MESSAGE



This 2020 Annual Report highlights the performance, productivity and state of development along the areas of governance, administration, social development, economic development, and environmental management of the Provincial Government of Bohol. Key areas for strategic decision and action to address gaps, issues and challenges are presented herewith as well.

The balanced relationship between the legislative and executive branches of the Provincial Government of Bohol has made way to the accomplishment of annual targets of various sectoral pillars. Good governance and joint leadership paved the way to the improvement and/or stability of socio-economic indicators despite the COVID19 pandemic:

- The Province has elevated to 20th place on the 2020 Cities and Municipalities Competitiveness Index (CMCI) of the DTI, which is 5 notches higher compared to the previous year among the 81 provinces in the country. It also maintained its Number 1 rank in the Central Visayas Region.
- DTI-Bohol's 16 Negosyo Centers (NCs) located in various parts of the province were able to accommodate 17,528 clients; 47.93% or 8,401 clients are for MSMEs assistance. DTI Bohol's performance for MSME assistance is 22.98% above its annual target of 6,831 and is 17.09% higher than last year's accomplishment.
- The Province of Bohol was among the finalists for the "Most Business-Friendly LGU Award" of 2020 spearheaded by the Philippine Chamber of Commerce and Industry (PCCI) for its commendable mitigation strategies against specified pandemic challenges faced by the local business sector.
- Bohol Tourist Arrivals in the Latest 2019 figures presented in the Regional Distribution of Overnight Travelers in Accommodation Establishments¹ of the Department of Tourism increased by 5.6% from 2018. Approximately 1.58 Million has visited the island before the occurrence of the pandemic during the first quarter of 2020.
- Domestic Accounts Deposit increased by 14.5% from 2018 now reaching P 56.8 Million from the P 49.6 Million in 2018. Increase in trust of depositors to the banking system was proven by the 18% increase in number of bank accounts opened by local depositors from 2018 to 2020 from around 683,000, it reached more than 806,000 accounts of different types. From 102 banking offices in 2018, 115 banking institutions are operating in various parts of Bohol.





ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT SECTOR

PROVINCIAL AGRICULTURE OFFICE (OPA)

From the total land area devoted for rice cultivation, 78% or 34,204 hectares have active rice paddies in 2020. During the pandemic and despite limited funds, the provincial government was able to

provide a total of 386,199 kilograms of hybrid and inbred rice seeds to support 3,484 rice farmers under its ART 120 and 160 Programs. Although investment increased by 164.6% in kilograms of rice seeds and 439% in budget from 2018, earnings from produced and harvested rice increased by 495% in 2020 from 2018 and reached the peak of 539% higher than 2019's.

ART 120 and 160 Programs were able to cover a total of 14,467 hectares and produce 23.4Million kilograms of milled rice worth P 1.05 Billion in 2020.

While farmers in other regions cry for help due to the massive decrease in palay cost in 2020, the local farmers from Bohol were able to benefit from the **Palay Buy-Back Project under ART 160 Program**. Farmers benefit four ways:

- (1) hybrid palays produced were purchased by the PGBh at P 20 per kilograms higher that the local market-buying price of P 12 per kilo,
- (2) palay buyers were forced to increase their purchasing price to P15-17 per kilo to compete with the provincial government, and
- (3) local consumers were provided low cost, fresh and naturally-milled rice.


To add, from the total investment cost of P 48Million, the estimated net income was P10.3 Million.

- Assistance under the ART Corn Technology Program through provision of open-pollinated variety (OPV) and yellow corn seeds to local corn growers continuous in support to both food security and the needs of the animal feed manufacturing industry. From merely 3,600 kilograms (200 bags) of OPV seeds in 2019, distribution increased to 9,522 kilograms (529 bags) of OPV and yellow corn seeds plus complimentary inorganic fertilizers in 2020.
 - As upshot, 545 beneficiary farmers were able to produce an estimated combined total of 1,322,500 kilograms of corn harvested from a combined total of 445.6 hectares of cornfields.
- The three (3) **Crop Facilities** BOATECH, Balilihan and Macaas Nurseries continuously produce and disperse seedlings to various recipients all over the province. From 2019, seedling production have increased by 213% while sales increased by 118% from 2020 despite the pandemic Although money value of dispersed seeds soared, quantity of seedling distribution and facility sales are expected to continue in 2021 onward.
- The **Upland Aquaculture Development Program's** Bilar Multi-Species Hatchery for catfish and tilapia earned P 88,560.00 from its total fry dispersal and sales in 2010 benefitting 210 breeders. OPA continuously monitors and provides technical and feed support to the production of an estimated 258.93 metric tons of aquaculture industry from backyard pond and fishpond growers, and commercial operators.
- Under the OPA Production Monitoring of Priority Marine Aquaculture Commodities, in 2020 alone, the province was able to produce 474.44 metric tons of bangus, 24.3 metric tons of oysters, 6.5 metric tons of mudcrab, 757.6 metric tons of seaweeds and 115.6 metric tons of vannamei.
 - In different coastline around the province, 325,000 mangrove seedlings and propagules were produced/procured and planted in 2020. The six mangrove nurseries are maintained to provide interested sectors participating in tree planting with seedlings for their respective reforestation efforts.
- Under the PRDP-GEF, expansion of marine protected areas, monitoring of seaweed culture, artificial reef installation, provision of support equipment and facilities continue. Financial support is also extended for microenterprise projects like seaweed, cassava, coconut production and processing.
- Under Research Agri-support Service, OPA coordinated with the Korean Program on International Agriculture (KOPIA) on the conduct of studies on testing the (1) suitability of yield and common resistance of kohlrabi, hot pepper and cucumber in local environment, and (2) adaptability of chicken dung as organic fertilizer.

The **Organic Agriculture Development Section** of OPA was able to contribute a total of 15 tons of naturally grown rice, root crops, fruits and vegetable in Bohol market. Their effective technology on organic fertilizer and pesticide preparation was passed onto local farmers through trainings. Agri-Inputs, supplies and equipment specifically 182 packs of OPV vegetable seeds, 800 Liters of natural pesticides, 100 pcs empty plastic drums and 100 piglets to Organic Agriculture practitioners were distributed to assisted organizations and individual farmers. In

support to the marketing of organic farm products, 5 producers and 50 consumers were recruited to sell and shop for organic products in Dao Market and during the ART Tabo sa Plaza thereby increasing patronage and promotion. In addition, 6 farmers were accredited to 2nd Party Certification to guarantee consumers that they are producing and selling organically-grown produce.

Irrigation Support Services. To ease the burden of farmers on providing stable water supply for crop irrigation, two Drilling Hammer-type Rigs and three units Water Geo-Resistivity Equipment were purchased by the Provincial Government under the Patubig sa Utanon sa Nataran. The Water Geo Resistivity equipment will be rented out to interested private entities and LGUs once SP approves its proposed rental rates and guidelines. There were also 104 drip irrigation sets purchased to support the local vegetable growers during drought.





To both help the displaced workers during the COVID pandemic and rehabilitate 50-communal irrigation systems in various areas in the province, Kita sa Kakugi or Cash for Work was adopted.

• Engineering Support Services. For further agricultural support, farm machineries like tractors (2), coco peeling machines (6) and mobile corn shellers (6) are made available for rental to interested farmers and organizations under the Farm Mechanization Program. Machineries are ensured to be properly maintained and available. A new Farm Machinery Warehouse is also under construction in Ubay and at 70% completion rate to make sure that equipment in areas far from Bohol's Capital are constantly maintained and made available to farmers within the area.



Agribusiness. Linkaging and networking for product marketing through UBI Festival, Tabo sa Plaza Rizal and SUHID sa Malampusong Mag-uumang Bol-anon were successful. A total income of P 6,628,511.30 was generated from the UBI Festival and Tabo alone while MLGUs, farmers, exhibitors and people's organizations were able to sell their products while consumers were able to purchase farm produce and processed products at lower cost. KADIWA on Wheels in the towns of Dauis, Loon, Alburquerque, Loay and Cortes generated a total sale of P28,212,060.10 where 32 exhibitors participated and 80,605 clients were served

- Price Monitoring and Demand Survey was conducted at 20 markets and supermarkets as well as 45 wet markets to enable the province to establish a Comprehensive Buyers Profile for Major Agricultural Commodities.
- PRDP-IREAP facilitated the implementation of 11 production and processing enterprises in eight towns for 11 projects located in Balilihan, Calape, Jagna, Mabini, Sevilla, Sikatuna and Jetafe worth P 38,699,858.00. Projects vary from cassava, vegetable, coconut, cocoa and seaweed processing.



Agri-Fishery Trading Program. The issues on unbalanced oversupply in coastal areas and high-cost of fishery products in interior towns/ barangays were balanced during the COVID pandemic. Fish traders were assisted in sourcing out supply from fish suppliers and transport/ delivery are facilitated to other areas across the province. Gross sales of P 13,318,568.00 were reached during the eight months participation of three people's organization in the Agrifishery Retail Terminal (ART) at CPG Park. The TAFIA (farmers' association) was able to avail P100K initial loan from Landbank.

OFFICE OF THE PROVINCIAL VETERINARIAN (OPV)

LIVESTOCK PRODUCTION SUPPORT

Al in Ruminants under UNAIP. Considered ruminants are cattle, carabao and goat. For this year, 2,616 beef cattle, 1,426 dairy cattle, 3,818 carabaos and 420 goats are inseminated serving 7,691 ruminant raisers while offspring produced recorded a total of 1,206 beef cattle, 806 dairy cattle, 1,317 carabaos and 320 goats.

Al Service Providers. Under the Unified Artificial Insemination Program (UNAIP) of the national government, 101 competent technicians from different sectors conducted Al Services in 45 municipalities while the remaining 3 towns with no resident Al technicians - Lila, Cortes and Tagbilaran City were served by OPV-based Al Technicians.

Procurement of Frozen Semen. The livestock semen used for AI services in the province were sourced-out from the National Artificial Breeding Center (NABC) in Malaybalay, Bukidnon through the DA-RFO-7, the NDA and the PCC. A total of 9,220 straws of frozen semen are acquired with breeds of Bulgarian Murrah Buffalo, Brahman, Holstein Fresian, Sahiwal, Anglo-Nubian and Boer in 2020.



- Pregnancy Diagnosis (PD). Pregnancy diagnosis thru
 transrectal palpation is regularly conducted by AI
 technicians. A total of 5,775 heads of large cattles and
 carabaos (serving 5,679 farmers) underwent
 transrectal palpation for pregnancy confirmation.
- Induction and Estrus Synchronization. Two approaches were adopted to improve conception rate; the hormonal and non-hormonal treatment. Under hormonal treatment, parenteral administration of hormones was done to induce and synchronize estrus (in heat) to help cascade reproductive cycle allowing Al technicians to serve

more animals. Such process reduces the normal estrous cycle of waiting period of 18 - 24 days. In 2020, a total of 1,921 cattle and carabaos underwent the estrus synchronization procedure serving 1,791 livestock farmers.

Under non-hormonal treatment, deworming and mineral/vitamin supplementation and uterine flushing are applied during animal clinics to increase fertility rates. 6,283 ruminants, benefitting 5,738 farmers, were served by LGU AI personnel under supervision of the office in 8 municipalities.

Ear tagging. For official identification of individual animals produced through AI, numbering through ear tagging is done. 1,296 heads of cattle and carabaos were tagged and registered in 15 municipalities.

Economic Value. The current estimated market value for each cattle and carabao weanlings produced through AI is P15,000.00 per head, thus, the total monetized value of offspring this year amounted to P49,935,000.00.



On, the economic value of goats produced through AI is estimated at P1,600,000.00 based on the cost of P5,000.00 per head at weaning age. The amount could be perceptibly 50% lower in value compared to local inferior breeds.

Al in Swine. Municipal-run Animal Breeding Centers (ABCs) aims to improve the genetic background of rural pigs to produce animals with better meat to increase income of small-scale pig raisers.

There are 15 MLGU-operated ABCs - Antequera, San Miguel, Trinidad, Talibon, Pres. Garcia, Sagbayan, Batuan, Carmen, Duero, Jagna, Loboc, Mabini, Pilar, Bilar and Sierra Bullones provided with boars, paraphernalia and technical assistance by the OPV.

ABCs facilitated the swine inseminated thru natural heat of 1,715 pigs where a total of 12,822 piglets were produced with an economic value of P38,466,000.00 based on the current value of P3,000.00 per head.



Operationalization of Liquid Nitrogen (LN2) Plant. The LN2 production facility acquired from the DA RFO 7 started its operation in the later part of 2019. It produces liquid nitrogen to ensure that proper temperature for preserving livestock semen is employed inside a mother tank that carries 3,500 straws of semen.

A total of 176 LN2 mother tanks amounting to P616,000.00 were acquired in 2020 and adding those acquired the year before, OPV was able to distribute a total of 197 tanks to beneficiary LGUs.

BOHOL NATIVE CHICKEN DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

The Bohol Native Chicken Development Program is a wholistic development initiative to improve and expand the industry in the province through production and commercialization. The program intends to increase the number of growers and breeders to meet the increasing local market demand.



Widely distributed in the province are 30 active native chicken growers' associations with 500 members. OPV attends their meetings and provides them technical assistance.

Production Support is divided into 3 components namely, the Establishment of Production and/or Grow out Areas, Breeder Infusion, and Feed Resource Development.

- Establishment of Production and/Grow Out Areas. The Provincial Livestock and Poultry Farm
 (PLPF) are maintained by OPV in Roxas, Bilar as an institutional farm for the production of
 quality native chicken breeders. Therein, a newly constructed 200-capacity native chicken
 house began operation in July 2020 targeting production of 6,400 high-quality chicks annually.
- The Commercial Native Chicken Farm with Complete Production Segments under PRDP Livelihood Project is still ongoing construction. It is located at Barangay Cambacay, Batuan and is operated by the Bohol Upland Farmers Federation of Cooperatives (BUFFC), which is composed of 15 cooperatives /associations from the 3rd District municipalities particularly Batuan, Carmen, Sierra Bullones, Pilar, Duero and Guindulman. The group projects to produce a total of 53,000-55,000 grow outs or



fattened heads annually from 1,200 native chicken breeders (1,050 females and 50 males) they are now trying to accumulate.

BONAGCA, a smallholder native chicken growers association, reported a current breeder population of 2,299 females and 583 males - with a production of 13,091 chicks for 2020. While other 29 municipal-based native chicken growers associations estimated to have produced 6,525 breeders and a projected production volume of over 300,000 heads per annum.

• **Breeder Infusion.** The PLPF, as an institutional farm for native chicken, was tapped as breeding centre for production of quality breeders for infusion. For 2020, a total of 500 heads of hardened chicks with a monetized value of P100,000.00 are distributed to the first 10 members of 10 native chicken growers' associations.

Municipal Native Chicken Production Centers (NCPCs) were established for the production of local breeders for infusion in their respective towns and to serve as alternative breeder sources in cases of avian outbreaks. The PGBh support covers provision of starter kits (breeders, poly nets, incubators and drugs/biologics). 20 MNCPCs are operating to date and had distributed a total of 1,181 heads, with a



- value of P259,820.00, to their respective 260 farmer beneficiaries.
- Native Chicken Feed Resource Development. With feeds accounting to 60-70% of the total native chicken production cost, alternative feed sources and feeding strategies are highly considered. The alternative sources is projected to cost between P18.00 20.00 /kilogram which is significantly lower than commercial feeds pegged at P28.00-32.00/ kilogram.
- Bayanihan "Passing-on-The Gift". Under the "We Heal as
 One Program" of the Provincial Government during the
 pandemic, the Bayanihan "Passing-on-The Gift Program
 was implemented to alleviate the pressures on food
 security and unemployment.



422 poultry raisers have donated 4,560 native chicken breeders to their chosen 912 beneficiaries. The cost of donated chickens reached a monetized value of P912,000.00 while the fencing nets, feeds and vet medicines from the PGBh is valued at P351,200.00. The present number of donated chicken is estimated to eventually produce 167,000 heads/year.

- A Unified Health Program (UHP) for native chicken was developed to protect the native poultry from New Castle Disease (NCD) through vaccination. In 2020, 43 MLGUs have withdrawn NCD vaccines for the inoculation needs of their local farmers while 103 individuals directly availed NCD vaccines from the OPV under the direct supervision of MLGU-MAOs for vaccination.
- Four (4) Poultry Farming Learning Sites located in Inabanga, Carmen and Trinidad were set up to promote and adopt science-based technologies on native chicken farming.
- Assisted Poultry Production. 81 Native Chicken Enterprise producers of BONAGCA, Dauis and Sikatuna were able to sell 7,045 heads of live native chickens with sales value of P 1,549,900.00 based on the current selling price of native chicken fattener at P 220.00/kilogram.
- Provincial Livestock and Poultry Farm in Bilar. Swine Semen Processing Center (SSPC) for swine semen processing is to be operated in partnership with the private firm UNAHCO. The building is at 80% completion rate and is expected to operate on the second quarter of 2021. The PGBh shall shoulder the cost of building the laboratory and boar pens, utilities like water and electric power, work force and feeds while

UNAHCO shall provide 2 boars, Al apparatus and supplies.

PLPF is now showcasing a mini-feed milling operation that produces 4 types of customized feeds used for native pigs, native chickens and goats. Feed production typically totaled into 1.3 ton/month for the feed maintenance requirement of almost all inhoused farm animals.

 Native Chicken Project. As part of the Native Chicken Enhancement Program, the farm adopts commercial approach on native chicken production. The newly

constructed breeding facility housed 102 breeders (82 females and 20 males) and has produced 3,598 chicks in 2020. From the stocks produced, 912 heads of hardened chicks with a monetized value of P182,400.00 were infused to beneficiary POs and MLGU production

centers. Some of the stocks were retained at the farm for further conditioning.

Forage Bank. The farm maintains a Forage Bank for demo purposes and production of forage legume seedlings. In 2020, 14,447 forage legume seedlings and cuttings are produced to for Intensive Forage Gardening (IFG) in support of the ART ICDP and Native Chicken Enhancement Program. In IFG, feed cost is estimated to decrease by 15-25%

• **Swine Project**. Late in 2020, out of five conventional female swine breeders, four sows produced 52 piglets. 42 piglets with an





- equivalent value of P126,000.00 are distributed to partner POs as livelihood assistance. Out of seven native pigs from Ubay Stock Farm, three are expected to farrow by 2021.
- Goat Project. Goats are being raised at the PLPF for demo purposes during hands-on training however, the five 5 does and two bucks produced eight offspring so for breeder infusion and upgrading purposes of the existing stocks, five of these offspring were distributed to requesting PO members. The remaining offspring are on preweaning ages and are awaiting distribution for breeder infusion.
- Farm Waste Utilization and Management. The farm is advocating the zero-waste farming using goat and carabao manure. In 2020, 3,502 kilograms of vermicast are produced for the production of fermented soil, a conditioning ingredient of potting media for forage seedling production. Biogas for pig manure and poultry waste management is also being employed.



Agricultural Rural Transformation thru Integrated Community Dairy Project (ART-ICDP). The ART-ICDP aims to mainstream dairy farming as a source of income to majority of the livestock farmers thereby making them a major contributor to the food production in Bohol.

- Dairy Production Support through Program Marketing. For the year 2020, ART-ICDP started its Phase 1 in 9 selected areas then Phase 2 in 10 more municipalities
- Herd Build-up. Twenty-three (23) ambulatory clinics are conducted 6 municipalities serving 1,170 farmers with 1,620 animals enrolled to the dairy project.
- Provision of Breeders. With Philippine Carabao Center (PCC) as one of the partners, the PGBh dispersed 28 Bulgarian Buffalo and American Murrah Buffalo



- bloodline carabulls and 105 caraheifers as breeders that has a total value of P 3.9M in 7 towns, adding to the available breedable dairy animals in the province.
- Animals and Feeding Program. The provincial government and DA RFO 7 provided Bohol Dairy
 Cooperative (the sole dairy producing cooperative in the province) a tractor for forage
 development and the cooperative was able to develop 29.5 has. of forages that include napier,
 coconut, root crops, grains, corn silage and others for 3 BODACO members and 17 nonmembers.
- Processing, Marketing and Milk Feeding. Under PRDP and in support to the marketing component of the ART-ICDP, the milk feeding program was launched and 6 freezers were turned over to BODACO. The total quantity of raw milk produced in 2020 is recorded at 254,946.75 liters from 433 dairy animals owned by 230 dairy farmers. The raw milk produced has an equivalent value of ₱11,082,432.00. The Milk Feeding Program of the Provincial Government was one of the major purchasers of the produced milk allocating a total budget of ₱10,348,000.00.

Philippine Rural Development Project (PRDP) six-year national project under the Department of Agriculture (DA) jointly funded by the World Bank, the National Government and the participating LGUs aims to establish a modern, value chain-oriented and climate-resilient agriculture and fisheries sector. In partnership with local government units (LGUs) and the private sector, the Project shall provide key infrastructure, facilities, technology and information to raise incomes, productivity and competitiveness in targeted areas.

• IPLAN. Bohol has the highest number of commodities with approved/updated PCIP in the entire PRDP-Visayas Cluster specifically enterprise ventures on Seaweeds, Buffalo Dairy, Native Chicken, Highland Vegetables, Cassava and Virgin Coconut Oil.

While RPCO-7 was awarded the "Highest Amount Leveraged for PCIP Implementation," receiving Php 3.59 Billion cost of non-PRDP supported interventions for PCIP, CY 2019 due to Bohol's successful mechanisms in leveraging resources from the public and private sector, the highest among the 16 regions implementing PRDP. In effect, Bohol received a Plaque of Recognition for this achievement. On the other hand, the pandemic is limiting the activities of the IPLAN resulting to cancellation of some major activities. For the year, the IPLAN through its TWG has only attended meetings mostly done through virtual conferences.

- **IREAP Implementation**. The Province of Bohol, in its 7th year of PRDP implementation, leads Region 7 in terms of funding accessibility for the implementation of various agri-fishery enterprises. The continued support of Provincial Officials has contributed to the achievement of RPCO 7 for being hailed as one of the best performing RPCOs the 2nd highest disbursement at the national level next to RPCO 6.
- **Project Implementation Status.** Fourteen (14) out of the 47 municipalities and 1 City have partnered with the Provincial Government of Bohol for funding support for 16 agri-fishery enterprises implemented by the 16 lead Proponent Groups (PGs)
- Bohol Dairy Processing and Marketing Enterprise. BoDaCo in Ubay, has delivered pasteurized fresh milk to 25,000 malnourished schoolchildren. With the continued support of OPV, EdCenter and collaboration with PCC, NDA, DepEd, and DSWD, BoDaCo was able to cope up with the losses when identified as the sole supplier of RTDs for the Bohol Feeding Program. It will also be collaborating with DepEd and PCC for another feeding program for 2021. In 2020, BODACO has recorded a gross income of P20,785,785.82 and a net income of P6,248,125.91.
- Batuan Native Chicken Breeding and Chicks Hardening Facilities and Marketing Enterprise.
 The Bohol Upland Federation of Farmers Cooperatives (BUFFC) of Batuan, which received the first tranche assistance amounting to 3.1M Pesos, operates Batuan Native Chicken Breeding and Chicks Hardening Facilities and Marketing Enterprise.
- Bohol Virgin Coconut Oil (VCO) Production & Marketing Enterprise. Kinagbaan Coconut
 Farmers and Processors Organization (Jagna) led four other cluster organizations from
 Antequera and Calape in the implementation of the Bohol Virgin Coconut Oil (VCO) Production
 & Marketing Enterprise, a PRDP subproject worth 9.2 Million Pesos. Two units of delivery
 vehicles are procured. The Construction of a VCO Processing facility in Kinagbaan, Jagna is also
 on-going.
- Bohol Seaweeds Production, Consolidation & Marketing Enterprise. This 23.8 Million Pesoworth Project is for the enhancement of existing farming activities of 287 seaweeds growers from the towns of Getafe, Talibon and Mabini. The Project's initial tranche amounting to 4.565 Million Pesos was received by Alumar Farmers and Fisherfolks Association in Getafe during the Turn-over Ceremony with the Governor. Aside from provision of seaweed farming paraphernalia; a seaweed warehouse is under construction while the procurement of necessary pumpboats and seaweeds seedlings are on the way for full operation of the enterprise. The Provincial LGU is also facilitating the procurement of a wing van as a marketing support to the enterprise.
- Bahalina Production and Marketing Enterprise. PEGAMMALO in Loon was able to generate a
 gross sale of P4,373,150.00 and net income of P430,287.00 during the pandemic. Further,
 membership of PEGAMMALO increased and now includes members from Maribojoc and
 Calape.

Bohol Rabies Prevention and Elimination Program

Dog Population Control and Management. The OPV conducted various spay and neuter activities in 11 municipalities, serving a total of 1,090 dogs and cats benefiting 799 clients, with support from volunteer Veterinarians and the MAOs through their livestock technicians and BALA.

With only 22 MLGUs maintaining temporary animal shelters and dog cages, the OPV, procured mobile dog cages and distributed them to 12 municipalities. Pole net frames for 47 municipalities are also provided. Training on dog catching, dog impounding and euthanasia were facilitated.

Dog Bite Management. Budget is allocated for the procurement of 40 vials human rabies vaccines for pre-exposure prophylaxis (PEP), as assistance to the MLGUs and BLGUs, to be used by program implementers identified to be at high risk and for post-exposure treatment of vaccinators accidentally bitten while doing their duty. A total of 174 high risk personnel received the PEP.

Massive Dog Registration and Rabies Vaccination. Covid-19 pandemic affected the activities due to restrictions. 6,045 dog tags were distributed to 13 high-risk municipalities. 9,911 vials or 99,110 doses of rabies vaccine were distributed to the 47 municipalities and the City of Tagbilaran. For 2020, 94,327 dogs were vaccinated - 53.10 % of the total dog population.

Meat Control and Safety Program

If Manila had shortage of hog meat due to the pandemic, Bohol suffered oversupply due to lack of customers who were expected to purchase hogs for fiesta celebration and for food businesses. In effect, hog raisers sold the meat of their slaughtered hogs along roads and other makeshift stalls without passing the required Meat Inspection. Meat price dropped to as low as P80-90 per kilo. Fearing possible spread of meat contamination and spread of animal diseases, Governor Yap issued Memorandum Circular No. 2020 – 017 enjoining all local Chief Executives of the province to strictly implement existing guidelines issued by the DA, the NMIS and other concerned national government agencies relative to the registration and licensing of food business operators. Moreover, MLGUs are enjoined to formulate and enact additional local ordinances to regulate slaughter and sale of meat and meat products and strengthening of the implementation of meat inspection in their areas of jurisdiction. Eventually, hotels and resort were allowed to open and trading of live hogs expanded up to Luzon.

In 2020, a grand total of 114,746 heads equivalent to 8,445,503 kilos dressed weight were recorded to have been slaughtered in 31 different slaughterhouses.

Livestock and Poultry Disease Prevention and Control Program

Implementation of Animal Health Programs for Livestock and Poultry. Drugs and biologics procured by the PGBh-OPV and the Department of Agriculture RFO7 with an estimated amount of P1,762,282.00, are provided to MAOs and BALAs in support to the implementation of animal health activities.

Disease Outbreak Investigation, Surveillance and Monitoring. Eight (8) disease investigations were conducted affecting cattle, native chicken and hogs and further spread were prevented contained after provision of immediate veterinary services and treatment.

Extension and Technical Support. Free animal clinics are conducted during Agri-HEAT and HEART Caravan of the Provincial Government, Dagyawan sa Barangay sponsored by DILG and during MLGU foundation days, agri-fairs and other activities initiated by the Office. 41 barangays in 15 MLGUs are served through referrals, consultations, treatments, vaccination and deworming. A total of 2,275 clienteles and 15,110 animals with a total outlay of P496,356.70.

The OPV was able to serve 784 walk-in clients, 418 served for referrals, 540 for consultations, 6,496 treatments, 1,1993 vaccination, 2,278 deworming and 5,932 given vitamin supplementations. Services are also rendered to 500 clients requesting inspection and issuance of veterinary health certificates for 5,527 animals inspected for slaughter and for transport.

African Swine Fever (ASF) Preparedness and Contingency Plan

As pro-active response to the African Swine Flu (ASF) scare, the Provincial Government issued EO 5 and EO 56 banning the entry of live hogs, pork and pork products and the regulation of the entry of feeds and feed raw materials from Mindanao to Bohol via air, land and water entry. As a result, BOHOL **REMAINS FREE FROM ASF** and is still classified as Green Zone per Bureau of Animal ASF Zoning and Movement. The ASF Provincial Response and Contingency Program is fully operational with a total of P44 M allocation. Twenty-two (22) Veterinary Quarantine Inspectors are hired and detailed in 11 ports and subports, 1 airport and the one-man BAI-Veterinary Quarantine Office. For the first 3 months of 2020 alone, a total monetized value of P87,357.50 of meat products were confiscated /apprehended.

AGRICULTURAL TRAINING INSTITUTE (ATI)

Rice, Corn, Hvcdp, Livestock, Organic Agriculture. ATI-7 has successfully accomplished 100% of its target- conducted 58 trainings, 17 Consultative Workshops and Performance Review, 3 School on the Air (SOA) and 31 Agritalk, Webinar, Technoforum. Served 6,119 stakeholders composed of farmers, Agricultural Extension Workers (AEWs), LGUs, NGAs, NGOs, Rural-based Organizations (4-H, P4MP, MS, RIC, VLAP, IPs), SUCs, Youth, and marginalized sectors (PWDs, Senior Citizens, etc).

Scholarship on Agriculture (EASY-AGRI). Region 7 has a total of 14 slots/beneficiaries where 10 of which are enrolled to Bachelor of Science in Agriculture (BSA) and 4 in Bachelor of Science in Agricultural Engineering (BSAgEng).

Webinar Series. Webinar on Food Always in The Home (FAITH) was conducted with 800 participants in the region. Assorted seeds and farm inputs were given each participant as an after-support. Bohol has 21 ATI-7 Learning Sites awarded with certificates' validity is 5 years from the date of awarding.

Urban Agriculture Program. With 410 - Individuals Recipients from Bohol, Negros and Siquijor and 5 - Urban Community beneficiaries all given with Vermi compost, Seeds, Seedling Tray, PP bags)

Organic Agriculture after training support. 70- Individual beneficiaries were trained

Back to Basic Extension support. 285 beneficiaries granted with Ready to lay chickens for Bohol and Siquijor

Financial Grants. 24 learnings sites establishments and enhancements made.

Farm Business Advisories (FBAs). 5407 farmers aged 22-29 years were served making Bohol hold first on the largest portion of clients served.

Utilizing Multimedia Platform, Radio, Facebook live and local cable channel in enhancing access to information dissemination. Three (3) School on the Air conducted under Livestock, RCEF and Hybrid Rice respectively; one (1) Radio Program, and Takna sa AgriKultura on herbs and spices and was also conducted using multi-media platform during the height of the pandemic. Radio was hooked up at FB live and local cable channel.

FITS Center. Seven (7) FITS Centers Enhanced under RCM fund in the region where they were provided with a tab, laptop, printers and various IEC materials.

Rice Crop Manager (RCM). Two (2) batches of RCM conducted with 100 participants using a ready to play USB and one (1) Rice Crop Manager Advisory Services (RAS) Training conducted with 19 participants following health quarantine protocols.

RCEF. 39 LGU-led Information Caravans with 1,340 farmers briefed to the 25 priority rice towns in Bohol and 14 in Negros Oriental under the Rice Competitiveness Enhancement Fund (RCEF).

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE (DA-RFO7)

Rice-Based Farming Systems – Palayamanan Model is implemented in 7 towns for 182 farmer members. DA interventions are provision of farming facilities and planting materials, conduct of demonstration projects, trainings to enhance skills and capabilities, and support to entrepreneurial activities.

BOHOL EXPERIMENTAL STATION (BES)

Corn-Cassava Program Production Support Services. For the corn-cassava program, 6 hectares for Cassava Production are maintained. Cropping with the production and distribution of 141,839 seeds, which is 335% higher than in 2019. Planted 3-hectares with Rayong 5 and 72; Golden Yellow; Lakan and Sultan 10 varieties of cassava. Generated income of Php 60,599.00 from the sales of tubers produced.

Quality Corn Seed Production. 100% accomplishment on area planted to NSIC Cn 222. Seed sampling and quality analysis on going at NSQCS.

Research and Development. Harvested the cropping trial on National Cooperative Testing Project of Corn.

High-Value Crops Development Production. Production of Quality Seeds and Planting Materials for mung bean planted Pag-asa 21 and yield 150-kgs. of yield received at Bohol

Operationalization of PRISM Project. Under the project, a total of 50 farmer cooperators were trained and adopts the NextGen Seeds and high value vegetable production. Despite of the decreased income from rice cropping in 2020, cooperators gained 20.99% additional income from their high value vegetable production.

On-Station Mushroom Technology Module. Introduced mushroom production as another income source for the farmers. DA conducted training for 50 participating farmers from by LGU- Ubay. The project produced 158 (bottles of tissue culture, 413 bags of spawn and distributed 126 bags spawn of oyster mushroom. Harvested 162.5 (102%) kilograms of oyster mushroom.

PhilRice SeedNet-Rice Seed Production. 32,560 kgs. of Registered Rice Seeds and 5,600 kgs. Certified Rice Seeds in two cropping seasons were produced and 345 farmers benefited from the project. It has generated an Income of P 1,773,792.00.

Carmen Research and Development Station

Offspring Production of Native Chicken. Maintained 50 heads native chicken as breeders and produced 150 offsprings, which is 120% of the annual target.

Offspring Production of Ducks. Maintained 80 heads of duck as breeders and produced 78 offspring hitting 111% of the annual target

Animal Distribution. Distributed 98 heads of duck to 13 farmer beneficiaries of Batuan, Bohol and 20 heads to beneficiaries achieving 126% of the annual target. 80 heads native chicken was also distributed to 15 beneficiaries.

Inbred Rice Seed Production. Produced 180 bags registered seeds (90 bags/ ha. during the wet season cropping and 170 bags during dry season.

Vegetable/ Fruit Tree Sedling Nursery Production. Targeted only 2,000 pcs fruit tree seedlings but was able to produce and distribute 12,741 pcs to different organization and individuals.

Ubay Stock Farm (USF)

Native Chicken Distribution. To be able to ease the effects brought about by unemployment, loss of livelihood and decreased pay, the Provincial Government focused on stabilizing agriculture, agrifishery and product processing to ensure that the cost of food products for the struggling public remains affordable and available in the local market.

Native Pig Distribution. To promote production of native pig as a low-cost high yield livestock, the program served as additional source of the livelihood and helped increase in food production for the entire country as a whole through distribution of 30 heads native pigs to various individuals and groups to 20 individuals and 5 groups.

Forage and Pasture Development. Distributes 1,200 cuttings of forage grasses to 80 individuals of 3 groups; 300 seedlings of forage legumes to 60 individuals belonging to 3 groups.

Development of Crops. Techno Demo on Corn, Vegetables and Crops Production were held, established techno demonstration on corn, vegetable and crops production. As support to Sec. DAR's Plant, Plant Program in response to food sustainability especially Covid-19 Pandemic. It serves as source of seeds and planting materials for our farmer/clienteles that lost their jobs due to the pandemic. 1.5 hectare of corn and 5.5 hectares of vegetable and crops were established to help individuals, farmer association, cooperative, LGU's, PVO and individual workers displaced due to COVID pandemic

DEPARTMENT OF AGRARIAN REFORM (DAR)

Ten 10% of the budgetary allocation of two sectors Land Tenure Security Program (LTSP) and Agrarian Justice Delivery Program (AJDP) were recalled by the DBM and 70% budget realignment was implemented in the Agrarian Reform Beneficiary Development and Sustainability Program (ARBDSP) sector hence too beat the changes, hardships and challenges faced during the pandemic year, DARPO Bohol embraced other means such as use of online social media and other communication technology and set up strategies in order to meet the target for the year.

In CY 2020, an overall rating in LTSP of 116% -AJDP with 103% based on caseload and 111% in ARBDSP. In LTSP, the high accomplishment was attributed to activities other than Land Acquisition and Registration. Land Acquisition and Registration are two of the highlight activities for LTSP, but because of the complexity and underlying problems/hindrances not to mention the protocols implemented due to COVID 19, greatly affected the acquisition and registration of lands for CY 2020 targets. The rates of accomplishments for these two indicators were only 23% and 33% respectively.

Out of 42,744 hectares coverage, 41,108 hectares were already accomplished which is equivalent to 96%. Further, out of 41,656 hectares carpable agricultural lands,40,368 hectares or 97% were already distributed to 33,184 ARBs. In terms of gross area, only 1,636 hectares of agricultural land is subject to acquisition and distribution in the succeeding years. In terms of gross area, only 1,636 hectares of agricultural land is subject to acquisition and distribution in the succeeding years.

Main Programs and Activities of the Department Implemented in the Province of Bohol for CY 2020

Land Tenure Security Program. Land Tenure Security Program is operationalized through land acquisition and distribution (LAD) or leasehold operations, an alternative non-land transfer scheme and involves redistribution of government and private agricultural lands to landless farmers and farm workers that covers all tenanted agricultural lands.

- Land Acquisition and Distribution (LAD). Land Acquisition and Distribution (LAD) involves the redistribution of all public and private lands to qualified farmers and farm workers, subject to the retention limit and just compensation to landowners. LAD involves complex processes such as land identification and documentation, conduct of land survey, land valuation and compensation, preparation of land distribution folder, land title registration and land title distribution. Under Research and Documentation, 11 landholdings in 356.3 hectares and 177 ARBs are accomplished. 214.7 hectares were surveyed; land valuation covered 30 landholdings and 283 hectares while EP/CLOA Registration covered 302 hectares and 113 ARBs. Under registration of EP/CLOA, only 98.2912 of its 302.0000 hectares targeted were registered equivalent to only 33% representing the gross area. The actual area distributed to 46 ARBS was 49.8030 hectares of private agricultural lands.
- Leasehold Operation. Leasehold operation covers tenanted lands within the allowable retention ceiling of 5hectares/landowner. The share tenancy arrangement between landowner and tenant are converted into a leasehold arrangement where the latter becomes agricultural lessees who, instead of paying the landowner a percentage share of the produce, will pay a fixed rental that is computed on the basis of historical production records. the accomplishment on leasehold for the year which is 51.0851 hectares as against the target of 49.0000 hectares. This is equivalent to 104% involving 81 ARBs.

Post LAD Activities. Post LAD Activities includes subdivision survey, re-documentation and registration of Collective CLOA, re-documentation of Distributed but not yet Documented (DNYD) landholdings, Generation of LDIS and Installation of Uninstalled ARBs. The table below will show the targets and accomplishments for the year. Under Re-documentation and Registration of individual CLOA, 79 hectares were accomplished (79% of the target) while under Subdivision of Collective CLOA (transmitted to and accepted by LMS), has accomplished 106% - 105.6 hectares compared to the 100-hectare target. Generation of Land Distribution and Information Sheet (LDIS) completed 191 ARBs compared to the target 150 (27% higher than target).

Agrarian Justice Delivery Program (AJDP). This targets the delivery of agrarian justice that involves adjudication of agrarian cases and agrarian legal assistance. Successively, AJDP is one of the contributory programs in terms of high accomplishment for DARPO Bohol. Since the influx of cases is uncontrollable, this sector is rated against its caseload.

- Adjudication of Agrarian Reform Cases (AARC). Law to exercise its quasi-judicial functions to hear and resolve agrarian reform cases which mostly involve agricultural tenancy and land valuation vests the DAR Adjudication Board (DARAB) through the Provincial Adjudicator. 100% of the target 632 case resolutions were resolved; mediation made in 484 which is 76% of the target; 1 post judgement completed; 609 cases (102% of the target) were executed/implemented; Administration of oaths target attained with 496 administrations done and 110% of the Implementation of writ of installation attained 124 compelted versus113 targeted.
- Agrarian Legal Assistance (ALA). Agrarian legal assistance is comprised of resolution of agrarian law implementation (ALI) cases, ARB representation before judicial and quasi-judicial bodies, and mediation and conciliation. Accoplishment versus target shows Resolution of ALI Cases- 211/165 (exceeds 100%); Land Transfer Clearance 805/ 560; Referral Cases (3/2); mediations (441/ 241). All major activities exceed targets. However, based on caseload, the accomplishment of representation in Judicial Courts was only 60% because 4 of these cases were already at the regular courts waiting for decisions.

Agrarian Reform Beneficiaries Development and Sustainability Program (ARBDSP) is a key service delivery program that is geared at providing the women and men ARBs and smallholder farmers and their organizations within the Agrarian Reform Communities/Areas (ARCs/ARAs) with gender-responsive and appropriate interventions to make them more resilient, productive, and enterprising

and become active players in sustainable communities. ARBDSP focusses on the following subprograms namely: Supervision and Management for Effective Delivery of Support Services; Social Infrastructure Building (SIB); Enterprise Development and Economic Support (EDES); and Climate Resilient Farm Productivity Support (CRFPS).

Below are the regular activities under ARBDSP:

- Supervision and Management for Effective Delivery of Support Services. Assessed 124
 organizations and conducted all targeted 48 Sustainability monitoring of Infra previously
 completed and turned-over to LGUs for maintenance.
- Social Infrastructure Building (SIB): Laying the foundations of Rural Development focuses on the capacity development of Agrarian Reform Beneficiaries (ARBs), Agrarian Reform Beneficiaries Organizations (ARBOs) and the community as well. ARBs are trained to equip them with the necessary knowledge especially on how to safeguard and sustain the coffers of every cooperative or agri-business enterprise. Due to health and economic crisis, the top management has directed all operating units, realignment of funds of some regular activities to ARBold Move for Deliverance of our Farmers from the COVID-19 Pandemic Project. 59 ARBOs with 1673 ARBs were capacitated on organizational building and management / governance -related activities. Membership recruitment is 12% higher than what was targeted 3381/3018.
- Enterprise Development and Economic Support (EDES). To empower and transform the ARBs into progressive entrepreneurs and to promote economic growth in the rural areas, DAR implements Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSME) development strategy. In this scheme, ARBs are given technical assistance and agricultural extension services to capacitate them with the skills and knowledge towards producing quality and competitive products and services. Marketing assistance with ARBs thru linkages with prospective agri-investors and other product buyers through participation in regular conduct of trade fairs and establishment of marketing centers.

The Marketing Assistance Program aims to hasten the development and establishment of enterprises in the ARCs and is carried out by building and sustaining links between and among farmer entrepreneurs, cooperative producers, processors, agribusiness firms, other institutional buyers, and service providers. Development and commercialization of ARB products is supported by DAR through market information assistance, product development and enhancement, resource mobilization with partners such as DTI, LGUs etc., and support to participation in local and national trade fairs. For the development of ARBOs to become MF Provider, 2 ARBOs developed as microfinance service providers with 60 ARBs trained and 139/100 (139% of the target) were provided w/ microfinance services. On the provision of Credit and Microfinance Services - 40/20 organizations provided w/ credit (double the target); 2578/2000 ARBs provided w/ credit services (129% of the target completed) and 2,962/2,500 ARBs provided w/ microfinance services. WASH-Focused Enterprise/Livelihood trained 1 ARBOs with 30 ARBs. For PBD Lawyering, 150 ARBs in 5 ARBOs were trained. Farm Business School was able to cover 3 ARBOs whose 92 members were trained.

ARBold Projects Component B: Farm Productivity assistance to ARBS has covered all 813 targeted ARBs while Component C on Livelihood Support or Women in Crisis Situation is extended to 15 beneficiaries

Climate Resilient Farm Productivity Support (CRFPS) aim toward improving agricultural productivity and income of the agrarian reform beneficiaries and build resiliency in communities amidst the harmful impact of climate change. It involves provision of capacity building for mitigation and adaptation practices and the provision of farm machinery and equipment. Sustainable Livelihood Support for Disaster Affected Areas involved 3 ARBOs with 90 members. Major Crop-Based Block Farm

Productivity Enhancement (Corn) involved 1 ARBO with 60 ARBs. Four (4) farm machineries and equipment/implement were provided.

In response to the directive of the top management to enhance partnership against hunger and poverty and intensify marketing of vegetables, fruits, crops and rice of ARBs thru ARBOs; DARPO Bohol has successfully facilitated and assisted two ARBOs to enter into marketing agreement with BJMP, Tagbilaran City Jail, Carmen District Jail, Talibon District Jail, Ubay District Jail and Don Emilio Del Valle Hospital.

Other than the regular support services, DARPO Bohol also maintains the extension of technical assistance to the projects or good innovative approaches developed thru the foreign/local projects initiatives such as:

- Establishment of grass roots micro-finance in Agrarian Reform Areas Thru Members Savings Operation (MSOs), (MICOOP) and DAR - CARD, INC. In CY 2020, Visayan Eskaya MPC of Biabas, Guindulman and Katipunan Farmer and Eskaya Credit Cooperative were launched as Members Savings Operation (MSO), making a total of twenty MSOs, two cooperatives under DAR-CARD and one cooperative under NATCCO, around the province.
- Facilitation of enrollment of all ARBs with Registry System for Basic Sectors in Agriculture (RSBSA) which is a program of the DA to help the ARBs receive or avail assistance from DA and other institutions. DAR's major role in this activity is the conduct of massive information drive on the advantages and disadvantages of being enrolled in the RSBSA. For CY 2020 the target set for DARPO Bohol was 5,716 ARBs enrolled but the accomplishment was only 1,497 ARBs or equivalent to 26%.
- to help the ARBs recover their capital for their crops in times of natural calamities, DAR provides free insurance premium coverage for all ARBs. ARBs are made cognizant of this program thru information campaign by DAR fieldmen. The target DARPO Bohol in CY 2020 was 1,750 ARB of which 828 ARBs were insured or equivalent to 47%

Public Management. PARCCOM's role is to coordinate and monitor all CARP-related activities to ensure the integration, strengthening, and intensification of the various program components of CARP on Land Tenure Improvement (LTI), Program Beneficiaries Development (PBD), and legal assistance/promotion of agrarian justice as well as anchor their coordinative role on the area-focused operation approach to enhance efficiency and effectiveness. Conducted are eight (8) regular meetings due to COVID 19 related restrictions. Monitoring of completed and on-going CARP Projects and the Inventory of ARBs in some selected areas are the major activities of PARCCOM. In order to quickly respond to the needs of the clienteles, DARPO Bohol has created and maintained the Public Assistance and Complaints Coordinating Unit (PACCU). DARPO Bohol has gathered 195 responses from the walkin clients served. For press releases, DARPO Bohol was able to prepare and publish 7 press and photo releases; 1 success story and 144 events were covered by various communication media.

Bohol maintains its strong partnership and linkaging the Provincial Local Government Unit by regularly and actively participating on their programs such as the Provincial Development Council, Enhanced Comprehensive Local Integration Program (ECLIP), Provincial Peace and Order Council (PPOC); Community Development Program/Purok Power Movement (CDP/PPM).

NATIONAL FOOD AUTHORITY (NFA)

Procurement. For 2020, NFA Bohol has procured at least 7,513 bags of palay or 107% procurement accomplishment due to to the low ex-farm, prices of palay, which ranged from P12.00 to P18.00 per kilogram during the last quarter of the fiscal year.

Distribution. 8,882 bags of rice were distributed which marked 48.05% accomplishment of the year's target of 182,900 bags. Rice distribution is at 251,185 bags exclusively sold to LGUs, DSWD, and other relief institutions for COVID-19 pandemic response. From the total volume distributed, 55% or 48,427 bags were released for relief operations for families affected during the community quarantines. NFA has also provided the monthly rice allocation for Persons Deprived of Liberty (PDL) and DSWD's bufferstocking requirements/food packs in support of their disaster preparedness programs. Prices of rice stayed at affordable levels during the year despite the health pandemic due to ample availability of commercial rice in the market. Retail prices of regular milled rice (RMR) averaged at P37.75/kg, well-milled rice (WMR) at P41.79 kg, premium rice at P51.54/kg, and white corngrits at P33.31/kg.

Technical Research and Development. NFA Bohol ensured all stored rice to be of quality standards before they were released and distributed. The retrofitted biomass furnace located at FLGC III warehouse in Carmen enabled the NFA to procure wet pay from local farmers during wet cropping season. 3,872 bags of wet palay were dried via NFA-owned driers to ensure that all palay stocks procured has attained a maximum moisture content of 14% and will be safe for long-term storage.

Finance. Total controllable expenses incurred by the office this year amounted to P2,310,496.82. The amount is 19.65% lower compared to 2091's expense of P2,875,382.04.

Human Resource Management and Manpower Development. The total warm bodies as of December 31, 2020 are 26 employees. Four (4) employees were separated from service due to retirement. On employee benefits, the office was able to pay all salaries as well as state and corporate benefits on time.

Public Affairs. All NFA's program and activities were widely disseminated through print and broadcast media and during various coordination meetings with its stakeholders. The agency proactively addressed various issues and concerns raised by the public through media interviews and consultative meetings with other government agencies to discuss the agency's plans and programs.

PHILIPPINE COCONUT AUTHORITY (PCA)

PCA was able to register a total of 111,109 registered coconut farmers and 69 traders and buyers of various coconut-based products, 6 Processors/Manufacturers/Oil Millers/Exporters and 439 Coconut Lumber Dealers/Processors in Bohol. There are also 409 chainsaws and 1 bandsaw recorded available for lumber processing. Total registration fees collected for 2020 is P1,005,867.00 while Certification Fees totals to P49,560.00.

As part of the COVID 19 Response Program, PCA implemented the following:

- Incentivized Coco Planting/Replanting 2020 planted 57,000 seedlings covering 398.6 hectares benefitting 503 individuals.
- **Banana Intercropping Project** has accomplished the planting of 151,200 suckers in 756 hectares of land for 756 beneficiaries where each sucker planted is paid P25 each as incentive.

BUREAU OF FISHERIES AND AQUATIC RESOURCES (BFAR)

For the year 2020, BFAR-Bohol implemented programs such as Targeted Action to Reduce Poverty and Generate Economic Transformation (TARGET), Special Area for Agricultural Development (SAAD), Stimulus Projects and additional programs/projects under request. Aside from that the office also rendered services i.e. fingerlings dispersal, conduct training/orientation/seminars/iec, licensing and inspection for Commercial Fishing Vessel, fishpond rental/ collection which BFAR-PFO Bohol collected

an aggregate amount of Php 1,169,750.00 for the issuance of fishworkers ID Issuance of local transport permit and among others.

COVID-19 Pandemic Response. BFAR PFO-Bohol responded to affected fisher folks during COVID through (a) issuance of 35 IATF-EID IDs; (b) provision of Food Passes for Cash and Food Subsidy for 41 Marginal Farmers and Fisher folks; (c) Sure Covid Loaning Program for 574 Fishers; (d) 355 families were reached by the Outreach program/ distribution of food packs in Malingin Island, and 26 LGUs benefited in the delivery of inputs and materials to ensure unhampered fishery activities in the Province of Bohol.

Turn-Over and Distribution. The office accomplished 581 number of units/ projects distributed/turned-over to project beneficiaries. 22-footer motorized FRP boats with 7HP marine engine and complete accessories were also released to beneficiaries.

Completed Projects. 34 fishery paraphernalia were distributed to beneficiaries of 6 coastal towns while 342 different aqua-fishery projects were assisted by BFAR in majority of the coastal towns of Bohol. Under SAAS 2020 Program, 179 individuals were assisted on their agri-fishery projects for tilapia, bangus, oyster and seaweed farm through provision of materials and other necessary inputs. BFAR was able to complete the following for 2020 - stocking of 302,300 pcs bangus, tilapia and carp fingerlings; harvest 61,204 kilos Tilapia and Bangus from BFAR project intervention; conducted licensing and inspection of 18 Commercial Fishing Vessels; accommodate 39 Fishpond Rental hence earning Fishpond Rental Collection amounting to P 1,169,750.00; issuance of 319 Fish workers ID; issuance of 2,026 Local Transport Permit at the PFO/seaport & airport and provision and planting of 1,500 pcs mangroves.

BFAR has also extended financial assistance which totals to \$\mathbb{P}\$ 2,002,999.80 for 45 agri-fishery related projects i.e., nursery, fishing nets, gears and paraphernalia, ice making and fish cage.

Fingerlings Dispersal. Distributed 302,300 pcs fingerlings province-wide for Tilapia, Bangus and common carp fish to Techno Demo Projects.

Assistance to Mammal Stranding. BFAR-PFO Bohol ensured the guidance and safety of our aquatic resources and assisted two incidents to mammal stranding in Alburquerque and Panglao.

Technical Assistance. Fisheries Livelihood Development Technician (FLDT) assigned in each LGU) monitors the status of programs/ projects and problems encountered in assigned towns and have rendered 287 services including the assistance to harvest season recorded at about 61,204 kilos and monitoring and inspection 104 times.

COOPERATIVE DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY (CDA)

Regulatory Function. 22 Pre-Registration Seminar (PRS) were conducted where 597 participants attended, 21 Registration Documents were processed/evaluated; and 48 Amendments Documents processed/evaluated; 15 on-site inspection/validation conducted; 221 Certificate of Compliance (COC) requirements evaluated

Development Function. Technical Assistance Services to 950 Cooperatives were provided; 8 Capability Building for Micro and Small Cooperatives were facilitated; 17 CDC monitored; 5 Coops enrolled at CBMIS were enrolled in BFAR Cooperative Business Matching Information System (CBMIS).

BOHOL INVESTMENT PROMOTION CENTER (BIPC)

Since 2010, Bohol BOSS kept track of data on investments generated from the province's Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) from the Business Name Registration Data of Bohol BOSS and all Negosyo Centers in the province.

- Last year was record-breaking for the province of Bohol in MSME investments, which totaled to P2.25 Billion. Investments generated from business registrations for 2020 totals to P1,533,640,819 which is 32% lower than in 2019 and 29.35% lower than in 2018.
- In 2019, total business name registration reached 8,554, which is 42.09% higher than in 2018. Annual BN Registrations for 2020 reached 6,554 that is 23.38% lower than in 2019 and 8.87% higher than in 2018. Although BN registrations are slightly higher than in 2018, investments generated are lower, which can be attributed to the increase in the number of micro-retail, and food manufacturing establishments that do not necessarily generate high capitalization.
- Aspiring entrepreneurs made up majority of those who registered; 86.8% of business name registration in 2020 are new applications. New BN Applications in 2020 are 22% lower than in 2019, but is 12.56% higher than in 2018, while renewal applications are 31.34% lower than in 2020 and 10.48% lower than in 2018. Employment generated from business name registrations has also consistently increased marking its highest in 2019 at 17,960. Although in 2020, employment generated by MSMEs reached 12,597, which is just 29.86% lower than 2019.

SEC Helpdesk at Bohol BOSS. In 2020, Our Bohol BOSS SEC Helpdesk has rendered services to 514 walk-in client queries, and has assisted in the approval of 25 applications, which is exactly even in 2019. Applications coursed through our SEC Helpdesk have consistently had 100% approval by the SEC and consequently issues their certificates of Incorporation.

Walk-in and on-call inquiries at the SEC Helpdesk in 2020 is comprised by Non-Stock Corporations in the majority at 62% or 320 clients, followed by 30% Stock Corporations or 154 clients and 8% Partnerships or 40 clients, out of the 514 total clients served.

The opening of more Negosyo Centers proved to be successful in providing comfort to far-flung applicants and in distributing workloads of Bohol BOSS to other Negosyo Centers and increase the overall total of annual business name registrations at different centers. This year Bohol Business One-Stop Shop (BOSS) – Negosyo Center Bohol managed to render services to 3,827 clients, which falls short by 799 clients from 2019 due to the pandemic restrictions.

COVID-19 Mitigating Measures, Initiatives and Interventions. Provincial Price Coordinating Council wherein BIPC is the secretariat met twice to discuss the possibility of price increase on basic and prime commodities in the province as a repercussion of the enhanced community quarantine declared by Governor Arthur C. Yap and how they may be prevented. Apprehension and filing of cases to identified violators of EO #20 by the Provincial Price Monitoring Joint Task Force led to the successful regulation of prices of basic commodities in markets throughout the province based on set Suggested Retail Price and Ceilings.

Enhanced Bohol Investment Promotion Program (EBIPP). The EBIPP Team is active in contributing efforts for economic recovery through conduct of meetings and online video conferences with partners for the crafting an emergency plan and/or recovery plan for the business sector and economy of the province.

Facemask Production. In support to the COVID-19 Mitigation Activities as Member of the Logistics Cluster, BIPC was directed to outsource the production of facemasks for distribution by the Office of the Governor to Provincial Government of Bohol employees, front liners and for constituents during medical relief missions. Bohol Provincial Employees' League (BOPEL) was tapped for funding and to work in partnership with the BIPC. 7,600 facemasks were produced, exceeding the 6K initial target, in collaboration with 8 local weaver groups, women's association, student-teachers groups and manufacturing entity.

Donations. Bohol Chamber of Commerce and Industry, Inc., Provincial Tourism Council and the Bohol Association of Hotels, Resorts and Restaurants, donated beds, bed sheets, pillows, toiletries and

fabrics, used mainly used for the temporary Quarantine Centers at the Capitol Annex and the Bohol Cultural Center during the call made by the Provincial Government through BIPC.

Bohol Online Market Project (Agri Retail Trade (ART) Online Merkado serves as an online portal to grant consumers access to market goods and products at the comfort of their homes, with the option to go for cashless transactions. Several meetings were conducted with potential partners for the development of the project and they came out with a proposal of tapping habal-habal drivers as courier service providers for their alternative livelihood. 4th Prototype of the system has been submitted by the developers to BIPC for product testing and critiquing and once approved, will be implemented. However, the proposed Agri-Retail & Trade Online Merkado FB Page was introduced to the BCCSF and the Local Finance Committee as initial phase of the online market platform while awaiting approval of testing.

Credit Surety Fund Loan Program (CSLFP). The CLSFP coordinated with the PGBH's Credit Surety Fund (CSF) partners in offering of loans for cooperatives and their respective members with annual interest rates of as low as 8%.

MSME Survey/ Poll on the effects of COVID-19 to their businesses under ECQ Guidelines. At the beginning of the implementation of the COVID-19 Enhanced Community Quarantine Measures, the BIPC initiated a survey/ poll labeled Pulso sa Gagmay'ng Magpapatigayon where 50 respondents with registered MSMEs and corporations business sectors on retail, transportation, tourism, accommodation, food, manufacturing among others were interviewed via phone calls. The information gathered are used to guide in the creation of provincial government intervention programs to the most affected sectors.

MSME Survey /Poll on the effects of COVID-19 to their businesses under MGCQ Guidelines. Another round of survey on the effects of COVID-19 to business under the MGCQ Guidelines aims to check the status of the business sector whether the more lenient MGCQ guidelines have initiated the re-opening of businesses of the different sectors or if they have remained closed.

Albur Creative Village Project. The Albur Creative Village Project was conceptualized to help re-open Bohol's tourism economy, provide employment and income- generating opportunities, and empower communities and stakeholders. This village development approach is an innovative model spearheaded by the Provincial Government, as Albur reflects a rich microcosm of Boholano heritage, culture and faith- based traditions and typical community life. The project is currently in the Land Acquisition Phase and with the Memorandum of Agreement with LGU Alburquerque already finalized by the Provincial Government of Bohol.

Product Development. In **April 2020**, the BIPC developed an *urna* **prototype** in collaboration with Fr. Val Pinlac and entrepreneur Ms. Crispina Singh, in response to the governor's request for the PGBh to develop its own token using Boholano cultural designs and methods. The *urna* design was approved by Governor Yap and is now being used as the official token/ souvenir item for PGBh guests and was also used during the conduct of PHITEX 2020. In addition, gift boxes samplers are still for further enhancement. BIPC designed and bundled the PHITEX 2020 craft tokens.

Bohol Investment Promotion Collateral: *Economic Factbook.* The Bohol Economic Factbook contains information on the province's economic profile, cost of doing business, statistics, business contacts and critical components of the Bohol Investment Code. The factbook is updated to the 2020 version along with the promotional material on 'How to Do Business in Bohol' as a guide to investors on the steps and guidelines of investing in Bohol.

The BIPC collected 25 LGU Investment Profiles and copies of their LIICs, and 59 Locational Profiles of areas for potential investments.

Bohol Virtual Business Mission. The European Chamber of Commerce of the Philippines (ECCP) with the consortium members of Local Government Integrity Circles Network (LoGIC Network and the BIPC organized the Bohol Virtual Business Mission via Zoom platform to explore business opportunities for supporting the business recovery of the LoGIC Network member LGUs and looking into possibilities for making investments and creating new jobs.

Macaas Tubigon Agri-Industrial Economic Zone Project. The reclassification of the property eyes into an Agro-Industrial Zone open to investments in product packaging manufacturing and distribution using indigenous and natural materials that will supply the needs of its home-grown food manufacturers and craftsmen and possibly its neighboring provinces.

Bohol BOSS Activities. The BOSS Caravan brings the services DTI, SSS, PhilHealth, Pag-IBIG, SEC, BIR, SEEM — Cluster representative, and DILG) in partnership with MLGUs, to a one-day event that include the conduct of a Business Forum and Business Registration services for MSMEs. This involves a basic orientation on business registration, requirements and membership with mandatory agencies. To continue providing services of the Asenso Negosyo Caravan under the ECQ and MGCQ guidelines, the BIPC and its partners thought of conducting a series of webinars that would orient its participants of each agency's services and how they can provide services amidst the pandemic. 8 webinars have been conducted with a total of 659 participants.

Basic Entrepreneurship for Sustainable Transformation or BEST Series Seminars is part of the services offered at the Negosyo Center-Bohol for existing and aspiring local entrepreneurs who want to improve their knowledge on entrepreneurship. The 'BEST' series conducts learning sessions on different topics such as entrepreneurship, business and financial management, and product and quality management, among others.

The BIPC has conducted ten (10) Entrepreneurial Development Trainings at the Bohol BOSS Conference Room to a total of 41 participants and Bohol BOSS conducted 1 SEC Zoom Webinar – Interim Online Registration System for 1-Person Corporations and those with less than 5 Incorporators in partnership with SEC-Cebu.

BOHOL EMPLOYMENT AND PLACEMENT OFFICE (BEPO).

During the pandemic, there are 14,837 displaced workers from different tourism- related businesses, 724 from registered transport groups and 1,108 additional workers that needs employment opportunities. Although the provincial government could not provide all of them alternative livelihood.

- 4,047 students benefited from the Special Program for Employment of Student Applicants, which is 337% of the target.
- Government Internship Program (Facilitation of 4,656 interns)
- 2 Pre-Employment Orientation Seminar (PEOS) conducted
- Pre-Employment Orientation Seminar (PEOS) for 2,500 Participants
- Pre-Employment Orientation Seminar (PEOS) to 10 Participating Schools/LGU's

Bohol Camp Bayanihan 1 Beneficiaries. COVID-19 Adjustment Measures Program (CAMP). CAMP is a safety net program that offers financial support to affected workers in private establishments that have adopted a Flexible Work Arrangement (FWA) or temporary closure as a measure due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Affected workers will be given a ONE-TIME financial support of PHP 5,000.00 in a lump sum, non —conditional, and regardless of employment status. For Batch 1, there are 174

establishments with a total of 2,767 workers who received P5,000.00 each. For Batch 2, there are 1,449 establishments and 25,156 workers who benefited from the program.

OFW & Migrant Workers Welfare Facilitation. There are 4,049 OFWs who arrived and were registered from Oct. 7, 2020 – Dec. 31, 2020. Under Project EASE, 19 Scholarship Grant @ P10,000.00/ School Year were released. Under SPIMS, 5 former OFW Teachers were hired as Teacher I of DepEd rad received P20,000.00 cash assistance. WAP Illness extended five OFWs Medical Assistance. Six (6) OFW human remains were repatriated. Under the Balik Pinas, Balik Hanapbuhay Program, eight OFWs were able to avail of the Livelihood Program. 21 individuals were assisted by the Balik Pinas, Balik Hanapbuhay Program; 12 of the Rebate Program; 158 by DOLE-AKAP; 18 received medical assistance; 7 death claims were facilitated and 22 scholarships granted. The BEPO OFW HELP DESK was able to extend assistance/facilitation to various concerns in coordination with the OWWA to 6791 individuals.

PROVINCIAL ECONOMIC ENTERPRISE MANAGEMENT OFFICE (PEEMO)

C.P.G. Grounds Economic Enterprise (Café Caloy). One of the operating revenue centers that the office currently manage is the CPG Heritage Grounds Economic Enterprise, where the Café Caloy is located. Café Caloy started its first year of full operation in 2020 with a total operational fund of P8.0M. The enterprise is engaged in caterings, selling of local products produced by people's organizations, cooperatives and small entrepreneurs in selling their products as inclusion to the catering menu. The business total revenue raised during the year amounted to P15,922.189.88 while Total Net Profit for the period is P5,039,076.09. Expected bookings for the year was 38 but the total accomplished bookings reached 1,104 for the year.

Aside from the catering services, Café Caloy became the "bagsakan center" of some of the donated items such as fresh vegetables and baked products, which were cooked/ distributed to medical frontliners or repacked and distributed to arriving OFWs, LSIs, peacekeepers and other front liners. Café Caloy's products were featured in Balik Bohol Music Video, Mabuhi Ta Igsoon sa Bag-ong Panahon music video and PHITEX 2020 Daily Themed Concept showcasing Boholano foods and delicacies during its daily theme of Boholano Fiesta.

Bohol Biodiversity Complex Operation is a revenue-generating area managed by PEEMO. Revenue generated from cash and non-cash sales amounted to P 104, 240.00 coming from camping/accommodation, sales from agricultural products like vermicast, ornamental plants, forest and fruit tree seedlings. The target sales for BBC is 250,000 so short of 145, 549.00 which gave an accomplishment rating of 41.60%.

DEPARTMENT OF TRADE AND INDUSTRY (DTI)

Exports and Investment Promotions. DTI – Bohol Provincial Office assisted twelve (12) investors and six (6) exporters through provision of information on exporting, participation to national trade fairs, registration of business name (BN) under Foreign Investment Act, information on Philippine Economic Zone Authority (PEZA) and Board of Investment (BOI) registration, among others. Investors were also provided information on COVID-19 related policies such as quarantine restrictions and travel protocols.

For the business name registration, 7,476 new registered businesses were recorded in 2020, 28.49% lower compared to 2019. New capital investments reached PhP 1,020,827,282.07 and generated 8,296 new jobs.

Industry Development. In 2020, DTI Bohol assisted 4,506 micro, small and medium enterprises (MSMEs) within the priority industries of the department.

MSME Development. Despite the pandemic, DTI Bohol with its 16 Negosyo Centers (NC) located in the different municipalities in the province, were able to assist for MSME assistance, which is 22.98% above its annual target of 6,831 and is 17.09% higher than last year's accomplishment.

Shared Service Facility (SSF). The SSF is a flagship project of the DTI aimed at improving MSME productivity and efficiency through better access to technology. It aims to improve MSME competitiveness by providing machinery, equipment, tools, systems, accessories and other auxiliary items, skills and knowledge under a shared system to increase production and improve product quality for better market sales and jobs generation.


In 2020, the DTI Bohol established four new SSFs: (1) in BISU Candijay Digifab Center, (2) for Ginger Yema Processing in Guindulman, (3) for Bohol Cacao Processing Center in BISU Bilar, and (4) for Bocarillo Making in San Miguel, Bohol. Overall, DTI Bohol has already established 36 operational SSFs.

Kapatid Mentor ME (KMME). All of the 24 mentees (100%) graduated from the program in 2020.

One Town One Product Next Generation (OTOP NextGen) is a priority stimulus program for MSMEs as government's customized intervention to drive inclusive local economic growth by enabling the localities and communities to determine, develop, support, and promote products or services rooted in its local culture, community resource, creativity, connection, and competitive advantage.

Interventions and assistance including training on e-marketing/ecommerce, facilitation of FDA — Certificate of Product Registration, and capability trainings for food and non-food MSMEs were provided to help them recover and reposition their business during this pandemic. These interventions. During the year, 1,464 MSMEs were doing business through ecommerce and 121 prototypes were developed under the OTOP program.

Sandugo Trade Expo. The annual trade exhibition event entitled Virtual Sandugo Trade Expo, was participated in by six (6) MSMEs and generated a total sale of PhP 9.8 Million



Centers eases doing business and provides access to development services for MSMEs through Business detailed therein. In 2020, the Negosyo Center assisted 1,065 MSMEs through provision of livelihood kits worth PhP 6,000 each.

Livelihood Seeding Program – Pangkabuhayan sa Pagbangon at Ginhawa (LSP – PPG). LSP-PPG aims to assist microenterprises of families/ individuals affected by calamities to resume their economic activities through provision of package assistance comprised of info materials, entrepreneurship training, and raw materials, tools and equipment worth an amount not exceeding Php 10,000.00 provided to affected families/individuals. In addition, livelihood opportunities for identified beneficiaries in priority areas of the national government i.e. KIA-WIA and NTFELCAC.











Comprehensive Monitoring and Enforcement Program (CMEP) and Price Monitoring. 690 business establishments were monitored by DTI Bohol to check whether they conform with the different Fairtrade laws i.e. price tag law, service and repair shop, labelling, DAO 3 Series of 2002, and product standards. As a result, ten (10) business establishments were formally charged for violations of fairtrade laws and trade and industry laws and total amount of PhP 237,500.00 administrative fines was collected. In addition, prices of basic and prime commodities are regularly monitored in 240 business establishments monthly in the 47 component towns while commodity prices in Tagbilaran City, is monitored weekly.

Accreditation and Business Licensing. In 2020, 274 business establishments were issued with appropriate accreditation and license certificates or permits.

Monitoring in Compliance to Workplace Safety and Minimum Health Protocols. DTI Bohol conducted on-site monitoring and inspection to dine in restaurants, barbershops and salons operating in the province. Moreover, DTI together with DOLE, conducted joint on-site inspection to monitor their compliance to the Interim Guidelines on Workplace Prevention and Control of COVID-19.

Consumer Education and Advocacy. DTI Bohol conducted 229 consumer education and advocacy activities specifically Diskwento Caravans, information dissemination activities, radio interviews, press releases, BAGWIS, business/ consumer education seminars, consumer organization strengthening, local price coordinating council using their developed information materials.

Consumer Complaint Resolution. Forty-four (44) consumer complaints were received and resolved through mediation in 2020.

Diskwento Caravan. DTI Bohol mounted twelve (12) Diskwento Caravan and Rolling Stores in 11 municipalities in partnership with the concerned MLGUs and in cooperation with Leonardo Distributors Inc. and NetMan generating a total sale of PhP 3.25 Million, serving 7,796 consumers and reaching 165 barangays.

Bagwis Award. A total of 28 business establishments were awarded with Bagwis Seals - 2 establishments received Gold Award; 4 got Silver and 22 got Bronze awards.

DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND EMPLOYMENT (DOLE)

For 2020 COVID19 response, the DOLE facilitated the following pandemic interventions:

- Bayanihan 1. BAYANIHAN 1's sub-component CAMP was able to release to 3,475 beneficiaries financial assistance amounting to PhP5,000.00 each with the total budget reaching PhP17Million. TUPAD BKK assisted 2,532 informal workers reaching a total financial assistance of PhP 10 Million while post-COVID TUPAD released PhP 12 Million to 3,036 Informal Worker beneficiaries.
- Bayanihan 2. BAYANIHAN 2's sub-component CAMP was able to release to 14,959 beneficiaries financial assistance amounting to PhP5,000.00 each with the total budget reaching PhP 74 Million. TUPAD BKK assisted 8,982 informal workers reaching a total financial assistance of PhP 14 Million while post-COVID TUPAD released PhP 12 Million to 3,036 Informal Worker beneficiaries.

DOLE-DTI Joint Monitoring. DOLE Labor Inspectors and partner DTI representatives monitoring 71 establishments in 2020.

SEnA Settled and Disposed RFAs. DOLE was able to resolve 182 out of 228 RFAs attaining 79.82% settlement rate and 50% of its annual target. All of the filed RFAs for the year were also disposed.

Integrated Livelihood and Emergency Employment Program (DILEEP). Total financial assistance amounting to Php 14,312,263 was provided to 1,131 individual beneficiaries for their respective livelihood initiatives.

Government Internship Program (GIP). DOLE was able to hire 5,424 GIP interns in 2020 to help them contribute to their family expenditures during the pandemic.

BOHOL TOURISM OFFICE (BTO)

In Bohol, with a continuous rise of tourist arrivals since 2009 culminating to 1.8M in 2019, it has significantly flopped down to 179,885 in 2020 (not total number yet). Estimated tourist receipts loss amounting to an estimated Php 4,710,962,766.70. 200,000 of Bohol's workforce were reported displaced tourism workers.

Tourism Planning and Product Development. With Bohol's plan of maximizing Bohol's ecological, cultural and heritage showcase:

- Seven (7) tourist destinations were assessed, inspected and evaluated for a proposed new Bohol North Tour circuit dubbed as Dagohoy Historical Trail.
- To create farm tourism colonies, an Inter-agency site validation team composed of BTO, BIPC, OPA, OPV, DTI, ATI and DA inspected and validated 33 farm sites in the province.
- For the institutionalization of the second circuit, the Heritage Tour Circuit dubbed Visita Iglesia de Bohol, BTO with the BACH Council, CCAD and PTC, 13 heritage churches and the 3 heritage stone buildings were assessed and their itineraries were launched during the PhiTEX.
- Regular monitoring is conducted to 14 existing tourism sites specifically Danao Giant Swing, Loboc Night Cruise, Strawberry Farm, Cave assessment in Sikatuna, and Jagna's Shrine of our Lady of the Barangay, Pedro Calungsod Shrine, Centennial Tree and MUSFA Strawberry Farm as well as a proposed mountain resort site in Laca and Baclayon's Edith Grand Garden.
- In coordination with the PEO,19 public marketplaces and their respective toilets were monitored and evaluated for the Market Improvement Project for possible funding support from World Bank-DOT TouRIST Project.
- BTO facilitated the Creative Industries Convergence with selected innovative food and culinary creators to explore the possibility of commercialization of their artistic techniques and products.
- During ECQ, the "Bohol Tourism Bubble" patterned after DOT's Tourism Bubble Concept was
 created and in preparation, BTO with the Provincial Tourism Council monitored Tarsier
 Sanctuary, Loboc Tourism Center, Chocolate Hills Complex, Sagbayan Peak, Alburquerque
 Church to determine whether they are prepared for the new normal tourism protocols
- Website enhancement of our website. In support to the possible opening of Bohol Tourism, the website tourism.bohol.gov.ph is getting ready for launch

Tourism Statistics Database Management. Tourism Data Gathering for monitoring and submission to the DOT continues. Guest Profiling through Exit Surveys are held to determine the satisfaction level and possible issue encountered during tourist visits to Bohol.

Tourism Services. From January to June 2020, BOT with DOT7 assisted in the repatriation of foreigners stranded in the province after the lockdown. Assistance continues in the facilitation of Exit Clearance of individuals who need to travel outside or within the country.

Scanning of QR Code. In support to BIATF and PGBh, BTO personnel detailed at the Bohol Panglao International Airport takes charge of scanning QR codes of arriving tourists, review their entry document and register via Bohol Tourism App for identification and contact tracing purposes.

Tourism Policy and Standards Section. As of the end of December 2020, the Provincial Inspection Team (PIT) wherein BTO is a core member and implementer has inspected 15 accommodation establishments for Ultimate Bohol Experience (UBE) Certification. The *Ultimate Bohol Experience* (UBE) is an idea of the PTC and the Honorable Governor.

Tourism Marketing and Promotion. Coordination with the private sectors of the tourism industry for promotional activities resumes in terms of providing affordable prices during specific seasons and ensuring the safety of sites in accepting tourists. The Provincial Government co-hosted Philippine Travel Expo (PhiTEX) 2020, to launch the opening of tourism in the Philippines where 122 buyers from 32 different countries, 345 seller delegates from 161 companies participated. Aside from promotional videos for various promotional media, online promotion is also done through the tourism.bohol.gov.ph and the Bohol tourism FB page.

DEPARTMENT OF SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY (DOST)

Despite the pandemic, opportunities on food processing, furniture, and GDH showed great potentials. For this year, assistance was focused on helping the communities shifting to community–based project. The implementation of Community Empowerment through Science and Technology (CEST)'s five (5) components: (1) Livelihood Development; (2) Health and Nutrition; (3) Water and Sanitation; (4) S & T Education; and (5) Disaster Preparedness and Hazard Mitigation continue.

Science for the People. In line with the DOST's mandate, heeding the slogan "Science for the People," all scientific and technological efforts are geared and utilized in maximum economic and social benefits for the people. We at the DOST Bohol Provincial S&T Center – being the frontline service provider of the agency, is implementing programs and projects that would make science and technology reach the grassroots level following the province's development plan mentioned above.

Small Enterprise Technology Upgrading Program (SETUP). The Small Enterprise Technology Upgrading Program (SETUP) provided technology interventions to two hundred eighty-eight (288) MSMEs this year. Thirteen (13) MSMEs of which received Innovation System Support Funds amounting to PhP 13,227,440.00 for them to adopt efficient technologies and necessary equipment and machinery to increase productivity. Complementation between MSMEs is also encouraged like those involved in metal production are encourage to sell their products to local food processors to save on costs of transportation and shipping. DOST Bohol provided 155 S&T interventions to 288 firms in the province. These interventions resulted in a generation of 201 employment, an average improvement of productivity by 20% per firm, and PhP 37.253 Million gross sales. SEPTUP also provided necessary equipment for beneficiary mushroom growers and processor, cakes/ pastry shop and shirt printing.

S&T Trainings. DOST Bohol PSTC conducted 47 Science and Technology personal and virtual trainings in 2020 benefitting 1,614 participants from 815 firms. Food Safety Webinar attended by food entrepreneurs and 2 batches of Training Workshop on Chocolate Processing at the DOST Bohol Chocolate Academy were facilitated.

S&T Consultancy Services. Technical consultancy programs were provided to MSMEs through the Consultancy for Agricultural Productivity Enhancement (CAPE), Food Safety, Cleaner Production, Energy Audit, and Packaging and Labeling. Six (6) cacao farms were assisted through CAPE while 53 packaging and labeling services provided to 26 firms.

Community Empowerment through Science and Technology (CEST). Community Empowerment through Science and Technology (CEST) Program facilitates the transfer of technologies to grass root

beneficiaries on areas of education, health and nutrition, water and sanitation, disaster risk reduction, and industry development or livelihood. The project is extended to Jagna, Candijay, PROCESS-Bohol and Philippine Information Authority (PIA).

 DOST-Bohol with LGU-Balilihan turned over 20 STARBOOKS (Science and Technology Academic-Research Based Openly Operated Kiosks) units to all the public primary, elementary, and secondary schools in the municipality and conducted the Training on the Operations of STARBOOKS for concerned IT personnel.



 Fund amounting to PhP 2,114,000 was released to the PROCESS- Bohol, Inc. for the implementation of the Accelerating S&T on Women Advocacy through Economic Empowerment Project in establishing fish and coconut-based enterprises in Talibon and Balilihan.

S& T Scholarship Program. Bohol PSTC's vigorous information campaign for the scholarship program earned Bohol as one of the provinces with large number of scholars. In 2020, one 146 scholars graduated while 236 are current scholars studying in accredited schools in Bohol for SY 2020-2021. To continuously process scholarship applications despite the threat of the pandemic, DOST developed and implemented an online platform hence a total of 1,933 successful applicants from Bohol were





Strategic Partnerships. DOST Bohol PSTC collaborated with the Central Visayas Information Sharing Network (CViSNet) Foundation Inc., and LGU-Balilihan to implement the Barangay e-System and Tools (BeST), an e-governance platform to manage













Special Projects A.) Science, Technology, and Innovation Support to Fight Against COVID-19: Provision of Specimen Collection Booth (SCB). To aid the demand for adequately implemented mass testing for COVID-19 in Bohol, DOST Bohol PSTC has

• Distributed three (3) Specimen Collection Booths (SCB) that cost Php 130,000.00 to Gov.

Celestino Gallares Memorial Medical Center and Don Emilio del Valle Memorial Hospital to ensure the safety of both the medical personnel and the patient. It is equipped with a 0.5 hp window-type air-conditioning unit, roof-mounted ventilator, slanted specimen table, Bluetooth speaker, two monobloc chairs and necessary medical paraphernalia.



DOST offers the SCB design for free to other fabricators and engineering groups interested
in producing the SCBs. However, they must strictly adhere to DOST's specifications, with
approval from the Department of Health (DOH).

Science, Technology, and Innovation Support to Fight Against COVID-19: Distribution of Face Shields

To support the needs of our colleagues in the government service and other groups in protecting themselves against the threat of corona virus, DOST Bohol Provincial S&T Center distributed face shields mass-produced by DOST - Metals Industry Research and Development Center (DOST-MIRDC) to government workers, policemen, media groups and to the provincial extraction team of TaRSIER 117.



SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT SECTOR

Bohol's Population and Poverty Situation

Based on the latest 2015 Census of Population (POPCEN), the province of Bohol posted a total population of 1,313,560 persons as of 1 August 2015. The population has an increase of 4.4% from 2010 Census of Population. Bohol's population accounted for 22 percent of Central Visayas' total population and 1.3 percent in the entire country in 2015. Bohol's population density is computed at 3.12 persons per hectare in 2015 compared to 2.68 persons per hectare in 2000. The increase in the total population of Bohol from 2010 to 2015 translated into an average annual population growth rate (PGR) of 0.87 percent which is lower than the 0.97 percent annual PGR of the province between the census years 2000 and 2010.

For the year 2020, Bohol's population is estimated by PSA to increase to 1,365,108 with an annual PGR at 0.77% between the period 2015-2020². This comprised 17 percent of the total estimated population of Central Visayas. About 32 percent of this projected population are below 15 years old while 61 percent are within the working age group of 15-64 years. The female reproductive age comprises 16 percent of the total estimated population in 2020. Total number of households in 2020 is projected at 316,834 households at an average of 4.3 persons per household.

As of the latest Poverty Incidence Report of the PSA conducted in 2018, Bohol's overall poverty incidence among families registered at 15.2 percent, lower by 10 percentage points compared to the year 2015 or equivalent to about 47 thousand families. This is a substantial reduction compared to 2015 when Bohol's number of poor families reached about 70 thousand. Although Bohol's poverty incidence greatly decreased through the years, the proportion of poor Boholanos whose per capita income is insufficient to meet their basic food needs or subsistence level, is still estimated at 2 percent or about 9 thousand Boholano families. Most of these poor families are found in the 2nd Congressional

District of Bohol as shown in the Map above. In 2020, a number of Bohol's children below 6 years old were found to be malnourished with 92 of them severely underweight while 372 were found to be severely stunted per the 2020 OPT Report.

Social Services. Notwithstanding the global COVID-19 pandemic that occurred in the early part of 2020, social services continued to be provided by the government to its populace albeit more focused on measures for the reduction, elimination and prevention of COVID-19 disease. In Bohol, the Provincial Government together with other stakeholders gathered together to strategize in its fight in the containment and elimination of the disease.

Combating COVID-19 Pandemic

Health Response. With the Department of Health (DOH), the Provincial Government of Bohol established two molecular laboratories located at the Gov. Celestino Gallares Memorial Hospital and a containerized molecular laboratory at the Capitol Annex. With this, RT-PCR test results can be given within 24 hours. Isolation centers/areas were established with the Gallares Hospital being identified as the COVID-19 hospital center in Bohol. The Bohol Inter-agency Task Force (BIATF) was organized involving all stakeholders in Bohol, both public and private, including major medical associations in the province. Health protocols were instituted and strictly enforced provincewide. Many more initiatives were instituted to address the COVID-19 pandemic.

Welfare Services. The Provincial Government spearheaded an emergency response to the pandemic in 2020 with the following interventions -

- A. Food Assistance Rice Assistance, Food-for-Work Assistance, Aid to Individuals in Crisis Situation, and Assistance to Stranded Individuals.
- B. Psycho-social Support services given to 433 families and 288 individuals
- C. Arts for Healing and Recovery Program
- D. Education Services
 - Implementation of Flexible Teaching and Learning Delivery Options/ Modalities
 - Allowing some schools to be used as Quarantine Facility of LGUs
 - Adopting to the "new normal" of teaching and learning (no face-to-face system)
 - Conduct of virtual trainings, literacy instructions and meetings

Family Program. Family Planning Program aims to ensure availability of quality services in all LGU's (thru Rural Health Units and Barangay Health Stations) and Hospital through ensuring competent Family Planning service providers, availability of family planning commodities and supplies. Regular monitoring on the implementation of this program is conducted throughout the year.

Field Health Services Information System 2020. The FHSIS is the official system of the Department of Health (DOH) / DOH-Center for Health and Development (CHD) and as per Executive Order No. 352 was included by the National Statistical Coordination Board (NSCB) in a system of designated statistics. FHSIS is the major component of the network information sources developed by the DOH. The FHSIS to date is the only information system in the whole government machinery that is in place down to the barangay level.

The Provincial Health Office of the Province of Bohol utilizes the Field Health Service Information System (FHSIS). The data generated is used in the monitoring and evaluation of health programs through program implementation review (PIR) conducted by PHO in collaboration with DOH-CHD Region 7. Moreover, the FHSIS is also utilized by the LGUs in their local decision making.

Health Emergency Management Services (Hems). Health Emergency Management Service (HEMS) is a complex process that involves activities performed in pre-disaster, disaster and post-disaster scenarios. These include health dissemination, health emergency planning, capability building, advocacy campaign, health emergency response coordination and monitoring, logistics prepositioning and donations tracking.

Health **Education** Advocacy Program (Heap). Many of the measures that are now taken to prevent citizens and health workers from getting infected imply a change of behavior. Hand washing, wearing face masks and protective gloves and social distancing are all forms of health behavioral change. One of campaign the

government is the "BIDA Solusyon Kontra Covid-19". This is enabling people to increase management and control over their health and its determinants is at the core of health promotion that is more important in this time of crisis than ever before.

Non-Communicable / Healthy Lifestyle Program. The Department of Health launched its Nationwide Healthy Lifestyle Movement - Pilipinas Go4health which encourages Filipinos to commit to a healthy Lifestyle through Physical activity, proper nutrition, and the prevention or cessation of smoking and alcohol consumption. The Healthy Lifestyle Program was launched to help prevent and control Noncommunicable diseases (NCDs) in the country. The increase in NCDs is affecting populations of lowand middle-income countries like the Philippines at a young age, reducing the productivity of the

working age population and stifling economic growth. Hence, the Pilipinas Go4health aspires to provide options for healthy living and making these options accessible to all Filipinos.


National Prevention of Blindness Program. The National Prevention of Blindness Program envisioned for a healthy vision for every Filipino through eye health promotion and disease prevention. Blindness, as a health problem, leads to enormous human suffering due to loss of functional ability and self-esteem. The 3rd Philippine National Survey of Blindness shows that about 3.5 Million (4.62%) Filipinos are visually impaired to one or both eyes. The program aims to reduce the current prevalence of bilateral blindness to less than 0.3% and ultimately to prevent or reduce blindness in the long run.

National Voluntary Blood Services Program. In accordance to Republic Act No. 7719, also known as the National Blood Services Act of 1994, the program promotes voluntary blood donation to provide sufficient supply of safe blood and to regulate blood banks. It aims to create public consciousness on the importance of blood donation in saving the lives of millions of Filipinos.

Almost all LGUs are affected with the pandemic so blood donation rate went down from 7.5% in 2019 to 4.4% this year. The blood donation organized by the private sector had a total number of blood unit of 1,222 in 2019 and 440 in 2020.

Environmental Sanitation. Environmental Sanitation is a major problem in the country. Environment can directly and indirectly impact on everyone's health and well-being. The following activities had been conducted:

- Provision of latrine and sustainable Sanitation to municipalities, province wide.
- Training on Community Led Total Sanitation (CLTS) (3 Batches)
- Monitoring and evaluation Re: Refilling Stations
- 4. Evaluation for ZOD (Zero open Defecation) Verification to different municipalities



Renal Disease Control Program. Renal disease control program of NKTL in coordination of DOH, PGBH thru the PHO, City health Office and BIA, aims to create awareness in the prevention and control of Renal and other related diseases holding by



information dissemination activities such as forum of local media, people in the community and patients as participants. This is part of the advocacy activities the above-mentioned agencies are regularly doing. To strengthen the advocacy of kidney disease prevention, kidney month is annual National Kidney Month Celebration.

Comparative Data on Renal Morbidity and Mortality (2019-2020). Here is a comparative data showing the significant difference of renal morbidity and renal mortality from the year 2019 and 2020. The data, based from the statistics of PHO, shows a little bit improving because the difference is high, even though 2020 data are still partial list. Nonetheless, there is only 38.44% or 2,328 cases of renal morbidity in year 2020; and only 10.58% or 55 case of renal mortality in the year 2020. In addition, it

is also advisable to have a comprehensive action plan that should include effective management of risk factors for Renal disease at the primary care level, improved case detection among at-risk populations,

and development of facilities for treating patients with documented disease.

Schistosomiasis Control and Elimination Program. Schistosomiasis is a parasitic infection caused by the blood fluke, Schistosoma Japonicum. Schistosoma eggs hatch, release miracidiae, and infect the intermediate snail host, Oncomelania hupensis quadrasi. Schistosomiasis is considered endemic in the municipalities of Talibon and Trinidad and thus the Schistosomiasis Control and Elimination Program remains an ongoing program in the Province of Bohol, aiming for a Schistosomiasis free province.

Mass Drug Administration (MDA) shall be continually implemented to reduce the disease prevalence with a vision of eliminating the disease eventually in all endemic areas. Health promotion and advocacy of SCEP shall be continued specially to the areas where many parents refused to give consent. Other activities like the surveillance and snail mapping should also be continued to closely monitor the status of the snail host. Field monitoring to the affected Barangays as to the





utilization of toilet bowls and safe water facilities should also be continually implemented.

National Leprosy Control Program. The National Leprosy Control Program ensures the provision of a comprehensive, integrated quality leprosy services at all levels of health care and envisioned an empowered primary stakeholder in leprosy and eliminate leprosy as a public health problem, aiming to ensure the availability of adequate anti-leprosy drugs or multiple drug therapy (MDT). Prevent and reduce disabilities from leprosy by 35% through Rehabilitation and Prevention of Impairments and Disabilities (RPIOD) and Self Care, improve case detection and post-elimination surveillance system using the WHO protocol in selected LGUs, integration of leprosy control with other health services at the local level, active participation of person affected by leprosy in leprosy control and human dignity program in collaboration with the National Program for Persons with Disability and strengthen the collaboration with partners and other stakeholders in the provision of quality leprosy services for socio-economic mobilization and advocacy activities for leprosy.

In 2019, there were 61 leprosy cases of which were classified as 2 PB and 59 MB while in 2020 there were 37 leprosy patients, of which 1 PB and 36 MB.

National Dengue Prevention and Control Program. Dengue is the fastest spreading vector-borne disease in the World. Dengue virus has 4 serotypes (DENV1, DENV2, DENV3 and DENV4). First infection with one of the 4 serotypes is usually non-severe, while second infection with one of the other serotypes may cause damage. Dengue has no treatment but the disease can be early managed. It is transmitted by day biting Aedes Aegypti and Aedes Albopictus mosquitoes. Dengue illness is categorized according to severity as a) Dengue without warning signs, b) Dengue with warning signs and c) Severe dengue.

Provincial Epidemiology Surveillance Unit (Operation Center). Disease surveillance is recognized as the cornerstone of public health decision-making and practice. Surveillance data provide information which can be used for priority setting, policy decisions, planning, implementation, resource mobilization and allocation, prediction and early detection of epidemics. Surveillance system can also be used for monitoring, evaluation and improvement of disease prevention and control programs.

This is an epidemiological practice by which the spread of disease is monitored in order to establish patterns of progression. In the province, there is a need to strengthen disease surveillance and response system. Strengthening surveillance and response system starts with developing policies and strategies that would make the system more efficient and effective. In order to achieve this, the Provincial Government of Bohol and the Department of Health is adopting an integrated approach to surveillance of priority communicable disease and conditions. This approach aims at coordinating and streamlining all surveillance activities and ensuring timely provision of surveillance information for action.

For year 2020, a Provincial Ordinance No. 2020-012 "ESTABLISHING THE PROVONCIAL EPIDEMIOLOGY AND SURVEILLANCE UNIT OF THE PROVINCE OF BOHOL AND MANDATING ALL LOCAL GOVERNMENT UNITS (LGUs) AND HOSPITALS TO CREATE EPIDEMIOLOGY SURVEILLANCE UNIT (ESU)/ CITY EPIDEMIOLOGY DURVEILLANCE UNIT (CESU) AND PROVIDING FUNDS THEREOF." It was in the said ordinance the PHO Operation Center was created.

Barangay Health Workers and Honoraria. Under the Primary Health Care System, the Barangay Health Workers (BHWs) plays a vital role in the community as being the first point of contact between the health care system and of the neighborhood. Their duties are very important as the are part of the community's fight attainment health for all in terms of prevention of diseases, as well as giving basic nursing care for clients/ patients. As front liners their active functioning and never-ending weariness just to make the community healthy signifies of their being the future's hero.

Population Development Program. The Philippine Population Management Program (PPMP) is being implemented through its three main program components: a) Responsible Parenthood and Family Planning (RP/FP), b) Adolescent Health and Youth Development, and c) (POPDEV) Integration. These three components deal with the main population issues related to sexual and reproductive health, including fertility and family planning concerns. It primarily aims to help couples to realize their desired timing, spacing, and number of children in accordance with their socio-economic, emotional, and psychological capacity. The (AHD) program aims to address issues related to adolescent and youth sexuality and reproductive health, including too early pregnancy. It aims to provide adolescent and youth with the appropriate information and life skills to enable them to cope with issues related to their sexual and full development into adulthood. The Young Adult Fertility Study (YAFS 4) conducted in 2013, pointed out that the most significant person in the lives of an adolescent is a "friend, classmate, or in general the peer".

HOSPITALS MAJOR ACTIVITIES

The ten (10) devolved hospitals in the Province of Bohol has been the reliable partner of the government and played its role expected. The following table is the bed capacity of the devolved hospitals.

