THRUSTS FOR THE ENSUING YEAR (CY 2017)

BWUI main thrust is to cater the annual increasing water demand in its service area with due consideration of the following programs:

1. Tapping the surface water at Olan Spring in Lourdes, Cortes - Medium Term

3. Expansion of services in the Franchise Area & to municipalities of Daulis & Panglao