Teodoro B. Galagar District Hospital (TBGDH)

Risk Assessment Workshop participated by all section heads was conducted to give orientation on the revised Risk Assessment Form. The workshop aimed to upskill the section heads in identifying, evaluating and minimizing the risk by adding control measures as necessary. TBGDH previously used FMEA to identify and evaluate risk status. However, one of the auditors during the ISO 9001:2015 Surveillance Audit advised to simplify the risk assessment form because FMEA is not applicable to hospital settings.

PPE Donning/Doffing and Swabbing Workshop. Safety in this time of pandemic is a major concern for TBGDH Frontliners, thus, workshop on proper Donning/Doffing and Swabbing facilitated by GCGMH Infection Control Team was conducted on September 19, 2020. The workshop was participated by Medtechs, Utility Workers, Nurses, Nursing Attendants, Ambulance Drivers and Doctors.

Blood Donor Recruitment Orientation. Blood Donor Recruitment Orientation organized by Gallares Team aims to create awareness on the importance of voluntary blood donation.

(Fil-Am Medical/Dental/Minor Surgical Mission). Surgical Mission sponsored by Fil-Am was successfully conducted in coordination with LGU-Jagna.

ISO 9001:2015 Remote Audit – May and November 2020. TBGDH has undergone the first remote surveillance audit and was able to maintain its ISO 9001:2015 certification with a total of 9 audit findings (7 minor non-conformities, 2 for Improvements and 0 major non-conformities).

Cong. Simeon G. Toribio Memorial Hospital (CSTMH)

Congressman Simeon Toribio Memorial Hospital a Level 1 in category, is situated at the middle of the island province which is sixty (60) kilometers away from Tagbilaran City. The hospital was created in May 28, 1968, by virtue of Republic Act 2079 with a bed capacity of twenty-five (25) named Carmen Emergency Hospital (Pambiglaang Pagamutan ng Carmen). It was later renamed to Celestino Gallares Memorial Hospital – Carmen then to Cong. Simeon G. Toribio Memorial Hospital.

With this COVID 19 pandemic, the BIARPS building converted into an ILI Ward which accommodates five (5) patients and recently the vacated old X-ray room and Laboratory is also converted into an ILI Ward also which accommodate seven (7) beds so that our implementing beds is fifty-two (52). This hospital adheres to Department of Health and PhilHealth policies being a Level 1 Hospital, TB DOTS Provider and Animal Bite Center.

The hospital provides 4 major services: Medical, Pediatrics, Obstetrics-Gynecology, Surgery and Laboratory including X-ray, Ultrasound and ECG. Also provided are DOTS Services, Rabies, Family Planning and Newborn Screening. The hospital serves the catchment area of Loboc, Sevilla, Bilar, Batuan, Carmen, Sagbayan, Dagohoy, Sierra-Bullones, Pilar and Danao with a catchment population of 228,785.

Congressman Natalio P. Castillo, Sr. Memorial Hospital (CNCMH)

The Cong. Natalio P. Castillo, Sr. Memorial Hospital is created in June 15, 1968 through Republic Act No.5297 and was then known as the Loon Emergency Hospital. It was renamed to its present name in

November 29, 1989 by Republic Act No. 678. The hospital is owned and managed by the Provincial Government of Bohol.

CNCMH is an Infirmary Health Facility operating on a 25-bed capacity as authorized by the DOH. It is a PHIC accredited hospital and presently operating on a temporary location pending the completion of the construction of the new hospital building. The Admin Office is located near the entrance of the temporary hospital building while the emergency room, nurse station, ward, laboratory, delivery room and pharmacy are all in one building thus resulting to overcrowding. The pediatric ward is made up of makeshift materials in which air-conditioning unit is installed to provide additional ventilation. Improvement/ renovation of the existing PhilHealth office funded by the PGBh has been completely done & endorsed by middle of this year and is presently being utilized as a Male ward to decongest patients from the main hospital building.

In addition, the OPD was built from DOH funds thru DPWH which started operating last April 2016 while the TB Dots center started its operation on the 2nd quarter of this year. However, the old damaged building is being utilized as a supply office and stock room for medicines, medical, dental, and laboratory supplies while the kitchen is operating in the old doctor's dormitory. A temporary isolation ward which is made of light materials is located 50 meters away from the main hospital building while x-ray facility is not available due to the current location and condition.

The CCNMH was previously classified as a Level I hospital. However, because of not meeting some Dept. of Health licensing requirements, the hospital was downgraded to primary care facility pending compliance to the lacking requirements like X-ray services, operating room services, among others since the hospital buildings collapsed/totally damaged in 2013 as a result of the 7.2 magnitude earthquake that hit Bohol Province.

Maribojoc Community Hospital (MCH)

The Maribojoc Community Hospital is a 15-bed hospital constructed in 1974, managed by the Philippine Medical Care Commission and in 1988 it was turned over to the Department of Health Manila until its devolution to the Provincial Government of Bohol in April 1993. The Hospital underwent its major renovation in August 1999 to March 2000 with the financial assistance of the Philippine Charity Sweepstakes Office. The hospital is located in Barangay Bayacabac, Maribojoc, Bohol. It serves primarily the people of Maribojoc and its neighboring towns of Antequera and Cortes. It provides primary health services such as emergency first aid and subsequent transport by ambulance when needed, outpatient consultations, 15-bed inpatient service, minor surgery, obstetric normal deliveries and routine laboratory examinations.

CNCMH serves the Inter Local Health Zone (ILHZ) of Loon, Maribojoc, Antequera, and Calape.

Francisco Dagohoy Municipal Hospital (FDMH)

The Francisco Dagohoy Memorial Hospital is a Provincial government—owned hospital constructed and built in 1983 and was fully operational in 1985 upon the completion of the main building and after the availability of all essential diagnostic equipment needed to provide both curative and rehabilitative health services to the people of Inabanga and its neighboring towns of Clarin, Buenavista, Getafe and Dagohoy.

A portion of this building was converted into a quarantine facility for the employees. Due to the threat of COVID 19 and in order to prevent the transmission of the said disease, the management decided to create four (4) groups as a new schedule for employees to man the operation of the hospital in a weekly basis.

The new building includes the Office of the Administrative and Finance Services Department, Emergency Room, Pharmacy, X-ray Room, Medical Social Welfare Office, Animal Bite Treatment Facility, Outpatient department, Medical Records Room and Laboratory. Due to budget constraints, the HFEP project has stopped its operation leaving behind the laboratory and x-ray room and some parts of the admin office unfinished.

The hospital is blest with a new ambulance funded by PDRRMO, with a set of emergency equipment, defibrillator and other emergency kits, tools and equipment primarily made for saving lives. The hospital has also finished its project for the line expansion of the whole hospital facility.

Catigbian District Hospital (CDH)

The Provincial Government of Bohol has provided us various expansion, repair and rehabilitation of the hospital as a health care institution/facility in order to give a better service to its clientele. The main old building is being utilized to cater the in-patients, out-patients as well as emergency cases. Radiology, Dental department as well as the billing and information section of the hospital are also situated in this building. The other sections like the business office, Office the Chief, Office of the Chief Nurse, Medical Records Office are located in a separate building are still for official turnover. Additional wards though not yet 100 percent complete are already being utilized to cater more patients. Due to the pandemic, the hospital has provided measures to ensure that health protocols are being observed and infection control will be maintained.

Clarin Community Hospital (CCH)

By the advent of the pandemic the hospital initiated the conversion of the unfinished CEMONC building to COVID wards. To protect the hospital personnel, the management requested PPE's from Tzu Chi Foundation.

Candijay Community Hospital (CCH)

Candijay Community Hospital (CCH), a Primary Health Facility and a PhilHealth accredited hospital is operating on a 10-bed capacity as authorized by the DOH. CCH has actual beds available.


It had attended 3,941 outpatients, 1,539 emergency cases. The record shows that the hospital has 180 patients with COVID-19 related signs and symptoms but it had only 5 COVID-19 positive patients.

With the pandemic, the hospital created nurse quarters and areas for quarantine. It also created a Triaging Team for the 3 Triage tent, temperature checking at main entrance gate, Personal data logging in for possible contact tracing, Checklist interview for possible signs and symptoms of COVID at the main entrance, and Swabbing booth for both OPD and admitted patient.

Garcia Memorial Provincial Hospital (GMPH)

GMPH is a Level 1 Hospital per DOH Memorandum with a 75 authorized actual and implementing bed capacity. In 2010, the hospital was certified by Philippine Health insurance as Center of Quality. GMPH is located in a 2-hectare government owned lot at San Jose, Talibon, Bohol. Looking at its completed infrastructures and buildings including their ground maintenance, it is a very ideal location for a Hospital. Transportation of patients, guests, workers and supplies to and from the hospital poses no problem as it is fronting a very wide national road. Environment is pollution free. This serves as strength of GMPH as referral hospital, given its location and catchment area of nearby towns. To maintain the smoothness of the operation, a Mancom Meeting is held on a monthly basis, Medical Staff and Nurses are also convened weekly.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH (DOH)

Training of Trainers on OPS/NPS, Donning and Doffing at Panda Tea Garden Suites, Tagbilaran City, Bohol last 15 September 2020.

An initiative initiated by the PDOHO Bohol DMOs in response to the COVID-19 pandemic in order to capacitate more health staff and supervisors on swabbing and contact tracing as there is an evidence of rising number of localized transmissions in the province. This activity ensures the team to work hand-in-hand and to live by the purpose on delivering efficient quality service to the community. Orientation on COVID-19 for Municipal Inter-Agency Task Force, Association of Barangay Captains and Private Sectors

PDOHO Bohol provides technical assistance through series of orientations, meetings, and engagements to local government units and stakeholders in order to capacitate and ensure quality and efficient response to COVID-19 pandemic. DOH protocols were disseminated, lobbied and discussed which served as guide for local implementation.

Bohol Provincial DOH provided Technical assistance to the launching of KALINAW in Tagbilaran City and was awarded "Local Government Unit Advocate of Health Award" by the Philippine College of Lifestyle Medicine.

An award given to the City of Tagbilaran for its exemplary initiative in promoting health and public safety. This includes the technical assistance provided by DOH in the middle of the pandemic during the establishment of KALINAW for mental health support, implementation of QR Code System for Contact Tracing.

Deployment of DMOs, Swabbers and MTDPs in Bien Unido, Talibon, Buenavista, Tubigon, Sierra Bullones, Ubay, San Miguel, Dauis and all municipalities with reported local transmission cases.

Immediate deployment of DOH personnel as COVID responders to the island barangays in all municipal-lities of Bohol as an initiative by the PDOHO Office to the municipalities seeking additional manpower in order to control the sudden rise of cases in the areas through their conduct of specimen collection/swabbing, contact tracing and strict implementation of isolation.

Provided Technical Assistance and IEC materials in the Giving of Care Bundles to PTB Patients, Breastfeeding Mothers and Pregnant Women in Sevilla, Bohol.

As a way of paying it forward and showing camarederie during this trying time, Sevilla have shared care bundles by giving of flyers and other IEC materials provided by DOH, fruits and vegetables to PTB patients, breastfeeding mothers and Buntis kits to pregnant women paralleled to its theme "We beat COVID through COVIDS Care of Vulnerable Individuals Diri sa Sevilla."

Provided Technical Assistance in the Municipality of Carmen in the continuation of its social campaign on teenage pregnancy prevention

The municipality of Carmen continued its social campaign on the prevention of teenage pregnancy. The social campaign which was launched last 2018, aims to educate, guide, and alert the parents, teachers the community and the teenagers themselves of the perils of teen pregnancy.

Engagement of PDOHO Bohol in the inspection of Quarantine Facilities. To ensure the safety, cleanliness and health of returning repatriates in the Province of Bohol, the PDOHO, together with the members of inter-agency task force, spearheaded the inspection of the quarantine facilities following strict standards and guidelines.

Provided Technical Assistance during the Blood Donation Setting per Barangay in the Municipality of San Isidro, Bohol. San Isidro, Bohol maintained to be an awardee for blood donation because of their quarterly conduct and quarterly target setting per barangay in blood donation.

Local Transmission Case Investigation and Swabbing of Close Contact was conducted by DOH personnel at Don Emilo Del Valle Memorial Hospital, Garcia Memorial Provincial Hospital and San Miguel LGU.

Conducted Hospital Surveillance DOH immediate respond to government hospitals with positive COVID-19 cases.

Basic Epidemiology and Surveillance was conducted by DOH Regional Epidemiology and Surveillance Unit (RESU) team to the technical staff of Provincial Health Office.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION – BOHOL SCHOOLS DIVISION


In Year 2020, the department supports the Basic Education Learning Continuity Plan (LCP) and the goals and objectives of DepEd to implement the flexible teaching and learning delivery options amid the crisis without compromising the delivery of quality education. DepEd Bohol mobilizes the creation of **Task Force "Oplan BB"** which translates "Brigada Eskwela, Balik Eskwela", as an implementing arm of the Schools Division Office to ensure the achievement of quality basic education agenda and successful implementation of LCP. The task forces are the following:

- 1. TF Kaalam (knowledge) is tasked to ensure that learning in the Division of Bohol continues amidst COVID-19 treats under the new normal of education. It is also to provide strategies and technical assistance in the quality implementation of flexible teaching and learning deliveries as well as the effective and efficient implementation of the "Most Essential Learning Competencies" (MELC) as prescribed by DepEd.
- **2. TF Gamitkat-on (Learning Materials/LRMD)** is tasked to ensure that quality reading resources, in both online and offline, are sufficient and accessible to all learners in support to the implementation of the different learning modalities in the curriculum delivery.
- **3. TF Pagbansay (HRLD)** is tasked to provide strategic HRD plan that suits local situations as well as to provide quality training delivery, upskilled/equipped teachers and non-teaching personnel in the new normal. It is also tasked also to provide technical assistance to ensure quality and sustainable HRD services towards acquisition and development of competent and wholesome personnel.
- **4. TF ICT PLATFORM** is tasked to provide quality support to teachers, administrators, and SDO personnel of the appropriate online/offline ICT platforms under the new normal by upskilling them through trainings on tools for instructional delivery, curriculum supervision, management, and electronic public services.

- **5. TF Bandilyo** is tasked to provide different platforms for effective and efficient information dissemination/advocacy on educational policy guidelines, strategies, development, and updates to internal and external stakeholders in the division.
- **6. TF Alalay** is tasked to ensure quality management systems implementation in Schools and Learning Centers and in the adherence to standards and policies. It is also to provide technical assistance for effective and efficient school management planning, delivery of basic education programs and services, and assessment of progress in achieving educational outcomes under the new normal.
- **7. TF Kaabag** is tasked to ensure provision of appropriate and adequate support of resources from internal and external stakeholders to schools for the efficient and effective delivery of quality basic education under the new normal.
- **8. TF Supporta** is tasked to provide technical assistance to schools and learning centers by responding to their identified needs in relation to governance and operations under the new normal; assist CID in the implementation of the BE-LCP programs and activities; act as Secretariat of the Provincial School Board in determining the budgetary needs for the operations and maintenance of public schools within the province.
- **9. TF ICT Infrastructure** is tasked to ensure provision of quality support/set-up and integration of telecommunications (telephone lines and wireless signals) and computers, as well as necessary enterprise software, middleware, storage, and audiovisual systems, that enable school/district offices and SDO to access, store, transmit, and manipulate information reasonably necessary to carry on delivery of educational services under the new normal.
- **10. TF Ayuda** is tasked to provide management with relevant financial and budgetary information for sound decision-making and to ensure efficient and effective management of financial support to schools and SDO for the implementation of quality delivery of basic education under the new normal.
- **11. TF Kalitala (Secretariat)** is tasked to ensure management of information, data, reports and provide inputs to management/chair on the analysis of reports/activities/programs accomplished, issues and concerns, recommendations, set directions, connect members to work together on common goals; report regularly to the group on activities completed and upcoming activities; circulate relevant information to group members; coordinate members' inputs; provide meeting support to management/chair; ensure support on results of activities/programs/projects that address achievement of goals and objectives.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION – TAGBILARAN CITY DIVISION


The City of Tagbilaran, being the Capital of the province of Bohol, serves as the gateway to the island province. The city sets on the plain which stretches up to the open waters of Tagbilaran Bay. The estimated land area of the City of Tagbilaran is approximately 32.7 square kilometers. It is situated on the south western portion of the island province of Bohol. The central part of the city is divided into three political districts. Poblacion I, II and wherein each is under a Punong Barangay and a set of Barangay Kagawad



Barangay, and a set of Barangay Kagawad. The remaining land area is equally divided into twelve barangays or districts, namely: Bool, Booy, Cabawan, Cogon, Dao, Dampas, Manga, Mansasa, San


Isidro, Taloto, Tiptip and Ubujan. All of which have their respective elementary school which constitutes the whole City Schools Division.

Under the leadership of our young & dynamic School Division Superintendent, Dr. Joseph Irwin A. Lagura, Tagbilaran City Division took part along with other Divisions in the Region in implementing the Ten(10) Point Basic Education Agenda as our guide in prioritizing our Banner Programs in 2020. These Agenda are as follows: 1) A 12 year Basic Education Cycle 2) Universal Pre-schooling for all 3) Establish the Madaris Education as a subsystem in the current education system 4)



Re-introduce technical and vocational education in public high schools 5) Every Child a Reader Program 6) Improve Science & Mathematics 7) Expand Government Assistance to Private Education 8) Use of Mother-Language Instruction, 9) Better Textbooks 10) Build More Schools in Cooperation with LGUs and other related programs, which has encouraged numerous teachers, families, parents,

students, and stakeholders despite the pandemic's impact on the lives and educational efforts of our colleagues and clients, hope springs forth. Literacy Rate in Tagbilaran City as of the year 2020 is 99.29%. The influx of people coming in and out of Tagbilaran have made its Education System facilities a Center for Learning to the Boholanos in general and those who wish to study here in this friendly city. Its major initiatives and the critical issues that need to be addressed is reflected on the succeeding pages of this report.



Certificate of Program Compliance (COPC) Issuances of SUCs in Region. CHED RO VII ensures Quality Standards for State Universities and Colleges (SUCs) and Local Universities and Colleges (LUCs) in the region to uphold greater access, equity, competitiveness and global excellence. Thus, pursuant to CMO No. 14, series of 2019 on "Policies and Guidelines in the issuance of Certificate of Program Compliance (COPC) to State Universities and Colleges (SUCs) and Local Universities and Colleges (LUCs)," CHED RO-VII obligated the Commission en Banc Resolution No. 641-2019 dated October 16, 2019 to all SUCs and CHED-recognized LUCs to heed the call for securing a COPC of each of their offered program. Since it is a new memorandum order, all Region VII SUCs and CHED-recognized LUCs were given two (2) years to comply beginning November 13, 2019. In case the SUC/LUC shall not able to secure the COPC within 2 years, the Governing Board may decide whether or not to continue offering the program.

4 of 5 LUCs in Bohol Recognized as HEI. In the advent of the implementation of RA 10931 otherwise known as 'The Universal Access to Quality Tertiary Education Act of 2017. As the law have mentioned, the FHE Program shall only be implemented in all State Universities and Colleges (SUCs) and CHED-recognized Local Universities and Colleges all over the country. This program then is intended for "All Filipino students who are either currently enrolled or shall be enrolled at any time thereafter in courses/programs leading to Bachelor Degree in any SUC and LUC and deemed to be exempted from paying tuition and other school fees for units enrolled.

Prior to the official assignment of Dir. Aljibe as CHED RO-VII Regional Director, all LUCs in Region VII have yet to comply with the minimum requirements to be considered as certified Higher Education Institution. Under the proactive leadership of Dir Aljibe, four (4) LUCs in Bohol Province with existing programs listed in the CHED Registry, has been given the status as officially CHED-Recognized Higher Education Institution. They are Trinidad Municipal College, Buenavista Community College, Tagbilaran City College, and Talibon Polytechnic College. These institutions have complied with the requirements to institutional recognition and operations of local universities and colleges as stipulated in CMO 32, s. 2006.

BISU's Response to COVID-19 Pandemic:

- The use of the University Bus as transport vehicle for the returning Boholano OFWs, LSIs, APORs from month of May to November 2020.
- The use of the facilities of Clarin Campus as community isolation unit of 39 locally stranded individuals.
- An Outreach activity was conducted by the Bilar Campus Extension Unit for the disinfection of San Isidro Labrador Parish in Bilar, Bohol and Sto. Nino Parish in Hanopol, Balilihan, Bohol.
- An outreach activity was conducted by the Main Campus through the Psychology Alumni Association for the distribution of 385 packs of essential goods to frontliners in the Municipalities of Corella, Sikatuna, Inabanga, San Isidro and Dimiao and to the PNP officers manning the checkpoints of Tagbilaran City, Municipalities of Dauis, Maribojoc and Antequera.
- An Outreach activity was conducted by the Bilar Campus Extension Unit for the distribution of 271 food packs to marginalized families, 20 food packs to the previous employees and 300 snack packs to barangay security personnel, RHU personnel and firemen in Bilar, Bohol.
- The Candijay Campus Research Unit transferred the technology Bohol QPass Tracer System as an alternative security measure for Quarantine Pass in Candijay, Bohol.
- An Outreach activity was conducted by the Balilihan Campus Extension Unit for the distribution of 132 food packsto the communities of Barangay Magsija, Balilihan, Bohol.
- The Main Campus through CVAARDEC distributed 308 pieces of face shields to the Municipality of Bien Unido and to the Farmer's Association in Bohol.
- An Outreach activity was conducted by the Calape Campus Extension Unit for the distribution
 of 60 setsworksheets and 40 sets of learning materials to Bonbon Elementary School and
 Tayabas Elementary School in Calape, Bohol.

Bohol Island State University (BISU) has conducted a project called "Isolation Tent" (62 units) with a grant of Php 803, 460.00 funded by the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) to respond the need for quarantine facilities for the returning Overseas Filipino Workers (OFWs) and Locally Stranded Individuals (LSIs).

Eleven faculty members and three students of BISU Main Campus participated the SAKURA Exchange program through the sponsorship of Japan Science and Technology Agency (JST) and Nagoya Institute of Technology last January 07-16, 2020 in Nagoya, Japan.

EDUCATION DEVELOPMENT CENTER (EDCenter)

Pres. Carlos P. Garcia Scholarship Program – facilitated the semestral processing and release of financial assistance of P 6,000.00 tuition fee assistance per semester, P 700.00 living allowance per month and P 1,000.00 uniform allowance per student for a total of 310 college students, in 15 various colleges and universities in the province.

Bohol Educational Subsidy Program – Facilitated the semestral processing and release of financial assistance of P 3,500.00 per student per semester for a total of 937 college students. These grantees were enrolled in 23 various colleges and universities in the province.

Student Recognition Program – had distributed medals and citations of Academic Excellence and Leadership Awards for outstanding graduating students in all 1,132 private and public elementary and secondary schools and colleges/universities in the province.

Provincial Milk Feeding Program – has 8,811 school-age malnourished children's beneficiaries in 23 municipalities in the province. The National Nutrition Council-Region 7 awarded the Province of Bohol for its Milk Feeding Program "COVID-19 Sugpuon, Malnutrisyon Wagtangon" as one of the Best Practices for COVID-19 Response in 2020.

Learning Support Program –had distributed school bags with various school supplies for 3,949 kindergarten and elementary students from 33 remote and island-schools in 11 municipalities in the province.


Acquisition of Learning Resource Equipment – has purchased high speed printing machine for the reproduction of contextualized learning materials developed by teachers across all levels and discipline. This is to ensure delivery of quality curriculum instruction to all learners under the new normal due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

OFFICE OF THE PROVINCIAL SOCIAL WELFARE AND DEVELOPMENT (OPSWD)

Aid to Individuals in Crisis Situation. The Crisis Intervention Division of OPSWD provides a range of services such as medical assistance, burial assistance, transportation assistance, food assistance and supportive assistance which shall be based on the assessment and recommendation of the social worker or the referring parties.

Throughout 2020, financial aid to individuals in crises reached Twenty Million Two Hundred Eighty-Five Thousand Three Hundred Thirty pesos (P20, 285, 330.00). A total of ten thousand thirty-nine (10, 039) indigent and vulnerable clients were satisfyingly provided with financial assistance based on their most pressing needs and concerns.

The department had served 4,205 females and 3,804 males needing medical assistance with a total of 8, 009 individuals amounting to P17,177,400.00; 292 females and 396 males needing burial assistance with a total of 688 individuals amounted to P2,144,000.00; 55 females and 48 males received supportive assistance with a total of 103 individuals amounted to P290,450.00; while 26 females and



33 males with a total of 59 individuals in need of transportation assistance amounted to P152,000.00; and 620 females and 560 males with a total of 1,180 individuals provided with food assistance amounted to P521,480.00.

 Emergency Response - After the arm conflict in Bilar on February 29, 2020, the office had provided food packs and stress debriefing sessions to two-hundred eighty-eight (288) residents from Barangay Cansumbol and Cambigsi, Bilar. One hundred ninety-five thousand forty pesos (P195,040.00) worth of Food Packs were also distributed to four hundred (400) indigent families evacuated after the armed conflict.


OPSWD responded two (2) fire incidents that happened in Totolan, Dauis on March 5, 2020 and in Pagina, Jagna on February 29, 2020. Financial assistance, food and non-food items such as blanket and thermos were provided to seventeen (17) families of Totolan, Dauis, worth P42,000.00.

COVID-19 Response – We Survive as One Bohol

P50,750.00 worth of Food Assistance was extended to 350 families in Poblacion, San Miguel. P63,000.00 worth of Food Assistance was distributed to 630 families in Guindacpan, Talibon. P361,630.00 worth of Food Assistance was provided to the 160 families (94 males, 69 females) stranded in Bato, Leyte who underwent quarantine for 14 days at NIA Office in Ubay when they returned to Bohol.

Rice assistance of eight (8) kilograms well-milled rice per family were also provided to 350, 000 families in the entire province amounting to one hundred fifty million pesos (P150,000,000.00).

In detail, provided with rice assistance were 771 vendors, 353 port workers & laborers, 172 massage therapists, 119 construction workers, 51 cosmetologists including barbers, 5,595 hotel/restaurant staff and workers, 141 souvenir shops workers, 1,839 tourist spot workers, 5,476 transportation drivers and 6,362 other unidentified sectors/groups. The graph below summarizes the number of displaced workers in different groups and sectors within the province.



- Bohol Senior Citizens PGBh acknowledges the contribution of senior citizens in communitybuilding and molding the young ones to be productive members of society. It also recognizes senior citizens among the vulnerable sector who need maximum attention and priority.
- Persons with Disability Affairs Office (PDAO) The Persons with Disability Affairs Office (PDAO) was established following the existing Provincial Ordinance No. 2015-004 as mandated under RA. 10070, an act establishing an institutional mechanism to ensure the implementation of programs and services for Persons with Disabilities in every province, city, and municipality, amending RA No. 7277 otherwise known as the "Magna Carta for Disabled Persons" as amended, and for other purposes. PDAO facilitated the following: Provision of Prosthesis and Assistive Devices, Assistive Devices Distributed and Livelihood Assistance to PWDs.
- o **Bohol Stimulation Therapeutic Activity Center (STAC)** has offered the following services to the Boholanos: Rehabilitation Program, Supplemental Feeding, Home Module, and Tutorial Class

- Bohol Crisis Intervention Center (BCIC) BCIC commits to provide a nurturing haven and care with direct services including temporary shelter, residential care, food, clothing and other needs to abused women and children. There were 40 clients served throughout 2020. An average of 30 clients served per month with 8 newly admitted clients. They were composed of 37 girls, 2 women, 1 boy child of women. The center has provided the following programs and assistance: Formal and Non-Formal Education, Life-Skills Activities, Spiritual Enhancement Activities, Children's Month Celebration, Legal Support and other medical and social development
- o Bohol Youth Home (BYH) Since the pandemic, the workforce of Bohol Youth Home construction has reduced from seventy (70) to ten (10) workers including skilled and unskilled laborers with one site engineer due to the delay of material delivery. As of December 2020, the Bohol Youth Home construction accomplishment remained at 80%. About 69.16% or P55,329,973.64 has been utilized as of December 2020 from a total project cost of P80.0 million.
- o Kauban Sa Reporma (KR) This is the advocacy campaign of the government to stop calling our brother surrenderers "former rebels" but call them "KRs" instead, to do away with the stigma attached to the term. This would also corroborate the fact that the government is seriously considering the human rights of the KRs as mandated by President Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo who issued Administrative Order No. 172 to streamline the program and interventions that specifically cater to them and their families. The Provincial Government thru the OPSWD conducted monitoring of individual and organizational livelihood projects and maintaining records of 280 KRs in the 14 clusters of (Antequera, Balilihan, Bilar, Batuan, Carmen, Catigbian, (2) Alicia, (2) Ubay, Danao, Inabangan, Sevilla & San Isidro; and of the 28 KRs in the 3 Resettlement Centers in Bayanihan Tuboran Ubay, Kalayaan Resettlement Danao & Rajah Sikatuna Katipunan Carmen.
- Enhanced Comprehensive Local Integration program (E-CLIP) This is a government program that aims to help the rebel members of CPP-NPA-NDF and Militia ng Bayan to restore their allegiance to the Philippine government. The financial benefits intended for their development include Firearms, explosives, and ammunitions remuneration, Immediate assistance (Php 15,000.00) and Livelihood assistance (Php 50,000.00) from DILG-Administered Package of assistance.
- O Child Protection and Development Program Republic Act 10410 otherwise known as the Early Years Act of 2013, declares that it is the policy of the State to promote the rights of children to survival, developmental, and special protection with full recognition and the need to provide developmentally appropriate experiences to address their needs and support parents in their roles as primary caregivers and as their children's first teachers. This year, the program utilized P5,596,134.00 (72.27%) out of the P7,742,652.00 budget allocation.
- Women Program The Provincial Social Welfare and Development Office is mandated to care, protect, nurture and guide the socially, physically and economically disadvantaged sectors in the province. OPSWD served as a catalyst and facilitator towards enabling women organizations be strongly involved in their own development and influence women in their respective communities. Fund utilized for this program was P60,116.00 or 3.33% from the budget allocation of P1,803,685.00.
- o Indigenous People (IP) Welfare and Development Program This program utilized 24.85% or P46,980.00 of the allocated budget P189,000.00. Globally we are struggling due to COVID- 19 pandemic which affects all aspects of lives of the populace. Amongst the most affected includes the Muslim communities in Bohol facing a great challenge most especially economically considering that majority of them are engage in small business enterprises. This year, three (3) quarterly livelihood monitoring, reporting and feedbacking were conducted with the support of various stakeholders including the PNP in Bohol.
- Family & Community Welfare & Development Program. Focus of this program are the disadvantaged and marginalized families and communities. In 2020, strengthening activities were focused in providing capacity building which includes leadership, values formation and conflict

management trainings. While ensuring sustainability of women groups and their livelihood projects, quarterly monitoring, reporting and feed backing meetings were conducted. Livelihood projects were provided to 3 groups/communities to wit: the souvenir vendors in Booy, Tagbilaran, fisherfolks in Pamilacan, Baclayon and vendors in Maribojoc. Each group were provided with a training on entrepreneurship and simple bookkeeping and the 2 groups (Tagbilaran and Maribojoc) received a total cash amounting to P100,000.00 as starting capital while P150,000.00 for the Pamilacan. Implementation of the Food for Work Program was facilitated with residents in the 12 barangays participating in community/ coastal clean-up and tree growing activities; 2,757 individuals/families received food packs (rice & canned goods) from September 2-November 20,2020.

- O Philhealth Insurance. This program is in accordance to Sangguniang Panlalawigan Resolution No. 2014-182 commitments to participate under the National Health Insurance Program (NHIP) as a sponsor and prescribed in the National Health Insurance Act of 2013 (Republic Act No. 10606). Last 2019, about 7,760 elected and appointed barangay officials were enrolled and PGBh paid the prescribed annual premium contributions and remitted a total amount of P18,624,000.00 to Philhealth. However, in 2020, the administration of Gov. Yap decided to change the scheme without jeopardizing the objective of ensuring financial risk protection and provision of health care services to Boholano constituents to only those that will be hospitalized/confined can be enrolled in the NHIP. With this, 47 individuals and their families benefitted the said program and PGBh paid a total amount of P169,200 (at P3,600/individual contribution) under the AICS program of OPSWD. In which, the provincial government save the 99% (P18,454,800.00) from its previous allocated budget.
- CoViD-19 Responses. Even before the COVID-19 pandemic, hunger continued to increase. The pandemic just pushed additional people in the province into chronic hunger. Measures to control virus outbreaks are disrupting global and local food supply chains. Border restrictions and lockdowns in the province are slowing harvests, destroying livelihoods and significantly hindering food transport. Equally urgent is the compounding threat of the pandemic on existing crises such as armed conflict, natural disasters, climate change- that are already stressing our food systems and triggering food insecurity around the province.

Technical Support to LSWDOs. This activity was in compliance with Administrative order 12 Series of 2017 as amended by AO 14 Series of 2007 (B) advocates for the Provincial/City/Municipal social Welfare and Development to include in their Annual work and Financial Plan the budget for capacity building activities specially trainings related to marriage counseling. Fund utilized was 93.26% or P466,300.00 of the budget allocation of P500,000.00. The PMOC training was conducted in four (4) batches taking in consideration the advice by the Commission on Population (POPCOM), the accredited trainer. There were 112 participants from the 33 MLGUs, the 1st Batch with 24 participants from Sagbayan, Candijay, Dauis, Loon, Balilihan, Panglao & Sikatuna; 2nd Batch — San Miguel, Getafe, Tubigon, Clarin, Bien Unido, Dagohoy, Danao, Guindulman, Buenavista with 27 participants; 3nd Batch — from Loay, Talibon, Trinidad, Ubay, Loboc, Carmen, Garcia Hernandez, Sevilla, Tubigon, Tagbilaran, Dagohoy, Mabini with 31 participants & 4th Batch — from Anda, Carmen, Dimiao, Duero, Jagna, Lila, Batuan, Mabini, Tagbilaran, Valencia with 29 participants trained and received accreditation certificates as Pre-Marriage Counselors in Bohol.

The National Commission on Indigenous Peoples (NCIP) spearheaded the opening activity for the 23rd IPRA Month Celebration via Zoom and Facebook Live! with different cultural presentations from CAR to Region XIII, sharing colorful costumes and different IP cultures. Moreover, the Eskaya IPs of Bohol, came together in Barangay Taytay, Duero in commemoration of their Indigenous Peoples Month. The Eskaya Community in Taytay prepared a Program, showcasing their "Sayaw nga ENESKAYA", songs, games and poems.

This is the second O. megalodon tooth fossil from Bohol found a local, the first one donated by Venjo Busalla and displayed at the National Museum of Natural History in Manila,

- Launching of #MgaKwentongPamana & #KabilingBolanon Series for National Heritage Month May 2020,
- Launching of *National Museum Bohol Exhibition Virtual Tours* for Museums and Galleries Month October 2020,

CENTER FOR CULTURE AND ARTS DEVELOPMENT (CCAD)

One of the three major pillars of the development in the province is the Revitalization and Flourishing of Bohol Arts and Cultural Heritage. The Center for Culture and Arts Development (CCAD), together with the Bohol Arts and Cultural Heritage (BACH) Council work closely with the Bohol Tourism Office (BTO) in the promotion of the 7 Arts. The 7 Arts will be cultivated and showcased around focused or specific tourist sites with local communities. As the agri-eco cultural tourism of communities is showcased, local culture and the 7 Arts will be promoted as part of the local offerings to travelers.

Cultural offerings in dance, music, poetry, story-telling, handicrafts, products and culinary experiences will take a very local and unique perspective and delivered by barangay artisans and performers. The venue of such promotions will be the commemorative events: UBI Festival, National Arts Months Celebration, Visual Art Exhibitions, Women's Month Celebration, Commemoration of Philippine Independence, Arts for Healing and Recovery Program (coping the COVID-19 pandemic), and Culture and Arts Development (under the new normal)

NATIONAL HOUSING AUTHORITY (NHA)

A joint undertaking between NHA and LGU of Pilar, Bohol under the NHA's Resettlement Assistance Program for LGUs (RAP-LGU) for the development of a 33,772.00 sqm. Such LGU-owned property will be converted into 148 serviced home lots to benefit the informal settler families qualified for relocation and resettlement under R.A. 7279 specifically those families living along flood/landslide prone areas and affected by government infrastructure projects. Total Cost of the Project is P15,146,609.93. The counterpart of the municipality is about P3,387,372.39 and NHA's funding assistance will be P11,759,237.54.

PHILIPPINE STATISTICS AUTHORITY (PSA)

In 2020, the whole world had been challenged economically, socially and the health sector was put to test. With the occurrence of COVID-19, some of the activities of PSA Bohol were either cancelled or

postponed. However, due to a high demand on statistics, the Philippine Statistics Authority (PSA) pushed through with the conduct of the 2020 Census of Population and Housing (CPH). In line with the government's goal, PSA started the Philippine Identification System.

A series of trainings were conducted prior to the enumeration. It involved a total of 1,716 hired personnel province-wide. At this point, the machine processing and data evaluation is still ongoing. The target date of release of the official data is in May 2021.

Bohol has a total workload of 369 sample establishments for ASPBI and 87 for SICT. The distribution started on 03 November 2020. Meanwhile, the collection of the questionnaires began ten days after. The collected questionnaires will undergo manual and machine processing at the provincial office. The target completion of the activity is February 2021.

Luckily, Bohol was among the first 32 provinces to start the implementation. The MOA signing between PSA and the LGUs was fast-tracked as it was done virtually province-wide and was completed on 14 October 2020. For the Step 1 (Pre-registration), a total of 234 hired personnel were involved. As of the end of the year, a total of 460,261 individuals were pre-registered which is 102.6% of the target. Bohol has an allocation of 181 Registration Kits. These will be allocated province-wide according to the workload per municipality. Bohol province is preparing for the Step 2 which was postponed to February 2021.

For the Civil Registration, the Decentralized Copy Annotation Project (DeCAP) was finally implemented this 2020. This is an innovation project of PSA to address the need to expedite the processing of annotations of civil registry documents. The province started the implementation in the last quarter of 2020. By the end of the year, a total of 534 applications were screened and forwarded to RSSO.

DEVELOPMENT ADMINISTRATION SECTOR

LOCAL GOVERNANCE

The Office of the Governor led the way with its several divisions. The Community Development Action for Rural Transformation (CD-ART) Section, developed 17 PGBh Community Organizers that conducted information drive on the COVID-19 pandemic, in 21 barangays that totals to 1,778 households which then trained 707 SWC volunteers in CDP deployed barangays. The Executive Support Section facilitated the preparation, finalization and signing of 54 Executive Order, and also provided 128 meetings (physical and zoom). The General Administrative and Technical Support Services assisted 1,637 walk-in clients, 350 daily schedules of the Governor, received 2,067 invitations and programs, designated 717 invitations and programs for representation. The Financial Management Section, was able to prepare and submit 10 PPMU for APP, revised 8 PPMP and 6 supplemental PPMPs, approval of 4 WFPs for special programs/ projects, posted 3 quarterly monthly utilization and balances report, submitted 4 Quarterly Reports on utilization of 20% DF programs to PPDO, processed the payments of 27 billings for the following: utilities, newspaper subscription and ad placements, facilitated 12 charges for funding of works proposal requests, supported 109 LGUs for Waterworks, Infrastructure Projects, support to LGUs for Road Development Projects – 31 Million per Municipality, Waterworks Project – 364 out of 4 Supplemental Budgets, 39 augment funds, released 6 requests of 10% withheld allotment, facilitated 7008 Purchase Requests, BAC Resolutions, Notice of Awards, Purchase Orders, Contracts, NTPs and Disbursement Vouchers. The Civil Society Organizations (CSO) Partnership Section facilitated the approval by the Provincial Governor of EO 34-2020, conducted meetings, workshops and main events (13). The Constituency Services Unit, were able to facilitate the request of 7,797

indigent constituents for financial assistance, transport of 12 corpse and 13 patients totaling to PhP 14,662,300.5, assisted and implemented 4 Humanitarian Mission that had served 783 beneficiaries.

The **Provincial Youth Development Office** conducted 15 meetings, and 2 strategic planning. Its LAUM program were also able to conduct 2 trainings, 3 sports clinic activities, its bisita belen bicycle challenge, 6 webinars, 6 virtual and in-person support sessions, 1 virtual workshop, dance campa and competitions, revised 2 provincial ordinances, Boholympics, and Provincial Youth Development Council, 3 Linggo ng Kabataan activities.

The **Sangguniang Panlalawigan of Bohol**: Legislative Branch yielded 1,032 Resolutions, and 41 Ordinaces, held 52 Legislative Sessions, 29 Legislative Committees have convened 137 meetings, 6-days marathon budget hearings, 4 investigations and 4 Public Hearings.

The **Bohol Provincial Library and Information Center (BPLIC)** recorded a total of 5,521 reader's statistics attendance of readers and researchers in 2020 which was decline compared to the 2019 data because of the pandemic. On July 2020, the library services suspension was lifted since March 2020 and noticeably only a handful of readers visited the library unlike that prior to the pandemic. The BPLIC innovated by tapping through social media platform and were able to give services to 132 clienteles. With the new normal, we have also recorded a high of 1,273,600 social media likes and engagements of library services. They have also added a new archives section for its Boholania collections, Filipiniana Archives, SP Legislative Records and the conversion also of the old SP Session Hall into a multimedia room to serve as seminar/ training hall. The library personnel also participated a total of 30 webinars. They were able to fully conduct book inventory and recorded a total of 15,000 volumes of books, a total of 138 titles of new book references have been delivered to the library of various subject areas. A new book mobile was purchased last December 2020 in replacement of the unserviceable book mobile from the National Library of the Philippines.

The Human Resource Management and Development Office (PHRMDO) were able to conduct 1 prescreening for 7 positions; identified 40 items for creation and 9 items for abolition; attended to 859 clients' requests/ applicants/ jobseekers; appointed 18 regular positions, 718 contracts of services, 209 casual plantilla and 2,165 job orders; 800 applicants and 1,500 job order workers; updated 2 copies of PGBh plantilla of personnel; issuance of ID numbers to COS, and JO; conduct briefing to 1,374 new entrants; and submission of 12 Reports on Appointments Issued (RAI). They also prepared and issued 3,175 payrolls and payroll registry; 18,050 leave applications; 65 evaluation worksheets for terminal leave of retirees; 1,749 NOSA and 1,894 certifications; 270 Loyalty incentives; 1,483 confirmation for employees availing GSIS loans; 12 accession reports; 7 grievance committee meetings with 3 cases taken up; exit interviews to 75 separating employees; enhanced the HRIS with the NOSA, On-line publication and additional entries in the payroll system; coordinated in the approval of the 5in-1 PGBh Health Program. For its Performance Management function, they were able to review 5,178 Strategic Performance Management System (SPMS) documents (target, ratings and 15 DPCRs) of PGBH employees; issued 118 certifications for mid-year and PEI to qualified employees; conducted 7 batches of SPMS orientation; consolidated 5,266 comments and recommendations; submitted report of Ratings to the Performance Management Team (PMT) and the CSC. They were also able to facilitate and documented 3 meetings; recognition activities to 711 recipients/ COVID - 19 frontliners; facilitated the dissemination of memorandum-advisories on health protocols relative to employees and workplace; facilitated the implementation of Alternative Work Arrangements in consonance with the CSC policies; administered the processing of leave applications (non-deductible) of 74 quarantined employees and certifications of PGBh workers; assisted 290 clients inquiring COVID issues and concerns; facilitated the giving of CAN incentives and rice packs to the PGBH employees. The PGBh Provincial Employees Profile (as of December 31, 2020) showed 1,444 filled up Plantilla positions out of the total of 1,777; With the Male and Female Regular-status employees of 689, and 755 respectively; Career positions occupying first level positions and second level positions with 915, and 500 occupants respectively; Non-career positions with a co-terminus and elective with 14 and 15 respectively; there are also 209 casual plantilla employees.

The Provincial Planning and Development Office (PPDO) was able to prepare the 2019 Provincial Annual Report and the 2021 Provincial Annual Development and Investment Plan. The "We Survive as One Bohol" program as a post-disaster Rehabilitation Plan as one of its major accomplishment for the year. Another major output of PPDO is the 8 Comprehensive Project Profile (CPP) on Decompression Chamber System, Assistance to Reinvigorate the Tourism Value Chain, Sea Ambulance, Hygiene Preparedness in Tourist Sites, Tourist Site Enhancement and Management, Palengke Program, Bohol Water Supply and Sanitation Project (BWSP) and Solid Waste Management Facility for Clustered Municipalities for the Transforming Communities towards Resilient, Inclusive and Sustainable Tourism (TouRIST) Program under the Department of Tourism (DoT) and the World Bank (WB); other project proposals were the the Cultural Hub, Alburquerque Craft Village and Creative Hub, Abatan River Cultural Hub, Scaling-up Public Healthcare Capacity at the Provincial Level to Manage Pandemic, Development of Tarsier Sanctuary Ecotourism Complex, FS for Talibon Cluster Sanitary Land Fill (BIAD III), Loctob Spring in Loboc for bulk water supply, Catagbacan, Loon Port as First Phase of the Proposed Bohol Northwest Special Economic Zone, Trauma and Urgent Care Center, Tagbilaran-Panglao Expressway Inter Central Business District (CBD) Link; started with the updating of Local Road Network Development Plan (LRNDP 2021-2025) and has consolidated Local Public Transport Route from submitting LGUs, prepared route maps and prepared the Bohol Public Transport Route Plan (BPTRP). Technical Assistance and Extension Services include review of municipal GAD Plan and Budget, and Accomplishment Reports; review Comprehensive Development Plan and Comprehensive Land Use Plan of component LGUs; support services in the implementation of Official Development Assistance (ODA), Philippine Rural Development Project (PRDP), Transforming Communities towards Resilient, Inclusive and Sustainable Tourism (TouRIST) Program, ICLEI-ASEP-CELLS, Localization of the Philippine Development Plan (PDP) 2017-2022 Result Matrices and Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), Bohol Energy Development Advisory Group (BEDAG), One Bohol Power (1BP) and the Panglao-Dauis-Tagbilaran City Executive Council (PADTEC). It has provided technical, administrative and Secretariat services to the Provincial Development Council during its 7 PDC Executive Committee meetings; prepared 58 PDC resolutions and forwarded them to NEDA-7 and concerned government agencies; coordinated with NEDA on the status of the project proposals that were transmitted.

The **Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG – Bohol)** has conducted several activities for the 2020 2020 Seal of Good Local Governance (SGLG) implementation for all LGUs. However, because of the COVID-19 pandemic, the 2020 SGLG assessment and onsite validation was suspended. Nevertheless, as an integral part of the SGLG, the Local Governance Performance Management System (LGPMS) website development is at its final phase with the pilot testing scheduled in December 2020. The Provincial Government of Bohol, the City of Tagbilaran and the 46 municipalities (2 of which are post-compliant) of Bohol were part of the Good Financial Housekeeping (GFH) passers. In relation to project monitoring through citizen's participation, an online roll-out orientation on Development Live or DevLive was conducted. At the same time, DILG-Bohol in coordination with other National Government Agencies (NGAs) led the conduct of Dagyaw 2020 activities. Town Hall meetings were conducted online, as a way of adapting to the new normal, amidst COVID-19 pandemic. A series of activities were conducted which included, among others, online Open Government Virtual Town Hall meetings. As to the compliance on the formulation/ updating of CDPs and CLUPs, the latest status report shows that 70% and 33% of the component city and municipalities have updated CDPs and CLUPs, respectively. DILG-Bohol provided technical assistance in the formulation of CDPs of six (6) LGUs in Bohol, namely: Tubigon, Maribojoc, Bien Unido, Dagohoy, Garcia-Hernandez and Mabini. For the Localization of the PDP 2017-2022 and the SDGs, a Provincial Workshop on Increasing Responsiveness of Local Plans to the PDP 2017-2022 and the SDGs which was participated by all city and to conduct information dissemination through advocacy activities, and provides support through trainings and seminars which were made online because of the pandemic; were able to have Community-Based Monitoring System (CBMS) where two (2) LGUs were provided assistance on the conduct of CBMS Module 1 Reorientation; the Synchronized Barangay Assembly this year was conducted through different modes. Technical assistance was still provided to the LGUs and was still being mindful with the current situation brought about by the pandemic. This level conducted eight (8) fact-finding activities, processed twenty-eight (28) death benefit claims, indorsed twelve (12) requests for authority to purchase motor vehicle, facilitated four (4) endorsements on lakbay aral and disseminated fourteen (14) invitation for scholarship programs. Updating the database for provincial, municipal and barangay officials through Barangay Information System (BIS) and Elective Local Officials Profile Database System (ELOPDS), sustained and complied the ARTA requirements through the establishment of a Public Assistance and Complaint Desk (PACD); updating of Citizen's Charter; cleared roads of illegal structures and construction in coordination with the PNP and BFP. The Orientation Course for the Newly Elected Officials to the Local Sangguinan was not pushed through because of the pandemic. Another round of SK Trainings was conducted; the Sumbungan Online as part of the "Bayanihan to Heal as One Act" was launched; continuously monitors the implementation of Kasambahay Law.

Secretariat services were provided in the regular conduct of Peace and Order Councils (POC) and Anti-Drug Abuse Councils (ADAC) joint meetings remain steadfast in providing technical assistance to the LGUs including the Provincial Government of Bohol. Seventeen (17) former rebels have received the DILG administered package of assistance; 47 municipalities and 1 component city have created their respective Local Task Forces to End Local Communist Armed Conflict (ELCAC); conduct of Barangay Drug Clearing Program (BDCP) Re-Orientation and validation of candidates for drug-cleared barangay; 47 municipalities and 1 city have operationalized the Community-Based Rehabilitation Program (CBRP); monitor the functionality of the 1,109 BADACs; submission of BADAC minutes of meeting were done.

For FY 2020 LGSF-AM, 46 MLGUs are eligible to receive the project funds. Presently, LGUs are waiting for the release of Notice of Authority to Debit Account Issued (NADAI) from the BTr while others are complying requirements for the confirmation of fund release. The DILG Provincial Inspection teams regularly conduct monitoring and inspection; continues to provide technical assistance to Local Council for the Protection of Children (LCPC) and GAD Focal Points. As to LCPC functionality, 21 LGUs are with Ideal Functionality, 13 Mature, 6 Progressive, and 8 Basic. Capacity development activities were constantly conducted; consistent in monitoring the compliance of the LGUs wherein the LGUs have organized and have functional GFPS, have GAD database and have GAD Monitoring and evaluation mechanism. Out of the 49 LGUs including the provincial government, 42 have GAD Codes, and 29 have GAD Plan and Budget and GAD Accomplishment Report which were already endorsed by the DILG. At present, 44 had submitted their GAD documents, but only 29 were endorsed. GAD Plan and Budget Monitoring System (GAD-PBMS) was introduced and operationalized this year. For gender

responsive interventions to COVID-19, a Joint Memorandum Circular was issued jointly by the CHR and the DILG entitled Ensuring Gender-Responsive Interventions to COVID-19 and the New Normal Including Ensuring Prompt, Effective and Survivor-Centered Response to all Forms of Gender-Based Violence. DILG also monitors the functionality of the Local Aids Council in the LGU. In order to strengthen the Management Coordination Committee (MMCs), regular meetings were conducted. Quarterly reports on the conduct of meetings were submitted to monitor the functionality of the committee. DILG Bohol also took part on the celebration of the Crime Prevention Week. On the other hand, Bohol maintains a zero recipient or LGUs that accepted relocates from another LGU, and zero sending LGUs or LGUs that relocated ISFs to another LGU nevertheless.

Four (4) LGUs in Bohol participated in the Online Training on the Electronic Business Permits and Licensing System (eBPLS) software. The Bohol Investment Promotion Center (BIPC) conduct of Ease of Doing Business Webinar Series for Business Permit and Licensing Officers (BPLOs) and Local Economic and Investment Promotions Officers (LEIPOs), which was also participated by the partner agency DILG Bohol. The Conditional Matching Grant to Provinces (CMGP) is in its 5th year of implementation since the implementation of KALSADA program in CY 2016. From 2016 up to present, eight (8) CMGP projects were completed, 2 ongoing projects for CMGP 2019 and 2 projects for issuance of Notice to Proceed, 1 under procurement and the remaining one project for CMGP 2020 is pending for procurement. Technical assistance to the PGBh in conducting activities specified under their Provincial Governance Reform Roadmap (PGRR); took the lead in the updating of the Local Road Network Development Plan (LRNDP) for CY 2021-2025.

DILG-Bohol provided technical assistance to LGUs resulting to their compliance to the DRRM Act. Records in this office show that on the state of LGU Disaster Preparedness Compliance, 46 LGUs are fully compliant while 2 are partially compliant. In terms of early preparations, only 2 LGUs are fully compliant, whereas for critical preparations 48 LGUs are partially compliant. For the Local DRRM directory, two LGUs are partially complaint. Technical assistance in the formulation of the Local Climate Change Action Plan (LCCAP) of the LGUs in Bohol. Through this unit, the DRRM focal person successfully facilitated two (2) CDRA-LCCAP orientation for the municipalities of Danao and Catigbian. DILG-Bohol fully supports the PGBh in its anti-illegal campaign programs; also took part during the conduct of Provincial Ecological Solid Waste Management Monitoring and Evaluation, Beach Tourism Destinations Monitoring.

Their Public Assistance and Complaint Desk (PACD) is able to ensure prompt assistance to clients. The Local Governance Resource Center is available to field officers and clients who need additional knowledge on governance. DILG Bohol actively engaged in programs and projects spearheaded and implemented by various Provincial and National Government Agencies and other National Convergence Initiatives. Online Calendar, online platform SubayBAYAN, Facebook page of DILG-Bohol, and online recording of incoming and outgoing communications have been established and maintained by this level. Various online activities initiated by DILG 7 Regional Office were participated by the Provincial Office personnel and DILG field officers. As to the institutionalization of HRM-related activities, the Provincial Human Resource Merit Selection and Promotion Board (PHRMSPB), indorsed comparative assessments for the positions of LGOOs V, VI and VII in February 2020; endorsed the shortlisted applicants for the Contact Tracers (CTs); the Program on Awards and Incentives for Service Excellence (PRAISE) was suspended. They observed the ISO 9001 Quality Management Processes, the newly hired LGOOs II were oriented on its processes. DILG-Bohol consistently implemented the Strategic Performance Management System (SPMS). One of the notable practices of the DILG-Bohol employees is the observance of the 5S program in the office. The conduct of Training on Procurement as part of the Financial and Administrative Management Enhancement Project was suspended due to the pandemic. Regular inventory of office equipment, supplies and other properties as well as Provincial BAC Meetings. Supervision, monitoring, and dissemination of updates are done through bimonthly field officers conferences and cluster meetings. This year, virtual conferences and meetings were employed as a way of coping up with the pandemic. To ensure cascading of ExeCom concerns to the provincial staff, this level initiated the conduct of Provincial Management Committee Meeting (ProManCom) participated by all program coordinators and administrative staff. DILG-Bohol provided assistance during the visit of the Secretary of DILG in July. PD Jerome G. Gonzales together with the cluster leaders also conducted supervisory visits to selected Field Officers to monitor their compliance with administrative requirements as well as their rapport with local officials and functionaries. Competencies of DILG-Bohol officers and staff are developed with their attendance to a number of trainings and seminars duly called for. Virtual platforms such as Google Meet, Zoom and Facebook live are utilized in the conduct of these activities. As to the Apprenticeship Program for LGOOs II and III, two LGOOs from Bohol are currently undergoing the said program. Disiplina Muna campaign and its activities were also conducted and participated by this field unit. DILG Bohol's collaboration with other government agencies were also evident this year. Showing a strong support to the Persons with Disabilities, Youth involvement and empowerment, among others. As to GAD Related activities, participation of women's month celebration, conduction of safety drills/exercises, coastal clean-up, tree planting and the celebration of the Sinulog festival. All of these accomplishments were made possible under the new and able leadership of our dynamic Provincial Director, Jerome G. Gonzales.

PUBLIC FINANCE

The Provincial Budget Management Office (PBMO) was able to prepare the Annual Investment Program (AIP) 2021, Supplemental Investment Plan (SIP) 2020; Annual Budget 2021, Supplemental Budget of the PGBh; provision of technical support services; Budget Execution and Control Services: encoded the approved Annual Budget 2020 into the E-budget system; preparation and release of Allotment Release Order (ARO); review of WFPs and Project Procurement Management Plans (PPMP); and Certification of Activity Designs for availability of appropriation; assignment of Responsibility Center through the e-budget system; receive, review, and issued certification of financial transactions as to the availability of appropriations; receive and earmark as to availability of appropriation Plantilla employees/ Contracts of Contract of Service Workers, Job Orders, Purchase Requests and Travel Order; process Requests for Augmentation/ Reversion/ Realignment and Release of Allotment reserved for later release; Budget Review Services: assisted the SP in the review of Annual and Supplemental Budgets and recommend the appropriate action; preparation of Review Letters of reviewed Annual and Supplemental Budgets for submission to the Committee on Appropriations and of Ordinance of the SP; Budget Accountability and Reporting Services, and monitor and evaluate budget performance of the PGBh; preparation of periodic reports; Technical Support Services: implementation of the E-Budget System including its enhancements, support for the implementation of the PGBH-Unified System (PGBH-US); together with the LFC, sustained the updating and implementation of the SP - approved Public Financial Management Improvement Plan (PFM-IP) with the PFM Assessment Report (PFMAR). PBMO likewise participated in the DBM-Asian Development Bank Capacity Building Program and chosen as one of the 6 pilot local budget offices in Central Visayas.

The **Provincial Accountant's Office (PAccO)** include submission of updated Financial Reports; reduction of reconciling items and achieving fair presentation of Financial Statements, prompt submission of monthly remittance reports; conduct of Capacity Development activities; briefing on Reporting of Hospital Receivables; conducted Bookkeeping Refresher, Teach-ins and Coaching; reduction of outstanding cash advances by implementing control measures; required mandatory inclusion in the DPCR of each Department/ Office the monitoring and submission of Liquidation for all Cash Advances drawn for the office or employee's travel; conducted Capacity Development activities for Auditors and other Audit staff; Auditing Refresher, Teach-ins and Coaching, continuous enhancement of PAccO's existing Financial Transaction Tracking System (FiTTSys); Digital database of communications and financial transactions at PAccO thru the Document Archival Information System (DAISy); implemented the barcoding of transactions received at PAccO to facilitate processing of claims. This year PAccO received an award as the Most Promising Information Technology Innovation, in recognition of the PGBh's significant initiative and collaboration with Commission on Audit in maximizing the use of the Electronic New Government Accounting System (e-NGAS) and Electronic

Budget System (eBudget) of PAccO and PBMO respectively through Information Techology. Another award received was as 2nd Place Best in Digital Governance Award-LGU Internal Processes Category, in recognition of the Provincial Government of Bohol's PGBh — Unified System (PGBh-US) for remarkable ICT practices and innovation which effectively rendered assigned tasks under the new normal with the virus still lurking in the environment.

At the **Provincial Treasury Office (PTO)**, accomplishments include collection of annual tax on vehicles, from Official Receipts and Stickers issued; conducted transfer of accountability to the following municipalities; conducted cash examination to accountable officers of PGBh-operated hospitals; number of auction property purchased by the Provincial Government of Bohol; number of letter requests received by this office citing the intention of Lot Owners who have legal interest in reacquiring their auctioned property, number of Notices prepared and transmitted personally to various requesting parties to come in the office to pay the price for resale and to bring with them papers/documents as basis of their claims of ownership of the property, they intend to re-purchase from the PGBh; issued Official Receipts and Cash Tickets to all payments made by taxpayers in accordance with Provincial Ordinance on Revenue Code and COA rules and regulations; reviewed and computed tax payments supporting documents, accurately performed Cash Count of daily cash collection, daily report of collections and deposits, accurately the daily collection with intact (OR), recorded accurately in the cash book all collections made during the day, received and reviewed accurately RPT collection reports, accurately consolidated the monthly remittance on RPT (Basic & SEF) provincial share; accurately received and liquidated daily collection remittances from all collectors, counted daily collections; monitored and reviewed accurately monthly reports and remittances of RPT provincial share; monitored daily the collections of income from provincial implemented taxes and other local fees; verified and acknowledged report of collections from the Cash Receipts Division; prepared Deposits for all collections and deposit to authorized Depository Bank, renewed time Deposits; Disbursed and approved vouchers and payrolls, salaries, and other claims and PF Share thru LBP and FCB Pitakard; encoded and uploaded account numbers to FCB website, withdrawal of funds by Disbursing Officers for wages; disbursed checks to various payees, delivered and received, approved vouchers from offices, released checks to various claimants, report of checks issued and released from all funds, recorded approved vouchers and payrolls with check.

The **Provincial Assessor's Office (PAssO)**, it was able to update the Schedule of Fair Market Values (SFMV), supervised the implementation and completion of Tax Mapping Project of LGUs. This office accumulated a total increase of Real Property Tax (RPT) total collectibles; issued certifications and processed tax declarations; accomplished issuances of certifications on total landholdings of landowner, history of assessments, non-encumbrance, certified true copies and annotations; tax declarations were processed last year such as: transfers of ownership, subdivisions, consolidations, and revisions; extended technical assistance to municipal assessors in appraising new/ undeclared hotels, huge buildings, machineries and other structures that contributed to the increase of real property assessments. The office's in-house programmer enhanced their computerized systems like enhanced Real Property History Information System (RPHIS), enhanced Property Holdings (cart type transaction), Certificate of Improvements, History of Property, enhanced reporting of Fuel Consumption, enhanced reporting of Office Supply, enhanced monitoring of Office Annual budget with auto-update balance. The systems have converted cadastral parcel map into GIS-Manifold tax maps and established and updated. Different Municipal Assessment Offices had downloaded their GIS Manifold tax maps at PAssO for review and consolidation.

Provincial Internal Audit Office (PIAO) conducts the management and operations audit under the PGBh has been undertaken regularly; completed Regular Audit Engagements; review and appraisal on the systems and processes, operations practices, records, reports, and performance standards of specific prioritized audit areas were also given attention through the conduct of Operations Audit; completed Operations Audits; conducted and completed a Special Audit Engagement on the Vehicle Management; Follow-up Audit Engagements were also completed; monitoring and updating on the status of implementation of the findings and recommendations of the COA's Annual Audit Report

(AAR) including prior year's audit findings and recommendations. Report on the Status of Implementation on the Audit Findings and Recommendations of the AAR for CY 2018 and 2019 were completed and submitted to COA. PIAO Auditors were assigned as Validators for the Offshore Boholanos Coordinating Team (OBCT) of the PGBh. This office also assisted the Local Finance Committee (LFC) and the Provincial Administrators Office in the preparation of various internal policies. Technical, financial and consultancy or advisory services has been provided. The Provincial Auditor has provided consultancy and advisory services to clients. PIAO has also reviewed and appraised various documents from the different offices/ departments. Varied inputs, advices and recommendations have been provided.

JUSTICE AND SAFETY

Bohol District Jail include perimeter fence inspection, banging of grills and checking of padlocks, observance of one (1) hour shutdown of electric power, physical headcount of PDL, intensifying the conduct of Greyhound Operation, contraband control, strengthening the campaign against CTG and localization EO No. 70, discipline and progressive cleansing of personnel including Guard Mounting. Regular drug testing activities are done. During the Recognition and Awarding of Gawad Penolohiya Awardee, certain personnel of the unit were recognized. Innovations made by the unit, is online video conference, E-DALAW and E-TAWAG. They have posted COVID-19 Management protocols include operation readiness, implementation of advisories and protocols, posting of advisories of NCOV-19and Algorithm Tarps outside the jail facility visible to all visitors, regular conduct of "Talk to PDL" for advisories re:COVID 19, tele-hearing and status of jail visitation, facility readiness, maintenance of Isolation Room (COVID-19) and Disinfectant Booth, disinfection procedures such as disinfection of vulnerable areas/surfaces, production of face shields and face mask made of padding, medical management and contamination prevention measures like daily health monitoring to both PDL and personnel, sunning activity, distribution of face masks, PDL dorm & Rank inspection, Mental Health Awareness and psychoeducation to PDL, stress management activities like Reflect-Share activity, group counselling, and recreational activities, tele hearing and E-Dalaw.

Data at the **Bohol Police Provincial Office (Philippine National Police – Bohol)** showed a decrease in the 2020 Peace and Order Incident, Public Safety Incident and Total Crime Incident. As to its Operational Accomplishments for the 2020 period with regards to its Campaign Against Illegal Drugs: Operations Conducted, Persons Arrested. As to Rewards and Punishment there were Commendations Issued, Punishments: Suspended, Dismissed, Demoted, and Reprimanded. A new Police Station Building for the Corella Police Station was inaugurated, blessed and turned-over. Ground Breaking for the construction of a new Police Station Building for the Danao Police Station. In the Implementation of Community Quarantine, there were certain violators of EO 13, 16, 15 and 17.

The 47th Infantry (KATAPATAN) Batallion 3rd Infantry (SPEARHEAD) Division, Philippine Army, the unit was able to conduct Combat Operations. The unit also performed such activities like Regular Patrol, Community Security Patrols, Camp Defense Drills, Visibility/ Mobile Patrol, Area Security, Security Assistance, Route Security, Security Convoy. CTG Personalities surrendered through the efforts of AFP-PNP Joint Operations. CSP/ CDP Deployment unit was able to successfully conduct the CSP Deployment in the Red Area and in the White Area. The unit was able to conduct the following activities for Covid-19 Response: IATF Quarantine Control Point, QRT, HADR meeting (COVID-19), Security Assistance to LSI, Transportation Assistance. As to Civil-Military Operations (CMO) and other Significant Activities, the Unit was able to conduct Peace Advocacy Symposium. Assistance in E-CLIP Distribution to FRs by the PGBh.

The **Office of the Provincial Prosecutor of Bohol**, prosecutors are recognized and commended as a consistent regional awardee for ten (10) consecutive years with the corresponding Plaque of Recognition for every year from 2010 to 2020 for resolving cases under preliminary investigation within the prescribed period set forth under DOJ Department Circular No. 1.

The Philippine Atmospheric, Geophysical and Astronomical Administration (PAG-ASA) in the aspect of Weather, Climate and Flood Forecasting/ Warning and Other Related Services: Thunderstorm Advisories, Rainfall Advisories, Dissemination of Forecast Products/Warnings/Advisories: Weather Forecast, Weather Bulletins and Advisory, IEC Conducted.

The Bureau of Fire Protection (BFP)/ Office of the Provincial Fire Director (OPFD) provides inspection; business permits processed; Mobile Business Ones-Stop-Shop and Oplan "Listas na Pamayanan". Fire Suppression records received calls, while the Fire Investigation of the Bohol Unit records Fire Incidents Investigated: Submitted Final Investigation Report within the Prescribed Timeframe, Arson Fire cases, Arson Fire Filed in Court. Emergency, Medical and Rescue Services: Non-Fire Calls Responded with Ambulance. With the outbreak of Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, this unit activated the Code Blue Alert (Heightened Alert status).

ENVIRONMENT MANAGEMENT SECTOR

The Province of Bohol takes pride of its abundant natural resources. It is blessed with mineral deposits, forest products, water resources, eco-tourism, high grade minerals, vast area for agriculture and aquaculture and blessed with pristine white sand beaches and coral reef of which the Boholano people and tourists enjoy these amazing wonders and God-Given creation. Project undertakings in the Province mostly rely upon the fertile soil and bountiful sea.

However, some Boholanos tend to abuse the gift of rich natural resources. They do not have the commitment to take good care of Bohol's lush vegetations, abundant supplies of surface water, pristine white sand beaches and azure blue waters. Hence, the Provincial Government of Bohol is motivated to mobilize the Boholanos in protecting, conserving and managing the environment and natural resources, in order to enjoy and sustain its natural resources and enjoy a clean, safe and healthy environment for the present and future generation.

All programs and projects related to environment and natural resources that were implemented by the DENR, CENRO Talibon and Tagbilaran, MGB, PEMO-EMB, DA, BFAR, BEMO and NGOS, Private Sector, among others, are in line with the Development Thrust to ensure efficiency and effectiveness in providing greater service delivery to the public for sustainability.

In the realm of achieving a brighter future, the convergence of various social entities is a way to have it. Heightened consciousness and concerted involvement of the people especially in the hinterlands would bring about the realization of a sustainable development. It is not a dream but a present task for future reality.

The updated development framework of Provincial Government of Bohol under the administration on Governor Arthur C. Yap and Vice Governor Rene L Relampagos, Environment Sector occupies a very special place. PGBh is redefining the environment management to integrate Disaster Risk Reduction and Management, as well as Climate Change Adaptation (DRRM-CCA).

The province is already implementing DRRM trainings across the Boholano communities down to the *purok* level. Strengthening of Local DRRMOs and BDRRMCs with numerous capacity building activities had been undertaken to improve community resiliency throughout the province. Among the major milestones are the following:

DISASTER RISK REDUCTION & MANAGEMENT/CLIMATE CHANGE ADAPTATION (DRRRM-CCA)

The highlights of the many DRRM-CCA initiatives are as follows:

- The active Provincial Disaster Risk Reduction Management Council (PDRRMC) has been tried and tested this pandemic crisis
- Upgrading and augmentation of equipment and facilities

- Establishment of TaRSIER 117 Sub-Stations in the different municipalities. The Tarsier 117 services are reaching even more communities now
- Throughout the province, LGU-based response groups and Local DRRMOs are being strengthened and capacitated
- PDRRMO also spearheaded and provided 6,952 emergency runs for all municipalities in the province for all six (6) TaRSIER 117 substations and the T-117 Headquarters in Tagbilaran City
- Strengthening Capacities of Institutions and Government/ Private Organizations partnership on DRRM
- Facilitated the donation drive/relief goods for Typhoon Ulysses victims in Bicol region (sent to OCD 7 for transport to Bicol)

Continuing implementation of HEAT-IT Bohol Agenda focusing on Health and Sanitation, Education and Skills Development, Agriculture and Food Security, Tourism and Livelihood, Information Technology, and Boholano Culture and Heritage Preservation.

EQUITABLE ECONOMIC GROWTH WITH ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY

Despite the restrictions of this trying times, economic growth initiatives continue, hand in hand, with our overriding concern for environmental sustainability. The following highlights the continuing initiatives of Bohol Environment and Management Office:

For 2020, the BEMO Coastal Resource Management Unit initiated activities to provide livelihood opportunities to coastal communities and help address issues on the low productivity and ensuring food security for the Boholano people through strengthening the management of Marine Protected Areas (MPAs), sustain collaboration and partnership on Coastal Law Enforcement and the establishment of Giant Clams Hatchery.

The "Massive Growing of Timber and Non-Timber Species in the Province of Bohol" is facilitated by the Forest and Water Resource Management Unit which continuously coordinates with the partners and institutions in promoting the program, assistance to tree planting activities, production of endemic species seedlings and provision of technical assistance to LGUs.

The Unit was able to produce 5,940 kilos of vermicompost or 118% increase from the 5,000 kilos target production. A total of 556,576 assorted planting materials were planted in various upland and mangrove areas in Bohol led by the Provincial Government of Bohol (PGBh) offices, national and local government agencies, civil society organizations like NGOs, POs, church organizations, business companies. Other volunteer groups participated the program.

The PWRM identified 307 waterless barangays or 27% of the total number of barangays in the province were identified in twenty-eight (28) municipalities.

A total of 151 barangays received the financial assistance from the Provincial Government of Bohol for the development or improvement of the waterworks system in the barangay. To date forty (40) LGUs already received the PhP 1,000,000 financial assistance for the development or improvement of the waterworks projects in their respective municipalities.

The Ecological Solid Waste Management (ESWM) Unit provides technical assistance to LGUs to respond to various complaints related to solid waste management and to attend other requests and demand driven-activities, including pollution control and prevention and liquid waste management.

The Unit coordinated for the passage of Plastic and Styrofoam Regulation Ordinance and the Ordinance on Sewage and Septage Management of the Province. To date, 60% of 48 LGUs have legislated Plastic Regulation Ordinances. The Unit has also facilitated the issuance of Memorandum

on the Alternative Disposal of Covid Related Waste, Monitoring of Illegal Septic Haulers/ Pumpers and other issuances and guidelines for the effective management of solid and liquid waste.

There are 32 LGUs with approved 10-Year Plan, 11 LGUs having approved 10-Year Plan with conditions, four (4) LGUs are still on the process of complying the recommendations of the review committee and the remaining one (1) LGU is still on the writing stage.

The **Provincial Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) Team** conducted monitoring and field evaluation to 48 LGUs on the Search for Best Practices of ESWM Implementation. During the monitoring, it was noted that there are also significant increases in the number of LGUs that are implementing Solid Waste Management Program in compliance to RA 9003 or the ESWM Act of 2000.

ESWM Unit conducted monitoring to the 10 Devolved Hospitals on their environmental and sanitation compliances, solid waste management including handling of infectious hospital and COVID1-19 related health care waste. Likewise, in coordination with the Bohol Tourism Office, Office of Honorable Board Member Jade Bautista, Provincial Health Office and DOT-Bohol the Unit participated in the inspection of tourism establishments in Anda, Dauis, Loboc, and Panglao to assess the environmental compliances under the new normal. In partnership with DENR-EMB, PHO Sewage and Septage Laboratory , they conducted water sampling to areas subject of complaints.

Meanwhile, the commissioning of the Capitol Sewage Treatment Plant (STP) Sequence Batch Reactor (SBR) was started in February of 2020 until to the last quarter. The commissioning were facilitated by the Wastewater Management Experts from Phil-Japan Worldwide Management Services.

The Bohol Island Aspiring Geopark together with the partners and stakeholders continue to extend and contribute collaborative efforts to achieve its main goal-to be the 1st UNESCO inscribed Global Geopark in the Philippines. Series of meetings from partnering agencies, experts and stakeholders, assessment, site inspection, and information education and communication campaigns had been convened for the realization of Bohol Island Aspiring Geopark.

The Land and Resource Management Unit (LRMU) had successfully sustained the productive partnerships with different sectors of society in different municipalities in the province by way of various presentations, dialogues, forums, and consultations with the civil society organizations, Local Government Units, Department of Environment and Natural Resources, Mines and Geo-Sciences Bureau, Environmental Management Bureau, Bohol Environmental Protection Task Force and Philippine National Police for enforcement. Furthermore, by means of coordination and collaborative initiatives, the Unit had effectively brought closer the services to its constituents. A total of eleven (11) Quarry and Sand and Gravel areas were investigated and resolved and twenty-eight (28) active permit areas monitored.

On December 3, 2020, Gov. Yap signed PO No. 2020-035 otherwise known as *"The Revised Bohol Mining Ordinance of 2020"* in compliance with the posting and publication requirements under Section 511 of Republic Act No. 7160 otherwise known as the Local Government Code of 1991.

Technical support services to internal and external stakeholders (Representation/Extension of technical assistance to Various Committees, Bodies, Councils, ODAs and other stakeholders)

The Province of Bohol is on the fifth year in the implementation the Philippine Rural Development Project (PRDP) funded by World Bank and implemented through the Department of Agriculture. Among the PRDP development objectives is to increase farmers' income in agri-fishery sector in program areas and to develop a more market-oriented and climate-resilient agriculture and fishery sector. It further strengthened the conservation of the coastal and marine resource base through biodiversity conservation and fisheries resources management as well as enhanced LGU institutional, technical, management and financial capabilities and environmental governance system. In the year

2019, the project has gained a remarkable accomplishment through the effort from the members of the **Provincial Project Management Implementing Unit (PPMIU)** for PRDP Bohol. Bohol was awarded as the best implementor province in the region, PSO Visayas Cluster and NPCO.

Five (5) of Farm-to-Market Roads were already implemented under PRDP, three of which were completed and formally turned over to the concerned LGU. Only the implementation of Dagnawan-Dagohoy FMR is ongoing with more than 70% accomplishment.

The I-REAP Component is composed of four (4) Regular Subprojects and twelve (12) Small Livelihood Projects with a total project cost of PhP 50,096,900.87 and PhP 11,920,855.00 respectively.

The Global Environment Facility (GEF) composed of Micro-Enterprise Projects (MEPs) and Marine Protected Areas (MPAs) has eight (8) PG beneficiaries which already received the second tranche fund amounting to PhP 806,440.00.

Technical Assistance/ Review/ Assessment of Comprehensive Development Plan (CDP) and Comprehensive Land Use Plan (CLUP)

The office had assisted and reviewed the CDP and CLUP documents of the municipalities of Buenavista, Loboc, Carmen, Dimiao, Baclayon, Inabanga, and endorsed the CLUPs of the municipalities of Buenavista, Loboc and Carmen to SP for approval.

Technical Support Services to INREMP implementation

Bohol is one of the beneficiaries of INREM project funded by the Asian Development Bank, implemented through DENR. The Wahig-Inabanga Watershed has been identified for the implementation of the project considering that is a major and critical watershed due to its environmental and economic significance, covering almost 62,000 hectares (15% of Bohol's total land area of 411,726 hectares) and is host to important forest/timberland, water resources, both surface and underground, agriculture, major eco-adventure tourism destinations and locations of some agroindustrial/commercial facilities in the province. The office had participated in the conduct of on-site monitoring, field material testing of the eleven (11) rural infrastructure projects, four (4) potable water system level II, benchmarking activities and turn-over ceremonies of 36 Livelihood Enhancement Support (LES) for batch 1 and 16 LES for batch 2 of the INREMP completed projects.

PARTNERSHIP AND COLLABORATION FOR EFFECTIVE ENVIRONMENTAL GOVERNANCE

FOR PENRO BOHOL

As mandated in Executive Order No. 192 dated June 10, 1987, the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) is the primary government agency responsible for the conservation, management, development and proper use of the country's environment and natural resources, including those in reservations, watershed areas and lands of the public domain, as well as the licensing and regulation of all natural resources utilization as may be provided by law in order to ensure equitable sharing of the benefits derived therefrom for the welfare of the present and future generation of Filipinos.

In spite of the threat and obstacles that this pandemic brings, DENR Bohol still achieved a satisfactory performance rate in terms of physical and financial component under the leadership of PENRO Charlie E. Fabre, CENRO Elpidio R. Palaca, Sr. (CENRO Talibon), and CENRO Ariel Rica (CENRO Tagbilaran City).

For 2020, DENR Bohol has a total allotment of Php 159,319,640.27 per approved FY 2020 General Appropriations Act for the use of its three (3) offices, namely: PENRO Bohol, CENRO Talibon and CENRO Tagbilaran City.

The consolidated accomplishment of the three offices in terms of GASS exceeded the targets in spite of the very few activities with accomplishment below 100%.

FOR ENVIRONMENT MANAGEMENT BUREAU (EMB)

For the year 2020, the Clearance and Permitting Division (CPD) has issued a total of 2,522 permits which is 188% above the annual target set at 1,338 permits issuance. Out of the permits issued, 1,381 (54.8%) were from the Toxic Chemicals and Hazardous Waste Permitting Section, followed by 833 (33%) from the Air and Water Permitting Section, and 308 (12.2%) from the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) Section.

For the Environmental Enforcement and Monitoring Division (EMED) have conducted a total of 5,630 monitoring and survey activities which is 40% above the target set at 4,030 firms monitoring and survey. Out of the monitoring activities, 1,232 (28.14%) firms monitoring came from Air Monitoring followed by Hazardous Waste Generator Monitoring at 1,433 (25.45%) firms and then Water Monitoring at 1,107 (19.66%) firms while other monitoring activities comprised of water body monitoring, air quality monitoring and LGU compliance monitoring constitute 33% of the annual target.

On the Financial aspect, the Office reached a 98% Budget Utilization Rate (BUR) as of December 29, 2020 from the obligated payment using the Maintenance and Other Operation Expenses (MOOE) and Capital Outlay (CO) funds. The BUR for the MOOE is at 98% while the utilization rate under the CO is at 99% as of December 29, 2020.

FOR CENRO TALIBON

The CENRO Talibon for CY 2020 successfully attained its planned targets and activities. The Office has once again proved and showcased its commitment in carrying out the Department's mission and vision.

For the CY 2020, CENRO Talibon has a total budget of Php 27,476,500 per approved FY 2020 General Appropriations Act. Maintenance and Other Operating Expenses (MOOE) almost compromised eighty-three percent (83%) of the allotment or Php 22,821,500. Said allocation is being utilized for the travelling allowances, supplies and materials, other services and mandatory expenses of the office purposely for the attainment of the targets per program, projects and activity. The remaining seventeen percent (17%) or Php 4,655,000 is allocated for Capital Outlay (CO) which has been used for the implementation of the National Greening Program.

The CENRO Talibon has accomplishment rating of 113% in CY 2020. This figure represents the overall rating for the five (5) units under the Office, namely: Conservation and Development Section (CDS); Regulatory and Permitting Section (RPS); Enforcement and Monitoring Section (EMS); Survey and Mapping Unit (SMU); and Planning and Support Unit (PSU).

FOR CENRO TAGBILARAN CITY

For CY 2020, CENRO Tagbilaran City has met its targets despite the restrictions of the pandemic with the supervision of CENRO Ariel N. Rica.

Some of the targets has been reduced, changed and removed in support to the government response to the pandemic. Despite of some restrictions and adjustments, CENRO Tagbilaran City had transferred to its new location at Upper De La Paz, Cortes, Bohol last August 1, 2020.

One of the targets that the office found it difficult to accomplish was the drafting and adoption of Forest Land Use Plan (FLUP) since the identified Local Government Unit focused to response the COVID-19. The Office initiated to hire three (3) technical writers as strategy for the FLUP.

Under Enforcement activity, forest protection and anti-illegal logging were intensified through conduct of mobile checkpoints, LAWIN patrol, and IEC to help regulate or lessen the illegal activities within the CENRO jurisdiction.

Conservation and Development Section (CDS) of CENRO Tagbilaran City extends extra effort in the overall management of the 10 protected areas. Strengthening of the PAMB's was maintained through the conduct of quarterly meetings. Another activity is the population and habitat assessment, and monitoring of tarsier conservation program in the municipalities of Balilihan, Loboc, and Sevilla, Bohol.

Coastal and Marine Ecosystem Management Program, also known as *Agos ng Buhay* or DENR Agos, aims to comprehensively manage, address, and effectively reduced the drivers and threats of degradation of the coastal and marine ecosystems in order to promote sustainability of ecosystem services, food security, and climate change resiliency for the benefits of the present and future generations. Activities include baseline assessment in Panglao Island Protected Seascape (PIPS), monitoring of coral reef and seagrass in Alburquerque-Loay-Loboc Protected Landscape and Seascape (ALLPLS), management effectiveness assessment (MEA) and maintenance and protection in ALLPLS and PIPS; knowledge, attitude and practice (KAP) survey in PIPS were among the activities conducted on the cited PA's.

With the extension of the Free Patent Law for Patent application, the Regulatory and Permitting Section had processed Agricultural Free Patent Application (FPA) with final action to 485 applications. For the Residential Free Patent application, a total of 810 applications were processed under the Regular fund. A total of 468 subdivided residential lots were surveyed with an equivalent area of 276,848 square meters.

As of CY 2020, CENRO Tagbilaran City has established plantations of more than 6,000 hectares for the Enhanced National Greening Program (e-NGP). For this year, this office has focused on maintenance and protection activities of the 90.0 hectares of rattan plantation in Omjon, Valencia, Bohol. Other activities were survey, mapping and planning for preparation of 2021 targets with a total of 500 has.

For financial aspects, the office had an allotment budget of Php 37,642,410.00 including Central Office Based Fund which was 100% obligated. Overall, all targets in CENRO Tagbilaran City for CY 2020 were successfully accomplished reaching more than 100% over the target.

BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF THE PROVINCE

Location

Bohol is an island province of the Philippines located in the Central Visayas Region (Region 7) consisting of Bohol Mainland and 75 minor surrounding islands. Its capital is Tagbilaran City. Bohol is the tenth largest island of the Philippines, with a land area of 4,117.26 square kilometers (1,589.68 sq mi) and a coastline of about 261 kilometers (162 miles) long. To the west of Bohol is Cebu Province, to the northeast is the island province of Leyte and to the south, across the Bohol Sea is Mindanao.

Population

The 2015 Census on Population showed that Bohol's population reached to 1.313 Million. This posted a 0.87% average annual increase from the 2010 population count. This annual growth rate is higher than the Central Visayas' growth rate of negative 2.25%. The province's population growth, however, is lower than that of the national annual growth rate of 1.70%. Taking into account this growth, estimated population of the province in 2018 is at 1.348 Million, 1.371 Million in 2020 and 1.432 Million in 2025.




It can be noted that while the population of Bohol has steadily increased, the rate of increase, however, declined from average 1.85% annual increase in 1990-2000 to 0.97% in 2000-2010 and further to 0.87% in 2010-2015.

Owing to the locality's progress in tourism, the municipality of Panglao has the highest growth rate in the Province marking an average annual increase of 3.08%. Other localities with high growth rates include Dauis, Jetafe, Sagbayan, Cortes, Trinidad, Baclayon, Corella, Talibon, and Tagbilaran City. Meanwhile, there are municipalities that posted negative growth rates. These include Dimiao, San Isidro, Mabini, Anda, Loboc, Valencia, Danao, Antequera and Catigbian.

Bohol's population density is 315 persons per sq. km in 2015, higher that the 305 persons per sq. km in 2010. In 1990, the province's population density was only 230 persons per sq. km. Most of the densely populated areas in the province are located along coastal areas, concentrated along the north to northeastern part of Bohol. Among the top 10 densely populated areas in the province include Tagbilaran City (3432/km2), Dauis (1065/km2), Tubigon, Panglao, Baclayon, Bien Unido, Loay, Pilar, Mabini and Calape. On the other hand, the least densely populated areas include Balilihan (119/km2), Bilar, Batuan, Sevilla, Antequera, Danao, Dimiao, Carmen, Loboc and Duero.

Poverty




As of the latest Poverty Incidence Report of the Philippine Statistics Authority (PSA) conducted in 2018, Bohol's overall poverty incidence among families registered at 15.2 percent, lower by 10 percentage points compared to the year 2015 or equivalent to about 47 thousand families. This is a substantial reduction compared to 2015 when Bohol's number of poor families reached about 70 thousand. Although Bohol's poverty incidence greatly decreased through the years, the proportion of poor Boholanos whose per capita income is insufficient to meet their basic food needs or subsistence level, is still estimated at 2 percent or about 9 thousand Boholano families. Most of these poor families are found in the 2nd Congressional District of Bohol as shown in the Map above. In 2020, a number of Bohol's children below 6 years old were found to be malnourished with 92 of them severely underweight while 372 were found to be severely stunted per the 2020 OPT Report.

Physical Resources

Bohol is blessed with an abundant biodiversity and natural resources that significantly influence its future development for agriculture, industry, tourism, settlements, culture and infrastructure. It has high diversity of flora and fauna found in the different ecosystems of the island such as its forests, reefs, farmlands, in zones along creeks and rivers, caves and marine areas.

Bohol has a total land area of 411,726 hectares with 654 kilometers of coastline and 6,245 square kilometers of municipal waters covering its major islands and islets. The province is within four major resource boundaries, i.e., upland/forestry, lowland/ agriculture, coastal/marine and water boundaries.


Bohol's water supply system for domestic, agricultural and industrial uses is mainly dependent on 2,224 springs, 59 rivers and 200 creeks.



There are 22 rivers basins/watersheds that are valuable sources of water for drinking and irrigation. Surface water from rivers and streams in these basins are impounded and distributed for irrigation, electric generation, industrial use as well as for domestic use.

Surface water in Bohol feeds its watersheds. There are 3 major watersheds in the province that have been declared as protected areas under the NIPAS. The largest reserve is the Wahig-Inabanga Watershed covering 16 municipalities with an aggregated area of 14,000 hectares. The second, and first to be proclaimed as a watershed forest reserve in Bohol, is the Loboc Watershed with an area of 10,450 hectares, part of which is inside the Rajah Sikatuna Protected Landscape. The third is the Duero Watershed (that covers an area of 3,620 hectares. The map below shows the location of these watersheds.

Based on the reports of the Mines and Geo-Sciences Bureau of the DENR, Bohol has large deposits of metals and minerals such as limestones, manganese, silica, dolomite, gold, deorite, chromite, rock phosphate, guano (organic fertilizers) and pebbles.



75% of Bohol's land are classified as alienable and disposable (A & D) land. The total area devoted to agricultural use is 273,950 hectares or 45 percent of the total land area of the province. Of the total agricultural area, 50 percent or 156,944 hectares is utilized for the planting of major crops such as rice, corn, coconut and rootcrops.


Bohol's public forestland or timberland occupies an area of about 101,271 hectares or roughly 25 % of its total land area. Almost 15% or 75,766 hectares of the province's land area is under protection through NIPAS System and are classified as environmentally constrained and critical areas.

Almost one-half of the province total land area is covered by grassland / shrub land, while one-third of its total area is utilized for agricultural activities. The province has a larger coverage of woodland (10.69%) compared to Cebu and some other provinces in the region. Wetland constitutes 4.92%, which includes mangrove, nipa, beach sands and fishponds while built-up areas comprise 10.22%.

The Province has the biggest mangrove forest in Southeast Asia located in Banacon, Getafe. There are about 1,200 species of crabs and shrimps with over 6,000 mollusks species found in 15,000 hectares of Baclayon, Dauis and Panglao (Bohol Marine Triangle). Bohol has one of the the six (6) World-renown Double Barrier Reefs - the Danajon Double Barrier Reef, covering 13 municipalities. The province has a total of 1,920 hectares of coral reefs and its coastal ecosystem provides the major source of animal protein for the populace.

Rice Narrative

In 2020, amidst the COVID-19 pandemic, the Provincial Government focused its resources through the Office of the Provincial Agriculturist in the production of the number one staple food which is rice. To sustain "Bohol as the Rice Bowl "in Region VII, strategies were put in place like continuous improvement of rice varieties, adoption of farmers to high quality seeds, best culture management practices, enhanced farm mechanization and subsidized seeds and fertilizers inputs.






Bohol has a total physical area of 47,376.51 hectares for rice cultivation. However, only 72.20%, roughly 34,204.00 has. is planted with rice. Inbred rice can be planted in both irrigated and non-irrigated fields. In Bohol, inbred rice is planted in around 21,939.00 has. while hybrid rice in 12,265,00 has. of irrigated fields. Hybrid rice is allocated with a bigger budget with the hope that it will produce more to sustain the food security in the province and in the whole of Region VII.

The budget for rice production in 2020 is the biggest so far for the Provincial Government of Bohol. It was almost four times compared to the previous year. Together with the increased in budget allocation is the expectation that rice production will likewise increase. The target production of 160 bags per hectare for hybrid rice in irrigated fields and 120 bags per hectare for inbred rice in non-irrigated fields became the mantra for most of the field rice technicians of the Office of the Provincial Agriculturist (OPA).


Seed inputs got the biggest allocation in the 2020 budget of the OPA. This is five times compared to that of the previous year. Out of the P17,680,000.00 budget, hybrid seeds have the biggest share. Year 2020 was the first time the office allocated budget for the procurement and distribution of hybrid seeds. Aside from the allocation of the PGBh, funds for rice seeds were also provided by the Department of Agriculture for the hybridization program, in consideration of Bohol being the Rice Bowl in the whole of region VII.





Records showed that in 2020, a 6,000 ha. area planted with rice yielded 23,400,000 kilograms of milled rice, which is equivalent to a 56-day rice buffer for the entire Boholano population. As a comparison, in 2019, only 3,662,000 kilograms of milled rice was produced from a cultivation area of 2,180 ha., which was only good for 8 days consumption for the entire Boholano population.

In peso equivalent, the 23.4T kgs milled rice produced last 2020 has a money worth of P1,053,000,000.00. This is a marked improvement from the 2019's P164,808,000.00 or the 2018's P177,120,000.00 financial equivalent.






A. Land Transport


A.1 Roads and Bridges:

As of end 2020, the total road length in Bohol is 6,146.42 kms. of which 12% is classified as national road, 14% provincial roads, 1% city road, 5% municipal roads and 68% barangay roads. Roads in the province are either paved with asphalt or concrete, or unpaved (gravel and earth). It classified according to type of pavement: 3% asphalt, 31% concrete, 49% gravel and 17% earth. Earth roads are those that have been shaped, but have not received engineering interventions like re-gravelling. The Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH) that builds and maintains national highways has the longest asphalt- and concrete-paved roads. The barangays have the longest gravel and earth roads.





Bohol has a total bridge length of 8,550.05 linear meters. Of this, the national government maintains 59%, the Provincial Government takes charge of 20% at 80 bridges with a total length of 1,685 linear meter, while the barangay and municipal bridges account for 21%. Combined, the national bridges have the longest length in concrete and steel-type bridges while barangay bridges have the longest length in timber and bailey-type bridges.




A.1.a Provincial Roads and Bridges.

The provincial roads are distributed to the three Project Management Divisions (PMDs) of the Provincial Engineering Office (PEO), with the grouping just slightly different from that of the congressional districts.

At PEO, the roads linking Tubigon and San Isidro town belong to the 1st District, while roads linking Ubay and Mabini, and Mahayag in San Miguel and Katipunan in Alicia belong to the 2nd District. San Isidro is under the jurisdiction of the 2nd Congressional District while Alicia and Mabini belong to the 3rd Congressional District.

Of the total 835.55 kms., PMD 1 has 49 roads totaling 259.029 kms; PMD 2 has 38, totaling 221.440 kms; and, PMD 3 has 70, totaling 354.081



kms. Gravel roads used to hog the provincial roads at 62%, but the flurry of concrete-paving projects with the entry of the Conditional Matching Grant to Provinces (CMGP), Roads Leveraging Linkages to Industry and Trade (ROLL-IT) of DTI and DPWH, as well as the latter's convergence with the Department of Tourism for provincial roads leading to established tourism destinations, has reduced this to 46.14% as of this writing. Most of these still gravel road sections are in PMDs 3 and 2.



> A.3. Vehicle Registration

The province experienced a decrease in the number of vehicle registration by 14% from CY 2019 to CY 2020, as recorded in the three (3) Land Transportation Offices (LTO) in Bohol due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Motorcycles dominated the Bohol road scene at 61.24%, followed by cars/vans/UVs at 27%.



The preference for motorcycles consistently stayed on top because of its affordability and lower maintenance cost compared to four-wheeled vehicles. Besides, motorcycle payment schemes are now easy to the pocket compared to conditions 10 years ago. Some dealers offer low down payments; some offer straight amortization even on a daily basis – with no down payment to boot.

B. Seaport:

The province has one (1) base port located in the Port of Tagbilaran; six (6) terminal ports located in Tubigon, Talibon, Ubay, Jagna, Loon and Getafe; five (5) outports strategically located in Clarin, Tapal, Alburquerque, Loay and Bien Unido and one (1) privately-operated port (by PMSC) in Garcia Hernandez.


The total number of ship calls have decreased from 2019 to 2020 by 61%.



The total number of passengers' traffic in the base port, terminal ports, outports and private ports also decreased by 80% in 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

C. Airport


Bohol has two airports, the Bohol-Panglao International Airport (BPIA) and the Ubay Feeder Airport. Only the BPIA handles commercial flights and passenger traffic with domestic direct flights to and from Manila and some direct international flights through Hongkong and South Korea, making the province easily accessible to a large number of tourists and investors.



Data from the Bohol-Panglao International Airport (BPIA) showed a decreased in the number of incoming and outgoing flights in 2020 (for flights thru Air Asia, Cebu Pacific, PAL, Air Swift, Air Juan, General Aviation and Military for domestic flights and international flights thru Jeju Air and chartered flights of Pan Pacific and Royal Air).

Power and Energy

Power supply in Bohol is provided by power plants located in Leyte and Cebu, and distributed by the three (3) existing DUIs such as Bohol Electric Cooperative I (BOHECO-I) (usage: 50%), Bohol Light Company, Inc. (BLCI) and BOHECO-II (usage: both 100%). The province has indigenous Hydro Power resources, as evidenced by the existing 7.5 MW hydro power plant (about 11% of current total demand of the island). The Visayas Wholesale Electric Spot Market (WESM) supplies up to 29% of energy mix for BOHECO-I. Majority of the power source to Bohol thru the Leyte-Bohol Power Interconnection is by submarine cables. All municipalities in the province are already provided with electricity. 100% of all barangays in the province are also energized.



On the transmission system, Bohol is quite vulnerable owing to a single Bohol transmission interconnection with Leyte. There is also the problem of line congestion because the National Grid Corporation (NGCP) implements Manual Load Dropping (MLD).



The existing water supplies available in the province have a Level III (individual house connections) system which is being operated by the LGUs. Most of the rural areas like barangays outside the Poblacion are being served by Level I (point source facility) and Level II system (communal faucet system).

Groundwater is the main source of water for the Province, which are then distributed by municipal waterworks and private entities.

Status of Irrigation. Bohol province has a total land area of about 411,730 hectares. It has a potential irrigable area of 44,076.00 hectares. In CY 2020, the status of irrigation development is 60.09%. This includes the three (3) national irrigation systems namely, Bohol Irrigation System-Stage 1 (Malinao Dam), Capayas Irrigation System and Bohol Irrigation System—Stage 2

(Bayongan Dam), and communal irrigation systems including constructed/assisted by the government

and privately-owned scattered in the different municipalities. Actually, there is still much to be desired in order to fully meet the need of the irrigation sector in the province and, ultimately, to be able to achieve success as the food basket in the Central Visayas region.

Communication

Telephone Services. The province of Bohol is wired with the rest of the world through the state-of-the-art telephone facilities that provide domestic and international linkages through three (3) service providers, namely PLDT/SMART, CRUZTELCO and Globelines where the public calling stations are scattered throughout the province. CRUZTELCO concentrates their services in Tagbilaran City, Jagna, Calape and Tubigon. PLDT and CRUZTELCO also provide payphones capable of international direct dialing. The Digital Telephone Exchange funded of the DOTC operates in the municipality of Tubigon, Talibon and Ubay.

Mobile Phones. Smart, Sun Cellular and Globe Communications Incorporated have operated their cellular networks, including cell sites, throughout Bohol. With their current mobile phone equipment, the consumers can already avail of an efficient and convenient communication facilities. There are already a total of 174 units of cell sites in Bohol, broken down into 74 by Globelines, 71 by Smart and 29 by Suns Cellular.

Internet Access. With the presence of facsimile machines and the internet, the patronage of telegram services has obviously decreased. There are four hundred nine (409) internet cafés operating in the province. However, internet connectivity is still a problem, particularly in the rural areas, especially in the COVID-19 pandemic period when distant learning and teleconferencing had become the norm for most of the students and workers, respectively.

Radio Services. Radio using transceivers is still a widely used mode of communication in the province. It provides back-up system, to telephone service. The Bohol Law Enforcement Communications Systems (BLECS) plays a consistent role in assisting the communications need of either the public and private individual. All local, provincial and national government offices have operational radios. The PNP/Military and some civilian groups utilized radio communications especially during emergencies like insurgency incidents, crime prevention, maintenance of peace and order in the community and occurrences of natural calamities such as earthquake, typhoon, fire and flood.

Broadcast and Cable TV. There are four (4) broadcast media stations in Bohol, namely: DYRD, DYTR, DYZD in Ubay and DYJP in Jagna. Two (2) FM stations (DYTR and DYRD) are likewise operating that provide information and entertainment. The coverage of station DYRD is limited to Clarin and Jagna. DYTR has a wider coverage area equivalent to 80% provincewide. DYRD has a 5,000 watts capacity while DYTR has 10,000 watts capacity. There is one relaying station based in Ubay (station DYZD) and one local station (DYJP) in Jagna, Bohol.

In the year 2020, Bohol has eleven (11) cable TV stations. The Bohol Community Cable Television (BCCTV) in Tagbilaran City, Mantle Cable Station in Talibon, Alcyber Cable System in Loay, Real Speed Cable TV Inc. in Calape, Southseas Vision in Tubigon, San Miguel Cable System in Jagna, Duero and Garcia Hernandez, Niña Cable TV System in Maribojoc, Zafra Cable in Panglao, Sto. Niño Cable TV System in Valencia and Dimiao, CCTN Cable System in Inabanga and DTV in Ubay.

Messengerial/Cargo Services. Messengerial and cargo services is provided by such companies like LBC, 2GO, Air 21, Fast Cargo, Pambato Cargo Forwrders, AP Cargo, LIBCAP Super Express, JRS and DHL. Mainly based in Tagbilaran City, branches are regularly established in major urban centers throughout the province.

Income Classification

The Province of Bohol is a First-Class Province in terms of income classification. Its municipalities, however, have varied income class depending on income levels each LGU has generated and raised.

Of the 48 city/ municipalities, 50% was classified as 4th Class, while 25% (12 LGUs) classified as 5th class. There are only three (3) municipalities that have reached the income levels for 1st class, which include Talibon, Tubigon and Ubay. Two (2) Municipalities – Carmen and Loon were classified as 3nd Class. Seven (7) LGUs, including Tagbilaran City, were classified as 3rd Class.

Raising revenues as well as reducing the dependency to the Internal Revenue Allotment (IRA) has been a common goal of LGUs in order to have sufficient level of financial resources to fund priority development programs and support the operations of local governments.




Natural Hazards

The Province of Bohol is prone to several hazards. Its inhabitants are vulnerable and at risks for natural calamities such as typhoons, earthquakes, flooding, tsunami, storm surges, wind wave, landslides, liquefaction and drought.

Based on the Hazard Susceptibility Study conducted in Bohol, eight (8) of the 48 towns/city are vulnerable to all types of hazards (Cortes, Duero, Guindulman, Inabanga, Jagna, Loay, Maribojoc, and Valencia) while the rest of the municipalities are prone to 3 to 7 hazards.

After the Great Bohol Earthquake and strong typhoons in in 2013, which caused the lives of Boholanos and destroyed Billion's worth of properties, the public and government have strengthened their awareness and readiness for better disaster risk reduction management at the local level. Capacities are continually being improved not just for emergency responders and the government but also down to the household and purok level to ensure that the risk for people are reduced and/or prevented.





STATE OF ADMINISTRATIVE GOVERNANCE

The pursuit towards reforms in governance has been one of the development priorities of the Provincial Government of Bohol (PGBh). Strategies are sustained by the bureaucracy for better effectiveness, efficiency, responsiveness and accountability in the delivery and management of public services and facilities. Offices continue to implement and improve existing systems and processes to achieve set targets.

Guided by the major strategies as envisioned in the 3-pillar strategic direction, the PGBh has strengthened its **human resource management** and development interventions with the institutionalization of the program on meritocracy and excellence for human resources. Through the Provincial Human Resource Management and Development Office (PHRMDO), efforts are undertaken for the competency-based recruitment, which basically sets the competencies on top of the basic requirements for available positions. This will set a more competitive and strategic process of selecting candidates to perform mandated functions of the organization. Correspondingly, the Competency-based Learning and Development is spearheaded by the PHRMDO to ensure that personnel are kept abreast with new and applicable skills to perform better their responsibilities and effectively address the multi-faceted needs of constituents.

Performance of personnel are managed and tracked with the full implementation of the Strategic Performance Management System (SPMS). Such system allows to set and measure the direct link and contribution of all individual personnel to the attainment of goals of the section and division they belong, to the office and eventually to the entire organization of the Provincial Government. To recognize the exemplary performance and dedication of personnel, the rewards and recognition initiative has been continued. Such award, in some way, provides the needed boost to encourage better performance among personnel and at the same time recognize their hard work exerted for public service.

The development of the Province of Bohol emanates from formulated plans and priorities. The Provincial Development and Physical Framework Plan (PDPFPF) of Bohol has laid the general direction of the province until 2028. Taking into account that the PDPFP has been crafted through **participatory planning processes**, its identified strategies, programs and projects in the local development investment plan (LDIP) serve as guide for the annual planning and budgeting of not just the Provincial Government, but also other local governments, national government agencies, and even the private sector, civil society organizations and other local and international



development partners. Planning exercises of local governments in the province has been supported to ensure that plans are consistent with and supportive to the overall provincial development direction. The active operation of the Provincial Development Council (PDC) allows more cohesive and participatory decision-making with regard to project fund-sourcing and endorsement. LGUs are also encouraged to propose programs and projects for funding assistance from various development agencies.

During the year, linkage of development plans of local and national government has been strengthened following the mechanisms laid under Memorandum Circular No. 2017-84 of the Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG). Such initiative facilitated the harmonization


of local development plans with the national development strategies and priorities and at the same time strengthen planning and budgeting linkages within the different levels of government.


Following on the successes brought by the 2018-2022 LRNDP, the Provincial Government of Bohol (PGBh), with supervision by the Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG), upgraded the road plans to attune it more to the provincial development directions of pag-atiman sa mga kabus ug makalolooy, pagpalambo sa industriyang turismo and pagpukaw sa kultura. The plan provides technical, social, economic, environmental comprehensive direction for the development of the road network in the province and supports the Provincial Development and Physical Framework Plan and the overall development framework of the province. The LRNDP is the plan of the province that will guide it in the development and management of the local road network within its jurisdiction).


Another important accessibility plan prepared by the Provincial Government is the Bohol Public Transport Route Plan (BPTRP), a consolidation of all Local Public Transport Route plans submitted by the all the Local Government Units (LGUs).

Together with the Local Finance Committee, the PGBh sustained the updating and implementation of the Sangguniang Panlalawigan-approved Public Financial Management Improvement Plan (PFM-IP)

with the PFM Assessment Report (PFMAR) used as basis to track and monitor progress and effects of implementation. Likewise, the implementation of the improvement plan and accuracy of the PFMAR were validated by a team from the Department of Budget and Management (DBM) Regional Office.











As one of the priority areas on **public financial management**, revenue-generation activities have been pursued by the PGBh in an effort to raise more funds from local sources to support the implementation of development programs. The 2020 collection data, both Tax and Non-Tax revenues, showed a 16.55% increase from the 2019 revenue efforts. In the 5-year data, the Province of Bohol had a steady increase in its income with the funds coming from the Internal Revenue Allotment (IRA) increasing an

average of 8.67% annually. It should be noted that the IRA share of the total PGBh income had increased from the 86.3% of 2016 to 87.8% in 2020. However, the 2020 IRA share is an improvement from that of the 2019 data

The Provincial Economic Enterprise Management Office (PEEMO) was further institutionalized in 2018 through Provincial Ordinance No. 2018-001 with the creation of definite staffing pattern that include the personnel for the Bohol Bio-diversity Complex in Bilar, Bohol and the Café Caloy in Tagbilaran City. Both revenue-generating establishments, they have been a good initiative of the Provincial Government of Bohol (PGBh) to increase revenues from local sources. Café Caloy is an initiative of PGBh to manage its own revenue-generating restaurant/function hall, which also support the development of its eco-cultural and historical tourism, because of its location in the grounds of the Pres. Carlos P. Garcia ancestral house. The other economic enterprise,



Bohol Biodiversity Center in Bilar, is gaining popularity among the environmental conservation sector and offers ecological management tour and camping and glamping sites.

Necessary improvement of systems and processes were also undertaken during the year for a more effective management and reporting of financial transaction. Through the Provincial Accountant's Office, the Philippine Public Sector Accounting Standards which conforms to international Standards is now fully implemented. The said office also launched the Document Archival Information System (DAISy), and has worked with other offices for the development and documentation of the Provincial Government of Bohol – Unified System.

For the Calendar Year 2020, Provincial Internal Audit Office (PIAO) PIAO has completed **seven (7) Regular Audit Engagements**. These were audit engagements with the Bohol Provincial Library and Information Center (BPLIC); Bohol Tourism Office (BTO); Provincial Administrator's Office (PAdmO); Governor's Office (GO); Bohol Law Enforcement Communication System (BLECS); Provincial Security Force (PSF); and the Provincial Youth and Sports Development Office (PYSDO).





Review and appraisal on the systems and processes, operations practices, records, reports, and performance standards of specific prioritized audit areas were also given attention by PIAO through the conduct of Operations Audit. PIAO values the importance of assessing the effectiveness, efficiency, ethicality and economy of government operations as it is essential to the delivery of better public services, accountability, and better governance. These are the focus of the operations audit specifically performed

by PIAO which started during the third quarter of 2020. PIAO has already completed **three (3) Operations Audits.** These audits included the Operations of the Cold Storage Facility (Office of the Provincial Agriculturist); Audit of the Retention and Distribution of PHIC Professional Fees (10 Devolved Hospitals); and the Operations Audit on the Compliance to the Guidelines on the Generation of Employee's Daily Time Records (All Departments and attached Offices of the PGBh).

Aside from the regular audit engagements, PIAO also conducted and completed a **Special Audit Engagement** on the Vehicle Management of the Governor's Office. In order to measure compliance of previously audited offices, **four (4) Follow-up Audit Engagements** were also completed. These were intended to measure the degree of compliance of the Auditees in response to the recommendations given by PIAO. The follow-



up audit engagements were with the Chocolate Hills Complex; Provincial General Services Office (PGSO); Café Caloy Catering Services; and the Bohol Information and Communication Technology Office (BICTO).




The Local Finance Committee (LFC) actively operates to formulate and recommend fiscal policies to the local chief executive as well as the Sangguniang Panlalawigan. The committee has assessed fiscal performance with

the use of the PFM Assessment Tool, which served as basis for the formulation of the PFM

Improvement Plan. With the existing electronic-based financial management information system, the generation of financial reports is facilitated to aid decision-making.

For resource allocation, the 2020 Provincial Budget has been operated through the Appropriation Ordinance enacted by the Sangguniang Panlalawigan. The Annual Budget provided allocation for priority programs and projects consistent and supportive to the overall development framework of the PGBh. The budget is also based on the financial requirements of the Annual Investment Program for 2020 and the Supplemental Investment Programs crafted within the year. Based on the DBM guidelines, the budget conformed with the necessary statutory and contractual requirements. The Annual Budget went through a series of extensive and deliberative review processes (executive review) conducted by Governor with the members of LFC. The Sangguniang Panlalawigan conducted the legislative budget hearings before the approval of the Appropriation Ordinance.



The budget execution is managed by the Provincial Budget Management Office (PBMO) through the EBudget System. Such system has facilitated the processing of various financial claims of the PGBh covered by appropriations. As part of the participatory process of budgeting, the PBMO conducted consultative for afor all offices to ensure that guidelines in budget utilization are followed. Civil Society



Organizations (CSOs) are also invited in the process for transparency as well as to generate recommendations in prioritizing government spending.

Innovations on **bringing direct services of government closer to the people** have been sustained by the PGBh. The conduct of the HEART caravan, despite the COVID-19 pandemic, has been continued in various locations of the province, benefiting thousands of Boholano constituents.

Another program pursued by the new Yap Provincial Administration is the Bisita sa Kapitolyo that brought every citizen concern through their local barangay councils with the new provincial dispensation.

Interconnectivity and partnership have been strengthened with the continuing convergence between the PGBh and national government agencies, LGUs, CSOs, private sector, development organizations. The PGBh-CSO partnership covenant



has allowed for the collaborative implementation of various programs and projects, including the activities during the CSO Week Celebration and the inter-faith dialogue on anti-terrorism campaign. PGBh was able to successfully accredit 34 CSOs and include them in the 4 mandated local special bodies (LSBs)

The PGBh, being known to be a good partner in delivering development programs and projects, has continued to implement convergence programs, including programs funded by Official Development Assistance (ODA) institutions. Among these programs include the World Bank and Department of Agriculture – Funded Philippine Rural Development Project (PRDP), Asian Development Bank – DENR, Integrated Natural Resources and Environmental Management Project (INREMP), Korea Program on International Agriculture (KOPIA), USAID-funded COMPETE Projects: Energy Development Project and the Bohol Water and Sanitation Program, and the JICA – National Government funded New Bohol Panglao International Airport, and the JICA - Nagoya University Bohorizon Project.

Participatory and shared leadership through various local special bodies and councils are also sustained. These councils have been operating to discuss policies, develop directions, and more importantly undertake the priority actions of member-agencies based on mandates and functions. Major councils that actively meet include the Provincial Development Council, Provincial Peace and Order Council, Provincial Disaster Risk Reduction Management Council, Provincial School Board, Provincial Cooperative Development Council, Provincial Tourism Council and Coastal Law Enforcement Council.



Special bodies are also organized for the better management of sector priorities such as the Abatan River Development Management Council, Tripartite Industrial Peace Council (TIPC), the Bohol Competitiveness Council, and the Provincial Price Monitoring Council.

Meanwhile, the re-organized Panglao Dauis and Tagbilaran City Executive Council (PaDTEC) has been regularly conducted to ensure for the better management of the resources and development of the Municipalities of Dauis, Panglao and the City of Tagbilaran. Areas of cooperation include



environmental management, culture and arts, tourism, urban management, waste management, water and sanitation, climate and disaster resiliency, Investment promotions, and economic connectivity and access.


Further, the Bohol Energy Development Advisory Group (BEDAG) continues to provide the

appropriate avenue for the discussion of power related concerns. The BEDAG has been very active in the resolution of power problem in the Province of Bohol during the Leyte earthquake in 2017 as well as facilitating for the initiatives that will build power resiliency in the province.

It cannot be denied that the development of Bohol is a product of collaboration with all stakeholder in the province, including direct cooperation with the League of Municipalities of the Philippines (LMP), Vice-Mayors' League of the Philippines, Philippine Councilors League, Liga ng mga Barangays-Bohol Chapter and the 3 Bohol Congressmen. It is important that through this collaboration, the common goal of Bohol can collectively pursue, with LGU and National government priorities aligned.



Pursuing local economic development through investment promotions and business-friendly environment has been sustained with clear partnership and complementation of efforts with the private sector. Among the initiatives include the operation of the Bohol Business One Stop Shop and the Negosyo Center, which is spearheaded by the Bohol Investment Promotion Center. In 2017, Bohol has been given the distinction to be the Most Business Friendly Province of the Country, owing to its policies and facilitation to promote business and investment.



Guided by its vision, mission and goals, the Province pursues prosperity through trade, investment, tourism promotion, MSME development, public-private partnership, infrastructure development, QMS, Innovation and human resource development, and LGU collaboration.

The Province of Bohol has been observed to be one of the Provincial LGUs where governance practices are set as benchmarks. The province is considered a learning destination wherein other LGUs can learn and share best practices and initiatives on Disaster Risk Reduction Management and Emergency Response, Good Governance Systems and Processes, Internal Audit, Public Financial Management and Tourism Governance. Through this, the PGBh has established collaboration with other LGUs and organizations where common priorities are pursued through technical exchanges and technical sharing.

Local Legislation

In the area of local legislation, the Sangguniang Panlalawigan of Bohol had held **52 Legislative Sessions** which were all Paperless; **29** Legislative Committees had also been convened, **137** Committee meetings, **6 days** Marathon Budget Hearings, **4** Investigations **and 4** Public Hearings.

COVID-19 PANDEMIC

Notwithstanding the global COVID-19 pandemic that occurred in 2020, social services continued to be provided by the government to its populace, albeit more focused on measures for the prevention, reduction, transmission and elimination of the COVID-19 disease. In Bohol, the Provincial Government together with other stakeholders, gathered together to strategize in its fight in the containment and elimination of the disease.

Combating COVID-19 Pandemic

Health Response

In 2020, to better address the pandemic, the Provincial Government of Bohol (PGBh), together with the national government thru the Department of Health (DOH), established two molecular laboratories located at the Gov. Celestino Gallares Memorial Hospital and a containerized molecular laboratory at the Capitol Annex. With this, RT-PCR test results can be given within 24 hours or less unlike before when such results were available a week or more after being sent to Cebu City. Isolation centers/areas were established with the Gallares Hospital being identified as the COVID-19 hospital center in Bohol. The Bohol Inter-agency Task Force (BIATF), the provincial counterpart of the national IATF, was organized involving all stakeholders in Bohol, both public and private, including both major medical associations in the province. Health protocols were instituted and strictly enforced provincewide.

Other initiatives were instituted to address the COVID-19 pandemic in Bohol in 2020:

- 1. Construction of isolation wings in all hospitals, providing separate Emergency Room (ER) for patients with respiratory infection, strict implementation of health protocols and providing a separate waiting area for OPD patients
- 2. Conversion of some hospital rooms to isolation rooms for COVID 19 patients
- 3. Construction of triage area in all hospitals, swabbing booth, foot bath. lavatory sink for handwashing at the hospital entrance
- 4. Provision of alcohol and sanitizers and footbath for customers/clients' use and strict wearing of face mask/face shield and observance of physical distancing in all public areas in Bohol
- 5. Hiring of additional contact tracers for all LGUs with funding from both local and national governments thru DILG
- 6. Conversion of rooms to isolation rooms for COVID 19 patients
- 7. Establishment of Quarantine/ Isolation Facilities including staffing complement
 - Identifying quarantine facilities in each LGU
 - 6 Quarantine facilities identified by PGBh and 1 isolation facility designated at Capitol Annex
- 8. Establishment of swabbing area for suspected COVID patients
- 9. Provision of medical equipment (i.e., ventilators, respirators, etc.), PPEs and other medical supplies and equipment
 - Procurement of medical materials and supplies such as PPEs, disinfectants, swabbing booth, boots, RT-PCR reagents/other materials
- 10. Issuance and strict implementation of mandatory policies and protocols imposed by the Department of Health, BIATF, LGUs and hospitals for COVID 19 prevention and the spread of the disease
 - COVID -19 Handbook on COVID-19 Protocols and Guidelines



We Survive as One Bohol" Program

Anticipating the massive negative impact of the pandemic on the economic and social way of life of the Boholano constituents and residents, the Provincial Government of Bohol (PGBh) conceptualized a response-initiative and dubbed it the "We Survive as One Bohol Program", a socio-economic impact initiative undertaken to stifle the adverse outcome of COVID-19. The program was conceptualized by Governor Arthur C. Yap to minimize the recessionary effects that would surely hit the province and targets the sectors that are directly and indirectly affected by the imposed ECQ on the residents in the entire province. Its Components include Relief Assistance Package (Food Assistance, Food Vouchers from Trash Program, Bohol Milk Feeding Program, Offshore Boholanos Cash Assistance, Returning Boholanos Program) Economic Stimulus Package (Bohol Guarantee Surety Program, Agriculture Retail and Trade (ART), Ari Ra Ta (ART) Merkado (Online Market), Agricultural Rural Transformation (ART):ART in Support to Vegetable and Water Enhancement Project, "Kita sa Kakugi" Cash-for-Work for the Rehabilitation & Restoration of Damaged Communal Irrigation System, ART Tabo sa Bohol (Mobile Market), Advance Rice Technology (ART 160/ ART 120), Utan ug Isda Para sa Tanan (ART Veg. and Fish Farming), Fish Trading Project, Livestock and Poultry Production Enhancement Project thru "Passing on the Gift", ART thru Integrated Community Dairy Farming, ART thru Enhanced Productivity and Profitability of Swine Production, Assistance to Reinvigorate the Tourism (ART) Value Chain) Infrastructure Program (Assistance for Rural Transformation (ART) for Barangay Infrastructure Projects, Accessible, Reliable and Timely (ART) Water for All Water Development Program)


Highlights on the 2020 Financial Performance of the Provincial Government

Efforts of the Provincial Government to improve public financial management is an unwavering commitment. Among the most crucial of this commitment is to strengthen the ability of the bureaucracy to raise the needed resources particularly those coming from locally-generated revenues. Noting on the high dependency on the Internal Revenue Allotment (IRA), the Provincial Government has moved forward towards the implementation of various strategies to increase revenue collection from local sources. Such an increase in collection will redound to more funds that can support the implementation of priority programs, projects and activities within the mandate and jurisdiction of the Provincial Government. With revenue-generation clearly included in the Reform in Governance pillar of the development framework of the province, the Provincial Government has made significant steps to sustain the steady increase in revenues and thereby reducing its IRA dependency in the long run.

Equally important is also the management of government spending, which basically focuses on how effective funds are utilized and disbursed. This correspondingly pairs with how the resources raised and collected are used to ensure that government funds are appropriately spent for programs and projects and that its services and benefits are provided to constituents.

Looking into the revenues of 2020, the Provincial Government of Bohol was able to raise a total of **P2,573,314,683.09**. Such figure is an increase of 13.31% from the collection level for the year 2019. Unfortunately, the data still show that the main source of funds for operations and other expenses by the Provincial Government (PGBh) is still the Internal Revenue Allotment (IRA) which approximately accounts for 87.7% of revenue sources, a slight improvement from the 2019 data where the IRA share was around 88.17%. While this is an improvement, the PLGU should strive more to wean itself from the dependency on the IRA as an operational source for its various project and programs. A very glaring data in the table is the decrease in the revenue from business fees and licenses which is -57.78% from the previous 2019 revenue. This is considerable in this time of the COVID-19 pandemic when the general economy in the province greatly stagnated or slowed-down, in the face of the health crisis, total lockdown, stoppage of some business enterprises particularly in the tourism sector and the restriction of movement in most of the population. With the onset of the easy of most of the imposed restriction and a more diversified economic portfolio of the province, expectation will be higher that revenues from the local sources will increased in 2021. Another consideration that should be taken is the effectivity of the Mandanas Decision that would provide bigger sharing of the LGUs in the national taxes.



Comparing with the previous 2019 collections, total financial resources coming from both internal and external sources in 2019 has reached P2.573 Billion, which is higher by 13.31%. It should be noted that the increase in revenue was mostly from the local sources (17.49%) compared to that of the IRA share for the province. This is a welcome data considering that the revenue from the business taxes and licenses had greatly decreased in this fiscal year. Continued programs on increasing local revenue generation will bring about the needed boost to increase this share in the revenue of the province.

With the COVID-19 Pandemic, the attainment of the estimated revenue targets for the year 2020 was effected. While resources from the national government's Internal Revenue Allotment (IRA) was fully downloaded, the locally-generated revenues were, however, limited as said pandemic affected operations of government revenue centers as well as how the public transact with the Provincial Government. While the total collection recorded an under-collection of 6% from the year's revenue targets, the under-collection of locally-generated revenues posted a substantial 35%.


Significant variance of actual collection was recorded for services and operations, which covers collection from the Provincial Government hospitals as well as the share from the revenues of the Chocolate Hills. The health and safety concerns of the public seemed to affect the hospital occupancy rates, as people prefer to stay in their homes and observe proper health protocols. Various levels of community quarantine and restrictions has notably affected the tourism industry in the Province, thereby significantly affecting tourism-based establishments, including the operation of the Chocolate Hills Complex.

The challenge for the next succeeding years is to achieve or even surpass that which is targeted. This is especially challenging in the local revenue generation considering that the economy experienced a strong beating that was brought about by the COVID-19 health crisis. More strategies for such direction should be continually implemented such as the intensification of tax campaign, full operation of economic enterprises as supported and managed by the Provincial Economic Enterprise Management Unit, updating of the Revenue Code and imposition of fees for services and facilities. Other strategies will also have to be sustained, as identified in the public financial management improvement plan, include, among others, the creation of inspectorate team for sand and gravel, updating of list of delivery trucks and vans in coordination with LTO, inspection of quarry sites and conduct of checkpoints in strategic areas for sand and gravel extraction, provision of funds for PhilHealth Point of Care Program/ PhilHealth Para sa Masa, hospital modernization program and placement of cash to high-yielding interest rate deposit account.

As to fund utilization, financial reports showed that the Provincial Government of Bohol obligated/ spent a total of P2,301.60 Billion in 2020. The figure includes all the operational costs of the Provincial Government including the programs,

projects and activities implemented for the provision of services and facilities to the general public. A notable expense in the fiscal period is the salary adjustment of health workers in the 10 PGBh-operated hospitals and the allocations to address the expenditures during the COVID-19 pandemic.



Taking a closer look on the expenditures per expense class, it can be observed that Maintenance and Other Operating Expense (MOOE) accounts for the largest share. As can be seen in the table and chart, MOOE posted P1,281.66 Million, accounting for 55.68% of the total obligation/ expenditures for 2020. It can be noted, however, that this is higher than the 2019 percentage of 44%.

Personal Services (PS), on the other hand, posted a total of P752.95 Million obligation, equivalent to 32.71%, a substantial decrease from last year's percentage and within the allowed percentage stipulated by law.

Meanwhile, the Capital Outlay that includes procurement of equipment, construction of facilities, infrastructures and other related capital expenditures, especially those that were related to the PGBh response to the COVID-19 pandemic still showed a noticeable decrease, recorded at P252.90 Million, a 10% share of the overall expenditure total.

It can be noted that figures for MOOE and Capital Outlay already covered obligations under the 20% Development Fund, Non-Office and the Provincial Disaster Risk Reduction Management Fund (DRRMF), where applicable.

Financial expenses or obligations utilized for the amortization of loans of the Provincial Government, particularly for the Hospital Modernization Program, posted a slightly lower amount of P14.09 Million. The Provincial Government was able to secure additional loans during the fiscal year allotted for its hospital modernization program.

With due consideration on the Provincial Government's revenue collection, expenditures (obligated/utilized) for operation, services, facilities and capitalized projects, and the continuing appropriations for priority programs and activities, the Statement of Receipts and Expenditures for 2020 shows the following details:

Noting the abovementioned figures, it shows that the operation of the Provincial Government for the year 2020 resulted to an ending balance of P215.232 Million. Such a result provides the Provincial Government additional financial sources that can be used to fund priority projects and activities for 2021, as may be necessary, and to be authorized through Supplemental Budgets.

Even with the COVID-19 pandemic and the level of expenditures for its response and management, the Provincial Government of Bohol has managed its available financial resources to be utilized to fund the year's priority programs, projects and activities. The statement, however, would show that utilization of available resources in the same year remains to be a challenge as significant resources are still accounted as continuing appropriations for development programs as well as for capital outlay. Such figure, however, includes the appropriations for the hospital modernization program and the acquisition of road heavy equipment, which are still on procurement process at the close of the year. The actual implementation of programs and projects continues to be the prime priority of the Provincial Government and efforts are being undertaken to improve timeliness in the planning and designing of infrastructure projects, procurement processes, and the ability of offices to implement and manage these projects.

Revenue Generation and Resource Mobilization Strategies to Support Implementation of Priority Programs and Projects

The Provincial Government of Bohol's identified priority programs, projects and activities (PPAs) require substantial financial resources. Taking into account the Internal Revenue Allotment (IRA) dependency with the level of locally-generated revenues, the allocation of resources has to be prioritized. It has been a continuing challenge of the Provincial Government to raise local revenue to be able to generate more funds and sustain the gradual decrease of dependency from the IRA.

Consistent with the Province's Public Financial Management Improvement Plan, the following are undertaken to increase locally-generated revenues:

- Sustain the operation of the Bohol Diagnostic and Ambulatory Care Center and the Provincial Government containerized PCR Laboratory
- Establish and sustain the operation of the Central Isolation Center (CIC)
- Full and expanded operation of economic enterprise Café Caloy and Bohol Biodiversity complex
- Continue to invest for hospital modernization/ expansion of 10 devolved hospitals
- Updating of the Revenue Code to incorporate new fees/ charges for PGBh facilities, services, products and equipment, including updating of hospital fees and charges
- Conduct of proper study and actual utilization of Provincial Government real properties for income generating ventures, including the implementation of water source development projects
- Placement of standby cash to high-yielding interest rate deposit accounts
- Pursue the inventory of all idle lands provincewide as basis for possible utilization for productive activities

- Sustain education/information campaign for the public to pay RPT on time, process immediately the transfer of real property ownership, and availment of civil remedies for real properties for auction
- Access external funding to significantly augment local resources to implement priority programs through collaboration with proper national government agencies, official development assistance (ODA) organizations, partner civil society organizations and the private sector and government financial institutions.

The following initiatives shall also be pursued to support proper resource mobilization:

 - ✓ Periodic physical inventory count, recording and reporting
 - ✓ Periodic updating of records based on PGSO reports
 - ✓ Strict implementation of PGSO mandated functions of inspectorate
 - ✓ Inclusion of the Audit of Inventories in Hospital Audit
 - ✓ Regular conduct of public auction for unserviceable PGBh properties
- To provide relevant, timely and accurate financial information to guide decision-making
- To enhance audit systems and audit compliance mechanism
 - o Creation and institutionalization of an Audit Committee
 - o Designation of Internal Control System Focal Persons in each Department
 - o Enforce the implementation of Audit Recommendations

PRIORITY STRATEGIES FOR IMPLEMENTATION

Guided by the overarching development framework of the Province of Bohol, the Provincial Government leads local government units, the national government agencies, civil society organizations, the private sector and the general public to pursue strategies consistent with the Ins.P.I.R.E.D. H.E.A.T.-I.T. Bohol development pillars.

In furtherance and enhanced concretization of the Provincial Development Framework, the 2019-2022 Provincial Administration has identified three sectoral pillars as guiding principles for its development prioritization. Such sectoral thrusts are: Pag-atiman sa mga Makalolooy (Kabus), Pagpukaw sa Kultura, Pagpalambo sa Industriyang Turismo.

Pag-atiman sa mga Kabus ug Makalolooy. Good governance can best be tested in the amount of care extended to its constituents. In the new dispensation, social services are given more emphasis. Programs that address the needs of the people are aggregated into such aspects as Preserving our Health through improvement in the Rural Health Care system like completion of the Annual Sports Calendar with the Provincial Engineering Office (PEO) and Bohol Tourism Office (BTO) for the circuits which will also be reflected in the third pillar of "Pagpalambo sa atong Industriyang Turismo"; preparation of Survey Questions for Profiling and Data Gathering, budgeting, identifying the poorest and most medically ignored barangays; costing the Complete Blood Count (CBC), Fecal Analysis and Urinalysis; finding diagnostic partners; preparing Diagnostic Tool kits for Barangay Health Workers; preparing the hospitals and clinics to support the Diagnostic Mapping, training the trainors; training and incentivizing the Barangay Health Workers; setting up a system to link diagnostic studies with the proper local, national, and private agencies for treatment; establishing municipal nurseries that will pursue the planting of endemic plants that have herbal and medicinal properties and providing for the extension training and education; planting of citronella and other plants that ward off disease-bearing insects; issuing Executive Orders (EOs) on the implementation of a comprehensive Canine Program (to address rabies and stray dogs issues), Level 1 Waterless Barangays (identifying Level 1 barangays, completing Bohol's Water Resource Map, plotting barangays that can serve as Water Distribution Points for clustered barangays, building water impounding capabilities), water harvesting and conservation; and ensuring that the Military, Police, Tarsier 117, and Purok Power Movement (PPM) units are working in key identified areas.

Another social service concern that is to be addressed is **Food Security** with such programs like establishing the Bohol Soil and Water Center (BSWC) that is operationally sustainable, available water and soil experts, uses Innovation and Smart Technology; updated farmers registry divided into crops and animal groups; listing of consolidated rice and corn areas with legitimate and dependable farm cooperatives; identification of rice and corn areas that will be given mini Service Facilities (Techno Demo Farm that is divided to seed, fertilizer, and machinery/equipment companies), identification of HVCC areas; establishment of a Bohol Farm Mechanization and Processing Center; vigorous nursery program for Bohol's Agricultural Crops including nurseries for endemic medicinal plants; Market Modernization Program with 40-footer Movable Refrigeration and Ice Making Machines that prioritizes Livestock, HVCC or Fisheries commodities; Slaughterhouse Modernization Program with refrigeration capability to bolster livestock and poultry production; building self-sufficiency capability in Dairy Milk needs for an initial 20,000 children; enhancing micro-financing and Buy Back programs; and issuing an Executive Order mandating that every municipality must maintain a HVCC nursery for crops and endemic plants.

A third social concern is in the aspect of **Curing Diseases** that will include such programs like the Hospital Modernization; increasing the pay/benefits of province-paid health workers like medical doctors, nurses and alike; linking with Foreign Grant's partners; linking with medical/health specialists practicing outside Bohol through Digital Medicine technology and ensuring that province-operated hospitals and clinics are money makers (like giving hospitals realty potentials).

Pagpukaw sa Kultura. As a stand-alone tourism destination of the country, Bohol's diverse tourist resources needs to be continuously promoted, enhanced and diversified. Culture and Arts will play a vital role in this aspect of tourism related activities. Because Bohol's cultural legacies already encompass the seven Arts of Music, Architecture, Sculpture, Painting, Literature, Film and Performing Arts, re-focusing them towards more sustainable, concise and inter-related activities will provide the necessary enhancement. In this aspect, the Provincial Administration will have such activities like exposure and training programs for the 7 Arts through local shows, competitions and train the trainors' program, partnerships with relevant stakeholders for the 7 Arts, developing the Arts & Crafts industry, publications, strengthening the Escuela Taller partnership, integrating 7 Arts in in-school and out-of-school activities, regular Arts Exhibitions (in cooperation with private associations, LGUs, schools and NCCA, participation in Culture and Arts programs in Manila or foreign tourism selling trips including Culinary, Handicrafts, Souvenirs and Wares; approval and groundbreaking of the Regional Center for Arts and Culture; international Arts, Culture and Tourism shows; completion of the Annual Cultural Calendar; building/renovating performance centers; partnering with the Catholic church and other sectors in the promotion of activities and sires for cultural tourism; countdown activities to the Quincentennial celebrations; integrating faith-based tourism in the Bohol Tourism circuits; promoting and enhancing the Bohol Culinary experience though the establishment of culinary events, publication of Bohol's Culinary Book, integration in agri-producers and the public market in the culinary experience, and establishment of a Culinary and HR Institute in Bohol.

Pagpalambo sa Industriyang Turismo. Capitalizing on the maturity of the tourism sector in the province, the Provincial Administration envisioned it to be more diverse and impacting on the lives of the Boholanos. Being a very sensitive and fragile sector, it needs better protection for its continued progression and ample support for its sustainability. Among the programs that will have a positive effect are: Protection of the Environment through an aggressive Tree Planting and Protection programs with bias on fruit bearing and endemic trees including mangroves at the coastal areas, establishment of municipal water systems and protection and conservation of the many watershed areas in the province; Infrastructure/Utilities Development like ports development/improvement programs for the ports in Tagbilaran City, Maribojoc, Loon, Tubigon, Buenavista, Getafe, Talibon, Ubay, Pres. Carlos P. Garcia, Jagna and Loay; enhanced Palengke program; Tourism Assistance program; establishment of a Bohol International Convention Center; protection of heritage houses and building a heritage village; lighting of tourist attractions and getting the approval for the coastal by-pass highway including funding and groundbreaking. Another program would be those related to Tourism Support that would include building WIFI zones all over the province; partnering with the Department of Tourism, private sector and LGUs on messaging, promotional and marketing programs; unifying the Transport industry; strengthening the Bohol Guide system; and strengthening the partnership with TESDA for training vouchers.



I. HIGHLIGHTS OF 2020 ACCOMPLISHMENTS


RICE NARRATIVE REPORT

In 2020, amidst the COVID-19 pandemic, the Provincial Government focused its resources both human thru the Office of the Provincial Agriculturist and corresponding budget in the production of staple food which is rice. To sustain "Bohol as the Rice Bowl" in the Region VII, strategies must be in place with the continuous improvement of rice varieties, adoption of farmers to high quality seeds, best cultural management practices, enhanced farm machineries and subsidized seeds and fertilizers inputs. It's only then, food security and rice self-sufficiency is sustained in the province.

Bohol has a total physical area of 47,376.51 hectares for rice. Only 72.20 % which is 34,204.00 ha. were planted with rice. Inbred rice could be planted in an irrigated and non irrigated fields. It covered an area of 21,939.00 ha. while hybrid rice was planted in 12,265,00 ha. Irrigated fields. Hybrid rice got the biggest budget in the hope that it could produce more to sustain the food security in the province and in the whole Region City.





Last year budget for rice production is the biggest so far for the Office of the Provincial Agriculturist. It was almost four times from the previous years. It was a very much challengeable year for the OPA staff especially



the Rice Section. A production of 160 bags of hybrid rice per hectare in an irrigated and 120 bags per hectare of inbred rice in a non irrigated rice field is quite a target for the field rice technicians. The Provincial Government thru the Office of the Provincial Agriculturist is all out support with the Rice Program of last year 2020 with the hope that this could help feed the Boholano people in this COVID pandemic and the whole Region VII


Seed inputs got the biggest slot of the budget for OPA for rice production of last year. It was five times compared of the previous year. A total of 17,680,000.00 was quite a sum of money of which hybrid seeds got the biggest slot. It was the first time the office allocated budget for hybrid seeds. Aside from PGBh budget, the Province has given a budget for rice seeds from the Department of Agriculture for hybridization being the Rice Bowl in the whole of region VII





Records shows that in 2020, an area of 6,000 ha. planted with rice could produce 23, 400,000 kilograms of milled rice and this could feed the Boholano population in 56 days. This was compared to the year 2019 where 3,662,000 kilograms milled rice was produced in a 2180 ha. planted with rice and that it was enough for 8 days consumption and in 2018 only 2050 ha. was planted, and this was able to produce 3,936,000 kilograms milled rice and that it is good only for 9 days consumption for the whole Boholano population

In peso, the milled rice 23,400,000 kilograms produced last year 2020 has a money worth of 1,053,000,000.00 while 2019's 3,662,400 kilograms milled rice was 164, 808,000.00 worth while 2018's 3,936,000 kilograms milled rice was 177,120,000. The saying goes that the more you invest the more you get as return but of with proper technology and technical assistance and



PROVINCIAL RICE PROGRAM

A. Advanced Rice Technology (ART) 160



ART 160 is hybrid rice production. It started during the wet season of 2020, in a 3,000 has. of irrigated ricefield. There are 12 MLGUs and 22 Irrigators Associations that are recipients of the program. It had a budget of P18,000,000 worth of hybrid seeds and approximately 3,434 farmers benefited in the program. The farmers was able to produce 8,000 MT or 160 cavans of palay per hectare and that the farmers could be able to generate P120,000 net income per hectare per season.

During the previous cropping the ART 160 program was able to produce 220 cavans more than the target of 160 cavans per hectare. This will give an income of approximately P165,000 net income per hectare. Thus in percentage accomplishment is 137.5 %.

❖ PALAY BUY BACK

Buy-back Scheme is the strategy component of the ART 160 Program to ensure a sure and secure market at a better price of the palay produce by the farmers. Only 300 hectares which is 10% of the ART 160 area covered will be focused in the scheme. The palay was bought at P20.00 per kilo at 14% moisture content of the palay. The budget was P48,000,000.00 and the estimated net income was 10.3 million. Other related activities:

B. Advanced Rice Technology (ART) 120

The ART 120 program was able to produce 160 cavans of play in a hectare of ricefield during this cropping season. It gave an approximately P113,333 net income per hectare per cropping season from the target of P85,000 net income only. The program accomplished a 133.33% from its target.





CORN & CASSAVA NARRATIVE REPORT

Corn is considered as the second staple food in the Philippines and in the Province of Bohol. It is also considered as the second principal crop to substitute during the absence of rice. Some of the Boholanos today considered corn as one of their major source of livelihood and income. Despite of being an alternate staple food, it is also the main source of ingredients for feeds in the poultry and livestock industry. For this reason, there is an assurance of market and therefore income through corn production.


Cassava is one of components in feeds manufacturing. It is usually intercropped with corn. Farmers' income in a certain area is maximized when these two crops are planted side by side.

The overall goal and objective is to increase production of quality corn for human consumption, feeds and industrial uses, as well as improve farmers' income and thus uplift their quality of life


Corn production in Bohol experienced a sudden drop in area harvested and goes with it also decrease in the production in metric tons from 2016 to 2020 but the yield in metric tons per hectare in 2020 differed by 0.26 compared to the average amount of the four consecutive years previously. This is due to good variety of corn seeds plus the bio-control to address pest diseases and many interventions given like fertilizers.

The graph shows that in the year 2020 corn volume of production has the lowest value compared to the previous four consecutive years






Corn production in Bohol in 2020 from the previous two graphs though not promising since it has the lowest number of hectares planted and yield or production compares from the previous four years, but when it comes to yield per hectares 2020 production garnered the highest value. This is because of the intervention given by the Provincial Government thru the Office of the provincial Agriculturist. These are the high-quality planting seeds, fertilizers that goes with it, mechanization, bio-control for infestation and new technology imparted to the corn farmers thru technical briefings





There are two kinds of corn variety planted in Bohol. They are the white and yellow variety. The white variety is grown and consumed usually as alternate staple food next to rice. It decreases in 2020 as to area planted and yield but as to yield per hectare it will be noticed that it increases compared to the previous four years. The interventions given to the Corn farmers are instrumental in the year 2020. Farmers must maximized their lot to give them more income thus a good way of life for the whole family. Although Boholonos are not corn eating people but idle land must be maximized.

The 3 graphs show the comparison of the performance of the white corn production in Bohol in the area planted, volume, and yield per hectare for five consecutive years from 2016 to 2020.










The yellow variety is grown usually for feed raw materials. As we all known there are many Boholanos who are into livestock farming. When in fact Marcela Farms is a typical example. They are producing their own feeds for their hogs farming. Learn from reliable source they are getting their raw material which is corn from Bukidnon. If our farmers could only provide their needs, the money that they spend could not go out from Bohol. This is an opportunity for our Corn Farmers that should not be missed. "Kakugi lang jud" should be borne in mind and to them all good luck. Both varieties if grown by the farmers could be beneficial since it will increase their income and ensure that they have food in their table.









Yellow corn production is promising as shown in the three graphs. Area planted to volume of production was increasing starting 2018 until last year. The yield per hectare slightly differed from 2018 to 2020 but not much.

CASSAVA PRODUCTION

Cassava production was not given a budget in the Office of the Provincial Agriculturist. But since it was grown intercropped sometimes with corn so we will not do away with it. It is a raw material for feed manufacturing. We did only the technical assistance. However, the Department of Agriculture is allocating a big sum of money for the implementation of this commodity. Season Long Training, technical briefing and agricultural inputs are given to Cassava growers.


HIGH VALUE CROPS DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM - HVCDP

The office also delivered / turnover of farm inputs; vegetable seeds, garden hose, plastic crates, yard long, solar water pump and fertilizers in 20 municipalities with the help of HVCDP staffs. These agricultural inputs help improved the quality and yields of crop and food production to the farmers of Bohol. Seeds are critical to successful crop production and inevitably, farm productivity and profitability. Fertilizer supplies nutrients to the soil that are essential for growth. Provides the potential for multiple harvests per year.

There are a total of two hundred nineteen (219) beneficiaries scattered in thirty-five municipalities of the province. As of April 30, 2020 the staff from the Office of the Provincial Agriculturist has monitored seventy seven (77) beneficiaries. Thirty-one (31) of them had done sowing the vegetable seeds in seed boxes, others directly sow the seeds in the ground, in garden plots, in pots and reusable containers. Mostly of the seeds had started to germinate. However, the rest of the beneficiaries are still preparing the area to be planted while others have just received the seeds. ensure that the program is properly implemented, technical assistance and collaborations to active stakeholder is conducted. There were 18 technical briefing, training/workshop and other activities were conducted to different commodities in various clienteles such as vegetable farmers and public elementary and high schools, banana, fruit trees, industrial crops, cut flower growers and CDP PPM.

With collaboration meetings to partner agencies conducted/participated in order to widen the scope and sharing of responsibilities during the whole duration of the implementation.

One of our initiatives to increase vegetable production in the province is to provide assistance to commercial/ semi-commercial farmer in the form of planting materials, technology as demonstration for vegetable production. This year there were 28 farms assisted.

CROPS FACILITIES


The Agri-Facilities Section was tasked to manage and handle the overall operation of the three (3) OPA operated nurseries which are located in Bohol Organic Agriculture Technology (BOATech) Center located at Gabi, Ubay, Bohol; Macaas Plant Nursery located at Macaas, Tubigon, Bohol; Balilihan Nursery located at Del Carmen Sur Balilihan, Bohol. All of these 3 nurseries were concentrating on the Plant Material Production and Stocking/Propagation; Organic Inputs Production and Crop Production, to generate income.

In 2020, the three plant nurseries produced a total of 128,041 pcs of fruit tree seedlings; a total of 169,930 pcs of soil media bagging and 38,677 pcs available seedlings. A total of 20,400 fruit seedlings was distributed and released to LGUs, Bohol Museum, National Agencies, Schools, Religious Group, Civil Society Organizations who requested fruit seedlings for their tree growing activities and walk-in farmer clients during HEART caravan with a total money value from dispered seedlings of P303,060.00. The overall total income from the three (3) facilities is about P 174,700,00

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A. Bohol Organic Agriculture Technology (BOATech) Center

In BOATech Centercrops production such as rice,coconut,banana,fruits and vegetables, rootcrops, and vermi production was done for income generating purposes. In rice production, they harvested 226 kilograms of Palay in 2 cropping season. In coconut production, they harvested 11,635 nuts and donated 1,000 pcs to coconut processing at Balilihan and produced 600 pcs coconut seedlings. In banana production harvested 858 kilograms of banana and 160 banana sucker dispersed. In vegetables such as musk melon, squash and black pepper they harvested an about of 816 kilograms and produced 300 pcs of pineapple suckers. Harvested 455 kilos of vermicast and used in the facility. For Ornamental Plant Propagation produced 1,465 pcs and maintained 1,000 sq.m for herbal and organic plants and endemic crops. A total of 700 hills production for herbs and spices. Total estimated income of P99,222.00 from BOATech facility was remitted to OPA Admin/ PTO.




B. Macaas Plant Nursery

In Macaas Nursery, aside from seedling production, they also engaged in fruits and vegetable production through greenhouse and openfield areas. In vegetable production, they harvested 50 kilos. Maintained 1,000 sq.m. scion grooves and HOPE. Expansioned of herbs and species for 498 hills. The total estimated income of P69,663.00 from Macaas facility was remitted to OPA Admin/ PTO.

C. Balilihan Nursery

Likewise, Bailihan Nursery Planted Black Pepper 100 hills. Planted herbal, herbs and spices 200 hills. Balilihan Nursery had also remitted an estimated income of P5,815.00



FISHERY PRODUCTIVITY DIVISION

A. UPLAND AQUACULTURE DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

The beneficiaries of this program are the local fish farmers of the existing tilapia growers/associations in the Province of Bohol. It aims to sustain the production of quality tilapia fingerlings needed throughout the production cycle; ensure the sustainability of water supply as a basic requirement in fish production and source of freshwater; produce alternative source of low-cost but nutritious and organic fish feed with raw materials available at the local sources; and produce marketable farmed tilapia and generate income out of the sales and harvest from cluster and communal fishpond, thus, reduce high fish prices in the locality.

In line with the program, the following activities were conducted:

Maintenance of the Bilar Multi-Species Hatchery

The Bilar Multi-Species Freshwater Hatchery is responsible for the maintenance of breeders and stocks with a stock of 2,900 pieces Tilapia breeders and 100 pieces Catfish breeders. The total fry collection (C.Y. 2020) is **632,950 pieces**; total fry dispersal (C.Y. 2020) is **572,475 pieces**; total income/sales generated by fingerlings/marketable tilapia (C.Y. 2020) is **Php 88,560.00**; total beneficiaries (C.Y. 2020) is **210.**







RESEARCH AGRI-SUPPORT SERVICE

The research section in coordination with the Korea Program on International Agriculture (KOPIA) has conducted a four (4) research study; one of them is the **Adaptability Project on Korean Variety of Hot Pepper, Kohlrabi, and Cucumber** in collaboration with Balilihan Farmer's Marketing Cooperative. To ensure its full implementation, we have conducted a series of sites visitations to its project locations.


The study for Dry Season was conducted in Brgy. Sal-ing, Balilihan, Bohol from January to June 2020. The Balilihan Farmer's Marketing Cooperative (BFMC) is the project co-operator. The objective of the study was to test the suitability (in terms of yield and resistance to common diseases) of Korean cultivars of kohlrabi (no.1), hot pepper (BT070DSD), and cucumber (CU1801) in the Bohol's environment. Among the three crops under study, kohlrabi was planted inside the protected structure since according to other related researches, this crop is grown best under protective structure. An area of 910m2 was prepared in the vegetable area of Brgy. Sal-ing, Balilihan. Out of this area, 800m2 was planted with hot pepper, 90m2 was planted with cucumber, while the remaining 20m2 was planted with kohlrabi. The proportion of area planted with each





crop was defined by the members of the association. Hot pepper being the largest since there's a promising price in the market. The result of the study in Dry season showed that **KOHLRABI** in Bohol got only 10 kilos in an estimated area of 20m2. This only suggest that its average yield is only 5MT/ha. This data is 81.49% lower than that of 27MT/ha potential yield in Korea. One of the factors which trigger to its notable difference is the fact that the crop was infested with cutworm.

In the case of **HOT PEPPER (BT070)**, it has a total yield of 32 kgs. This means that its average yield is 4MT/ha. Other Philippine variety are Pinatubo and Red Hot which have 4.185MT/ha and 4.7MT/ha yield respectively. The data implies that with regards to yield, hot pepper (070) comes second to Pinatubo. It is then safe to say





that this Korean variety thrives well in Bohol's condition and can compete to other existing local variety. However, the variety is susceptible to fungi infection caused by Phytophtora capsici. Immature fruits were observed to have a burnt-like appearance on its tips while mature fruits were observed to have wilted.

For CUCUMBER (CU1801), it has a total yield of 141 kgs/90m2. Converting it into MT/ha, the data will generate a yield of 15MT/ha. Other Philippine varieties are Pilmaria and Bituin having 27.5MT/ha and 30MT/ha, respectively. Despite having a low production yield, there was no disease being identified on the crop. Though common pests for cucurbits were found, no significant loss was recorded.





On the other hand, the study for Wet Season (June-December 2020) was conducted in two different locations in Bohol. Location 1 was in Brgy. Tanday, Corella with the project titled "Growth and Yield of Pechay (Brassica chinensis) Applied with Fermented Chicken Dung" while location 2 was in Brgy. Hanopol Weste, Balilihan with the project titled "Growth and Yield of Lettuce (Lactuca sativa) Applied with Fermented Chicken Dung".



The change of site was in accordance with the project's primary goal which is to 'uplift the economic condition of Boholano farmers'. This time, another two associations were assisted by the project: BRM Farm which was managed by Kapunongan sa Bol-anong Organikong Mag-uuma (KBOOM) in Tanday, Corella and Ilaja Farm which was managed by Hanopol Weste Farmer's Association (HWESFA) in Hanopol, Balilihan. In Location 1 and 2, 4 blocks were prepared and each block has 4 plots with a total of 16 plots all in all. Each plot measures 1mx3m- standard size of plots used by many of the researchers. Treatments used were the following:

Location 1:	Location 2:
T1- no application	T1- no application
T2- 20 g/plant	T2- 10 g/plant
T3- 40 g/plant	T3- 20 g/plant
T4-80 g/plant	T4- 40 g/plant

Right after the application of treatments in Location 1, transplanting was done. It was observed on the day after transplanting that ninety percent of the population have died. This effect can be attributed to the high ammonium content of the fermented chicken dung. Thus, the farm cooperator conducted re-planting of missing hills on the third day. One week after transplanting, ten sample plants were identified randomly in each plot and the collection of data was done. The parameters being gathered were plant height, number of leaves, and yield. Data revealed that among the treatments being applied on pechay, T3 got the highest number of leaves, plant height and yield. Meanwhile in Location 2, treatments were applied two weeks prior to transplanting, giving the ammonia of the chicken dung to be released in the atmosphere. 100% survival rates of all plants were recorded. The parameters being gathered were number of leaves, plant height, and yield. Among the treatments, T3 got the highest average number of leaves, highest plant height, and yield.

It is worth mentioning that OPA was recognized as one of the active partners of CVAARRDEC last October 26, 2020 on its Regional Research and Development Symposium.








ORGANIC AGRICULTURE DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Activating the local food producers and processors, consumers and agri-fishery stakeholders to supply and consume organic foods to promote the wellbeing of general public across the province.

Under the Organic Agriculture (OA) Development Section, the staff members were able to produced 15 tons of naturally grown agri products like rice, root crops, fruit and vegetables. Conducted trainings to Organic Agriculture (OA) Focals and organic practitioners to the different farmers in the municipalities of Panglao, Sevila and Ubay (BoaTech Center). They were taught on how to prepare organic fertilizers and pesticides like JADAM, Rhodo Technology, NFTS and Vermicomposting for their farm for a minimal expense, Heirloom Seeds and Seedling Production











Aside from trainings, we were able to distribute to our assisted organizations and individual farmers the following Agri-Inputs, supplies and equipment: 182 packs of OPV vegetable seeds, 800 Liters of natural pesticides, 100 pcs empty plastic drums and 100 piglets to Organic Agriculture practitioners.






Under the **Marketing Development Services** we were able to assist 5 producers and 50 consumers recruited to sell and shop organic products at Dao Public Market and during ART Tabo sa Plaza. The group were very active in participating different activities initiated by the office. They maintained the display of organically produced products daily at Dao Public Market and increasing number of customers patronizing organically grown products was being observed.

For the **Advocacy and Stakeholders Development Services** we were able to conduct 12 meetings with BOAExeCom, KBOOM, BANALIG & Marketing Partners via physical and virtual to further observe the Covid Health Protocols. This is to maintain and expand Organic Agriculture organizations





Organic Certification System, as part of the component in Organic Agriculture program, Bohol is working on Participatory Guarantee System as alternative way towards 2^{nd} Party Certification. Consumers are guaranteed how organic they are consuming thru PGS Certification. To date there were 6 farms accredited to 2^{nd} Party Certification (PGS), they are as follows:



ENGINEERING SUPPORT SERVICES

IRRIGATION SUPPORT SERVICES

The Provincial Government of Bohol through the Office of the Provincial Agriculturist has been very proactive in solving our farmer's needs by providing them support services. The RASS Division, specifically the Engineering Section for the year 2020, has facilitated the purchased of 2 units Drilling Rig (Hammer Type) worth 1 million under the 20% DF. The procurement of this equipment intends to acquire groundwater to water aquifers and eventually provide our farmers a stable water resource in irrigating their crops. This is much needed to highland agricultural areas. Initial water drilling operation conducted at Balilihan Nursery and at BoaTech Center, Ubay.







The Water Geo Resistivity Equipment will be for rental to all interested beneficiaries (private or LGUs). The proposed rental rates are not yet approved by the Sangguniang Panlalawigan of Bohol as follows: for Private – 20,000/site; for LGUs/LGAs – 10,000/site

Also, Identification and validation of proposed sites for Small Farm Reservoir (SFR) worth P 5.2 Million with 72 out of 104 sites were already completed; water aquifer detection and rehabilitation of existing irrigation facilities were also carried out. In addition to this, a budget worth 14 Million was funded to purchase 104 drip irrigation sets to support our vegetable growers in times of drought.

FARM MECHANIZATION SUPPORT SERVICES


Meanwhile, under the **Farm Mechanization Program**, this section has conducted various tractor activities to the different localities of Bohol. Operations include rotavation and harrowing of fields both for lowland and upland cultivation, Facilitated combine rice harvester operations.

Collection and remittance report of farm machineries rental to PTO are remitted on time. Our operators have also conducted repair and maintenance of our farm machineries to ensure that these are performing efficiently and effective whenever used.

In addition, an on-going construction of Farm Machinery Warehouse worth P2 Million located at the BoaTech Center, Ubay, Bohol is at 70% completion.

The six Coco Peeling Machine will be turn-over to the Agribusiness Division of OPA. They will be the one to take charge of the operation and the corresponding fee (rental rates) for the rental of the machines is still for approval by the Sangguniang Panlalawigan of Bohol.

The six Mobile Corn Shellers are also for rental to all interested Corn Farmers. And the proposed rental rates is due for approval also by the Sangguniang Panlalawigan of Bohol.



Fish Trading Program

These are the activities conducted:

Provided the necessary support to members of the Bohol Fish Traders Group in identifying and establishing the areas in the Province that showed an oversupply of fish as a result of the sea travel restrictions imposed during the quarantine period.

Validated the fish supply in the municipalities of Talibon, Inabanga, Getafe, Bien Unido and Buenavista as the potential sources of the fish supply for the Fish Traders Group — these areas having shown an oversupply of fish during the start of the guarantine period.

Assisted Fish Traders in sourcing out fish supply from areas identified as potential sources and facilitated the delivery and sale of low-priced fish to municipalities and barangays across the Province. There are 3 groups of Fish Traders

I. HIGHLIGHTS OF 2020 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

LIVESTOCK PRODUCTION SUPPORT

Artificial insemination. One of the major strategies to increase livestock productivity and profitability, as well as improve farmers' income is adopting genetic upgrading through artificial insemination. All is a technique in which sperm is collected from the bulls, buck and boar processed, stored and manually introduced into the female reproductive tract at appropriate time for the purpose of conception. Such innovation allows faster dissemination of genetic superiority to local livestock population even in remote locations.

In Bohol, the implementation of the provincial AI program is in close coordination and strategic alliances with the national agencies like the Philippine Carabao Center (PCC), the Department of Agriculture (DA) RFO 7 and the National Dairy Authority (NDA) and the Municipal Local Government Units (MLGUs) through its Municipal Agricultural Offices.

Though AI requires technical skills and effective lines of communication between the farmer and the AI technician, the technology has been well adopted by Boholano livestock raisers since 1990's mainly due to economic advantage of the quality of offspring produced.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF THE YEAR

Al in Ruminants under UNAIP. Considered ruminants are cattle, carabao and goat. For this year, a total of 2,616 beef cattle, 1,426 dairy cattle, 3,818 carabaos and 420 goats are inseminated serving 7,691 ruminant raisers while offspring produced recorded a total of 1,206 beef cattle, 806 dairy cattle, 1,317 carabaos and 320 goats.

It can be noted that there is a decrease in the artificial insemination services particularly in cattle and offspring produced in cattle and carabao this year compared to the previous year. The travel restrictions and social distancing imposed by the government is limiting the transport of frozen semen from source thus affecting the performance of AI services and monitoring of offspring, respectively.

Al Service Providers. Under the Unified Artificial Insemination Program (UNAIP) of the national government, the Al services in the province are carried out by a total of 101 competent technicians from different sectors covering 45 municipalities. The 3 remaining areas with no resident Al technicians are the municipalities of Lila, Cortes and Tagbilaran City, however, these areas are served by the OPV-based Al Technicians.

Procurement of Frozen Semen. The livestock semen used for AI services in the province are sourced out from the National Artificial Breeding Center (NABC) in Malaybalay, Bukidnon through the DA-RFO-7, as well as from the NDA and the PCC. For this year, a total of 9,220 straws of frozen semen are acquired with breeds of Bulgarian Murrah Buffalo, Brahman, Holstein Fresian, Sahiwal, Anglo-Nubian and Boer.



Pregnancy Diagnosis (PD). Pregnancy diagnosis thru transrectal palpation is regularly conducted by AI technicians. This AI management strategy decreases the interval between AI services as well as increases AI service rate.

For this year, a total of 5,775 heads of large ruminants (cattle and carabao) undergone transrectal palpation for pregnancy confirmation serving 5,679 farmers.

Induction and **Estrus Synchronization**. To improve conception rate, 2 approaches are adopted; the hormonal treatment and non-hormonal treatment. In hormonal treatment, parenteral administration of hormones is done to

induce and synchronize estrus (in heat) which then helps to cascade reproductive cycle allowing AI technicians to serve more animals. Such process reduces the waiting period of 18 - 24 days, the normal estrous cycle of ruminants. This year, a total of 1,921 cattle and carabaos undergone the procedures of estrus synchronization serving 1,791 livestock farmers.

For non-hormonal treatment, deworming and mineral/vitamin supplementation and uterine flushing are done during the conduct of animal clinics. These conditioning procedures also increase fertility rate thus stepping up on pregnancy probabilities. Per record, a total of 6,283 ruminants are served benefitting 5,738 farmers covering 8 requesting municipalities. These health procedures are performed mainly by LGU AI personnel under supervision of the office.

Ear tagging. This is a numbering system for the official identification of individual animals produced through AI. For 2020, a total of 1,296 heads of cattle and carabaos are tagged and registered covering 15 municipalities.

Economic Value. Animals produced from artificial insemination services commands better price in the market, this is how Al financially works on livestock farming. The current estimated market value for each cattle and carabao weanlings produced from Al is P15,000.00 per head, thus, the total monetized value of offspring this year amounted to P49,935,000.00.



On goats, the economic value of AI offspring is estimated at P1,600,000.00 based on the cost of P5,000.00 per head at weaning age. When compared to using local inferior breeds, the said monetized values could be perceptibly 50% lower in values.

Al in Swine. The establishment of Animal Breeding Centers (ABCs) at the municipal level aims to improve the genetic background of rural pigs, producing better performance and meat quality, thus, playing an important role in increasing income of small holder pig raisers.

There are 15 MLGU-operated ABCs in the province particularly located in Antequera, San Miguel, Trinidad, Talibon, Pres. Garcia, Sagbayan, Batuan, Carmen, Duero, Jagna, Loboc, Mabini, Pilar, Bilar and Sierra Bullones. In support to the ABC operations, the office provided boars and some AI paraphernalia apart from technical assistance.



Reports from these ABCs shows a total of 1,715 swine inseminated thru natural heat. On the other hand, the offspring produced recorded a total of 12,822 heads which represents an economic value of P38,466,000.00 based on the current value of P3,000.00 per piglet.

Operationalization of Liquid Nitrogen (LN2) Plant. It should be noted that the LN2 production facility is

acquired from the DA RFO 7 in 2019 with counterpart from the Provincial Government in form of area, manpower and maintenance cost. It started its operation in the later part of 2019.

To date, this facility produces liquid nitrogen which ensures correct temperature in preserving the livestock semen inside a mother tank that carries 3,500 straws of semen.

A total of 176 LN2 mother tanks with a monetized value of P616,000.00 are produced this year. With on hand stocks from previous year, the office is able to distribute a total of 197 tanks to Al covered LGUs.



Capacity Development. This year, 2 basic and 2 advance AI trainings for large ruminants, are conducted by the PCC, NDA and DA RFO 7. The OPV coordinated with these agencies and facilitated the participation of MLGU Technicians and provided technical assistance as facilitators and trainers.

AGRICULTURAL RURAL TRANSFORMATION THRU BOHOL NATIVE CHICKEN DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

The Bohol Native Chicken Development Program is a wholistic development initiative for improving and expanding the native chicken industry in the province, embarking on native chicken production and commercialization. This year, the program intends to increase the number of growers and breeders to meet the increasing market demand for native chicken meat.

The Provincial Government of Bohol is taking the lead in providing an investment friendly environment to ensure profitability of this industry through organization of key players, making accessible healthy breeder stocks, provision of policy support and technical assistance, support equipment, post-harvest facilities and providing linkages with financing institutions.

Ultimately, the goal is to sustain and make available, affordable organically or naturally grown quality native chickens.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF THE YEAR

Social Mobilization. Formation of native chicken growers' associations is one of the strategies adopted in program implementation. Despite the restricted movement due to the pandemic crisis, there is 1 association formed this year, the Valencia Native Chicken Growers Association of the municipality of Valencia with a membership of 15.

To date, there are 30 native chicken growers' associations which are widely distributed in the province including the Bohol Native Chicken Growers Association (BONACGA), which is eyed to be the federation of native chicken growers' associations in the province. All in all, these groups have active memberships of 500. As of this time, 4 out of these 30 associations are DOLE registered.

In support to the organizations, representative from the office attends the groups' regular meetings. Because of the Covid-19 pandemic crisis, only 15 meetings of 12 Native Chicken Growers' Associations are attended this year. In addition, five (5) special workshops on production Breeding and Nutrition Committees of BONACGA are also assisted.

Production Support. This cog is divided into 3 areas; 1) the Establishment of Production and/or Grow Out Areas, 2) Breeder Infusion and 3) Feed Resource Development.

Establishment of Production and/Grow Out Areas. The office has maintained the Provincial Livestock and Poultry Farm (PLPF) in Roxas, Bilar as an institutional farm for the production of quality native chicken breeders.

The newly constructed 200-capacity native chicken house has begun to operate in July 2020 which targets to produce a yearly volume production of 6,400 good chicks. Gradually, the facility is occupied with the selected existing breeders of 80 hen-level to showcase the commercial approach on native chicken production.

The production and health management practices on this operation is aimed to be replicated in the upcoming establishment of commercial native chicken farm of BUFFC under PRDP.

Commercial Native Chicken Farm with Complete Production Segments. This facility is under the PRDP

livelihood project located at Barangay Cambacay, Batuan. It is operated by Bohol Upland Farmers Federation of Cooperatives (BUFFC), a federation composed of fifteen (15) cooperatives/associations coming from the municipalities in the third congressional district of Bohol: Batuan, Carmen, Sierra Bullones, Pilar, Duero and Guindulman. To date, this production facility is on its development/construction phase.

Meanwhile, the group is now scouting for 1,200 native chicken breeders (1,050 females and 50 males) which is projected to produce a total of 53,000-55,000 grow outs or fattened heads per year.



Small-holder Native Chicken Growers. With the reports extracted from 65 BONACGA members, the association has a current breeder population of 2,299 females and 583 males. For this year, this group has recorded a production of 13,091 chicks.

Meanwhile, the other 29 municipal-based native chicken growers associations have an estimated record of 6,525 breeders with a projected production volume of over 300,000 heads per year.

Breeder Infusion. The PLPF, as an institutional farm for native chicken, is tapped as the breeding center for production of quality breeders for infusion. For this period, a total of 500 heads of hardened chicks with a monetized value of P100,000.00 are distributed to the first 10 members of 10 native chicken growers' associations.

The establishment of Native Chicken Production Centers (NCPCs) at the municipal level is aimed to produce breeders for infusion in their respective areas of jurisdiction. In addition, these MNCPC are alternate sources

of breeders in case of disease outbreaks affecting other production centers.

These MNCPCs are supported by the provincial government thru provision of starter kits composed of breeders, poly nets, incubators and drugs/biologics. To date, there are 20 operational MNCPCs which recorded to have distributed in their respective areas a total of 1,181 heads with an equivalent monetized value of 259,820 benefitting 260 farmers.



Native Chicken Feed Resource Development. Recognizing that feeds account 60-70% of the total production cost, the use of alternative feed sources and feeding strategies are given utmost attention.

<u>Customized Concentrate Feed Utilization</u>. This year, two types of customized concentrate feed ration intended for breeders and grow-outs/or fatteners is developed. These rations are made up of local

ingredients like rice bran and tree legume leaves and added with feed additives like effective microorganisms to enhance its quality.

It is currently tested on native chicken breeders and grow outs at the Provincial Livestock and Poultry Farm. Based on data, these customized rations have yielded positive results, hitting the target of more than 25% hen per day egg production. To further test its performance on field at the farmer-level, a feeding trial is now currently conducted involving five (5) selected native chicken farmers of BONACGA.

On economic point of view, the cost of these customized feeds is at a range of P18.00 - 20.00 per kilogram, significantly lower than the commercial feeds which is pegged at P28.00-32.00 per kilogram

<u>Alternative Protein Source Production.</u> The office is promoting 2 plant-based protein sources: Azolla and Indigofera.

Azolla Gardening. Azolla, a water-fern with crude protein value of 25-30 is mainly tapped as an alternative feed protein source for native

ent to be utilized as a feed to chicke

chicken. Apart from its high protein value, it does not need any equipment to be utilized as a feed to chicken. To campaign its utilization as an excellent option of low-cost feed, setting up azolla gardens is strategically done at the municipal level, thru the Municipal Agricultural Offices. In this approach, stable supply of azolla

inoculum can be achieved and whoever interested farmers in their respective areas can avail easily such inoculum for production.

To date, a total of 47 MLGUs are provided with 4 x 3 meter-azolla pond liners for azolla gardening. As of this period, 11 MLGUs are recorded to have established azolla gardens: District 1: Antequera, Baclayon, Calape, Catigbian, Corella, Cortes, Dauis, Loon, Tubigon; District 2-Talibon and District 3-Valencia.

A total of 45 native chicken growers are also given starter kits which include azolla pond liners and azolla inoculum. These number of azolla ponds are expected to produce a total of 24,600 kg fresh yield azolla per year.

Based on field monitoring, farmers claimed that utilizing azolla on a 50:50 ration (50% azolla and 50% commercial feeds) saves almost 60% of feed cost without negative impact on the native chickens' performance.





Intensive Forage Gardening. The use of Intensive Forage Gardening (IFG) thru planting a 200 indigofera seedlings in a 200 sq meter-lot is also campaigned to native chicken farmers. Among the introduced forage legumes as alternative protein source, the Indigofera, a tree legume plant with a crude value of 27-31% is recommended on the basis that it is suitable to thrive under Bohol's climate, being a drought stress tolerant, easy to grow and tolerant to soil with low fertility.

For this year, a total of 600 farmer cooperators are campaigned to adopt this IFG. It is targeted that a 12-hectare indigofera plantation in a 3-year period will be developed with expected total fresh weight yield of over 50 tons per ha. per harvest.

To carry out the promotion of this forage, a barter scheme is implemented wherein native chicken growers will provide a 100 kg potting/sowing media to the office and in return, will receive 200 ready-to-plant seedlings in a certain period. To date, 4 native chicken growers have availed this project.

BAYANIHAN "PASSING-ON-THE GIFT". In response to the COVID-19 pandemic crisis where Bohol launched the "We Heal as One Program", the OPV implements this unique project to ensure food security and livelihood opportunities to affected families.

The project adopts a counter-parting scheme of resources where livelihood partners and other stakeholders are campaigned and encouraged to pass on a "Gift" in the form of start-up chicken breeders (4F&1M) to less privileged and interested neighbors.

To complete the package, the provincial government provides counterpart in form of production kits which include 10-meter poly net for fencing, sachets of anthelmintics, vitamins and mineral supplements. For other commodities, the counterpart includes dewormers, pack of vitamins and minerals and feed ingredients like azolla and molasses.

To date, a total of 422 donors have shared stocks to their chosen 912 beneficiaries. The donated native chicken reached to 4,560 heads with a monetized value of P912,000.00. The production support of the provincial government on the other hand, is valued at P351,200.00. It is expected that the present number of hen-level donated could produce an estimated volume production of 167,000 heads/year.

Animal Health Support Measures thru Adoption of the Unified Health Program. The office has developed a Unified Health Program (UHP) for native chicken. Recognizing that the New Castle Disease (NCD) is endemic in the province, this health protocol mainly recommends the vaccination against NCD.

For this year, 43 MLGUs out of 48 City/MLGUs have withdrawal records on NCD vaccines to cater requesting farmers in their respective areas. A total of 103 individuals, on the other hand, are directly availing the NCD vaccines from OPV. These individuals, however, are under the direct supervision of MLGUs thru the Municipal Agriculture Offices in the conduct of vaccination.

To intensify the campaign on NCD vaccine usage among native chicken growers, the office held 5 batches (5 pax per batch) of vaccination hands-on training on NCD at the Provincial Livestock and Poultry Farm in Bilar.

Capacity development. To enhance the capabilities of our partners stakeholders particularly on the production aspect of native chicken, trainings, seminars and skills demo are conducted.

For this year, a total of 29 training sessions with 614 participants are conducted with the OPV technical staff as resource persons. This is on a per request from MLGUs and NGAs assisted POs. Majority of these trainings are related to the local feedstuff utilization with emphasis on azolla cultivation technology.

Learning sites are also set up to show farmer-trainees on how to apply science-based technologies on native chicken farming. For this year, 4 learning sites are supported;

- Sto. Rosario Organic Native Chicken Farm Growers Asso. Sto. Rosario, Inabanga (PO-base)
- Jonathan Gabriel Carmen (BONACGA member)
- Ismael Tumanda Nueva Fuerza, Carmen (BONACGA member)
- Rey Masayon La Victoria, Trinidad (BONACGA member)

Marketing and Post-harvest Support. Among the associations, 3 groups are already into enterprise level.

Based on records, a total of 7,045 heads of live native chickens are sold from 81 native chicken growers. With the current price of native chicken fattener of P 220.00/kg, the sales value of the sold chicken could be at P 1,549,900.00.

To increase the market-share of native chicken meat and produce wholesome meat as well, the office allocated a budget for the procurement equipment to upgrade the mini-dressing plant operated by BONACGA. The said allocation is charged to 20% development fund and is on procurement process.

PROVINCIAL LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY FARM

The Provincial Livestock and Poultry Farm (PLPF) in Roxas, Bilar is a government-owned facility being managed by the OPV for 23 years now. It has become a vital component of the Bohol Biodiversity Complex. As such, the farm is considered a drop off point, a production and learning center that accommodates farmers, field observers and students conducting studies. Existing projects implemented in the farm include

native chicken production, swine production, goat production, waste management, animal feed development and researches.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF THE YEAR

Swine Semen Processing Center (SSPC). The SSPC is a facility for processing swine semen from tested boars of superior quality. This new facility aims to provide a state-of-the-art technology that will help smallholder pig farmers produce genetically superior offspring that are competitive in the market in terms of meat quality. It will also serve as a training center for government Technicians, private AI practitioners and farmers as well on swine artificial insemination.

The project is in partnership between UNAHCO, a private firm that specializes in animal healthcare and sells animal products and the Provincial Government of Bohol (PGBh) through the OPV.

It will be operating under a counterpart system; the PGBh provides the building or center that houses a laboratory and boar pens, the utilities like water and electric power, manpower and feeds, while UNAHCO provides 2 boars, Al apparatus and supplies.

To date, the building is already 80% completed and the goal is to put the center into operation by the second quarter of 2021.

The economic benefits of this project could be directly appreciated on its effect on saving the breeding cost and ensuring the use of disease-free semen for breeding. Based on UNACHO's standards, the processed swine semen from one boar semen ejaculation can serve 10 to 15 different sows or gilts compared to the



usual 1 adult female swine. With 2 boars at 2 collections per week, the number of served sows would average to 1,248 heads per year. This facility therefore, has the capacity to generate an estimated breeding cost value of P 1,872,000.00 per year based on current value of private-operated AI service.

On the technical assumption of 80% farrowing rate and 10 piglets born alive per litter, the indirect economic distribution then could be accounted on the 9,884 heads of projected AI offspring. With the current value of P3,000.00/head weaner piglet, the projected return of investment in monetized value of AI offspring could amount to P 29,952,000.00.

Mini-feed Mill operation. Recognizing the vulnerability of livestock and farm operations on the rising costs of feeds and the lack of cheap feed made from local ingredients, the PLPF is now showcasing a mini-feed milling operation.

The PLPF is adopting partly the natural feeding system thru fermentation, hence, the equipment utilized in feed milling has involved only crushing and mixing of local ingredients along with certain percentage of a commercial concentrate.



As of this year, the feed mill produces 4 types of customized feeds used for the 3 commodities in the farm: native pig, native chicken (breeder and grow-out feeds) and goats. Feed production for all these types is usually done once a week which typically totaled into 1.3 ton/month for the feed maintenance requirement of almost all in-housed farm animals.

It is observed that there is a significant reduction in feed costs when formulated rations are based on local feed ingredients manufactured by this mini mill. The energy source mainly used in the said rations is rice bran. The protein sources, on the other hand, are leguminous leaves of *indigofera* and azolla in the inclusion rate of

20% shredded leguminous leaves per formula. Based on the prevailing local prices of the feed raw materials used, the cost of the aforementioned formulated feeds ranges from P18.00-20.00/kilogram.

Native Chicken Project. As part of the Native Chicken Enhancement Program, the farm is now showcasing the commercial approach on native chicken production. This year, the newly constructed breeding facility is occupied with 102 breeders (82 females and 20 males).

The farm adopted two breeding strategies:

- crossing superior indigenous mature Paraokan cocks (large type strain) with the common type of female native chicken and;
- breeding superior indigenous mature cocks (large type strain) with superior mature hens.

Paraokan, a large type strain of native chicken, is selected as breeders due to its ability to produce fast growing grow-outs, a positive attribute suitable for



commercial native chicken production. Using the customized feeds formulated for native chicken fatteners, it is observed that Paraokans could attain the body weight (BW) of 900 grams to 1 kilogram in just 3 months. This BW is significantly higher than the BW of the common small strain native chicken which will take 10 months to reach the said fattening weight.



To complete the production segment, the office also allocated a budget under the 20% development fund for the construction of brooder and grower houses. The detailed plan is currently under review and approval by the Provincial Engineer's Office.

Based on the above-mentioned breeders maintained, a total of 3,598 chicks are produced this year, a 95% performance rate versus the target. It is recognized that some aspects on management must be evaluated to come up with a precise approach on native chicken production. Out from the stocks produced, 912 heads of hardened chicks with a monetized value of P182,400.00. are infused to identified or requesting POs and MLGU-operated production

centers. Some of the stocks are retained and subjected to conditioning procedures to produce more quality breeds.

Forage Bank. A Forage Bank is presently maintained at the farm, mainly intended for demo purposes and production of forage legume seedlings. For this year, a total of 14,447 forage legume seedlings and cuttings are produced to campaign on Intensive Forage Gardening (IFG) in support of the ART ICDP and Native Chicken Enhancement Program.

With IFG, it is estimated that adding 30% leguminous leaves in the diet of ruminants lowers feed cost by 25%. The aforementioned incorporation of 20% shredded leguminous leaves on the rations, however, saves 15 to 20 % of feed concentrate cost.



Swine Project: Conventional type. On late part of this year, the PLPF has new stocks of 5 swine female breeders. Out of these new breeders, 4 farrowings are recorded producing 52 piglets. To date, 42 offspring with a monetized value of P126,000.00 are distributed to partner POs as livelihood assistance.

Swine Project: Native Pig. Another venture this year is on native pig raising in support of the national program on the conservation and utilization of native animals. Seven (7) female native pigs are sourced out from Ubay Stock Farm. One male breeder, on the other hand is rented from a private individual with a piglet sharing agreement. To date, 3 heads are pregnant which are expected to farrow on first quarter of 2021.

Goat Project. Goats raised at the PLPF are specifically intended for demo purposes during hands-on training. At the beginning of the year, there are five 5 does and 2 bucks maintained at the farm that produced 8 offspring.



Five (5) of these offspring then are distributed for breeder infusion and upgrading purposes of the existing stocks of requesting PO members. The remaining offspring, however, are on pre-weaning ages, waiting for the line-up request for breeder infusion.

Farm Waste Utilization and Management. The farm is advocating the zero-waste farming wherein techniques on efficient utilization of animal wastes are adopted viz.

Vermiculture. A process where vermi worms specifically the African Night Crawler are used to convert



organic materials into humus-like materials called vermicast. At the PLPF, organic materials used are goat and carabao manure. This year, a total of 3,502 kilograms of vermicast are produced and mainly used in the production of fermented soil, a conditioning ingredient of potting media for forage seedling production.

<u>Biogas.</u> The one (1) unit bio-digester established the Bureau of Animal Industry (BAI)is still functional. It showcases pig waste/manure utilization.

<u>Poultry Waste Management</u>. In managing poultry litter, rice hulls are incorporated as bedding materials, purposely done to keep the native chicken litter dry at all times. The dry litter is important for the health and welfare of birds as well as the farm personnel assigned in native chicken project.

In addition, effective microorganisms (EM) like commercially-produced EM-1 and concoctions are sprayed once a week to the beddings in order to reduce the mal-odor level associated with the emission of ammonia

from poultry litter. The EM-inoculated poultry litter then are regularly harvested and utilized as fertilizer for forage and pasture maintenance.

Techno sharing services. For this year, the number of visitors in the farm reduced to 194 as compared to last year's registration of 340 individuals. Interests of farmer visitors are mainly on observation of feed production utilizing natural feedstuffs. The farm also caters to hands on demo on vaccination procedures.



RESEARCHES

This year, the researches relate to the design of feeding trials which aim to utilize Azolla as feed ingredient with appropriate technologies for use under field conditions. In general, such trials are done with close

participation of farmers to test interventions on real-life farmer situation.

Native Chicken Feed Formula. This test formula is designed for native chicken grow-outs. The participating farmers are provided with azolla pond liners and azolla inoculum. Thereafter, the other local feed ingredients are manually mixed with azolla grown by the farmers.

To date, 5 farmers are on the feeding phase of the test formula which is targeted to finish on the first quarter of 2021. This test formula aims to come up with a low-cost feed.

Dairy Feed Formula. This research is in partnership with the Philippine Carabao Center. It is carried out thru establishing azolla production units involving 12 dairy farmers. It aims to evaluate the use of Effective Microorganism treated Azolla as feed supplement in the diet of upgraded lactating dairy carabaos under field conditions. This is situated in Barangay San Vicente and Barangay Bong-Bong, Ubay where dairy farmers use only commercially prepared feeds as concentrate rations.

Specifically, the objectives of the study are to determine the influenced of the test formula on milk yield and its net income over feed cost. This feeding trial commenced on the last quarter of 2020 and targeted for evaluation by first quarter of 2021.



AGRICULTURAL RURAL TRANSFORMATION THRU INTEGRATED COMMUNITY DAIRY PROJECT (ART-ICDP)

The ART-ICDP is a priority program of the Provincial Government implemented through Office of the Provincial Veterinarian. The goal of the project is to mainstream dairy farming as a source of income to majority of the livestock farmers thereby making them a major contributor to the food production in Bohol.

Specifically, the project aims to:

- a) increase the income of the participating farm families by at least P30,000.00 annually;
- b) enroll at least 1,000 dairy animals yearly; and
- c) provide 100% of the milk supply requirement of the National Feeding Program for the province of Bohol.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF THE YEAR

Dairy Production Support through Program Marketing. For the year 2020, ART-ICDP started its implementation in 9 selected or identified project areas of Ubay, Mabini, Alicia, President Garcia, San Miguel, Dagohoy, Bien Unido, Talibon and Trinidad for phase 1, while phase 2 covers 10 municipalities of Getafe, Danao, Sierra Bullones, Carmen, Catigbian, Buenavista, Inabanga, Sagbayan, Tubigon and Balilihan.

Despite the COVID-19 pandemic, program presentation and marketing are conducted together with the project partners like the DA, PCC, ATI, NDA, MLGUs and BODACO, in the 7 municipalities of San Miguel, Mabini, Talibon, Tubigon, Ubay, Alicia and Trinidad.

Herd Build-up. Twenty-three (23) ambulatory clinics are conducted in the 6 municipalities of Alicia, Mabini, San Miguel, Talibon, Trinidad and Ubay serving 1,170 farmers with 1,620 animals enrolled to the dairy project. Additional project orientations on ART-ICDP are also conducted with farmers in Ubay, San Miguel and Mabini.



During these animal clinics, other services are offered and provided for free to raisers by the OPV in coordination with the Municipal Agriculture Office and the barangays.

Provision of Breeders. The Philippine Carabao Center (PCC) as one of the partners of the project, dispersed 28 carabulls and 105 caraheifers of Bulgarian Buffalo and American Murrah Buffalo bloodline, as breeders with a total book value of 3.9M. These carabaos are distributed in the areas of Alicia, Getafe, Guindulman, Mabini, San Miguel, Talibon and Ubay, thus adding to the available breedable dairy animals in the province.

Animals and Feeding Program. The Bohol Dairy Cooperative (BODACO) being the sole dairy producing cooperative in the province is provided a tractor for forage development. This year, BODACO is able to develop a total of 29.5 has. of forages which include napier, coconut, root crops, grains, corn silage and others for 3 BODACO members and 17 non-members. It should be noted that this tractor is provided to the province by the DA RFO 7.

It should also be noted that the shredders distributed are acquired through the National Livestock Program of the DA Central Office. For Azolla gardening, 7 Azolla gardens are already established in Zamora, Talibon.





Processing, Marketing and Milk Feeding. Supporting the marketing component of the ART-ICDP is the launching of milk feeding program and turnover of 6 freezers to BODACO held on November 4 at the capitol. This is a part of the PRDP assistance to BODACO in its dairy enterprise and marketing.

This year, the total raw milk produced in the province is recorded at 254,946.75 liters from 230 dairy farmers with 433 dairy animals. This volume of raw milk has an equivalent value of ₱11,082,432.00.

For BODACO alone, a total of 99,971.37 liters are produced this year with lowest production in July and highest registered production in December. Milk utilization include sale of raw milk, processed, milk testing and others.

One of the biggest markets for raw milk produced in the province is the Milk Feeding Program of the government. This year, the provincial LGU has allocated P10,348,000.00 for the milk feeding program for children aged 3-5 years old. The milk feeding spearheaded by the Provincial Government through the EDCenter, served a total of 10,055 children from the different municipalities and island barangays. It should be noted that the main supplier of these milk is the BODACO.

PHILIPPINE RURAL DEVELOPMENT PROJECT (PRDP)

The PRDP is a six-year national project under the Department of Agriculture (DA) that aims to establish a modern, value chain-oriented and climate-resilient agriculture and fisheries sector. In partnership with local government units (LGUs) and the private sector, the Project shall provide key infrastructure, facilities, technology and information to raise incomes, productivity and competitiveness in targeted areas. The Project is jointly funded by the World Bank, the National Government and the participating LGUs.

Likewise, it aims to strengthen good governance, transparency and accountability mechanisms at all stages of the project cycle. It also intends to operationalize a local-level convergence platform among relevant national line agencies and other stakeholders such as the private sector, civil society and academe to synergize programs and projects. This multi-stakeholder convergence is seen to facilitate the implementation of more relevant interventions that benefit a bigger segment of farmers and fishers, ushering them towards inclusive growth. The Project is jointly funded by the World Bank, the National Government and the participating LGUs.

Specific investments and interventions are to be implemented under 4 central components of the project, namely: 1) Local Planning (IPLAN); 2) Infrastructure Development (I-BUILD); 3) Enterprise Development (I-REAP); and 4) Project Support (I-SUPPORT).

The Provincial Government of Bohol through the Provincial Program Management and Implementing Unit (PPMIU) with its aim for a wide-ranging development in the province, has been mobilizing all the involved departments in partnership with the national and local offices to carry out all the deliverables and activities

required by the Philippine Rural Development Project (PRDP). In the overall PRDP implementation, the OPV is represented specifically in the IPLAN and IREAP components working on separate responsibilities.

IPLAN. Investment for AFMP Planning at the Local and National Levels (IPLAN) aims to strengthen the DA's planning, programming and budget execution process in support of the Agriculture and Fisheries Modernization Plan (AFMP), serves as the basis for resource allocation and prioritization of DA programs, projects and activities implemented at the national and regional levels.

In the crafting of the Value Chain Analysis (VCA) of a certain commodity by the DA-PRDP Regional Project Coordinating Office, the Provincial Core Planning Team (PCPT) for which OPV is represented, provides and gathers data and other related information of the commodity under study.

While the PCPT handles the preparation of the Provincial Commodity Investment Plan (PCIP) specific for livestock and poultry, it also assists in the preparation of the Expanded Vulnerability and Sustainability Assessment (EVSA) and preparation of PCIP's other than livestock.

IREAP (Investment for Rural Enterprises on Agri-Fishery Productivity). Through the I-REAP, PRDP will engage broad sections of the sector in the production of marketable surplus through investments in strategic segments of priority commodity value chains prioritized under the Regional Agriculture and Fishery Modernization Plan (RAFMP) and the Provincial Commodity Investment Plans (PCIPs). I-REAP is also designed to strengthen collaboration between the DA and the provincial governments. It will adopt the farm-to-table service delivery strategy being pursued under the Agrikulturang Pilipino (AgriPinoy) framework. It will utilize the Bureau of Soil and Water Management's (BSWM) vulnerability and suitability assessment (VSA) methodology and results and the participatory resource assessment (PRA) that will be conducted as bases for incorporating climate resiliency strategies.

The implementation of the I-REAP component, and the PRDP as a whole, involves several institutional partners at the regional, provincial, municipal and barangay levels. These include several national government agencies and the entire local government unit (LGU) community in the country. It also involves local communities, households, people's organizations, non-government organizations, private sector, academic institutions and other civil society sector (source: Operations Manual I-REAP Component).

ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF THE YEAR

IPLAN. It can be noted that Bohol has the highest number of commodities with approved/updated PCIP in the entire PRDP-Visayas Cluster. These PCIPs are Seaweeds, Buffalo Dairy, Native Chicken, Highland Vegetables, Cassava and Virgin Coconut Oil. All of these PCIPs have been reviewed to know the fund and resources leveraged as well as the mechanics applied for leveraging.

The RPCO-7 IPLAN reported the successful mechanisms of Bohol in leveraging resources from the public and private sector, which contributed to RPCO-7 being awarded the "Highest Amount Leveraged for PCIP Implementation, achieving Php 3.59 Billion cost of non-PRDP supported interventions for PCIP, CY 2019. This is the highest among the 16 regions implementing PRDP". In fact, Bohol received a Plaque of Recognition for this achievement.

On the other hand, the pandemic is limiting the activities of the IPLAN resulting to cancellation of some major activities. For the year, the IPLAN through its TWG has only attended meetings mostly done through virtual conferences.


On December 3, during the PSO Visayas-RPCO 7- PPMIU Bohol Virtual Meeting, the discussion focused on the inquiry of PPMIU Bohol on the Dairy PCIP and the possibility of its enhancement to cover the new slaughterhouses proposed for funding under PRDP.

In response, the PSO presented the assessment on the investments and unfunded investments of the dairy PCIP as follows:

The PCIP fund requirements amounted to a total of P5,571,700,000.00 where 62% or P3,440,662,228.00, both PRDP and non-PRDP, is funded investments while 38% or P2,131,037,772.00 is the unfunded investments.

From the funded investments, P25,926,200.00 are completed, P18,881,028.00 are on-going while P3,395,855,000.00 are proposed. As indicated in the graph below the segments on processing, followed by inputs represent the highest funded segments of the PCIP.





With the above-findings and analysis, the PSO concluded that there is no need to enhance the PCIP on dairy buffalo at this point in time, as there are still a number of interventions which are yet to be implemented and funded. The PSO thereby recommended to review the parameters used in the EVSA and to re-run it for priority ranking of the municipalities.

Similar analysis on the PCIP of native chicken will be undertaken by the TWG-OPV on the first semester of 2021.

IREAP Implementation. The Province of Bohol in its 7th year of PRDP implementation, leads in region 7 in terms of funding accessibility to implement various agri-fishery enterprises. With the passion and commitment to serve the Boholano people and with the continued support of the Provincial Officials, Bohol has contributed much to the big achievement of RPCO 7 for having been hailed as one of the best performing RPCOs with the second highest disbursements in the national scenario next to RPCO 6. The pronouncement is done during the just-recently conducted World Bank Mission in November.

Project Implementation Status. Fourteen (14) out of the 47 municipalities and 1 City have partnered with the Provincial Government of Bohol for funding support for 16 agri-fishery enterprises implemented by the 16 lead Proponent Groups (PGs). These include 12 small livelihood projects (SLPs) and 4 regular subprojects.

In preparation for the final turn-over of the projects to the PGs, 10 out of the 12 PGs have undergone the Joint Inspection Team (JIT) conducted by the PRDP partners together with PPMIU-Bohol on March 3-6. The remaining 2 SLPs, the BCCAP and LUBI MPC have submitted the final liquidation and is still on process of completing the procurement, respectively.

It is also worth to note that Bohol has accessed more funds from PRDP to implement the 4 regular subprojects of the 4 lead PGs.

Bohol Dairy Processing and Marketing Enterprise. BoDaCo in Ubay, as the lead PG, is continuously operating as the only cooperative in Bohol engaged in dairy processing and marketing. Very sad to note that because of the COVID-19 pandemic, sales and income of the enterprise is very much affected generally by the current pandemic outcome such as i) suspension of classes since schools are the big markets of dairy products produced by the PG, ii) closure of market outlets of BoDaCo particularly in Panglao and iii) closure or very limited operation of resorts, hotels, restaurants and other establishments.

The continued support of the Provincial Government thru the OPV, EdCenter and with continued collaboration with partner agencies such as the PCC, NDA, DepEd, and DSWD, the PG has been able to cope up the losses as they are the sole supplier of RTDs for the Feeding Program of the province amounting to 5.9 Million.



BoDaCo has completely delivered the pasteurized fresh milk to the 25,000 malnourished Boholano school children until last quarter of this year. BoDaCO will also be partnering with DepEd and PCC for another feeding program launched on November 4, for the succeeding year 2021.

As the year is about to end, the BoDaCo has received equipment support from DA-PRDP and the Provincial Government of Bohol which include i) 3 units chest-type freezers, ii) 3 units upright freezers and iii) 2 units of chillers.

The fund is still part of the first tranche release received by the PG in January of 2018. To date, the PG and PLGU-Bohol are working closely to expedite the procurement of remaining goods, especially the refrigerated van which is already long overdue.

For this year, the BODACO has recorded a gross income of P20,785,785.82 and a net income of P6,248,125.91.

With the aim of expanding market as well as promote dairy products produced, BoDACo also requested Governor Yap to put up a display center within the capitol premises. To date, the PG is awaiting the response of the Gov.

Batuan Native Chicken Breeding and Chicks Hardening Facilities and Marketing Enterprise. This enterprise is operated by the Bohol Upland Federation of Farmers Cooperatives (BUFFC) of Poblacion Sur, Batuan, the second regular subproject of Bohol. BUFFC received the first tranche assistance amounting to 3.1M pesos in October 2019.

The procurement of goods and construction of the Communal Native Chicken Production Center is delayed because of additional requirements by PRDP especially in relation to the civil works component of the subproject. In July, the PG procured 1 unit brand new hauling truck and one package of construction materials for the native chicken facility.



With these procured goods, BUFFC has reached the 50% fund utilization and able to submit the first liquidation documents to RPCO 7 in November. The second tranche fund is already downloaded to the PLGU on the third week of December.

To date, BUFFC is preparing the required documents to claim the second tranche. All other related activities are set for next year.

Bohol Virgin Coconut Oil (VCO) Production & Marketing Enterprise. The COVID-19 pandemic could be a brighter business opportunity of another PG who is a beneficiary of a 9.2 Million pesos subproject, implemented by the Lead PG, the Kinagbaan Coconut Farmers and Processors Organization in Kinagbaan, Jagna, together with other 4 cluster organizations from Antequera and Calape, with total members of 203.



This enterprise is an enhancement to the existing kitchen-type VCO processing of the Lead PG. This aims to increase the production capacity of the group towards catering the need of the market especially that VCO is highly recommended by DOST to boost the immune system to fight against any diseases, like COVID-19.

On November 4, the PG KCFPO received the first tranche funds amounting to 3.060 M in a ceremonial turned-over by Governor Yap. As of now, the PG has procured 2 units of delivery vehicles: the hauling truck for the procurement of raw materials and close-type delivery vehicle for their finished products.

Construction of a VCO Processing facility in Kinagbaan, Jagna is also on-going.




Bohol Seaweeds Production, Consolidation & Marketing Enterprise.

This enterprise is operated by the Alumar Farmers and Fisherfolks Association of Alumar, Mahanay Island, Getafe, amounting to 23.8 Million. The project is for the enhancement of the existing farming activities of the 287 seaweeds growers from the towns of Getafe, Talibon and Mabini. The PG received the first tranche amounting to 4.565 Million on November 4 during the Turn-over Ceremony with the Gov.

Seaweeds farming inputs such as P.E ropes, plastic straw and bamboo poles are already procured, geotagged and distributed to the 200 first-in-line beneficiaries. In addition, the PG has an ongoing construction of seed weeds warehouse in the later part of the year and the procurement of other goods such as pumpboat and seaweeds seedlings to fully operate their enterprise.

On the other hand, the Provincial LGU is facilitating the procurement of a wing van as a marketing support to the enterprise of the PG.





Bahalina Production and Marketing Enterprise. Operated by PEGAMMALO in Loon, this is one enterprise that shows positive and increasing income during this pandemic. The strict community quarantine

restrictions including the liquor ban enables the bahalina product to expand its market as many drinkers diverted and patronized their product.

This year, the PG is able to generate a gross sale of P4,373,150.00 and net income of P430,287.00. Another positive impact for PEGAMMALO is their increasing membership that now covers Maribojoc and Calape.

Native Chicken Enterprises. The PGs engaged in native chicken enterprises are not performing well as breeders are aging and need to be replaced and technical problems of the incubators. These resulted to very minimal income of the enterprise affecting financial capability to shoulder the operating expenses such as salary for the caretaker, payments for utilities (water & electricity) and procurement of feeds.

With these concerns, OPV is continuously supporting the native chicken enterprises by providing input supplies such as azolla, corn grits, molasses and EM for them to formulate their own feeds, thus defraying the cost of feeds.

Despite the problems encountered by these PGs, monthly reports are still regularly submitted to the PPMIU-IREAP. Sad to note that most of the SLPs as reflected in the reports show no operation or net loss.

Project Monitoring, Assessment and Review. With the occurrence of COVID-19 pandemic, the field monitoring activities of partners are limited. In February this year, an Auditor from the COA Provincial Office



conducted a random monitoring on the 4 implemented SLPs, 3 in Balilihan and in Loon. This activity is a follow-up audit done last 2019.



The PRDP partners also conduct monitoring thru virtual or zoom meetings with PPMIU- I-REAP and selected Proponent Groups on very important and urgent concerns. For I-REAP, the monitoring activities are being continued and are done regularly. Because of the restriction on mass gathering, PG meetings are done only thru convening the Officers/BODs.

A review and assessment are conducted in September with the BoDaCo in Ubay, to enhance the Operations Manual (OM) of the Bohol Dairy Processing and Marketing Enterprise. However, this OM is not yet adopted by the General Assembly due to restriction on mass gathering.

Capacity Development. With this new normal, PRDP continues to capacitate the PGs especially in the aspect of product marketing. The problem of PGs to market their product is being responded by PRDP thru the National Project Coordinating Office (NPCO) I-REAP with an Online Training on Digital Marketing. This is conducted in 3 batches, September 25 & 28 and October 9 and participated by the Project Managers of the PGs and the I-REAP staff of PPMIU-Bohol.

BOHOL RABIES PREVENTION AND ELIMINATION PROGRAM

The Bohol Rabies Prevention and Elimination Program is a locally-initiated comprehensive program launched in 2007 and was conceptualized with the ultimate goal of eliminating rabies disease in the province. Its implementation is multi- sectoral with the participation from the national government agencies, provincial, municipal and barangays LGUs involving the 47 municipalities, the City of Tagbilaran, the 1,109 barangays and non-government institutions.

The program is implemented through 7 components such as i) social mobilization, ii) dog population control and management, iii) dog bite management, iv) massive dog registration and rabies vaccination, v) communication management, vi) surveillance and vii) monitoring and evaluation.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF THE YEAR

Social Mobilization. Rabies program orientations to partners like the Municipal Rabies Prevention and Elimination Council (MRPEC) and the Bantay Rabies sa Barangay (BRB) are conducted to improve awareness and strengthen program implementation. This year, the 3 municipalities of Albur, Loboc and Pilar have undertaken para legal trainings conducted by the OPV in close coordination with the Municipal Agricultural Offices.

Dog Population Control and Management. The growing number of stray dogs and cats in the communities has posed danger to people of all ages in terms of bites, fecal and urine pollution and vehicular accidents. Despite the issuance of laws and policies, stray dogs continue to be seen in streets, in public buildings and even resorts and beaches.

Spay and neuter is one strategy used and thereby plays a major role in controlling dog population in particular and eventually, rabies elimination. Priority areas is served based on request of the municipalities or barangays. The OPV spearheads the activity with support from volunteer Veterinarians and the municipal agricultural offices through its livestock technicians and the BALA.



This year, massive spay and neuter is conducted in 11 municipalities serving a total of 1,090 animals, of which 935 dogs are and 155 are cats benefiting 799 clients.

Dog impounding and euthanasia is another strategy to control dog population and is governed by the existing law, the Republic Act No. 8485 otherwise known as the "Animal Welfare Act of 2007 which is amended to Republic Act No. 10631. Without this guidance, disposal of stray dogs may lead to maltreatment, torture or suffering of animals which are punishable as stipulated in the law.

Technical and manpower is supported to LGUs to guide in the dog impounding activities. Presently, only 22 MLGUs have temporary shelter and dog cages while most have no facilities and paraphernalia, rather, rely on the OPV.

To support and strengthen implementation at the municipal level, mobile dog cages are procured and provided to 12 municipalities and pole net frames for 47 municipalities. A guideline has been set in the selection of LGUs especially in the distribution of dog cages, prioritizing those areas that are regularly conducting dog impounding, with existing dog shelters and trained dog catchers as well.

The Office also rendered 32 times technical assistance to 8 requesting MLGUs for training of dog catchers, dog impounding and euthanasia. These municipalities include Baclayon, Calape, Loon, Panglao, Sagbayan, Alicia, Candijay, Mabini and the City of Tagbilaran. Ten (10) designated dog catchers are trained in Calape in a two-day training, lecture and practicum with emphasis on proper and humane way of handling/impounding stray dogs.

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Though there are several requests for trainings received this year, only Calape is pushed through. Several MLGUs opted to cancel these activities due to government-imposed restrictions on movement and social distancing. Other requests are denied for non-compliance of requirements such as standard dog cages, shelter for impounded dogs and designated pre-exposed dog catchers before the training will be conducted.

Four (4) job order personnel who are designated as dog catchers are hired to provide manpower support to MLGUs during dog impounding and euthanasia. A total of 272 dogs are impounded and humanely eliminated covering the areas of Loon, Panglao, Baclayon, Sagbayan and Calape.

Dog Bite Management. As a form of support to MLGU and BLGU in rabies program implementation, a budget is allocated for the procurement of 40 vials human rabies vaccines for pre-exposure prophylaxis (PEP) to program implementers identified to be highly at risk, as well as for the post-exposure treatment of vaccinators accidentally bitten during vaccination.

A total of 174 high risk personnel received the PEP on the first quarter of this year. The Provincial Health Office (PHO) provided additional vaccines to augment the number of doses needed since the number of personnel submitted for immunization increased vis-a-vis the targeted count.

Though PEP is successfully facilitated, several constraints affected its implementation such as i) failure of the LGUs to submit on time the list of beneficiaries despite several follow up, ii) rescheduling for failure of MLGU staff to come on schedule, iii) non-completion of others on the 3-doses



regimen and iv) the institution of PEP is dependent on the time availability of the PHO staff.

Massive Dog Registration and Rabies Vaccination. The 3-month period massive rabies vaccination scheduled from March to May is greatly affected by the Covid-19 pandemic when the whole province was under Enhanced and General Community Quarantine starting mid-March. Because of movement restrictions and social distancing imposed by government, a few LGUs who have started dog vaccination on time stopped and later resume, while others did not start as scheduled until restrictions have been relaxed.

There are municipalities who cancelled the barangay-to-barangay vaccination and opted to do it at the Municipal Agriculture Office on a per request basis. Apart from the effects of the pandemic, vaccination schedule for 2020 is not synchronized. A number of LGUs also decided to conduct vaccination on the second semester only.

Pre vaccination activities are undertaken like briefing orientation with Municipal Livestock Technicians which emphasized requirements like dog population survey, vaccination schedule and schedule for PEP before rabies vaccines will be released. Vaccination paraphernalia such as alcohols, disposable syringes and needles are also provided in advance. A number of MLGUs are supplied with dog cards and dog tags. A total of 6,045 dog tags are distributed to considered 13 high risk municipalities including Mabini, Jagna and Sagbayan.

A total of 9,911 vials or 99,110 doses of rabies vaccine are distributed to the 47 municipalities and the City

of Tagbilaran this year. Though vaccines are enough to cover the 70% vaccination target for the entire province, vaccination coverage for this year is quite low with 78.6% or 872 of the 1,109 total barangays of the province.

For 2020, a total of 94,327 head of dogs are vaccinated representing 53.10 % of the total dog population.



Communication Management. Information Education and Communication (IEC) has a very essential role in promoting awareness to the general public on rabies disease elimination and responsible dog ownership. For the 2020 Rabies Awareness Month Celebration every March, the Governor issued a Memo Advisory enjoining all LGUs to conduct awareness campaigns about rabies and its prevention measures including promotion of Responsible Pet Ownership together with putting up of streamers using the theme "Rabies ay Iwasan, Alagang Aso't Pusa ay Pabakunahan".

The Rabies Awareness Month is celebrated in a simple way with activities that include spay and neuter and with some areas starting massive vaccination activities early. For the World Rabies Day Commemoration last September 28, the Office together with the MLGUs installed streamers and produced and distributed information materials.

A total of 5,008 copies of rabies leaflets are distributed during the conduct of program orientations, paralegal trainings and other related activities. A total of 140 flash drives that contained rabies information are also distributed to 48 municipal SK Chairmen and Municipal Link – DSWD staff. In addition, this year, 6,966 tarpaulin are distributed to the 48 LGUs with information of penalties for violators.

Surveillance. Because rabies is a fatal disease and could be transmitted to humans, continuous surveillance is needed to determine the presence of the disease in the province. Annually, the office is collecting and submitting dog head samples for routine surveillance and from rabies suspect biting dogs to determine and confirm the presence of the virus.

The office failed to achieve the targeted 40 dog head samples this year. Collection is stopped due to the suspension of transport carriers for inter-island travel. It could be noted that dog head samples have to be sent to the Regional Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory (RADDL) in Mandaue City for examination.

There are only 10 dog head samples collected from the municipality of Pres. Carlos P. Garcia as part of routine surveillance and being declared Rabies - Free Zone. Out of the 10 samples submitted, 1 from the barangay of San Vicente is confirmed positive for rabies antigen.

To evaluate and verify reports on suspect and probable human rabies deaths, disease investigations are undertaken together with representatives from the Provincial Health Office. Contact tracing of possible exposure to rabies suspect biting dogs is also done in coordination with the Municipal Agriculture Office to initiate preventive and control measures. This year, investigation is conducted on the reported probable human rabies case in Loboc and canine suspect cases in Lila and Inabanga.

Movement of dogs and cats is also regulated following the issued DA Memo – Circulars especially on transport of animals. Necessary documents such as veterinary health certificates and updated rabies vaccination records are the pre – requisites before the animals are allowed to be transported. The said documents are being checked by the Veterinary Quarantine Inspectors (VQI) posted in the different ports

and sub-ports of the province. A total of 77 veterinary health certificates for dogs and cats shipped outside the province are issued this year.

Monitoring and Evaluation. Most targeted consultative meetings and assessments have been cancelled this year due to pandemic and the issuance of the Governor restricting the conduct of gatherings like meetings. Instead, the allocated budget for these activities is re-aligned for projects identified to mitigate the effects of the pandemic and help the affected farmers and individuals.

The Office is only able to conduct 1 consultative meeting participated by Municipal Agriculturists and Municipal Agricultural Officers. This activity is intended to evaluate the progress, accomplishments, and discuss issues concerning implementation and enforcement of policies at the municipal level. Budget allocation of some meetings are also re-aligned.

MEAT CONTROL AND SAFETY PROGRAM

Assuring the safety and quality standards for consumer products related to livestock and poultry, the safe flow of food of animal origin from the point of production to the table of consuming community.

The program involves all municipalities including the City of Tagbilaran and is implemented through 2 components; component 1. Strengthening the Provincial Meat Inspection Service and component 2. Upgrading and Strengthening Municipal Meat Inspection Service

ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF THE YEAR

Strengthening the Provincial Meat Inspection Service (PMIS). Presently, the PMIS is lodged at the Animal Health Division of the office. However, as soon as the meat inspection service unit shall be created, all functions and responsibilities will automatically be transferred and carried out by such division.

At the provincial level, the Provincial Meat Inspection Service will soon be officially created when the PMIS ordinance shall be approved. At present the draft ordinance is already prepared and subject to review together with representatives of the NMIS, however, the pandemic limits the conduct of the activity as scheduled.

To date, there is still a need to enact the ordinance and create a functional and organizational structure to strengthen the implementation of the Meat Safety and Control Program.

Upgrading and Strengthening Municipal Meat Inspection Service. Only 1 joint meeting with City, Municipal Meat and Quarantine Inspectors is conducted on August 7, in coordination with the Bureau of Animal Industry (BAI) and the National Meat Inspection Service (NMIS).

Feed backs during the meeting has caught the attention of the office on the proliferation of meat-based food businesses such as i) slaughtering of hogs in the barangays, ii) household deliveries, iii) ambulant selling and display of pork in makeshift markets along roads and talipapas; without these products having been inspected by authorized municipal meat inspectors/staff in the locality. This problem has emerged a result of the oversupply of hogs brought about by the economic impact of the pandemic. When hotels, resorts and restaurants closed and fiesta celebrations are cancelled, farm gate prices have gone down to P80-90 per kilo and traders stopped buying due to difficulty in the shipment of hogs to their regular markets outside Bohol.

Backyard hog raisers find it very difficult to market their farm produced and experience losses in their enterprise. However, the government compromise the safety of the public as these activities may be contributory to cross contamination of foods and eventually results to food-borne illnesses, increasing the risks of spreading zoonotic and other animal diseases

Relative to this, Governor Yap has issued a Memorandum Circular No. 2020 – 017 enjoining all local Chief Executives of the province to strictly implement existing guidelines issued by the DA, the NMIS and other concerned national government agencies.

This memo also serves as a guide for MLGUs in the registration and licensing of food business operators. Moreover, MLGUs are enjoined to formulate and enact additional local ordinances to regulate slaughter and sale of meat and meat products as well as strengthen implementation of meat inspection in their areas of jurisdiction.

Specifically, for the municipalities of Duero and Pres. Carlos P. Garcia, task forces are created to conduct monitoring and surveillance of unlawful activities pertaining to trade of live hogs, slaughter and selling of meat and meat products. The Office has also developed a system and come up with protocols to facilitate trading of live hogs.

On the last quarter of the year, illegal activities have curbed as markets started to improve. Hotels, resorts and restaurants started to open and trading of live hogs expanded up to Luzon.

Monitoring Operation of Municipal Slaughterhouses and other Meat Establishments. Semestral monitoring of functional slaughterhouses is performed; however, not during actual operation considering that slaughtering schedules are at night time. Monitoring is also undertaken on meat shops, restaurants, malls and the satellite markets in Tagbilaran City in coordination with the City Veterinarian's Office.

This year, the NMIS conducted an independent assessment in the municipal-operated slaughterhouses. Findings are presented during the consultative meeting on Feb. 27, for corrective actions with regards to slaughterhouse operation and improvement of slaughterhouse facilities.

Generally, the facilities do not conform to structural standards; some are old and dilapidated. These hinder compliance to policies especially on good hygienic slaughtering, handling and manufacturing procedures. Conduct of post abattoir inspections and monitoring of public /wet markets are also recommended to ensure that all meat and meat products sold are safe and wholesome.

The day-to-day operation of municipal slaughterhouses requires all Meat Inspectors from the 29 municipalities to submit monthly slaughter reports to the OPV for collation and consolidation. Data gathered represents part of the total animals slaughtered in the province and at the same time reflect the quantity and capacity of every operational slaughterhouse.

The consolidated provincial reports are forwarded to the NMIS Regional Office while the data from private-operated slaughterhouses and dressing plants, are collected by the provincial-based Meat Control Officer and deputized Meat Inspectors of the NMIS.

In 2020, a grand total of 114,746 heads or 8,445,503 kilos dressed weight are recorded from 31 operational slaughterhouses; 53,635 heads of which come from the municipalities and 61,111 heads from private slaughterhouses and poultry dressing plants.

Compared to the slaughter records of 2019, there is a reduction in the number of heads slaughtered in all commodities. This is an indication on the effects of the pandemic rather than the emerging African Swine Fever in Luzon and Mindanao.

Benchmarking of Public Markets. One of the prioritized activities for year 2020 is the conduct of benchmarking in public markets provincewide to evaluate existing compliance to meat safety measures in the markets. Because of the IATF restrictions due to Covid-19 and the pressing need to focus more on ASF preventive measures, benchmarking is undertaken only in 30 LGUs.



The summarized benchmark findings are as follows:

Products Sold

- It is noted that the types of products sold in the market are pork, beef and poultry. Pork and beef are sold raw/fresh while chicken is sold frozen or cut ups
- Pork is largely sold in all public markets while beef is only found in big municipalities.
- The pork and beef sold in LGUs with functional slaughterhouses are produced from their slaughterhouses while those without a slaughterhouse facility, animals are slaughtered at the house of meat vendors
- Chickens are sourced out from accredited poultry dressing plants such as Marcela and Magnolia, and are sold as frozen, chilled whole dressed or cut ups.

Required Documents

- Most LGUs with operational slaughterhouse and with designated Meat Inspectors are not issuing Meat Inspection Certificates except for Tagbilaran City;
- MLGUs of Calape, Tubigon and Catigbian used gate pass instead while the other LGUs are using the issued Official Receipts as gate pass to control meat vendors to go inside the market;
- During the visit, it is also noted that most of the vendors have Health Certificates, being one of the requirements in getting business licenses, however, only few included their personnel;

Utensils

- For utensils, generally, wooden chopping boards are used:
- Pails are used as containers for entrails and blood;
- Plastic crates or "banyera" are used to transport meat from the slaughterhouse;
- The utensils are brought home but some are kept in lockers provided by the market management;
- Accordingly, meat vendors are cleaning their utensils and display areas after conducting business using detergents and food grade disinfectants like chlorine;

Health & Hygienic Practices

- Every vendor wore the required face mask being one of the preventive measures for Covid – 19;
- Meat vendors from Baclayon and Sagbayan are wearing hairnet and apron but in some markets only the meat slicer wore apron;
- Pest control is not undertaken in all public markets.

Product Display

- Meat and meat products are usually displayed on top of wooden or concrete tables with plastic cellophane lining or table cover or placed in plastic or aluminium trays in most MLGUs;
- Slatted stainless tray used for displaying meat and meat products are found only in Tubigon;
- Others are hang using deformed round bars and some are painted.
- In newly renovated public markets with new meat section, meats are in direct contact with the tiles

Slaughtering Facility

- Per interview, these meat vendors claimed that they have their own slaughter/dressing areas which are inspected by the municipal sanitary inspectors from time to time;
- Floor dressing is not practiced as slatted table tops though made of bamboo are devised and used;

Other Facilities

- Most of the meat sections are located in an open area which are prone to flying ash and dust but are not prone to flooding;
- Toilets and wash rooms are commonly used;
- All meat sections in public markets have no ceiling. It is only in Loon that the top of the meat section is covered with transparent plastic cellophane as protection from birds' feces;
- No objectionable odors are observed. Most have enough working space and have common unloading area for the whole market operation in all MLGUs visited;
- The use of lighting is not always practiced however some vendors are still using the yellow bulb which is not allowed:
- Cracks and indentations in few meat sections are noted;

The above-findings are targeted for presentation in year 2021 to concerned MLGUs as basis for improving management on the meat section within their public market.

IEC. As part of the food safety assurance, activities include the conduct of a 1-day seminar on Food Safety in coordination with NMIS and LGUs of Catigbian and Baclayon thru the Municipal Agriculture Offices. A total of 50 meat and barbeque vendors attended the seminar on November 18 and 19, at their respective municipal training centers.

Together with the representative from NMIS, the office also conducted an orientation on meat inspection policies, food safety and formulation of Slaughterhouse Manual of Operation on November 25th attended by key personnel of Sagbayan.

Apart from the seminars, the Meat Safety Consciousness Week is also observed on the third week of October along with MLGUs in a very modest way thru putting up of tarpaulin with the theme, "Sa Anumang Panahon Malinis Na Karne Ang Layon".

Upgrading of Slaughterhouse Facilities thru Provision of Slaughterhouse Equipment. There are only 29 functional municipal-operated slaughterhouses in the province categorized as locally registered meat establishments (LRME); Two (2) other slaughterhouses and 1 poultry dressing plant are privately-operated that are accredited as "Double A".

With this current situation, it is envisioned to upgrade capacity of existing and newly constructed slaughterhouses as well as establish poultry dressing plant with "Double A" standards to ensure production of safe and healthy meat for public consumption. Likewise, to give more opportunities to Bohol's meat and

meat products gaining access to export markets. This year, the Office has strategically identified the LGUs of Sagbayan, Loon, Valencia, Balilihan and Tagbilaran City.

To harmonize with national standards, representatives from NMIS are invited to conduct assessment of structural design and identify the needed equipment to make the facilities operational and qualify for "Double A" category where results of the assessment are presented and discussed with the concerned LGUs.

For Sagbayan, the Provincial Government through the OPV has allocated 3.2 M for the procurement of recommended slaughterhouse equipment. Other modifications of structural design and improvement will be a counterpart and to be shouldered by concerned LGU.

On the other hand, because of bigger funding requirement needed for the completion of Loon and Valencia slaughterhouses, renovation of Tagbilaran City Slaughterhouse and construction of a Poultry Dressing Plant (PDP) in Balilihan, these projects are proposed for funding assistance from PRDP which are set for technical evaluation this coming January 15, 2021.

Series of consultations are conducted with Local Chief Executives along with their key personnel to gain support and cooperation especially in the preparation of feasibility studies, detailed engineering designs and program of works. Besides, representatives from the Provincial Engineer's Office together with staff from PRDP conducted inspection of the site and facilities.



LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY DISEASE PREVENTION AND CONTROL PROGRAM

Disease prevention and control program concerns with safeguarding the health of livestock and poultry in the province to attain self-sufficiency in foodstuff of animal origin and to produce quality animals for draft and breeding purposes involving different industry players from both government and civil societies. Primary focus is towards economically important and emerging diseases.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF THE YEAR

Implementation of Animal Health Programs for Livestock and Poultry. Drugs and biologics procured by the PGBh-OPV and the Department of Agriculture RFO7 with an estimated amount of P1,762,282.00, are provided to the Municipal Agricultural Offices and BALAs in support to the implementation of animal health activities.

Disease Outbreak Investigation, Surveillance and Monitoring. Eight (8) disease investigations are conducted this year affecting cattle, native chicken and hogs.

For swine, reports received on the early part of the year are from Duero, Lila and Albur. Investigation reports show signs and symptoms of fever, loss of appetite, nasal discharges and difficulty in breathing, tentatively diagnosed as mycoplasma and enzootic pneumonia as the animals responded to antibacterial treatment.

For cattle, 5 heads are reported with complaints on inappetence, labored breathing, lameness and blood-stained feces. As signs are indicative of hemosep, vaccination is then recommended in the adjacent barangays and municipalities to curb the infection. Sporadic cases of hemosep are also reported in Albur, Sikatuna and Dauis but are contained after immediate veterinary services.

Particularly for Sagbayan, the Disease Surveillance Team immediately conducted disease investigation on reported high mortality of native chickens in several barangays. Based from signs and symptoms observed, the disease is tentatively diagnosed as NCD outbreak. Immediate ring vaccination is carried out in the nearby barangays to prevent further the incursion of the NCD virus. In response, the OPV provided NCD vaccine to the MLGU for the conduct of ring vaccination and continued monitoring in the nearby barangays.

In line with the regular surveillance for economically important diseases such as FMD, NCD and AI, a total of 522 blood samples are collected this year from different species and submitted to the Regional Disease Diagnostic Laboratory for sero-testing.

For AI surveillance, sample collection is conducted 2 times. First collection is prior to the arrival of migratory birds and the second is during post migratory period. With reported AI cases in the early part of this year, the conduct of blood sampling among our local poultry species is indeed necessary.



With the presence of migratory birds in 4 sites of Bohol, particularly in Panas, Candijay, Poblacion, Pilar, Sag, Talibon and Sambog, Corella, surveillance is done in the months of February to March and October to November, in time of the pre- and post-migratory period.

A total of 180 samples are collected and subjected to Real time PCR testing at the RADDL. Based on the lab results, all samples submitted are negative for type A viral RNA.

Part of disease surveillance is the conduct of regular monitoring of all livestock and poultry facilities like livestock oksyon market, slaughterhouses, farms as well as projects. Activities include provision of technical assistance and supervision in the conduct of basic animal health programs like vaccination, deworming and compliance to bio-security protocols. These are undertaken to assure healthy animals for meat-based food supply to the Boholano constituents.




Figure 1. Map of Facilities and L & P Projects

The Office supervises the implementation of the Unified Animal Health Program as well as health monitoring of native chickens raised in Production Centers. Assistance is also rendered to native chicken growers, members of partner organizations and to MLGUs with Municipal-based Native Chicken Production Centers in Dauis, Loon, Dimiao, Valencia, Alicia, Candijay, Sikatuna and Antequera.

The 2 operational Livestock Oksyon Markets in Catigbian and Sagbayan is also regularly monitored during operation. This year, 23 visits or monitoring are recorded where the assigned Veterinarian inspects the condition of animals displayed especially in the compliance to animal welfare. Veterinary health certificates are also issued to animals for slaughter and shipment.

Most of the activities of the Livestock Disease Preparedness Program are implemented but are not fully achieved. It can be noted that the major factors involved in accomplishments are the restriction imposed, the work from home policy, lack Veterinarians to carry out the veterinary services and the intervening activities that need to



be prioritized within the pandemic period.

Mobility is not an issue at this point in time with the availability of the veterinary ambulatory clinic named BRAVO which is provided by the DA RFO 7 in 2019. For 2020, BRAVO utilization recorded a total of 113 services as follows:

The NCD Laboratory located near the BMCI, is targeted to be operational this year, however, the facility is not yet officially transferred to the Provincial Government from the DA RFO 7, pending approval of occupancy permit from the City Government.

The operation of the Provincial Health Care and Laboratory (PAHCUL) which is beside the NCD Laboratory, is momentarily suspended. Part of the facility until at present is utilized as a storage area for materials and veterinary supplies in the absence of a storage room or warehouse. The office also lacks personnel especially Veterinarians to man its operation. With this situation, laboratory activities are very negligible.

Processing of blood serum for sero-surveillance and 5 necropsies of sick or dead animals on a per request basis, are only conducted for the year.

Strengthening Program Implementation. In our efforts to protect the province from emerging and reemerging diseases, a joint coordinative meeting is conducted for LGU-based Meat and Veterinary Quarantine Inspectors, Livestock Technicians and Municipal Agriculturists. This is aimed at aligning office programs and projects vis-a-vis the targeted activities of municipal LGUs.

Plan for the current year is presented during the first meeting of the year. Implementers are also informed of new policies, standards and protocols to ensure that it is cascaded down to the municipal and barangay levels. Issues and concerns related to meat and veterinary quarantine inspection are discussed with representatives from the Bureau of Animal Industry and the National Meat Inspection Service to strengthen the activities of these services.

Reports from municipalities are reviewed to check and validate with the focal persons for consolidation and prompt submission to the national government. Aside from these, the office also attended virtual meetings sponsored by line agencies such as Department of Agriculture and the National Meat Inspection Service to be updated of the activities of the national government.

Extension and Technical Support. Free animal clinics are conducted during Agri-HEAT and HEART Caravan spearheaded by the Provincial Government, Dagyawan sa Barangay sponsored by DILG and through requests from MLGUs especially during foundation days and agri-fairs as well as those initiated by the Office.

To date, 41 barangays in 15 MLGUs are served which include referrals, consultations, treatments, vaccination and deworming. A total of 2,275 clients are attended (1,410 males, 865 females) with 15,110 animals served involving a total cost of P496,356.70.

Free services to walk-in clients seeking for assistance is also offered by the office. For the year, a total, of 784 clients are attended with 418 served for referrals, 540 for consultations, 6,496 treatments, 1,1993 vaccination, 2,278 deworming, and 5,932 on vitamin supplementations

Services are also rendered to 500 clients requesting inspection and issuance of veterinary health certificates with a total of 5,527 animals inspected for slaughter and for shipment.


The office through the animal health division is also able to serve 7 times as resource persons during the conduct of Barangay Livestock Aide Refresher Courses sponsored by the Agricultural Training Institute in Antequera and Maribojoc, Corella, Loon, Pres. Carlos P. Garcia, Trinidad, Lila and Loboc.

African Swine Fever (ASF) Preparedness and Contingency Plan

Considering its geographical location, the province is relatively safe from direct spread of livestock diseases, however, as an island with several ports of entry this also poses danger where illegal entry of live animals, processed animal products and animal by-products could possibly occur.

To regulate animal and product movement, manpower and logistical support are provided to strengthen the operation of the provincial quarantine service which includes 1 major seaport, 12 sub-ports and 1 international airport. These areas are directly managed by the Bureau of Animal Industry (BAI) Veterinary Quarantine Service.

It can be noted that ASF started in August of 2019 in the Philippines. In January of 2020, Mindanao had its first reported case in region XI which later on expanded to region XII and a present case in region X particularly in Iligan City in the late part of November.



As a pro-active response, the Prov.l Government through Gov. Yap issued EO 5 and EO 56 banning the entry of live hogs, pork and pork products as well as regulating the entry of feeds and feed raw materials from Mindanao to Bohol to prevent the possible incursion of the ASF virus into the province.

Fortunately to date, the province of **BOHOL REMAINS TO BE FREE FROM ASF** and is still classified to Green Zone according to the Bureau of Animal ASF Zoning and Movement.

This year 2020, the ASF Provincial Response and Contingency Program is fully operational. A total of 44 M is allocated for program implementation. Twenty-two (22) Veterinary Quarantine Inspectors are hired to augment the 11 ports and subports, 1 airport and the one-man BAI-Veterinary Quarantine Office in Bohol.

Bio-security measures are in placed with the installation of foot mats, advisory signages, procurement of disinfectants and power sprayers, IEC materials like leaflets in vernacular, English and Chinese versions are also reproduced with a total of 30,400 copies distributed to incoming passengers, barangay officials and other stakeholders.

Quarantine Inspectors are designated to inspect, apprehend and confiscate shipped-in hogs and hand-carried pork and pork products, though incoming passengers are very minimal due to travel restrictions with the Covid-19 Pandemic towards the second quarter till December.

For January to March, a total monetized value of P87,357.50 worth of products are confiscated /apprehended; with P69, 472.50 pork products and P17,885.00 returned to sender.

At the height of the COVID-19 pandemic in July, the Quarantine Inspectors (QI) are also assigned to conduct disinfection of all vehicles coming from outside the province to prevent possible entry of COVID-19 virus. A total of 27,406 vehicles are disinfected and issued with disinfection clearance for the whole year.

Moreover, with the issuance of EO 56, QI's are also tasked to check incoming feeds whether it bears the required necessary documents and issued notices to shippers/feed dealers to follow feed quarantine protocols.

In addition, series of meetings are conducted with the members of the ASF Provincial Executive Committee, with different stakeholders including Municipal Agriculturists,

Livestock Technicians, Veterinary Quarantine Inspectors and Quarantine Aides, Barangay Livestock Aides, shippers, traders, swine raisers, feed dealers/suppliers and shipping companies for consultations and information sharing and updating.

Apart from these, barangay to barangay IEC is conducted in Albur and Baclayon to provide ASF updates to barangay officials and the possibility of illegal entry of live hogs, pork and pork products through fisher folks.

I. HIGHLIGHTS OF 2020 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The COVID-19 pandemic equally makes and breaks to ATI-7's delivery of training and extension services. It makes by maximizing the full potential of the workforce to innovate methodologies to continue serving its clients and stakeholders in the island- provinces of Central Visayas. It breaks because of the restrictions caused by the virus where face-to-face activities as well as gathering of large crowds and field-base implementation were prohibited; plus, challenging connectivity in the field and the limited movement of forwarders were untimely arrival of starter kits and among others.

But all of the above mentioned, pivots ATI-7's 2020 accomplishments. Anchored with LEADS (Learn, Exhibit, Advise, Dissemination and Support), the center enables to achieve significant stride.

Strengthening Competency & Competitiveness through Capability Building

LEARN






ATI-7 Participants Profile





4. On-Station Mushroom Technology Module

> Implemented to introduce mushroom production as another income source of the farmers and improve the knowledge and technology that is currently used by our farmers.

Significant accomplishments:

- 1. Conducted training with the ALS-Ubay with 45 students and 5 participants from Philippine Army as requested and sponsored by LGU- Ubay. Some training requests from interested groups were cancelled due to the threats of COVID-19 Pandemic.
- 2. Produced 118 (118%) bottles of tissue culture, 413 (103.25%) bags of spawn and distributed 126 (126%) bags spawn of oyster mushroom.
- 3. Produced 30 (60%) bottles of straw mushroom and 11 (28%) bottles of milky mushroom while the sub-culture (spawn) was 20 (40%); for straw mushroom and 9 (18%) for milky mushroom. Very low accomplishment due high contamination rates resulting to no available source for tissue culture.
- 4. Produced 3,836 (100%) fruiting bags and distributed 668 (61%) fruiting bags. Distribution is very much affected due to the threats of the COVID-19 Pandemic, walk-in clients is very limited;
- 5. Harvested 162.5 (102%) kilograms of oyster mushroom.
- 6. Distributed 70 (23.3%) IEC materials since there were no more trainings conducted due to the Pandemic; and was able to assist 1 Mushroom Grower at Pob. Sur, Carmen, Bohol.

Significant Accomplishments:

Maintained 50 heads native chicken as breeders and produced 150 offsprings (120% of the annual target) through egg incubation (40%) and laying (60%).

2. Offspring Production of Ducks

Maintained 80 heads of duck as breeders and produced 78 offsprings (111% of the annual target) through egg incubation.

3. Animal Distribution

Distributed 78 heads of duck to 13 farmer beneficiaries of Batuan, Bohol and 20 heads to a beneficiary from Achilla, Ubay, Bohol. A total of 98 ducks was successfully distributed to 14 farmer beneficiaries which counts 126% of the annual target.

80 heads native chicken was also distributed to 10 members of Cancatac Farmers Association last September 9, 2020 in Corella, Bohol, 3 farmers from Bilar, Bohol and 1 from Batuan, Bohol.



I. HIGHLIGHTS OF 2020 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

CY 2020 was a pandemic year and everything that was normal was drastically changed due to COVID 19. Amidst the health crisis, health protocols and new normals were introduced in order to lessen if not prevent the spread of the virus to the people. Everyone felt and faced the challenges adapting the protocols and new normals in everyday life. Sequentially, this pandemic has brought tremendous effect in the implementation of the programs of the Department both in terms of physical and financial matters. Ten percent (10%) of the budgetary allocation of two sectors Land Tenure Security Program (LTSP) and Agrarian Justice Delivery Program (AJDP) were recalled by the Department of Budget and Management (DBM) while Seventy percent (70%) budget realignment was implemented in the Agrarian Reform Beneficiary Development and Sustainability Program (ARBDSP) sector.

To beat the changes, hardships and challenges faced during the pandemic year, DARPO Bohol embraced other means such as use of online social media and other communication technology and set up strategies in order to meet the target for the year.

In CY 2020, an overall rating in LTSP of One hundred sixteen percent (116%), AJDP with one hundred three percent based on caseload (103%) and one hundred eleven percent (111%) in ARBDSP. In LTSP, the high accomplishment was attributed to activities other than Land Acquisition and Registration. Land Acquisition and Registration are two of the highlight activities for LTSP, but because of the complexity and underlying problems/hindrances not to mention the protocols implemented due to COVID 19, greatly affected the acquisition and registration of lands for CY 2020 targets. The rates of accomplishments for these two indicators were only twenty three percent (23%) and thirty three percent (33%) respectively.

Figure 1 shows accomplishment in terms of gross area because the performance of the department is measured in terms of its gross area. Out of 42,744 hectares coverage, 41,108 hectares were already accomplished which is equivalent to 96%.

Figure 2 on the other hand, shows accomplishment in terms of acquired area. This is the actual area distributed to the Agrarian Reform Beneficiaries (ARBs). Data shows that out of 41,656 hectares carpable agricultural lands,40,368 hectares or ninety-seven percent (97) were already distributed to 33,184 ARBs




In terms of gross area, only 1,636 hectares of agricultural land is subject to acquisition and distribution in the succeeding years.

Below are the main programs and activities of the Department that were implemented in the Province of Bohol for CY 2020.

LAND TENURE SECURITY PROGRAM

Land Tenure Security Program is operationalized either through land acquisition and distribution (LAD) or leasehold operations. LAD involves the redistribution of government and private agricultural lands to landless farmers and farm workers. leasehold operations, on the other hand, is the alternative non-land transfer scheme. It covers all tenanted agricultural lands such as those in the retained areas, not yet acquired for distribution under CARP, and those which may be validly covered under existing laws.

Land Acquisition and Distribution (LAD)

Land Acquisition and Distribution (LAD) involves the redistribution of all public and private lands to qualified farmers and farm workers, subject to the retention limit and just compensation to landowners. LAD involves complex processes such as land identification and documentation, conduct of land survey, land valuation and compensation, preparation of land distribution folder, land title registration and land title distribution. Below are the activities under LAD.

In table 1, One of the highlights of activities is the registration of EP/CLOA. For CY 2020, only 98.2912 of its 302.0000 hectares targets was registered or equivalent to only 33%. This figure represents the gross area. The actual area distributed to 46 ARBS was 49.8030 hectares. This accomplishment came from private agricultural lands.

Leasehold Operation

Leasehold operation covers tenanted lands that are within the allowable retention ceiling of five (5) hectares per landowner. The share tenancy arrangement between landowner and tenant could be transformed into a leasehold arrangement. The tenants become agricultural lessees who, instead of paying the landowner a percentage share of the produce, will instead pay a fixed rental that is computed on the basis of historical production records.

Table 2 shows the accomplishment on leasehold for the year which is 51.0851 hectares as against the target of 49.0000 hectares. This is equivalent to 104% involving 81 ARBs.

Post LAD Activities

Post LAD Activities include the following: subdivision survey; redocumentation and registration of Collective CLOA; Redocumentation of Distributed but not yet Documented (DNYD) landholdings, Generation of LDIS and Installation of Uninstalled ARBs. The table below will show the targets and accomplishments for the year.

Table 3 shows that two (2) indicators were not met. Subdivision of Collective CLOA and Generation LDIS were achieved garnering 106% and 127% respectively.

II. Agrarian Justice Delivery Program (AJDP)

This second major program is the delivery of agrarian justice that involves adjudication of agrarian cases and agrarian legal assistance. Successively, AJDP is one of the contributory programs in terms of high accomplishment for DARPO Bohol. Since the influx of cases is uncontrollable, this sector is usually rated against its caseload.

a. Adjudication of Agrarian Reform Cases (AARC)

The DAR Adjudication Board (DARAB) through the Provincial Adjudicator is vested by law to exercise its quasi-judicial functions to hear and resolve agrarian reform cases. These cases mostly involve agricultural tenancy and land valuation.

Below are the activities under AARC with corresponding targets and accomplishments.

Under ADJP Program, the forecasted figures were budgeted but in terms of accomplishment it is measured against caseload.

The highlight of activity under AARC is the resolution of cases, all other indicators are subsequent activities related to the resolution of cases except LAD related activities.

The table above reflects that the resolution of cases was met 100% based on caseload.

Agrarian Legal Assistance (ALA)

Agrarian legal assistance is comprised of resolution of agrarian law implementation (ALI) cases, ARB representation before judicial and quasi-judicial bodies, and mediation and conciliation.

There are three types of cases under this program namely: judicial or court cases, quasi-judicial, and cases related to agrarian law implementation (ALI). The first two types involve representation of farmers by DAR lawyers before the regular courts and DAR Adjudication Board, respectively. The third type involves the administrative rendering of decision on exemption, conversion and retention.

The DAR utilizes more aggressive alternative dispute resolution techniques in mediation to reduce conflicts maturing into court cases. The general objective is to persuade the contending parties to settle their disputes amicably or out of court before the DAR.

Table 5 reflects that all of the forecasted figures were accomplished. But based on caseload, the accomplishment of representation in Judicial Courts was only 60% because 4 of these cases were already at the regular courts waiting for decisions. The over-all good performance for Legal Division is the result of good team work, perseverance of the employees involved in attaining the targets and most of all the logistics support extended by the DAR Management.

III. AGRARIAN REFORM BENEFICIARIES DEVELOPMENT AND SUSTAINABILITY PROGRAM (ARBDSP)

Agrarian Reform Beneficiaries Development and Sustainability Program (ARBDSP) is a key service delivery program that is geared at providing the women and men ARBs and smallholder farmers and their organizations within the Agrarian Reform Communities/Areas (ARCs/ARAs) with gender-responsive and appropriate interventions to make them more resilient, productive, enterprising and become active players in sustainable communities.

The services are delivered to the beneficiaries either individually or collectively through their organizations (ARBOs) and/or communities/areas (ARCs, ARC Clusters, ARAs), (convergence) either through direct implementation or facilitation and coordination with the other CIAs such as the DPWH, LBP, NIA, DOLE and DTI and other CARP key stakeholders such as the Pos, NGOs, CSOs, the academe, the business/private sector, other GFIs.

In order to attain its vision, ARBDSP focusses on the following sub-programs namely: Supervision and Management for Effective Delivery of Support Services; Social Infrastructure Building (SIB); Enterprise Development and Economic Support (EDES); and Climate Resilient Farm Productivity Support (CRFPS). Below are the regular activities under ARBDSP:

Social Infrastructure Building (SIB): Laying the foundations of Rural Development

SIB focuses on the capacity development of Agrarian Reform Beneficiaries (ARBs), Agrarian Reform Beneficiaries Organizations (ARBOs) and the community as well. ARBs are trained to equip them with the necessary knowledge especially on how to safeguard and sustain the coffers of every cooperative or agribusiness enterprise.

It is in this component where community organizing activities are undertaken and convergence initiatives with CARP Implementing Agencies (CIAs) for delivery of the provision of support services to ARBs. Due to health and economic crisis, the top management has directed all operating units, realignment of funds of some regular activities to ARBold Move for Deliverance of our Farmers from the COVID-19 Pandemic Project.

The next table shows the targets and accomplishment of regular activities under SIB.

Enterprise Development and Economic Support (EDES)

To empower and transform the ARBs into progressive entrepreneurs and to promote economic growth in the rural areas, DAR implements Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSME) development strategy. In this scheme, ARBs are given technical assistance and agricultural extension services to capacitate them with the skills and knowledge towards producing quality and competitive products and services.

DAR also provides marketing assistance with ARBs thru linkages with prospective agri-investors and other product buyers. Among these are the regular conduct of trade fairs and establishment of marketing centers. The Marketing Assistance Program aims to hasten the development and establishment of enterprises in the ARCs. This is carried out by building and sustaining links between and among farmer entrepreneurs, cooperative producers, processors, agribusiness firms, other institutional buyers, and service providers. Development and commercialization of ARB products is supported by DAR through market information assistance, product development and enhancement, resource mobilization with partners such as DTI, LGUs etc., and support to participation in local and national trade fairs.

In response to the directive of the top management to enhance partnership against hunger and poverty as well as intensify the marketing of products of our ARBs thru ARBOs, DARPO Bohol has successfully facilitated and assisted two (2) of our ARBOs, namely PNB-KGB and Bohol Bayanihan Multi-Purpose Cooperative to enter into marketing agreement to six government entities within the province, namely; Bureau of Jail Management and Penology, Tagbilaran City Jail, Carmen District Jail, Talibon District Jail, Ubay District Jail and Don Emilio Del Valle Hospital. The products involved are vegetables, fruits, crops and rice. The two ARBOs have been actively marketing their products to the above-mentioned government entities.

Other than the regular support services, DARPO Bohol also maintains the extension of technical assistance to the projects or good innovative approaches developed thru the foreign/local projects initiatives such as:

Establishment of grass roots micro-finance in Agrarian Reform Areas Thru Members Savings Operation (MSOs), (MICOOP) and DAR - CARD, INC. Capability Development Program or the Savings and Credit System which is a quasi-bank or bank like operation. The establishments of a quasi-bank particularly in areas where banks and other financial institutions are not available help a lot in terms of savings and loan accessing by our Agrarian Reform Beneficiaries. It started with a few thousands of pesos as operating capital. Through the years of extending technical assistance, there are already MSOs that are declared as millionaires. In CY 2020, Visayan Eskaya MPC of Biabas, Guindulman and Katipunan Farmer and Eskaya Credit Cooperative were launched as Members Savings Operation (MSO), making a total of twenty (20) MSOs, two (2) cooperatives under DAR-CARD and one (1) cooperative under NATCCO, around the province, namely:

Other activities that DAR have been engaging was the facilitation of enrollment of all ARBs with Registry System for Basic Sectors in Agriculture (RSBSA). This is actually a program of the Department of Agriculture but in order to help the ARBs in receive or avail assistance from DA and other institutions. DAR's major role in this activity is the conduct of massive information drive on the advantages and disadvantages of being enrolled in the RSBSA. For CY 2020 the target set for DARPO Bohol was 5,716 ARBs enrolled but the accomplishment was only 1,497 ARBs or equivalent to 26%.

Another initiative of DAR to help the ARBs recover their capital for their crops in times of drought, La Niña or other natural calamities is the provision of free insurance premium coverage for all ARBs. ARBs are made cognizant of this program thru information campaign by DAR fieldmen. The target DARPO Bohol in CY 2020 was 1,750 ARB of which 828 ARBs were insured or equivalent to 47%

IV. ORGANIZATIONAL PROFILE

For CY 2020, the personnel strength of DARPO Bohol is one hundred four (104) of which 3 are detailed from other provinces. Of the 3 detailed personnel, one is holding a third level position.

DARPO-Bohol has five cluster field offices. Forty-seven (44) of its employees are assigned to the different clusters while sixty (60) employees are assigned at the provincial office.

Data and Information Management

Data and information management have played a crucial role towards reflecting the needed information as basis for decision making by the management in the course of implementing a program/project.

DAR Bohol is using and maintaining Operation Tool (OPTOOL) which provides information of LAD accomplishments and balances; Legal Cases Monitoring System (LCMS) which monitors the status of case folders. This system enables the Secretary of the Department to monitor the case folders via online. Due to pandemic the Information Technology Enabled Maturity Assessment (ITEMA) tool was not utilized due to travel and mass gathering restrictions.

V. PUBLIC MANAGEMENT

Strengthening PARCCOM is a vital move for the department. Its role is to coordinate and monitor all CARP-related activities to ensure the integration, strengthening, and intensification of the various program components of CARP on Land Tenure Improvement (LTI), Program Beneficiaries Development (PBD), and legal assistance/promotion of agrarian justice. They shall anchor their coordinative role on the area-focused

operation approach to enhance efficiency and effectiveness. The PARCCOMs may also recommend to the PARC Executive Committee (ExCom) any innovative or alternative approach to implement agrarian reform.

In CY 2020, PARCCOM was only able to conduct eight (8) regular meetings due to COVID 19 related restrictions. Monitoring of completed and on-going CARP Projects and the Inventory of ARBs in some selected areas are the major activities of PARCCOM.

In order to give quick response to the needs of the clienteles, DARPO Bohol has created and maintained the Public Assistance and Complaints Coordinating Unit (PACCU). For CY 2020, DARPO Bohol has gathered 195 responses from the walk-in clients served. The overall rating for the services rendered was Very Satisfactory.

Information plays a vital role to establish and maintain partnership with the key players in the implementation of the Comprehensive Agrarian Reform Program with Reforms (CARPER). The key players include the agrarian reform beneficiaries, CARPER implementing agencies, foreign donors, academe, people's organizations, among others. These stakeholders including the general public deserve to know what the DAR Provincial Office of Bohol has been doing through the years.

For press releases, in CY 2020, DARPO Bohol was able to prepare and publish seven (7) press and photo releases; one (1) success story and one hundred forty-four (144) events were subjected to press releases and published in local newspapers, in-house publications of DAR and posted in the FB website.

Bohol maintains its strong partnership and linkaging the Provincial Local Government Unit by regularly and actively participating on their programs such as the Provincial Development Council, Enhanced Comprehensive Local Integration Program (ECLIP), Provincial Peace and Order Council (PPOC); Community Development Program/Purok Power Movement (CDP/PPM).

For CY 2020, DARPO Bohol has maintained its interpersonal partnership such as:

- Linkages with DAR Line Agencies like DA, Provincial Agriculture Office, ATI, PCA, NIA, DTI, DOST, APC, DSWD, DENR, LGUS and the Provincial Government Unit.
- Attendance to the regular meeting of Association of United Development Information Officers-Bohol (AUDIO-Bohol) and participating AGRI-Talk, a development program of the Agricultural Training Institute (ATI), Region VII;

I. HIGHLIGHTS OF 2020 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

A. PROCUREMENT

NFA's palay procurement aims not only to boost its rice inventory, but also to provide farmers a fair return of their investment should farm prices fall below the government support price. NFA's new mandate under RA 11203 or the Rice Tarrification Law is to aggressively focus on palay procurement from local farmers to fulfill its bufferstocking function intended for calamitites/disasters. For 2020, NFA Bohol has procured at least 7,513 bags of palay or 107% procurement accomplishment which was attributed to the low exfarm, prices of palay which ranged from P12.00 to P18.00 per kilogram during the last quarter of the fiscal year.

B. DISTRIBUTION

A total of 8,882 bags of rice were distributed in 2020 which marked a 48.05% accomplishment of the year's target of 182,900 bags. This year's rice distribution at 251,185 bags since NFA has temporarily suspended its rice sales through all its authorized outlets and shifted its focus to LGUs, DSWD, and other relief institutions for COVID-19 pandemic response.

From the total volume distributed, 55% or 48,427 bags were released in response to various relief operations particularly as food packs for families who were directly affected during the community quarantines implemented at the height of the COVID-19 pandemic. NFA has also provided the monthly rice allocation for Persons Deprived of Liberty (PDL) and DSWD's bufferstocking requirements / food packs in support of their disaster preparedness programs.

Prices of rice stayed at affordable levels during the year despite the health pandemic due to ample availability of commercial rice in the market. Retail prices of regular milled rice (RMR) averaged at P37.75/kg, well milled rice (WMR) at P41.79 kg, premium rice at P51.54/kg, and white corngrits at P33.31/kg.

C. TECHNICAL RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT

NFA Bohol strictly adheres to its policy of stock quality maintenance and good warehouse keeping. All its stored rice were ensured of quality standards befor they were released and distributed.

The retrofitted biomass furnace located at FLGC III warehouse in Carmen enabled the NFA to procure wet pay form local farmers particularly during the wet cropping season. A total of 3,872 bags of wet palay were dried using NFA-owned driers to ensure that all palay stocks procured has attained a maximum moisture content of 14% and will be safe for long-term storage.

NFA-Bohol has also undertaken three (3) Repair, Maintenance and Technology (RMT) projects for CY 2020 to include: Repair of GID Warehouse Flooring, Site Development of FLGC III Warehouse in Carmen and the Upgrading of NFA Bohol's Electrical Syustem. All three projects were properly posted at the PhilGEPS website and underwent proper bidding procedures.

D. FINANCE

Total controllable expenses incurred by the office this year amounted to P2,310,496.82. The amount is 19.65% lowercompared to 2091's expense of P2,875,382.04.

E. HUMAN RESOURCE MANAGEMENT AND MANPOWER DEVELOPMENT

The total warm bodies as of ecember 31, 2020 are 26 employees. Four (4) employees were separated from service due to retirement. On employee benefits, the office was able to pay all salaries as well as state and corporate benefits on time.

F. PUBLIC AFFAIRS

All NFA's program and activities were widely disseminated through print and broadcast media and during various coordination meetings with its stakeholders.

The agency proactively addressed various issues and concerns raised by the public through media interviews and consultative meetings with other government agencies to discuss the agency's plans and programs.

I. HIGHLIGHTS OF 2020 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Over the years, Bureau of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources has been helping our country in protecting fisheries and aquatic resources and empower stakeholders to improve productivity as what its mission aimed and a vision of "An institution of excellence in sustainable fisheries management and services contributing to the nations food security by having 20% fish surplus and improving fisherfolks quality of life by 2030". All along, the guiding framework that motivated and inspired the PFO-BOHOL staff to move in implementing programs and projects which help Boholano Fisherfolks alleviate their poverty incidence by providing livelihood support, technical assistance and so on.

For the year 2020, BFAR-Bohol implemented programs such as Targetted Action to Reduce Poverty and Generate Economic Transformation (TARGET), Special Area for Agricultural Development (SAAD), Stimulus Projects and additional programs/projects under request. Aside from that the office also renders services such as follows: fingerlings dispersal, conduct training/orientation/seminars/iec, licensing and inspection for Commercial Fishing Vessel, fishpond

rental/ collection which BFAR-PFO Bohol collected an aggregate amount of Php 1,169,750.00, issuance of fishworkers ID Issuance of local transport permit and among others.

Accomplishment for 2020 shows a collaborative effort of BFAR-PFO Bohol with its stakeholders/project beneficiaries in executing/implementing the programs.

I. HIGHLIGHTS OF 2020 ACCOMPLISHMENTS


The BIPC and Bohol BOSS continued to serve its clients even with the ongoing pandemic. Although other services have been limited in sorts, service remains as top priority being the one-stop shop for business registration and the investment promotion arm of the province.

Strict health protocols and guidelines are being followed while service-orientation and client satisfaction remains as our core values.






Since 2010, Bohol BOSS kept track of data on investments generated from the province's Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) from the Business Name Registration Data of Bohol BOSS and all Negosyo Centers in the province.



Comparative data highlights the resilience of the Boholanos and its local economy even after the calamities in 2013 and this year's ongoing pandemic, after all it's business unusual.

Last year was record-breaking for the province of Bohol in MSME investments which totaled to P2.25 Rillion


Investments generated from business registrations for 2020 are <u>32% lower than in 2019</u>, while <u>29.35%</u> lower than in 2018.



2019 total business name registrations reached a total of 8,554, 42.09% higher than in 2018.

Annual BN Registrations for 2020 reached a total of 6,554 which is **23.38% lower than in 2019**, but **8.87% higher than in 2018**.

Although BN registrations are slightly higher than in 2018, investments generated are lower which can be attributed to the increase in the number of micro-retail and food manufacturing establishments that do not necessarily generate high capitalization.




This graph shows the annual average of business name registrations, wherein only <u>16.3% are renewals</u> from the overall total number of registrations for the last 10 years, although the total number of new registrations in 2014 have decreased wherein 37.1% of total applications were renewal, which could be an effect of the 2013 calamities.


Aspiring entrepreneurs made up majority of those who registered; **86.8%** of business name registration in 2020 are **new applications**.

New BN Applications in 2020 are <u>22% lower than in 2019</u>, but is <u>12.56% higher than in 2018</u>, while renewal applications are <u>31.34% lower than in 2020</u> and <u>10.48% lower than in 2018</u>.

It was in 2010 that the BIPC implemented the **Bohol BOSS Information Management System**, a system that greatly enhances data analysis and information generated from Bohol BOSS data on business name registrations which has been continually enhanced over the years. The system includes data on employer and employee sex disaggregation, and new and renewal application classification.




This graph on sex disaggregation of business owners shows a consistent trend in entrepreneurship among Boholano women, with an average of **53% more women in business** than men in the 9-year period of 2012-2020.



Employment generated from business name registrations has also consistently increased marking its highest in **2019 at 17,960**.


While in **2020**, employment generated by MSMEs reached a **total of 12,597**, which is **29.86% lower than 2019** but shows **very minimal difference to 2018**.



This graph on employment disaggregation shows an average of **12.5% more male employees** than females from 2012 to 2020. Compared to the graph on disaggregation of business owners, it shows a greater role of women in the paradigm of Boholanos in business.

SEC HELPDESK AT BOHOL BOSS

In January 2013, the Bohol BOSS Securities and Exchange Commission Helpdesk started serving clients which offered assistance in Stock and Non-Stock Corporation Applications and ensuring that all requirements and payments were complete. One of the officers also did liaisoning services to the SEC-Cebu Extension Office, delivering and processing the applications collected every month. Initial feedback from applicants were tremendously positive as it saved them a lot of time, effort and resources, rather than processing their applications in Cebu themselves. Through this manual services provided for by our Helpdesk, it took just a month or less for the registration of a complete application and the consequent release of SEC registration certificates.



In 2020, Our Bohol BOSS SEC Helpdesk has rendered services to a total of 514 walk-in client queries, and has assisted in the approval of 25 applications, coincidentally and exactly the same as in 2019. Our SEC Helpdesk Officer, also offered phone-call inquiries services and follow-up services of applications, while working at home during the start of the pandemic.


The number of walk-in clients, does not necessarily mean the number of unique individuals as they are counted per repeating session/ inquiry with our SEC Helpdesk Officer. Most of our clients visit the SEC Helpdesk at an average of 10 to 12 sessions per application.


Number of approved applications vary, depending on the number of clients needing assistance. Regardless, however, applications coursing through our <u>SEC Helpdesk have consistently had 100% approval by the SEC</u> and consequently issues their certificates of Incorporation.

Clients repeatedly visit the SEC Helpdesk repeatedly for multiple queries regarding their applications, which indicates significant need for advisory and technical assistance.


Walk-in and on-call inquiries at the SEC Helpdesk in 2020 is comprised by Non-Stock Corporations in the majority at 62% or 320 clients, followed by 30% Stock Corporations or 154 clients and 8%

Partnerships or 40 clients, out of the 514 total clients served.





The opening of more Negosyo Centers in different areas proved successful as its primary purposes are to provide comfort to far-flung applicants and to distribute the load of Bohol BOSS to other Negosyo



Centers at the same time increasing the overall total of annual business name registrations from the different centers.

This year the Bohol Business One-Stop Shop (BOSS) – Negosyo Center Bohol managed to render services to **3,827 clients**.

BIPC and Bohol BOSS makes sure that customers are heard through daily feedback from the regular customer satisfaction survey.

Customer satisfaction rating has stayed consistently high every year on all indices at an average of **90.96% in 2020.**



III. BIPC Activities CY 2020

BEFORE COVID

On **January 30, 2020**, the BIPC held an **Investment Forum** where we invited over Municipal Mayors and their respective Local Economic and Investment Promotion Officers and Municipal Tourism Officers at the Provincial Capitol, CPG Hall.

Resource speakers for the event included Board Member Jade Bautista, SP Committee Chair for Tourism, Trade and Industry; Atty. Lucas Nunag, Provincial Tourism Council Chairman; the DILG Provincial Focal Person; Atty. John Titus Vistal, Provincial Planning and Development Coordinator; Josephine Cabarrus, Bohol Tourism Officer, and Ms. Maria Fe M. Dominise, BIPC Head,

The forum had a **total of 70 participants including 3 Municipal Mayors**, which were enjoined to set up their office structure with corresponding budget in order to be able to come up with their municipal profiles and promotional materials, including the legislation and adoption of their Local Investments and Incentives Code.





In 2019, the **Angat Buhay Women**, a flagship anti-poverty program the Office of the Vice President, held a 3-day capacity development training that focused on developing the basic competencies needed by aspiring entrepreneurs which included the evaluation of business ideas, creation of a business plan, business registration setup, lectures on key business principles, and mentoring sessions at the Bohol Bee Farm in Dauis.

On **February 21, 2020**, Angat Buhay Women in partnership with SPARK Philippines returned to Bohol and conducted the **Aspiring Women Entrepreneurs Boot Camp** with the Bohol BOSS and BIPC partners at the Panda Tea Garden Suites.

And again on February 27-28, 2020 at the Kew Hotel.





COVID-19 Mitigating Measures, Initiatives and Interventions

I. Policy Advocacy

Mitigation measures – Provincial Price Coordinating Council

The BIPC, as secretariat of the Provincial Price Coordinating Council, initiated meetings with the Council on **March 13 and 20, 2020** to discuss the possibility of price increases of basic and prime commodities in the province as a repercussion of the enhanced community quarantine declared by Governor Arthur C. Yap and how they may be prevented.





The Council also agreed that each mandated agency, responsible for the monitoring and enforcement of suggested retail prices release issuances and set price ceilings and suggested retail prices of said commodities.

On **April 22 and 28, 2020**, follow up council meetings were conducted to discuss the finalization of a legislative action to prevent price increases in the markets.

Consequently, the BIPC drafted Executive Order #19 – EXPANDING THE MEMBERSHIP OF THE PROVINCIAL PRICE COORDINATING COUNCIL. The purpose of the expansion was to engage more national and provincial government agencies in the enforcement of price control and monitoring of basic and prime commodities especially during crises and emergency situations.

The BIPC also drafted Executive Order #20 - REITERATING THE PRICE CEILINGS, SUGGESTED RETAIL PRICE AND PRICE FREEZE OF BASIC COMMODITIES IN THE PROVINCE OF BOHOL AND CREATING A PROVINCIAL PRICE MONITORING JOINT TASK FORCE TO ENFORCE THIS ORDER AS A MEASURE INSTITUTED TO ADDRESS THE ONGOING THREAT OF COVID-19.

The said EO reiterates the recently issued suggested retail prices, price ceilings and price freeze of commodities such as processed goods, fruits, vegetables, livestock, fish and meat, liquefied petroleum gas, medicines, medical supplies and equipment, etc.

Apprehension and filing of cases to found violators of EO #20 by Provincial Price Monitoring Joint Task Force led to the successful regulation of prices of basic



commodities in the markets throughout the province, in accordance with set Suggested Retail Price and Ceilings.

Enhanced Bohol Investment Promotion Program (EBIPP)

The EBIPP Team is active in the participation of efforts for economic recovery within the province. Several meetings and online video conferences were conducted with EBIPP partners for the purpose of crafting an emergency plan and/or recovery plan for the business sector and economy of the province.

II. COVID-19 Mitigation Activities as Member of the Logistics Cluster

FACE MASKS PRODUCTION

The BIPC received a direct order from Provincial Administrator Atty. Kathyrin Fe D. Pioquinto to outsource the production of face masks for distribution by the Office of the Governor to the Provincial Government of Bohol employees, frontliners, and for constituents during medical relief missions.





Provincial Administrator Pioquinto tapped the aid of the Bohol Provincial Employees' League (BOPEL) for funding and to work in partnership with the BIPC.

The BIPC, exceeded its initial target of 6,000 face masks and has produced a total of 7,600 face masks in a span of three (3) weeks from various sources; BISU-MC, Balilihan Women's Association, Catigbian Teachers and Students Group, Tubigon Manufacturing, Cortes AISO, Jagna Weavers, Loboc Bahian Women's Association and Antequera Weavers, which have been submitted to the Office of the Governor.





DONATIONS

The BIPC tapped its partnerships with private sector groups such as the Bohol Chamber of Commerce and Industry, Inc., Provincial Tourism Council and the Bohol Association of Hotels, Resorts and Restaurants, encouraging said groups to submit donations in kind to the Provincial Government.

The private sector groups gladly obliged to the call to help their fellow Boholanos and have donated items such as, beds, bed sheets, pillows, toiletries and fabrics, among others, which will be mainly used for the temporary Quarantine Centers at the Capitol Annex and the Bohol Cultural Center.

Bohol Online Market Project (Agri Retail Trade (ART) Online Merkado)

The BIPC was also tasked in the conceptualization of an online marketplace, dubbed as the Agricultural, Retail and Trade or **ART Online Merkado**, which is planned to have multiple features that will serve as an online portal to grant consumers access to market goods and products at the comfort of their homes, with the option to go for cashless transactions.



Several meetings were conducted with potential partners for the development of the project.





The project proposes to tap the habal-habal drivers as courier service providers, to provide alternative livelihoods for these displaced individuals during the pandemic.

Meetings were also conducted with the Boholano Cooperative representatives and the banking sector to get their participation on the project.



On April 7, 2020 the BIPC met with Credit Surety Fund (CSF) partners for the project where Ms. Dominise, head of BIPC, presented the provincial government's Credit Surety Fund Loan Program in response to the pandemic and the ART Online Merkado Project to the Cooperatives where it was agreed that the Coops may avail of the loan, granted that they would likewise offer loans to their members with annual interest rates of as low as 8% while the banks would offer loans to the Coops with annual interest rates of as low as 4%.



On **May 20, 2020,** another forum was conducted with the BCCSF officers on the mechanics of said program; Introduced the proposed Agri-Retail & Trade Online Merkado (FB Page) to the BCCSF and the Local Finance Committee, as a possible initial phase of the online market platform while the actual program is under development.

The ART Online Merkado Project is **currently in the development stage** with the BIPC in close coordination with the service provider which targets to release the program within the year.


As of December 2020, a 4th Prototype of the system has been submitted by the developers to BIPC for product testing and critiquing.

MSME Survey/ Poll on the effects of COVID-19 to their businesses under ECQ Guidelines

At the beginning of the implementation of the COVID-19 Enhanced Community Quarantine Measures, the BIPC initiated a survey/ poll on the effects of said measures and the pandemic as a whole to their respective businesses.

BIPC crafted a survey form called "Pulso sa Gagmay'ng Magpapatigayon" and was used to interview 50 respondents through phone calls with registered MSMEs and Corporations from the Bohol BOSS Database.

Respondents varied from different business sectors such as retail, transportation, tourism, accommodation, food, manufacturing, etc. to ensure that all sectors were covered.





Data analysis and observations were made and results were converted into graphs and visuals through a report which was later presented to the governor.

The information gathered served as a guide in the crafting of provincial government intervention programs to the most affected sectors based on the survey results.

MSME Survey /Poll on the effects of COVID-19 to their businesses under MGCQ Guidelines

Another round of survey is ongoing on the effects of COVID-19 to business under the Modified General Community Quarantine Guidelines. The survey started late September and is still ongoing.

The second survey aims to check the status of the business sector whether the more lenient MGCQ guidelines have initiated the re-opening of businesses of the different sectors or if they have remained closed.



Infographic Materials on COVID-19 Provincial Updates, Guidelines and Advisories

BIPC staff have been requested by Governor Yap to regularly design and create updated infographic materials on COVID-19 for information dissemination by the province's official media outlets.

Said staff is also tasked in the creation of the **Governor's weekly Press Briefing presentations**.

III. Investment Promotion

community life.

Albur Creative Village Project

The Albur Creative Village Project was conceptualized in late December 2019 after a meeting with the BACH Council Executive Committee and the DTI.

Albur makes for a very attractive tourist destination, in that, in just a small town that is strategically located, one can see rich and diverse local cultural traditions and artisanal works, such as, wood carving; pottery; loom, hat and mat weaving; traditional asin tibuok salt making; broom making; calamay processing, painting and sculpture. Urna making and wood carving is a living industry. This village development approach is an innovative model spearheaded by the Provincial Government, as Albur reflects a rich microcosm of Boholano heritage, culture and faith- based traditions and typical



The Village will help re- open Bohol's tourism economy, provide employment and income- generating opportunities, and empower communities and stakeholders.



The BIPC is tasked as lead implementing agency in close coordination and partnership with the BACH Council Chairman, Fr. Val Pinlac, and LGU Albur in the development of said project.

Several meetings were conducted with LGU Albur, including a Sangguniang Bayan session where the PGBh and the lot

owners of proposed project location were convened to discuss the project.

More meetings were also conducted by the BIPC with the Project Coordinating Team where re-design of the project has been established based on the recommendations of various stakeholders involved in the project.

The project is currently in the Land Acquisition Phase and with the Memorandum of Agreement with LGU Alburquerque already finalized by the Provincial Government of Bohol.

A formal MOA-signing activity has been set in February of 2021.

Product Development

In **April 2020**, the BIPC developed an *urna* **prototype** in collaboration with Fr. Val Pinlac and entrepreneur Ms. Crispina Singh, in response to the governor's request for the PGBh to develop its own token using Boholano cultural designs and methods.

The *urna* design was approved by Governor Yap and is now being used as the official token/ souvenir item for PGBh guests and was also used during the conduct of PHITEX 2020.





Gift boxes: samplers for further enhancement

The BIPC sought assistance from entrepreneur, Vicky Wallace, to try out possible gift boxes with prototypes ready for further product development and enhancement

PHITEX 2020 tokens and souvenir bundle Sample Boholano products folio: Go local

Documented various quality souvenir items made, crafted and produced in Bohol for use in the product development section of BIPC.

BIPC was tasked in the design and bundle of the **PHITEX 2020 craft tokens** and the identification and selection of product items to be included in the bundle.



BIPC engaged with 3 concept and design artists led by Tamara Ansley Raut, Product Development Officer of the BIPC, with the supervision and guidance of Ms. Maria Fe Dominise.







BIPC and its artists

conducted several brainstorming sessions and in the process developed various logos, designs and product samples which were submitted to Governor Yap for approval.

The designs were later approved and used in PHITEX 2020.

Bohol Investment Promotion Collateral: *Economic Factbook*

The **Bohol Economic Factbook** is a promotional material regularly updated by a team of researchers from the BIPC which contains information on the province's economic profile, cost of doing business, statistics, business contacts and critical components of the Bohol Investment Code.

The 2019 version of the Bohol Factbook which was originally scheduled for print early this year was set on hold due to the pandemic.

BIPC used the opportunity and updated the factbook into the 2020 version with blueprints for the print-ready jacket and leaflets completed.


The BIPC also created a promotional material on 'How to Do Business in Bohol' as a guide to investors on the steps and guidelines of investing in Bohol.



The economic factbook and other promotional print materials is set for printing this December.

Bohol Investment Profiling

To keep abreast of the province's investment opportunities and areas for investments of its municipalities, the BIPC sent out letters to the 48 LGUs requesting them to accomplish two (2) templates; (1) LGU Investment Profile and (2) Investment Locational Profiles and send the accomplished templates along with a copy of their Local Incentives and Investment Codes to the BIPC, if any.



The BIPC collected a total of **25 LGU Investment Profiles** and copies of their LIICs, **and a total of 59 Locational Profiles of areas for potential investments**.

Bohol Virtual Business Mission

On **October 20, 2020**, the European Chamber of Commerce of the Philippines (ECCP) together with the consortium members of Local Government Integrity Circles Network (LoGIC Network), a project co-funded by the European Union (EU) and Konrad Adenauer Stiftung (KAS), in partnership with the BIPC as its LoGIC Project provincial partner, had organized the **Bohol Virtual Business Mission via Zoom platform.**

The three-hour Virtual Business Mission, primarily aimed to explore business opportunities for supporting the business recovery of the LoGIC Network member LGUs and looking into possibilities for making investments and creating new jobs.

The event had the following objectives:

 Introduce Bohol Province as a LoGIC project preferred investment destination;



- Exchange information on business interests and investment/business requirements of localities;
- Orient and match the business mission delegates on the business opportunities the province; and
- Strengthen the network between local stakeholders and potential investors for continuous consultations and dialog on business opportunities.

The event was planned and conceptualized by LoGIC Network and BIPC since June 2020, where it was agreed that the BIPC gathered and packaged LGU Investment Profiles for the event.

The profiles were submitted to ECCP and were then distributed to potential investors from their network in the European Union as a marketing tool for the event.

The BIPC, co-funded by LoGIC Project, also organized a Blended Teleconference at the BestWestern Plus IvyWall Resort in Panglao for physically-attending participants for the event while others were able to join in via Zoom.

Governor Arthur C. Yap immersed himself deeply in the event where he delivered his keynote speech, enlightened the participants of Bohol current situation amidst the pandemic, its priority investment areas and developmental goals, and answered all questions and queries addressed to him by participants.

The BIPC also developed an **Investment Promotion AVP** which was shown solely for the event.



Tourism Support Program: Promotion and Marketing

As a support program for the Tourism of Bohol, the BIPC wrote a request letter sent to the Department of Transportation (DOTr) and the Civil Aviation Authority of the Philippines (CAAP) on the possibility of setting up a retailing showcase at Bohol-Panglao International Airport to attract visitors and buyers to the diverse offerings on the aroma and flavour of local coffee, *sikwate*, and cuisine; and local crafts and souvenir items.

The objective was to promote Bohol and to benefit local stakeholders in the value chain.

Preparation of Application Form

CAAP has replied and sent the BIPC the requirements for application, which, among others, include the need to determine business entity applicant, business arrangements and organizational setup, products and services, and architectural and financial plans, among others.

This request is currently pending due to the closure of most aviation and tourism activities during the pandemic.

Macaas Tubigon Agri-Industrial Economic Zone Project

With the thrust of the national government in opening the country as a prime location for foreign investments, to help fast track the country's economic recovery efforts through the development of new industries and job creation for its people, Bohol has positioned itself as the next location for

investments in manufacturing and light industries in the Visayan region, a big part in the fruition of the provincial government's developmental directions for inclusive growth and economic development with careful regard to environmental preservation and sustainability.

Further, the arrival of the province's first manufacturing factory, a High Density Polyethylene (HDPE) pipes factory in Barangay Bahian, Loboc, has championed the province as a major prospect for investments in these industries.


Moving forward, the Provincial Government of Bohol sets its eyes in developing one of its properties as an Agro-Industrial Zone open to investments in product packaging manufacturing and distribution using indigenous and natural materials that will supply the needs of its home-grown food manufacturers and craftsmen and possibly its neighboring provinces.

The BIPC has been tasked to lead the project where it had been coordinating with the Provincial Micro, Small and Medium Enterprise Development Council on how to go about the project and in gathering needed information to identify the local market for agro-industrial manufacturing products and their specific packaging products and materials needed.

The BIPC has acquired the pertinent documents of the property for better planning: **Site Advance Survey Plan; Site Development Plan, Tax Declaration of Real Property and Google Maps screenshots of the proposed site**.

The BIPC also drafted and sent out the letter to Mayor Willam Jao of LGU Tubigon and Engr. Noel C. Mendaña, Municipal Planning and Development Coordinator, requesting for more information on the property and the **reclassification of said property from a Commercial Lot into an Agro-Industrial Economic Zone** and for its inclusion in the formulation of their upcoming Comprehensive Land Use Plan.

The reclassification of said property is now included in the draft CLUP of the LGU where it is being scheduled for approval by the Sangguniang Bayan.



IV. Bohol BOSS Activities



The BOSS Caravan brings the services of the Bohol BOSS partner agencies; namely the Department of Trade and Industry(DTI), Social Security System(SSS), Philippine Health Insurance (PhilHealth), Home Development Mutual Fund (Pag-IBIG), Securities and Exchange Commission

(SEC), Bureau of Internal Revenue (BIR), SEEM — Cluster representative, and Department of Interior and Local Government (DILG), in partnership with the target Local Government Unit, to a one-day event that include the conduct of a Business Forum and Business Registration services for Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs). This involves a basic orientation on business registration, requirements and membership with mandatory agencies. The caravan also offers business advisory, facilitation of applications with DTI and SEC, and facilitation of Employee/Employer Registration with SSS, Pag-IBIG, and PhilHealth.

In 2019, the Bohol BOSS Asenso Negosyo Caravan were conducted in five (5) municipalities and reached a total of 1,575 constituents from their municipalities.

Amidst the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, the BIPC and Bohol BOSS brainstormed with its National Government Agency partners and thought of ways on how to continue providing services of the Asenso Negosyo Caravan under the ECQ and MGCQ guidelines.

Conclusively, the BIPC and its partners thought of conducting a series of webinars that would orient its participants of each agency's services and how they can provide services amidst the pandemic.

8 webinars have been conducted with a total of 659 participants.

Bohol is 'BEST'

The Basic Entrepreneurship for Sustainable Transformation or BEST Series Seminars is part of the services offered at the Negosyo Center-Bohol for existing and aspiring local entrepreneurs who want to further improve their knowledge on entrepreneurship.

The 'BEST' series conducts learning sessions on different topics such as entrepreneurship, business and financial management, product and quality management, among others.

The seminars and trainings are facilitated by Business Counselors of Negosyo Center-Bohol and is offered free to anyone who wishes to attend, including private individuals, students and civil society groups. The series also invite ask over special mentors and business people who offer their knowledge and services pro bono for the program.

This year, in accordance to COVID-19 health protocols and guidelines, conduct of BEST Seminars have been limited to smaller groups of participants for physical conducts while the BIPC likewise innovated to using online platforms in some sessions for greater information dissemination.

From January to June, the BIPC have conducted ten (10) Entrepreneurial Development Trainings at the Bohol BOSS Conference Room to a total of 41 participants.









On May 29, 2020, Bohol BOSS also conducted one (1) SEC Zoom Webinar – Interim Online Registration System for 1-Person Corporations and those with less than 5 Incorporators in partnership with SEC-Cebu.

Benchmarking at the Philippine Trade Training Center - Innovation for Collaboration food innovation hub

On January 14, 2020, Ms. Dominise, BIPC Head, went on a benchmarking mission at the Philippine Trade Training Center to study the prospects of having a Food Innovation Hub setup in the province in collaboration with its NGA partners.



FDA Helpdesk at Bohol BOSS

In **April and July 2020**, Ms. Dominise wrote 2 letters addressed to FDA Region VII requesting the possibility of having the Food and Drug Administration setup an extension of its services at the Bohol BOSS.

Food being a major sector in the development strategy, it is but imperative and a given that Bohol becomes a best practice in terms of offering quality food products and services, and compliant with food safety standards and quality through mandatory/ required certifications.

A very significant number of our MSMEs and tourism facilities are into the food business, hence, the PGBh through the BIPC- Bohol Business One-stop Shop/ Negosyo Center has to prioritize assistance by enhancing the ease of doing business through the proposed setup of a *Food and Drug Administration Helpdesk at the Bohol BOSS*.



The request was approved and on **August 13, 2020**, the Bohol FDA Helpdesk has officially opened and started offering services at the Bohol Business One-Stop Shop.

Bohol BOSS Partners Online Portal for Unified Advisories for the Business Sector

BIPC created a messenger group chat with Bohol BOSS partner agencies, to serve as medium for regular advisory dissemination from the different partner agencies (SSS, PhilHealth, SEC, BIR, Pag-IBIG, DTI).

BIPC shares and/or uploads advisories and links to the 'BIPC' and 'Kasadya Pasko sa Bohol' Facebook Pages for wider information dissemination.

Bohol BOSS Partners Commitment Setting and Strategic Planning

On **December 15, 2020**, the BIPC conducted the **Bohol BOSS Partners Commitment Setting and Strategic Planning**, an annual activity initiated by the BIPC for its valued Bohol BOSS partners to lay bare its accomplishments and milestones and to plan way forward its next steps and strategies for the upcoming year.

Due to the restrictions of the pandemic, this year's forum was conducted via Zoom Webinar where we also invited in Mr. Frederick Amores, the Department of Information and Communications Technology Director for Visayas Cluster 2.

V. Local Government Integrity Circles (LoGIC) Project 2020 Activities

The Provincial Government of Bohol is a model of open governance, taking into account the important roles of transparency and accountability in governance. Bohol Province was chosen as a pilot province of the LoGIC Project in order to "establish a culture of integrity in local government units all over the Philippines because LGUs play a critical role in integrity building and in investments/ jobs creation."















The Local Government Integrity Circles or LoGIC Project is a collaborative platform that serves as the consultative and monitoring body of the Integrity Mechanisms that the Provincial Government of Bohol must create. So far, project results in existing pilot areas indicated that it has encouraged transparency and efficient governance, improved relations between LGUs and the business sector,

enjoined citizen participation in LGU planning and decision making, and established lean, simple and honest procedures in business and investment registration.

The BIPC, led by Ms. Maria Fe Dominise as the official focal person for the province, has facilitated the conducted of project's activities since it started in 2018.

In 2020, LoGIC Project started off with a visit by LoGIC Project Officials for the Results-Oriented Monitoring, led by Dr. Stefan Jost, Mr. Jaume Guardans and Mr. Patrick Asiñero, Project Coordinator.

On **February 12, 2020**, the BIPC facilitated a **Consultative Meeting with LoGIC Project Bohol partners** for the upcoming Results-Oriented Monitoring visit of LoGIC Project officials on Feb 17, 2020.





On **February 17**, facilitated the official **ROM visit of the LoGIC Project officials** at the PPDO Cambangay Hall, with the Provincial Integrity Circles Technical Working Group.

On **March 9-11, 2020**, BIPC and BCCI represented the province in the **LoGIC Project Sustainability Workshop** in Manila.

On **May 21, 2020**, the BIPC, its partner CSOs and other provincial delegates attended the **LoGIC Project Visayas Cluster Zoom Conference**, via Zoom.

On **July 7, 2020**, the BIPC facilitated the participation of the Provincial Government of Bohol departments and offices in the **LoGIC Project Zoom Webinar on ARTA Orientation and Crafting of Citizen's Charters**.

On August 5, 2020, the BIPC facilitated the PGBH Integrity Circles TWG Meeting and Final Crafting of Provincial Integrity Mechanisms.

On **August 7, 2020**, the BIPC facilitated the Province of Bohol LoGIC Project delegates' participation in the **Kamustahan and Review of LGU Integrity Mechanisms**, which included representatives from the PGBh, private sector and CSOs.

In 2019, it was agreed that the next step for the project was the **Cascading of Integrity Circles** from the provincial level down to the municipal level. Twenty (20) out of the 48 MLGUs were selected for the project.

But in 2020, due to COVID-19 pandemic, LoGIC Project and the PGBh made a compromise to reduce the target to eight (8) MLGUs, namely, Anda, Alicia, Baclayon, Dimiao, Sagbayan, San Miguel, Tubigon and Trinidad.

On **August 14, 2020**, the BIPC facilitated the conduct of a **Blended Webinar for the 8 pilot LGUs at the Metro Centre Hotel**. A blended webinar, is an activity conducted in a traditional venue which may be participated by physical participants or online participants.



On **September 11, 2020**, the BIPC facilitated the conduct of the **Blended Webinar with the Bohol CSO-LGU-Business Sector Partnership for Open Government and Integrity Building**.

On **September 15, 2020**, the BIPC facilitated the conduct of the **LoGIC-CSO Webinar with the 2 pilot MLGUs Dimiao and Baclayon**.

On **September 22, 2020**, the BIPC facilitated the conduct of the **LoGIC-CSO Webinar with the 3 pilot MLGUs Anda, Alicia and Trinidad**.

On **September 29, 2020**, the BIPC facilitated the conduct of the **LoGIC-CSO Webinar with the 3 pilot MLGUs Sagbayan, San Miguel and Tubigon**.







October 20, 2020 was the conduct of the **Bohol Virtual Business Mission** in partnership with the European Chamber of Commerce of the Philippines and the LoGIC Network. *(details stated above)*

On **October 28, 2020**, BIPC and members of the Provincial Integrity Circles TWG participated in the **LoGIC Project Annual Review**, to discuss the next steps for the project.

It was then announced by Mr. Patrick Asiñero, Project Coordinator that the project has been given a 4-month extension.

On **November 24, 2020,** BIPC attended the **LoGIC Project Blended Webinar with Civil Society Organizations** of project-member LGUs.

On **December 11, 2020**, attended the **LoGIC Round Table Discussions**, with the theme 'The Role of Youth and Women Leaders in Integrity Building.

VI. Special Activities

Most Business-Friendly LGU Awards

In September 2020, the Provincial Government of Bohol received the official invitation from the Philippine Chamber of Commerce and Industry to join and submit an entry for the "Most Business-Friendly LGU Award" of 2020.



BIPC was tasked in the

submission of the Nomination form in partnership with the Bohol Chamber of Commerce and Industry, and the official entry where **3 Major Challenges faced by the Province for the Business Sector** during this pandemic were identified and the provincial government's **Programs and Projects in the Mitigation of said Challenges.**

BIPC sought the aid of the Provincial Planning and Development Office, head by Atty. John Titus Vistal in the identification and finalization of inputs for said entry.

BIPC also facilitated the participation of the province during the **Final Judging** which was done via virtual platform

The Province of Bohol was later announced as **One of the Finalists** for said award.

EMPLOYMENT FACILITATION

Our office was not able to implement the targeted Job Fairs and Special Recruitment Activities (SRA) for CY 2020 due to the Covid-19 Virus pandemic. Since, gathering of people and face-to-face meetings and interviews we're prohibit under the circular issued by the National IATF that was also adopted in the local levels thru issuances of LGU Ordinance/Memorandum Circulars signed by the respective LGU Chief Executives. However, despite of the pandemic our office still find way to provide employment opportunities to our Boholano jobseekers especially those workers who were displace/ affected because of the pandemic.

Our office created a team to gather list of displaced/affected workers all over the province and on the other hand, our office solicits job vacancies to provide job matching and job referrals. We closely work with the Bohol Association of PESO Managers (BAPESOM), Bohol Tourism Office (BTO) and the Provincial Social Welfare and Development Office (PSWDO) in the gathering of displaced/affected workers as well as closely coordinated with our partner National Agencies on the implementation and facilitation of available assistance for the displaced/affected workers.

TULONG PANGHANAPBUHAY PARA SA ATING DISPLACED/ DISADVANTAGE WORKERS, BARANGAY KO, BAHAY KO (TUPAD BKBK)

Emergency Employment Program or Tulong Panghanapbuhay sa ating Displaced/Disadvantage Workers Program (TUPAD) is a community-based package (municipal/barangay) of assistance that provides emergency employment for displaced workers, underemployed, and seasonal workers, for a minimum period of 10 days but not exceed to a maximum of 30 days, depending on the nature of work to be performed. The following are the list of requirements on TUPAD Program:

- 1. FOR PRE-IMPLEMENTATION PHASE: the following requirements shall be submitted to DOLE Regional Office/Field Office are; Letter of Intent, TUPAD Work Program (Enhanced OSEC-FMS Form No. 3 Annex B), Summary List of Beneficiaries (Enhanced OSEC-FMS Form No. 3 Annex B).
- 2. DURING POST-IMPLEMENTATION: Certification from the Barangay/LGU that the beneficiaries have performed the duties and responsibilities.
- 3. Certification of Underemployment/Displacement from LGU/ Barangay
- 4. Certification from the Local Government Unit (LGU) that the eligible beneficiary is not a recipient of the financial assistance from DOLE, DSWD and DA.
 - As of December 2020 there are 1,193 beneficiaries benefited the TUPAD program.







I. HIGHLIGHTS OF 2020 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

For the year 2020, the office has 10 regular employees with additional manpower of 23 Job Orders and two Contract of Services hired for the year. This manpower worked with extra miles for the accomplishment of the different activities for which this non-traditional office, revenue centers had carried out in different demanded services.

An Organizational structure with Vision, Mission and Goals for the office was being approved by the Local Chief Executive with on- going enhancement in the Project Development Section by hiring additional regular employees for the year but due to COVID-19 pandemic, no hiring for a regular Administrative Officer III. Instead, 2 Contract of Services were hired, an Accountant and a Marketing/Planning Consultant were added to help us in the preparation of financial statements, analysis, and giving boost in the marketing and planning activity for the different initiatives of PEEMO. All personnel received enabling memorandum for their tasks and work assignments to avoid duplication and define work load depending on their qualifications and experiences. Reality check reveals that the people are multi-tasked and well maximized.

Capacity development were also availed through Webinars such as, Two (2) Food Handling Trainings, Mental Health, SPMS for new employees, Coffee Mixing, and the Assessment and Strategic Planning. There were also one on one orientations given by Consultant with regards to handling effective inventory for fast moving utensils and materials for the Coffee shop business operation.







Preparation of Budget and the necessary supporting documents were made by the Administrative Section of this Office with the review and approval of its Head of Office. The Work and Financial plan and the different strategies were participated by the different focal persons coming from the different sections. Review of different Petty Cash Vouchers and Cash Advances were reviewed by the respective supervisors in the operation site, reviewed and approved in the administrative section.





For Financial Management

A section of Enterprise Finance Management in this office had focused on the financial transactions of the revenue centers. This fast tract the replenishments of the operational funds used at Café CaLOY.



REVENUE CENTERS

C.P.G. GROUNDS ECONOMIC ENTERPRISE (CAFÉ CALOY)

One of the operating revenue centers that the office currently manage is the CPG Heritage Grounds Economic Enterprise, where the Café Caloy is located. Said enterprise was created by virtue of Provincial Ordinance No. 2019-001. Café Caloy started its first year of full operation in 2020 with an operational fund of P5.0M and additional P3.0M for other special purpose/return to investment. Thus, this totals to P8.0M operational fund. The enterprise has engaged in caterings, selling of local products produced by people's organizations and cooperatives, among others. It has likewise assisted small entrepreneurs in selling their products as the café includes said food products in its catering menu. Café Caloy on its first year of operation is legally operating with business permit, health and sanitation permit and duly registered and regularly paying taxes with the Bureau of Internal Revenue (BIR).

Café Caloy been fully served the catering needs of our Provincial Government. This is on top of the various orders and caterings it served to various national and private institutions. Likewise, since March 2020, Café Caloy has focused serving the food requirements of the COVID 19 Task Force Command Center, Doctors, Nurses and other frontliners.

The business total revenue raised during the year amounted to **P15,922.189.88**; composed of Cash Sales of P482,669.99, Non-Cash/non-food sales (inter-agency transactions) of P69,580.00, and Non-Cash Food/catering services (inter-agency transactions) of P P15,369,940.00. **Total Net Profit** for the period is **P5,039,076.09**. Below is the illustration of cash and non-cash sales from January to December 2020.

Systematic procedures on bookings, inventory and bookkeeping were also done. Expected bookings for the year was 38 but the total accomplished bookings reached 1,104 for the year.



The Café Caloy was closed to walk in customers starting March this year due to the pandemic. High demands of food provisions inside the Provincial Government of Bohol due to the mitigation and coordination meetings with the health and local government units to uphold health standards and

adhere national and international standards on combating the dreadful COVID.

To this need, the catering and food provisions were provided by Café Caloy as emergency call to supply food and at the same time earn revenue. All other food provider cannot supply the different management and focal offices need for front line services during this pandemic as majority of the restaurants/service providers were closed.










Aside from the catering services, Café Caloy also played a noble part in responding to the needs of the constituents during the COVID 19 pandemic. Café Caloy became the "bagsakan center" of some of the donated items as fresh such vegetables and baked products. Donated vegetables were cooked by the kitchen staff and distributed to medical frontliners. Donated breads and cookies were repacked and

distributed to arriving OFWs, LSIs, peacekeepers and other frontliners.

With the provincial government's strive to revive its tourism and economy, it has implemented various promotions and marketing strategies. This time, Café Caloy's products were featured in the following:

- Balik Bohol Music Video, a marketing and promotional video showcasing culture, food, attractions to revive Bohol's tourism in the new normal.
- Mabuhi Ta Igsoon sa Bag-ong Panahon, a music video on the efforts of the provincial government in combatting the COVID 19 pandemic
- PHITEX 2020 Daily Themed Concept. Café Caloy showcased the Boholano foods and delicacies during its daily theme of Boholano Fiesta. This likewise coincided with the opening ceremonies of the PHITEX 2020 held in Bellevue Resort, Bohol.





Covid -19 Response. In adherence to Executive Orders in mitigating the pandemic, three job order staff from the Café Caloy were awarded during the State of the Province Address by Gov. Arthur C. Yap. They are given recognition in responding through effective food service.

Given the limitation of the kitchen area at Café Caloy and due to the voluminous catering services/orders, and with the approval of the present leadership, our office is currently implementing a 900k budget for the construction of a commissary at the former Bohol Tourism Office located at the Governor's Mansion. Once this will be finished, a more conducive and spacious kitchen will be expected.









BOHOL BIODIVERSITY COMPLEX OPERATION

Another revenue generation area being managed by the office is the Bohol Biodiversity Complex located in Bilar, Bohol. Due to the pandemic, lesser bookings and activities were conducted/implemented in the area. However, despite the pandemic, BBC generated amount to add up to the coffers of the provincial government.

Revenue generated from cash and non-cash sales amounted to P 104, 240.00 coming from camping/accommodation, sales from agricultural products like vermicast, ornamental plants, forest and fruit tree seedlings. The target sales for BBC is 250,000 so short of 145, 549.00 which gave an accomplishment rating of 41.60%.

The site development plan has to be updated to fit to farm tourism development and to have a business permit to legalize the operation. There is an available budget for this but a feasibility study has to be conducted first and be approved by the Local Finance Committee and The Management.

Two (2) promotional activities produced, likewise, able to activate the BBC facebook page. With updated posting of recent developments and activities together of marketing some agricultural and ornamental plants. Internet connection through pocket wifi for business was connected and available to guests and customers.

For the administrative side, repairs and refurbishing plans for the site staging area and the Learning Center are still on going. For communications and records, there are deliveries for furniture and fixtures and sound system. CCTV set was delivered and installed for safety and supervisory purposes. Frequent follow up for the Program of Work and other necessary documents to proceed on the bidding of the construction of the Welcome and Visitor's Learning Center and other construction at BBC. Said documents are still in PEO and PGSO.



For marketing and booking services there were 5 accommodations served during the month of June where the facility at BBC was utilized as quarantine facility to accommodate front liners.

ART 160 RICE BUY-BACK PROJECT

PEEMO played a major role in the implementation of the ART 160 Rice Buy-Back Project as in charge in marketing the rice produced by farmers as well as its by-products by virtue of the Executive Order issued of Governor Art Yap. ART 160 Buy Back project primarily aims to assist the Boholano rice farmers through clustering of rice areas to increase rice yield and reduce the cost of production. Aside from providing farm inputs and technical assistance to qualified beneficiaries, we shall also assist them in marketing their products such as head rice (whole grain), broken rice, rice bran, and among others.

Despite major challenges that were met along its course of implementation especially on the marketing aspect such as lack of manpower; absence of vehicle for deliveries and other mobilization; packaging and among others, our office was able to reach a **P2,251,599.50** sales from October 27 to December 31, 2020.



I. HIGHLIGHTS OF 2020 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

001: Exports and Investment Promotions

The Department of Trade and Industry – Bohol Provincial Office (DTI Bohol) assisted twelve (12) investors and six (6) exporters. Assistance given includes provision of information on exporting, participation to national trade fairs, registration of business name (BN) under Foreign Investment Act, information on Philippine Economic Zone Authority (PEZA) and Board of Investment (BOI) registration, among others. Investors were also provided information on COVID-19 related policies such as quarantine restrictions and travel protocols.

For the business name registration, a total of 7,476 new registered businesses were recorded in 2020, 28.49% lower compared to 2019. New capital investments reached PhP 1,020,827,282.07 and generated a total of 8,296 new jobs.



Moreover, DTI Bohol were able to developed economic facts for the three (3) growth center municipalities located in the northern economic corridor of the province which include the municipality of Tubigon, Getafe and Talibon.



002: Industry Development



During the year, DTI Bohol assisted a total of 4,506 micro, small and medium enterprises (MSMEs) that are within the priority industries of the department. These priority industries include electrical and electronics, auto and auto parts, aerospace parts, IT BPM and ecommerce, tool and die, iron and steel, chemicals, agri-business


(bamboo, cacao, coco coir, coffee, processed food, processed fruits and nuts), shipbuilding, furniture, garments (wearable and home styles), creative, tourism, transport and logistics and construction.


Programs and projects were implemented to support and address the needs and gaps of the industries such as localization of national roadmaps, planning workshops for local industry councils and trainings for MSMEs in the priority industries. In order to conform to the limitations, set by this pandemic, new normal methodologies and modalities were adopted to implement these services.





Considered as Bohol's backbone industry, a planning workshop was also facilitated by the DTI Bohol to invigorate the tourism industry in the province which is heavily affected by this pandemic.






Cities and Municipalities Competitiveness Index

On the other hand, the 2020 round of the Cities and Municipalities Competitiveness Index (CMCI) continued. Overall, the province of Bohol increased its ranking 5 notches higher compared to 2019's rank of 25.



003: MSME Development

Despite the pandemic, the DTI Bohol with its 16 Negosyo Centers (NC) located in the different municipalities in the province, were able to assist a total of 17,528 clients in 2020, 47.93% (8,401) of which are MSMEs assistance. DTI Bohol's performance for MSME assistance is 22.98% above its annual target of 6,831 and is 17.09% higher than last year's accomplishment.



Shared Service Facility (SSF)

The SSF is a flagship project of the DTI aimed at improving MSME productivity and efficiency through better access to technology. It is meant to improve MSME competitiveness by providing machinery, equipment, tools, systems, accessories and other auxiliary items, skills and knowledge under a shared system. The facilities should help target beneficiaries increase their production capacities and improve product quality, resulting to increased markets, increased sales, and jobs generation.

In 2020, the DTI Bohol established four (4) new SSFs: SSF for BISU Candijay Digifab Center, SSF for

Ginger Yema Processing in Guindulman, SSF for Bohol Cacao Processing Center in BISU Bilar, and SSF for Bocarillo Making in San Miguel, Bohol. Overall, DTI Bohol has already established a total of 36 SSFs all of





which are 100% operational.

• Kapatid Mentor ME (KMME)

Now on its fourth year, the DTI Bohol conducted two (2) runs of KMME programs thru online with a total of 24 mentees from August to December 2020. All of the 24 mentees (100%) graduated from the program.



One Town One Product Next Generation (OTOP NextGen)

OTOP is a priority stimulus program for Micro, Small and Mediumscale enterprises (MSMEs) as government's customized intervention to drive inclusive local economic growth. The program enables localities and communities to determine, develop, support, and promote products or services that are rooted in its local culture, community resource, creativity, connection, and competitive advantage.




Interventions and assistance were provided to MSMEs to help them recover and reposition their business during this pandemic. These

interventions include training on e-marketing/ ecommerce, facilitation of FDA – Certificate of Product

Registration, and capability trainings for food and non-food MSMEs. During the year, 1,464 MSMEs were doing business through ecommerce and 121 prototypes were developed under the OTOP program.





Sandugo Trade Expo

The annual trade exhibition event of the department, entitled Virtual Sandugo Trade Expo, was conducted from July 20 - 24, 2020 thru Zoom. Six (6) MSMEs joined the new normal trade expo and generated a total sale of PhP 9.8 million.





Livelihood Seeding Program – Negosyo Serbisyo Sa Barangay (LSP – NSB)

The LSP – NSB is a program of department that allows a wider reach of business development assistance by bringing government services closer to the people through partnerships between relevant local government units and DTI officials. Also, the DTI in partnership with the NGAs, LGUs, private sector, and through the Negosyo Centers promote ease of doing business and providing access to development



services for MSMEs through Business Counselors in their area of responsibility.



MSME beneficiaries of the LSP-NSB Program may include sole proprietors, cooperatives, or sectoral associations that are located in identified barangays. This year, a total of 1,065 MSMEs were assisted under the program. Each MSMEs were provided with livelihood kits worth PhP 6,000 each. "Recorida" activities were also conducted to disseminate information on the services and programs of the department.

• Livelihood Seeding Program – Pangkabuhayan sa Pagbangon at Ginhawa (LSP – PPG)

The project aims to help microenterprises of families/individuals affected by fire incidents and other calamities restart their economic activities. It also aims to provide livelihood opportunities for identified beneficiaries in areas considered as priorities of the national government such as KIA-WIA and NTFELCAC. Package of assistance comprised of information materials, entrepreneurship training, and item/s like raw materials, tools, and/or equipment worth an amount not exceeding Php 10,000.00 provided to affected families/individuals.







004.1: Consumer Protection

• Comprehensive Monitoring and Enforcement Program (CMEP) and Price Monitoring

In 2020, a total of 690 business establishments were monitored by the DTI Bohol. These business establishments were monitored to check whether they conform with the different fairtrade laws such as price tag law, service and repair shop, labelling, DAO 3 Series of 2002, product standards, among others.

Ten (10) business establishments were formally charged for violations of fair-trade laws and trade and industry laws. Types of violation committed include: Violations on Price Act or R.A. 7581; Violations on Price Tag under R.A. 7394; and Violations on DAO 2, series of 2007, R.A. 4901.Total amount of administrative fines collected is PhP 237,500.00.

In addition, prices of products considered as basic necessities and prime commodities are regularly monitored in 240 business establishments each month across the 47 municipalities in the province. Prices of goods in Tagbilaran City, however, is monitored per week.

Accreditation and Business Licensing

During the year, a total of 274 business establishments were issued with appropriate accreditation and license certificates or permits. These accreditation, license or permit include service and repair establishment accreditation (147); sales promotion permit (86); ship brokers (34); and private emission testing center (7).

Monitoring in Compliance to Workplace Safety and Minimum Health Protocols

In monitoring compliance of business establishments to the guidelines on minimum health standards, DTI Bohol conducted an on-site monitoring and inspection to dine in restaurants, barbershops and salons operating in the province. Moreover, DTI together with DOLE conducted a joint on-site inspection to monitor their compliance to the Interim Guidelines on Workplace Prevention and Control of COVID-19.



004.2: Consumer Education and Advocacy

As part of the department's mandate, DTI Bohol conducted 229 consumer education and advocacy

activities. These initiatives include Diskwento information Caravans, activities, dissemination interviews, radio press releases, BAGWIS, business/ consumer education seminars, consumer organization strengthening, local price





coordinating council, among others.

Moreover, four (4) information materials were also produced: (a) 5 Basic Consumer Responsibilities; (b) Bagwis Awards; (c) Purchasing Products Online; and (d) Sustainable Consumption.

• Consumer Complaint Resolution

Forty-four (44) consumer complaints were received during the year and 100% were resolved through mediation within the prescribed time of 10 days. Types of consumer complaints received include consumer product and service warranties (26), deceptive sales act (6) and sales promotion complaint (1). Other complaints that were received include concession on rents (DTI MC. 20-31), online investment scams, high price of alcohol and rice, and refund complaint during the community quarantine. These complaints were coordinated and forwarded to the proper government agency for their resolution.

Diskwento Caravan

Ensuring the supply of basic necessities priced in accordance with or lower than the suggested retail prices or price freeze, DTI Bohol mounted twelve (12) Diskwento Caravan and Rolling Stores in 11 municipalities in partnership with local government units and in cooperation with Leonardo Distributors Inc. and NetMan.

Bagwis Award

The DTI-Bagwis Program gives due recognition to establishments that uphold the rights of consumers while practicing responsible business where consumers get the best value for money. The program also encourages the setting up of Consumer Welfare Desks (CWDs) or an equivalent customer relations office inside the mall that will provide information to consumers and serve as a mechanism for the speedy resolution of consumer complaints.

In 2020, a total of 28 business establishments were awarded with the Bagwis Seal: 2 Gold; 4 Silver, and 22 Bronze awardees.

I. HIGHLIGHTS OF 2020 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The tourism industry is one of the world's greatest markets, until the world met a pandemic. The outbreak of Covid-19 labeled as the "black swan" event, caused significant damage globally, creating shocks in almost all the industries due to restrictions, curfews, stay-home and work-from-home policies and quarantines, creating negative impacts on the tourism industry, experiencing sharp falling revenues, affecting movement, both the demand side (restriction of freedom of movement, border closing, guests' fear of infection) and the supply side (closure of accommodation and catering establishments as well as leisure facilities used for tourism).

In Bohol, with a continuous rise of tourist arrivals since 2009 culminating to 1.8M in 2019, it has significantly flopped down to 179,885 in 2020 (not total number yet). Estimated tourist receipts loss amounting to an estimated Php 4,710,962,766.70. 200,000/42% of Bohol's workforce were reported displaced tourism workers.

While the Provincial Government ensures that the Province can contain and manage local infection by institutionalizing health protocols and healthcare system, the tourism industry supported by the Provincial Government through the Bohol Tourism Office and the Provincial Tourism Council are trying to rebuild tourism for the future.

Tourism Planning and Product Development

Earlier in the year (2020), with the intention of providing more tour offerings, we assessed, inspected and evaluated Getafe port, Cambuhat Village and Oyster Farms, Danao Adventure Part and Organic Farms, Sagbayan Peak, Inabanga Cultural Park, with optional offerings of Bongan and Pandanon Sandbars in Talibon and Getafe respectively for a proposed new tour circuit, the **Bohol North Tour**, dubbed as the *Dagohoy Historical Trail*, offering 2 itineraries; an option of a (1) day tour and (2) 2D1N Tour with 3 alternative options; highlighting chocolate hills, and the beach, with a good intra-province access.

With the aim of creating *farm tourism colonies*, as encouraged by the Governor, we coordinated an Inter-agency site validation team composed of BTO, BIPC, OPA, OPV, DTI, ATI, DA and inspected and validated 33 farm sites in the province.

For purposes of institutionalizing the *Visita Iglesia de Bohol*, another marketable circuit, together with BACH Council, CCAD and PTC, 13 Heritage churches (Panglao, Dauis, Tagbilaran, Baclayon, albur, Loay and the 3 heritage stone buildings, Dimiao. Valencia, Jagna, Cortes, Loon, Maribojoc and Tubigon), had been assessed for *Heritage Tour Circuit* wherein 3 Heritage Sites Itineraries were created and launched during the PhiTEX.

We did *regular monitoring* to 14 existing tourism sites, (validated the launching of) Giant Swing in Danao, Loboc Night Cruise, Strawberry Farm, Cave assessment in Sikatuna, Shrine of our Lady of the

Barangay at Ilihan Hill, Pedro Calungsod Shrine in Barangay Malbog (for Faith Tourism), Centennial tree and MUSFA strawberry farm, a proposed mountain resort site in Laca, all in Jagna town, Edith Grand Garden I Baclayon, among others.

19 public markets (including toilets) were monitored and evaluated in coordination with the PEO, for the market improvement project to proposed for funding to the World Bank-DOT TouRIST Project, with the ultimate purpose of marking public markets as additional tourist stops as in the case of markets abroad. We have also submitted three project proposals fir ossible funding to World Bank on the same program.

Creative Industries Convergence was conducted with the creative industry sector of the province, particularly the food and culinary creatives to explore the possibility of the "commercialization" of the creative sector.

In support to the *Sustainable Environment Program*, we conducted two *Tree growing* activities in Garcia-Hernandez, Bohol in coordination with the LGU and the Bohol Limestone Corporation, planting trees in the denuded part of the limestone quarry area, the reforestation program of the corporation in January 2020, another tree growing activity was conducted at the small reforestation project of LGU Pilar, Bohol in February 2020 and mangrove planting was done at Kinubkuban, Calape, Bohol in September 2, 2020..

During the ECQ, the "Bohol Tourism Bubble", was created, dovetailed from the tourism bubble concept of the Department of Tourism, a bubble within a bubble, wherein Bohol partners directly with neighboring market sources that are equally successful in containing Covid-19. With this partnership, we can mutually open our borders allowing their tourists to travel directly within Bohol with less stringent Covid-19 travel protocols. In preparation for creating the tour bubble, we together with the PTC monitored existing sites, namely; Tarsier Sanctuary, Loboc tourism center, chocolate hills complex, Sagbayan peak, Albur church, among others, to determine whether the health and safety protocols were already in place and look at its readiness.

Website enhancement of our website, — *tourism.bohol.gov.ph* was underway. Enhancement of the lay-out and content especially attuned to the tourism new normal. The *Visit Bohol App* — co-developed with BICTU to facilitate ease of travel for tourists.

Coordinated in the planning and review of the BACH Council Plan, with CCAD and BACH Council, and other activities like; drafting of the Tourism and Cultural Calendar, preparatory activities for the 500 years of Christianity in the Philippines, attended the commemoration of the birth of the National Artist Jose Abueva. Assisted LGU Jagna in its tourism planning.




Tourism Statistics Database Management

Relative to the importance of data, we do Tourism Data Gathering /Monitoring and submission of Tourist Arrival, Visitor Arrival Records and related data to the Department of Tourism.

Conduct Exit Surveys for tourist/guests profiling and in order to know issues and situations of the destination that need to be acted upon for the satisfaction of the visitors and improvement of the destination.

Conduct Refresher/ mentoring sessions for new Municipal Tourism Officers/LGU data in-charge to teach/refresh their knowledge on the data computation, analysis and of tourism receipts. All these are contained in a tourism data base for easy access.



Tourism Services

With DOT 7, from early January to June 2020 assisted in the repatriation of foreign nationals stranded in the province after the lockdown. To date the office is still assisting to facilitate the Exit Clearance of individuals wanting to travel international/out of the country.

In support to BIATF and PGBh, the office detail personnel at the Bohol Panglao International airport to scan QR codes of arriving tourists and review their entry documents. The office provides and man

the portal - Bohol Tourism App where incoming tourists can register before they can enter Bohol and where they will be given their QR codes for identification and contact tracing purposes.

The Tourist Assistance Section is incharge with providing tourism information and guiding of guests and media in famtours and promotional video shoots of Bohol.

Tourism Policy and Standards Section

Part of the mandate of the office is to lobby for policy enactments and standard implementation, thus monitoring/evaluation of existing tourism and establishment sites together with the Product Development Section were undertaken to determine whether the facility is of standard and see if policies are put in place and implemented.

By the end of December the Provincial Inspection Team (PIT) of which the office is a core member and implementer have already inspected 15 Accommodation Establishment for *Ultimate Bohol Experience* (UBE) Certification. The *Ultimate Bohol Experience* (UBE) is an idea of the PTC and the Honorable Governor. It is a concept of safe and seamless travel experience for tourists, an integrated online system put in place for the entire tourism value chain from arrival at the airport, enroute to the Accommodation Facility, dining establishments, tours/day trips, until check out, all these are integrated for better safety and ease in contact tracing.

To put premium on the UBE, an UBE Seal of Excellence has to be carried by a DOT accredited tourism establishment, in order to be part of the tourism prioritized services, and it has complied with set requirements; i.e. met all local and national government regulatory measures, safety protocols, carrying capacity and environmental standards.

The office facilitated organizational meetings and documentary requirements of the *tourist transport* sector until its formal confederation, to the formal oath taking of its officers on May 5, 2020


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Coordinated with DOT on standards and accreditation of primary tourism establishments and (initially) enhancement of service standards of industry players (Bohol Star Rating Program and Tour Guide Badge Program).

Coordinated the conduct of 6 sectoral and 3 industry forums for the drafting of the IRR of Provl. Ord. 2020-024 and gathered protocols of the different sectors for the drafting of the Ordinance.

Collaborated with Stakeholders, PTC, BOFETTO, BAHRR, etc. in planning, conduct of tourism activities/program; i.e. tourism bubble, UBE Seal, and raised to Concerned Agencies/Authorities tourism concerns and issues relative to tourist transport, LTFRB and DOTr concerns, PCSSD on ascuba diving and free diving issues in Panglao, displaced tourism workers benefits, among others.

Acts as Secretariat on consultations/meetings/fora with PTC, PIST Board, MTOs accommodation, transport, travel and tour, events, diving, and tour guides associations and other tourism industry stakeholders.









Tourism Marketing and Promotion

Early last year, we coordinated with the tourism private sector in a promotional activity, i.e. *Sweet Summer Sale* in Feb 2020, slashing down of hotel/resort rates to entice local tourists and in by December, plans are on the way for the Bohol Online Sale (BOS) in Feb. 2021.

With the creation of the Tourism Bohol Bubble, the Marketing Campaign was also put in order to convince market sources that Bohol is prepared to accept tourist.

From September 19-28, 2020, Bohol Provincial Government co-hosted The Philippine Travel Expo (PhiTEX) 2020, a hybrid B2B (business-to-business) marketing promotions to the international markets, signaling the opening of tourism in the Philippines. It was participated in by 122 buyers representing 32 different countries, 345 seller-delegates from 161 companies in various sub sector. Funded by the Tourism Promotions Board (TPB), coordination and financial legwork was done by BTO.

For PhiTEX consumption, 6 theme-videos (Heritage, Faith, Nature and Adventure, Sports, Farm Marine Activities) and 1 Behold Bohol video were shoot in coordination with BACH Council, Artistic team and CCAD for the video-on-demand portion of the B2B. A *Boholano product bazaa*r was also staged at the venue for the participants. At the last two days of the event the participants went on famtours to three tour bubble itineraries.

Due to the perceived success of the PhiTEX, the TPB, arranged the DIP (Destination Inventory Program), Bohol Familiarization Trip, composed of officials of NGAs and a separate famtour for the members of Philippine Tour Operators Association (PhilTOA), arriving on December 7 until the 12 of December 2020.

Still in coordination with the DOT, Bohol created a video for KAIN NA project, which was aired online where Bohol fiesta fares were featured. Bohol was also featured in the following video shoot for DOT marketing program, namely: "Mundo Heritage" project, which featured Bohol, Baguio and El Nido; "Bohol to the Mediterranean Market"; Air Asia Media Team for online and TV release; "Finding You" for the South East Asian vieo project. Bohol was also featured in the Market Forum and on a 6-page e-newsletter for the Vietnamese market in December 12.

Online promotion is also done through the tourism.bohol.gov.ph and the Bohol tourism FB page.

I. HIGHLIGHTS OF 2020 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

DOST-BOHOL PSTC's programs and Projects for 2020 were anchored on the Province's clear vision: ecocultural tourism, agro-industrialization, and light manufacturing. It also encompasses the mission service slogan LIFE HELPS — Livelihood and Tourism, Infrastructure, Food, Education and Technology, Health, Environment, Leadership Development, Peace and Order, and Sports and Youth Development.

DOST programs and projects are also geared to support the InSPIRED (Infrastructure, Social Well-being & Shelter, Peace and Order, Interconnectivity, Reforms in Governance, Equitable Economic Growth with Environmental Sustainability, Disaster Risk Reduction & ManagementClimate Change Adaptation) HEART (Health, Education, Agriculture, Rural Development and Tourism) the enduring advocacy towards poverty reduction of the present administration under the leadership of Governor Arthur Yap and Vice-Governor Rene Relampagos.

As an offshoot of the Science and Technology Master Plan and as a response to the present administrations' development plan, DOST has implemented as a banner program the Small Enterprise Technology Upgrading Program or SETUP, which is also in line with the abovestated vision of the province. Priority areas under this program are food processing, furniture, GDH (gifts, decors, and handicrafts), agriculture/aquaculture/forestry, metals and engineering, ICT, Health and Wellness, Halal Products and Services, energy and environment, creative industry, and other regional industry priorities -- all supportive of the said vision.

Despite the pandemic, the food processing, furniture, and GDH sectors' opportunities showed great potentials. Thus, in 2020, the situation still calls for projects that upgrade our food processing, woodworking production, and GDH production facilities to improve their products' quality.

For this year, assistance were focused on helping the communities. We shifted to the community–based projects for more significant impacts. The implementation of Community Empowerment through Science and Technology (CEST) is on-going. We are creating valuable projects in the municipalities of Balilihan, Ubay, Pres. Carlos P. Garcia and Talibon helped in identifying the needs and opportunities in S&T at the grassroots level. CEST program has five

(5) components: (1) Livelihood Development; (2) Health and Nutrition; (3) Water and Sanitation; (4) S & T Education; and (5) Disaster Preparedness and Hazard Mitigation. Implementation of this program shall be through a participatory approach.

Science for the People

In line with the DOST's mandate, heeding the slogan "Science for the People," all scientific and technological efforts are geared and utilized in maximum economic and social benefits for the people. We at the DOST Bohol Provincial S&T Center – being the frontline service provider of the agency, is implementing programs and projects that would make science and technology reach the grassroots level following the province's development plan mentioned above.

Small Enterprise Technology Upgrading Program (SETUP)

The DOST's flagship program Small Enterprise Technology Upgrading Program (SETUP), provides technology interventions to two hundred eighty-eight (288) MSMEs this year. Thirteen (13) MSMEs were supplied with innovation system support funds amounting to P 13,227,440.00. These funds were used to acquire efficient technologies, equipment, and machinery to increase MSMEs' said productivity. We extended a package of assistance on technology training, consultancy services, packaging and labeling, and other related interventions under this program.

Furthermore, though the assistance is provided to individual firms in the priority sectors, it is being ensured that they have to complement each other. The SETUP beneficiaries under the Metals and Engineering Sector, for instance, are now serving local food processors in their equipment needs. As a result of the technology interventions, Corrales Welding Shop now provides stainless cooling racks, tables, sinks, and other customized stainless GMP-compliant equipment for the province's food processors. Having a local fabricator that can provide these needs could save transportation and shipping expenses rather than buy from Manila or Cebu.

In 2020, DOST Bohol provided a total of one hundred fifty-five (155) S&T interventions to two hundred eighty-eight (288) firms in the province. These interventions resulted in a generation of two hundred one (201) employment, an average improvement of productivity by 20% per firm, and P 37.253 million gross sales.



Green Thumb Farm in Sambog, Corella, Bohol, a beneficiary of the Small Enterprise Technology Upgrading Program (SETUP) of DOST, acquired and installed one (1) unit Vacuum Fryer to produce mushroom chips and other mushroom-based products.



7 Dwarfs Cakes and Pastries Shop in Candijay, Bohol acquired a 3-deck oven and improved its processing facility to produce cakes, torta, and other pastries.



Right Fit by Faith Alteration and Print Shop in Tagbilaran City acquired a computerized laser cutter and engraver, a two-head computerized embroidery machine, a large format sublimation printer, and a rotary-type heat press machine for the production of customized shirts, uniforms, printed bags, and souvenir items.

S&T Trainings

Science and Technology training conducted for 2020 under the SETUP Techno Academy covers Cacao Production, Understanding Chocolates, Chocolate Processing, Waste Analysis and Characterization Studies for residual, recyclable, biodegradable and special wastes, Packaging and Labeling of Products, Food Safety, and e-governance platform. However, due to the pandemic, some of the trainings were virtually conducted.

In 2020, DOST Bohol PSTC conducted 47 trainings benefitting 815 firms with 1,614 participants.



DOST Bohol conducted meat processing training last February 6-7, 2020. Various processed meat products were introduced to the participants, such as bacon, pork tocino, ham, and longganisa.



DOST 7 conducted its first Food Safety Webinar entitled Food Safety, Food Delivery, and COVID-19 attended mostly by food entrepreneurs who are into home-based cooking, retailing, reselling, food delivery service providers, government agencies, and private organizations nationwide. Important points on food safety, food hazards and on how to ensure the safety of food deliveries during this pandemic were discussed by Mr. Bryan Ybañez of the DOST 7 Food Safety Team.

Virtual training on Waste Analysis and Characterization Study (WACS) conducted on October 14-15, 2020 attended by 41 participants representing the 22 municipalities in the province of Bohol.



Two batches of women-led cacao processing enterprises attended the Training Workshop on Chocolate Processing at the DOST Bohol Chocolate Academy on November 19-20, 2020 & November 23-25, 2020 respectively.



S&T Consultancy Services

Technical consultancy programs were provided to MSMEs through the Consultancy for Agricultural Productivity Enhancement (CAPE), Food Safety, Cleaner Production, Energy Audit, and Packaging and Labeling.

In 2020, six (6) cacao farms were assisted through CAPE;); one (1) firm for Cleaner Production Consultancy; two (2) firms for Food Safety Consultancy; and one (1) firm for Energy Audit Consultancy. There were fifty-three (53) packaging and labeling services provided to twenty-six (26) firms.







Community Empowerment through Science and Technology (CEST)

Community Empowerment through Science and Technology (CEST) Program is DOST's strategy of bringing science and technology at the grass roots level, thus closer to the people. This will facilitate the transfer of technologies to beneficiaries along the areas of education, health and nutrition, water and sanitation, disaster risk reduction, and industry development or livelihood.

CEST project implementation to various LGU's in 2019continued in 2020. New LGU's, NGA's, NGO's and academe identified and assisted in 2020. These are in Jagna, Candijay, PROCESS-Bohol, and Philippine Information Authority in Bohol.



DOST-Bohol in partnership with the Local Government of Balilihan, turn-over twenty (20) STARBOOKS (Science and Technology Academic-Research Based Openly Operated Kiosks) units to all the public primary, elementary, and secondary schools in the Municipality of Balilihan. Likewise, conducted the Training on the Operations of STARBOOKS for the respective school IT personnel to administer the utilization of STARBOOKS.

S& T Scholarship Program

In S & T Education, Bohol PSTC has vigorously campaigned and disseminated information materials for the scholarship program resulting in Bohol as one among the provinces having large number of scholars. This is the reason why DOST-Science Education Institute has provided Bohol PSTC a staff complement dedicated to render services related with the implementation of S & T Scholarship Program. Bohol PSTC

also spearheads in providing the necessary support mechanism for the scholars through putting scholars up funds by the themselves which could be borrowed by them in times of emergencies. Furthermore, for ease in monitoring, the scholars were organized into cells where the cell leader periodically the scholarship reports to coordinator regarding the status of their cell members.



In 2020, one hundred forty-six (146) scholars have graduated. A Learning Assistance Programs are provided to help them develop their capabilities. There are two hundred thirty-six (236) ongoing scholars studying in accredited schools in Bohol for SY 2020-2021.

Due to the pandemic, DOST developed and implemented an online platform to provide the aspiring students avenue to process their scholarship application despite the threat of the pandemic. A total of 1,933 successful applicants were recorded from Bohol.



Virtual Scholarship Caravan conducted for the senior high school from various schools in Tagbilaran City, 1st Congressional District, 2nd Congressional District, and the 3rd Congressional District of Bohol.

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Strategic Partnerships

Partnership with key institutions is a good strategy of multiplying ourselves to hasten the implementation of DOST programs and services. Linkages and networks were established and maintained for this purpose. For major programs of DOST, Bohol PSTC partnered various Local Government Units, Non-Government Organizations, Peoples Organizations and other National Line Agencies.

DOST Bohol PSTC partnered with the Central Visayas Information Sharing Network (CViSNet) Foundation Inc., and LGU-Balilihan to implement the Barangay e-System and Tools (BeST) to all the barangays in the Municipality of Balilihan. BeST is an e-governance platform to manage resident's profiles and other vital information necessary for development planning of the LGU.



The 31 barangays in the Municipality of Balilihan were equipped and trained on the operation and utilization of the Barangays e- System and Tools (BeST)

Also, DOST Bohol PSTC, in collaboration with the Local Government Unit of Balilihan and PROCESS-Bohol, conducted a series of technology training on the production of coconut-based personal care products for the women of Barangay Baucan, Datag, Haguilanan, and Sagasa. With coconut as the main crop of Balilihan, these technology trainings are one way of producing high-value byproducts of coconut rather than the traditional copra.

The five (5) women from each barangay were trained to produce two (2) of the following cleaning agents and personal care coconut-based products: hand and body lotion, antimosquito lotion, everyday shampoo, shampoo bars, bath soap, liquid dishwashing soap, allpurpose liquid detergent soap, and liquid hand soap with coconut oil as its main ingredient. The technology training capacitates these women for sustainable livelihood opportunities because these products will be available soon in the local public markets and terminals.

PROCESS-Bohol & LGU Balilihan partnered with DOST Bohol to augment the province's supply of necessities during this pandemic using our local ingredients. This endeavor also establishes and operate gender-responsive technology-based enterprises to enhance economic development in response to the COVID-19 pandemic,

Special Projects A.) Science, Technology, and Innovation Support to Fight Against COVID-19: Provision of Specimen Collection Booth (SCB)

To aid the demand for adequately implemented mass testing for COVID-19 in Bohol, DOST Bohol PSTC has distributed three (3) Specimen Collection Booths (SCB) to Gov. Celestino Gallares Memorial Medical Center in Tagbilaran City and Don Emilio del Valle Memorial Hospital in Ubay. The SCB is designed to ensure the safety of both the medical personnel and the patient.

The booth design required zero contact between the person collecting the specimen and the people providing the samples. Positive pressure is maintained inside the booth using a pressure sensor to prevent outside contamination from getting inside the booth. It is equipped with a 0.5 hp window-type airconditioning unit and a roof-mounted ventilator with a filter to ensure enough ventilation and airconditioner for the medical personnel. It has a slanted specimen table ergonomically designed to provide enough leg space for both the patient and the tester. The SCB is also equipped with a Bluetooth speaker for a clear and audible conveyance of instructions to the patient. The booth is also provided with two monobloc chairs, semidisposable untextured nitrile gloves, disposable clear plastic gloves, a disinfectant dispenser, and a plastic bag for disposing of used plastic gloves. Each SCB unit costs Php 130,000.00.

DOST-Philippine Council for Industry, Energy and Emerging Technology Research and Development (DOST-PCIEERD) and Philippine Council for Health Research and Development (PCHRD) spearheaded the project. DOST partnered with a Startup awardee, Futuristic Aviation and Maritime Enterprise (FAME), Inc., to design and manufacture the SCBs.

The booth features the FAME-designed temperature scanner, an additional accessory of the SCB where patients' temperature may be obtained and recorded in the cloud for easy monitoring of hotspots in areas where the SCB is installed. The temperature scanner is developed and owned by FAME, Inc. and may be sourced directly from FAME, Inc.

DOST offers the SCB design for free to other fabricators and engineering groups interested in producing the SCBs. However, they must strictly adhere to DOST's specifications, with approval from the Department of Health (DOH).

B) Science, Technology, and Innovation Support to Fight Against COVID-19: Distribution of Face Shields Manufactured by DOST-MIRDC for the Frontliners

To support the needs of our colleagues in the government service and other groups in protecting themselves against the threat of corona virus while they continue to serve the country amidst the pandemic, DOST Bohol Provincial S&T Center distributed face shields to government workers, policemen, media groups and to the provincial extraction team of TaRSIER 117. The face shields have been mass-produced by DOST - Metals Industry Research and Development Center (DOST-MIRDC) using plastic injection technology.



Bohol's Population and Poverty Situation

Based on the latest 2015 Census of Population (POPCEN), the province of Bohol posted a total population of 1,313,560 persons as of 1 August 2015. This is 58,432 persons more than its total population of 1,255,128 persons in 2010. Bohol's population accounted for 22 percent of Central Visayas' total population and 1.3 percent of the country in 2015. Bohol's population density is computed at 3.12 persons per hectare in 2015 compared to 2.68 persons per hectare in 2000. The increase in the total population of Bohol from 2010 to 2015 translated into an average annual population growth rate (PGR) of 0.87 percent which is lower than the 0.97 percent annual PGR of the province between the census years 2000 and 2010.

For the year 2020, Bohol's population is estimated by PSA to increase to 1,365,108 with an annual PGR at 0.77% between the period 2015-2020¹. This comprised 17 percent of the total estimated population of Central Visayas. About 32 percent of this projected population are below 15 years old while 61 percent are within the working age group of 15-64 years. The female reproductive age comprises 16 percent of the total estimated population in 2020. Total number of households in 2020 is projected at 316,834 households at an average of 4.3 persons per household.



As of the latest Poverty Incidence Report of the PSA conducted in 2018, Bohol's overall poverty incidence among families registered at 15.2 percent, lower by 10 percentage points compared to the year 2015 or equivalent to about 47 thousand families. This is a substantial reduction compared to 2015 when Bohol's number of poor families reached about 70 thousand. Although Bohol's poverty incidence greatly decreased through the years, the proportion of poor Boholanos whose per capita income is insufficient to meet their basic food needs or subsistence level, is still estimated at 2 percent or about 9 thousand Boholano families. Most of these poor families are found in the 2nd Congressional District of Bohol as shown in the Map above. In 2020, a number of Bohol's children below 6 years old

were found to be malnourished with 92 of them severely underweight while 372 were found to be severely stunted per the 2020 OPT Report.

Social Services

Notwithstanding the global COVID-19 pandemic that occurred in 2020, social services continued to be provided by the government to its populace albeit more focused on measures for the reduction, elimination and prevention of COVID-19 disease. In Bohol, the Provincial Government together with other stakeholders gathered together to strategize in its fight in the containment and elimination of the disease.

Combating COVID-19 Pandemic

Health Response

In 2020, to better address the pandemic, the Provincial Government of Bohol (PGBh), together with the national government thru the Department of Health (DOH), established two molecular laboratories located at the Gov. Celestino Gallares Memorial Hospital and a containerized molecular laboratory at the Capitol Annex. With this, RT-PCR test results can be given within 24 hours or less unlike before when such results were available a week or more after being sent to Cebu City. Isolation centers/areas were established with the Gallares Hospital being identified as the COVID-19 hospital center in Bohol. The Bohol Inter-agency Task Force (BIATF), the provincial counterpart of the national IATF, was organized involving all stakeholders in Bohol, both public and private, including both major medical associations in the province. Health protocols were instituted and strictly enforced provincewide.

Other initiatives were instituted to address the COVID-19 pandemic in Bohol in 2020:

- 1. Construction of isolation wings in all hospitals, providing separate Emergency Room (ER) for patients with respiratory infection, strict implementation of health protocols and providing a separate waiting area for OPD patients
- 2. Conversion of some hospital rooms to isolation rooms for COVID 19 patients
- 3. Construction of triage area in all hospitals, swabbing booth, foot bath. lavatory sink for handwashing at the hospital entrance
- 4. Provision of alcohol and sanitizers and footbath for customers/clients' use and strict wearing of face mask/face shield and observance of physical distancing in all public areas in Bohol
- 5. Hiring of additional contact tracers for all LGUs with funding from both local and national governments thru DILG
- 6. Conversion of rooms to isolation rooms for COVID 19 patients
- 7. Establishment of Quarantine/ Isolation Facilities including staffing complement
 - Identifying quarantine facilities in each LGU
 - 6 Quarantine facilities identified by PGBh and 1 isolation facility designated at Capitol Annex
- 8. Establishment of swabbing area for suspected COVID patients
- 9. Provision of medical equipment (i.e., ventilators, respirators, etc.), PPEs and other medical supplies and equipment
 - Procurement of medical materials and supplies such as PPEs, disinfectants, swabbing booth, boots, RT-PCR reagents/other materials

- 10. Issuance and strict implementation of mandatory policies and protocols imposed by the Department of Health, BIATF, LGUs and hospitals for COVID 19 prevention and the spread of the disease
 - COVID -19 Handbook on COVID-19 Protocols and Guidelines
 - Leaflets on COVID -19
 - Advocacy/ IEC on precautionary measures on COVID-19
 - > Trainings/orientations conducted on COVID-19 for Municipal Inter-Agency Task Force, Association of Barangay Captains and Private Sectors
 - > Simplified Trainor's Training Module for Non-Medical Personnel: COVID-19 Response Information Campaign Version 1.0 April 20, 2020
 - Creating modules for non-medical personnel in handling COVID-19
- 11. Created the PHO Infectious Waste Disposal and Disinfection Teams
- 12. Creation of an Emerging and Non Re-Emerging Infectious Diseases (EREID) Unit in hospitals
- 13. Organized the Bohol PHO Operation Center (OPCEN) with 24/7 duty staff and hotlines in response to Code Red Sublevel II situation

Welfare Services

 - Provided financial/food assistance to 10,039 distressed individuals for medical, burial, transportation and food: P20,285,330.00
- 4. Assistance to Stranded Individuals
 - Extended assistance to 656 stranded individuals and 980 families amounting to P608,380.00

The FHSIS is the official system of the Department of Health (DOH) / DOH-Center for Health and Development (CHD) and as per Executive Order No. 352 was included by the National Statistical Coordination Board (NSCB) in a system of designated statistics. FHSIS is the major component of the network information sources developed by the DOH. The FHSIS to date is the only information system in the whole government machinery that is in place down to the barangay level.

The Provincial Health Office of the Province of Bohol utilizes the Field Health Service Information System (FHSIS). The data generated is used in the monitoring and evaluation of health programs through program implementation review (PIR) conducted by PHO in collaboration with DOH-CHD Region 7. Moreover, the FHSIS is also utilized by the LGUs in their local decision making.

D. HEALTH EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT SERVICES (HEMS)

Health Emergency Management Service (HEMS) is a complex process that involves activities performed in pre-disaster, disaster and post-disaster scenarios. These include health dissemination, health emergency planning, capability building, advocacy campaign, health emergency response

coordination and monitoring, logistics pre-positioning and donations tracking. To manage health emergency in the Province of Bohol, the Health Emergency Management Staffs of the Bohol Provincial Health Office (PHO) is at the forefront of all of these activities. The Bohol PHO - Operations Center (OPCEN) at Provincial Capitol monitors the occurrence of health emergencies and events, mostly the COVID-19 Pandemic as of the moment, with emergency potential through various communication media (televisions, cellphones, transportation, newspapers) 24 hours a day, seven days a week starting at the 4th week of January 2020. It is manned by the staffs of the Technical Division with the support of the Admin and Supply Division of the Bohol Provincial Health Office (PHO), which is headed by a Provincial Health Officer, Nurse V, PESU Coordinator, and HEMS Coordinator. In case of any occurrences, situations, or events, these personnel coordinate the response actions as necessary. These coordination and monitoring will continue until the response activities are terminated or the event is considered closed and a final report is prepared.

E. HEALTH EDUCATION AND ADVOCACY PROGRAM (HEAP)

The real war heroes in the battle against the CoV-2 virus are virologists, epidemiologists, doctors and nurses that focuses on the prevention of disease. Nurses are continuously doing their best to promote health awareness to the general public. Many of the measures that are now taken to prevent citizens and health workers from getting infected imply a change of behavior. Hand washing, wearing face masks and protective gloves and social distancing are all forms of health behavioral change. One campaign of the government is the "BIDA Solusyon Kontra Covid-19".

Enabling people to increase management and control over their health and its determinants is at the core of health promotion that is more important in this time of crisis than ever before. Health promotion can contribute to addressing the CoV-2 virus threat at different levels: at the downstream level focusing on individual behavior change and disease management, at the midstream level through interventions affecting organizations and communities and at the upstream level through informing policies affecting the population.

F. NON-COMMUNICABLE / HEALTHY LIFESTYLE PROGRAM

The Department of Health launched its Nationwide Healthy Lifestyle Movement - Pilipinas Go4health which encourages Filipinos to commit to a healthy Lifestyle through Physical activity, proper nutrition, and the prevention or cessation of smoking and alcohol Consumption. The Healthy Lifestyle Program was launched to help prevent and control Non-communicable diseases (NCDs) in the country. A significant proportion of Filipino adults are exposed to NCD risk which include tobacco and alcohol use, unhealthy diets, and physical inactivity. About 57% of the total mortality rate in the Philippines is due to NCDs such as Cardiovascular diseases, Cancer, Diabetes, and Chronic Respiratory Disease. The increase in NCDs is affecting populations of low- and middle-income countries like the Philippines at a young age, reducing the productivity of the working age population and stifling economic growth. Hence, the Pilipinas Go4health aspires to provide options for healthy living and making these options accessible to all Filipinos.

G. NATIONAL PREVENTION OF BLINDNESS PROGRAM

The National Prevention of Blindness Program envisioned for a healthy vision for every Filipino through eye health promotion and disease prevention. Blindness, as a health problem, leads to enormous human suffering due to loss of functional ability and self-esteem. The 3rd Philippine National Survey of Blindness shows that about 3.5 Million (4.62%) Filipinos are visually impaired to one or both eyes. The program aims to reduce the current prevalence of bilateral blindness to less than 0.3% and ultimately to prevent or reduce blindness in the long run. According to WHO estimates, about 80% of global blindness is modified that could have been prevented or controlled if the available knowledge and interventions had been timely applied or it can be successfully tested for sight restoration. The Program requires a community-based strategy and information dissemination that focuses on avoidable the inability to deliver such information to the community level contributes to the gasps of the program.

Persons with Disabilities (PWDs), according to the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons With Disabilities, include those who have long-term physical, mental, intellectual or sensory impairments which in interaction with various barriers may hinder their full and effective participation in society on an equal basis with others. The International Classification of Functioning, Disability and Health (ICF) refer to disability as "an umbrella term covering impairments, activity limitations, and participation restrictions. Impairment is a problem in body function or structure; an activity limitation is a difficulty encountered by an individual in executing a task or action; while a participation restriction is a problem experienced by an individual in involvement in life situations". The ICF's definition of disability denotes a negative interaction between a person (with a health condition) and his or her contextual factors (environmental and personal factors). A comprehensive approach in interventions is then necessary for persons with disabilities (PWDs) as it entails actions beyond the context of health, but more on helping them to overcome difficulties by removing environmental and social barriers (WHO, 2013).

Most of the institutions, organizations, establishments having regular schedule in the past years did not showed-up this year. Some reasoned out of having no students in schools, others due to closure of their business establishments while others were due to slashing of employees. This steered us to convince other groups to conduct blood donation and we made it. We were able to tap 9 new more groups mostly of which were the hospitals who were then the recipients of blood for their patients. Men in uniform have greatly contributed to the collections as they were the recruits of the hospitals. With the scarcity of blood this year the Gov. Celestino Gallares Memorial Hospital had done their blood donation among its staff and employees, likewise the PGBh employees headed by this office did our share of giving too which was conducted at the Ceremonial Hall, 4th Floor New Capitol Building. This year a total of 148 mobile blood donations were conducted in both LGU and community-initiated activities with a total collection of 6,944 units of blood which is equivalent to a Blood Donation Rate of 4.7 all from voluntary blood donors, the considered living heroes of Bohol.

Blood Donor Recruitment Orientation is an activity which has great impact on the recruitment of blood donors. Through these orientations, there were more blood donors who voluntarily share their precious blood. A total of only 12 batches of BDRO were conducted with 615 Blood Donor Recruiters in attendance which is 40% less than 2019 orientations. COVID 19 pandemic greatly affects the program implementation.

Observance of Special Event

Despite of the pandemic but still we were able to celebrate World Blood Donor Day this year which was strictly following on the minimum health standard protocol. This year's celebration was anchored on the theme "Isang Pamilya, Isang Lahi, Isang Bansa" held in the municipality of Anda with Dugoyanihan Zumba Dance craze among health workers headed by the Municipal Health Officer Dr. Rosario Tinio and of course following social distancing, after which a mobile blood donation followed with Governor Celestino Gallares Memorial Hospital blood bank as the BCU (blood collecting unit).

Acknowledging the efforts of program partners like the barangay officials most especially the barangay captains for their active participation in the blood donation by bringing recruits. There were 369 barangays in Bohol who were awarded in 2019 for attaining 1% or more Blood Donation Rate. Since social gathering is not allowed due to the COVID 19 pandemic, the awards were then delivered to their respective LGUs for them to distribute to the awardees. This year it increased to 372 barangays.

- Recognition of LGUs, program awardees and blood galloners that boost morale

Hindering Factors:

- Poor donor recruitment and retention

- Limited donor recruiters
- Existing fears, prevailing misconceptions about blood donations amidst covid situation
- No province-owned hospital capable and licensed to operate a Blood Bank
- Lack of phlebotomist
- Inadequate budget for donor meals
- Insufficient funds for Donor Incentive Program
- Less priority of some LCEs
- Non-availability of NGOs, POs supporting blood program
- Lack of vehicle causing clash among program implementers resulting to commute
- Impact of costly blood processing fees especially among indigents
- Delayed procurement processes thus activities were not conducted on time

Recommendations:

- Purchase collaterals as token to blood donors for them to be encouraged to come back the next scheduled blood donation activity.
- Conduct more blood donor recruitment orientations down to barangay level
- Conduct IEC and distribute materials down to barangay levels to raise awareness on voluntary non-remunerated blood donation
- Provide technical assistance/support to LGUs in terms of advocacy for voluntary blood donation
- Assist GMPH comply with necessary requirements for blood bank license
- Training on Clinical Practice Guidelines for medical practitioners
- Train more nurses and medical technologists on Quality Blood Donation Phlebotomy
- Purchase vehicle to augment blood collection and other advocacy activities
- Lobby to increase budget for voluntary blood donation to cover donor meals, incentive programs
- Lobby for inclusion of blood processing fee in LGU/DSWD budget
- Fastract procurement processes so that supplies will be delivered on time.

Bohol province has twenty-two (23) provincial paid sanitation inspectors and forty six (48) municipal paid sanitation inspectors doing their duties and functions for environmental activities.

Program/Project/Activity:

1. Provision of latrine and sustainable Sanitation to municipalities, province wide.

Improper excreta disposal is the principal factor in the transmission and spread of gastro infection and intestinal parasitism. Responsible to water supply sources contamination which resulted to outbreaks of diseases such as gastroenteritis, cholera and others. Aside from that, improper and unsanitary excreta disposal bring about unsightly condition and foul odor which definitely nuisance to the community. Based on the DOH Administrative Order No. 2010-0021indicating the

objectives that at least 60% of all barangays have been declared ZOD status and all barangays by 2022. Pushing the sanitation agenda, one take action seriously and advocates that sanitation be an immediate priority and invites all municipalities and communities to accelerate actions in improving sanitation for all by providing individual sanitary latrines to households without toilet, especially to those classified as indigents.

2. Training on Community Led Total Sanitation (CLTS) (3 Batches)

CLTS is an approach that focuses on assisting the community and individual in understanding the health risk associated with open defecation and use of disgust and shame as 'triggering factor" to promote action or behavioral change leading to construction and use of locally built household latrines without any form of subsidy from government. The approach is aimed mainly on achieving sustained behavioral change thru motivation and mobilization of the communities to understand the health and environmental risk associated with open defecation. Training will completely guide our sanitation Inspectors in performing effectively their day-to-day duties and responsibilities in the field of Environmental Sanitation especially the ZOD Program in its municipalities.

3. Monitoring and evaluation Re: Refilling Stations

The demand of water refilling stations — water store that sell purified water is increasing. Water refilling stations managed by private entrepreneurs offer a cheaper and more convenient solution to the public drinking water needs than bottled water or the use of household filters. An informed survey revealed that 7 out of 10 licensed water refilling stations do not comply with drinking water safety guidelines set by DOH to ensure water safety and quality. Water refilling stations did not comply DOH requirements that their personnel wear proper attire such as mask, hair net, gloves, scrub suit tom prevent water contamination while some water refilling stations were not using the proper procedure for thoroughly cleaning and sanitizing the water containers. To ensure their continuous business operation, water refilling stations need to secure sanitary permit by passing sanitary inspections which are periodically conducted. As a safety measures, household are encouraged to source their drinking water only from licensed water refilling stations who consistently and fully comply with DOH guidelines.


4. Evaluation for ZOD (Zero open Defecation) Verification to different municipalities (2019 - (2020) ZOD program is presently being promoted by the DOH and other agencies in the country such as UNICEF, World Bank, Water and Sanitation Program, Plan International etc. as one of the major strategies for scaling up several sanitation developments. By 2016 as set in the DOH National Sustainable Sanitation Plan (NSSP), at least 60% of all barangays have declared ZOD status and all barangays nationwide by year 2022. Verification and certification status is an important activity to know the actual situation as to what extent the claims made the barangay to give recognition or reward (ex. Financial assistance for sanitation program or hardware subsidies that could be given as collective community reward once the community achieves ZOD status) and to recognize the collective effort of the communities in achieving ZOD status based on clear objective measures and impartial process. The implementation of ZOD program and the recognition of barangay ZOD status deemed necessary to set guidelines on the verification and certification of the barangay that would achieve ZOD status and to streamline the verification and certification process for both government and non -government WASH (Water, Sanitation and Hygiene), thereby monitoring and evaluation is vital on this program.



Target vs. Accomplishment

Recommendation:

- 1. Strengthen IEC down to barangay, purok, and school level
- 2. Regular monitoring
- 3. Provide technical assistance/support to LGUs in terms of environmental sanitation.
- 4. Procurement of digital camera for documentation

Plan for 2021:

Environmental Sanitation activities for 2021 will continue to implement depending on the Pandemic situation such as provision of latrine and sustainable sanitation to municipalities province wide, monitoring and evaluation Re: Refilling Stations, evaluation for ZOD (Zero open Defecation) Verification to different municipalities, conduct monthly monitoring on sea water sampling at specific sites in Panglao town and other related activities.

Here is a comparative data showing the significant difference of renal morbidity and renal mortality from the year 2019 and 2020. The data, based from the statistics of PHO, shows a little bit improving because the difference is high, even though 2020 data are still partial list. Nonetheless, there is only 38.44% or 2,328 cases of renal morbidity in year 2020; and only 10.58% or 55 case of renal mortality in the year 2020. In addition, it is also advisable to have a comprehensive action plan that should

include effective management of risk factors for Renal disease at the primary care level, improved case detection among at-risk populations, and development of facilities for treating patients with documented disease.

Q. SCHISTOSOMIASIS CONTROL AND ELIMINATION PROGRAM

Schistosomiasis is a parasitic infection caused by the blood fluke, Schistosoma Japonicum. Schistosoma eggs hatch, release miracidiae, and infect the intermediate snail host, Oncomelania hupensis quadrasi. Schistosomiasis is considered endemic in the municipalities of Talibon and Trinidad and thus the Schistosomiasis Control and Elimination Program remains an ongoing program in the Province of Bohol, aiming for a Schistosomiasis free province.

R. NATIONAL LEPROSY CONTROL PROGRAM

The National Leprosy Control Program ensures the provision of a comprehensive, integrated quality leprosy services at all levels of health care and envisioned an empowered primary stakeholder in leprosy and eliminate leprosy as a public health problem, aiming to ensure the availability of adequate anti-leprosy drugs or multiple drug therapy (MDT). Prevent and reduce disabilities from leprosy by 35% through Rehabilitation and Prevention of Impairments and Disabilities (RPIOD) and Self Care, improve case detection and post-elimination surveillance system using the WHO protocol in selected LGUs, integration of leprosy control with other health services at the local level, active participation of person affected by leprosy in leprosy control and human dignity program in collaboration with the National Program for Persons with Disability and strengthen the collaboration with partners and other stakeholders in the provision of quality leprosy services for socio-economic mobilization and advocacy activities for leprosy.

T. NATIONAL DENGUE PREVENTION AND CONTROL PROGRAM

Dengue is the fastest spreading vector-borne disease in the World. Dengue virus has 4 serotypes (DENV1, DENV2, DENV3 and DENV4). First infection with one of the 4 serotypes is usually non-severe, while second infection with one of the other serotypes may cause damage. Dengue has no treatment but the disease can be early managed. It is transmitted by day biting Aedes Aegypti and Aedes Albopictus mosquitoes. Dengue illness is categorized according to severity as Dengue without warning signs, Dengue with warning signs and Severe dengue.

U. PROVINCIAL EPIDEMIOLOGY SURVEILLANCE UNIT (OPERATION CENTER)

Disease surveillance is recognized as the cornerstone of public health decision-making and practice. Surveillance data provide information which can be used for priority setting, policy decisions, planning, implementation, resource mobilization and allocation, prediction and early detection of epidemics. Surveillance system can also be used for monitoring, evaluation and improvement of disease prevention and control programs.

This is an epidemiological practice by which the spread of disease is monitored in order to establish patterns of progression. A key part of modern disease surveillance is the practice of disease case reporting. With the advent of modern communication technology, this has changed dramatically. Further, there is considerable public pressure to make this information available quickly and accurately. In the province, there is a need to strengthen disease surveillance and response system. Strengthening surveillance and response system starts with developing policies and strategies that would make the system more efficient and effective. In order to achieve this, the Provincial Government of Bohol and the Department of Health is adopting an integrated approach to surveillance of priority communicable disease and conditions. This approach aims at coordinating and streamlining all surveillance activities and ensuring timely provision of surveillance information for action.

Detection of disease cases will be done by the disease reporting units or DRUs which are the following:

- Rural Health Units
- MHO/CHO
- Local hospitals (district hospitals, provincial hospitals, regional hospital)
- Private hospitals and clinics

In the previous years' accomplishment report of notifiable diseases reached only 40%, only few DRUs are active. Currently with the strong coordination and collaboration with the Department of Health thru their NDHs reporting system has intensely changed. Almost all RHUs submit their weekly report, however MESU are not active, and thus surveillance of other diseases is not well identified. Thorough investigations of reported cases were done by Provincial Epidemiology and Surveillance Unit PESU with Regional Epidemiology and Surveillance Unit RESU and proper actions were also conducted. Despite of limited budget allocated for PESU the team able to conduct investigation and monitor reported cases using PHO office gasoline allowance.

For year 2020, a Provincial Ordinance No. 2020-012 "ESTABLISHING THE PROVONCIAL EPIDEMIOLOGY AND SURVEILLANCE UNIT OF THE PROVINCE OF BOHOL AND MANDATING ALL LOCAL GOVERNMENT UNITS (LGUs) AND HOSPITALS TO CREATE EPIDEMIOLOGY SURVEILLANCE UNIT (ESU)/ CITY EPIDEMIOLOGY DURVEILLANCE UNIT (CESU) AND PROVIDING FUNDS THEREOF." It was in the said ordinance the PHO Operation Center was created. The main function of the Operation Center are:

- Operation Center Response (24/7)
- Specimen Collection (24/7 & when needed)
- Transportation (24/7)
- Disinfection (24/7)
- Quarantine Facility Response (24/7)
- Infectious Waste collection, disinfection and disposal
- Front Desk Services
- Provides Capacity Building, lectures and orientation to other frontliners both medical and non-medical team.
- Provides coordination between the public, concerned individuals, hospitals, Rural Health Units, DOH and others
- Arrangement and endorsement of non-covid patients to hospitals with available beds
- Deployment of medical assets (specimen collectors, disinfecters, etc)
- Discharge of MARI and SARI cases with endorsement to concerned LGU
- Issuance of Medical Certificate
- Submission of COVID-19 data to GO, DOH, concerned LGU
- Reporting of COVID 19-related deaths to LGUs for immediate burial
- Contact-tracing
- Identification and preparation of Isolation and Quarantine Facilities
- Specimen Reception, storage, packing and delivery.
- Advocacy IEC and dissemination of information to LGUs/RHUs/Health Facilities
- Monitoring of contacts tracing activities and general COVID-19 data collection, posting, tracking and reporting
- Allocation and distribution of supplies and other resources
- Responds to gueries on COVID-19 and OpCen services

Gaps

- Very limited budget allocated by the Provincial government.
- Since there is limited budget for PESU, the unit has been dependent with supplies and logistics from RESU especially during outbreak response.
- Some disease reporting units are inactive or delayed in submitting reports due to unavailability of internet connections.
- Inactive Municipal Epidemiology and Surveillance Unit and no designated disease surveillance officer in some Rural Health Units and Hospitals
- PESU Office not conducive for work, it should obtain small laboratory and sink for the specimen examination and preparation to send to RITM for confirmation of cases.


Strategies

W. POPULATION DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

The Philippine Population Management Program (PPMP) is being implemented through its three main program components: Responsible Parenthood and Family Planning (RP/FP), Adolescent Health and Youth Development, and (POPDEV) Integration. These three components deal with the main population issues related to sexual and reproductive health, including fertility and family planning concerns. It primarily aims to help couples to realize their desired timing, spacing, and number of children in accordance with their socioeconomic, emotional, and psychological capacity. The (AHD) program aims to address issues related to adolescent and youth sexuality and reproductive health, including too early pregnancy. It aims to provide adolescent and youth with the appropriate information and life skills to enable them to cope with issues related to their sexual and full development into adulthood. The Young Adult Fertility Study (YAFS 4) conducted in 2013, pointed out that the most significant person in the lives of an adolescent is a "friend, classmate, or in general the peer". Further, the same study revealed that the picture on sexual risk behaviors indicate a worsening

trend. The situation calls for a response that may not necessarily address the problem immediately but at least provide interventions for the factors that largely contribute to it. In Bohol Province, data shows that, for the last three years (2018-2019), the number of teenage pregnancy is growing rapidly.

Figure I. Authorized Bed Capacity and Bed Occupancy Rate 2016-2020





Figure II. Hospitals Admissions Categorized as PHIC and non PHIC members for 2018-2020





Figure V. Income from 2016-Jan-November 2020






Figure VI. Hospital MOOE vs Income

Safety in this time of pandemic is a major concern for TBGDH Frontliners, thus, workshop on proper Donning/Doffing and Swabbing facilitated by GCGMH Infection Control Team was conducted on September 19, 2020. The workshop was participated by Medtechs, Utility Workers, Nurses, Nursing Attendants, Ambulance Drivers and Doctors.

Blood Donor Recruitment Orientation - February 4, 2020)

Blood Donor Recruitment Orientation organized by Gallares Team aims to create awareness on the importance of voluntary blood donation.

Surgical Mission Conducted – February 2020 (Fil-Am Medical/Dental/Minor Surgical Mission)

Surgical Mission sponsored by Fil-Am was successfully conducted in coordination with LGU-Jagna.







Infrastructure

Construction of Commu Ward/ Holding Area - March 12, 2021 (Funded by LGU)

Commu Ward started to operate on April 2020 with 15 beds capacity. It caters patients with respiratory symptoms. Holding area is provided for patients waiting for laboratory result.

ISO 9001: 2015 Quality Management System Activities

Conduct of Internal Quality Audits – February and August 2020

Internal Quality Audit (IQA) is done twice a year to ensure that compliance to Quality Management System is maintained. It determines the problem and resolve it by finding the root cause and taking corrective actions to improve the system of department /sections. The first IQA was conducted last 20 February 2020 with 16 minor non-conformities and 8 improvements. The latest IQA was conducted last August 10-14, 2020 with 7 minor non- conformities and 5 improvement findings.

Conduct of Management Reviews – April and October 2020

Top Management conduct Management Review attended by all section heads and department heads every 6 months to determine and evaluate the QMS performance, the need for change and recommendations for improvement.

ISO 9001:2015 Remote Audit – May and November 2020

TBGDH has undergone the first remote surveillance audit and was able to maintain its ISO 9001:2015 certification with a total of 9 audit findings (7 minor non-conformities, 2 for Improvements and 0 major non-conformities).

CONG. SIMEON G. TORIBIO MEMORIAL HOSPITAL (CSTMH)

Congressman Simeon Toribio Memorial Hospital a Level 1 in category, is situated at the middle of the island province which is sixty (60) kilometers away from Tagbilaran City. The hospital was created in May 28, 1968, by virtue of Republic Act 2079 with a bed capacity of twenty-five (25) named Carmen Emergency Hospital (Pambiglaang Pagamutan ng Carmen). It was later renamed to Celestino Gallares Memorial Hospital - Carmen then to Cong. Simeon G. Toribio Memorial Hospital. Since 2018, it is downsized from fifty (50) bed capacity to forty (40) due to lack of Nurses and the on-going infrastructure projects. Until now, another on-going project which is the completion of our CEMONC building project is the cause why some of our in-patients are displaced and cannot accommodate additional patients beyond forty (40). However, with this COVID 19 pandemic we converted the BIARPS building into an ILI Ward which accommodates five (5) patients and recently the vacated old X-ray room and Laboratory is also converted into an ILI Ward also which accommodate seven (7) beds so that our implementing beds is fifty-two (52). This hospital adheres to Department of Health and PhilHealth policies. It is PhilHealth accredited namely:

- Level 1 Hospital
- TB DOTS Provider
- **Animal Bite Center**

The hospital provides 4 major services: Medical, Pediatrics, Obstetrics-Gynecology, Surgery and Laboratory including X-ray, Ultrasound and ECG. Also provided are DOTS Services, Rabies, Family Planning and Newborn Screening. The hospital It serves the catchment area of Loboc, Sevilla, Bilar, Batuan, Carmen, Sagbayan, Dagohoy, Sierra-Bullones, Pilar and Danao with a catchment population of 228,785. The hospital has sixty-two (62) regular employees. This work force is being augmented by twenty-seven (27) contract personnel and twenty-nine (29) Job orders. These employees are encouraged to participate civic actions within the hospital premise monthly. Physical Fitness is being practiced every Wednesday through Zumba and ball games for one (1) hour.



CNCMH ACCOMPLISHMENT REPORT

I. BACKGROUND

The Cong. Natalio P. Castillo, Sr. Memorial Hospital is created in June 15, 1968 thru an act of Congress per Republic Act No.5297 and was then known as the Loon Emergency Hospital. It was renamed to its present name in November 29, 1989 by Republic Act No. 678. The hospital is government-owned and managed by the Provincial Government of Bohol.

CNCMH is an Infirmary Health Facility operating on a 25-bed capacity as authorized by the DOH. It is a PHIC accredited hospital and presently operating on a temporary location pending the completion of the construction of the new hospital building. The Admin Office is located near the entrance of the temporary hospital building while the emergency room, nurse station, ward, laboratory, delivery room and pharmacy are all in one building thus resulting to overcrowding. The pediatric ward is made up of makeshift materials in which air-conditioning unit is installed to provide additional ventilation. Improvement/ renovation of the existing Philhealth office funded by the PGBh has been completely done & endorsed by middle of this year and is presently being utilized as a Male ward to decongest patients from the main hospital building.

In addition, the OPD was built from DOH funds thru DPWH which started operating last April 2016 while the TB Dots center started its operation on the 2nd quarter of this year. However, the old damaged building is being utilized as a supply office and stock room for medicines, medical, dental, and laboratory supplies while the kitchen is operating in the old doctor's dormitory. A temporary

isolation ward which is made of light materials is located 50 meters away from the main hospital building while x-ray facility is not available due to the current location and condition.

The CCNMH was previously classified as a Level I hospital. However, because of not meeting some Dept. of Health licensing requirements, the hospital was downgraded to primary care facility pending compliance to the lacking requirements like X-ray services, operating room services, among others since the hospital buildings collapsed/totally damaged in 2013 as a result of the 7.2 magnitude earthquake that hit Bohol Province.

CNCMH serves the Inter Local Health Zone (ILHZ) of Loon, Maribojoc, Antequera, Calape, Tubigon, Clarin and Inabanga. However, most of the clientele are from Loon and Calape due to the presence of 3 other province-run hospitals in Maribojoc, Clarin, and Inabanga along with the developed municipal-run hospitals in Calape and Tubigon. The activation of the ILHZ is yet to be done and development in their area is yet to be seen.

The Maribojoc Community Hospital is a 15-bed hospital constructed in 1974, managed by the Philippine Medical Care Commission and in 1988 it was turned over to the Department of Health Manila until its devolution to the Provincial Government of Bohol in April 1993. The Hospital underwent its major renovation in August 1999 to March 2000 with the financial assistance of the Philippine Charity Sweepstakes Office. The hospital is located in Barangay Bayacabac, Maribojoc, Bohol some 14km. from Tagbilaran City. It serves primarily the people of Maribojoc and its neighboring towns of Antequera and Cortes. It provides primary health services such as emergency first aid and subsequent transport by ambulance when needed, outpatient consultations, 15-bed inpatient service, minor surgery, obstetric normal deliveries and routine laboratory examinations.

FRANCISCO DAGOHOY MUNICIPAL HOSPITAL

I. SITUATIONAL ANALYSIS:

Introduction. This strategic plan has been made to meet the desired goal of Francisco Dagohoy Memorial Hospital for the year 2022 to enhance the service offered and to increase the income generating.

Background. The Francisco Dagohoy Memoriall Hospital is a Provincial government —owned hospital constructed and built in 1983 and was fully operational in 1985 upon the completion of the main building and after the availability of all essential diagnostic equipments needed to provide both curative and rehabilitative health services to the people of Inabanga and its neighboring towns of Clarin, Buenavista, Getafe and Dagohoy. It was managed and operated by the Philippine National Government through the supervision of the Department of Health. When the Local Government Code of 1991 took effect after its approval, the management and operations of this hospital were devolved from the Department of Health to the Provincial Government of Bohol on April 1, 1993. In February to June 2003, the main building of this hospital underwent a complete, total renovation and rehabilitation through the financial assistance of the Mormons. It is located at Cagay-an, Inabanga, Bohol, about two (2) kilometers away from the Poblacion, along the Inabanga National Highway, around 72 kilometers away from the City of Tagbilaran and is situated in the northern coast of the Island of Bohol.

Current Situation. The construction of the hospital's new ward building has greatly help the in housing of our patients. The said building has a capacity of accommodating 40 patients more or less. The construction of the said building was funded by the Department of Health through the Health Facility Enhancement Program Project (HFEP) duly implemented by the DPWH. A portion of this building was converted into a quarantine facility for the employees. Due to the threat of COVID 19 and in order to prevent the transmission of the said disease, the management decided to create a new schedule for employees wherein 4 groups are being formed in which the said group will take in charge in the operations of the hospital for one week. After its duty, another group will take over, the previous group will directly occupy the quarantine facility as stated above for 7 days, a rapid/ swab test will be performed to the said group depending on the situation in order to ensure that they are free from COVID before they will be released for their home quarantine. The old hospital building is currently converted into an isolation facility, wherein no employees are allowed to enter except for those

selected hospital nurse, nursing attendant, utility worker who will man the facility. Patients who have covid related symptoms are being brought and be treated upon. Since the building has been greatly affected by the 7.2 earthquake, the management decided to demolish the facility. This year 2021, the hospital has acquired budget for the said demolition. The hospital is currently coordinating with the Provincial Engineer's Office and Provincial General Services Office to facilitate the requirements, conduct joint inspection and estimation of cost for the project. However, the hospital will be facing challenge since it has been used as an isolation facility. The Construction of new ER and OPD building has also improved our services especially in giving comfort to our patients as well as the employees. The said building has started its operation last September 2020. The building includes the Office of the Administrative and Finance Services Department, Emergency Room, Pharmacy, X-ray Room, Medical Social Welfare Office, Animal Bite Treatment Facility, Outpatient department, Medical Records Room and Laboratory. Due to budget constraints, the Hfep project has stopped its operation leaving behind the laboratory and x-ray room and some parts of the admin office unfinished. However, through the effort of the employees, the hospital has managed to finish the laboratory and the admin office and currently started its finishing touches in the xray-room. The hospital also plans to upgrade its services, by this year a new to dots center will be opened for the public. A license to operate for the hospital, pharmacy and laboratory and philhealth accreditation has been renewed for the period January 1 to December 31, 2021. A new generator set was installed last November 2020, funded by the Provincial Disaster and Risk Reduction Management Office. The said equipment has greatly helped the hospital in providing a continuous supply of electricity especially in times of power interruption and sudden brown/ blackout. The hospital is very thankful to the PDRRMO since a new ambulance which was also funded by the office was delivered to the hospital last August 2020, wherein a complete set of emergency equipment which includes defibrillator and other emergency kits, tools and equipment primarily made for saving lives. The hospital has also finished its project for the line expansion of the whole hospital facility. Three new 50 kva transformers line post together with accessories has been installed by the Bohol Electric Cooperative I with the help of the Provincial General Services Office. The said project was pursued by the management in order to have a stable electricity capable enough to supply the needs of the hospital especially to the hospital's medical and non-medical equipment. The management is planning to have a new water source, since it has been observed that current water source is producing less water supply. The hospital is now coordinating with the Provincial Planning and Development Office for the said Project.







I. HIGHLIGHTS OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS FOR CY 2020

Over the years, the Department of Education (DepEd) has been undertaking fundamental reforms which could be considered as the most ambitious actions DepEd has undertaken. These reforms which are now being implemented are expected to create critical changes to further accelerate, broaden and sustain improved education effort.

As the year 2020 ushered in, we are again in the forefront of the biggest challenge in education history brought about by COVID-19. The severe short-term disruption has been felt by all families and has greatly affected the education system not just in our country but in the whole world. The crisis crystallizes the dilemma whether to forego the opening of classes in School Year 2020-2021, reducing contact, and saving lives, or keep schools opened as provided by law and face a great challenge in the delivery of teaching and learning using a flexible delivery modality. Education should be our top priority. Despite the present condition, DepEd is guided with the pronouncement of our Secretary, Leonor M. Briones, "Education Must Continue". Indeed, the issuance of DepEd Order No. 007, s. 2020 School Calendar and Activities for School Year 2020-2021 and Basic Education Learning Continuity Plan, translated the commitment of DepEd to ensure education continuity amid the crisis but health and safety of our learners and the whole school communities are of utmost importance and must be always uphold.

DepEd's "newfound purpose" of the Sulong Edukalidad campaign is to move forward together as the education system is being prepared for the "new normal". In this battle, all actions have been anchored on serving the public and on ensuring that the health and safety of the learners, teachers and personnel will be given priority in DepEd policies and actions. In this light, DepEd issued Memorandum (OUCI-2020-307) which suggested measures to foster "Academic Ease" during the COVID-19 pandemic as well calling on the whole nation to preserve the "bayanihan" spirit as it ensures that education of millions of Filipino learners will continue. The Division Learning Continuity Plan is

crafted to address the educational needs of all learners employing various innovative strategies effectively and efficiently promoting and sustaining a learner-centered public institution under the COVID-19 pandemic.

In Year 2020, the agency supports the Basic Education Learning Continuity Plan (LCP) and the goals and objectives of DepEd which is to implement the flexible teaching and learning delivery options amid the crisis without compromising the delivery of quality education. DepEd Bohol mobilizes the creation of **Task Force "Oplan BB"** which translates "Brigada Eskwela, Balik Eskwela", as an implementing arm of the Schools Division Office to ensure the achievement of quality basic education agenda and successful implementation of LCP. "Oplan BB" is composed of eleven (11) task forces to give guidance/directions and quality implementation of the strategies/interventions of the LCP thereby, minimizing or eliminating health risks, resource constraints, communication crisis, political imbalance and other hindering factors. The task forces are the following:

1. TASK FORCE (TF) KAALAM

TF Kaalam (knowledge) is tasked to ensure that learning in the Division of Bohol continues amidst COVID-19 treats under the new normal of education. It is also to provide strategies and technical assistance in the quality implementation of flexible teaching and learning deliveries as well as the effective and efficient implementation of the "Most Essential Learning Competencies" (MELC) as prescribed by DepEd.

2. TASK FORCE (TF) GAMITKAT-ON

TF Gamitkat-on (Learning Materials/LRMD) is tasked to ensure that quality reading resources, in both online and offline, are sufficient and accessible to all learners in support to the implementation of the different learning modalities in the curriculum delivery. It is also to provide technical assistance, and support to LR Development Team in the development of contextualized learning resources and quality assured text-based and non-text-based learning resources.

3. TASK FORCE (TF) PAGBANSAY

TF Pagbansay (HRLD) is tasked to provide strategic HRD plan that suits local situations as well as to provide quality training delivery, upskilled/equipped teachers and non-teaching personnel in the new normal. It is also to provide technical assistance to ensure quality and sustainable HRD services towards acquisition and development of competent and wholesome personnel.

4. TASK FORCE (TF) ICT PLATFORM

TF ICT PLATFORM is tasked to provide quality support to teachers, administrators, and SDO personnel of the appropriate online/offline ICT platforms under the new normal by upskilling them through trainings on tools for instructional delivery, curriculum supervision, management, and electronic public services. It is also to ensure provision of technical assistance for sustainable implementation of the learning continuity plan of the basic education under the new normal.

5. TASK FORCE (TF) BANDILYO

TF Bandilyo is tasked to provide different platforms for effective and efficient information dissemination/advocacy on educational policy guidelines, strategies, development, and updates to internal and external stakeholders in the division. It is also to ensure support in the implementation of the learning continuity plan under the new normal.

6. TASK FORCE (TF) ALALAY

TF Alalay is tasked to ensure quality management systems implementation in Schools and Learning Centers and in the adherence to standards and policies. It is also to provide technical assistance for effective and efficient school management planning, delivery of basic education programs and services, and assessment of progress in achieving educational outcomes under the new normal.

7. TASK FORCE (TF) KAABAG

TF Kaabag is tasked to ensure provision of appropriate and adequate support of resources from internal and external stakeholders to schools for the efficient and effective delivery of quality basic education under the new normal. It is also to provide technical assistance in generating resources for the implementation of learning continuity plan.

8. TASK FORCE (TF) SUPPORTA

TF Supporta is tasked to provide technical assistance to schools and learning centers by responding to their identified needs in relation to governance and operations under the new normal; assist CID in the implementation of the BE-LCP programs and activities; act as Secretariat of the Provincial School Board in determining the budgetary needs for the operations and maintenance of public schools within the province; and facilitate the release of funds from the SEF pursuant to the budget prepared and in accordance with existing rules and regulations.

9. TASK FORCE (TF) ICT INFRASTRUCTURE

TF ICT Infrastructure is tasked to ensure provision of quality support/set-up and integration of telecommunications (telephone lines and wireless signals) and computers, as well as necessary enterprise software, middleware, storage, and audiovisual systems, that enable school/district offices and SDO to access, store, transmit, and manipulate information reasonably necessary to carry on delivery of educational services under the new normal. It is also to provide technical assistance to ensure sufficient capacity, maintenance, and support specifications to satisfy the requirements of the teaching and learning delivery, and public services with regard to information and communications technology, data processing and communications.

10. TASK FORCE (TF) AYUDA

TF Ayuda is tasked to provide management with relevant financial and budgetary information for sound decision-making and to ensure efficient and effective management of financial support to schools and SDO for the implementation of quality delivery of basic education under the new normal. It is also to ensure provision of technical assistance to schools and SDO on matters of financial literacy and stewardships.

11. TASK FORCE (TF) KALITALA

TF Kalitala (Secretariat) is tasked to ensure management of information, data, reports and provide inputs to management/chair on the analysis of reports/activities/programs accomplished, issues and concerns, recommendations, set directions, connect members to work together on common goals; report regularly to the group on activities completed and upcoming activities; circulate relevant information to group members; coordinate members' inputs; provide meeting support to management/chair; ensure support on results of activities/programs/projects that address achievement of goals and objectives.

In the ensuing implementation of the BE-LCP, Technical Working Groups (TWG) in all subject areas and working teams/special working teams were gathered face-to-face from time to time with utmost considerations of the health and safety protocols in aspects where virtual engagements are difficult to conduct. Technical assistance to the field were delivered and conducted in all the listed activities below using all available technologies/platforms (text messages, video call, zoom, teams, FB, messenger, etc). All functional divisions: CID, SGOD, and OSDS are given specific instructions to extend technical assistance to the field beyond office hours even if personnel are adopting 'work from home' arrangements as well as to keep all lines (online/offline) open even during weekends. A Sense of urgency, coordination, and cohesiveness at all levels of governance are advocated and institutionalized.



I. HIGHLIGHTS OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS FOR CY 2020



Situational Overview:

1) A 12 year Basic Education Cycle

33,556 pupils/students enrolled in public & private kindergarten, elementary and secondary schools in Tagbilaran City. **1,921** for Kindergarten (age 5 years old), **12,128** for elementary (ages 6-11 years old), **11,800** for Junior High School and **6,630** for Senior High School (ages 12-18 years old). About **22,496** students enrolled in public schools, representing 67.04% of the total school age population (ages 5-16 yr. old) in the city and **11,060** or 29.75% representing the private schools enrollment.

2) Universal Pre-schooling for all. All the **24** public Elementary Schools and **20 out of 21** private Elementary Schools offer Kindergarten Education resulting in a total of **1,921** enrollment for Kindergarten (age 5 years old) for SY 2019-2020 which corresponds to 5.72% of the total enrolment population.

3) Establish the Madaris Education as a sub-system in the current education system

Madarasah/ALIVE Education plays an important role on our Muslim learners. Relatively, our Division has provided three(3) public ES(Tagb. City Central ES, City East ES & Cogon ES) & one(1) public Secondary School(Dr. Cecilio Putong NHS) which offer this type of learning with a total enrollment of 147 for this school Year 2019-2020. Four(4) teacher-Asatidz help together to handle this curriculum. As part of our support, Division Musabaqah Festival for our Muslim Learners was scheduled on September to be ultimately culminated thru a Regional Musabaqah Festival on December 2020 while a Madrasah INSET Activity for our teacher-Asatidz' as part of their capability building initiative was also proposed for this school year scheduled on October 2020 with a corresponding budget of fifteen thousand pesos(P15,000.00). All these were cancelled due to the COVID-19 crisis.

4) Re-introduce Technical and Vocational Education in Public High Schools.

Tagbilaran City DepEd Division thru its public secondary schools re-introduce technical and vocational education particularly in the Public Senior High Schools namely: Cogon High School – Evening Class offering, Dr. Cecilio Putong National High School, Manga National High School, Mansasa National High

School, San Isidro National High School & Tagbilaran City Science High School which are all offering Technical-Vocational & Livelihood (TVL) Course Offering.

5) Every Child a Reader Program

It is a perennial activity of the Division geared particularly on the non-reading Elementary pupils in order for them to have mastery in reading & comprehension. This is translated thru the Phil-IRRI Program(one in English for Grades 4-6 learners while the other one is in Filipino for Grades 3-6 learners. For SY 2019-2020, of the total of four thousand six hundred twenty four (4,624) learner-enrollees who took the Phil-IRRI test in English, only two thousand three hundred seventy six(2,376) passed the General Standard Test(GST) while those who took the test in Filipino, only two thousand three hundred eighty seven(2,387) out of the total enrolment of five thousand nine hundred sixty five(5,965) passed the GST, so, those who failed the said test will be subjected to the proper Phil-IRRI Exam (Pre-test phase and Post-test phase involving frustration, instructional, and independent equivalency areas respectively) and this is true to both subjects in Filipino and English. This program has its culmination during the National Reading Month. Our Division has appropriated 2 culminations scheduled on February and November last year (SY 2019-2020) with a total budget of twenty thousand pesos(P20,000.00) charged to MOOE. however, due to the Covid-19 Pandemic it was disrupted so that only the first culmination was implemented.

6) Improve Science & Mathematics

These two major subjects were given utmost importance on the part of our Division in fact, concerned Science and Math Supervisors conduct supervision of classroom instructions related to these subjects to assess teacher's performance and efficiency and knowledge absorption on the part of the learners. Several programs, projects & activities sponsored by both public & private entities were also proposed

& prioritized to help improved these subjects and much more enhanced the knowledge of the concerned learners. Among others are the following: Metrobank MTAP DepEd Math Challenge (Division Elimination), Metrobank MTAP DepEd Math Challenge (Division Finals), MTAP Saturday MATH Program for Regular & Advanced Learners with a total proposed budget of forty one thousand pesos(P41,000.00). However, due to the Covid-19 Pandemic it was disrupted so that only the related activities from January to February were implemented.

7) Expand Government Assistance to Private Education

Qualified learners of all the ten(10) private schools in Tagbilaran City DepEd Division have availed this program, the Junior High School-ESC and Senior High School Voucher subsidy thru our assistance and as part of our agency's mandate. Consolidated reports on GASTPE-ESC Grantees and Senior High School Voucher Program Recipients reveal that a total of two thousand nine hundred forty seven learners with a total amount of 19.850M were allocated for Junior High School while three thousand three hundred fifty six learners with a total amount of 53.637M were allocated for Senior High School.

8) Use of Mother-Language Instruction. This program is geared towards Grades 1 to 3 learners. This holds true with Tagbilaran City DepEd Division wherein several activities were implemented to give importance, due recognition and full support to this policy. Among the activities held for this purpose are the following: Supervise and monitor Filipino Classes for January to March and June to December, Provide technical assistance to School Heads and Filipino Teachers, Tagisan ng talino for Elementary and Secondary. However, due to the Covid-19 Pandemic it was disrupted so that only the related activities from January to February were implemented.

9) Better Textbooks

As part of the agency's mandate in addressing this issue, our Division took the initiative of reflecting on our list of priority programs and projects, a provision for better quality of Instructional Materials to all schools, Tools and Equipment for Senior High School and Tech-Voc with a corresponding budget of fifteen million two hundred fifty thousand pesos (15,250,000.00).

10) Build More Schools in Cooperation with LGUs. Tagbilaran City DepEd Division in collaboration with the City Government of Tagbilaran spearheaded the Construction of School Buildings and Covered Courts to all schools with a partial estimated amount of P35,000,000.00.

10. COVID 19 Experience

The Learning Continuity Plan

The Learning Continuity Plan (LCP) is our major response and our commitment in protecting the health, safety, and well-being of learners, teachers, and personnel. Education can and must continue but only under the health protocols set by the Department of Health and the World Health Organization. The key elements of the learning strategies that operationalized the BE-LCP are the streamlining of the K to 12 Curriculum into the Most Essential Learning Competencies (MELCs), and allowing of multiple learning delivery modalities such as distance learning and blended learning, either on top or in place of face-to-face learning delivery modality. To help learners, parents, and teachers implement these learning delivery modalities, Self-Learning Modules (SLMs) were made available in print and offline/online digital format, including the radio-based instruction for this school year. Tagbilaran City DepEd Division adopted the Modular type of learning for public schools while the blended type of learning modalities were adopted by that of the private schools as shown by the table below.

Youth Development

The Youth Formation Division (YFD) is a newly-formed division under the Bureau of Learner Support Services (BLSS) in the Department of Education Central Office. It aims to develop the Filipino youth for societal development, a Filipino Youth that understands that society cannot be successful unless all of its parts work together and address the nonworking parts in the society by providing a learner-centered development towards a proactive Filipino youth. It is anchored in supporting the K to 12 curricula by honing and complementing the following learning areas and skills



to be developed namely: Societal engagement, Technical skills, Social skills, Creativity and innovation skills, Affective skills, and Self-mastery skills. The goal of YFD is to empower Filipino children and youth who are responsible, hardworking, enterprising, persevering, value-driven and culturally-rooted equipped with world class skills imbued with values such as maka-Diyos, maka-Tao, maka-Bayan at maka-Kalikasan. The purpose of YFD is to formulate policies, standards and guidelines on youth programs in collaboration with its stakeholders to complement the learnings through co-curricular and non-curricular activities that promote character information, civic engagement and social consciousness towards an empowered Filipino youth that are value-driven, culturally rooted and Godfearing citizens. The Youth Formation Division (YFD) implements youth formation programs namely Student Government Program, Youth for Environment in Schools Organization (YES-O), Career Guidance Program and other shared programs such as Barkada Kontra Droga, Gulayan sa Paaralan and Child Protection Policy implementation. The division youth formation coordinators crafts division memoranda and advisories on the implementation of such programs. For easy access of data and other relevant information from the field, the YFD coordinators develop a division database/roster of the newly-elected SPG/SSG & Guidance Counselors/Designates.

The Youth Formation Division has provided technical assistance to the field through capacity building and roll-out activities this also includes the submission of reports to the regional and central office. The following are the activities to capacitate our partners in the field such as SPG/SSG advisers, YES-O coordinators, Career Guidance Designates and Advocates; the activities include:

A. Inclusive education program

1. SPED Program

An Educational Program/Service designed to meet the needs of children with special needs who cannot profit from general or Regular Education because of disabilities or Exceptional Disabilities. SPED is derived from the premise that in a democracy, every individual is valuable in his own right and should be afforded equal opportunities to develop his full potential. Equal

Educational opportunities do not mean the same educational experiences but rather "Different" experiences based on the child's unique needs. The right to education cannot be denied a person if only because of his disabilities. The ultimate goal of special education shall be the integration or mainstreaming of learners with special needs into the regular school system and eventually in the community. Tagbilaran City DepEd Division has two(2) public schools offering SPED Curriculum namely: Tagbilaran City Central School SPED Center(Public Elementary) & Tagbilaran High School for Hearing Impaired(Public Secondary) while on the private school, we have the Bohol Deaf Academy(a Private Secondary School that caters the deaf & mute learners).

2. ALIVE Program

DepED is implementing the Madrasah Education Program, as a response to the call for global commitment on Education for All. It is guided by the Roadmap for Upgrading Muslim Basic Education. There are three major components under the Roadmap: (1) Arabic Language and Islamic Values Education (ALIVE) in public schools, (2) Standard Madrasah Curriculum in Private Madaris (Islamic educational institutions), and (3) Arabic Language and Islamic Values Education (ALIVE) for Muslim Out-of-School Youth and Adults. The Arabic Language and Islamic Values Education (ALIVE) Program is the result of the dedicated efforts of the Department of Education Central, Regional and Division officials and Asatidz (teachers) who believe in the worth and development potential of every Muslim child in multi cultural and diverse environment. The Arabic Language and Islamic Values Education of DepEd Tagbilaran City showed improvement in terms of its Implementation in the past years. We have our implementation in three ES & one Secondary School namely Cogon ES, City East ES, Tagbilaran City Central ES and Dr. Cecilio Putong NHS. This in cognizance to the economic social and cultural development of the city.

3. Alternative Learning System

The Alternative Learning System (ALS) is a parallel learning system in the Philippines that provides opportunities for out-of-school youth and adult (OSYA) learners to develop basic and functional literacy skills, and to access equivalent pathways to complete basic education. The ALS Program uses a contextualized non-formal curriculum which is substantially aligned with the K to 12 Curriculum for Basic Education of the formal school system, but it is not the mirror image of the formal school curriculum. It is aligned but not identical. The ALS Program during the pandemic has greatly affected the participation of our learners. Below is the statistical data showing the decrease of participation in each ALS program.




Higher Education Institutions in Bohol Province $\underline{\bf 30}$

Total Programs in Bohol Province 386





CHED R7 conducts zoom conferences for student services and development

The Commission on Higher Education Region 7 conducted month-long zoom conferences in preparation for the new normal concerning services to student welfare and development. Different institutions across the region together with CHED RO7's Education Supervisors II presented their innovative and dynamic plans in order to meet the demands and prepare necessary actions in relation to the new normal.



Certificate of Program Compliance (COPC) Issuances of SUCs in Region

CHED RO VII ensures Quality Standards for State Universities and Colleges (SUCs) and Local Universities and Colleges (LUCs) in the region to uphold greater access, equity, competitiveness and global excellence. Thus, pursuant to CMO No. 14, series of 2019 on "Policies and Guidelines in the issuance of Certificate of Program Compliance (COPC) to State Universities and Colleges (SUCs) and Local Universities and Colleges (LUCs)," CHED RO-VII obligated the Commission en Banc Resolution No. 641-2019 dated October 16, 2019 to all SUCs and CHED-recognized LUCs to heed the call for securing a COPC of each of their offered program. Since it is a new memorandum order, all Region VII SUCs and CHED-recognized



LUCs were given two (2) years to comply beginning November 13, 2019. In case the SUC/LUC shall not able to secure the COPC within 2 years, the Governing Board may decide whether or not to continue offering the program. All requests for COPC per program shall be submitted to the concerned CHED ROs for processing. Despite of the challenges due to the havoc of COVID 19 pandemic CHED RO VII, was able to walk through with Region VII SUCs on their process in obtaining the COPC before the dateline as stipulated in CHED Memorandum Order No. 14, series of 2019.

4 of 5 LUCs in Bohol Recognized as HEI









In the advent of the implementation of RA 10931 otherwise known as 'The Universal Access to Quality Tertiary Education Act of 2017,' it has been decided that LUCs shall be included in the Free Higher Education (FHE) Program. The FHE is one of the salient programs under R.A. 10931. As the law have mentioned, the FHE Program shall only be implemented in all State Universities and Colleges (SUCs) and CHED-recognized Local Universities and Colleges all over the country. This program then is intended for "All Filipino students who are either currently enrolled or shall be enrolled at any time thereafter in courses/programs leading to Bachelor Degree in any SUC and LUC and deemed to be exempted from paying tuition and other school fees for units enrolled. All students availing themselves of the FHE program shall be entitled to a free tuition for all courses/subjects/classes enrolled in during

a particular semester, likewise free miscellaneous, other school fees, and similar or related fees" (RA 10931 IRR, Rule II, sections 4 &7). There are now 13 existing LUCs in Region-VII spread around the provinces of Cebu and Bohol. Prior to the official assignment of Dir. Aljibe as CHED RO-VII Regional Director, all LUCs in Region VII have yet to comply with the minimum requirements to be considered as certified Higher Education Institution. However, to expedite the FHE program to LUCs, the CHED and the UniFAST have decided to include only those LUCs with 100% program compliance with the collatilia that after 2 years they have already acquired the institutional recognition as HEI from the CHED and failure to do so would mean stripping out of all the benefits under FHE program. It's now official that CHEDRO-VII, under the proactive leadership of Dir Aljibe, four (4) LUCs in Bohol Province with existing programs listed in the CHED Registry, has been given the status as officially CHED-Recognized Higher Education Institution. They are Trinidad Municipal College, Buenavista Community College, Tagbilaran City College, and Talibon Polytechnic College. These institutions have complied with the requirements to institutional recognition and operations of local universities and colleges as stipulated in CMO 32, s. 2006. Meanwhile, Colegio de Getafe has yet to comply. They were given at least six months to comply with the minimum requirements to continuously enjoy the benefits of the FHE program under RA 10931 and eventually given the status as officially CHED-Recognized LUC.
















IV. Priority Areas for Action/Plans/Programs for CY 2022

The Priority areas for action plan/s programs for CY 2022 are anchored on the university's accomplishments in the four functions: **Instruction, Research, Extension** and **Production** - in accordance with its goals in attaining national recovery and development by delivering excellent, quality and relevant education.

I. INSTRUCTION

- Full operation of the College of Medicine in collaboration with the Gov. Celestino Gallares Memorial Hospital and the full support of the Provincial Government of Bohol and the three (3) Congressional Districts of the Province.
- Full employability of College of Medicine professors and Provisions of facilities such as laboratories and medical equipment.

Learning Continuity Plan

The Commission on Higher Education has provided orders and strategies for Higher Education Institutions (HEI) to maintain and continually deliver quality education despite the disruptive events or circumstances in the new normal. As we open the first semester in September 2020, our plans and strategies in facing these challenges are spelled-out in this continuity plan. As provided in CHED Advisory no. 7 released on May 24, 2020, there shall be no delivery of instructions in face-to-face modality but shall implement the flexible learning modality until a new advisory is issued lifting the existing provisions. The Administration has promptly addressed the demands for Covid-19 protocols and the requirements for the New Normal. On-going projects and programs are focused on improving IT infrastructure, restructuring the physical environment, installing facilities related to COVID 19 response and prevention, establishing procedures and protocols complying basic health requirements, facilitating online transactions, retooling faculty members for online learning management systems and pedagogy, procuring a Learning Management System (LMS). In a two-year time, the University shall develop a contextualized LMS. In compliance to CMO No. 4, series of 2020, this Learning Continuity Plan which aims to implement flexible learning to the students, contains main areas of concern on instruction, support services to students and employees, partnerships and linkages, health and safety, disaster risk reduction management and evaluation. Meanwhile, the flexible learning modality is a combination of modular learning, online learning, distribution of a printed or soft copy of learning materials/modules that could be delivered in synchronous, or in asynchronous manner. The Learning Continuity Plan will allow the University to be proactive and resilient in response to the uncertainties of the present pandemic uncertainties. Thus, the University will continue to achieve its mission of providing quality higher education.

II. RESEARCH & DEVELOPMENT

Research makes the difference between an ordinary establishment of learning, a college and a higher education institution. Bohol Island State University is an institution of higher education. Hence, the institution's mandates include research. The research culture of BISU revolved on the curricular programs which includes Agriculture; Forestry; Fishery; Engineering with concentration on agriculture, civil, electrical, mechanical and Computer; Architecture; Industrial Design, Coastal Resources Management, Environmental Science, Education, Information Technology, Hospitality Management, Tourism, Psychology, Entrepreneurship, Allied Medical, and Industrial Technology. The institution had its first set of R&D Agenda formulated for implementation in 2006-2010. Then, the second in 2011-2016 and the third for 2017-2022 operation guided by the R&D road map. To be relevant to the needs of the society and the end-users, the research programs, projects and activities are formulated based on the development constraints of the stakeholders who are the farmers, fishermen, traders, food processors, leaders of peoples' organization, entrepreneurs, students, faculty, technicians, business managers, administrators, industry operators and employers of graduates. The university's research agenda are anchored on the R&D Agenda of the supervising institution of higher education and of the leading research institutions in the Philippines, the CHED's NHERA 1 (1998 - 2008) and NHERA 2 (2009-2018), DOST's Harmonized National Research and Development Agenda (2017-2022), RDE Agenda of DA-BAR, DENR and the Regional Development Research Agenda (2017-2022) apart from the local, regional and the international Development Plans. The prioritization principles of CHED particularly multidisciplinary, policy orientation, participation and networking, dovetailing and complementation with other research initiatives are also adopted in prioritizing the university's R&D Agenda.

This R&D Agenda will guide the Faculty/Staff-Researchers, Student-Researchers and Research Partners in conceptualizing research projects, studies and activities.

I. HIGHLIGHTS OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS FOR CY 2019

- 1. Pres. Carlos P. Garcia Scholarship Program Facilitated the semestral processing and release of financial assistance of P 6,000.00 tuition fee assistance per semester, P 700.00 living allowance per month and P 1,000.00 uniform allowance per student for a total of 310 college students. These scholars were enrolled in 15 various colleges and universities in the province. Qualifying examinations were conducted for 1,270 student-applicants in strategically-located testing centers in the province to be accessible by them nearer to their hometowns. Increase in available slots for scholars from 300 to 325 students with the additional budget in 2020.
- 2. Bohol Educational Subsidy Program Facilitated the semestral processing and release of financial assistance of P 3,500.00 per student per semester for a total of 937 college students. These grantees were enrolled in 23 various colleges and universities in the province. Qualifying examinations were conducted for 7,289 student-applicants in strategically-located testing centers in the province to be accessible by them nearer to their hometowns. Increase in the amount of financial assistance from P 2,500.00 to P 3,500.00 per student per semester with the additional budget in 2020.

Printing of citations and segregation of medals

4. **Provincial Milk Feeding Program** – Delivered and distributed fresh milk and milky buns for 8,811 school-age malnourished children in 23 municipalities in the province. The National Nutrition Council-Region 7 awarded the Province of Bohol for its Milk Feeding Program "COVID-19 Sugpuon, Malnutrisyon Wagtangon" as one of the Best Practices for COVID-19 Response in 2020.

5. **Learning Support Program** – Segregated, packed, delivered and distributed school bags with various school supplies for 3,949 kindergarten and elementary students from 33 remote and island-schools in 11 municipalities in the province.

6. **Acquisition of Learning Resource Equipment** – Purchased high speed printing machine for the reproduction of contextualized learning materials developed by teachers across all levels and discipline. This is to ensure delivery of quality curriculum instruction to all learners under the new normal due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Initially served the needs of San Miguel Technical-Vocational High School in the printing and reproduction of their learning modules.

- 1. **Pres. Carlos P. Garcia Scholarship Program** increase the amount of monthly living allowance for scholars with the additional budget for 2021.
- 2. **Bohol Educational Subsidy Program** increase the number of grantees to completely fill-in all available slots.
- 3. **Student Recognition Program** include Junior High School students in the Recognition Program.
- 4. **School Feeding Program** conduct feeding to school children in other public elementary schools not covered in 2020.
- 5. **Learning Support Program** provide learning supplies to school children in other public elementary schools not covered in 2020.
- 6. **Livelihood Skills Training Program** conduct skills trainings on dressmaking, meat processing, motorcycle repair, and other skills to out-of-school youth.
- 7. **Agriculture Learning Program** conduct trainings on agriculture to persons with learning interest on farming.


I. HIGHLIGHTS OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS FOR CY 2020

• Aid to Individuals in Crisis Situation


The Crisis Intervention Division of OPSWD provides a range of services such as medical assistance, burial assistance, transportation assistance, food assistance and supportive assistance which shall be based on the assessment and recommendation of the social worker or the referring parties.

Throughout 2020, financial aid to individuals in crises reached Twenty Million Two Hundred Eighty-Five Thousand Three Hundred Thirty pesos (P20, 285, 330.00). A total of ten thousand thirty-nine (10, 039) indigent and vulnerable clients were satisfyingly provided with financial assistance based on their most pressing needs and concerns.

The graph below visualizes the highest served clients with the corresponding amount received.



The department had served 4, 205 females and 3, 804 males needing medical assistance with a total of 8, 009 individuals amounting to P17,177,400.00; 292 females and 396 males needing burial assistance with a total of 688 individuals amounted to P2,144,000.00; 55 females and 48 males received supportive assistance with a total of 103 individuals amounted to P290,450.00; while 26 females and 33 males with a total of 59 individuals in need of transportation assistance amounted to P152,000.00; and 620 females and 560 males with a total of 1, 180 individuals provided with food assistance amounted to P521,480.00.







• Emergency Response

Emergency response includes any systematic response to an unexpected or dangerous occurrence. The goal of an emergency response procedure is to mitigate the impact of the event on people and the environment.

An armed conflict occurred in Bilar on February 29, 2020. The aftermath would usually leave a trail of untold misery and even destruction to life and property. Affected individuals and families would then be placed into crises. Subsequently, two-hundred eighty-eight (288) residents from Barangay Cansumbol and Cambigsi, Bilar were provided with food packs and stress debriefing sessions.

One hundred ninety-five thousand forty pesos (P195, 040.00) worth of Food Packs were also distributed to four hundred (400) indigent families evacuated after the armed conflict.

Some human-induced fires are accidentally caused by such kitchen stove, lamp, or lighted candle left unattended. OPSWD responded two (2) fire incidents that happened in Totolan, Dauis on March 5, 2020 and in Pagina, Jagna on February 29, 2020. P42,000.00 worth of financial assistance, food and non-food items such as blanket and thermos were provided to seventeen (17) families of Totolan, Dauis whose residential dwellings were greatly damaged by the blaze.

COVID-19 Response - We Survive as One Bohol

The majority of the communities in Bohol were significantly affected by the lockdowns due to the threats of the pandemic caused by the Covid-19 virus.

A total of P 50, 750.00 worth of Food Assistance was extended to 350 families in Poblacion, San Miguel. P 63,000.00 worth of Food Assistance to 630 families in Guindacpan, Talibon. Further, PGBh extended P361,630.00 worth of Food Assistance to the 160 families (94 males, 69

females) stranded in Bato, Leyte who underwent quarantine for 14 days at NIA Office in Ubay when they returned to Bohol.

Rice assistance of eight (8) kilograms well-milled rice per family were also provided to 350, 000 families in the

entire province amounting to one hundred fifty million pesos (P150, 000, 000.00)

Meanwhile in 2020, there were twenty thousand eight hundred seventy-nine (20, 879) displaced workers in the tourism industry that had been noted within the province. Wherein, the 18,534 displaced workers were from the list submitted by the 34 MLGUs and 2,345 direct list submitted from establishments which includes transport tourism groups/sectors. The amount of P9,699,750.00 budget was utilized in the procurement of NFA rice for the Rice Assistance for Displaced Workers in the Tourism Industry.

In detail, provided with rice assistance were 771 vendors, 353 port workers & laborers, 172 massage therapists, 119 construction workers, 51 cosmetologists including barbers, 5, 595 hotel/restaurant staff and workers, 141 souvenir shops workers, 1, 839 tourist spot workers, 5, 476 transportation drivers and 6, 362 other unidentified sectors/groups.



The graph below summarizes the number of displaced workers in different groups and sectors within the province.

Issues and Concerns

1. Complaints on the rice quality (NFA rice - baho/bokbok/kuto)

Recommendations

- 1. There should be a warehouse exclusively for rice and other basic food storage.
- 2. Regularly cleaning of the storage area which may include spraying of walls, crevices and pallets with insecticides.

• Bohol Senior Citizens

PGBh acknowledges the contribution of senior citizens in community-building and molding the young ones to be productive members of society. It also recognizes senior citizens among the vulnerable sector who need maximum attention and priority. Hence the performance of Bohol Senior Citizens Center's programs and activities to assist the elderly in the province.

o Data Collection

To have complete data on the elderly population in the entire province, the Bohol Senior Citizens Center prompted every municipality to submit a Masterlist of Senior Citizens. Throughout 2020, twenty-six (26) municipalities had submitted a Masterlist of Senior Citizens, namely from the first district were, Alburquerque, Antequera, Balilihan, Calape, Catigbian, Dauis, Maribojoc, Panglao, Sikatuna. Clarin, Dagohoy, San Miguel, and Talibon from the 2nd district, while from the 3rd District were Alicia, Batuan, Candijay, Carmen, Dimiao, Garcia Hernandez, Jagna, Lila, Loay, Mabini, Pilar, Valencia, and Sierra Bullones.

Out of the 26 municipalities who had submitted, a total of 19 municipalities were already encoded in the database. On the other hand, there are still twenty-two (22) who were non-compliant with the submission.

Re-awakening and Preservation of Boholano Culture and Tradition

On July 15, 2020, the Senior Citizen's Center coordinated with the Center for Culture and Arts Department through Mr. Rommy Tagaan and Mr. Luspo on the participation and contribution of the elderly for the preservation of Boholano culture and tradition. Activities focused on the preservation of Boholano Culture and Tradition through the promotion of cultural offerings by barangay artisans and performers in dance, music, poetry, story-telling, handicrafts, products, and culinary experiences should have initially commenced through 2020, however, due to the pandemic all activities were suspended, restricting mass gatherings and assemblies, considering the vulnerability of the elderly.

Bohol Centenarians

Provincial Ordinance No. 2020-020, Granting Benefits and Privileges to Boholano Centenarians, was approved last June 30, 2020. The effectivity of the ordinance shall take effect on January 01, 2021. In this ordinance, a Centenarian will receive an award and recognition such as Cash Gift to qualified centenarians, a Letter of Felicitation, and a Plaque of Recognition.

Number of Walk-In Clients Served



The graph above represents that second quarter had the lowest number of elderly who requested assistance from the center since it was also the start of the community quarantine. The graph also shows that fourth quarter had the highest number of clients served since the elderly already have scheduled days for their proceedings following provincial ordinance released. Frequently asked questions of the elderly were usually about on the Social Pension Program, requirements on the issuance of OSCA ID, queries on the submission of the master list, and non-natives (foreigners) seeking issuance of an OSCA ID.

• Persons with Disability Affairs Office (PDAO)

The Persons with Disability Affairs Office (PDAO) was established following the existing Provincial Ordinance No. 2015-004 as mandated under RA. 10070, an act establishing an institutional mechanism to ensure the implementation of programs and services for Persons with Disabilities in every province, city, and municipality, amending RA No. 7277 otherwise known as the "Magna

Carta for Disabled Persons" as amended, and for other purposes.

Provision of Prosthesis and Assistive Devices

On February 20, 2020, Tzu Chi Foundation and PDAO facilitated casting for 38 amputees qualified for a prosthesis of which 22 are males and 16 females. The materials for casting and prosthesis were provided by Tzu

Chi Foundation, Inc. Also, 20 were recipients of wheelchairs aged below 60 years old, while there were 149 elderly.

A total of P1.50 Million was released to qualified recipients.

Assistive Devices Distributed

Throughout 2020, there was a higher rate of females provided with assistive devices than males.

Livelihood Assistance to PWDs

On May 29, 2020, Gov. Arthur Yap and PSWDO Carmelita Tecson turned over a check worth P100,000.00 to the Bohol Federation of People with Disability, Inc. (BFPDI) as a starter for their livelihood project on Rice Retailing. The ceremony took place at the Capitol.

On November 27, 2020, a meeting was held participated by BFPDI officers to solicit feedback on their livelihood project as well as their plans to sustain their livelihood.



Rehabilitation Program

The program provides pediatric evaluation to determine the proper management of and treatment for each client. Physical Therapy activities are aimed to maintain, restore and improve the general physical condition of Children with Disability (CWD). Treatment sessions, which last from 1 to 1.5 hours, are usually conducted twice a week. Activities include: Joint range of motion and stretching exercises Muscle strengthening exercises Neurodevelopmental techniques to restore or develop normal muscle tone in order to achieve postural control. Application of physical modalities such as heat and cold packs, icing, electrical stimulation as well as hydrotherapy techniques.

Since the pandemic, face-to-face therapy sessions were only conducted from January 2020 to March 13, 2020. A total of 118 sessions for the physical therapy (PT) services were conducted with 74 female CWD and 44 male CWD; 161 sessions for occupational therapy (OT) services with 90 female CWD and 71 male CWD; 148 sessions for Special Education (SpEd) services with 68 female CWD and 80 male CWD. A total of 427 sessions only were conducted from January-March 13, 2020.



Supplemental Feeding

Amidst pandemic, home visits were still conducted by the therapists and SPED teacher to ninety-three (93) CWDs following minimum health protocols to continue delivery of services to STAC clients. Ninety-three (93) food packs were also distributed to 48 females and 45 male CWDs. A total of 520 CWDs were provided for supplemental feeding throughout 2020.






o Home Module

STAC Bohol commits to serve its beneficiaries amidst the pandemic by updating them through calls or posting on our social media page to adapt to the new normal. The therapists and the SPED teacher were assigned to call the parents of the CWD once a week and guide them on their child's

home exercise plan or activity. The graph shows the number of calls made to 127 CWDs. There were a total of 164 active CWDs with 108 males and 56 females.


Tutorial Class

Tutorial classes were conducted three times a week to four (4) BCIC clients in compliance with the learner's materials provided by the school to aid the distance learning through different modalities introduced by the Department of Education. A total of 35 tutorial sessions were conducted.

• Bohol Crisis Intervention Center (BCIC)

BCIC commits to provide a nurturing haven and care with direct services including temporary shelter, residential care, food, clothing and other needs to abused women and children. There were 40 clients served throughout 2020. An average of 30 clients served per month with 8 newly admitted clients. They were composed of 37 girls, 2 women, 1 boy child of women.



These children were provided with balanced

and well-nourished food through funds from the Provincial Government of Bohol. Actual disbursement reached P1, 166,099.82 from a budget of P 1, 300,000.00. There were however food assistance and in-kind donations of P257, 991.00 from groups, organizations during outreach activities. While in residential care, girls learned home management skills through continuous training and supervision by the house parents.

Formal and Non-Formal Education

To build the capacities of abused women and children, BCIC continues learning of clients through formal and non-formal education, life skills education and livelihood trainings. For 2019-2020 a total of 23 girls on formal education, 12 are on modular learning while one (1) is on Alternative Learning System (Acceleration and Equivalency). These girls were then accelerated.

For 2020-2021, there were a total of 26 girls (3 College, 5 Senior HS, 11 Junior HS, 7 Elementary) enrolled thru online and modular learning. This program was made possible through funds from the Provincial Government (PGBh), donated vehicles that ferry staff in the pickup and retrieval of modules in their respective schools. A total of P107, 133.00 was disbursed out of the P200, 000.00 budget. Tutorial sessions were also facilitated by BCIC staff and teachers with continuous

monitoring and supervision of house parents through crisis workers on their educational needs.

Life-Skills Activities

The Women's History Month activity on March 17, 2020, and self-awareness activities conducted on March 18-19, 2020 as a way of enabling clients to have clear perceptions of their personalities such as

identification of their strengths and weaknesses and how to make use of these strengths and develop weaknesses to strengths.

Spiritual Enhancement Activities

Lenten recollection activity that concentrates on spiritual healing and liberation conducted on April 6, 2020, station of the cross on April 7, 2020 and the 9-day Novena Prayer for the feast of Saint Joseph participated by an average of 32 clients and facilitated by BCIC staff. Aside from the daily devotional prayer and rosary, BCIC clients also celebrated Eucharistic Celebration with Fr. Nestor Ubalde, SVD twice a month.

Other Therapeutic Activities

Other therapeutic activities such as dance therapy, play therapy, and sports activities were conducted weekly as a way of enabling clients to gradually develop new and creative solutions to problems and practice teamwork, released negative energies, and help manage emotions.

1. Virtual sessions on "Physical and Mental Hygiene" facilitated by Ms. Lorelei Flores of WCPU-Gallares psychologist was likewise conducted on December 4, 2020.

- 2. "CoViD-19 Orientation" was conducted on July 10, 2020, facilitated by an in-house nurse wherein there was a demonstration of proper handwashing and the regular wearing of face masks.
- 3. Health-related activities were Hand Washing performed as part of CoViD-19 conducted such as the "Nutrition Month Celebration" wherein a poster-making contest was made. Posters were then posted and winners were awarded.

Referrals

Two (2) girls were referred to GCGMH for psychological evaluation since BCIC has no available psychological testing/evaluation tool. Referring parties spent for the cost as

a counterpart. The psychological state of the referred girls was determined and measures to deal with issues and concerns affecting them were identified accordingly.

BCIC 18th – Year Anniversary and Women's Month Celebration

BCIC 18th year Anniversary and Women's Month Celebration took place on March 8, 2020, was started with a Holy Mass, followed by the different dance presentations of the girls wherein culture and arts were integrated. The Management board members, volunteers, and partners attended the occasion since this was prior to the lockdown. This was actively participated by BCIC staff and 32 clients.



Children's Month Celebration

Due to the pandemic, the BCIC management opted to make the program simple unlike the usual celebration of Children's Month as a way of strict regard to the Covid-19 preventive practices such as maintaining social distancing. Advocacy campaigns on the rights of children, dance and song presentations of the girls, and poster-making contest were presented. Winners have listed entries to the digital poster-making contest of the 2nd CGMH Women and Children Advocates Congress. Therapeutic activities were performed through PGBh funds, cooperation, and active participation from staff and clients as well as volunteers and other partners. A total cost of P 39,000.00 was discharged out of the P 250,000 budget.

Legal Support

For the legal support, a total of 7 new cases were filed at the Provincial Prosecution Office, 6 preliminary hearings attended, 2 pre-conferences, 5 arraignments, 6 pre-trials, and 25 trials attended. These undertakings for support services includes the private complainant interviewed by the WCPD-Police Officer for affidavit taking, the WCPD-Police Officer conferring with the minor regarding her affidavit before formally filing the case, and presentation of the private complainant as the first witness of the case filed.

Medical/Dental Services

On medical/dental services, there are 28 girls provided with dental care and were also referred and examined by medical doctors from City Health office for further medical examination and treatment.

After Care Services

For the after-care services, there were 10 clients turned over to families/ relatives and 1 client was referred to another childcaring agency.

formal discharge. The assessment was essential before formal discharge to ensure parents' willingness and capacity to take custody on the child and provide security as well.

Advocacy Campaigns

Gender-Based Violence sessions are conducted in LGUs that were not visited yet, and those LGUs who requested for such activity, however, due to CoViD-19, only four (4) LGUs were visited namely, Balilihan, Tagbilaran, Dauis, and Loboc with a total of 150 participants in March, 2020. Thirty (30) males and One Hundred Twenty (120) females participated in the activity.





March 6, 2020

The activity was in partnership with TSKI and LGUs while the 18th Day Campaign to End VAW was conducted on December 2, 2020, in partnership with MSWD and PNP at Candijay, Bohol in which social distancing and the wearing of everyone's facemasks were strictly observed as a way of ensuring everyone's safety.

Support services were then made possible through strong coordination among the case management teams - PNP/WCPD, city/provincial Prosecution Office. Health concerns through GCGM Hospital's WCPU, City Health Office, and aftercare services through local social workers as well as advocacy efforts with local government units.

o Donations Received

Throughout 2020, there were about 10 groups that conducted outreach activities at BCIC. They donated meals, snacks, toiletries, hygiene kits, and other food items for the clients. During the general community quarantine groups and organizations only had quick visits and just dropped off food, hygiene kits, and goods for the girls. Goods were then disinfected before distribution.

Staff Development

Regular staff meetings were conducted to enhance the knowledge, skills, and attitude of staff in dealing with clients. Through this activity, the caregivers shared learnings to provide utmost care and support for easy delivery of services to clients. Part of the consultation meeting was the drafting of the Child Protection Policy that took



place in December 2020. Two social workers also participated in the online Training on Child Abuse Prevention and Case Management of Abused Children in Child Caring Agencies on November 19-24, 2020, and PASWI Convention on November 26-28, 2020, respectively.

Social Development

Bohol like other parts of the world is suffering from the onslaught of COVID-19 which significantly impacted the economic and the social well-being in general; compromising access to basic social services, includes but not limited to health, education, livelihood, water sanitation and hygiene amongst others. Amidst this COVID-19 pandemic, the most affected are the disadvantaged and marginalized sectors herein served by the Social Division of the Office of the Provincial Social Welfare & Development. The "Care for the Weak" which aims to alleviate the lives of poor Boholanos is one of the main thrusts of the Provincial Government

of Bohol under the present administration of Gov. Art Yap. In 2020, most of the regular services in our various programs were suspended due to the pandemic. Our activities were focused on capability building and economic-related interventions and were able to serve a total of 30,031 individuals, 1,109 barangays within the 47 municipalities and 1 city.

Bohol Youth Home (BYH)

Since the pandemic, the workforce of Bohol Youth Home construction has reduced from seventy (70) to ten (10) workers including skilled and unskilled laborers with one site engineer. Throughout the year 2020, the physical accomplishment on the construction of the Bohol Youth Home was 60% in January, 65% in February, 65.3% in April, 70% in June, 75% in August and in October, 80%. As of December 2020, the Bohol Youth Home construction accomplishment remained at 80%.











About 69.16% or P55,329,973.64 has been utilized as of December 2020 from a total project cost of P80.0 million.

Issues and Concerns

Amongst the issues and concerns in the delayed project implementation was the shortage of materials as the main reason for the reduction of manpower. The shortage of materials was also greatly affected by the protocols following the lockdown due to the pandemic. A delay on the delivery of materials was one of the hindering factors of the contractor. Bad weather condition, like heavy rains, also affected the construction of the facility wherein workers could not proceed to ground levelling due to muddy grounds. Even with light rains, they still could not continue on the electrical installation and roofing works.

The budget allocation from the DSWD - Juvenile Justice and Welfare Council amounting to P5.0 Million was also suspended due to the pandemic. It was supposed to finance the construction of the administration building for the facility. According to the Juvenile Justice and Welfare Council personnel, the fund allocation was realigned to other expenses related to CoViD-19.

In addition, the procurement of furniture and fixtures was one of some that was put on hold during the transition of the new administration, wherein there was prioritizing on the procurement of the urgently needed materials and supplies.

Recommendations

In response to the urgent call of DSWD, BJMP and PNP Bohol which was later reinforced by the result of the visit conducted last Sept. 3-4, 2019 by a team from the Central Office of the Commission on Human Rights to consider it a priority project the establishment and full operation of a functional, efficient and effective Bahay Pag-asa in Bohol. It is strongly recommended the following:

- To conduct a dialogue with the contractor to fast-track completion in the construction of at least the male dormitory and be partially turn-over to PGBh before end of the 1st semester of 2021;
- 2. Facilitate procurement of equipment, facilities, supplies and all required necessities for the full operation of the male dormitory in the Bohol Youth Home;
- 3. Coordinate with PHRMDO in the hiring of staff; and
- 4. Collaborate in capacitating the newly hired/assigned staff for BYH for at least one (1) month on the job training at RRCY Argao, Cebu Province a youth facility for CICLs managed and operated by DSWD FO VII.

• Kauban Sa Reporma (KR)

This is the advocacy campaign of the government to stop calling our brother surrenderers "former rebels" but call them "KRs" instead, to do away with the stigma attached to the term. This would also corroborate the fact that the government is seriously considering the human rights of the KRs as mandated by President Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo who issued Administrative Order No. 172 to streamline the program and interventions that specifically cater to them and their families. As such, AO 172 mandates OPAPP to implement the necessary mechanisms for the effective and fast integration of the FR's and their families seeking to be integrated into mainstream society by providing them with sets of interventions under the Social Integration Program (SIP). Aimed at sustaining a genuine social and economic integration of the FR's and their families and contribute to healing divisions in the community, the SIP hopes to create an environment that is conducive to promote peace and access to economic and social opportunities. The Provincial Government thru the OPSWD conducted monitoring of individual and organizational livelihood projects and maintaining records of 280 KRs in the 14 clusters of (Antequera, Balilihan, Bilar, Batuan, Carmen, Catigbian, (2) Alicia, (2) Ubay, Danao, Inabangan, Sevilla & San Isidro; and of the 28 KRs in the 3 Resettlement Centers in Bayanihan Tuboran Ubay, Kalayaan Resettlement Danao & Rajah Sikatuna Katipunan Carmen.

Enhanced Comprehensive Local Integration Program (E-CLIP)

This is a government program that aims to help the rebel members of CPP-NPA-NDF and Militia ng Bayan to restore their allegiance to the Philippine government. Through this program, they can be reintegrated back to the community, be with their families, and start over with their new, normal lives. The financial benefits intended for their development include Firearms, explosives, and ammunitions remuneration, Immediate assistance (Php 15,000.00) and Livelihood assistance (Php 50,000.00) from DILG-Administered Package of assistance.

Throughout 2020, 12 FRs surfaced and received assistance from DILG-Administered Package in a total amount of P794, 000.00. 



Two (2) Community Organizers deployed under the CDP-PPM in two (2) barangays of Bugang Sur, Bilar and Janlud, Batuan from May 26 to June 2020 wherein series of home visits, community campaigns, profiling and other related peace activities were conducted.

Issues and Concerns

- 1. Conflict among cluster leaders due to poor leadership and unclear organizational direction:
- 2. Poor communication and feedback among leaders;
- 3. Former rebels are worried of their individual and family's safety and security; and
- 4. Some of the former rebels are complaining of being used/having no choice/forcibly engaged to conduct peace advocacy (which includes community campaigns, community intelligence etc.).

Recommendations

- Conduct training on leadership and conflict management to cluster leaders and 2nd line leaders;
- 2. Provide technical assistance in the establishment of communication protocol and mechanisms;
- 3. Provide identification card signed by DILG and the governor in lieu of JAPIC certificate;
- 4. Only those interested/voluntary signified interest to be engaged/employed in the provincial peace advocacy team, military and police community peace endeavors. That some verbally expressed that they wanted to live in peace with their family and focus in their family livelihood undertakings.

• Child Protection and Development Program

This program focuses in providing early intervention services for children ages 3 to 11 years old. Republic Act 10410 otherwise known as the Early Years Act of 2013, declares that it is the policy of the State to promote the rights of children to survival, developmental, and special protection with full recognition and the need to provide developmentally appropriate experiences to address their needs and support parents in their roles as primary caregivers and as their children's first teachers. This year, the program utilized P5,596,134.00 (72.27%) out of the P7,742,652.00 budget allocation.

o Children's Month Celebration thru Children Contest

RA 10661 declared the month of November as the National Children's Month. The celebration intended to commemorate the Filipino children emphasizing the importance of the role of the child within the Filipino family and within the Philippine society. In 2020, we celebrated the 28th National Children's Month with the theme "Sama-samang Itaguyod ang Karapatan ng Bawat Bata sa Panahon ng Pandemya". 

Provision of financial assistance/subsidy to CDWs and DCOs

In compliance with the mandates of the law, PGBh thru OPSWD provided financial assistance/subsidy to all day care workers and officers in Bohol. A total of 1,315 day care workers and day care officers received the financial assistance/subsidy. Considering the limited approved budget for 2020, the subsidy varies according to length of service rendered by the CDWs and DCOs and were able to receive a maximum equivalent to 8 months at P500.00 per month. Their financial subsidy was directly deposited to their individual ATM accounts either FCB or LandBank.

Training on ECCD of CDWs and DCOs

ECCD training was conducted to CDWs and DCOs in the MLGUs of Bilar and Alburquerque. This aims for a continuum provision of quality services in ECCD by the Center staff and its partner's public awareness on preparing young children for success in school and later in life and to inculcate responsiveness and accountability among the LGUs and parents.

Issues and Concerns

- 1. Difficulty in the implementation of Child Development Program due to new normal (modular not yet allowed);
- 2. Various complaints re Supplemental Feeding (SF) of DSWD due to incomplete & delayed delivery of goods, poor quality of goods/supply by suppliers;
- 3. Majority of the public child development centers and workers have expired registration and accreditation;
- 4. Need to change the Child Development Center billboards/names based on EYA Act 2003;
- 5. Registration & Accreditation of all private pre-schools (M/CLGUs & ECCD Council) not yet institutionalized & implemented in Bohol;
- 6. Federation of CDWs and DCOs no legal identity yet

Recommendations

- CDWs to tapped parent volunteers to help in the monitoring and providing support re New Normal ECCD program implementation at the community level. And Continue to provide TA re strengthening & enhancing KAS of CDWs & DCOs thru meetings and conduct of monitoring;
- 2. MLGUs to write incident/grievance report to DSWD re SF issues and concerns.
- 3. Coordinate w/ ECCD Council & DSWD re CDCs & CDWs accreditation & registration (new & expired).
- 4. Expedite passing of Provincial Ordinance re Institutionalizing PGBh subsidy for CDWs and Renaming/changing of CDC billboards/name.
- 5. Conduct Dialogue cum Seminar Orientation of Public & Private CDC Operation and Accreditation for LCEs, MSWDOs & School Administrators/Owners;
- 6. Registration of the association to any national accreditation & registration agency

Women Program

The Provincial Social Welfare and Development Office is mandated to care, protect, nurture and guide the socially, physically and economically disadvantaged sectors in the province. Article XIII, Section 15 of RA 7160 otherwise known as the Local Government Code specifically refers to the role of people's organizations, defining them as "bonafide associations of citizens with three demonstrated capacities to promote the public interest and with identifiable leadership, membership and structure". The constitution guarantees the right of the organizations to

"effective and reasonable participation at all levels of social, political and economic decision-making" and requires state agencies to "facilitate the establishment of consultation mechanisms" (Art. XIII, Sec.16). Thus, OPSWD served as a catalyst and facilitator towards enabling women organizations be strongly involved in their own development and influence women in their respective communities. Fund utilized for this program was P60,116.00 or 3.33% from the budget allocation of P1,803,685.00.

Issues and Concerns

- 1. Provincial women's association has no legal identity yet;
- 2. BOFWA By-Laws and Constitution still need to be approved and ratified by the constituted body;
- 3. Only 15 out of 48 C/MLGUs women associations submitted their master list, Certification of Registration and Recognition of members;
- 4. Lack of baseline data on women organizations from barangay, municipal and provincial level;
- 5. Poor support for women development programs at the barangay level;
- 6. Poor technical assistance support to municipal women organizations from the LSWDOs: and
- 7. Lack of coordination between the municipal women organizations to their municipal advisers (MSWDO/SWOs, Sangguniang Bayan Chair Comm. On Women Welfare etc.

Recommendations

- 1. Facilitate BOFWA registration before end of 1st semester in 2021;
- 2. Facilitate at least an online meeting and discuss approval and ratification of the BOFWA By-Laws and Constitution;
- Follow-up with the MLGUs with lacking/unsubmitted required provincial reports (includes profile, case study, masterlist of members, Certificate of Registration and Recognition etc.);
- 4. Provide technical assistance to municipal women organizations in baseline data gathering from barangay to municipal level;
- 5. Facilitate conduct of advocacy for budget allocation and program support for meaningful women activities/projects;
- 6. Lobby with LSWDOs for technical support to municipal & barangay women organizations/association; and
- 7. Provide strengthening collaboration activity amongst the stakeholders and municipal women organizations.

• Indigeneous People (IP) Welfare and Development Program

Section 17, Article XIV of the 1987 Philippine Constitution, specified that the state shall recognize, respect, and protect the rights of the indigenous cultural communities to preserve and develop their cultures, traditions, and institutions. Furthermore, RA 7160 otherwise known as the Local

Government Code of 1991 (Art.13, section 486, I & IV), mandated the Provincial Government through PSWDO to facilitate the implementation of welfare for the needy, disadvantaged and impoverished and develop and implement programs/projects/ activities to alleviate and improve their living condition. This program utilized 24.85% or P46,980.00 of the allocated budget P189,000.00. Also included in this program were the Muslims in Bohol. The Bohol Muslim Community Peace Movement Incorporated (BMC-PeM, Inc) was organized in October 2017 by the Bohol Provincial Branch-PNP with the strong collaboration of the Provincial Government through the SEEM Cluster Head, Provincial Social Welfare and Development Office, AFP Bohol, and the Muslim community leaders. In June 2019, the BMC-PeM Inc got its Certificate of Registration from the Security Exchange Commission (SEC). Primarily, the group aims to develop and strengthen their members through the spirit of unity, cooperation and sharing among one another.

Bohol has three IPs namely the Eskaya in Taytay, Duero; Biabas, Guindulman; Lundag, Cansungay, La Swerte, Catagdaan, Pilar; Canta-ub, Sierra-Bullones, and Cadapdapan Candijay; Badjao in Totolan, Dauis and Ati of Loay.

Globally we are struggling due to COVID- 19 pandemic which affects all aspects of lives of the populace. Amongst the most affected includes the Muslim communities in Bohol facing a great challenge most especially economically considering that majority of them are engage in small business enterprises. This year, three (3) quarterly livelihood monitoring, reporting and feedbacking were conducted with the support of various stakeholders including the PNP in Bohol.

Issues and Concerns

- 1. IPMR not yet implemented in the province;
- 2. IPs cluster leaders are in faction due to misunderstandings and other personal interests;
- 3. Lacking budget and technical support from NCIP for various community IP activities and other development endeavors; and
- 4. BMC-PeM leaders & their members expressed of being mistreated/discrimination from some Boholanos.

Recommendations

- 1. Continue advocating for the full IPMR implementation at all levels in Bohol;
- 2. Facilitate conduct of conflict management to all IP leaders;
- 3. Advocate for budget allocation and formulation of policies/ordinances that will support development programs for IPs in their respective localities; and
- 4. Conduct community sensitivity campaigns on Muslims culture, practices etc. in their respective barangays and municipalities.

• Family & Community Welfare & Development Program

Focus of this program are the disadvantaged and marginalized families and communities. In 2020, strengthening activities were focused in providing capacity building which includes leadership, values formation and conflict management trainings. While ensuring sustainability of women groups and their livelihood projects, quarterly monitoring, reporting and feed backing meetings were conducted. Livelihood projects were provided to 3 groups/communities to wit: the

livelihood projects, quarterly monitoring, reporting and feed backing meetings were conducted. Livelihood projects were provided to 3 groups/communities to wit: the souvenir vendors in Booy, Tagbilaran, fisherfolks in Pamilacan, Baclayon and vendors in Maribojoc. Each group were provided with a training on entrepreneurship and simple bookkeeping and the 2 groups (Tagbilaran and Maribojoc) received a total cash amounting to P100,000.00 as starting capital while P150,000.00 for the Pamilacan. Implementation of the Food for Work Program was facilitated with residents in the 12 barangays participating in community/ coastal clean-up and tree growing activities; 2,757 individuals/families received food packs (*rice & canned goods*) from

PhilHealth Insurance

September 02 to November 20,2020.

This program is in accordance to *Sangguniang Panlalawigan Resolution No. 2014-182* commitments to participate under the National Health Insurance Program (NHIP) as a sponsor and prescribed in the National Health Insurance Act of 2013 (Republic Act No. 10606). Last 2019, about 7,760 elected and appointed barangay officials were enrolled and PGBh paid the prescribed annual premium contributions and remitted a total amount of P18,624,000.00 to PhilHealth. However, in 2020, the administration of Gov. Yap decided to change the scheme without jeopardizing the objective of ensuring financial risk protection and provision of health

care services to Boholano constituents to only those that will be hospitalized/confined can be enrolled in the NHIP. With this, 47 individuals and their families benefitted the said program and PGBh paid a total amount of P169,200 (at P3,600/individual contribution) under the AICS program of OPSWD. In which, the provincial government save the 99% (P18,454,800.00) from its previous allocated budget.

o CoViD-19 Responses

Even before the COVID-19 pandemic, hunger continued to increase. The pandemic just pushed additional people in the province into chronic hunger. Measures to control virus outbreaks are disrupting global and local <u>food supply chains</u>. Border restrictions and lockdowns in the province are slowing harvests, destroying livelihoods and significantly hindering food transport. Equally urgent is the compounding threat of the pandemic on <u>existing crises</u> such as armed conflict, natural disasters, climate change- that are already stressing our food systems and triggering food insecurity around the province.

Issues and Concerns

- 1. Minimal budget for livelihood projects.
- 2. The need to improve the delivery of livelihood program services.
- 3. To assess OPSWD's capacity, especially its field personnel, to perform both microcredit and employment facilitation activities.
- 4. Lack of office Policy for the Food for Work Program, prioritization, beneficiaries, and tasks/roles of partners.

Recommendations

- 1. Allocate enough budget per year for at least the 05% Boholano living below poverty threshold or 1\$/day income.
- 2. OPSWD to adopt policy changes to enhance program implementation.
- 3. To assess capacity, hire competent/train existing OPSWD's field personnel, to perform both microcredit and employment facilitation activities.
- 4. Formulate and submit to SP Bohol policy for the Food for Work Program.

• Technical Support to LSWDOs

Enrichment Training on Pre-Marriage Orientation and Counseling (PMOC)

This activity was in compliance with Administrative order 12 Series of 2017 as amended by AO 14 Series of 2007 (B) advocates for the Provincial/City/Municipal social Welfare and Development to include in their Annual work and Financial Plan the budget for capacity building activities specially trainings related to marriage counseling. Fund utilized was 93.26% or P466,300.00 of the budget allocation of P500,000.00. The PMOC training was conducted in four (4) batches taking in consideration the advice by the Commission on Population (POPCOM), the accredited trainer. There were 112 participants from the 33 MLGUs, the 1st Batch with 24 participants from Sagbayan, Candijay, Dauis, Loon, Balilihan, Panglao & Sikatuna; 2nd Batch – San Miguel, Getafe, Tubigon, Clarin, Bien Unido, Dagohoy, Danao, Guindulman, Buenavista with 27 participants; 3nd Batch – from Loay, Talibon, Trinidad, Ubay, Loboc, Carmen, Garcia Hernandez, Sevilla, Tubigon, Tagbilaran, Dagohoy, Mabini with 31 participants & 4th Batch – from Anda, Carmen, Dimiao, Duero, Jagna, Lila, Batuan, Mabini, Tagbilaran, Valencia with 29 participants trained and received accreditation certificates as Pre-Marriage Counselors in Bohol.

I. HIGHLIGHTS OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS FOR CY 2020

The year 2020 has been a challenging year for all of us. With the occurrence of COVID-19, some of the activities of PSA Bohol were either cancelled or postponed. However, due to a high demand on statistics, the Philippine Statistics Authority (PSA) pushed through with the conduct of the 2020 Census of Population and Housing (CPH). Aside from this, in line with the government's goal to implement the National Identification System, the PSA started with the project last 2020. These were two major undertakings of PSA for 2020. Of course, minimum health standards were strictly observed in the course of these activities for the safety of the workforce as well as of the general public.

STATISTICAL

2020 Census of Population and Housing (2020 CPH)

The biggest project of the PSA for this year was the 2020 Census of Population and Housing. Despite of the challenges brought by the COVID-19 pandemic, the PSA was able to continue with the conduct of the census. Generally, it was a success from the coordination stage to the completion of the manual

processing.

A series of trainings were conducted prior to the enumeration. The second level training (regional) was held virtually on 20-25 July 2020. The third level training was then held a week after. The participants at this level involved 69 hired Census Area Supervisors province-wide. The fourth level training, on the other hand, was

divided into four batches, that is, twelve municipalities per batch for the four weeks of August. This time, the participants were the hired enumerators, team supervisors and headquarter clerks. OF course, social distancing was observed during trainings. We thank the LGUs of Bohol for the assitance and provision of venue for the municipal-level trainings.

The enumeration period was set in May but due to the pandemic, it was moved to September. It involved a total of 1,716 hired personnel province-wide. PPE, which included face mask, face shield and alcohol were provided for the hired personnel for the entire duration of the field work.

At this point, the machine processing and data evaluation is still on-going. The target date of release of the official data is in May 2021.

Quarterly Labor Force Survey (LFS)

The LFS is a quarterly survey conducted in the months of January, April, July and October. It aims to generate estimates on employment rate, unemployment rate, labor force participation rate, etc. at the regional level (Shown in Table 1 are the generated statistics for 2020 per round). For each quarter, the survey involves around 384 to 386 sample households province-wide.

2019 Annual Survey of Philippine Business and Industry (ASPBI)/2019 Survey on Information and Communications Technology (SICT)

The 2019 ASPBI was one of the postponed surveys for 2020. This annual activity was supposed to be conducted in March. Due to the pandemic, it was moved to October. This time, the rider survey is the 2019 SICT.

Bohol has a total workload of 369 sample establishments for ASPBI and 87 For SICT. The distribution started on 03 November 2020. Meanwhile, the collection of the questionnaires began ten days after. The collected questionnaires will undergo manual and machine processing at the provincial office. The target completion of the activity is February 2021.

Monthly Collection of Prices

The PSA collects prices of a certain market basket of goods and services on a monthly basis. This data is necessary for the generation of the Consumer Price Index, Inflation Rate and Purchasing Power of Peso. For 2020, the statistics generated were as follows:

Luckily, Bohol was among the first 32 provinces to start the implementation. The MOA signing between PSA and the LGUs was fast tracked as it was done virtually province-wide and was completed on 14 October 2020. For the Step 1 (Preregistration), a total of 234 hired personnel were involved. As of the end of the year, a total of 460,261 individuals were preregistered which is 102.6% of the target.

The implementation of the Philippine Identification System started this year. This includes Steps 1 and 2 for the said project.

Bohol has an allocation of 181 Registration Kits for Step 2 (Registration). These will be allocated province-wide according to the workload per municipality. Bohol province is preparing for the Step 2 which was postponed to February 2021. The office is grateful to the military who gave their full support and assistance during the arrival and delivery of the said kits last December.



The registration kits were delivered on 10 December 2020 aboard one of the Philippine Naval Fleet. The military men of Bohol assisted in the transport of the kits from Tagbilaran seaport to PhilSys Bohol office.

CIVIL REGISTRATION

For the Civil Registration, the Decentralized Copy Annotation Project (DeCAP) was finally implemented this 2020. This is an innovation project of PSA to address the need to expedite the processing of annotations of civil registry documents. The province started the implementation in the last quarter of 2020. By the end of the year, a total of 534 applications were screened and forwarded to RSSO.

Several activities were also done in relation to the 30th Civil Registration Month. Aside from this, there was also an active participation to activities conducted by LCROs province-wide. I. HIGHLIGHTS OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Functional Statement of BPLIC:

Serve as a repository of printed and recorded cultural heritage and the intellectual, literary and information sources and provide the people access to these resources for their intellectual growth, citizenship building, lifelong learning and enlightenment. Guided by these, the library was able to coin a new vision, mission and goals for 2018 and beyond.

VISION:

A Center of Information facility and gateway in promoting eco-cultural literacy in the Province of Bohol by providing the innovative library services to the people from all walks of life.

MISSION:

We commit to:

- 1. Update library collection to support the literacy program;
- 2. Develop and preserve cultural heritage collections;
- 3. Innovate library services that respond to the needs of the community and
- 4. Modernize library facilities.
- 5. Establish more municipal libraries and barangay reading center.

Goals:

We aim to:

- 1. To continually purchase updated library collections;
- 2. To enhance our archives collections
- 3. To engage in continuing formal education and to attend professional trainings and seminars and
- 4. To provide functional and modern library facilities.

The Bohol Provincial Library and Information Center (BPLIC) started its services to the Boholano community on September 7, 1925. The growth and services of the Library is due to the table and staunch support of the local officials and civic-minded citizens of the province coupled with the great interest of the National Library officials. The year 2000 the Library marks its 75 years of service to the province of Bohol and bested other finalists and won the Outstanding Provincial Library in the Philippines Award after a one-year search in 1999 conducted by the National Library of the Philippines in celebration of the Philippine Public Libraries Centennial Anniversary.

In year 2012, BPLIC garnered the second place among fifty finalists for the search for Outstanding Provincial Libraries in the Philippines. Recognized and awarded as fourth place in the Search for Outstanding Public Libraries with Special Program on the Protection and Preservation of Cultural Heritage last November 24, 2017.

It provides a wealth of information and knowledge that compliments classroom education at the same time, preserve the unique cultural heritage of Boholanos and the national identity that binds us as one Filipino nation. BPLIC has catered countless number of Boholanos who have undoubtedly contributed to the growth and development of the province and its people. While the advent of information and communication technology has made information readily available in the internet, the use of public

libraries remains relevant because of the quality materials and our ability to harness technology for our beneficial use.

In providing efficient and effective library services to the entire Boholano community, the library was able achieve its vision, mission and goals through the following services:

I. READERS SERVICES

The importance of the reader's services in each public library is to circulate out books, magazines, newspapers and other library materials to the public readers. Librarians attend to answer reference questions involving research, reference and directional assistance but also to provide current awareness services through bulletin board display and information drive through library orientation program.

A total of **5,521 reader's statistics attendance** of readers and researchers was recorded and have declined also compared to the 2019 reader's attendance. It has affected the seating capacity of our reading area due to the COVID 19 pandemic where the active attendance of students from grade school, high school and college decreased rapidly with the implementation of no face-to-face classroom policy as well as the suspension of classes.

The library adapted health protocols to safeguard both the library personnel and readers who availed the library services last July 2020 after its suspension of library services last March 2020. Only a handful of readers visit the library compared before the pandemic.

However, with the innovation of the social media platform, a total of 132 clienteles have access to reference and book borrowing assistance online service of the provincial library. While there was a massive increase in the digital platform through the social media likes and engagements of library supporters a recorded high of 1,273,600. Below is the profile of library users;

- Archives Services. A more spacious archives room to house all the Boholania collections, Filipiniana Archives, SP Legislative Records are in placed in the new archives section in the second floor of the Provincial Library which was formerly the Office of the Liga.
- ➤ Multimedia Room. The formerly SP Session Hall was converted to a multimedia room to serve as a seminar/training hall for small group of persons of various sectors that need training such as librarians, youth and young professionals. Last October 12, 2020, youth from the PYDO Office conducted a mental awareness training in the library's multimedia room.
- ➤ Online Capability Services. The library personnel participated a total of 30 webinars conducted by the National Library of the Philippines, PHRMDO and other organizations to keep abreast of the new normal services of the library, scholarship grants, archives management and so on.
- ➤ KOHA-Online Public Access Catalog. The library has initiated and implemented the use of the KOHA online public access catalog for the librarians and readers to access the library's resources instead of using the old card catalog that started last March 2020.
- ➤ Inventory of library materials. After the suspension of classes last March 2020, the library was able to fully conduct book inventory and recorded a total of 15,000 vols. of books from allocations of the National Library of the Philippines, Purchased through government funds, donations from NGO's, and private individuals.
- Purchase of books. A total of 138 titles of new book references have been delivered to the library of various subject areas as requested by the clientele researchers.
- ➤ Purchase of Book Mobile. A new book mobile was purchased last December 2020 in replacement of the unserviceable book mobile from the National Library of the Philippines last March 17, 2016, after thirty-four years of library outreach services.

I. HIGHLIGHTS OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

With our stronghold commitment as catalyst of change and partner of the Local Government Units (LGUs) towards growth and development to achieve local autonomy, the dynamic men and women of DILG-Bohol hurdled the challenges and remained dedicated public servants in implementing the programs, projects and activities towards attaining the following outcomes:



Accountable, Transparent, Participative and Effective Local Governance. DILG-Bohol through the Field officers continuously facilitate and monitor the compliance of LGUs to the Full Disclosure Policy (FDP). In the province, all 47 municipalities, 1 city, and the provincial government are compliant as regards the posting of FDP documents in conspicuous places. Early this year, several activities were conducted for the 2020 Seal of Good Local Governance (SGLG) implementation as an award, incentive, honor and recognition-based program for all LGUs. However, because of the COVID-19 pandemic, the 2020 SGLG assessment and onsite validation was suspended. Nevertheless, as an integral part of the SGLG, the Local Governance Performance Management System (LGPMS) website development is at its final phase with the pilot testing of the new LGPMS Website scheduled in December 2020. The Provincial Government of Bohol, the City of Tagbilaran and the 46 municipalities (2 of which are postcompliant) of Bo- hol were part of the Good Financial Housekeeping (GFH) passers. On Performance Challenge Fund (PCF), an incentive for SGLG Passers, 100% of the recipient LGUs in CY 2015, 2016, 2017 and 2018 have completed their projects while 50% of recipient municipalities in CY 2019 have completed their projects. In relation to project monitoring through citizen's participation, an online roll-out orientation on Development Live or DevLive was conducted. It is a mobile application that allows one to monitor and report on the local government's projects related to the Sustainable Development Goals in the Philippines. At the same time, DILG-Bohol in coordination with other National Government Agencies (NGAs) led the conduct of Dagyaw 2020 activities. Dagyaw, a Hiligaynon term for togetherness, exemplifies the Filipino spirit of Bayanihan. Town Hall meetings were conducted online, as a way of adapting to the new normal, amidst COVID-19 pan- demic. Outcomes from these dialogues shall serve as key references of the government in public decision-making and in formulating policies for better public sector performance and service delivery. A series of activities were conducted which included, among others, online Open Government Virtual Town Hall meetings. As to the compliance on the formulation/updating of Comprehensive Development Plans (CDPs) and Comprehensive Land Use Plans (CLUPs), the latest status report shows that 70% and 33% of the component city and municipalities have updated CDPs and CLUPs, respectively. DILG-Bohol provided technical assistance in the formulation of CDPs of six (6) LGUs in Bohol, namely: Tubigon, Maribojoc, Bien Unido, Dagohoy, Garcia-Hernandez and Mabini. Moreover, the CDP facilitators of DILG-Bohol provided technical assistance in the formulation of CDP of six municipalities in Siguijor. For the Localization of the Philippine Development Plan (PDP) 2017-2022 and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), a Provincial Workshop on Increasing Responsiveness of Local Plans to the PDP 2017-2022 and the SDGs which was participated by all city and to conduct information dissemination through advocacy activities, and provides support through trainings and seminars which were made online because of the pandemic. Similarly, the threat of the pandemic did not impede the implementation of the Community-Based Monitoring System (CBMS), two (2) LGUs were provided assistance on the conduct of CBMS Module 1 Reorientation. Likewise, the Synchronized Barangay Assembly this year was conducted through different modes in order to adhere to the established IATF-MEID guidelines.

Mindful with the current situation brought about by the pandemic, varied approaches were utilized in the provision of technical assistance to the LGU demand-driven trainings this year. Face-to-face and various virtual platforms were utilized by the DILG-Bohol personnel to continuously provide technical assistance to LGUs. The DILG Provincial Office also ensures that Central Office directives and issuances are promptly communicated to all LGUs. This level also entertained and responded to a number of clients on legal opinions/advices, conducted eight (8) fact-finding activities through the Cluster Leaders, processed twenty-eight (28) death benefit claims, indorsed twelve (12) requests for authority to purchase motor vehicle, facilitated four (4) endorsements on lakbay aral and disseminated fourteen (14) invitation for scholarship programs. DILG-Bohol also maintains and updates a database for provincial, municipal and barangay officials through Barangay Information System (BIS) and Elective Local Officials Profile Database System (ELOPDS). DILG-Bohol likewise sustains and complies with the ARTA requirements through the establishment of a Public Assistance and Complaint Desk (PACD) and regular updating and maintenance of Citizen's Charter. In response to the directive of the President to clear roads of illegal structures and constructions, Road Clearing activities were conducted in close coordination with the Philippine National Police (PNP) and Bureau of Fire Protection (BFP). As to the program for the Newly Elected Officials (NEOs), the planned Program for NEOs: Orientation Course to the Local Sanggunian was not pushed through because of the threat of the COVID-19 pandemic. In relation to the SK Mandatory and Continuing Training, another round of SK Trainings was conducted this year by the DILG Field Officers, in partnership with their respective Local Youth Development Officers, SK Federated Presidents, and Local Department Heads. This year, the Sumbungan Online as part of the "Bayanihan to Heal as One Act was launched as one of the initiatives under the Bantay Korapsyon program of the department. In addition, DILG-Bohol through its C/MLGOOs continuously monitors the implementation of Kasambahay Law.

Peaceful, Orderly and Safe LGUs. Secretariat services are ably provided by the Provincial Director and C/MLGOOs in the regular conduct of *Peace and Order Councils (POC) and Anti-Drug* Abuse Councils (ADAC) joint meetings even if the conduct of the Peace and Order Council Performance Audit was postponed due to the pandemic. In relation to the conduct of Peace and Order and Public Safety Planning Workshops and Compliance of LGUs to POPSP - Policy Compliance Monitoring System (PCMS), DILG- Bohol through the C/MLGOOs remain steadfast in providing technical assistance to the LGUs including the Provincial Government of Bohol. As to the Initiatives to End Local Communist Armed Conflict (ELCAC) and Preventing and Countering Violent Extremism, the Bohol Enhanced Comprehensive Local Integration Program (ECLIP) Committee had been active in the processing and endorsement of qualified beneficiaries for the program. Seventeen (17) former rebels have received the DILG administered package of assistance. Under the new program, Communicating for Perpetual end to Extreme violence and forming Alliance towards positive Change and Enriched communities (C4PEACE) comes the birth of Retooled Community Support Pro- gram (RCSP) which targeted 19 barangays in the province. It is a convergence mechanism that aims to identify issues in the target barangays which need government intervention, and is implemented thru the conduct of "Dagyawan sa Barangay". To ensure the proper and successful implementation of the program, several activities and coordination meetings were conducted. Moreover, as to the Initiatives to End Local Communist Armed Conflict (ELCAC) and Pre-venting and Countering Violent Extremism, the 47 municipalities and 1 component city have created their respective Local Task Forces to End Local Communist Armed Conflict (ELCAC). In the same way, despite the threat of the pandemic, DILG-Bohol continues its work with other concerned agencies towards clearing barangays from illegal drugs through the conduct of Barangay Drug Clearing Program (BDCP) Re-Orientation and validation of candidates for drug-cleared barangay which is part of the DILG-Philippine Anti-Drug Strategy (DILG-PADS). Further, all 47 municipalities and 1 city have operationalized the *Community-Based Rehabilitation Program (CBRP)*. DILG -Bohol also continues to monitor the functionality of the 1,109 BADACs in the province. Submission of **BADAC minutes** of meeting were done to this level for 2020.

Socially-Protective LGUs. True to its commitment to capacitate and nurture local government units for the benefit of the Filipino citizenry, DILG has also implemented various locally-funded projects in the province. For *SA- LINTUBIG* Program, all FY 2013 and 2015 projects were completed, 90% for FY 2016, 70% for FY 2017, 78% for FY 2018 and for FY 2019, out of 13 projects, only one project is completed. As to the implementation of *BuB-Provision of Potable Water Supply* Program, 98.5% and 98.83% of the FY 2014 and 2015 projects were completed, respectively. Out of the 199 from the FY

2017 Local Government Support Fund-Assistance to Disadvantaged Municipalities (LGSF-ADM) projects, 190 projects (95.48%) were completed, 7 projects (3.52%) are ongoing and 2 projects were not implemented whose funds were reverted to the Bureau of Treasury (BTr). As to the 138 FY 2018 Local Government Support Fund-Assistance to Municipalities (LGSF-AM) projects, 127 (92.09%) of which were already completed, 6(4.34%) projects are on-going while 4 projects with unutilized funds were returned to the Bureau of Treasury. As regards the FY 2019 LGSF- AM, of the 82 projects, 53 (64.63%) are completed, 26.83% or 22 projects are ongoing, 4 or 4.88% projects are for NTP issuance, 3 projects or 3.66% are not yet started. For FY 2020 LGSF-AM, 46 MLGUs are eligible to receive the project funds. Presently, LGUs are waiting for the release of Notice of Authority to Debit Account Issued (NADAI) from the Bureau of Treasury (BTr) while others are complying requirements for the confirmation of fund release. In an effort to continuously monitor the progress of the implementation of these locally-funded projects, the DILG Provincial Inspection teams regularly conduct monitoring and inspection. Further, the DILG-Bohol continues to provide technical assistance to Local Council for the Protection of Children (LCPC) and GAD Focal Points. As to LCPC functionality, 21 LGUs are with Ideal Functionality, 13 Mature, 6 Progressive, and 8 Basic. As to the Functionality of the Local Councils for the protection of Children, this year's audit was suspended however, capacity development activities were constantly conducted. In terms of Monitoring the LGU Compliance to Magna Carta of Women, this unit remains consistent in monitoring the compliance of the LGUs. All LGUs have organized and have functional GFPS, have GAD database and have GAD Monitoring and evaluation mechanism. Out of the 49 LGUs including the provincial government, 42 have GAD Codes, and 29 have GAD Plan and Budget and GAD Accomplishment Report which were already endorsed by the DILG. At present, 44 had submitted their GAD documents, but only 29 were endorsed. Moreover, GAD Plan and Budget Monitoring System (GAD-PBMS) was introduced and operationalized this year. For gender responsive interventions to COVID-19, a Joint Memorandum Circular was issued jointly by the Commission on Human Rights (CHR) and the DILG entitled Ensuring Gender-Responsive Interventions to COVID-19 and the New Normal Including Ensuring Prompt, Effective and Survivor-Centered Response to all Forms of Gender-Based Violence. For the promotion of women's rights, DILG Bohol sustains its monitoring of functionality of LCAT-VAWCs and VAW Desks. DILG also monitors the functionality of the Local Aids Council in the LGU. Likewise, in order to strengthen the Management Coordination Committee (MMCs), regular meetings were conducted. Quarterly reports on the conduct of meetings were submitted to monitor the functionality of the committee. DILG Bohol also took part on the celebration of the Crime Prevention Week. On the other hand, Bohol maintains a zero recipient or LGUs that accepted relocatees from another LGU, and zero sending LGUs or LGUs that relocated ISFs to another LGU nevertheless, as part of the efforts on the provision of Assistance to the Relocated Informal Settler Families (ISFs) in Resettlement Communities in Response to the COVID-19 Emergency, LGUs in Bohol provided food packs to residents and non-residents in order to cope up with the COVID-19.

Business-Friendly and Competitive LGUs. In support to the national thrust on the promotion of business competitiveness and ease of doing business, DILG Bohol continues its push for empowering the LGUs to be- come more competent in pursuing more economic feats. Four (4) LGUs in Bohol participated in the Online Training on the Electronic Business Permits and Licensing System (eBPLS) sponsored by the Department of Information and Communications Technology (DICT) aimed to capacitate the LGUs in the adoption and implementation of the eBPLS software. In aid to the continued promotion of building business-friendly LGUs and in light to the current situation brought by the pandemic, the Bohol Investment Promotion Center (BIPC) of the Provincial Government of Bohol initiated the conduct of Ease of Doing Business Webinar Series for Business Permit and Licensing Officers (BPLOs) and Local Economic and Investment Promotions Officers (LEIPOs). As one of the partner agencies, DILG Bohol participated in the webinar series which provided platform for partner agencies to orient BPLOs and LEIPOs on their services. Further, LG Bohol sits as a member of the Bohol Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSME) Development Council. It is noteworthy that the Conditional Matching Grant to Provinces (CMGP) is in its 5th year of implementation since the implementation of KALSADA program in CY 2016. From 2016 up to present, eight (8) CMGP projects were completed, 2 ongoing projects for CMGP 2019 and 2 projects for issuance of Notice to Proceed, 1 under procurement

and the remaining one project for CMGP 2020 is pending for procurement. This year, DILG-Bohol provided technical assistance to the Provincial Government of Bohol in conducting activities specified under their Provincial Governance Reform Roadmap (PGRR). This unit also took the lead in the updating of the Local Road Network Development Plan (LRNDP) for CY 2021-2025. Series of workshops and writeshops were conducted to ensure an inclusive and participative planning process for an enhanced LRNDP.

Environment Protective, Disaster Resilient and Climate Change Adaptive LGUs. In order to build LGU capacities for an environment protective, climate change adaptive and disaster resilient communities, DILG-Bohol provided technical assistance to LGUs resulting to their compliance to the DRRM Act. Records in this office show that on the *state of LGU Disaster Preparedness Compliance*, in terms of data availability, 46 LGUs are fully com- pliant while 2 are partially compliant. In terms of early preparations, only 2 LGUs are fully compliant, whereas for critical preparations for mayors, all 48 LGUs are partially compliant. For the Local DRRM directory, two LGUs are partially complaint. DILG-Bohol also provided technical assistance in the formulation of the *Local Climate Change Action Plan (LCCAP)* of the LGUs in Bohol. Despite the threat of pandemic, this unit through the DRRM focal person successfully facilitated two (2) CDRA-LCCAP orientation for the municipalities of Danao and Catigbian. Being a member of the an- ti-illegal logging task force, DILG-Bohol fully supports the Provincial Government of Bohol in its *anti-illegal campaign programs*. Moreover, DILG-Bohol also took part during the conduct of *Provincial Ecological Solid Waste Management Monitoring and Evaluation*, Beach Tourism Destinations Monitoring.

The Strengthened Internal Organizational Capacity of the men and women of DILG-Bohol is enhanced in order to continually provide quality services to its clientele. An established Public Assistance and Com- plaint Desk (PACD) is located at the main entrance of the Provincial Office to ensure prompt assistance to clients. The Local Governance Resource Center with reading materials is available to field officers and clients who need additional knowledge on governance. As partner of the LGUs in promoting good governance, DILG Bohol actively engaged in programs and projects spearheaded and implemented by various Provincial and National Government Agencies and other National Convergence Initiatives. Online Calendar, online platform SubayBAYAN, Facebook page of DILG-Bohol, and online recording of incoming and outgoing communications have been established and maintained by this level. These were done to enable to quickly and effectively provide citizens, may they be in the private or public sector, with information, including the full disclosure reports, news updates, as well as the programs, services and projects of the office. Various online activities initiated by DILG 7 Regional Office were participated by the Provincial Office personnel and DILG field officers. As to the institutionalization of HRM-related activities, the Provincial Human Resource Merit Selection and Promotion Board (PHRMSPB), formerly, Provincial Personnel Selection Board (PPSB) indorsed comparative assessments for the positions of LGOOs V, VI and VII in February, 2020 and for the positions of Admin Assistant, LGOOs II, V and VI. They also conducted meetings to endorse the shortlisted applicants for the Contact Tracers (CTs). Due to the threat of COVID-19, the Program on Awards and Incentives for Service Excellence (PRAISE) was suspended. In order to maintain the ISO certification of DILG Region 7, DILG-Bohol as a sub-regional office observed the ISO 9001 Quality Management Processes. The newly hired LGOOs II were oriented on the ISO processes. DILG-Bohol consistently implemented the Strategic Performance Management System (SPMS). As to personnel development, various invitations to scholarship programs and activities were received by this level and subsequently disseminated to the Field Officers, however, none of the DILG-Bohol personnel availed for the offered scholarship programs. Moreover, *Physical Fitness Activities* such as zumba is a way of life in DILG-Bohol as it is done every 1st Friday of the month, however, the conduct of *Integrity* Circle was suspended this year. One of the notable practices of the DILG-Bohol employees is the observance of the 55 program in the office. One of the planned activities suspended due to the pandemic was the conduct of Training on Procurement as part of the Financial and Administrative Management Enhancement Project. Regular inventory of office equipment, supplies and other properties as well as Provincial BAC Meetings were also observed by this level. Supervision, monitoring, and dissemination of updates are done through bi-monthly field offi- cers conferences and *cluster meetings*. This year, virtual conferences and meetings were employed as a way of coping up with the pandemic. To ensure cascading of ExeCom concerns to the provincial staff, this level initiated the conduct of Provincial Management Committee Meeting (ProManCom) participated by all program coordinators and administrative staff. DILG-Bohol provided assistance during the visit of Secretary of the Interior and Local Government (SILG) Eduardo M. Año in July. PD Jerome G. Gonzales together with the cluster leaders also conducted supervisory visits to selected Field Officers to monitor their compliance with administrative requirements as well as their rapport with local officials and functionaries. Competencies of DILG-Bohol officers and staff are developed with their attendance to a number of trainings and seminars duly called for. Due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, virtual platforms such as Google Meet, Zoom and Facebook live are utilized in the conduct of these activities. As to the Apprenticeship Program for LGOOs II and III, two LGOOs from Bohol are currently undergoing the said program. Disiplina Muna campaign and its activities were also conducted and participated by this field unit. DILG Bohol's collaboration with other government agencies were also evident this year. An equally strong show of support was extended to the **Persons with Disabilities, Youth involvement** and empowerment, among others. As to GAD Related activities, participation of women's month celebration as well as conduct of safety drills/exercises, coastal clean-up, tree planting was conducted. Moreover, DILG-Bohol also celebrated the Sinulog festival. All of these accomplishments were made possible under the new and able leadership of our dynamic Provincial Director, Jerome G. Gonzales.

Accountable, Transparent, Participative, and Effective Local Governance

FULL DISCLOSURE POLICY

In line with the government's policy that requires local officials of provinces, cities, and municipalities to fully disclose particular financial transactions of the LGU to keep their constituents informed of how the LGU budget is managed, disbursed and used, the DILG-Bohol Field Officers continuously facilitate the compliance of their respective LGUs to the Full Disclosure Policy. At the provincial level, the posting within the prescribed period in three conspicuous places and in the FDP, Portal are regularly monitored.

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SEAL OF GOOD LOCAL GOVERNANCE (SGLG)

The Seal of Good Local Governance (SGLG) is an award, incentive, honor and recognition-based program for all LGUs. It is a continuing commitment for LGUs to continually progress and improve their performance in the areas of transparency and accountability in the use of public funds, preparedness for challenges posed by disasters, sensitivity to the needs of vulnerable and marginalized sectors of society, implementation of health programs, educational reforms, investment and employment promotion, local culture and heritage programs, protection of the constituents to life and damage to property, and safeguarding the

integrity of the environment.

In the early part of this year, different activities were conducted for the 2020 Seal of Good Local Governance (SGLG) implementation. These activities were the following: Updating of the SGLG-LG-PMS Directory of Personnel, Accomplishment of the SGLG Policy Feedback Form and the issuance of the draft Memorandum Circular for the implementation of the 2020 SGLG. In the said draft issuance, indicators were arranged ac-cording to the areas stated in the SGLG Act. But most of the 2019 indicators were retained and only two indicators on youth development were added for purposes of profiling. This is because the Implementing Rules and Regulations of RA 11292 or the SGLG Act is yet to be formulated

But with the public health crisis that occurred due to the COVID 19, some activities were suspended especially the 2020 SGLG assessment and onsite validation. However, other activities were also continuously implemented especially the crafting of the IRR for RA 11292. The Council for Good Local Governance (CGLG), the policy-making and advisory body which will ensure the proper implementation of the SGLG being chaired by the Secretary of the DILG was initially convened before the pandemic. The Council drafted the SGLG IRR starting in the month of February, during their meeting. Currently, eight (8) out of ten (10) CGLG members have given their concurrence with the draft IRR, and the latest draft IRR, version 5, has been endorsed for comments and concurrence to the remaining two (2) members of the CGLG.

Meanwhile, the Governance Assessment Report (GAR) for the 2019 SGLG implementation was also released in February of this year. The GAR displays the overall performance of LGUs across the governance areas. Exit conference were conducted by the DILG Field Officers to disseminate the GAR. Performance information generated from the GAR was used by the LGU officials and personnel to develop comprehensive analysis as well as the evidence-based interventions.

Local Governance Performance Management System (LGPMS)

An integral part of the SGLG is the Local Governance Performance Management System (LGPMS), which serves as the main operational platform for the SGLG particularly for online data entry and web reports. At present, the LG- PMS Website development is at its final phases, with the pilot testing of the new LGPMS Website scheduled in December 2020.

LGU Profiling

Part of the LGPMS, is the Local Government Unit-(LGU) Profile which is updated on an annual basis. Data included in the LGU Profile are provided and accomplished by the LGU-LGPMS Teams composed of LGU officials and functionaries. For the 2020 LGU Profile, new items were included which were not present in the 2019 version. This is due to the task given to the DILG to gather more comprehensive data on the disaster management capabilities of the local government units. This is part of an inter-agency effort to improve governance systems in the wake of COVID-19 and the new normal.

LGU Profile forms filled out by the LGU LGPMS Teams are - Annex A for provinces and Annex B for cities and municipalities. Similar to previous years, LGUs through their LGU-LGPMS Teams filled out both manual and on-line data capture forms. After filling out and verifying the LGU Profile form by the Team, data are encoded. The online LGU Profile Survey Form was accessed through http://bit.ly/2020-LGU-Profile. Online encoding was done by the 47 LGUs of Bohol from October 20-28, 2020. The remaining two LGUs encoded in the early part of November. Uploading of the accomplished LGU Profile form in pdf file was also done at the designated Google Drive by the 44 PCMLGUs of Bohol from October 29-30, 2020. There were five (5) which uploaded in the early part of November.

LGPMS-SGLG Provincial Focal Person (PFP) Ma. Reina A. Quilas was tasked to monitor the proper accomplishment of such forms, and to check that all pertinent fields and required signatures were present. After which, PFP Quilas accessed the designated LGPMS-SGLG Google Drive folder to upload the digitized LGU Profile forms.

Good Financial Housekeeping (GFH)

The Good Financial Housekeeping is a recognition to LGUs which passed and adhered to the good financial housekeeping standards of the DILG. These standards are on accounting and auditing by the Commission on Audit (COA) and on full disclosure policy by the DILG. The GFH started in 2010 and has been included as one of the requirements for an LGU to receive the Seal of Good Local Governance (SGLG).

The three municipalities of Bohol, which are Bien Unido, Pilar and San Isidro were given time to comply with the requirements for post assessment. Only the latter was not able to make it to the post assessment. The two LGUs were already included in the database of GFH passers which is updated by the BLGS monthly.

Local Development Council (LDC) Functionality

The Local Development Council (LDC) functionality is one of the requirements for an LGU to pass the SGLG. The specific indicators under the LDC functionality include: LDC organization (Executive Committee, LDC full council, sectoral committees and Secretariat), composition, conduct of meetings and presence of plans like the Comprehensive Development Plan, Local Development Investment Program (LDIP) and the Annual Investment Program (AIP).

The Bureau of Local Government Supervision (BLGS) released the 2019 LDC functionality profile in the early part of this year, which was taken from the 2019 SGLG results. There were nine (9)

municipalities of Bohol which achieved a low LDC functionality rating. These municipalities were given the opportunity to raise their rating from "low" to "medium" by complying with the minimum criteria of a functional LDC based on the Local Government Code. The guidelines were issued by the Central Office on the post assessment compliance.

To date, all the nine municipalities were able to comply with the post assessment compliance. These LGUs which passed the LDC functionality assessment have the opportunity to access the Local Government Support Fund-Assistance to Municipalities (LGSF-AM) and the LGSF-Sagana at Ligtas na Tubig sa Lahat (SALINTUBIG), provided that other criteria are also met.

On February 14, 2020, the Bureau of Local Government Supervision (BLGS) released and published the list of local government units (LGUs) which passed the GFH. The Provincial Government of Bohol, the City of Tagbilaran and the 44 municipalities of Bohol were part of the GFH passers.

Performance-Based Bonus

The Performance-Based Bonus (PBB) is a top-up bonus that is given to employees based on their performance and contributions to the accomplishment of their Department's overall targets and commitments. The PBB is under the Performance-Based Incentive System (PBIS), a system of incentives for government employees that is being introduced in FY 2012, per EO No. 80.

For FY 2019, only the municipalities of Talibon and Tubigon, were eligible for the PBB. These LGUs were is- sued the Notice of Final Eligibility by the DILG-Bureau of Local Government Supervision (BLGS) on June 3, 2020 along with three other LGUs in Region 7. These LGUs met the eligibility criteria namely: passer of the 2019 SGLG criteria; with maintained/updated Citizen's/Service Charter; with a fully functional Strategic Performance Management System (SPMS) and sustained compliance with the Commission on Audit (COA) audit findings. The PBB was charged to LGU funds for FY 2020 subject to the Personnel Services limitation in LGU budgets pursuant to Sec. 325 of the Local Government Code. Granting of the PBB to officials and employees of the municipalities of Talibon and Tubigon was made from May 29 until December 31, 2020.

For FY 2020, the PBB eligibility criteria are the following: minimum local governance standards, most current and updated Citizen's/Service Charter reflecting streamlined and reengineered processes; Performance Rating System/ Strategic Performance Management System (SPMS) and sustained compliance with audit findings. Specific indicators under the local governance standards are the following: SGLG awardee in any year from 2015-2019; at least medium compliance of the Local Development Council (LDC) functionality as of August 28, 2020 and passer of the Good Financial Housekeeping as of August 28, 2020 except those which availed of remedies under DILG Memo Circular dated February 16, 2015. Based on the BLGS prepared profile, sixteen LGUs in the province of Bohol are initially qualified to the PBB, only on the local governance standards which are under the DILG. These LGUs were advised by the DILG to signify their intent to avail of the PBB since the granting of the PBB is on an enrolment basis. These LGUs are still to be assessed with their compliance with other governance standards particularly on the following: most current and updated Citizen's/Service Charter reflecting streamlined and reengineered processes; Performance Rating System/ Strategic Performance Management System (SPMS) and sustained compliance with audit findings. These LGUs will be notified if they are eligible for the 2020 PBB, in the year 2021. If qualified, PBB payment will also be made next year.

PERFORMANCE CHALLENGE FUND (PCF)

Established in 2010, the Performance Challenge Fund (PCF) is a performance-based reform program of the DILG that seeks to rationalize inter-governmental transfer of the national government to LGUs and encourage the convergence of local development initiatives with the national development agenda and priorities under the Philip- pines Development Plan (PDP) 2017-2011 and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) as one of our international commitments. It is a subsidy given to eligible LGUs under the Local Governance Performance Management Program of the Department to support high-impact local development projects identified as priority by the LGU. The PCF is given to LGUs that passed the SGLG.

In CY 2015, the LGUs of Alicia, Danao, Loboc, Loon, Maribojoc, Panglao, San Miguel, Sierra Bullones, Talibon and the Provincial Government of Bohol were recipients of the Performance Challenge Fund, These LGUs shown in Table 3 were required to submit to DILG-Bohol Provincial Office a regular project implementation monitoring report.





Leveraging Civic-Technology for Governance Innovation (DevLive)

Development Live or DevLive app is an application that allows one to monitor and report on the local government's projects related to the Sustainable Development Goals in the Philippines. The feedback will be helpful in responding to any concerns or issues that might rise. DevLive is developed by the DILG and the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP).



By installing the app, it allows the person to provide feedback in terms of progress, timeliness, and effectiveness of local infrastructure projects in real time.

An online orientation on the roll-out of DevLive was conducted on November 6, 2020, 9:00 am-12:00 noon. It was participated by LGOO II Adelene G. Ibarra, Engr. Ruel D. Go and DMO II Geralyn Janette Corona.

Providing Avenues for Advocacies for Open Government Participation (Dagyaw)

The Dagyaw 2020: Open Government Virtual Town Hall Meetings officially started on October 8, 2020 via Zoom and Facebook live. The previous Dagyaw participatory governance and town hall meetings were held face-to- face with government officials and stakeholders. To adapt to the times, especially with the emergence of the COVID-19 pandemic, Dagyaw migrated to online platforms, hence the virtual town hall meetings.

'Dagyaw' is a Hiligaynon term for 'togetherness'. The event is branded under this word to exemplify the Filipino spirit of 'bayanihan'. It is a series of town hall meetings initiated pursuant to Executive Order No. 24, signed on May 2017 that is geared towards the mandate of the PGC in ensuring the direct participation of various stakeholders in the formulation of programs and policies to address emergent governance concerns at the grassroots level and in initiating projects that shall facilitate citizen empowerment and participation in governance in the national, regional and local levels.

The Dagyaw 2020 is anchored on the objectives of the National Task Force (NTF) Against COVID-19 Sub-Task Group on Governance aimed at building mutual trust between the government and the Filipino people by providing an open, protected and neutral space for dialogues on key national and local issues and plans amid the public health crisis.

Outcomes from these dialogues shall serve as key references of the government in public decision-making and in formulating policies for better public sector performance and service delivery.

The conduct of these series of events are led by the Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG), Presidential Communications Operations Office (PCOO) and Department of Budget and Management (DBM) with sup- port coming from the Office of the President (OP), Office of the Cabinet Secretary (OCS) and different national government agencies

IMPROVED LOCAL DEVELOPMENT PLANNING

CLUP and CDP Monitoring

Pursuant to the Local Government Code of 1991, cities and municipalities are mandated to formulate the Comprehensive Development Plan (CDP) and Comprehensive Land Use Plan (CLUP). Being tasked to provide general supervision over local government units, the DILG monitors the compliance of every LGU as to the formulation of the aforementioned plans.

Localization of the Philippine Development Plan (PDP) 2017-2022 and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)

The Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG), through the Bureau of Local Government Development (BLGD) has undertaken series of regional and provincial level activities for the localization of the Philippine Development Plan (PDP) 2017-2022 and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) since 2018. One of the initiatives include the alignment of the provinces' and their component cities and municipalities' development investment programs with the national, regional, and provincial strategic priorities and thrusts embodied in the PDP, Regional Development Plan (RDP), Provincial Development and Physical Framework Plan (PDPFP), and Provincial Development Investment Program (PDIP) respectively.

In 2019, DILG-Bohol conducted the Provincial Workshop on Increasing Responsiveness of Local Plans to the PDP 2017-2022 and the SDGs which was participated by all city and municipalities of the province. Such activity aimed to (i) monitor and evaluate provincial accomplishments vis-à-vis committed targets; (ii) determine performance gaps and opportunities wherein potential provincial assistance to component LGUs to address such gaps may be identified; (iii) identify PPAs (contributing to the realization of PDP-SDGs), and (iv) possible elevation of identified PPAs to the RDC for possible funding by regional line agencies.

For this year, submission of the required outputs of the aforementioned activity were done by the provincial, city and municipal LGUs. The status of the submission of outputs is as follows:

CUSTOMIZED ACTIVITY: PLUC Review

As a member of the Provincial Land Use Committee (PLUC), DILG Bohol represented by LGOO V Eunice Anne B. Caballo participated in the presentation and review of the draft CLUPs of LGUs Loay and Loboc on January 29, 2020 at the Provincial Planning and Development Office (PPDO), Bohol Provincial Capitol, Tagbilaran City. The PLUC provision- ally approved such plans pending compliance to the corrections presented.

CSO – PEOPLE'S PARTICIPATION PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM Citizen Satisfaction Index System (CSIS)

The DILG is committed to aggressively scale up interventions towards a kind of governance that values transparency, accountability, participation and performance. The Citizen Satisfaction Index System (CSIS) is currently implemented by the department to help promote transparency, accountability and participatory governance. It is an assessment tool for the service delivery performance of local governments based largely on the knowledge, experience and perception of the people. The CSIS endeavors to assess the quality, responsiveness and inclusiveness of public services from the point-of-view of the people as clients and as citizens. It is designed to collect and generate relevant citizens' feedback on local governments' service delivery performance and on the citizens' general satisfaction. The CSIS conceptualizes the citizen as the center of local government performance.

For year 2019, the municipalities of Ubay and Loboc were the pilot LGUs for CSIS Implementation in the Province of Bohol. This is in partnership with the Local Resource Institutes (LRIs) which are the Cebu Institute of Technology-University for Ubay and University of San Jose Recolletos for Loboc.

After the successful conduct of the CSIS Survey, CSIS Utilization Conferences were held last February 20, 2020 and February 27, 2020 in Ubay and Loboc, respectively. In these activities, presentations of

the survey results to the local officials and functionaries, workshops on the formulation of the Citizen Priority Action Plan (CPAP), and focus group discussions with civil society organizations (CSOs) were done.

These two LGUs had already submitted the approved CPAP to DILG VII.

LUPONG TAGAPAMAYAPA INCENTIVE AWARDS (LTIA)

The annual search of the Lupong Tagapamayapa Incentive Awards (LTIA) commenced on February 11, 2020 with the submission of three (3) entries for first to third class municipalities category, twelve (12) entries for fourth to sixth class municipalities category, and one (1) entry for component city category. The Lupong Tagapamayapa Provin- cial Awards Committee conducted table assessment of entries on February 12-13, 2020 at the DILG Bohol Provincial Office to come up with the top three finalists from each category except for the component city. On-site validation ensued on February 17-19, 2020 which focused on the actual interview of the lupon chairpersons, members and secretaries, and the inspection of lupon records.

The Lupong Tagapamayapa of Pinayagan Sur, Tubigon emerged as the provincial winner for the first to third class municipalities category, the Lupong Tagapamayapa of Nahawan, Clarin for the fourth to sixth class municipalities category, and automatically, the Lupong Tagapamayapa of Taloto, Tagbilaran City for the component city category which made them as Bohol's official entries to the regional search.

KATARUNGANG PAMBARANGAY (KP)

Section 399 of R.A. No. 7160 or the Local Government Code of 1991 provides for the creation of the Lupong Tagapamayapa or Lupon in each barangay, composed of the Punong Barangay, as Chairman and ten (10) to twenty (20) members.

Pursuant to the above-mentioned provision of R.A. No. 7160, the Lupong Tagapamayapa of the 1,109 Baran- gays of the Province of Bohol are all organized. Below are the actions taken by the Lupong Tagapamayapa of the 48 Cities and Municipalities of the province, viz:

Sections 421 and 422 of the Local Government Code of 1991 and DILG MC No. 2007-129 mandates the City and Municipal Mayors and their respective Sanggunians to provide support necessary for the effective implementation of the Katarungang Pambarangay. In connection, all Lupons of the 1,109 Barangays of the Province of Bohol were all provided with support such as, but not limited to, financial support, advocacy campaign on KP implementation and online trainings as an alternative means due to the ongoing threat of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Department of Justice (DOJ), through the Office for Alternative Dispute Resolution (OADR), in collaboration with the Department, conducted a series of online training on Katarungang Pambarangay (KP) Law via zoom and Facebook live. The online training was participated by the Punong Barangays, the Lupong Tagapamayapa Members, Barangay Secretaries and the C/MLGOOs of the province of Bohol.



The online training aims to equip the Lupong Tagapamayapa members with adequate knowledge and com- petencies on the Katarungang Pambarangay (KP) Law. The lectures include discussions on Mediation/Conciliation and Arbitration.

Lupong Tagapamayapa Members and Barangay Secretary of Loboc, Bohol, attending the online training on Katarungang Pambarangay (KP) Law, hosted by the Department of Justice (DOJ), through the Office for Alternative Dispute Resolution (OADR).

COMMUNITY-BASED MONITORING SYSTEM (CBMS)

The threat of COVID-19 pandemic did not impede the implementation of CBMS to some Local Government Units (LGUs) of Bohol. For this year, thru the technical assistance of LGOO VI Mylove C. Flood, the following LGUs completed the 4-day CBMS Accelerated Poverty Profiling Module 1 Training – Data Collection (using tablets):

BARANGAY ASSEMBLY DAY

Pursuant to Section 397 of the Local Government Code of 1991, Presidential Proclamation No. 599, series of 2018 and DILG Memorandum Circular No. 2020-100, barangays in the Province of Bohol were enjoined to conduct their barangay assemblies.

In response to the altered situation brought by COVID-19 pandemic, the Barangay Assembly Day for the Second Semester of CY 2020 was conducted through different modes other than the usual face-to-face which include the utilization of social media platforms and distribution of flyers or leaflets. For barangays that conducted face-to-face mode, IATF-MEID guidelines on mass gatherings and enforcement of prevention protocols were strictly adhered.

Common highlights of the second semester assembly include report on the implementation of the Social Amelioration Program, solid waste management, compliance to COVID-19 health protocols, ongoing projects, COVID-19 initiatives, and COVID and non-COVID related plans or upcoming projects

TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE ON DEMAND-DRIVEN ACTIVITIES

Demand driven activities are aimed to build on the specific competency needs identified by the LGUs as defined in their Capacity Development Agenda. Moreover, it also pertains to demand driven trainings conducted in the local government units with the assistance of the DILG Field Officers.

As of the third quarter of CY 2020, a number of demand-driven trainings were conducted by all the LGUs of Bohol. This demand driven activities pertain to Administrative Governance, Social Governance, Economic Governance, Environmental Governance and Valuing Fundamentals of Good Governance. These trainings with their corresponding local governance areas were managed/facilitated/rendered technical assistance by the DILG Field Officers to the Local Government Units.

In consideration with the ongoing pandemic, face-to-face activities are limited and different virtual platforms are utilized by this office.

CENTRAL OFFICE DIRECTIVES

Central Office directives and issuances e.g. memorandum circulars, memoranda and advisories are communicated and disseminated to all 49 LGUs through email to the Office of the Governor and to the respective City and Municipal Local Government Operations Officers. Urgent and important issuances are furnished to the Office of the Governor and the concerned national or provincial agencies through personal delivery. The administrative services section of this office ensured the service of the directives.

LGU ADMINISTRATIVE GUIDANCE (LEGAL OPINIONS / FACT-FINDING / 8888)

LEGAL OPINIONS

Roughly 250 walk-in clients were provided with legal opinions and advices mostly on municipal and barangay governance. Most of these complaints were related to leave of absence of municipal/barangay officials, katarungang pambarangay and implementation of SAP, among others.

Also, 2 requests for legal opinion were endorsed to the Regional Office regarding the (1) Resumption to office of a barangay official after availing of the plea-bargaining agreement and (2) Hiring of COS worker assigned to the Sangguniang Bayan whose salary is sourced from the appropriation of the same.

Legal opinions, advices and clarifications were also provided to field officers on their urgent queries via telephone calls and online chats. On the other hand, the number of complaints received and number of replies indorsed to the Regional Office as of November 20, 2020:



Processing of Death Benefit Claims of Barangay Officials





A total of **28** death benefit claims from January to November 2020 for release to beneficiaries of deceased barangay officials.





STATISTICS BY TERM OF OFFICE 2019




Graph 2. Statistics by Term of Office 2019

TRAVEL ABROAD

Pursuant to Presidential Executive Order No. 77 dated the March 15, 2019, the Department issued DILG Memorandum Circular No. 2019-83 amending the guidelines on the foreign travel of Local Government Officials and Employees. The application for Foreign Travel Authority, complete with all the required documents must be filed to www. blgs-pcmd.com which was changed to fta.dilg.gov.ph towards the end of 2019.

With this year's COVID-19 pandemic, the Department has issued an advisory dated March 14, 2020 directing all local government officials and employees to stay within their LGUs and were banned from any travel, except those for medical reasons. Thus, additional documentary requirements are needed to be complied pursuant to DILG Advisory dated July 17, 2020.

This office disseminated the said issuances to all concerned thru the Office of the Governor and the City/Municipal Local Government Operations Officers for information and guidance

ISSUANCE OF ENDORSEMENT ON LAKBAY ARAL

In line with the policies and guidelines on study tours or "lakbay aral" of LGUs, DILG-Bohol was able to assist in the issuance of DILG VII's endorsements for the conduct such activities of the following LGUs.

SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM FOR LGUS

All 48 C/MLGOOs of the province communicated a total of 14 invitations for scholarship programs to all their LGU assignment. These invitations are also forwarded to the Office of the Governor. COMPLIANCE TO ANTI-RED TAPE ACT (ARTA)

Public Assistance and Complaints Desk (PACD) Established and Maintained

The Public Assistance and Complaints Desk (PACD) is located at the main entrance of the Office of the Provincial Director to promptly attend to clients requesting assistance from any of the staff of the provincial office. The PACD is manned by LGOO II Julie Mae Nombre, LGOO II Joyce Telmo and Mr. Nikko Audrey Aranas. Considering the current situation, COVID-19 safety protocols are also strictly observed.

Updating and Maintenance of Citizens Charter

Anti-Red Tape Act is consistently applied and practiced by the DILG-Bohol as manifested in the posting of updated Citizen's Charter at the main entrance of the DILG provincial office. This already included the frontline services espoused by DILG Central Office.

The "no noon break" signage is conspicuously posted at the main door of the office with the anti-red tape slogans. The Public Assistance and Complaint Desk is also apparent in the office ably manned by LGOO II Julie Mae Nombre, LGOO II Joyce Telmo and Mr. Nikko Audrey Aranas.

ROAD CLEARING

Initiatives in relation to the Presidential Directive to Clear Roads of Illegal Structures and Constructions

During the 2019 State of the Nation Address, President Rodrigo Roa Duterte enjoined all local officials to exercise their powers essential to reclaim public roads which are being used for private ends and in the process rid them of illegal structures and constructions.

In adherence to this Presidential Directive, DILG Memorandum Circular 2019-121 Presidential Directive during the 4th State of the Nation Address of the President to clear roads of Illegal Structures and Constructions was issued on July 29, 2020.

To further ensure compliance and continuous conduct of road clearing operations, DILG Memorandum Circular 2020-027 Continued Implementation of the Presidential Directive to Clear Roads of Illegal Obstructions (Road Clearing 2.0) was issued on February 7, 2020.

The directive was disseminated to the concerned offices in the LGUs. DILG Bohol conducted an Orientation of the Provincial Validation Team composed of the DILG Provincial Director, representative from the Philippine National Police

(PNP) and representative from the Bureau of Fire Protection (BFP) and conducted an interface with the Governor for the succeeding activities.

PROGRAM FOR NEOS: ORIENTATION COURSE FOR LOCAL SANGGUNIANS

The Program for Newly-Elected Officials is a continuing intervention of the Department of the Interior and Local Government through the Local Government Academy in its commitment to provide a harmonized and holistic capacity development delivery mechanism for local governments all over the country. It is in line with the Department's mandate to further strengthen the capability of local governments aimed towards effective and efficient delivery of basic services to the citizenry by helping NEOs effectively discharge their duties and responsibilities, as well as be able to define their development roadmaps.

The program primarily aims to enhance the capacities of LGUs, particularly of newly-elected officials as both development and economic managers who are able to operationalize their respective visions and agendas, improve their service delivery towards inclusive, resilient and sustainable growth.

This program is composed of five components, as follows: Component 1 – Ensuring Smooth Transition; Component 2 – Jumpstarting Local Governance; Component 3 – Looking Forward to Better Governance; Component 4 – Sharpening the Saw; and Component 5 – Enhancing LGU Performance.

SK MANDATORY AND CONTINUING TRAINING PROGRAM

The Sangguniang Kabataan (SK) Reform Act of 2015 or RA 10742, which was approved on January 15, 2018, gave way to strengthening and empowering the SK as a useful conduit in community development. Its Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR), specifically Rule V, Section 30 of the Act states that "for the purpose of emphasizing the role of the youth in nation building and molding them to become better citizens with the values of patriotism, nationalism and honor as a Filipino, any SK official, whether elected or appointed, or any member of the Local Youth Development Council (LYDC) must undergo the mandatory training program before she or he can assume office".

To assume financial independence of the Sangguniang Kabataan, the newly appointed SK Treasurers and SK Secretaries, along with SK Members who were unable to attend the first round of trainings after the elections, under- went the Sangguniang Kabataan Mandatory Training (SKMT), a requirement before they can assume office. These were conducted in the different LGUs.

The training was composed of various lectures, group discussions and activities that was divided into three (3) modules comprising of five (5) sessions which include:

Module 1 - Session 1: Decentralization and Local Governance

Session 2: SK History and its Salient Features

Module 2 - Session 1: Meetings and Resolutions

Session 2: Planning and Budgeting

Module 3 - Session 1: Code of Conduct and Ethical Standards for Public Officials and Employees

The activities were facilitated by the respective DILG Field Officers, and the resource speakers were composed of the local functionaries. A total of 3,903 participants attended the mandatory training. This comprised of 1,935 SK Members, 970 SK Secretaries, and 998 SK Treasurers.

BANTAY KORAPSYON

Bantay Korapsyon is a flagship program of the DILG encouraging the involvement and participation of various stakeholders in the fight against corruption down to the grassroots level. It starts from the people being involved in the fight against corruption by airing their complaints through Hotline 8888, the Presidential Complaint Center and even walk-in complaints.

The program also introduces a three-pronged strategy to combat corruption through education by improving awareness regarding corruption; prevention by reducing opportunities to do corrupt acts; and determent by raising the probability of catching the corrupt and rewarding good practices all achieved through partnerships and community mobilization, and community-specific, LGU-nuanced, and DILG-focused capacity development interventions.

For the year 2020, the Department launched the *Sumbungan Online* as part of the "Bayanihan to Heal as One Act. It serves as a vehicle for People's Organizations, Non-Governmental Organizations, Home Owners' Associations, and other Civil Society Organizations and citizens to report anomalies and violations against the Bayanihan Act.

MONITORING ON THE IMPLEMENTATION OF KASAMBAHAY LAW

In compliance to the semestral submission of Kasambahay Monitoring Report and to strengthen the imple- mentation of Batas Kasambahay, the DILG officers concerned were requested to remind the Punong Barangays within their areas of jurisdiction on their mandated functions pursuant to RA 10361 and DILG issuances and to submit data needed for the monitoring. For the second semester of CY 2019 which submission was due on January 15, 2020, the Province of Bohol has the consolidated data on the following:

Provision of Secretariat Services to POCs


The DILG, as Head Secretariat, continues to provide technical and administrative support to Peace and Order Councils through the sending of notices, preparation of the agenda, resolutions and the minutes of meetings. It also provides



assistance to the different POC Chairpersons and Vice-Chairpersons in the conduct of P/C/MPOC meetings and other Peace and Order-related activities.

For 2020, the Provincial Peace and Order Council (PPOC) have conducted three (3) meetings with four (4) resolutions passed. Virtual PPOC meetings were conducted during the COVID-19 pandemic as an alternative mechanism in ensuing that peace and order situation updates are regularly communicated.

Peace and Or- der Assessment. The Philippine Army through the 47th Infantry Battalion also provides inputs on the Internal Security Situation in the Province. Other law enforcement agencies such as the PDEA and NBI also render updates and reports on their operational accomplishments.

All the 48 City/Municipal POCs in the province

conduct regular Peace and Order Meetings to ensure that the peace building initiatives of the LGUs are being implemented amidst the COVID-19 pandemic.

Peace and Order Council Performance Audit

For the year 2020, the conduct of the 2019 Peace and Order Council Performance Audit was postponed, how- ever, POCs remain operational through the conduct of regular meetings emphasizing the role of the Council in the fight against COVID-19 and observing the minimum public health standards and other preventive measures.

Peace and Order and Public Safety Planning Workshops and Compliance of LGUs to POPSP - Policy Compliance Monitoring System (PCMS)

The Peace and Order Council is mandated to formulate a 3-year Local Peace and Order and Public Safety (POPS) Plan consisting of programs and activities to promote peace and order and public safety in the locality.DILG-Bohol facilitated the Peace and Order and Public Safety Plan (POPSP) Formulation of the Provincial Government of Bohol on January 15, 2020 at the Reception Hall, 2nd Floor, New Capitol Building. Participants of the activity were members of the Technical Working Group for POPS planning of the Provincial Peace and Order Council.

The C/MLGOOs of DILG-Bohol facilitated the conduct of POPS Planning in the LGUs. They serve as resource persons, facilitators, and assisted in the finalization of the LGU POPS Plans. They also

provided assistance in encoding the 2020-2022 POPS Plan and in submission of the First Semester Accomplishment in the POPSP - Policy Compliance Monitoring System (PCMS).

On February 20, 2020, five (5) Former Rebels (FRs) who were initially classified as Militia ng Bayan (MBs) qual- ified Regular NPA members and were granted livelihood the assistance in amount of P 50,000.00 each in Barangay Tabuan, Antequera, Bohol.



Enhanced Comprehensive Local Integration Program

The Enhanced Comprehensive Local Integration Program E-CLIP aims to facilitate the mainstreaming of Former Rebels who were members of the CNN and the MB as productive citizens, enhance capacities of LGUs and NGAs in the implementation and sustainability of the programs, and compensate and remunerate all turned-in firearms.

The Bohol Enhanced Comprehensive Local Integration Program (ECLIP) Committee had been active in the processing and endorsement of qualified beneficiaries for the program.

For 2020, the Bohol E-CLIP Committee have conducted three (3) meetings and deliberated on the potential enrollees to the program.

Communicating for Perpetual end to Extreme violence and forming Alliance towards posi-tive Change and Enriched communities (C4PEACE)

With the issuance of Executive Order No. 70 Institutionalizing the Whole-of-Nation Approach and Creation of the National Task Force to End Local Communist Armed Conflict (NTF-ELCAC), government policies and peace initiatives were refocused to address the root causes of local armed conflict by prioritizing the delivery of basic government services, social development packages in conflict-affected areas and vulnerable communities.

For 2020, 19 barangays in the Province of Bohol were identified as target barangays for the implementation of the Retooled Community Support Program (RCSP), a convergence mechanism for LGUs particularly in the barangay for the identification of issues and needed government interventions.

The RCSP is implemented thru the conduct of the "Dagyawan sa Barangay", an avenue for productive, valuable, and visible engagement between the government and its citizens through direct interfacing with government officials and access to frontline government services and national programs.

In the implementation of the RCSP in the Province of Bohol, several activities and coordination meetings were conducted.

Initiatives to End Local Communist Armed Conflict (ELCAC) and Preventing and Countering Violent Extremism

In support to the Whole of Nation Approach to End Local Communist Armed Conflict (ELCAC), DILG Bohol facilitated the Creation of Task Force-ELCAC at the Provincial, City, Municipal and Barangay level.

The Provincial Joint Task Force (JTF) Dagohoy To End Local Communist Armed Conflict (ELCAC) was created thru Executive Order No. 18 Series of 2019. The task force will spearhead in attaining inclusive and sustainable peace in the province by combining an integrating both the Bohol Joint Task Force Dagon and the Task Force Hoyohoy to End Local Communist Armed Conflict (ELCAC).

The 47 municipalities and 1 city in the province have also created their respective Local Task Forces to End Local Communist Armed Conflict (ELCAC) either thru an Executive Order or a Joint Resolution of the Peace and Order Council and the Development Council.

The Provincial Task Force has conducted meetings on January 16, 2020 and June 29, 2020. A Joint Meeting of the Task Group Kalinaw (Internal Security) under the ELCAC (JTF Dagohoy) and RDP-PPM TWG was also conducted on April 29, 2020. Capacity development activities were also provided through the Community Development Program (CDP) of the Provincial Government of Bohol.

The Community Development Program is a multi-pronged approach and strategic stakeholder's convergence to attain inclusive and sustainable peace and development through the integration of peace, development and security efforts, promotion of good governance practices, empowerment of the marginalized communities reducing poverty incidence and risks of disadvantaged members of society and bringing government closer to the people.

DILG-Bohol as a member of the Executive Committee and the Technical Working Group of the Community Development Program attended and facilitated several activities of the CDP.





DILG-Bohol recognizes the important role of partnership and coordination in advocating the Whole-of-Nation Approach. On August 28, 2020, DILG-Bohol Focal Person on Peace and Order Concerns served as a resource person during the ELCAC Briefing to the members of AUDIO-Bohol Camp Rajah Sikatuna, Katipunan, Carmen, Bohol.

Barangay Drug Clearing Program (BDCP) Re-Orientation

The Bohol Provincial BDCP Team composed of representatives from DILG Bohol, Bohol Provincial Police Office (BPPO), PDEABohol, and the Bohol Center for Drug Education and Counselling (CeDEC), continued to promote the Barangay Drug Clearing Program to the LGUs by strengthening their capacity in implementing their anti-illegal drug efforts and providing them with technical assistance through the conduct of BDCP Orientations.



The Provincial BDCP team encourages all LGUs especially those with- out or have less than fifty percent of their barangays declared as drug-cleared to conduct the re-orientation by writing to the LCEs as well as doing close coordination with their local PNP-PCR, C/ML- GOO, and other concerned personalities.


The selected participants for the activity are the Punong Barangay, Barangay Secretary, Sangguniang Barangay Member Committee Chairperson on Peace and Order, Sangguniang Kabataan Chairperson, Interventionists, Chief of Police, PNP Officer in charge with Community Relations, City/Municipal Health Officer, and the C/MLGOO.



During the re-orientation, the participants are updated with the BDCP processes as well as the documentary requirements to qualify for a drug-cleared status. Among the LGUs which have implemented the said re-orientation in 2020 are Corella, San Miguel, Loay, Antequera, Mabini, Loon, Cortes, Duero, Dagohoy, Bilar, President CPG, Alicia, Baclayon, and Anda. The team were also able to conduct the said activity to the Liga ng mga Barangay Bohol Chapter during one of their conferences.

Community-Based Rehabilitation Program Monitoring

DILG Bohol continues in monitoring the sustainability of the institutionalization of CBRP in the grassroots level. The chart below shows that all 1,109 barangays in the province have operationalized CBRP during the first and second quarter monitoring. However, during the 3rd quarter monitoring,



report shows that only 914 or 82.4% of the the barangays in province have existing CBRP. This is due to the COVID-19 pandemic which the caused its suspension of implementation and not barangays have resumed by the third quarter.

Monitoring of BADAC Monthly Meetings

DILG - Bohol continues to monitor the functionality of the 1,109 BADACs in the province. However, at the height of the community quarantine, the monitoring of BADAC meetings was deferred to provide ample time to focus on COVID-19 measures. By the third quarter of 2020, only 901 or 81.24% of the BADACs were able to resume the conduct of monthly meetings. All BADACs, through the C/MLGOOs are encouraged to remain functional and performing their duties and responsibilities in managing the effects of illegal drugs.

PROJECT IMPLEMENTATION STATUS OF DILG LOCALLY FUNDED PROJECTS

True to our commitment to capacitate and nurture local government units for the benefit of the Filipino citizenry, our department pushed for projects which seek to equitably assist all LGUs in the delivery of basic services by providing financial subsidy to the LGUs for the implementation of their priority programs and projects.

1. SALINTUBIG


Sagana at Ligtas na Tubig (SALINTUBIG) sa Lahat Project is one of the substantial developments managed by DILG which is primarily intended for waterless municipalities and barangay nationwide. It is aimed to contribute to the attainment of the goal of providing potable water to the entire country and targets defined in the Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) for 2015 – 2030.

FY 2013 and 2015 SALINTUBIG PROJECTS

For 2013 and 2015, municipalities of Batuan, Bilar, Dagohoy, Inabanga and Calape with the project cost of Php 29.5M were 100% completed. A total of 7,201 household benefited the said projects.

FY 2016 SALINTUBIG PROJECTS

For 2016, ten (10) municipalities in the province of Bohol under the Salintubig Program of the Department, nine (9) municipalities were completed and the remaining one (1) is still ongoing. The one (1) LGU already submitted catch-up plan, and affidavit of undertaking for the time extension. DILG-Bohol Engineers, together with the concerned MLGOOs, conducted on-site visit and project monitoring activities.






BUB - PROVISION OF POTABLE WATER SUPPLY

Apart from the Salintubig (Sagana at Ligtas na Tubig) sa Lahat Program, the Department also manages the Pro- vision of Potable Water Supply Program with funding under the Bottom-Up Budgeting. MLGOOs of the province of Bohol with BUB water projects in FY 2014, 2015 and 2016 conducted monitoring and on-site validations together with the Municipal WATSAN Team and Regional and Provincial Project Development Management Units. MLGOOs of this province likewise played a vital role in the submission of required documents for the releases of the first tranche, its liquidation, the release of second tranche and the liquidation of completed projects.

Being part of the monitoring of projects, weekly and bi-monthly monitoring reports were also submitted by concerned Cluster LGOOs. For completed projects of more than a year, a Rapid Subproject Sustainability Assessment was conducted by the MLGOOs in their respective areas of responsibility, which was submitted to Central Office.


FY 2014

To date, out of the total 65 sub-projects in FY 2014 from the 30 beneficiaries' municipalities under Bottom-Up Budgeting (BUB) of the Department, 64 sub-project or 98.5% were already completed, while still 1.5% are near completion.



FY 2015

Forty-two (42) LGUs in the province of Bohol including Tagbilaran City were prioritized in the provision of potable water supply projects under the Bottom-Up Budgeting (BUB) program of the Department. Of these municipalities and city, a total of 86 sub-projects were implemented which means that there are more than one water subprojects in some LGUs. This is so because there are still households in some barangays that do not have access to potable water supply. Out 86 subprojects, 98.83% are already completed and 1.17% are near completion.



FY 2017 LOCAL GOVERNMENT SUPPORT FUND-ASSISTANCE TO DISADVANTAGED MUNICIPALITIES (LGSF-ADM)

DILG and DBM on a Joint Memorandum Circular issued the JMC No 2017-3 dated May 23, 2017 providing the Policy Guidelines and Procedures in the Implementation of the FY 2017 Local Government Support Fund-Assistance to Disadvantaged Municipalities (LGSF-ADM). The program covers the provision of a water supply system, local access roads, evacuation facilities and small water impounding projects (SWIP). The 47 municipalities in Bohol were the recipients of the said project.

Of the 199 ADM projects, 190 projects or 95.48% were completed, 7 projects (3.52%) are ongoing. The two Small Water Impounding Projects in Barangays Las Salinas Norte and Tangcasan Sur, all in Loay, Bohol were not feasible projects per validation report from DA-BWWM R7. The LGU returned the funds to the Bureau of Treasury.

FY 2018 LOCAL GOVERNMENT SUPPORT FUND-ASSISTANCE TO MUNICIPALITIES (LGSF-AM)



The 47 municipalities of the province are part of the total 1,373 municipalities that are covered by the FY 2018 Local Government Support Fund-Assistance to Municipalities (LGSF-AM) Program. The projects funded under this program were culled out from the Local Development Investment Plans (LDIPs) of municipalities. The program covers the following eligible projects:

A total of 138 AM projects were funded in the province of Bohol.

After almost three years of implementation, 127 projects or 92.09% were already completed while the 6 (4.34%) projects are ongoing. These 6 LGUs submitted Notarized Affidavit of Undertaking with commitment to complete the projects not later than December 31, 2020, otherwise, the funds will be returned to the Bureau of Treasury (BTr). Four (4) or 2.90% projects with unutilized funds were already reverted to BTr. A local access road project in the municipality of Baclayon was not implemented due to double funding. The LGU already returned the funds to the Bureau of Treasury in pursuant to DILG MC No. 2018-61.

FY 2019 LOCAL GOVERNMENT SUPPORT FUND-ASSISTANCE TO MUNICIPALITIES (LGSF-AM)

DILG issued Memorandum Circular No 2019-71 dated May 20, 2019 for the Policy Guidelines and Procedures in the Implementation of the FY 2019 LGSF-AM Program. This program covers 1,373 municipalities. Almost similar with the provisions of the LGSF-AM 2018 Policy guidelines, LGSF-AM program will fund projects culled out from the LDIPs of the municipalities and shall be limited to:

- Local Access Roads, to include drainage system along existing roads, that are compliant with DPWH standards.
- Local Bridges
- Potable Water System projects
- Evacuation Center and Disaster Risk Reduction-related equipment
- Small Water Impounding Projects
- Rain Water Catchment Facilities
- Sanitation and Health Facilities
- Municipal Drug Rehabilitation Facility

The province of Bohol has 46 municipalities as beneficiaries of the program. These are the municipalities who passed both the governance and technical requirements. There are 82 FY 2019 LGSF-AM projects implemented in the province of Bohol. Out of the total, 53 or 64.63% are completed, 26.83% or 22 projects are ongoing, 4 or 4.88% projects are for NTP issuance, 3 projects or 3.66% are not yet started. Based on the guidelines, the projects should be completed by December 31, 2020, otherwise, the funds will be returned to the Bureau of Treasury. However, because of the COVID-19 pandemic, DILG and DBM has issued a Joint Memorandum No.5 dated October 30, 2020 wherein LGUs are given until December 31, 2021 to complete the projects provided that said funds are obligated, awarded and ongoing before December 31, 2020.

FY 2020 LOCAL GOVERNMENT SUPPORT FUND-ASSISTANCE TO MUNICIPALITIES (LGSF-AM)

DILG issued memorandum Circular No. 2020-088 dated May 21, 2020 regarding the Policy Guidelines and Procedures in the Implementation of the FY 2020 LGSF-AM program. The FY 2020 LGSF-AM covers 1,372 MLGUs with an allocation of 11.714 billion. For the province of Bohol, 46 MLGUs are eligible for the program funds, however, the municipality of Baclayon was not endorsed to the Department of Budget and Management due to its failure to comply the documentary requirements on the release of funds which was due on October 30, 2020 as stated in the policy guidelines. Presently, some of the LGUs already received the Notice of Authority to Debit Account Issued (NADAI) while others are awaiting the issuance of NADAI from the Bureau of Treasury (BTr).

Project Monitoring and Inspection

In an effort to continuously monitor the progress on the implementation of the locally funded projects, the DILG Regional and Provincial Inspection teams regularly conduct monitoring and inspection of BUB, ADM, AM and CMGP Projects in the province.

One of the strategies initiated to ensure that the requests of inspections and punch listing from the LGUs are properly addressed, the 3 PDMU engineers were given specific area of assignments wherein they are responsible on the conduct of the inspection, punch listing and preparation of corresponding reports. They are also tasked to conduct review on the DED and Program of Works for the proposed projects.



STRENGTHENING LOCAL COUNCIL FOR THE PROTECTION COUNCIL (LPC)

STRENGTHENING LOCAL COUNCILS FOR THE PROTECTIONOFCHILDREN

As mandated by law to oversee the organization and functionality of the Local Council for the Protection of Children (LCPC), DILG-Bohol enjoins Local Chief Executives (LCEs) to organize and make functional the LCPCs, which shall take the lead in the integration and implementation of all children's programs in their respective localities.

The Local Social Welfare and Development Officers were re-oriented on the guidelines based on DILG MC No. 2008-126 on March 13, 2020 at Panda Tea House, Tagbilaran City.



Using the revised guidelines pursuant to DILG MC No. 2008-126, Bohol field officers monitoring results show that majority of the LCPCs are functional with Mature and Ideal levels of functionality. The proportion of functional LCPCs to the total number of evaluated/monitored LCPCs is much higher.

Evidently, statistics confirm that Bohol LGUs recognized the vital role of the LCPCs in promoting and safeguarding the rights of children as emphasized in various DILG



Memorandum Circulars. In CY 2020, the LCPC Inter-Agency Management Task Force (IMTF) conducted the Table Assessment for the LCPC Functionality on March 9-20, 2020. The results are as follows: 21 LGUs with Ideal Functionality, 13 Mature, 6 Progressive, and 8 Basic.

Functional LCPCs are those that meet regularly and have minutes of meetings, have an action plan, approved budget, and submit an annual report on children.

Orientation on Local Councils for the Protection of Children Functionality

The Seal of Child Friendly Local Governance is complemented by the Department of the Interior and Local Government Memorandum Circular (DILG MC) 2014-80 issued on July 7, 2014 endorsing the Child Friendly Local Governance Audit (CFLGA) to all Provincial Governors, City and Municipal Mayors, the ARMM Regional Governor, DILG Regional Directors, and other concerned parties. Likewise, the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) and the Department of Education (DepEd) issued Administrative Order No. 03 s. of 2014 and Memorandum No. 97 s. of 014, respectively, for the designation of representatives to the Child Friendly Local Governance Audit Team otherwise called the Interagency Monitoring Task Force (IMTF).

The indicators for the audit have been upscaled to better measure the child-friendliness of an LGU in terms of Survival, Protection, Development, Participation, and Governance.

For CY 2020, the audit was suspended in consideration with the ongoing pandemic, but capacity building activities continue to be conducted online.

On October 15, 2020, members of the Bohol LCPC Inter-Agency Management Task Force attended the Seal of Child-Friendly and Local Governance Knowledge Management System (SCFLG KMS). With this system, data collected from the CFLGA data-capture forms will be encoded and scores are automatically generated.

On October 21, 2020, the Local Government Academy hosted the webinar entitled "Bata, Pamilya at Eskwela - Strengthening Local Government Support to Ensure the Right to Education of Children with Dysfunctional Families", participated by members of the respective LCPCs at all levels.


The National Children's Month's virtual kick-off was also well-attended by local officials and functionaries on November 4, 2020, which was also streamed live on the LCPCng Gumagalaw Facebook Page. Speakers discussed how they managed to protect and promote children's rights during the pandemic.

INSTITUTIONALIZING GENDER RESPONSIVE LOCAL GOVERNANCE

Monitoring of LGU Compliance to Magna Carta of Women

The Philippine Framework Plan for Women describes gender-responsive governance as one that enhances the abilities of women and men to contribute to and benefit from development. Towards this end, legislations are crafted and passed to make governance gender responsive. One of the legislative measures passed is the Magna Car- ta of Women (MCW) or Republic Act 9710 which mandates non-discriminatory and pro-gender equality and equity measures to enable women's participation in the formulation, implementation, and evaluation of policies, plans, and programs for national, regional, and local development.

In order to localize the Magna Carta of Women, PCW-DILG-DBM-NEDA Joint Memorandum Circular 2013-01 was issued in 2013 and was amended through JMC 2016-1. The DILG is tasked to evaluate and monitor the LGU's compliance to the different institutional mechanisms to localize the Magna Carta of Women as follows:



- Formulation and implementation of LGU GAD Plan and Budget and GAD Accomplishment Report
- Enactment of the GAD Code
- Creation/re-organization and functionality of GAD Focal Point System (GFPS) or similar GAD mechanisms
- Establishment of the LGU GAD Database
- Functionality of VAWC Office/Desk
- Mainstreaming gender perspectives in the PDPFP/CLUP /CDP
- · Capacity Building of officials and employees on GAD

Based on the monitoring conducted, all the LGUs have organized and have functional GFPS, have GAD database and have GAD Monitoring and evaluation mechanism. While out of the 49 LGUs including the provincial government, 42 have GAD Codes and 29 have GAD Plan and Budget and GAD Accomplishment Report which were already endorsed by the DILG. At present, 44 had submitted their

GAD documents, but only 29 were endorsed. Others had submitted their documents manually, before the GAD-PBMS was operational.

On the other hand, the GAD Plan and Budget Monitoring System (GAD-PBMS) was introduced this year. The GAD-PBMS is an automated system that is used to address the common diversity of reviewing, commenting and endorsing the GAD Plan and Budget as well as the GAD Accomplishment Reports in the LGU by automating. It is developed by the DILG for purposes of providing ease in reporting requirements.

DILG MC 2020-105 directed all LGUs except the barangays to adopt the GAD-PBMS. LGUs are directed specifically to encode their GAD Plan and Budget (GPB) and GAD Accomplishment Report (GAD-AR) in the system and corresponding review by the Planning and Development Office (PPDO) and the DILG as well as the endorsement will also be made in the system. Formal encoding by the designated LGU encoder began this year for the 2021 GAD Plan and Budget, following the prescribed timelines under PCW-DILG-DBM-NEDA JMC 2013-01 as amended by JMC 2016-01.

In order to capacitate the LGU functionaries, specifically the GFPS TWG Chairperson/GAD Focal Person and the LGU Encoders, DILG Bohol spearheaded a virtual Orientation on GAD-PBMS. It was held in two batches on September 16 & 17, 2020. During the Orientation, DILG Bohol's GAD focal person, Ma. Reina Abellana-Quilas oriented the LGU functionaries on the GAD-PBMS and demonstrated how to encode the GAD documents at the system. During the Orientation, LGU encoders of Tagbilaran City, Albuquerque and Loon also shared their experience and the concerns they encountered in encoding their GAD documents. The virtual activity was graced by Regional Focal Person James Andrew Andaya and D'One Cluster Head, Mardonio T. Roxas. Providing assistance in the conduct of the activity to FP Quilas were alternate GAD Focal Person Rachel Torremocha and Information Officer Lindsey Marie Vismanos.





On the other hand, Focal Person Quilas also oriented the reviewers at the Bohol Provincial Planning and Development Office on the GAD-PBMS. The reviewers are headed by Ms. Stella Case π as. They were oriented on how to log in to the system, access the GAD documents for their first level review and endorse said document to DILG Bohol Provincial Office.

Through the virtual Orientation and face to face orientation conducted, encoding of LGUs of the GAD documents as well as review of the Provincial Planning and Development were successfully conducted.

As for the barangays, manual process will be adopted following PCW-DILG-DBM-NEDA JMC 2013-01 as amend- ed by JMC 2016-01. Also, in line with the DILG's task to provide technical assistance to the local government units on GAD, C/ MLGOOs attended and provided technical assistance to different capacity building activities of the Local Government Units. Focal Person Quilas acted as resource person to the GAD Planning and Budgeting Workshop of the Municipality of Tubigon on February 27, 2020 and Sikatuna on March 9, 2020.

Gender Responsive Interventions to COVID 19

On July 15, 2020, a Joint Memorandum Circular was issued jointly by the Commission on Human Rights (CHR) and the DILG entitled Ensuring Gender-Responsive Interventions to COVID 19 and the New

Normal Including Ensuring Prompt, Effective and Survivor-Centered Response to all Forms of Gender-Based Violence.

The Joint Circular was issued for the purpose of protecting women and girls who are disproportionately affect- ed during the pandemic especially that some are facing multiple forms of inequalities due to disability, sexual orientation, gender identity, age, and ethnic minority. This is compounded by the health crisis. Aside from that, the pressure to respond to COVID 19 of the LGUs may disrupt care and support for gender-based violence survivors and referral networks and access to justice in cases of GBV may be disrupted. During ECQ, women and men's experiences and needs vary because of their different physical, cultural, security and sanitary needs. It is important that government's responses and interventions recognize this gendered nature of the COVID 19 crisis and to craft gender-responsive and intersectional response. The JMC aims to make concrete directives and recommendations towards gender-responsive and intersectional interventions during the COVID 19 crisis, during transition and even to ensure that women and girl's concerns and the concerns of members of the LGBTQI+communities are responded to during the COVID 19 crisis, during transition and recovery local government units are directed to:

Gendered and Intersectional Response to COVID-19 Crisis

- 1. Ensure participation in the design, planning, and implementation of crisis interventions, transitions and recovery plans
- 2. Render visible the needs of women and girls, of LGBTQ1+ persons and other vulnerable and marginalized groups and thus design and implement interventions with these needs and multiple intersecting vulnerabilities in mind
- 3. Ensure that women's and girl's specific health needs are addressed at the community level, during containment measures, during transition and recovery
 - 4. Ensuring prompt, effective and survivor-centered response to gender-based violence

Gendered and Intersectional Response during Transition and Recovery

Paying attention and addressing specific vulnerabilities to ensure protection and full enjoyment of rights and specific interventions for women facing multiple and intersecting vulnerabilities such as: Women with Disabilities; Girl Children; Elderly Women; Women Deprived of Liberty; Children in Conflict with the Law; Members of the LGBTQI+ Community; Urban Poor women; Women in the formal and informal economy; Women PUIs, PUMs and COVID positive; Moro and Muslim women; Rural and indigenous women; Internally displaced women; Migrant women; Persons living with HIV; Women frontline workers; Women human rights defender; Single mothers and Teenage mothers.

VAW Desk

Another task of the DILG is to ensure LGU compliance on the Establishment of a Violence Against Women (VAW) Desk in every barangay pursuant to DILG-DSWD-DEPED-DOH-PCW Joint MC No. 2010-2 dated December 9, 2010. The DILG is also mandated to facilitate the functionality of the VAW Desk. Its functionality shall be assessed in the following areas: Establishment, Resources, Policies, Plan and Budget and Accomplishment.

For this year's functionality assessment, the reference year is 2019. However, per DILG Advisory dated August 17, 2020 this year's assessment was deferred. This is to give way for the barangays' to efficiently and effectively implement the minimum public health standards to prevent and mitigate the impact of, provide prompt and timely response to, and recover from the COVID 19 pandemic.

In April, an Advisory was sent to the LGUs for the functionality of the VAW Desk along with the Barangay Council for the Protection of Children (BCPC). These local mechanisms perform crucial roles and

functions in addressing possible cases of abused among women and children. All Barangay VAW Desk and BCPC were reminded to ensure the availability of their services to make them more responsive to the needs of women and children. In particular, said structures will undertake measures to prevent the incidence of violence against women and violence against children; provide immediate assistance to victim-survivors and render appropriate support during Community Quarantine.

Following the Advisory on the activation of the VAW Desk and BCPC, the barangays were made to report the incidence of Violence Against Women (VAW) and the Violence Against Children (VAC). VAC & VAW form 1 were accomplished and submitted by the Barangay Secretaries to the C/MLGOOs. Then, these were consolidated by the latter and reflected in VAW & VAC form 2. C/MLGOOs then submit these forms which were also consolidated by the Provincial Focal Person, Ma. Reina Quilas. She submitted VAC & VAW Form 3 to the DILG Regional Office which contained data of all the 1,109 barangays.

Below is a Table showing the VAW incidence from March to October 2020. Based on the said table, the highest number of VAW cases are physical in nature followed by psychological. Sexual has the least number of cases. For the action taken, referred to PNP has the highest number while the least is referred to court.

Local AIDS Council LGU Monitoring

The DILG Bohol continues to monitor all 48 city and municipalities' organization of their Local AIDS Council (LAC) as well as their implementation of programs and activities that mitigate the negative impacts of STI, HIV, and AIDs in their locality.

As of the third quarter of 2020 monitoring period, 46 LGUs have organized their LAC and 2 LGUs are for reorganization. Most LAC meetings are conducted together with the Local Health Board meeting and HIV/AIDS programs are incorporated in the health programs budget allocation of the LGUs.

The common programs and activities identified by LGUs for HIV and AIDS prevention and control include con- tinuous information dissemination and other advocacy programs, strengthening of the LAC, provision of modern family planning services, HIV testing, integration of HIV/AIDS prevention during the conduct of Mothers' Class, Integration of HIV/AIDS prevention during the 4Ps meeting of Parent Effectiveness Session, integration of HIV/AIDS prevention during marriage counselling, World AIDS Day Commemoration, referral and counselling, and other support programs and seminars.

STRENGTHENING THE MANAGEMENT COORDINATING COMMITTEES (MCCs)

The Management Coordinating Committee is composed of representatives from the Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG), Philippine National Police (PNP), Bureau of Fire Protection (BFP), Bureau of Jail Management and Penology (BJMP), and the National Police Commission (NAPOLCOM), which serves as a coordinating body for effective linkages and integration of policies and programs. After the reconstitution through an executive order last year, the established MCCs in the 48 local government units of the Province of Bohol continued to convene the council every month. The DILG Field Officers sit as chairperson in their respective MCCs, and the DILG Provincial Director sits as chairperson at the Provincial Management Coordinating Committee.

The committee is tasked to discuss matters affecting peace and security and public safety measures, and pursue activities that facilitate coordination and collaboration among and between the members in attaining its objectives.

In order to strengthen the committees, the C/MLGOOs are required to submit the Quarterly Functionality Report of the MCC. Minutes of the monthly MCC meetings are also monitored through its submission to the DILG Provincial Office.

This year's meetings provided an avenue for the members to present their organization's needs and address inter-agency concerns especially the measures placed against the Covid-19 pandemic





CRIME PREVENTION WEEK

Crime Prevention Week Celebration

The National Crime Prevention Week (NCPW) is celebrated every first week of September of every year to encourage implementation of activities that focus on prevention as an approach in combating criminality.

In the observance of the 26th National Crime Prevention Week (NCPW), DILG-Bohol participated in the Virtual Kickoff Ceremony on September 1, 2020.

CAPACITATING LGUS ON RESETTLEMENT GOVERNANCE (RG)

Provision of Assistance to the Relocated Informal Settler Families (ISFs) in Resettlement Communities in Response to the COVID-19 Emergency

As the government continues its fight against COVID-19, the poorest of poor remain to be the most badly hit and bear the brunt brought about by the pandemic. Consistent with the "Bayanihan to Heal as One Act", the Department, under MC 2020-090, has directed local government units (LGUs) to

provide financial and non-financial assistance to relocated Informal Settler Families (ISFs) in resettlement communities in response to the COVID-19 situation as a temporary support measure.

In Bohol, there are no LGU or national government programs that entailed the relocation of affected ISFs. Bohol maintains a report of zero recipient or LGUs that accepted relocatees from another LGU, and zero sending LGUs or LGUs that relocated ISFs to another LGU.

Nonetheless, all Bohol LGUs have provided non-financial assistance in the form of food packs and other sup-plies to both their permanent and temporary residents in order to cope with the COVID-19 crisis.

Business-Friendly and Competitive LGUs

IMPROVE LGU COMPETITIVENESS AND EASE OF DOING BUSINESS

Online Training on the Electronic Business Permits and Licensing System (eBPLS)

In reference to the Republic Act No. 11032 also known as the Ease of Doing Business and Efficient Service Deliv- ery Act of 2018 and as a partner agency in the computerization efforts of the local government units (LGUs) towards a Digital Philippines, DILG Bohol thru MLGOOs from target LGUs attended the Online Training on the Electronic Business Permits and Licensing System (eBPLS). LGUs of Corella and Sevilla were part of the 1st online training conducted last September 14-18, 2020 while LGUs of San Miguel and Sikatuna were trained last October 19-23, 2020. The activity which was conducted by the Department of Information and Communications Technology (DICT) aimed to capacitate the LGUs in the adoption and implementation of the eBPLS software.





INNOVATION

BOSS Webinar Series

In aid to the continued promotion of building business-friendly LGUs and in light to the current situation brought by the pandemic, the Bohol Investment Promotion Center (BIPC) of the Provincial Government of Bohol initiated the conduct of Ease of Doing Business Webinar Series for Business Permit and Licensing Officers (BPLOs) and Local Economic and Investment Promotions Officers (LEIPOs). As one of the partner agencies, DILG Bohol participated in the webinar series which provided platform for partner agencies to orient BPLOs and LEIPOs on their services.

Bohol Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSME) Development Council

The COVD-19 pandemic and the imposed restrictions to curb its spread has negatively impacted businesses. The unprecedented disruption of commerce brought by the pandemic resulted to lower revenues of Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs). To address the disrupted cashflow and continuing expenses, businesses are forced to adjust their operations while



others are compelled to close, and consequently resulted to a number of displaced workers. In response to the current situation, Bohol MSME Development Council convened last July 2, 2020 at the CPG Hall of the Provincial Capitol Building. DILG Bohol, a member-agency of the council, was represented by LGOO II Jed B. Ighot in the meeting. The objective of the meeting was to harmonize national government agency programs and come up with action plans to support "We Survive as One Bohol" program of the Provincial Government of Bohol.

Atty. John Titus Vistal of Provincial Planning and Development Office presented the program which covers relief assistance package, economic stimulus packages to help jumpstart the local economy and infrastructure program. The program also aimed to adopt convergence of resources program in reviving the economy of Bohol, to provide eco- nomic amelioration support to sectors affected by the COVID-19 pandemic, to encourage linkage with private sector and people's organizations in rendering livelihood and other assistance to affected Boholanos and to rebuild consumer and business confidence and eventually resume a new normal of state of economic activity.

A weekly virtual meeting was conducted thereafter which tackled issues and concerns from business sectors. Updates which would help accelerate the recovery of the MSME sector were also provided by member-agencies. The council's focus includes the identification of tourism sites for reopening, establishment of an agro-industrial zone in Bohol and identification and evaluation of proposed projects for development and products for promotion.

CMGP



The CMGP is the successor of the KALSADA Program which was initiated in FY 2016 following the successful completion of the Australian Aids Provincial Road Management Facility (PRMF). Conditional Matching Grant to Provinces (CMGP) for Road and Bridge Repair, Rehabilitation, and Improvement, a partnership program between the Department of the Interior and Local Government and the Department of Budget and Management, is a governance reform program that supports Provinces in the

sustainable development and management of local roads, and improvement of national-local road connectivity across the country.

CMGP aims to address the poor state of local roads as a result of more than two decades of underinvestment since the devolution of the responsibility for local road management to Local Government Units (LGUs) without appropriate transfer of capacities and resources to take care of its local road network.

The program not only aims to augment funds for provincial road works, but more so to strengthen local capacities in Local Road Management and Public Financial Management for the sustainable development and maintenance of local roads and continually contribute to socio-economic progress. The program aims to achieve reforms in the following key reform areas:

Local Road Management

- a. Local Road Information Management
- b. Local Road Network Development Planning
- c. Local Road Construction and Maintenance
- d. Local Road Asset Management

Public Financial Management

- e. Internal Audit
- f. Budgeting, Revenue Generation and Expenditure Management
- g. Procurement

Monitoring and Inspection of CMGP Projects

DILG conducts regular Quality Assurance Monitoring and inspection to all CMGP ongoing projects. This activity was participated by the representatives of the Provincial Engineering Office headed by Provincial



Engineer Camilo Gasatan, DILG-CMGP Engineer Ruel D. Go and DMO II Geralyn Janette Corona. This is to ensure that projects are implemented in consonance with the CMGP guidelines and the approved Program of Works (POW) and Detailed Engineering Design (DED). Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, project



inspection and monitoring was suspended from May to July 2020. It resumed on August 2020 with strict observance of health protocols and social distancing measures under the new normal.

CAPACITY DEVELOPMENT ACTIVITIES

Through the DILG-DBM Joint Memorandum Circular 2017-2, the Provincial Local Government Units are tasked to prepare the Provincial Governance Reform Roadmap (PGRR) to achieve the set reform targets. The PGRR is a five-year governance reform plan of the PLGUs in seven key reform areas on Local Road Management (LRM) and Public Financial Management (PFM) consisting of annual targets and strategies required for the province to achieve the "target situation" by 2022. It is focused on building the capacities of provincial LGUs by promoting economic growth and improving community access to provincial and private services.

In line with the prioritized capacity development activities in the PGRR, DILG-Bohol in coordination with the Provincial Government of Bohol has provided technical assistance and conducted the following activities:

I. Local Road Management Performance Assessment (LRMPA) Validation

The Local Road Management Performance Assessment is a governance reform monitoring scheme for the Conditional Matching Grant to Provinces for Road Repair, Rehabilitation and Improvement. The performance on the achievement of Governance Reform will be the basis for CY 2020 Allocation Criteria under the Performance Indicators alongside Absorptive Capacity and Performance on Compliance with Fund release requirements of the PLGUs.

The LRMPA is an activity in coordination with the Road Sector Committee of the Provincial Local Government Unit of Bohol and the DILG CMGP Provincial and Regional focal to assess and validate the 2018-2019 Governance Reform Deliverables which was conducted on March 9-11, 2020 using the Monitoring Matrix provided by the Regional Focal Miss Bernadette Forones-Camilo.

The first activity prior to the LRMPA Validation was the Inception meeting which was conducted at JJ's Seafoods Village on March 6, 2020. The process of the assessment validation was discussed and facilitated by Bernadette F. Camilo-Regional Governance Focal and were attended by Atty. John Titus Vistal-PPDO Coordinator, Geralyn Janette Corona- DMO II, Ruel D. Go- Provincial CMGP Engineer, Eustaquio Socorin-

Provincial Treasurer, May Limbaga-Provincial Internal Auditor, Josette Celocia-Provincial Accountant, Paul Rabuya and Evelyn C. Ayuban- Asst. Provincial Engineer.

The actual LRMPA validation was conducted on March 9-11, 2020. The different departments involved in the LRM activities, however, were being evaluated accordingly. Based on the LRM targets and deliverables, documents were thereby presented as a proof of their accomplishments. There were some positive and negative issues that were found out though they are not severely affecting the performance of the Province of Bohol. On the other hand, site validations of 4 selected Provincial LGU's implemented projects were simultaneously inspected. These



were facilitated by Engr. Ruel Go and the Provincial Engineering Office (PEO) Engineers. Likewise, Regional Governance Focal Bernadette Camilo and DMO II Geralyn Janette Corona also conducted the assessment and validation of the provincial government's governance performance aspect at the offices of the Provincial Internal Audit Office (PIAO) and the Provincial Budget and Management Office and Provincial Procurement Management Unit (PPMU). On the second day, the assessment was with the Provincial Accountant Office (PACCO), and PEO together with the Provincial Focal for CMGP, LGOO II Adelene Ibarra.







On the 3rd day, the result of the validated LRMPA was presented to the members of the Local Road Management Team held at PPDO Conference Hall. It was then observed that there was a significant increase of the score of the Provincial Government for CY 2019 compared to the performance on CY 2018.

Ms. Bernadette Forones-Camilo, DMO II Geralyn Janette Corona and LGOO II Adelene G. Ibarra were the validators for the 2018- 2019 LRMPA.

II. Training – workshop on Overview of Local Road Asset Management (LRAM) and Road Asset Booking

DILG Bohol spearheaded the conduct of a virtual training-work-shop on the overview of local road asset management (LRAM) and road asset booking on July 29 and August 6, 2020. The activity was fa-cilitated by Mr. Michael Cañares of Step-up consultancy. The activity aimed to orient the participants on the basic principles underpinning local road asset management, improve the Provincial Government's current practices on road asset assessment and booking in the financial accounts as well as realize the importance of asset manage-ent principles and practices to properly manage local road assets.

The activity was participated by representatives from the office of Provincial General Services Office (PGSO) - 2, Provincial Engineer's Office (PEO) - 3, Provincial Treasurer's Office (PTO) - 3, Provincial Internal Audit Office (PIAO) - 2, Prov'l Assessors' Office (PASSO) - 3, Provincial Accountant's Office - 3 (PACCO) and 2 from DILG. The activity ran for one week with agreed intervals between sessions. With

most of the provinces in the country being under quarantine due to COVID 19 pandemic, this activity was the first virtual activity of DILG-Bohol under the CMGP program.

III. Roll-out on the Infrastructure Project Monitoring System (IPMS)

The 3-day virtual training for the roll-out of the infrastructure project management system (IPMS) was conducted on September 8-10, 2020 at the PEO Conference Hall. The IPMS is a system developed by the DILG through the Office of Project Development Services (OPDS)-Conditional Matching Grant to Provinces Project Management Office (CMGP PMO) in partnership with the UNDP ROAD2SDGs and the PointWest Technologies Inc. The IPMS is envisioned to help the Provincial Local Government



Units (PLGUs) to effectively and efficiently manage their infrastructure projects as it enables computerized progress monitoring, document management, and electronic workflow processing. The activity aimed to discuss how the IPMS will help in monitoring infra projects and introduce the components of the IPMS, its functions, and the roles of the users in the system.

The online conference was participated in by the contractors and project engineers from the following construction firm: Muaña construction, Labb construction, Herbert Malmis Gen. Merchandise and Contractor, Inc., YS construction, BNYU Development Corporation, NNYU Construction, AlChris Construction, as well as the engineers and technical staff of the PEO.

The resource speakers for the said virtual training were, Ms. Bernadette Forones Camilo, Regional Coordinator of the Conditional Matching Grant to Provinces (CMGP), and UNDP regional engineer Mr. Richel Daluz. They were assisted by Engineer Ruel Go of DILG Bohol, who is also the CMGP provincial engineer.

Local Road Network Development Plan (LRNDP) Updating

The LRNDP is an integrated 5-year development plan that sets the sustainable development framework and direction for local roads and identifies goals, objectives and strategies as basis for roads prioritization, funding and implementation. It provides the means of the LGUs to improve the local competitiveness through adequate and well-maintained roads infrastructure and better roads connectivity to ease movement of people and goods, and spur local economic development.

In 2017, the Department of the Interior and Local Government, in partnership with Asia Foundation through the Conditional Matching Grant to Provinces guided the LGUs in updating their Provincial Road Network Development Plan into Local Road Network Development Plan 2018-2022 to expound the identification of Provincial Core roads applying the Value Chain analysis and the digitized maps of the provincial, city, municipal and barangay roads as provided by NAMRIA.

Recently, the DILG issued Memorandum Circular No. 2020-119 dated September 7, 2020, providing the Guidelines on the Enhancement of the Local Roads Network Development Plan (LRNDP) for period covered 2021-2025. The enhanced LRNDP 2021-2025 shall adopt spatial planning for total connectivity between road networks and land uses including value chain analysis-ensuring roads are planned to include total lengthy of upgrading, rehabilitation, improvement and maintenance (including RBIS road markers, safety features, climate resilience and geotechnical stability), using GIS tools and be guided by the national standard design matrix of appropriate intervention works corresponding to different road conditions and traffic volumes.

Hence, to facilitate the enhancement of the LRNDP 2021-2025, ILG-Bohol provided assistance to the Provincial Local Government Unit in the updating of the plan through the conduct following activities:

1. Roll-out on LRNDP Updating

An online roll-out training on the LRNDP was conducted on August 10-14, 2020 and was facilitated by UNDP Consultant Engr. Evan Arias. The activity was participated by eleven (11) participants from the Provincial Government of Bohol, specifically the Provincial Planning and Development Coordinator (PPDC), GIS staff, Provincial Engineer (PE), Provincial Accountant, Head of the Bohol Environmental Management Office, Provincial Budget office, Provincial Treasurer, SP chair on the Infrastructure, CSO Representative, President of the Bohol As- sociation of Municipal Engineers, President of the League of Local Development Planning Coordinators. For DILG-Bohol, LGOO II Adelene G. Ibarra, DMO II Geralyn Janette Corona and Engr. Ruel D. Go participated in the activity.

The activity aimed to orient the participants with the SDG indicators related to the Local Road Network Development Plan and DRM-CCA and its significance to good governance. Generally, the activity emphasized the importance of connectivity of local road networks from the national level down to the barangay level to ensure facilitation of economic development in the province.

2. Pre-formulation meeting and Tasking for LRNDP updating

To ensure that all processes of enhancing and updating the LRNDP will be conducted as scheduled, a pre-formulation meeting and tasking was conducted on September 3, 2020 at the Provincial Engineering Office. The activity was attended by the Local Road Management Team (LRMT) of the Provincial Government of Bohol. DMO II Geralyn Janette Corona provided the secretariat services during the conduct of the activity. Likewise, the participants also agreed on the series of activities to be undertaken until the Enhanced LRNDP 2021-2025 will be completed.

3. Multi-stakeholders' Workshop

On September 15-17, 2020, a follow-through activity on the Updating of the LRNDP called "Multistakeholders' Workshop" was conducted at JJ's Seafood Village, Tagbilaran City. The activity was participated in by the Municipal Engineers and/or MPDCs of the 48 LGUs in the province including the

city. The activity aimed to consolidate the updated list of core inventory of municipalities in the province to be incorporated into the enhanced LRNDP. A workshop was conducted to generate road related issues and concerns. The 3-day activity was facilitated by Ms. Josefina Cemini and different topics relating to road management were presented by the heads of offices of the Provincial Government of Bohol including the







orientation of the new guidelines for the Updating of the LRNDP 2021-2025 as per MC No. 2020-119.

4. Consolidation of the updated list of Core roads from C/MLGUs

As an off-shoot to the Multi-stakeholders' Work- shop, a one-day consolidation on the updated list of core roads and emerging issues from the city and municipalities was conducted on October 13, 2020 at the Provincial Engineering Office. Out of the 47 municipalities, there were 41 municipalities who were able to submit to Mr. Leo Montejo and Engr. Rodrigo Arocha of the PPDO Infrastructure Section the inventory list of core roads. The consolidation was handled by the Local Road Management Team of the Provincial Engineers Office particularly the three Project Management Divisions. With due consideration to the conflict of schedules of the Technical Working Group for Updating the Enhanced LRNDP 2021-2025, there were changes of the schedules of the LRNDP Updating activities that were agreed upon which were as follows:

5. First Write-shop on the Drafting of LRNDP



The drafting of the Enhanced LRNDP 2021-2025 started the 1st Writeshop on October 28-29, 2020 at Casa Rey Francis, Tagbilaran City. There were 27 personnel



from the different departments who were members of the Local

Road Management and were tasked to work for the updating of the LRNDP. The writers were: PPDO—Mr. Robert Varquez, Mr. Leo Montejo and Engr. Rodrigo Arocha, PEO- Engr. Evelyn Ayuban, June Socorro Blanco, Juvie Castro, Engr. Richard Bompat and Deanna Marie Nabuya, PDRRMO-Tiarra Lourdes Bulilan, Dianna Polinar and Jose Requeron, BEMO-Liezel Fuentes, Carl Michael Bin and Jessel Polinar, HRMDO-Ma. Lourdes Requeron, PIAO- Ma. Fe Loma, PTO-Ma. Thelma Maisog, PACCO- Ma. Antonette Marilla, BTO-Joanne Pinat, OPA-Ramil Rodela, PBMO- Julius Elorde. Ms. Josefina T. Cemini as the facilitator, guided these writers as they come up with their presentation. DMO II Geralyn Janette Corona and LGOO II Jeanette Camilotes of DILG Bohol, provided the secretariat services throughout the activity.

Two scheduled activities will be conducted to complete the process of updating the LRDNP. A 2-day technical writing of the plan will be conducted on November 26-27, 2020 at JJs Seafood Village while the second write shop will be conducted in December.

Other Capacity Development Activities:

I. Overview on Local Road Management and Quality Assurance Standards

DILG-Bohol hosted the first activity of the Project Development and Management Unit (PDMU) for CY 2020. The activity entitled Overview on Local Road Management and Quality Assurance Standards was conducted on February 19-21, 2020 at Bohol Tropics Resort, Tagbilaran City. It was participated in by the members of the PDMU of the four (4) provinces in Region VII.



This 3-day activity aimed to orient, if not enhance the participants' basic understanding on road quality assurance standard. Engr. Richel Daluz and Bernadette Forones Camilo, United Nation Development Programme (UNDP) Engineer and CMGP Regional Coordinator were the resource persons of the entire activity.

One of the highlights of the activity was the conduct of the actual site visit of a CMGP road project at Anonang, Valencia, Bohol wherein participants were divided into three groups and were tasked to conduct quality assurance on the completed CMGP projects. Thereafter, each group were tasked to present the findings to Engr. Camilo Gasatan and Engr. Evelyn Ayuban of the Provincial Engineering Office.



Environment Protective, Disaster Resilient, and Climate Change Adaptive LGUs ENHANCING LGU CAPACITY ON DRR AND CCA

• State of LGU Disaster Preparedness

Republic Act No. 10121 or the Philippine Disaster Risk Reduction and Management (DRRM) Act of 2010, aims to uphold people's constitutional rights by addressing the root causes of vulnerabilities to disasters, strengthening the country's institutional mechanism for disaster risk reduction and management and building the resilience of local communities to disasters including climate change impacts.

It also aims to develop, promote and implement a comprehensive National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Plan (NDRRMP) that aims to strengthen the capacity of the National Government and LGUs, together with partner stakeholders, to build resilience of communities and to institutionalize arrangements and measures to reduce disaster risks, including projected climate risks and to enhance disaster preparedness and response capabilities at all levels.

Pursuant to Republic Act No. 10121 (DRRM Act of 2010), Republic Act No. 9729 (Climate Change Act of 2009) and DILG's Operation Listo through the LGU State of Preparedness Report which is submitted quarterly, LGUs conduct- ed an inventory of their foundational administrative requirements. This is to assess and address the performance gaps, link gaps to policy or program interventions, and monitor improvements on disaster preparedness.

• Local Climate Change Action Plan (LCCAP)

As a political unit, LGUS are mandated to exercise their inherent powers such as police power, as well as share with the National Government the responsibility in the management and maintenance of ecological balance in their respective territorial jurisdiction. Being a corporate body, every LGU is mandated to promote the general welfare among the inhabitants within its territorial jurisdiction through planning as an integral part of governance and rationalizing local planning to enhance each LGU's capability.



DILG MC No. 2014-135 provides for the guidelines on the Formulation of Local Climate Change Action Plan for all the LGUs, invoking Section 14 of RA No. 9729 (Climate Change Act of 2009), as amended by RA No. 10174. The issuance reiterates that the LGUs shall be the frontline agencies in the formulation, planning and implementation of Climate Change and National Climate Change Action Plan.



Consistent with the Department's mandate to capacitate the LGUs, DILG-Bohol through its DRR-CCA Focal Person, LGOO II Karen Ann B. Beniga conducted trainings on the formulation of LCCAP. In 2020, the following are the activities assisted by DILG-Bohol in relation to the formulation of LCCAP:

Policy Advocacy Conducted on the Organization of LDRRM Office, Utilization of LDRRM Fund and Other Policy Issuances

Sec. 12 of Republic Act 10121 or the Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Act provides for the establishment of a Local Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Office (LDRRMO) in every province, city and municipality which shall be responsible for setting the direction, development, implementation and coordination of disaster risk management programs within their territorial jurisdiction. The LDRRMO shall be under the office of the governor, city or municipal mayor and shall be composed of a DRRMO to be assisted by three (3) staff responsible for: (1) administration and training; (2) research and planning; and (3) operations and warning. To prescribe policies for the creation of the abovementioned office, JMC No. 2014-01 was issued laying down the guidelines specifically for the institutionalization of the four statutory DRRM positions in every province, city, and municipality.

Being one of the priority programs of the department, all the 49 LGUs, to include the Province of Bohol, were conducted with advocacy activities and provided with technical assistance for them to substantially comply with the requirements of the law and the department issuance since 2011 up to the present. Table 38 below shows that thirty-nine (39) LGUs, to include the Province of Bohol, have a regular DRRMO.

Section 21 of RA 10121 also provides for the *Local Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Fund (LDRRMF) which* shall not be less than five percent (5%) of the estimated revenue from regular sources to support disaster risk management activities. Other provisions on LDRRMF were stipulated for the guidance of the LGUs. MLGOOs continue to advocate for the proper utilization of the LDRRMF especially on the use of the 70% of the 5% LDRRMF for preparedness, prevention and mitigation, and rehabilitation. On the other hand, MLGOOs also disseminated department issuances on DRRM.

• DILG 7 DRRM/CCA Focal Persons Meeting

DRRM-CCA is one of the components of the Outcome Area: Environment Protective, Disaster Resilient and Climate Change Adaptive LGUs, of the DILG's Operational and Intervention Framework and is comprised of major pro- rams. This outcome area requires the whole presence of key people to whom

the program operations are entrusted with, that to some extent demands real-time outputs and actions as our DRRM works pervade disaster operations and emergencies.

In 2020, to ensure the accomplishment of the DRRM-CCA deliverables, aside from the disaster monitoring works, quarterly DRRM-CCA Focal Persons Meeting has been attended by the DRRM Provincial Focal Person. Most of these meetings were conducted virtually due to COVID-19 pandemic. The meeting serves as a venue for leveling off of deliverables, threshing out of issues and concerns in the implementation of PPAs, and coaching among the focal persons.

PDRRMC MEETINGS

As member of the council, the DILG has always been a strong partner of the Provincial Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council (PDRRMC), not just in meetings but also in information dissemination, capacity building, and other activities for the strengthening of LDRRMCs and the Bohol Association of Local Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Officers (BALDRRMO).

In 2020, DILG-Bohol, represented by the DRRM Provincial Focal Person, has attended all PDRRMC quarterly meetings. Most of these meetings were conducted virtually due to COVID-19 pandemic. Aside from the quarterly meetings, the PDRRMC also convenes whenever there is a threat of disasters, may it be caused by a natural or a man- made hazard.

SUPPORT TO ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AND DISASTER RESILIENCY (SEPDR)

Anti-Illegal Logging Task Force

DILG Bohol, as a member of the Anti-Illegal Logging Task Force (AILTF) of the Province of Bohol, fully supports its campaign against illegal logging. The Department is one with the AILTF's drive to protect the ecosystem and preserve biodiversity.

Along with other National Government Agencies and Bureaus, the Department is very well represented in the AILTF's programs and activities. Among these programs and activities is the conduct of



quarterly meetings to report the Task Force's accomplishments and discuss future plans and strategy to further strengthen the AILTF's advocacy.

SWM ACTIVITIES

• Provincial Ecological Solid Waste Management Monitoring and Evaluation

In compliance with the provisions of Republic Act 9003, otherwise known as the Ecological Solid Waste Management Act of 2000, the Provincial Government of Bohol has launched the Province-wide Search for Best Practices for Ecological Solid Waste Management in 2007. The search is a continuing activity of the Provincial Ecological Solid Waste Management Board and is due to be conducted this year 2020.

Last September 11, 2020, the Provincial Ecological Solid Waste Management Monitoring and Evaluation (PESWM M&E) Team convened at the BEMO Conference Hall of the Provincial Capitol Building. As a member-agency, DILG Bohol, through the representation of LGOO II Jed B. Ighot, attended the said meeting with the purpose of re- viewing and finalizing the criteria for the conduct of monitoring and evaluation of Ecological Solid Waste Management (ESWM) Implementation in the 48 LGUs of Bohol which commenced last October 20, 2020.

The provincial government-initiated field evaluation and monitoring covered the environmental organization and program implementation of ESWM Laws and Ordinances for the year 2018-2020.

Indicators that were looked into are Functional SWM Organization, 10-year ISWM Plan, Ordinance and Enforcement System, Cost Recovery System, Waste Diversion to Effective Management at Source and to Effectively Manage Collected Garbage, Efficiency of Waste Collection and Transport, and Waste Disposal Activities being implemented in the city/municipality related to the establishment of a RA 9003-compliant disposal site conforming technical guidelines. In support to help curb the spread of COVID-19 and to prevent further environmental degradation, LGU's compliance on the guidelines on the proper handling and management of COVID-19 related health care wastes were also checked.

BEACH TOURISM DESTINATIONS MONITORING

Pursuant to Section 3(i) of RA 7160, the DILG together with Local Government Units shall take part in the maintenance of ecological balance within their territorial jurisdiction. Through DILG memorandum Circular No. 2018- 173 signed by SILG Eduardo M. Año entitled "Monitoring of Compliance of Island Resorts and Beach Tourism Destinations", the Department of the Interior and Local Government was instructed by the President to continuously monitor the supervision of all other island resorts and beach tourism destinations to avoid a Boracay Island-like closure pursuant to Cabinet Action/Decision File No. 535-09118—15-16-17.

Panglao, Bohol was among the beach destinations enjoined with the planning, assessment and implementation of the DILG's rehabilitation program. A total of 574 establishments were inspected over the period of Nov 11 – Dec 16, 2019 covering the barangays of Bil- isan, Bolod, Danao, Doljo, Libaong, Looc, Lourdes, Poblacion, Tangnan and Tawala.

Below are the findings as of February 27, 2020.For the LGU Requirements such as Mayor's Permit, Barangay Clearance, Sanitary Permits, and Real Property Tax Receipts/ Contract of Lease, most establishments were issued by the said permits. As show in the graph out 574 establishments inspected, 526 have Mayor's Permit, 481 have Barangay Clearance, 503 have Sanitary Permit, and 428 have Real Property Tax Receipt/ Contract of Lease.








The inspection results also showed that majority of establishments have complied with the requirements of labor laws. Meanwhile, a number of establishments were for verification since they claimed that they have complied to such requirement but failed to show the documents. Not applicable status were those establishments which do not have any employees.

For compliance to Zoning Clearance, LGU Occupancy Permit and LGU Building Permit, establishments were not strictly required to comply until the year 2015. In terms of availability of STP, a large number





of establishments do not have above 50 rooms.


For BFP Fire Safety Evaluation Clearance and FSIC Occupancy Permit, most of the establishments were not required to comply such until a certain year when the BFP strictly

implements such Status on the compliance of

DENR-EMB Requirements such as ECC/CNC, Discharge Permit and Permit to Operate is subject to changes depending on the results of the DENR-EMB7 One Stop Shop activity on February 26-28, 2020 wherein such permits, new and pending application, are accommodated. In the 20-meter easement, only 49 violations were recorded. The remaining 492 are inland establishment, hence, not subjected to the 20-meter easement compliance.

For DOT accreditation, only primary establishments (facilities such as accommodations, travel and tours, among others which are directly related to tourism) were required to be accredited with the agency. The PCCSD on the other hand is a permit required to be complied by diving sites/establishments.

BOHOL EARTHQUAKE ASSISTANCE (BEA)

More than 7 years after the 7.2 magnitude earthquake hit Bohol, the rehabilitation of the damaged key infra-structures under the Bohol Earthquake Assistance (BEA) Program of our department is almost complete.

Out of 1,063 BEA projects, four (4) sub – projects are still on-going wherein two (2) of which are bridges, while the remaining two (2) are projects implemented in the municipalities. The delay in project implementation were caused by the various revisions of plan.





Strengthened Internal Organizational Capacity

Public Assistance and Complaints Desk (PACD) Established and Maintained

The Public Assistance and Complaints Desk (PACD) is located at the main entrance of the DILG Bohol Provincial Office to promptly attend to clients requesting assistance from any of the staff of the office. The PACD is manned by

SubayBAYAN

The Information System and Technology
Management System (ISTMS) of the
Department enhanced the old Program and
Project Monitoring System with the creation of

Project Monitoring System with the creation of the new Program and Projects Management System (PPMS), called the SubayBAYAN. The SubayBAYAN is the official portal of the Department in the monitoring, reporting and bringing to the public the progress of implementation of all Locally-Funded Projects (LFPs) administered by the Office of Project Development Services (OPDS). DILG-Bohol has conducted the updating on the status of SubayBAYAN system data uploading on March 13, 2020 at the DILG Bohol Provincial Office. The activity was participated by the field officers. LGOO II Diolito Iyog gave a short review on how to manipulate the system. He also presented the status of encoding of projects to the system. With the issuance of the supplemental gidelines for the



implementation of the SubayBAYAN, PD Jerome Gonzales issued a provincial order 2020-086 dated November 11, 2020 designating LGOO II Adelene G. Ibarra as focal person and LGOOs II Jeanette Camilotes and Diolito Iyog as alternate focal persons. Likewise, in an unnumbered memorandum issued by PD Gonzales, LGUs are encouraged to submit the DILG Provincial office the list of LGU encoders for monitoring purposes.


Online Calendar

This page is able to quickly and effectively provide citizens, may it be in the private or public sector, with information and news updates of the different programs, projects and services of the Department.



INSTITUTIONALIZATION OF HRM-RELATED ACTIVITIES / PROJECTS Provincial Personnel Selection Board

Pursuant to the Department Circular No. 2019-20 released on November 2019 and with the reshuffling of the Provincial Directors, the former Provincial Personnel Selection and Promotion Board (PPSPB) now referred as Provincial Human Resource Merit Selection and Promotion Board (PHRMSPB) was reorganized by virtue of Provincial Order 2020- 12 issued on January 29, 2020.

The PHRMSPB indorsed comparative assessments for the positions of LGOOs V, VI and VII in February, 2020 and for the positions of Administrative Assistant, LGOOs II, V and VI in August, 2020.

With the hiring of Contact Tracers (CTs), the PHRMSPB also conducted meetings to pass a resolution endorsing them.

Program on Awards and Incentives for Service Excellence (PRAISE)

PRAISE is a system designed by the Civil Service Commission to encourage innovativeness, efficiency, and productivity in the public service by recognizing and rewarding officials and employees for their superior accomplishments and other personal efforts which contribute to the efficiency, economy, or other improvement in government operations.

For this year, PRAISE is suspended due to COVID-19 pandemic.

International Organization for Standardization (ISO) Activities

Executive Order No. 605 dated February 23, 2007 mandates all government agencies to adopt the ISO 9001 Quality Management System (QMS). It is a government-wide quality management program which intend to strengthen and improve the internal systems and procedures of the organization. DILG Region VII was able to achieve the ISO Certification on the last year's (2019) audit, however, continued efforts on the implementation of ISO are still needed as it is subject for surveillance audit annually in order to check improvement.



The DILG VII Regional Office Internal Quality Audit (IQA) Team is set to conduct internal quality audit on November 2020. LGOO VI Mona Lissa T. Hinog conducted internal quality audit in the in the DILG Bohol Provincial Office. She also gave initial orientation on the ISO 9001 Quality Management System to the new LGOO IIs.

Strategic Performance Management System (SPMS)

DILG-Bohol consistently implemented SPMS in accordance with the process as indicated in DILG Memorandum dated June 29, 2015. Office Performance Commitment and Review (OPCR) of DILG VII Regional Office were made as bases of the OPCR of the Provincial Director and which in turn were the bases of the Division Performance Commitment and Review (DPCR) of the Program Manager and

Cluster Heads. The Individual Performance Commitment and Review (IPCR) of the field officers were drafted and then presented during conferences on the months of January and July for comments, clarifications and queries and then finalized for them to prepare and submit to their respective cluster heads.

The recorded submission and compliance of the requirements and reports of the individual employees as pre- pared by the program coordinators are posted at the DILG-Bohol bulletin board for easy validation and the final rating are made as bases of ratings in the IPCRs especially for the field officers.

As one of the recipients of the DILG-LG Sector scholarship grants, LGOO VI Lady Lennoire P. Abad actively participated the said activity. It aimed at showcasing the Re-Entry Action Plan

/ Commitment Action Plan (REAP / CAP) and "best practices" of grantees and/ or completers to inspire others who are in the phase of accomplishing their REAP / CAP. Such activity also served as a venue for sharing of personal or professional experiences and accomplishments during their scholarship abroad and/ or locally.

Physical Fitness Activities

Pursuant to Civil Service Commission (CSC) issuance directing all government agencies to initiate physical fitness activities for all its officers and staff, DILG Regional Office VII issued a memorandum on the conduct of physical fitness activities. Said directive is also in line with the health lifestyle projects under GAD and personnel development. DILG — Bohol Province, on its part conducts zumba exercises at the conference hall every 1st Friday of the month at the afternoon. It is also applied as energizers in seminars, trainings and other similar events.

• Integrity Development Activities

DILG—Bohol Province recognizes the importance of continually strengthening the Integrity Circle through the conduct of activities that further improve the camaraderie and teamwork of its personnel which are indispensable ingredients in the effectiveness of the operations in the office.



Despite the pandemic, physical activities as unfreezers are still practiced even in online activities. For this year, Integrity Circle activities were suspended due to COVID-19 pandemic. Despite the situation, DILG – Bohol maintains its solid bond through online platforms such as creation of group chats and conduct of virtual activities.

Orientation of Newly-Hired Employees

Last March 16, 2020, three (3) newly hired LGOO IIs were deployed in the DILG Bohol Provincial Office. These are LGOO II Joyce Telmo, LGOO II Jun Arcy Pacleb and LGOO II Jed Ighot. LGOO VI Mona Lissa T.

Hinog, the former Program Manager and Chief of the Administrative Services, conducted an orientation to the new LGOOs II on the same date covering administrative matters and office policies.

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5S Program

The DILG-Bohol Provincial Office maintained its luster with the conduct of regular clean-up of office areas and regular arrangement or filing of office documents. With the provision

of steel cabinets to each program coordinators and to the administrative section, important files and supplies are safeguarded and kept intact. The 5S system is also adopted by the field officers and is regularly checked during supervisory visits by the Cluster Heads and PD Gonzales.

Financial and Administrative Management Enhancement Project

DILG-Bohol has an initial coordination with Government Procurement Policy Board (GPPB) last February 2020 for the conduct of a seminar on procurement, however, the schedule was not realized due to COVID-19 pandemic. All DILG-Bohol provincial personnel were tasked to prepare their respective Project Management Plan (PPMP) for 2020 to be consolidated by the BAC Secretariat in order to generate the 2020 Annual Procurement Plan.

Conduct of Regular Inventory of Equipment, Supplies, Machineries and other Properties of the Office

To ensure that machineries and other properties of the office are taken-cared of, semestral inventory of equipment is done by designated property custodian ADA VI Uldarick Ladores. Acknowledgement Receipt for Equipment (ARE) is signed by the concerned recipient employee while Inventory Custodian Slip (ICS) is accomplished by personnel who are assigned office gadgets and other properties. In the event that equipment, gadget or other properties become unserviceable, these are stored in the bodega after proper



recording. These unserviceable properties are disposed upon indorsement by the DILG VII Fiscal and Administrative Division and approval by the COA resident auditor.

Other properties like office supplies are likewise managed through monthly updated report of procurement and distribution of supplies handled by LGOO II Julie Mae P. Nombre. Distribution of supplies is based on the Project Procurement Management Plan or on request basis with corresponding recording of supplies balances. Report of procurement and distribution of supplies is prepared and submitted monthly to the DILG VII Regional Office.

Bids and Awards Committee (BAC)

As of November 24, 2020, DILG-Bohol BAC successfully facilitated nineteen (19) small value procurements particularly on the Lease of Venue and Food and has conducted sixteen (16) meetings to deliberate quotations/bids.



INNOVATION: Provincial Management Committee (ProManCom) Meeting

DILG-Bohol initiated and sustained the Provincial Management Committee Meeting or ProManCom as an opportune time to be updated as regards the programs of the department and to dis- cuss concerns of mutual interests among program coordinators. The agenda of the activity include reloading of assignments of the program coordinators, MP supplementation, presentation of indicative



OPB which is the basis for the formulation of the OPCR, preparation for upcoming activities of the department. PD Gonzales takes the lead in the discussion of deliverables and updates and manages consensual decisions on some vital concerns. Program Coordinators present updates of the different programs of the department and follow-up compliance of requirements and submission of required reports. The field officers, on the other hand, present issues and requests advice and clarifications especially on the implementation of major programs



Provincial Year-End Evaluation and Awarding Ceremonies

The provincial version of the DILG VII Year-End Evaluation and Awarding is the continued conduct of DILG-Bohol's conferment of awards and incentives for Best Performing Cluster Team and Field Officers. Awardees are given certificates and tokens in recognition of a job well done. This activity is done during the last field officers conference. But in consideration with the ongoing pandemic, this activity will be conducted online.

Field Officers (FOs) Conferences

Regular monitoring of the undertakings and accomplishments of field officers are made through the conduct of bi-monthly conferences usually held every mid and end of the month. To ensure complete attendance and participation of personnel to the bi-monthly conference, a memorandum dated January 13, 2020 was issued by PD Jerome G. Gonzales on the schedules of conferences for CY 2020. However, virtual platforms such as Google Meet and Zoom are utilized in the



conduct of conferences in consideration of the ongoing pandemic. There were also times wherein there were no meetings conducted due to the pandemic.

Cluster Meetings

Meetings of D'ONE and M&M Clusters are regularly conducted to present updates and follow-up compliance to office mandates from cluster members. Before the pandemic, Cluster Leaders Mardonio T. Roxas and Ma. Reina A. Quilas made it a point to con- duct out-of-town meetings to break the monotony, to conduct supervisory visits and as bonding moments among cluster members. Considering the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, cluster meetings are conducted using online platforms such as Google Meet and Zoom



Support to SILG / Central Office Operations

SILG's Visit to Bohol

Last July 31, 2020, SILG Eduardo M. Año together with Tourism Secretary Bernadette Romulo–Puyat visited the Province of Bohol to meet with the Provincial Government of Bohol officials and the 48 Mayors of the province. Discussed during the meeting were the present situation of Bohol amidst the COVID-19 pandemic, plans for local tourism and the possibility of reopening and resuming tourism activity in the province through the "UBE" or the Ultimate Bohol Experience. The "UBE" is a certification system that will award the "UBE Seal" to establishments that are compliant with the health and safety protocols allowing them to operate.

Apprenticeship Program for LGOOs II and III

Two LGOOs from Bohol, namely: Diolito A. Iyog and Julie Mae N. Paredes, join the ongoing Apprenticeship Program for LGOO IIs and IIIs. These apprentices compose the 53rd Batch of LGOOs. PD Jerome G. Gonzales served as one of the resource persons of Module 1 (Interpersonal Relations and Team Development). Currently, they are taking up Module 3 (Results-Based Project Development).



Capacity Development for Non-LGOO Personnel

Capacity development activities are provided to non-LGOO (Administrative and Fiscal) personnel in order to further enhance their skills and competencies. However, no competency-based training conducted for these personnel for this year due to COVID-19 pandemic.

DISIPLINA MUNA

Disiplina Muna Advocacy Campaign launched in Cities and Municipalities

One of the flagship programs of DILG is the Disiplina Muna Advocacy Campaign which aims to promote the culture of discipline among Filipinos.

It can be recalled that the first provincial launching (after Metro Manila) of the Disiplina Muna Advocacy Campaign was held in the Province of Bohol on December 5, 2019. On July 13, 2020, DILG Bohol participated in the launching of the campaign led by the PNP. DILG Bohol Provincial Director Jerome G. Gonzales was the guest of



honor in the activity. The campaign was likewise launched in the different cities and municipalities within the province. These were attended by our DILG field officers, who also signed the respective Disiplina Muna Pledge manifesting their full support to the objectives of the campaign

BIDA ang May Disiplina: Solusyon sa COVID-19 National Launching

The BIDA ang May Disiplina: Solusyon sa COVID-19 campaign by DILG and DOH was launched on August 14, 2020 with the main goal of encouraging people participation in the battle against COVID-19 by living a life of discipline and earnestly practicing the minimum health standards set by health authorities. The Department also encouraged all barangays to set up their own Disiplina Brigades to drive the core message of the campaign which is individual responsibility and discipline will stop the spread of COVID-19.

EMPLOYEE WELFARE

Support to Inter-Agency Commitment Activities

DILG Bohol actively partnered and supported programs, projects and activities of various provincial and national government agencies.

Support to Persons with Disabilities

After a number of advocacies and coordination made by this Office, Executive Order No. 05, Series of 2016 come to surface constituting the Provincial Accessibility Monitoring Team (PAMT), which shall hold quarterly meetings and discuss standards on accessibility of infrastructures and facilities for Persons with Disabilities (PWDs).





Bohol as a prime eco-cultural tourist destination must adhere to become a barrier-free environment for local and foreign tourists following the Universal Design. In 2018, the PAMT has started to conduct Access Audits in some municipal halls and public buildings using a monitoring checklist on the compliance to the minimum requirements of the Accessibility Law (BP 344).

Seeing the need to create a sub-monitoring team in the LGUs, the Provincial Government issued Executive Order No. 35, Series of 2016: Requiring Local Government Units to Issue a Memorandum to Create Municipal Accessibility Monitoring Team (MAMT) on the road to implementing barrier-free environment in the locality. Another noteworthy accomplishment of the PAMT is the review of a provincial ordinance adopting a barrier-free design and standards towards a barrier-free tourism environment for the benefit of the PWDs.

Support to Youth Involvement and Empowerment

With the onset of COVID-19, activities for youth involvement still continues. Adapting to the times, various activities are conducted online involving the youth. Sangguniang Kabataan officials are frequently invited to join the different Talakayan Series spearheaded by the Local Government Academy in partnership with the National Youth Commission. The Center for Federalism and Constitution Reform also conducted the Constitutional Reform National Youth Summit from September to November, which composed of various events and activities such as the CoRe Webinar, Essay – Poster Making – Short Film and Songwriting Contest, National Debate, and Tiktok Challenge

GENDER AND DEVELOPMENT

GAD-Related Activities

Cultural and Physical Fitness Program

A memorandum on the conduct of Physical Fitness / Sports Activities was issued on July 9, 2015 by the former Regional Director of DILG 7, RD Rene K. Burdeos. This is in line with the Physical Fitness Program (Health Lifestyle Project) under GAD activities and personnel development, and pursuant to CSC Memorandum Circular No. 8, series of 2011 which



directs all government agencies to initiate physical fitness and sports activities for all its officers and staff. This promotes the development of a healthy and alert workforce. Thus, DILG Bohol conducts zumba

exercises at the conference hall every 1st Friday of the month at 4:00 in the afternoon. It is also applied as an energizer in seminars, trainings and similar events

• Women's Month Celebration

In support to the 2020 National Women's Month Celebration, the women of DILG Bohol posed holding up advocacy materials in line with the global multigenerational campaign of UN women," Generation Equality: Realizing women's rights for equal future." With the theme "WE Make Change Work for Women", it highlights the empowerment of women as harbingers of change and enable them to participate in and benefit



from development efforts. The celebration shall also endeavor to bring together women and girl leaders from various generations towards a collective agenda of empowering all women and girls.

Conduct of Safety Drills / Exercises

DILG-Bohol caused the widest dissemination to all I o c a I government units in the province in the conduct of Earthquake Drills. DILG Bohol Personnel also joined in the conduct of the regular Simultaneous Earthquake Drill. This drill aims to raise awareness to the general public on what to do during the actual occurrence of an earthquake, to ensure the preparedness



of the community in the event of a major earthquake, and to take the contingency plans of the government agencies in times of disaster.

Moreover, DILG-Bohol also invited personnel from Bureau of Fire Protection (BFP) to discuss and demonstrate fire safety tips

Coastal Clean-Up Day

Sea, rivers and waterways trash are considered as pollution problem in the province of Bohol. Far more than an eyesore, a rising tide of marine debris may threaten human health, marine life, and the tourism industry province-wide. Bohol seas and waterways have faced so many challenges, and trash should not be one of them as trash in this part of Bohol's ecosystem is entirely preventable.

Presidential Proclamation No. 470, series of 2003 declared every 3rd Saturday of September as the International Coastal Clean-up (ICC) Day, and Presidential Proclamation No. 244, series of 1993 declared September of every year as National Clean-up Month. However, due to COVID-19 pandemic, no related activities were conducted and/or participated by DILG-Bohol personnel.

- Tree Planting Activity Tree planting activities aim to raise awareness to the society in the importance of planting and saving trees, express our concern to the environment, and diminish the unfavorable effects of climate change. However, no related activities were conducted and/or participated by DILG-Bohol personnel due to COVID-19 pandemic.
- Employees Health Welfare In order to promote the health welfare of its personnel, DILG-Bohol regularly conducts medical and physical check-ups. Medical services usually include uric acid test, CBC and ECG. For this year, the schedule of this annual activity is yet to be determined.
- Provision of Ramps, Signage and Comfort Rooms for the Senior Citizens and Differently-Abled Persons at DILG Bohol Office Buildings, facilities and utilities for public use are required to be accessible to all its clients especially the senior citizens and differently-abled persons. In compliance to this, DILG-Bohol has provided ramps, signage and comfort rooms for these people.

Mende will be assigned in Negros Oriental Province, in compliance to the Department-wide reshuffling of Provincial and City Directors. DILG VII Regional Director Leocadio T. Trovela graced the activity held at the Conference Hall, DILG Bohol Provincial Office.

DISSEMINATION OF COVID-RELATED MCS TO LGUS

Issuances that are received by the Regional Office and forwarded to the Provincial Offices are immediately disseminated to all concerned officials through our field officers upon receipt. All communications are sent via electronic mail which aids in real-time dissemination.

PROVISION OF TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE TO LGUS (LGUS ASSISTED IN THE IMPLEMENTATION OF RELEVANT COVID-19 ISSUANCES)

SOCIAL AMELIORATION PROGRAM (SAP)

WAITLISTED/ LEFT-OUT BENEFICIARIES OF THE 1ST TRANCHE OF THE SOCIAL AMELIORATION PROGRAM

Following the Special Guidelines on the Provision of Social Amelioration Measures, an intensified government response is adopted to provide emergency subsidies to poor and low-income families in the form of the Social Amelioration Program. In relation thereto, the Local Government Units of the Province of Bohol responded to the aforementioned program. A total of 177, 456 families were paid in the 1st Tranche of the Social Amelioration Program.



Under Section 9.2 of Joint Memorandum Circular No. 1, all Local Government Units were directed to account to the proper agency the disbursement of funds or goods to the beneficiaries. Thus, as of July 9, 2020, the DILG Bohol reported a 100% full completion of the liquidation of the 1st Tranche of the Social Amelioration Program.

Furthermore, under the Joint Memorandum Circular No. 2 for the SAP 2nd Tranche, 5 million waitlisted family-beneficiaries in the country shall be provided with the emergency subsidy. For the Province of Bohol, the C/MLGOO's are in close coordination with their respective MSWDOs for the payout of the SAP 1st tranche waitlisted family-beneficiaries. They are also sending daily reports as to the monitoring of the SAP waitlisted family-beneficiaries through a link provided by the DILG Region Office.

SUPPORT TO PERSONS WITH DISABLITIES (PWD)

In order to ensure that policies, programs, and services for persons with disabilities are implemented at the local level during the Covid-19 pandemic, the C/MLGOOs were required to submit a weekly report as to the monitoring of the situation of persons with disabilities. All local government units of the Province of Bohol were able to provide assistance to the PWDs during the pandemic. Issues and concerns of PWDs were also monitored to ensure that they can participate in building an inclusive society.

Provided under RA 7277, as amended by RA 10754, the DILG Bohol disseminated the memorandum to all local government units for the stricter enforcement of the registration and issuance of Persons With Disabilities Identification Cards (PWD ID). This memorandum is to ensure that only qualified PWDs are registered and given the corresponding IDs.

Furthermore, in compliance with the DILG Memorandum Circular No. 2010-103, the office provided the status of the LGUs in the establishment of Persons with Disability Affairs Office (PDAO) through the link provided by the DILG Region Office. All 48 LGUs in the Province of Bohol have PWD Focal Persons and were able to establish the PDAO.

PROVISION OF TECHNICAL SUPPORT AND SECRETARIAT SERVICES TO THE INTERAGENCY TASK FORCE

LOCALLY STRANDED INDIVIDUALS (LSI)

The year 2020 has been a very challenging year for our country. It is such a trying time for all Filipinos as we continue to battle the threat of the pandemic brought by COVID-19. The Philippines recorded its first local transmission last March 07, 2020 which compelled President Rodrigo Roa Duterte to issue **Proclamation No. 922, Series of 2020**, declaring the country under a state of public health emergency. Following this stance is the imposition of several measures to mitigate the spread of COVID-19, e.g. strict implementation of minimum health standard protocols, travel ban, lockdown and community quarantine. Consequently, unemployment and retrenchment rate increased due to closures of both big and small businesses, disruption of trade, and waning of the tourism industry following the series of lockdowns and community quarantine throughout the country. Transportation services be it land, sea and air are put on hold, inadvertently resulting in an increased number of locally stranded individuals (LSIs) mostly displaced workers, including thousands of Boholanos.

With the increasing numbers of locally stranded individuals, the Department through SILG Eduardo M. Año issued DILG Memorandum Circular No. 2020-087 providing guidelines on the duties and responsibilities of local government officials and all concerned on the management of Returning Overseas Filipino Workers (ROFs) and Locally Stranded Individuals (LSIs). Likewise, an Advisory dated June 01, 2020 from Usec. Bernardo C. Florece, Jr., Undersecretary for Peace and Order was issued, directing all local chief executives at the City/Municipal level to establish a one- stop shop for the management of LSIs.

THE "HATID TULONG" INITIATIVE OF THE OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT

The "Hatid Tulong" is a government-wide effort led by the Office of the President that seeks to provide transportation assistance to locally stranded individuals (LSIs) such as stranded students, tourists and displaced workers. The "Hatid Tulong" program aims to transport 10,000 LSIs from the National Capital Region (NCR) back to their respective home provinces. DILG Bohol, through our City/Municipal Local Government Operations Officer (C/MLGOOs), facilitated and coordinated with the LCEs concerned in managing the arrival of Boholanos who were able to avail of the "Hatid Tulong" program. A total of more or less 800 Boholanos benefited from the said program.

MONITORING OF LGU COMPLIANCE AND ENFORCEMENT OF IATF DIRECTIVES AND OTHER NATIONAL **GOVERNMENT POLICIES AND ISSUANCES AND MOBILIZATION OF LGU RESOURCES**

Functionality of the Barangay Health Emergency Response Team (BHERT)

At the start of the community in Metro Manila, the Department has directed all barangays to organize their BHERTs and ensure their functionality with the following indicators, namely: conduct of barangaywide information campaign on COVID-19 Prevention and control; setting up of Barangay Information or call center; monitoring of barangay clean-up campaign; monitoring of PUMs and their condition; ang conduct of coordinative meetings.

Bohol has responded to this directive and was able to organize a total of 1,114 BHERTs. 1,109 barangays have established a Barangay Health Information Center (BHIC), have conducted barangay-wide information campaign, con- duct monitoring of Barangay Clean-up Campaign (i.e., proper disposal of garbage; disinfection of public places; cleaning of esteros and canals; and enforcement of laws on health, sanitation and cleanliness), conduct monitoring of PUMs and their condition, and conduct coordinative meeting among the Barangay, BHERTs, RHU, Rep DOH, etc.

Creation of LGU Contact Tracing Teams

To help address challenges faced as regards to the government's COVID-19 response, the National Task Force for COVID-19 has tasked the DILG and DOH in the effective implementation of contact tracing in provinces, cities, and municipalities. Local government units (LGUs) were then mandated to organize Contact Tracing Teams (CTT) to conduct contact tracing in communities, under the technical guidance and supervision of the Department of Health and its representatives at the local health level.

The CTT's primary roles are to conduct contact tracing for all persons with known exposure to a COVID-19 patient to ensure that they are strictly observing the home-quarantine measures; monitor the status of Person Under Investigation, Person Under Monitoring and family members with known contact to confirmed case to mitigate possibility of contagion; and to report daily updates to the COVID-19 provincial and Regional Task Forces.

As response to the Department's directive, Bohol city and municipalities have organized a total of 105 Contact Tracing Teams, 2,006 Contact Tracing Team members and 1,347 of which have undergone relevant training. Moreover, with the Department's directive to create Contact Tracing Teams at the barangay level, Bohol is able to organize a total of 1,141 teams mostly composed of barangay tanod and barangay health workers.

Contact Tracing Daily Report

In coordination with the DOH- Epidemiology Bureau, the Department came up with a harmonized reporting template for LGUs' daily contact tracing status report. The daily status report includes data on organization of CTTs, contact tracing status of confirmed cases, management and outcome of confirmed cases, disease case classification of close contacts, management and outcome of close contacts, and testing of close contacts. The DILG Bohol Field Officers obtain these required data from their local health office or local contact tracing team leaders and report their LGU's contact tracing status not later than three in the afternoon every day.

Hiring of Contact Tracers

Republic Act 11494 or the Bayanihan to Recover as One Act has mandated the Department to hire 50,000 con- tact tracers (CTs) to augment the existing capacity of the LGUs in its measures against the COVID-19 pandemic. Region VII has been allocated to hire 4,241 contact tracers and Bohol has hired 895 contact tracers as of November.

DILG Bohol started the process of hiring contact tracers in September and was able to deploy the first batch of 760 contact tracers to all 48 LGUs in the province on October 1, 2020. The deployment of these DILG- hired contact tracers is based on their residence, the number of existing contact tracers, and the ideal number of contact tracers per population.

The CTs become part of the Contact Tracing Teams led by the City/ Municipal Health Officers with members from the Philippine National Police, Bureau of Fire Protection, Barangay Health Emergency Response Teams (BHERTS), and volunteers from Civil Society Organizations (CSOs). Among their responsibilities are to conduct interviews, profiling, and perform an initial public health risk assessment of COVID-19 cases and their identified close contacts; refer the close contacts to isolation facilities; conduct enhanced contact tracing in collaboration with other agencies and private sector; conduct daily

monitoring of close and general contacts for at least 14 days, and perform such other tasks in relation to the COVID response.

The newly hired CTs have undergone orientations including the virtual orientation conducted by DILG Region 7 on October 2, 2020 and those conducted by their assigned City/Municipality and the Provincial Government of Bohol. Orientation training provided by the LGUs included topics on - Update on COVID-19; Basics of Contact Tracing; Filling up of Forms; Profiling of COVID-19 Contacts; Infection and Prevention Control; Demonstration on Donning and Doffing of PPEs; LGU Protocols on Contact Tracing; and Other Health, Safety and Security Protocols.

PREPARATION AND SUBMISSION OF COVID-19 RELATED COMPLIANCE/MONITORING REPORTS COVID-19 CASES OF LOCALLY STRANDED INDIVIDUALS (LSI)

With the implementation of DILG MC No. 2020-087, Dir. Leocadio T. Trovela, CESO IV issued an unnumbered memorandum dated September 09, 2020 directing LGU's and DILG LSI-desk offices to monitor the status of Locally Stranded Individuals (LSIs) within their respective jurisdictions. Part of the said monitoring is the daily updating and reporting of the number of confirmed COVID-19 cases of LSIs, number of recoveries and number of deaths. Pursuant to the above-mentioned memorandum, DILG Bohol province has recorded the following data, viz: **COVID-19 CASES OF LSIs**

MANAGEMENT OF THE DEAD AND MISSING

The Department, as the lead agency of the Management of the Dead and Missing (MDM) Cluster of the National Disaster Risk Reduction Management Council (NDRRMC) provided an interim guideline on the management of human remains of patients under investigation (PUI) and confirmed COVID-19 cases through **DILG MC No. 2020-063** dated March 27, 2020. The said Memorandum Circular provided a standard process on properly managing the human remains of patients under investigation (PUI) and confirmed cases of COVID-19.

On March 28, 2020, SILG Eduardo M. Año issued a memorandum providing guidelines in order to ensure a uniform and standard implementation of DILG MC No. 2020-063. In line with the said memorandum, the number of COVID-19-related deaths in the Province of Bohol, using the new case classification (suspect, probable, confirmed) provided under Department of Health Administrative Order No. 2020-0013 was strictly monitored and reported, viz:

I. HIGHLIGHTS OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS

SUMMARY:

The Provincial Budget and Management Office (PBMO), consistent with its set mandates under the Local Government Code, has provided budgetary support services to all Provincial Government departments, offices, hospitals and development partners for the year 2020 to implement programs, projects and activities (PPAs) supportive to the development pillars of the Provincial Administration. Such PPAs are directly aligned and supportive to caring for the weak, reawakening the Boholano Culture, and expanding the tourism economy in the Province of Bohol.

Activities and initiatives of the PBMO, while mainly relate to public financial management (PFM), directly support the actual day-to-day processing of financial claims and other financial transactions of the Provincial Government, a very essential function for the execution of the PPAs and corresponding obligation and utilization of budgetary allocation in 2020.

I. MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENTS:










the improvement plan and accuracy of the PFMAR were validated by a team from the Department of Budget and Management (DBM) Regional Office.



Highlights of the COVID-19 Pandemic Response Initiated

Heeding the national government's effort of suppressing the Covid-19 pandemic and consistent to CSC Announcement No. 13 series of 2020, as well as the Honorable Governor's Executive Order No. 18, relative to work-from-home arrangement, the Provincial Accounting Office and the Provincial Budget and Management Office immediately initiated a data migration from local network system to Virtual Private Server (VPS) to provide an online platform that will facilitate effective remote working spaces. VPS is an industry standard service available and widely adopted in the cloud. This capability enhancement was implemented to remain true to our offices' commitment of providing unhampered service delivery to our Boholano constituents especially during this time of pandemic where disbursement and financial management is of utmost importance. Data migration on our financial systems specifically eNGAS, eBudget, and FiTTSys comes with proper coordination to Commission on Audit (COA) and creation of Office ICT Policy for security consideration and vulnerability risk management. With this, our financial management systems became resilient during the pandemic period and continue to be at this present time.

It caters to forty-seven (47) local assessment offices of this province, and provides all forms of technical assistance to the only component city (Tagbilaran City), also of this province. The following activities were accomplished based from the office Plans and Programs, for CY- 2020."

1. INCREASE REVENUE GENERATION CAPACITY AND FUND SOURCING

a. Updated the Schedule of Fair Market Values (SFMV)

Pursuant to Section 212 of R.A. 7160, PAssO crafted a new SFMV for 2020 of the different classes of real properties situated in the province which will supersede the 2016 SFMV. The document was submitted to the Bureau of Local Government Finance Regional Office -7 of which a Certificate of Compliance was already issued and currently lodge in the Office of Sangguniang Panlalawigan (SP) for deliberation.

The new SFMV will be made as basis for the valuation of all real properties in the entire province as soon as it will be passed and approved by the SP and also the basis on the next general revision to take effect upon approval.

b. Supervised the implementation and completion of Tax Mapping Project of six (6) LGUs

As the PGBh allocated counterpart funds for the tax mapping operation of six (6) LGUs namely: Dagohoy, Maribojoc, Sevilla, Talibon, Tubigon and Ubay

In the amount of P4M, PAssO conducted monitoring and evaluation. Periodic progress report submission and close supervision was enforced to ensure completion of the project according to the PIP. Presently most if not at all project center LGUs are on the process of its completion.

c. Local Revenue Generation

QUARTERLY REPORT ON REAL PROPERTY ASSESSMENT

Data and information from the Quarterly Report on Real Property Assessment (QRRPA) would be useful to Local Officials, NGAs, such DOF & BLGF, in the monitoring of the movement of different classes of Real Property as it reflects the economic development of the particular LGU, in this case the province.

A historical QRRPA summarizes the changes in the assessments of a particular locality and traces the reasons for such changes on whether it's from residential, agricultural, commercial, industrial, mineral and the special classes.

Data reflected in the QRRPA can be viewed in the context of developments in the locality. Properties with Restriction includes the total assessed values of properties under CARP, under

court litigation, road lots, open spaces and other amenities of subdivisions which have not been officially donated to LGUs etc., wherein the local treasurers are temporarily prevented from collecting the RPT.

As of CY 2020, the Province of Bohol accumulated a total increase of Real Property Tax (RPT) total collectibles amounting to the sum of **Three Hundred Thirty-Six Million Six Hundred Ninety-Two Thousand Eight Hundred Eight Pesos (P336,692,808.76).**

PAssO also issued certifications and processed tax declarations PAssO has accomplished 8,451 issuances of certifications such as: total landholdings of landowner, history of assessments, non-encumbrance, certified true copies and annotations which the PTO collected P1,603,432.00 worth of secretary's fees.

On the other hand, tax declarations were processed last year such as: transfers of ownership, subdivisions, consolidations, and revisions. Likewise, the PTO have collected transfer fees in the amount of P1,007,136.80.

- Extended technical assistance to Twenty-six (26) municipal assessors in appraising new/undeclared hotels, huge buildings, machineries and other structures that contributed the increase of real property assessments.
- Implemented the presentation of current tax receipt or Professional Tax Receipt for real estate practitioners pursuant to R.A. 9646 and MRPAAO prior to the issuance of certifications and other real property assessment related documents to increase the revenue collection.



- Conducted periodic consolidation of GIS manifold Tax Maps on 47 Municipalities and regularly updating the GIS Manifold PAssO server;



5. CAPACITY AND TEAM BUILDING

Since a number of encoders in the local assessment offices are new and were not yet trained on GIS-Manifold system, PAssO scheduled a training-workshop in every district of the Province of Bohol.

The activity enabled the new encoders to convert their own digital parcellary maps into parcellary tax maps. From time to time, the newly generated data will be properly transmitted and stored at the PAssO server.

Conducted Tree Planting Activities

On October 2, 2020, in compliance to the memorandum issued by the Governor Arthur C. Yap and with the observance of the closing of the Civil Service Month, the employees of the Provincial Assessor's Office conducted a Tree Planting Activity at Bien Unido, Bohol.





I. HIGHLIGHTS OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The Provincial Internal Audit Office (PIAO) has been conducting activities which promote good governance for better-informed decision-making, accountability for the stewardship and control of resources, and the efficient use of these resources to deliver quality public services and better outcomes for citizens. PIAO monitors and institute continual improvement of internal controls to support the achievement of the Strategic Development Priority Pillars of the Provincial Government of Bohol (PGBh). These pillars are (1) Pag-atiman sa mga Kabus ug Makalolooy: Ensure the general welfare of constituents, Preserve the comfort and convenience of their inhabitants, Enhance economic priority and social justice, Promote health and safety; (2) Pagpukaw sa Kultura: Preservation and Promotion of Boholano Culture and Culture Heritage; and (3) Pagpalambo sa Industriyang Torismo: Sustainable Tourism and Livelihood Development.

PIAO performs internal audit engagements and these activities help the PGBh in promoting and enhancing transparency and accountability in governance as well as achieve desired results through effective stewardship of public resources. This is in the pursuit of promoting and enhancing transparency and accountability in governance. The conduct of management and operations audit of the different departments, offices and hospitals under the PGBh has been undertaken by PIAO regularly.

For the Calendar Year 2020, PIAO has completed **seven (7) Regular Audit Engagements**. These were audit engagements with the Bohol Provincial Library and Information Center (BPLIC); Bohol Tourism Office (BTO); Provincial Administrator's Office (PAdmO); Governor's Office (GO); Bohol Law Enforcement Communication System (BLECS); Provincial Security Force (PSF); and the Provincial Youth and Sports Development Office (PYSDO).

Review and appraisal on the systems and processes, operations practices, records, reports, and performance standards of specific prioritized audit areas were also given attention by PIAO through the conduct of Operations Audit. PIAO values the importance of assessing the effectiveness, efficiency, ethicality and economy of government operations as it is essential to the delivery of better public services, accountability, and better governance. These are the focus of the operations audit specifically performed by PIAO which started during the third quarter of 2020. PIAO has already completed **three (3) Operations Audits.** These audits included the Operations of the Cold Storage Facility (Office of the Provincial Agriculturist); Audit of the Retention and Distribution of PHIC Professional Fees (10 Devolved Hospitals); and the Operations Audit on the Compliance to the Guidelines on the Generation of Employee's Daily Time Records (All Departments and attached Offices of the PGBh).

Aside from the regular audit engagements, PIAO also conducted and completed a **Special Audit Engagement** on the Vehicle Management of the Governor's Office. In order to measure compliance of previously audited offices, **four (4) Follow-up Audit Engagements** were also completed. These were intended to measure the degree of compliance of the Auditees in response to the recommendations given by PIAO. The follow-up audit engagements were with the Chocolate Hills Complex; Provincial General Services Office (PGSO); Café Caloy Catering Services; and the Bohol Information and Communication Technology Office (BICTO).

The regular and periodic functions of PIAO also included the monitoring and updating on the status of implementation of the findings and recommendations of the Commission on Audit's Annual Audit Report (AAR) including prior year's audit findings and recommendations. Report on the Status of Implementation on the Audit Findings and Recommendations of the AAR for CY 2018 as of December 31, 2019 was completed and submitted to COA on February 21, 2020. Meanwhile, the Report on the Status of Implementation for CY 2019 as of August 31, 2020 was completed and submitted to COA on October 14, 2020.

During the heights of the pandemic, PIAO also assisted the top management in addressing urgent needs of the PGBh. PIAO Internal Auditors were assigned as Validators for the Offshore Boholanos Coordinating Team (OBCT) of the PGBh. They were tasked to validate the data provided by the stranded offshore Boholanos to ensure truthfulness of their stranded status and the need for assistance.

PIAO has also assisted the Local Finance Committee (LFC) of the Provincial Government of Bohol as well as the Provincial Administrators Office in the preparation of various internal policies of the PGBh. Technical, financial and consultancy or advisory services has been provided to both internal and external clients. For CY 2020, the Provincial Auditor has provided consultancy and advisory services to one hundred eleven (111) clients. PIAO has also reviewed and appraised forty-four (44) various documents from the different offices/departments of the PGBh. Varied inputs, advices and recommendations have been provided to both internal and external clients of PIAO.

Although the annual conduct of Internal Control System Focal Person (ICSFP) Seminar and the Baseline Assessment of Internal Control System (BAICS) workshops for 2020 were both cancelled due to the health protocols implemented, PIAO was able to accomplish all other deliverables for the calendar year. The seminar-workshops were cancelled in strict compliance to the memorandum issued by the Governor prohibiting crowd gatherings from different department/offices.

II. Priority Areas for Action/Plans/Programs for CY 2022

By the year 2020, PIAO is expected to have already completed its management audit engagements to all offices/departments under the PGBh. The office will then strengthen its compliance audit and give more focus on determining the degree of compliance of Auditees in response to the internal audit findings and recommendations given by PIAO during the past audit engagements.

Operations Audit will be also frequently and regularly conducted to address urgent issues and concerns that need immediate attention. PIAO advocates for transparency, accountability and good governance. These can be promoted through the conduct of operations audit as it values the importance of assessing the effectiveness, efficiency, ethicality and economy of government operations. The conduct of operations audit will be one of the priority areas of the office.

For the Calendar Year 2022, PIAO will also include as its priority area the strengthening of the involvement of the Internal Control System Focal Person (ICSFP) in every office in order to support the improvement of the office internal control system. It aimed to immediately address issues and concerns regarding internal control measures.

Monitoring of the Management Action Plans of all offices audited by PIAO will also be constantly performed to ensure that compliance will be properly monitored and measured. PIAO will continually conduct this activity as this is vital in reinforcing compliance of the offices/hospitals to the audit recommendations given. In doing so, this will promote responsibility and accountability of the personnel and eventually in the entire office.

In order to further promote transparency, accountability and good governance, PIAO is also planning to introduce the importance of internal audit in the Municipal Local Government Units (MLGUs) of Bohol. This is a way of promoting and inspiring MLGUs to establish Internal Audit Services Units in their respective municipalities.















BREAKDOWN of 8 FOCUS CRIMES January - December 2019 vs 2020




COMPARATIVE NON-INDEX CRIMES January - December 2019 vs 2020







BREAKDOWN OF TRAFFIC RELATED INCIDENTS January – December 2019 vs 2020




MONTHLY TREND OF 8 FOCUS CRIMES




CRIME CLOCK ON 8-FOCUS CRIMES









I. HIGHLIGHTS OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS

A. SITUATIONAL ANALYSIS

The Office of the Provincial Prosecutor of Bohol has the following prosecutors, to wit:



MAIN FUNCTIONS

- Receive criminal complaints filed by law enforcement agencies/Police Officers and private complainants;
- Conduct preliminary and inquest investigations of criminal complaints;
- Resolved criminal complaints filed in the office;
- File information in courts;
- Prosecute criminal cases in courts covering eleven(11) Regional Trial Courts; Twenty(20) Municipal Circuit Trial Courts and Two(2) Municipal Trial Courts); and
- Appear for the state in Civil Cases and Special Proceedings as deputized by the Office of the Solicitor General.

OTHER FUNCTIONS

- ➤ Besides the regular and prosecutorial functions, the Provincial Prosecutor serves as the Vice-Chair of the Election Board of Canvassers, and sometimes act as Register of Deeds of the Province of Bohol;
- Conduct lectures to police officers pertaining to the criminal laws;
- > Render legal assistance thru: letter requests and walk-in clients;
- Render legal opinions and advices;
- Assess, collect and deposit collection fees (clearance/certification/certified true copy of documents);
- Issue clearances and certifications.

The volume of work increases every year due to the fact that the municipal judges can no longer conduct the preliminary investigations and inquest proceedings. These functions are now exclusively lodged by this office; hence, manpower and office space are not enough to accommodate the clients who will transact business and to attend the hearings in the office.

B. HIGHLIGHTS OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The Office of the Provincial Prosecutor of Bohol is commended for its dedication and commitment - a significant contribution in the achievements in the objectives of the Department of Justice in the speedy resolution of cases.

In fact, our Prosecutors are recognized and commended as a consistent regional awardee for ten (10) consecutive years with the corresponding Plaque of Recognition for every year from January-December 2010 to January-December 2020 for resolving cases under preliminary investigation within the prescribed period set forth under DOJ Department Circular No. 1, dated January 5, 2001.

These accomplishments were done by us as a team knowing our responsibilities in the administration of justice in the province pursuant to the vision and mission of the Department.

 - Considering that the volume of work increases every year due to the fact that the municipal judges can no longer conduct the preliminary investigations and inquest

proceedings and furthermore, only sixteen (16) Prosecutors will appear and prosecute criminal cases and special cases in courts covering eleven (11) Regional Trial Courts; twenty (20) Municipal Circuit Trial Courts and two (2) Municipal Trial Courts in the entire Province of Bohol.

- 2) Small office space not enough to accommodate clients (complainants/ respondents/witnesses and law enforcement officers) especially now that we are facing this Covid 19 pandemic and social physical distancing among persons is a must.
- 3) Lack of personnel to handle the voluminous work;
- 4) Limited funds for the purchase of office supplies, office equipment and maintenance of the latter;
- 5) Insufficient space for physical evidence (exhibits) and records;
 - Presently the same one (1) room is utilized for safekeeping of physical evidence and as storage room for various records/archived;
 - We have a limited office space;
 - We have no available room for our disposed records, hence, the small space in front of the Hall of Justice is being utilized as improvised bodega for our disposed records.


A. Jurisdiction

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COVID-19 PANDEMIC ACTIVITIES

With the outbreak of Coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) illness caused by a novel coronavirus now called severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2 (SARS-CoV-2, formerly called 2019-nCoV) which was first identified in Wuhan City, Hubei Province, China, initially the Chief Directorial Staff, BFP National Headquarters activated the Code Blue Alert (Heightened Alert status) effective 31 January 2020 to all Special Rescue Force (SRF, previously called Special Rescue Unit) personnel and to those who are trained in CBRN/HazMat. As per record, Bohol has 18 SRF personnel and eleven of them are trained in CBRN/HazMat. Also, we have three Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) personnel.

On 12 1700H March 2020, the BFP wide raised its alert status to Code Red (Full Alert status) from Code Blue due to the increasing case of COVID-19 pandemic in the country. Thus, all BFP units prepared guidelines to mitigate the effects of COVID-19 and prevent the spread of said disease:

- a. All BFP Bohol units were advised to observe skeletal workforce provided that the respective duties and responsibilities in the station will not be hampered; and all personnel are On-Call anytime;
- b. BFP units refrained from conducting activities with the public;
- c. All BFP personnel nationwide donated a part of their salary for COVID-19 humanitarian efforts in the spirit of Bayanihan to Heal as One Challenge through salary deduction for the month of May 2020. The Philippine General Hospital was the beneficiary;
- d. Observed self-decontamination before assuming post in the station and after duty; also, after conducting field works;
- e. Observed the use of proper PPE and SCBA during fire operations. Conducted on-site decontamination procedures of personnel and equipment after fire operation.
- f. Created Decontamination Team; and established decontamination area.
- g. Designated Focal Person to supervise and facilitate the on-time submission of COVID-19 reports and the monitoring of COVID-19 activities;

- h. Conducted decontamination/disinfects different offices;
- i. Provided hand sanitizers, checked body temperatures, asked for any signs and symptoms, observed 1-meter distance and ensure the wearing of mask by BFP personnel and clients.
- j. Provided assistance to DSWD in the distribution of Social Amelioration Assistance Program subsidy. Transported, accompanied and secured the DSWD staff in the exercise of their functions

Data Management including Systems Management and Maintenance

Under data management, DENR-Bohol maintained three (3) servers with one (1) server per office with the Information Systems Analysts and GIS/IT Specialists as well as submitted one (1) newly-approved or existing CTPO record to RO/FMB.

There were difficulties encountered in the procurement of ICT equipment. The winning bidder for the 14 units of laptop computers and 14 units of desktop computers, Sonjay Microsystems, failed to deliver the ICT on schedule and lastly issued a waiver due to the unavailability of stock from local sources in Manila and even abroad. The Bids and Award Committee (BAC) cancelled the award and was forced to start from step 1 and repeat the bidding process since it is only the sole bidder as all the other suppliers from Cebu were not able to submit their bids due to the pandemic. As the issue was raised during one of the virtual FDU meetings conducted every Monday, the Regional Office, through the ARD for Management Services provided assistance and fortunately, PS-DBM had available stocks of the items based on its specifications at the moment. The office has coordinated with the regional office in facilitating the payment of the check as well as the delivery of the items to DENR-Bohol.



Forest Land Use Plan (FLUP) is a plan centered on the allocation of forests and forestlands and is developed through consensus among stakeholders such as DENR, community and civil society groups to ensure it effective management and sustain ecosystem services. For CY 2020, DENR Bohol has assisted LGUs President Carlos P. Garcia, Candijay, Inabanga, Corella, Duero and Tagbilaran City in the formulation of their Forest Land Use Plan (FLUP). On the other hand, it facilitated the adoption of the FLUPs of LGUs Bien Unido, Danao, Buenavista, Jagna, Sevilla and Garcia Hernandez. In spite of the problem caused by the pandemic, the office still came up with strategy of hiring writers to focus on the FLUP formulation with the LGU and DENR personnel providing all needed data.



DENR Bohol submitted 39 annual and monthly reports. The CENR Offices submit their reports to the PENR Office who will then endorse the report to the Regional Office. An electronic file of the reports are also submitted to RO through email. Monthly report leads to the early detection and resolution of potential problems, actions can be taken for targets with backlogs, shows the general patterns throughout the year and data integrity issues can be picked up early as many are looking into it.



DENR Bohol submitted two (2) Plans to the Regional Office (RO) to cover CY 2021-2023, namely the Provincial Work and Financial (WFP) and the Provincial Budget Proposal. Plans from the respective provinces were then consolidated to formulate the Regional level plans.

DENR Bohol submitted twelve (12) updated forest product price data to RO for the whole year. CENRO Talibon's results show that under the Rough Lumbers category, Mahogany lumber has the highest market value while Marine plywood posted the highest market value under the Wood Panel Products category on the annual average prevailing price for 2020. The Revised Price Monitoring System (RPMS) DAO 2000-55 generates data on prices of all forest products. The price monitoring units at the CENRO level conduct data collection. Results of the monitoring are used as the basis for determining charge rates for these forest products as provided for by Republic Act 7161, otherwise known as the Forest Charges Law of 1991.

Updating of all data on Foreshore Leases

DENR Administrative Order No. 2004-24 defines Foreshore as the part of the shore, which is alternately covered and uncovered by the ebb and flow of the tide. On the other hand, Lease is a privilege granted by the state to a person, private corporation, and association or partnership, to occupy and possess, in consideration of specified rental/fee, any land of the public/private domain (including its improvement) in order to undertake any authorized activity therein. The three (3) offices of DENR Bohol updated their respective foreshore lease data and monitored 75 out of 70 foreshore occupants bringing the accomplishment rate to 107%.




Manila Bay Cleanup

- Panglao Island Restoration and Rehabilitation Program (PIRRP)



One of the major thrust of the present administration under the leadership of President Rodrigo R. Duterte is to restore the country's top tourism sites which include the Island of Boracay and it also because of this reason that the Island of Panglao in Bohol, which is known for its white beaches, is within the radar of the President. As a tangible action for the pressing concern on the degradation and pollution of Panglao Island, the Panglao Island Restoration and Rehabilitation Project (PIRRP) was implemented with funding downloaded on April 2020 through Sub-Allotment Advice (SAA) 04-285 with a total budget of Php 9,750,000.



One of the activities under the PIRRP is the rehabilitation and improvement of Command Center/Operation Centers in the PENRO and CENRO level. To make the operation center operational, the fund also covered the purchase of Information, Communication and Technology (ICT) materials as well as furniture and fixtures. The IEC component included the production of IEC materials in which 10 billboards were installed and 4 Sintra Boards were produced and were posted in strategic places within Panglao Island as well as in the office premises of PENRO Bohol and CENRO Tagbilaran City.

A total of nineteen (19) LAWIN/Beach Patrollers were hired under the PIRRP who have undergone orientation prior to their dispersion in their area of assignment within the island. Occupants and structures within and outside legal easement were identified and violators of the easement zoning were issued with Notice of Violation (NOV). In fact, filing of cases is one of the identified targets thus 2 reports on violations were already forwarded to the Legal Division of DENR-7 for their opinion and appropriate action. On the other hand, Status of water quality in terms of coliform level was monitored monthly through the conduct of ambient and effluent water quality test in the coastal waters of Panglao and in order to prevent further water pollution, water tourism activities and solid waste management facilities are monitored daily.

The twenty-five (25) IEC campaigns conducted by CENRO Tagbilaran City were focused on educating the stakeholders of the existing laws and policies concerning environmental protection such as RA 9003 or the Solid Waste Management Act, RA 9275 or the Clean Water Act and RA 8749 or the Clean Air Act. 


The Solid Waste Management (SWM) Program is spearheaded by the Environmental Management Bureau (EMB) through the Provincial Environmental Management Office (PEMO) in coordination with the Provincial Government of Bohol and other NGAs. DENR Bohol is part of the evaluating committee for the SWM of Local Government Units. In the case of CENRO Talibon, the SWM Focal Person conducted monthly monitoring on the SWM Facilities of the municipalities within their jurisdiction. The office always see to it that it is included in its information, education and communication (IEC) campaigns as one of the top 10 priority programs of the Secretary.





The Enhanced National Greening Program's priority programs include the rehabilitation of 1.2 million hectares of denuded forest lands by 2022 and maintenance and protection of existing forests. The National Greening Program or the NGP as the DENR banner program is a convergence initiative of DA-DAR-DENR where the DENR stands as the lead agency. As a government priority pursuant to EO Nos. 23 and 26, both series of 2011, the NGP aims to achieve: a) Poverty reduction among upland and lowland poor households, indigenous peoples, and in coastal and urban areas; b) Sustainable management of natural resources through resource conservation, protection, and productivity enhancement; c) provision of food, goods and services such as timber, fiber, non-timber forest products, aesthetic values, air enhancement values, water regulation values and climate change mitigation by expanding forest cover that serves as carbon sink; d) Public awareness and social and environmental consciousness on the value of forests and watersheds; e) positive values among the youth and other partners through shared responsibilities in sustainable management of tree plantations and forest resources and f) consolidation and harmonization of all greening efforts of the government, civil society and the private sector.





A total of 2,127 hectares out of the 2,079 hectares target were conducted with survey, mapping and planning which also include the conduct of community consultation/IEC, site assessment, geotagging and perimeter surveying of plantable areas, preparation of GIS based maps, identification of fire prone areas, formulation of PO specific site plan and soil sample collection and analysis.







Establishment of Bamboo Plantation

For CY 2020, DENR Bohol assessed **150 hectares** out of 500-hectare target. It has also completed the production of **102,000** bamboo planting stocks in their respective bamboo nurseries. The establishment of bamboo plantation will be undertaken on CY 2021.

Establishment of Bamboo Plantation



The Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) Signing for production of bamboo stocks and plantation establishment between the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) PENRO Bohol, CENRO Talibon and CENRO Tagbilaran City took place on September 18, 2020. The activity was conducted in line with the celebration of the World Bamboo Day 2020. CENRO Talibon and CENRO Tagbilaran conducted simultaneous MOA signing at Cansague Sur, San Isidro and Canawa, Candijay. A separate meeting was called for the distribution of the 15% mobilization as well as the orientation on how to raise quality bamboo stocks and how to establish a bamboo plantation.



ISSUES & CONCERNS

Issuance of Community Based Forest Management Agreement

CBFMA is a production sharing agreement between the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) and the participating people's organizations (POs) for a period of 25 years renewable for another 25 years and shall provide tenurial security and incentives to develop, utilize and manage specific portions of forest lands (DENR DAO No. 96-29). Meanwhile, Certificate of Stewardship is awarded to individuals or families actually occupying or tilling portions of forest lands pursuant to LOI 1260 for a period of 25 years renewable for another 25 years. It is only issued within established CBFM project with CBFMA, subject to the decision and recommendation of the PO (DENR Administrative Order No. 98-45).










In order to ensure security of tenure, social justice and poverty alleviation among Filipinos, Improved Land Administration and Management Program is one agency's priority programs. A land title is the evidence of the right of the owner or the extent of his/her interest, and by which means he/she can maintain control and as a rule assert right to exclusive possession and enjoyment of the property. A land title can also be used as a capital for loan collateral or a business. For CY 2020, DENR Bohol exceeded most of its targets under the Improved Land Administration and Management Program. These include the issuance of residential patent, agricultural patent, lots surveyed and transmitted to RO and cases resolved.









The main activity under land records maintenance is the entry of lots in the allocation book which aims to provide efficient recording of the lots based on the approved cadastral. Aside from the maintenance of land records, the Records Officer together with other assigned personnel is preoccupied in the receiving and acting on requests and other correspondences and others. The Records Officer also caters to clients' inquiry with regards to status of land and other land record matters.

UnderSecretary for Field Operations, Enforcement and Muslim Affairs Jim O. Sampulna led the lifting of suspension of titling and distribution of land titles to the constitutents of Panglao Island, Bohol on March 6, 2020 at the Panglao Cultural Center. With him were Gov. Arthur C. Yap, 1st District Congressman Edgar M. Chatto, Mayor Leonila P. Montero of LGU Panglao, Mayor Meriam Sumaylo of LGU Dauis, LMB Director Atty. Emelyn Talabis, PENR Officer Charlie E. Fabre, OIC, CENRO Ariel N. Rica of Tagbilaran City and Register of Deeds (ROD) personnel.

The Regulatory and Permitting Section (RPS) conducted a Barangay Pulong-Pulong on Survey and Titling. The resource persons were Engr. Emiliano Hormachuelos, LMO III Aurelio D. Baay, Jr., LMO II Cristorey Cabilogan and Engr. Myrna Labuan. The activity was also graced by Hon. 

Survey and registration of Protected Area Occupants (SRPAO) was conducted in thirty-two (32) barangays within the seven (7) municipalities comprising the Rajah Sikatuna Protected Landscape (RSPL). 

PAs with protection ensured

DENR Bohol takes charge in the protection of sixteen (16) protected areas through its CENR Offices, namely: CENRO Tagbilaran City and CENRO Talibon. One of the main interventions of the agency for consistent protection of these PAs is the conduct of Brigade Patrolling or LAWIN Patrol. LAWIN is a forest and biodiversity protection system which hinges on regular monitoring and informed responses to forest and biodiversity threats. LAWIN empowers communities and authorities in addressing degradation and achieve conservation objectives.





Most common threats observed during monthly LAWIN Patrol include illegal cutting of trees, collection and hunting of wildlife and improper disposal of garbage. Apprehension and confiscation of illegal forest products were among the actions taken by the office.





DENR-Bohol conducted Ecotourism Program Impact monitoring in three (3) PAs per Semester. Its process of monitoring is based on the BMB Technical Bulletin No. 2014-03 with Socio-Economic Survey and Trail Resource Assessment and Monitoring (TRAM). Results showed that People's Organizations, entrepreneurs and other members of the community benefited from the shares of the earnings from the guests who have visited the PA. However, one of the negative impacts recorded are tourists who are only after leisure and are irresponsible in managing their wastes. In addition, they do not adhere to the guidelines in terms of the noise they produce that will disturb the wildlife present in the area inspite of the briefing or orientation conducted prior to their respective ecotourism activities.





Integrated Protected Areas Fund (IPAF) is a GoP trust fund set up under the provisions of the 1992 NIPAS Act (Sec.16) for the purpose of receiving donations, endowments and revenues generated within protected areas and disbursing the same to finance projects of the National Integrated Protected Area System (NIPAS). IPAF, just like any Government trust fund, is subject to the strict rules and regulations on budget preparation, disbursement and audit to facilitate transparency and monitoring. For CY 2020, DENR Bohol has collected a total of Php 977,481.91 over its target of Php 1,000,000.00 under IPAF. The collection haven't reached its target as most protected areas were closed due to the pandemic and a large portion of the fund comes from the fees of tourists visiting the sites.

Aside from the cave's historical, scientific, economic and aesthetic significance, it houses valuable natural resources thus it must be protected and sustainably-managed. For CY 2020, DENR Bohol was able to surpass its target of two (2) as it assessed nine (9) caves. The results of the assessment were packaged into a Detailed Cave Assessment Report which will serve as basis for the appropriate intervention of the office and the community for its management and protection. Part of the output of the assessment is the classification of the abovementioned caves.



Cave Management and Protection Program





Two (2) caves were classified by both CENR Offices for CY 2020 based on the assessment conducted. For CENRO Tagbilaran City, Canlusong Cave 1 was classified as Class II due to presence of bats and other biological resources while Canlusong Cave 2 was classified as Class I due to bad odor from bat colonies.

Two (2) caves were formulated with a 10-year Cave Management Plans namely: Cabagnow Cave Pool and Cantijong Cave through the joint efforts of the B/MLGU, Peoples Organizations and other stakeholders and DENR PENRO Bohol and CENRO personnel pursuant to RA 9072 or the National Caves and Cave Resources Management & Protection Act of 2001.

The Cave Management Plan of three (3) caves were implemented. For the Duangon Cave in Zamora, Bilar, some of the activities include enrichment planting within the vicinities of the cave, installation of Information Board on its history and Workshop on Cave Karst Ecosystem, Bat Identification and Cave Dwelling Species and Laws related on Caves, among others. Twelve quarterly reports for the three (3) caves were also submitted to the Regional Office.

The RAMSAR Convention states that the wise use of wetlands is the maintenance of their ecological character, achieved through the implementation of ecosystem approaches, within the context of sustainable development. For CY 2020, DENR-Bohol assessed inland wetland, prepared inland wetland management plans, implemented inland wetland plans including quarterly reports and forged partnerships.



Wildlife Resources Conservation Sub-Program





Under the Wildlife Resources Conservation Sub-Program, DENR-Bohol through CENRO Talibon rescued and rehabilitated, tagged and released four (4) marine turtles in Gaus, Carlos P. Garcia, Bohol. All 7 species of marine turtles are found on the Appendix I of the Convention on International Trades of Endangered Species of Wild Flora and Fauna (CITES). The IUCN classified three of its species as critically endangered while the remaining species are classified as endangered due to habitat loss and degradation, hunting and poaching, trade, incidental capture, climate change, pollution, disease and natural predators and introduced species.

Five (5) sites in the province were conducted with quarterly tarsier population monitoring, namely: Loboc, Sevilla, Balilihan, Anda and Candijay. The current condition of *T. syrichta* is threatened and endangered brought by illegal trading and destruction of their habitat.

For the management and protection of wildlife, two (2) Critical Habitat Management Plans were prepared for Anda, Bohol for tarsier and Pres. Carlos P. Garcia for marine turtles. CENRO Tagbilaran and CENRO Talibon maintained and improved their respective Wildlife Rescue Centers (WRCs) located at RSPL, Bilar and CENRO Talibon respectively. These WRCs serve as temporary shelter to turned-over or rescued wildlife until they are rehabilitated and released to the wild. Some of the rescued wildlife include Brahminy Kite, White-eared brown Dove, Black-and chinned Fruitdove and Colasisi among others.

Four (4) migratory bird sites were monitored quarterly, namely: Cabilao Island, Loon; Panglao Island; Mahaba Islet, Calituban, Talibon and Malinao Dam, Pilar. In Cabilao Island, Rufous Night Heron N. caledonicus, Little Egret E. garzetta, Little Heron, Barred Rail R. torquatus, Common Sandpiper Actitis hypoleucos and Whiskered Tern. Chdonias hydribus were observed while in Panglao Island are Eastern Reef Egret Egretta sacra, Chinese (Swinhoe's) Egret E. eulophotes, Little Egret E. garzetta, Little Heron, Redshank T. totanus and Common Sandpiper Actities hypoleucos. In Mahaba Islet, 37 waterbird species (with estimated count of 3805) dominated by plovers were observed while 20 waterbird species (with estimated count of 6,902) dominated by Philippine ducks were observed at Malinao Dam.



Seagrass beds and coral reef baseline assessment were conducted at Panglao Island Protected Seascape (PIPS). Coastal habitats were surveyed and mapped using handheld GPS incorporating GIS and field validation activities to determine the size of the habitats within the area. Standardized method stipulated in Technical Bulletin 2019-04 "Technical Guide on Biodiversity Assessment and Monitoring System for Coastal and Marine Ecosystems" such as Photo-transect, Fish Visual Census (FVC), Belt transect and transect-quadrat technique were used to obtain data on coral reef, associated reef fish, macroinvertebrates' community and seagrass ecosystem. Four (4) coastal barangays within PIPS were conducted with coral reef assessment, namely: Danao, Doljo, Looc and Poblacion. On the other hand, seagrass beds assessment was conducted to seven (7) barangays of PIPS namely: Danao, Doljo, looc and Poblacion of the municipality of Panglao, Bohol and Totolan, Poblacion and Songculan of the municipality of Dauis, Bohol. Results of the survey and mapping activities showed that PIPS has a total of 51.92 hectares of coral reefs and 1,973.07 hectares of seagrass beds.

Seagrass beds and coral reef monitoring was conducted at the Albur-Loay-Loboc Protected Landscape and Seascape (ALLPLS) and Talibon Group of Islands Protected Landscape and Seascape (TGIPLS) for CY 2020. For ALLPLS, overall results results of the monitoring revealed the declining trends of coral reef, reef fishes, macro-invertebrates and seagrass bed condition. The changes were attributed to potential anthropogenic factors such as induced by human activities as well as natural factors (typhoon. predation). Hence. management strategies should be tailored to address the declining trends such as annual monitoring and information, education and communication.





Albur-Loay-Loboc Protected Landscape and Seascape (ALLPLS) and Talibon Group of Islands Protected Landscape and Seascape (TGIPLS) were conducted with water quality monitoring. For TGIPL/S, water samples were obtained from eleven (11) sampling stations (2 sites in Sitio Bansan and Brgy. Sag; 3 sites in Mahaba Islet, Calituban and Tambi Island and 1 sitein Banbanon Island, San Francisco, Talibon.

In order to reduce threats and pressures identified, patrolling was conducted at Panglao Island Protected Seascape (2,445.08 hectares), Albur-Loay-Loboc Protected Landscape and Seascape (1,165.51 has.) and Talibon Group of Islands Protected Landscape and Seascape (6,446.31 has.) For TGIPL/S, threats commonly observed were debris such as plastics, straws, nylons, and other materials entangled in sapling and mature mangrove trees. Also, some mangrove trees were pruned and cut, Ceriopstagal exhibited stunted growth, excessive nutrient accumulation and abandoned fishponds were observed. All threats mentioned were presented to the Protected Area Management Board (PAMB) for their appropriate action.

BISFFA's Floating Fish Cottage had harvested once since its date of establishment. A total of 25 kilos of grouper amounting to Php 10,000.00 for Php400.00 per kilo. On the other hand, CFA harvested five (5) times since the establishment of its enterprise on Brown Lip Culture. It harvested a total of 100 kilos equivalent to Php 35,000.00 for Php 70.00 per kilo. Aside from that, CFA offered rental services of their floating cottage installed with videoke and a sari-sari store which gave them an additional income of Php 12,000 or Php2,0000 per month.

In general, the respondents of TGIPLS have high awareness and have positive attitude towards biodiversity and coastal and marine ecosystem nevertheless, it was not reflected on their actual behaviour and practices.

With regards to PIPS, more than half (61.4%) of its respondents have knowledge of biodiversity. Most of the respondents know the importance of mudflats, mangrove, seagrass beds and coral reefs. Most (82%) of the respondents know about marine pollution and acknowledge that people are the direct contributors (79%). Majority (93%) of the respondents agree that it is necessary to protect these various ecosystems and wants to share steps in protecting biodiversity to their family and relatives. In terms of practices, 92% answered that they never cut mangrove for charcoal production. In addition, most (82%) of the respondents contributed to the conservation and protection of biodiversity by practicing proper solid waste management.

DENR-Bohol conducted six (6) special events for CY 2020, namely: World Wetlands Day, World Wildlife Day, Month of the Ocean, Philippine Environment Month, International Coastal Clean-Up Month and Coral Triangle Day.

Under the Green Fins Implementation and Institutionalization within Legislated PAs, five (5) dive centers were scheduled for assessment in CY 2020. Unfortunately, the tourism industry suffered a lot in the onset of the pandemic. Most of the dive shops stopped their operation thus the conduct of assessment is not possible as it requires actual conduct of tourism activities such as diving, snorkelling and others. With this predicament, the target was changed to the production and distribution of IEC Materials in relation to Green Fins Implementation.

DENR-Bohol provided technical assistance to LGUs Tubigon and Talibon in the formulation of their Integrated Coastal Management (ICM) Plans. DENR-CMEMP personnel worked closely with the Office of the MENRO and MAO for the scheduling of meetings and trainings to facilitate the drafting of the ICM Plans.

DENR-Bohol through CENRO Tagbilaran City and CENRO Talibon conducted assessment and monitoring of PA Management Effectiveness using METT in three PAs, namely: IPS, ALLPLS and TGIPS. The METT is adopted from the World Commission on Protected Areas (WCPA), which focuses on the six (6) elements of effective management as specified in Biodiversity Management Bureau (BMB) Technical Bulletin No. 2018-05. Participants were divided into smaller groups and were given different schedules for the conduct of METT in order to adhere with the protocols of the General Community Quarantine. Overall, the average score for ALLPLS and PIPS are 61% and 64% respectively which denotes GOOD Management Effectiveness Status





This target is spearheaded by the Mines and Geo-Sciences Bureau with Staffs installed in the respective CENR Offices.

DENR work hand-in-hand with MGB, Provincial Government of Bohol and other institutions in the investigation of mines-related cases.

DENR-CENRO Tagbilaran City Survey Team conducted an actual ground survey of Loon-Maribojoc uplifted coral reef as a result of magnitude 7.2 magnitude earthquake that hit Bohol on October 15, 2013. The team utilized the existing GPS points surveyed by the Mines and Geosciences Burea (MGB).



Special Programs/ Projects



New Bohol Airport Construction and Sustainable Environment Protection Project

Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) and the Department of Transportation (DOTr) is presently working together for the implementation of the New Bohol Airport Construction and Sustainable Environment Protection Project by virtue of a Memorandum of Agreement signed on July 18, 2017.

As stipulated in the MOA, "NBACSEPP" came into being in consideration that the location of the new airport in Panglao Island, Bohol is surrounded by beautiful marine areas and also to pay special attention to environmental protection. DENR is assigned to undertake the procurement and implementation of the reforestation project of the NBACSEPP since the office houses a pool of expertise on reforestation activities and project. One of those is the National Greening Program (NGP), thus it can guarantee technical assistance in geotagging the identified plantations site, seedling production, plantation establishment, protection and maintenance.

On the other hand, DOTr having the funds, is tasked to download, release and transfer project funds amounting to Php32,513,427.17 to DENR-PENRO Bohol. In return, DENR-PENRO Bohol is accountable for the utilization of the fund, designate qualified DENR officers and employees to take charge of the planning, procurement and implementation of the NBACSEPP in close coordination with DOT and prepare the detailed plans and other necessary documents for the project in accordance with existing NGP standards among others.

An NBACSEPP monitoring team was created and is tasked to conduct compliance monitoring and environmental surveillance of the affected areas due to the ongoing construction and the conduct of studies relative to the project. Its membership is consisted of the DOTr, being the proponent, DENR-EMB (Environmental Management Bureau), Department of Tourism (DOT), the provincial government of Bohol (PGBh) and several affected municipalities, representatives from the academes, Civil Aviation Authority of the Philippines (CAAP) and the DENR-PENRO (Provincial Environment and Natural Resources Office).

Presently, NBACSEPP is implemented in sixteen (16) municipalities and one (1) city in Bohol, namely: Dimiao, Guindulman, Panglao, Dauis, Maribojoc, Sikatuna, Baclayon, Loay, Tagbilaran City, Cortes, Loon, Alburquerque, Sevilla, Bilar, Pilar, San Miguel and Balilihan. A total of 349 hectares of upland (328.406 has.), mangrove (10.031 has.) and urban (68.83 kms.) areas were validated and assessed by DENR-PENRO Bohol personnel. The first year of implementation (CY 2017) is focused on validation, assessment and coordination as well as survey, mapping, planning and blocking. On the other hand, CY 2018 and the preceding years will be dedicated to seedling production, plantation establishment and maintenance.

For CY 2020, targets are focused on the maintenance and protection of established plantations including fruit trees and timber (indigenous) tree species as well as conduct or attendance to Information, Education and Communication (IEC) activities meetings. Maintenance activities cover strip brushing, ring weeding, application of organic fertilizer and maintenance of fireline and patrol works

Integrated Natural Resources and Environmental Management Project (INREMP)

The Integrated Natural Resources and Environmental Management Project (INREMP) is one of the major projects of the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) which aims to address unsustainable watershed management in four (4) priority Upper River Basins (URBs), namely: Chico River Basin in the Cordillera Administration Region, Northern Luzon; Bukidnon Upper River Basin in Northern Mindanao, Region X; Lake Lanao River Basin in the Autonomous Region of Muslim Mindanao and Wahig-Inabanga River Basin in Bohol, Region VII. The project focuses on indigenous people and resource-poor communities and aims to reduce and reverse degradation of watersheds and associated environmental services caused by forest denudation and unsustainable farming practices. INREMP has four (4) components, namely: Component I: River Basin and Watershed Management and Investment; Component II: Smallholder and Institutional Investment in Conservation and URB Productivity Enhancement; Component III: River Basin and Watershed Management Capacity and Related Governance Mechanisms and Component IV: Project Management and Support Services.

Under Component II, 29 Livelihood Enhancement Support (LES) projects were awarded to various Peoples Organizations (POs) which were proposed by the POs themselves. These LES Subprojects include solar dryer pavement, farm machineries, rice mill facility, food processing, all weather plastic dryer and fish coral facility. A Livelihood and Enterprise Development Specialist was hired to provide all the necessary assistance to the PO from conceptualization, formulation and finaliation of the LES proposal.

Component III covers the conduct of Information, Education and Communication (IEC), Capacity-building and strengthening, Institutional and Organizational strengthening and Support to the establishment of Model Farms for ICRAF. For the conduct of IEC, information materials such as facemasks, brochures and video documentations were produced and distributed to the community. A 30-minuter radio program entitled "Teleradyo sa PENRO" hosted by the Technical Extension Officers Romeo S. Teruel and For. Nestor Molina was aired at stations DYTR and DYRD to increase awareness and participation among its listeners. For the capacity building and strengthening, INREMP Personnel, especially the Technical Extension Officers (TEOs) and field staff conducted mentoring, extension, strengthening and trainings to Peoples' Organizations. A team was also created to facilitate the systematic and smooth preparation of the INREMP Pre-Terminal Report. This year, model farms for ICRAF were also established with the support of INREMP-PPMO Bohol.

Integrated Natural Resources and Environmental Management Project (INREMP)

Under the Work Financial Plan (WFP) for CY 2019, INREMP has continuing targets and funds under Component III specifically on the conduct of radio plugging while for Component IV comprises of procurement of ICT equipment and hiring of TEOs and other specialists.

Under the Natural Resources Management (NRM), a total of 1,310.5 hectares were maintained with the following breakdown: NRM 2017 Conservation Farming (CF)-230.5 hectares, NRM 2018 CF-200 hectares and NRM 2018 Assisted Natural Regeneration (ANR)-880 hectares.

Under the Rural Infrastructure (RI), a total of 34.86 kilometers of access roads were rehabilitated while four (4) water systems were awarded. Also, 36 LES Subprojects were monitored and submitted their liquidation reports.




Year 2020 has been a crucial and challenging year for the department in terms of accomplishing its programs/projects/activities because of several constraints such declaring a state of calamity throughout the Philippines due to Corona Virus Disease 2019. However, with constant monitoring and evaluation, the entire workforce of the department in the CENRO — Talibon have actively exerted concerted efforts in carrying out the agency mandate, vision, mission for which it was established. Working for the people with the aid of Divine providence and through the fund specifically allotted for each activity, these resulted to the attainment of accomplishment vis- à-vis the targets as follows.

For the Calendar Year, CENRO Talibon has a total budget of Php 27,476,500 per approved FY 2020 General Appropriations Act. Maintenance and Other Operating Expenses (MOOE) almost compromised eighty-three percent (83%) of the allotment or Php 22,821, 500. Said allocation is being utilized for the travelling allowances, supplies and materials, other services and mandatory expenses of the office purposely for the attainment of the targets per program, projects and activity. The remaining seventeen percent (17%) or Php 4,655,000 is allocated for Capital Outlay (CO) which has been used for the implementation of the National Greening Program.

The CENRO-Talibon, an overall performance rating of 113% was accomplished. This fig ure represents the overall rating for the five (5) units under CENRO-Talibon namely:

Conservation and Development Section (CDS); Regulatory and Permitting Section (RPS; Enforcement and Monitoring Section (EMS); Survey and Mapping Unit (SMU); and Planing and Support Unit (PSU).

Protection and Maintenance of Coastal and Marine Ecosystem

Every month, CMEMP Team undertaken patrol works within Talibon Group of Islands Protected Landscape and Seascape. This is to monitor existing threats that could hamper the productivity of our coastal and marine resources. Threats that were commonly observed by the team were (Drafted debris such as plastics; Straws, nylons and other materials entangled in sapling and mature mangrove trees; some mangrove trees were pruned and cut; stunted growth of Ceriopatagal; excessive nutrients accumulation and abandoned Fishpots.

All threats observed by the team were presented to the Protected Area Management Board for appropriate actions.

Concerning the practices, the average weighted mean is 2.14 falls under descriptive rating -SOMETIMES-, which implies that respondents is rarely participating in any environmental activities. Respondents are still reliant to plastics (126 out of 741) and even throw garbage anywhere especially when there is no trash bins within the area (449 out of 741). Thus, there is a need to change the practices of the respondents in relying using of plastics and encourage then to adopt the 4R-s which stands for Reduce, Reuse, Recycle and Refuse. Moreover, trash bins shall be installed within the protected area. On the positive side, respondents practiced waste segregation and proper waste disposal.

In general, respondents have high awareness and have positive attitudes towards biodiversity and coastal and marine ecosystems nevertheless, it did not reflect on their actual behavior.

Assessment of Stakeholders – programs

True enough to its mission and vision, the DENR CENRO Talibon workforce has functioned all throughout the year towards achieving all of the foregoing objectives .

The extension of technical assistance on forest conservation and development is focused on local communities as represented by their organizations, hence it was recognized that the communities are in the best position to manage and protect forests, they are encouraged to participate in Decision-making on the sustainable use of forest resources by enjoining them in meeting sand planning workshops and soliciting their inputs for forest program development.

One hundred seven (107) POs including MLGUs and BLGUs positively responded for NGP contracting. Also, one (3) POs completed and updated their CRM Framework with the assistance of The DENR before the end of the year.

As regards to clientele compliance, Certificate of Stewardship Contract (CSC) holders under the Integrated Social Forestry (ISF) Program were assessed to evaluate their performance based on the completed CSC evaluation forms. A total of 101 CSCs were assessed, evaluated and have completed Individual Evaluation Forms and were qualified for renewal.

Another stakeholder clientele that received DENR technical assistance are those who govern the protected areas under the jurisdiction, this is the Protected Area Management Board (PAMB) members who decide matters relating to planning, peripheral protection and general Administration of the protected area. The DENR however, is closely coordinating and constantly providing guidance with the PAMB members through the Protected Area Superintendents (PASu) or the Assistant Protected Area Superintendents (APASu).

Concerning our coastal clientele, the ICM Planning workshop conducted. It is basically dem and-driven which means the DENR only provides technical assistance only when the LGU is committed to go through the planning workshop activities. All targeted LGUs were definitely Undertook, responded and committed to partnership with the DENR.

With the aid of the Information Education Campaign (IEC) activities conducted through various environmental celebrations, regular meetings, consultations and assistance are ways undertaken to maintain good working relationships with stakeholders. Assessment of Stakeholders' programs.

Executive Summary

This report was made for the **ANNUAL REPORT** for accomplishment of CENRO Tagbilaran City CY 2020. Considering the area coverage within the administrative jurisdiction and the threats of Covid-19 pandemic, this office has been able to accomplished it's targets for CY 2020 with the supervision of our CENR Officer Ariel N. Rica.

Some of the targets has been reduced and removed in support to the government response to the pandemic. One of the activities that has been affected is the repair and maintenance of CENR Office building. Hence, this is not the hindrance that were not been able to transfer to our new office location at Upper De La Paz, Cortes, Bohol last August 1, 2020.

Also, one of the targets that the office found it difficult to accomplished was the drafting and adoption of Forest Land Use Plan (FLUP). Since the identified Local Government Unit focuses on the COVID-19 pandemic. With that, the office initiate to hire three (3) technical writers as strategy to accomplished the said target.

Under Enforcement activity, forest protection and anti-illegal logging were intensified through conduct of mobile checkpoints, LAWIN patrol, and IEC to help regulate or lessen the illegal activities within the CENRO jurisdiction.

Conservation and Development Section (CDS) of CENRO Tagbilaran City extends extra effort in the over-all management of the 10 protected areas. Strengthening of the PAMB's was maintained through the conduct of quarterly meetings. Another activity is the population and habitat assessment and monitoring of tarsier conservation program in the municipalities of Balilihan, Loboc, and Sevilla, Bohol.

On the Coastal component, Coastal and Marine Ecosystem Management Program, also known as *Agos ng Buhay* or DENR Agos, aims to comprehensively manage, address, and effectively reduced the drivers and threats of degradation of the coastal and marine ecosystems in order to promote sustainability of ecosystem services, food security, and climate change resiliency for the benefits of the present and future generations. Activities include baseline assessment in Panglao Island Protected Seascape (PIPS), monitoring of coral reef and seagrass in Alburquerque-Loay-Loboc Protected Landscape and Seascape (ALLPLS), management effectiveness assessment (MEA) and maintenance and protection in ALLPLS and PIPS; knowledge, attitude and practice (KAP) survey in PIPS were among the activities conducted on the cited PA's.

With the extension of the Free Patent Law for Patent application, the Regulatory and Permitting Section had processed Agricultural Free Patent Application (FPA) with final action to 485 applications. For the Residential Free Patent application, a total of 810 applications were processed under the Regular fund. And a total of 468 subdivided residential lots surveyed with an equivalent area of 276,848 square meters.

As of CY 2020, CENRO Tagbilaran City has established plantations of more than 6,000 hectares for the Enhanced National Greening Program (e-NGP). For this year, this office focus on maintenance and protection activities of the 90.0 hectares 2018 rattan plantation in Omjon, Valencia, Bohol. Added to that, survey, mapping and planning for preparation of 2021 targets having a total of 500.0 has. For financial aspects, the office had an allotment budget of Php 37,642,410.00 including Central Office Based Fund whereas 100% has been obligated. Overall, all targets in CENRO Tagbilaran City for CY 2020 were successfully accomplished reaching more than 100% over the target.



A. General Administration and Support Services (GASS)

For almost thirty-three (33) years of being established, CENRO Tagbilaran City was previously located at New Capitol Site, Cogon District, Tagbilaran City and was transferred at Upper De La Paz Cortes, Bohol last August 1, 2020.

This office has seventy-three (73) regular employees including three (3) retirees and 1 deceased in which 27 were females and 46 males. On the other hand, one hundred thirty-one (131) were Job orders/ Contractuals assigned to CENRO support activities and special projects particularly PA Management Delineation, Survey and Registration of Protected Area Occupants (SRPAO) & Panglao Island Restoration and Rehabilitation Program (PIRRP).





B. Support to Operations (STO)

• Production and Dissemination of Technical and Popular Material in the Conservation and Development of Natural Resources including Environment Education 457 IEC materials were produced and distributed to academe, LGUs/ BLGUs, POs and other stakeholders within CENRO Tagbilaran City jurisdiction. There are 14 tarpaulins related to environment events, Women's Month and others were also produced and installed within the office premises.



In celebration of Environment Month last June 2020, CENRO Tagbilaran City created an exhibit with a theme "Protect Nature, Sustain Our Future".





A total of 8 lectures/forums were conducted to the academe in Clarin and Jagna, Bohol as well as the RSPL enumerators and Panglao LAWIN Patrollers facilitated by this CENRO spearheaded by Ms. Maria Corazon T. Colarines, Acting Admin Chief.

Formulation and Monitoring of ENR Sector Plans

This office had conducted series of workshop to 3 LGUs i.e Corella, Duero and Tagbilaran City for the formulation of their draft Forest Land Use Plan (FLUP). Hence, the attainment of the target activity was deferred due to COVID -19 pandemic protocol at the time of Enhanced Community Quarantine (ECQ) in which meetings and gatherings were prohibited. Strategy initiated by this office was to hire three (3) Technical Writers to prepare the draft plan in order to achieved the target by 4th quarter of this current year 2020. Also, three (3) municipalities specifically Jagna, Garcia-Hernandez and Sevilla adopted their finalized FLUP for CY 2020.





On the other hand, there were two Community Based Forest Management (CBFM) holders that had successfully conducted their updating: PO Tultugan Small Fishermen and Farmers Association (TSFFA) in Tultugan, Calape, Bohol and PO Badiang Farmers Forest Association (BFFA) in Badiang, Sikatuna, Bohol. The updating activities were conducted on the second and third quarter of this year respectively.

In addition, a total of 527.63 hectares were reported as of November 23, 2020 on resurveying and mapping of existing tenurial instrument hence upon further reviewed by the Regional Office based on current resurveyed and mapped data, 2 POs namely Agahay Nipa Planter's Association (AGNIPA) with an area of 56.25 has. in Agahay, Maribojoc, Bohol and Badiang Farmer's Forest Association (BFFA) with 66 has. in Badiang, Sikatuna, Bohol it's existing areas were classified as Alienable and Disposable Land thus the resurveyed area was not accepted. Therefore, the team was advised to replace the 2 POs to accomplish the 500.0 has. Target with POs Tultugan Small Fishermen and Farmer's Association (TSFFA) and Sta. Cruz Fishermen Association (SANFA). The table below shows the detailed data of the resurveying and mapping.

Furthermore, a total of 600 Certificate of Tree Plantation Ownership (CTPO) applied and issued were encoded in e FIS. Monthly accomplishment report of CENRO Tagbilaran City were submitted to PENRO Bohol and Regional Office thru email. CENRO Tagbilaran City updated 100% of foreshore lease data and inventoried/monitored forty (40) foreshore occupants out of 35 targets. Moreover, ENR programs, activities and projects monitoring/ evaluation are the targets for CY 2020. As of to date, a total of 8 reports submitted to PENRO that corresponds to the monitored/evaluated activities and programs.



C. Operations

Enhance National Greening Program

As of year 2020, DENR-CENRO Tagbilaran City has established plantations of more than 6,000 Hectares. At present, no target for plantation establishment were implemented. Thus, maintenance and protection activities which includes patrol works, ring weeding, remarking, application of fertilizer and replanting were conducted for the 90.0 has. 2018 established rattan plantation at Omjon, Valencia, Bohol contracted by the BLGU.



Likewise, a total of 480 jobs were generated on NGP activities while 2 Extension Officers were hired to assist the PO's in implementing the projects. In addition, survey, mapping and planning (SMP) were also conducted in preparation for CY 2021 establishment of e-NGP plantations where a total of 500.0 has. were surveyed covering 150.0 has for Bamboo and 350.0 has for Rattan plantation.

Moreover, production of bamboo planting stocks for CY 2021 commenced on the 4th quarter of the current year. As of to date, a total of 36,745 bamboo planting stocks (Botong, Kawayan tinik and Bagacay) were produced by 20 family beneficiaries from Sto. Rosario, Antequera, Candanas Garcia Hernandez, San Roque and Ubujan Sagbayan, Cansague Sur San Isidro, and Magsaysay Sierra Bullones, Bohol. Generally, common issues and concern in implementation of the program were the following:

- 1. Presence of livestock on NGP areas still identified as one of disturbance that caused seedlings mortality.
- 2. Prolonged dry season which contributes to the increase of mortality.
- 3. Survival rate on previous NGP plantations failed after third year from its establishment due to lack of budget for succeeding years intended for maintenance and protection.

Conduct of information, education and communication campaign (IEC) to the concerned PO's and barangays and imposition of penalty to those violators were actions taken initiated by this office.



Intensified Forest Protection and Anti-Illegal Logging

CENRO Tagbilaran City had intensified it's forest protection and anti-illegal logging activities within it's area of jurisdiction thru coordination and linkages with other law enforcement agencies i.e Philippine National Police (PNP) and National Bureau of Investigation (NBI) by conducting regular Mobile check point to monitor the transport of forest products coming in and out of the Province and LAWIN patrol.





These resulted to investigation of thirty-six (36) different violations committed with a total volume of 34,755.64 board feet of lumber/ timber of different species, 10 units of vehicles, 30 other tools and equipment, 79 pieces of finished and unfinished furnitures, 17 sacks of charcoal and 5 bundles of bamboo split. And a total of 17 cases were filed in court.



Likewise, a total of 37.918 cubic meter of apprehended forest products were directly turn over to the DENR depository area located at Bilar Nursery in Rajah Sikatuna Protected Landscape (RSPL), DENR Sub-station in San Pedro Duero, Bohol and DENR CENR Office Compound for safekeeping.



In addition, Enforcement and Monitoring Section conducted regular LAWIN patrol activity within the areas of Alejawan Cansuhay Anibongan River Watershed Forest Reserve (ACARWFR), Rajah Sikatuna Protected Landscape (RSPL), Loboc Watershed Forest Reserve (LWFR) and Mangrove Areas composed of 4 teams. A total of 691.63 kilometers had been accomplished out of the target of 480 kms.



On the other hand, EMS had conducted massive information and education campaign strategy to Local Chief Executives, Barangay Council, Association of Barangay Captains, Sangguniang Bayan, Forest occupants and Users. Forest Rangers where tasked to attend different meetings in the community to disseminate forest protection programs, objectives and updated forestry laws, rules and regulations including actual Law Enforcement Activities.

Forest communities were also involved in forest protection works through issuance of Memorandum of Partnership Agreement (MOPA) between the Department of Environment and Natural Resources and Taytay Eskaya Tribe and Cantaub Eskaya Tribe.

Moreover, creation of Multi-Sectoral Forest Protection Committee conducted to the BLGU Officials of barangay Behind the Clouds, Batuan Bohol was the other means to strengthened the forest protection by monitoring environmental issues in support of the DENR.



Improved Land Administration and Management

This office had processed and transmitted to PENRO a total of 810 Residential Free Patent Application, 485 Agricultural Free Patent under regular target while 608 additional targets under COBF, and 15 Special Patent. Additionally, 468 subdivided residential lots surveyed in the municipalities of Alburquerque, Antequera, Calape, Carmen, Clarin, Cortes, Duero, Dimiao, Loay, Lila, Maribojoc, Sierra Bullones, San Isidro, Sagbayan, Sagbayan, Sevilla, Valencia, Loon, Loboc, Tubigon and other areas within CENRO Tagbilaran City jurisdiction.

There were also 12 land cases had been resolved/decided while 2 disposition of land cases under Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR).

Other accomplishments include eight (8) appraisal foreshore lease application (FLA), 40 inventory of FLA, 3 updating of FLA and 4 actions taken on complaints thru 8888 related to land issues.

Further, Undersecretary for Field Operation, Enforcement and Muslim Affairs Jim O. Sampulna lead the lifting of suspension of titling in Panglao Island and distribution of title at Panglao Cultural Center dated March 6, 2020 together with Gov. Arthur C. Yap, First District Congressman Edgar M. Chatto, Hon. Mayor of Panglao Leonila P. Montero, Hon. Mayor of Dauis Meriam Sumaylo, LMB Director Atty. Emelyn Talabis, PENRO Officer Charlie E. Fabre, OIC-CENRO Officer Ariel N. Rica, personnel of DENR CENRO Tagbilaran City, personnel of Register of Deeds and the constituents of Panglao, Bohol.


Enhanced Biodiversity Conservation

PA's, Caves and Wetlands Management

Rajah Sikatuna Protected Landscape (RSPL) conducted survey and reg istration of protected area occupants in thirty-two (32) barangays within 7 municipalities comprising the PA. The population of protected area occupants was 1,431 individuals while PA users have a total of

2,715 individuals . Based on the results of 876 respondents interviewed, 99 are tenured migrants, 217 non tenured migrants and 560 are PA users.






Under PA management zone delineation, 2 protected areas (Rajah Sikatuna Protected Landscape and Alburquerque-Loay-Loboc Protected Landscape and Seascape) conducted the delineation. RSPL had accomplished a total of 596.89 kms. where 322.07 kms identified as Strict Protection Zone (SPZ) and 274.82 kms for Multiple Use Zone (MUZ). On the other hand, ALLPLS had delineated a total of 240.32 kms covering of 66.09 kms SPZ and 174.23 kms for MUZ.






Installation of monument at ALLPLS

CENRO Tagbilaran City has 10 protected areas comprising of 4 legislated PA's namely Alburquerque-Loay-Loboc Protected Landscape and Seascape (ALLPLS), Chocolate Hills Natural Monument (CHNM), Rajah Sikatuna Protected Landscape (RSPL) and Panglao Island Protected Seascape (PIPS) and 6 initial components, Alejawan-Cansuhay-Anibongan River Watershed Forest Reserve (ACARWFR), Cabilao-Sandingan Island Mangrove Swamp Forest Reserve/Wilderness Area (CSIMSFR/WA), Clarin Group of Island Wilderness Area (CGIWA), Loboc Watershed Forest Reserve (LWFR), Pangangan Island Mangrove Swamp Forest Reserve/Calape Group of Island Wilderness Area (PIMSFR/CGIWA) and Tubigon Group of Island Mangrove Swamp Forest Reserve/Wilderness Area (TGIMSFR/WA).





Regular activities conducted within the PA includes regular LAWIN patrolling to ensure effective protection of resources within the area. Most common threats include illegal cutting of trees, collection and hunting of wildlife, and improper disposal of garbage.

Apprehension and confiscation of illegal forest products and wildlife were among the actions taken of these office on the threats observed during patrolling.

Another activity is the conduct of communication, education and public awareness (CEPA) which accomplished a total of 4,807 IEC materials produced and distributed , 85 interpretative signs installed and posted and 110 public gatherings/campaigns attended thru barangay council and assembly meeting within the 10 PA's.









Meanwhile, implementation of Biodiversity Monitoring System (BMS) was conducted this year every semester during wet and dry season. But LWFR and CHNM continuously conducted its BMS quarterly accomplishing 24 BMS reports submitted to Regional Office thru the PENRO.

For PAMB operationalization, the 10 PA's has been able to conduct its PAMB meeting quarterly despite of the pandemic. Whereas, a total of 158 PAMB Resolutions had been submitted to Regional Office for approval of the PAMB Chairman. Below shows the number of PAMB meetings conducted and resolutions submitted by the 10 PA's.







RSPL also conducted monitoring on the impact of ecotourism program every semester based on the BMB Technical Bulletin No. 2014-03 with Socio Economic Survey and Trail Resource Assessment and Monitoring (TRAM) process. As a result, there are positive and negative impacts on ecotourism observed. On the positive side, the Peoples Organization and the entrepreneurs who have been engaged in the ecotourism business at RSPL as well as the BLGU and MLGU got their shares weekly from the activities availed by the guest. However, the negative impact that there were some guests are not nature oriented or cannot appreciate the beauty of nature even though briefing and orientation at the Information Center was made. They are just after on the leisure and enjoyment and they are irresponsible on their garbage specially the noise pollution that may affect and disturb the wildlife presence in the area.

Another activity conducted in RSPL is the maintenance of ecotourism facilities. Personnel assigned were regularly conducting their duties and responsibilities to maintain the cleanliness to serve to the visiting tourist. The following were the activities conducted under the maintenance of ecotourism activities of RSPL, to wit;

- Repainting and improvement of the RSPL Information Center
- Rehabilitation of the RSPL Entrance Station
- Weeding, watering of plants during dry season and cleaning of the parks vicinity
- Renovation of the Duplex Cottage
- Construction of the parking lot at the RSPL Information Center
- Gravelling of the slippery road around the park's vicinity
- Planting of ornamental plants and landscaping of the park's surrounding
- Installation of streetlights at the parks surroundings
- Treatment against termites to all ecotourism facilities.
- Wiping the window and walling glasses.
- Cleaning of the comfort room& bathroom.
- Repair and maintenance of fittings and other accessories in the comfort room & bathroom.



- Cleaning and sweeping the premises outside the building
- Change of beddings and other bed accessories used by the visitors.

- Washing of the used blankets, pillows and beddings.
- Cleaning the entire Plaza including the road of Magsaysay Park by cutting off the grass.
- Sweeping the fallen dry leaves around the ecotourism facilities and in the premises of the Park including the road.
- Maintenance of the access trail going to view deck and other tourist designated areas.
- Beautification of the Parks by planting of flowers.
- Maintenance/improvement of Water Supply.
- Protection and safeguarding the Ecotourism Facilities against burglars including illegal cutting of trees and illegal hunting of wildlife.
- Fixing of dripping roof of the ecotourism facilities.

For cave management program, the team had assessed Canlusong Cave 1 and Canlusong Cave 2 at Bugsoc, Sierra Bullones, Bohol. As a result, Canlusong Cave 1 was classified as Class II due to presence of bats and other biological resources while Canlusong Cave 2 classified as Class I due to bad odor from bat colonies.

A ten (10) year cave management plan of Cantijong Cave in Cansague Sur, San Isidro, Bohol was prepared through the joint effort of BLGU of Cansague Sur, MLGU of San Isidro, PO Cansague Norte and Sur Bamboo Planters Multi-Purpose Cooperative (CANSBAPMUCO), PENRO Bohol and CENRO Tagbilaran City pursuant to R.A 9072 or



the National Caves and Cave Resources Management and Protection Act of 2001 intended for the management, conservation and protection of the cave.



For this year, cave management plan was implemented in Duwangon Cave at Zamora, Bilar, Bohol. Quarterly reports on the highlights of cave management plan status was prepared and submitted to the Regional Office thru the PENRO.

For Inland **Wetland Management Program**, profiling of priority wetland as well as preparation of it's management plan was conducted at Lake Tupas-Viga, Antequera, Bohol. The lake is within Alienable and Disposable (A & D) land. There is currently no conservation and management activities in the area except for the Joint Resolution No. 1 Series of 2018 formulated by barangay Tupas and Viga to protect the lake.

Lake Tupas-Viga generally aims to become a wetland-developed ecotourism destination pursuing sustainable development managed by the responsible stakeholders. In order to fulfill this goal without degrading the wetland's nature, a lake assessment and planning workshop were conducted for the preparation of the wetland management plan in close coordination of the

Department of Environment and Natural Resources, Barangay Local Government Unit of Tupas and Viga, Municipal Planning and Development Officer, Municipal Tourism Officer, Sangguniang Barangay of Antequera and People's Organization of Farmers, Women's and Fisherfolks. The Wetland Management Plan was endorsed to Regional Office through PENRO on September 22, 2020.

Wildlife Conservation

Target on the expansion of tarsier conservation program particularly the conduct of monitoring of Philippine Tarsier population and their habitat in municipalities of Balilihan, Loboc and Sevilla, Bohol is much vital for determining trends of its population in the wild and likewise provide an important tool for directing conservation efforts and policies to sustain viable population of this species. Monthly reports were submitted to the Regional Office on the activities undertaken i.e. coordination to LGU's and BLGU's concerned; population assessment and monitoring where a total of




92 Philippine tarsier individuals were recorded; habitat monitoring, patrol and protection works which the team observed as possible threats to the survival of these species (upland cultivation and tree cuttings); focus group discussion (FGD) conducted in the 12 barangays covered; and communication education and public awareness (CEPA) campaign on R.A 9147 or the Wildlife Resources Conservation and Protection Act and Presidential Proclamation 1030 "Declaring the Philippine Tarsier as a Specially Protected Faunal Species of the Philippines".

Wildlife Rescue Center in RSPL was maintained to serve as temporary shelter for the rescued/turnedover animals and wildlife. Regular feeding, cleaning and other maintenance were conducted. Below shows the report of captive animals in the DENR Designated Wildlife Rescue Center for CY 2020.

Waterbird Census were conducted in Cabilao Island and Panglao Island Monitroing site. Common birds observed in Cabilao Island includes Rufous Night Heron *N. caledonicus*, Little Egret *E. garzetta*, Little Heron, Barred Rail *R. torquatus*, Common Sandpiper Actitis *hypoleucos* and Whiskered Tern Chdonias hybridus while in Panglao Island, Eastern Reef Egret *Egretta sacra*, Chinese (Swinhoe's) Egret *E. eulophotes*, Little Egret *E. garzetta*, Little Heron, Redshank T. totanus and Common Sandpiper Actities hypoleucos were commonly seen in the area.


❖ Scaling Up of Coastal and Marine Ecosystems Management Program

Baseline Assessment in Panglao Island Protected Seascape (PIPS)

Habitat Mapping and Baseline Assessment was conducted in Panglao Island Protected Seascape (PIPS). Coastal habitats were surveyed and mapped using a handheld GPS incorporating GIS and field validation activities to determine the size of the habitats within the area. Standardized method stipulated in Technical Bulletin 2019-"Technical Guide on **Biodiversity** Assessment and Monitoring System for Coastal and Marine Ecosystems" such as Photo-transect, Fish Visual Census (FVC), Belt transect and transect-quadrat technique were used to obtain data from the coral reef. associated reef fish, macroinvertebrates' community and seagrass ecosystem. The coral reef assessment covers the four (4) coastal barangays inside PIPS namely Brgy. Danao, Dolio, Looc and Poblacion.



Meanwhile, assessment in seagrass beds were conducted in seven (7) barangays inside PIPS namely Brgy. Danao, Doljo, Looc and Poblacion of Municipality of Panglao and barangay Totolan, Poblacion and Songculan of Municipality of Dauis. Results of the survey and mapping activity showed a total of 51.92 hectares of Coral Reef and 1, 973.07 hectares of seagrass beds.




Monitoring of Coral Reef and Seagrass in Alburquerque- Loay- Loboc Protected Landscape and Seascape (ALLPLS)

Monitoring of coral reef and seagrass was conducted in Alburquerque-Loay-Loboc Protected Landscape and Seascape. The total coral reef area of ALLPLS based on actual survey has 59.67 hectares in which 29.3 hectares are reef area of Albur while 30.37 hectares are coral reef of Loay. In terms of seagrass, ALLPLS has a total area of 87.78 hectares with Albur and Loay having 29.48 hectares and 58.3 hectares, respectively. Result shows decline on the average seagrass percent cover from 50.75% (2018) to 36.12% (2020). The condition of seagrass ecosystem dropped down from GOOD condition in 2018 to FAIR condition category in 2020 survey.



Overall results of the reveal declining trends of coral reef, reef fishes, macro-invertebrates seagrass beds condition. The potential drivers of change to these resources are pressures from anthropogenic (damages induced bν human activities) and natural (typhoon, predation). Hence, a management strategy should be tailored focus on addressing the declining trends; annual monitoring should conducted to evaluate the efficiency

of the strategies; and IEC must be conducted to all local residents so disseminate information about the coastal ecosystem.



Management Effectiveness Assessment (MEA) in ALLPLS and PIPS

Moreover, Management Effectiveness Assessment (MEA) was conducted in ALLPLS **PIPS** using and the Management Effectiveness Tracking Tool (METT) adopted from the World Commission on Protected Areas (WCPA), which focuses on six elements of effective management as specified in the BMB technical bulletin 2018-05. To adhere with the GCQ protocols in group gatherings due to the current pandemic, the respondents were clustered and schedule at different time. ALLPLS assessment concurred last May 18-19 & 21, 2020 while respondents from PIPS took the



assessment last August 27 and September 02, 2020, they scheduled in a morning and afternoon arrangement. A total of 20 and 10 respondents from ALLPLS and PIPS, respectively, participated in this activity. They are PAMB members composed of the respective Punong Barangays, Municipal Planning and Development Coordinator (MPDC), representatives from BEMO office, PNP-PEDO, PA staff and APASu of both PA.

Overall, the average score for ALLPLS using the METT is 61% which denotes GOOD Management Effectiveness Status. Based from this assessment the element with highest average score is CONTEXT (100%) while the component with lowest average score is INPUT with 54.4%. Since, there was no previously available data to identify the trend of PA management using the METT tool, this result would serve as the baseline data for ALLPLS. While the average score for PIPS using the tool is 64% which denotes GOOD Management Effectiveness Status. The same result indicates the element CONTEXT (100%) has the highest average score while the component with lowest average score is INPUT (55.4%). PLANNING has an average score of 68.3% while PROCESS gained 66.1%.

Maintenance and Protection Activity in ALLPLS and PIPS

Every month, coastal area of ALLPLS and PIPS were being patrolled by the CMEMP team. It was observed that the mangrove areas of these PA's are receivers of garbage especially in the areas where there are settlements. Some of the garbage was collected during patrolling, meanwhile garbage in bulk size was documented and the observation of the team was relayed to the Punong Barangay so that official will also organize localized clean-up drive to remove all the debris and maintain the condition of the mangrove areas.

• Social Marketing and Mobilization / Communication Education and Public Awareness (CEPA) – Knowledge, Attitude and Practice (KAP) Survey in PIPS

The conduct of the KAP survey was based on the prescribed standard methods stipulated on the DENR-BMB Technical Bulletin No. 2017-10 and the DENR-BMB Technical Bulletin No. 2017-17 "Supplementary guideline on the conduct of the Knowledge, Attitude and Practice (KAP) survey for the Coastal and Marine Ecosystems Management Program (CMEMP)". The survey respondents were grouped into: 1. Local Chief Executives / LGU Key Officials, 2. Household heads (usually fishermen), 3.

Local Organizations, 4. Students / Youth (15 to 24 years old) 5. Local business owners 6. School heads and teachers.

In general, most local chief executive (85.7%) are aware that their barangay belongs to Panglao Island Protected Landscapes and Seascapes (PIPS). Meanwhile, student has the least knowledge on barangays under PIPS. In terms of perception on biodiversity, coastal and marine ecosystem, about 61.4% of the respondents have the knowledge on biodiversity in which 64% knows the importance of mudflats, 70% knows the importance of mangroves, 73% knows the importance of seagrass beds, and 77% knows the importance of Coral Reefs. With regard to the perceptions on marine pollution and climate change and its effect, high percent of respondents (82%) knows about marine pollution and 79% of them believe people directly contributed to it. Also, 69% of respondents knows about climate change and in the same manner believe that people directly contribute to its catastrophic effects (84%).

A greater percentage of respondents (93%) agree that it is necessary to protect the various ecosystems such as corals, seagrass beds, mudflats, and mangroves. Majority of the respondents (92%) show willingness to protect the ecosystems since they find it as an obligation. Also, 92% of them want to show to their family and relatives the ways to conserve and protect our biodiversity. Around 88% of respondents are conscious of the impacts of the climate change. Likewise, 89% of them support the government in protecting our biodiversity. However, there are still people (59%) who are dependent on knowledgeable person in protecting biodiversity. Moreover, about 39% respondents blame others for the calamities that are happening because of their irresponsible actions. On the negative aspects, around 57% of the people do not contribute to the country's biodiversity conservation, and 45% of them tend to disregard critical issues about biodiversity.

In terms of practices of the respondents relating to the environment, 92% of the answer never cut mangroves for charcoal production. Besides, 82% of respondents contributed to the conservation and protection of biodiversity by practicing proper waste management. The use of tin cans, plastic straws, plastic bottles, and other plastic materials has 65% response, followed by joining of tree planting activities and clean-up activities in the community (64%). About 63% of the respondents advocate and participate in activities in conservation and protection of biodiversity. According to the results, 56% of the people said they never throw garbage such as plastic straws, candy wrappers, plastics, etc. anywhere especially when they cannot see garbage bins nearby. Admittedly, 48% of them take photos of beautiful natural scenic and post them on social media to encourage friends and relatives to visit. Only 43% of the respondents don't directly harvest fish and other resources from the ocean.

The top three (3) most effective media for spreading awareness about the status of the country's biodiversity are television (89%), internet such as social media (58%) and radio (53%). Other means that are part of the top five (5) medium that the respondents would like to be informed about the country's biodiversity are key persons from DENR & LGU, and newspaper.

Green Fins Implementation

Green Fins is a conservation initiative designs to work with dive and snorkel operators to promote a set of standards for sustainable environmentally dive and snorkeling tourism activities. One of the activity of Green Fins is a yearly assessment of dive centers who are member of Green Fins. The assessment involves free environmental trainings to staff of a dive center and a normal day dive tour together with guests to assess them on how responsible dive operators they are and come up with feed backing to address issues they have encountered during the assessment. However, due to pandemic, dive shops and resorts that offers dive tours stopped catering tourist because of the restrictions on travel, thus the target assessment was realigned to production and



distribution of IEC materials. 90 IEC materials in a form of flyers and cloth tarpaulin were produced that were given to the member dive shops. These materials are designed to disseminate knowledge on the "Guidelines to the Code of Conduct" and other relevant information on how to become a responsible diver.

Technical Assistance to LGU's

This year, Municipality of Tubigon is the identified municipality to be provided with technical assistance of CMEMP by way of formulation of Integrated Coastal Management Plan.

The first integrated coastal management plan of the town was in 2013, it is the product of the collective efforts of the Technical Working Group composed mainly of LGU, government line agencies, non-government and people's organizations, and private sector through a series of research, planning workshops and consultations. A draft plan was formulated however because of unprecedented event, the 7.2 earthquake that shook Bohol on that year, proceeding of the plan was not prioritized. Hence, this year the CMEMP team coordinated with the MENRO Office and Municipal Agriculture's office to set meetings to update the activities identified in the plan. The draft ICM Plan was formulated and submitted to the Regional Office for enhancement and it will be presented to the LGU-Tubigon.

Biodiversity Friendly Enterprise (BDFE) Monitoring

In 2017, Financial Assistance worth of Php. 200, 000.00 was given to Fisherfolks of Las Salinas Sur Association (FLASSA) of Loay and Danao United Fisher's Association (DUFA) of Panglao for their proposed "Establishment of Bangus Fish Cage", Eastern Poblacion Fishemen's Association (EPO) for their proposed "Fish Aggregating device or "Payaw". In 2018, another financial assistance was awarded to Macaas Fishers Association (MFA) in Tubigon for their proposed "Kayak Ecotourism" and soap and detergent production worth of Php. 248, 000.00. DUFA was awarded with Php. 122, 000.00 for their proposed "Kayak Ecotourism" and EPO was given Php. 15, 000.00 for mobilization for their proposed "Fish Tienda" as their sustained BDFE.

The above mentioned BDFE enterprises were target for monitoring to know the status of the enterprise and to able to identify what maybe the preferable technical assistance needed further by

the PO's to develop and improved their respective BDFEs. Questionnaire devised by Regional office together with the BDFE form 2 from BMB Technical Bulletin 2017-11 were used in the monitoring last February 11, 12 and 20, 2020. Another monitoring was conducted on the 3rd quarter of the year, it was facilitated last September 14, 16 & 19, 2020 using structured questionnaire (BDFE Financial Monitoring Tool), from BMB.

Information state that three (3) POs are gaining profit from their respective BDFE except for FLASSA, their enterprise was not pursued due to location constraint of their proposed enterprise. Only EPFA recorded increased in number of members involved in their BDFE and no reported increase of PO assets acquired during the monitoring, however it was noted that the materials used in their BDFE were continuously maintained. No reported increase in PO membership but the increased role of women in the enterprise was seen in DUFA, EPO and MFA, wives of PO members were in charge of selling of harvested fish and as receiving clerk who entertains visitors and facilitate their eco-tourism activity. For environmental indicator, POs assessed have good record on biophysical assessment

based on the contribution to biodiversity conservation and environmental awareness hence the three (3) organizations have scores of 1. MFA have scheduled coastal clean-up and mangrove planting within the kayak route in order to rehabilitate the mangroves and improved the aesthetic beauty of the area.

Water Quality Monitoring

One of the components of CMEMP is the development of management strategies for the establishment and strengthening of NIPAS MPAs. The conduct of water quality

monitoring and assessment is the identified activity in the implementation of this program. As prescribed on the Memorandum 2020-423 "Guidelines on Water Quality Monitoring Assessment", the WQMA should be done once per season (wet & dry) hence last June the team collected water samples in all coastal barangays within Albur-Loay-Loboc Protected Landscape and Seascape for the dry season sampling. The areas where the samples gathered were made permanent monitoring station and was revisited last November to collect water samples for the wet season sampling.

A total of 22 sampling stations was established in ALLPLS, 13 stations in coastal area of Loay, 6 sampling areas in Albur and 4 station within the Loboc river of the PA. Collection of sampling was done by the CMEMP team, EMB representative, BEMO representative and PHO personnel. The parameters taken from the samples are; total coliform, fecal coliform, water temperature, Dissolve Oxygen (DO), conductivity, total dissolve solids, salinity and PH. Samples collected was taken to PHO laboratory for fecal analysis.

Four of the sampling sites are within the strict protection zone of the PA thus, the water classification is Class SA and the rest of the sampling sites are within the multiple use zone and water body is classified as Class SB.

Special Programs/Projects (Panglao Island Restoration and Rehabilitation Program)


Panglao Island Restoration and Rehabilitation Program (PIRRP) was funded anchored to the marching orders from President Rodrigo Roa Duterte, through the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) Secretary Roy Cimatu to address and monitor the different activities and promote sustainability on the island. Panglao Island comprises of nineteen (19) coastal barangays—nine (9) barangays in Panglao (Tangnan, Bil-isan, Looc, Doljo, Poblacion, Danao, Tawala, Bolod and Libaong) and ten (10) barangays in Dauis (Dao, San Isidro, Biking, Catarman, Mayacabac, Poblacion, Totolos, Songculan, Tabalong and Bingag). Fourteen (14) barangays were targeted for inventory/identification of occupants/structure within legal easement since 5 barangays namely, Danao, Tawala, Bolod,

Libaong (Panglao) and Bingag (Dauis) have been surveyed last 2018 and 2019. The table below shows the data on inventoried structure within legal easement in Dauis and Panglao.

The IEC Campaign aims to inform the different stakeholders of the objectives of the Panglao Island Restoration and Rehabilitation Program (PIRRP) and to educate the stakeholders of the exisiting laws and policies concerning environmental protection like RA 9003 or the Solid Waste Management Act, RA 9275 or the Clean Water Act and RA 8749 or the Clean Air Act.

Also, tarpaulins that contain information about the Municipal Ordinance of Panglao on Solid Waste Management which is Municipal Ordinance No. 4 Series of 2016 were installed along the coastal of Panglao Island.



Moreover, a total of four technical conferences of easement occupants were conducted on August 11, October 20, November 24 and November 26, 2020.

Furthermore, 496 establishments in Panglao, Bohol and 771 establishments in Panglao, Bohol were inventoried/identificatied occupants/ structures outside the legal easement. Please see attached annex on the results of the inventory.

Monitoring and inspection of Solid Waste Management was conducted as part of the pollution control and prevention. LAWIN patrollers monitored the condition of the Material Recovery Facilities of the 17 barangays (6 brgys. in Dauis, Bohol and 10 brgys. in Panglao, Bohol) and the frequency of garbage collection/ disposal of the respective municipalities to Alburquerque Cluster Sanitary Landfill.

42 coastal clean-ups were conducted in the Panglao Island from May 2020 to November 2020 wherein a total of 2,483 participated the said activity with 984 trash bags were filled weighted 8,243.78 kgs of trash collected.

Additionally, baseline assessment and monitporing of coral reefs and seagrass beds on areas outside NIPAS PA was conducted to determine the effect and impact of environmental pressures (improper solid waste management, inadequate sewage, and septage including wastewater and other tourism-derived pressures) on coral reefs and seagrass. The team was composed DENR personnel, LGU, BLGU, BEMO, OPA, BFAR and PNP.

Coral reefs assessment has been conducted in barangay Bingag, Tabalong, Poblacion and Mayacabac, Dauis, Bohol while seagrass beds assessment has been conducted in barangay Bingag, Catarman, Mayacabac and Songculan. Commonly observed coral life forms were non-acropora branching and non-acropora massive while commonly observed species in seagrass were *Thalassia hemprichii*, *Halodule uninervis*, *Enhalus acoroides* and *Cymodocea rotundata*. The data gathered during the assessments were recorded and are subject for consolidation once the assessments are conducted on all barangays under PIRRP.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The 2020 Annual Accomplishment Report (AAR) highlights the accomplishment of the Environmental Management Bureau – Region 7 as of December 29, 2020. All information within the AAR were based on all the collected data from different Sections and Divisions. It is the purpose of this report to inform all the personnel of the status of all programs, projects, and activities (PPAs) of the Agency and to determine the appropriate action/response needed.

This AAR presents the Physical Accomplishment of the Clearance and Permitting Division (CPD) and the Environmental Monitoring and Enforcement Division (EMED, and the Financial Accomplishment from the Finance Section. A summary of the abovementioned section are as follows:

For the year 2020, the Clearance and Permitting Division (CPD) has issued a total of 2,522 permits which is 188% above the annual target set at 1338 permits issuance. Out of the permits issued, 1381 (54.8%) were from the Toxic Chemicals and Hazardous Waste Permitting Section, followed by 833 (33%) from the Air and Water Permitting Section, and 308 (12.2%) from the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) Section.

For the Environmental Enforcement and Monitoring Division (EMED) have conducted a total of 5630 monitoring and survey activities which is 40% above the target set at 4030 firm monitoring and survey. Out of the monitoring activities, 1232 (28.14%) firm monitoring came from Air Monitoring followed by Hazardous Waste Generator Monitoring at 1433 (25.45%) firms and then Water Monitoring at 1107 (19.66%) firms while other monitoring activities which are composed of water body monitoring, air quality monitoring and LGU compliance monitoring constitute 33% of the annual target.

On the Financial aspect, the Office reached a 98% Budget Utilization Rate (BUR) as of December 29, 2020 from the obligated payment using the Maintenance and Other Operation Expenses (MOOE) and Capital Outlay (CO) funds. The BUR for the MOOE is at 98% while the utilization rate under the CO is at 99% as of December 29, 2020.

1. Physical Accomplishment

The Physical Accomplishments details the actual physical accomplishments of the Agency compared to the targets set by EMB-Central Office for 2020. Most physical accomplishments are attributed from the Clearance and Permitting Division and from the Environmental Monitoring and Enforcement Division. Due to the Corona Virus Disease – 2019 (COVID19), various strategies were implemented to meet the required target of the regional office per mandated laws.

I. Clearance and Permitting Division (CPD)

The Clearance and Permitting Division (CPD) is the division responsible in the issuance of environmental permits to industrial facilities and commercial establishments. The table below shows the sections under this division and their respective permits issued.

For FY 2020, the CPD has been tasked to accomplish a total of 1,338 Permit Issuances collectively from the above sections. The target value was assigned by the Environmental Management Bureau – Central Office (EMB-CO) which is equal to the target for FY 2019. The target value was also kept at minimum since the inflow of applications were client driven.

As of December 29, 2020, the total cumulative permits issued by the CPD was at 2,522 permits or equivalent to a 188% of its annual target. Comparing from the previous year, a 24% decrease in the

issuance of permits were recorded which could be attributed to the implementation of lockdown and quarantine protocols leading to non-operation of establishments and facilities.




Figure 1. Summary of Permits and Clearances Vs. No. of Permits Issued




Figure 2. Number of Permit Issued vs Type of Permits for the last 5-Years

Figure 1 illustrates the magnitude of the permit issued versus their respective type of permit. It can be noted that the most issued permit is the Hazardous Waste Generators ID while the least issued permit is the Chemical Control Order — Registration for Ozone Depleting Substances (CCO-R-ODS). Figure 2 presents the number of permits issued for the last 5 years. It can be noted that most of the permits issued in the past 5-years have an increasing trend specially in the issuance of Hazardous

Waste Generators ID. Discussion on each section will be provided on the later sections of the 2020 AAR.

Environmental Impact Assessment Section

Presidential Decree 1586 (PD 1586) or the Philippine Environmental Impact Statement System (PEISS) was established to require of all agencies and instrumentalities of the national government, including government-owned or controlled corporations, as well as private corporations, firms and entities for every proposed project and undertaking which significantly affect the quality of the environment¹ to undergo the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) process.



The Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) Section is responsible in issuing the Certificate of Non-Coverage (CNC) and the Environmental Compliance Certificate

(ECC) for projects that have the potential to pose significant impact to the environment.

It can be observed that the EIA Section has exceeded their annual target for ECC and CNC at 139% and 947%, respectively. The Certificate on Non-Coverage is a nonmandatory clearance issued for projects below the ECC threshold. The high issuance of such clearance could be attributed to the requirement of other National Government Agencies (NGAs) to secure environmental permits for their projects.




Figure 3. 5-Year Data of ECC Issuances (2016-2020)

In a 5-year comparison (fig. 3), ECC issued in 2020 is lower compared to 2019 by around 20% but higher than 2016 to 2018. This decrease could be attributed as an effect of COVID19 where activities have been delayed or put-on hold. Issuance of ECC continue despite of the series of lockdown due to the implementation of Online Permitting System.

ii. Air and Water Permitting Section

The Air and Water Permitting Section is responsible for the issuance of Permit to Operate (PO) mandated under R.A. 8749, Wastewater Discharge Permit (DP), and the Pollution Control Officer (PCO) Accreditation Certificate mandated under R.A. 9275.

a. Permit to Operate (PO) Air Pollution Source Equipment and Control Device

Under the Philippine Clean Air Act of 1999 (R.A. 8749), entities operating an Air Pollution Source Equipment/Installation (APSE/I) and its Air Pollution Control Device (APCD) are required to secure a Permit to Operate (PO) for the usage of such equipment.

Table 3 presents the annual target versus the actual accomplishment of the section in the issuance of PO. For 2020, 165 and 291 POs were new and renewal applications, respectively.




Figure 6. 5-Year Data of PO Issuances (2016-2020)

Figure 6 presents the comparison of permit issuance for the past 5 years. For the issuance of new PO, it can be observed that both 2018 and 2019 has a higher permit issuance compared to 2016, 2017 and the year 2020 recorded as the lowest. For 2020, the decrease in the new PO application could be attributed to the closure of commercial establishment as an effect of the COVID19 pandemic.

The decreased PO Renewal for 2020 can also be attributed to the effect of COVID19 which is the lowest in the past 5 years.

b. Wastewater Discharge Permit (DP)

The Philippine Clean Water Act of 2004 (R.A. 9275) regulates the discharge of wastewater to any bodies of land or water in the country. All establishments discharging wastewater are required to secure a Discharge Permit (DP) and ensure that their wastewater pass the effluent standard as stated in DAO 2016-008.

For 2020, the section has accomplished the required target as presented in table 4 below:




Figure 7. 5-Year Data of DP Issuances (2016 – 2020)

As presented in the table above, it can be observed that both New and Renewal DP issuance exceeded their annual target by 830% and 153%, respectively. Comparing the DP issuance in the last 5 years, as presented in Fig. 7, the following can be noted:

- 1. Discharge Permit issuance for New and Renewal is highest in 2020 since 2016 to 2020.
- 2. There is an increasing trend in DP renewal from 2017 to 2020 which is attributed to the area clustering implemented in the region.
- 3. The increase in discharge permit issuance could be attributed to the online permitting system implemented by the Bureau.

iii. Toxic Substances and Hazardous Waste Permitting

The function of the Toxic Chemical and Hazardous aste Management (TCHW) Permitting Section is to evaluate and process permit, and clearance applications mandated under R.A. 6969 or the Toxic Substances and Hazardous and Nuclear Wastes Control Act of 1990. The Section is incharge for the issuances of permits and clearances for the importation, manufacture, rocessing, handling, storage, transportation, sale, distribution, use



and disposal of all unregulated chemical substances and mixtures in the Region, including the entry, even in transit as well as the keeping or storage and disposal of hazardous wastes into the Region for whatever purpose.

a. Toxic Chemical Management

Under the Toxic Chemical Management, substances listed under the Chemical Control Order (CCO) and Priority Chemical List (PCL) are highly regulated and require extensive monitoring.

DENR-EMB issues Chemical Control Orders (CCOs) that prohibit, limit, or regulate the use, manufacture, import, transport, processing, storage, possession, and wholesale of those priority chemicals that DENR-EMB determined to be regulated, phase-out, or banned because of the serious risks they pose to public health, workplace, and environment. At any one time, DENR-EMB may

impose a regulation, a phase-out plan, or a ban on a chemical or chemical substance when it determines that such action is necessary².

Meanwhile, the Priority Chemicals List (PCL) is a list of existing and new chemicals that DENR-EMB-CO has determined to a potentially pose unreasonable risk to public health, workplace, and the environment³.

Chemicals and chemical substances that pose an unreasonable risk to public health or the environment are potentially subject to CCOs. Each year, after due consideration to industrial needs, the health and environment risks, the Philippine commitment to international and regional treaties and conventions, and DENR-EMB's capabilities and resources to manage the controlled chemicals, EMB-CO may determine what chemicals listed as priority (PCL) should be regulated, controlled, or phase out.




Figure 10. 5-Year Data of SQI Clearance Issuance

As presented on the table above, the Small Quantity Importation (SQI) Clearance, CCO-Registration, CCO-Importation Clearances and CCO - ODS have exceeded their annual target.

The Small Quantity

Importation (SQI) Clearance is issued for the importation of chemicals not registered under the Philippine Inventory of Chemical and Chemical Substances (PICCS) and should not exceed 1000kg per chemical annually.

Looking at the Figure. 10, the SQI issuance in the last 5 years is increasing from 2016 to 2019. However, for 2020, SQI issuance decrease around 5% or 14 permits compared to 2019. This indicates that there is a slight decrease in importation of new chemicals in the region.

Companies using regulated chemicals under the CCO are required to register as to register under DENR-EMB for the importation, manufacture, processing, handling, storage, transportation, sale,

distribution, and use of such substances. Upon Registration, the Company can now apply for the CCO-Importation Clearance for the importation of the regulated substance or chemical. Companies that use any of the chemical under CCO are required to apply for CCO Clearance. Such chemicals are as follows:

- Mercury and Mercury Compounds
- Cyanide and Cyanide Compounds
- Asbestos
- Polychlorinated Biphenyls
- Ozone Depleting Substances
- Lead and Lead Compounds
- Arsenic and Arsenic Compounds




Figure 11. 5-Year Data of the CCO Clearance Issued

Based on the 5-Year Data comparison on the issuance of CCOs, it can be seen in Fig. 11 the following:

- 1. The year 2020 recorded the lowest CCO-Registration issuance from 2016 to 2020.
- 2. There is a slight decrease in the CCO Importation Clearance issued in 2020 compared to 2019 which could be attributed to the restriction of transboundary logistics and closure of some firms.
- 3. There is a slight increase in the registration of CCO ODS which means that the region has a new firm which requires a CCO-Registration for Ozone Depleting Substances (ODS).

b. Hazardous Waste Management

The role of the Hazardous Waste Management is to implement Title III (Hazardous Waste Management) of DAO 29, the Implementing Rules and Regulations of RA 6969 and DAO 2013-22, its Procedural Manual.

Hazardous Waste are substances which presents either:

Substances that are without any safe commercial, industrial and agricultural or economic
usage and are shipped, transported or brought from another country of origin for dumping or
disposal into or in transit through any part of the territory of the Philippines; and

By-products, side-products, process residues, spent reaction media, contaminated plant or equipment or other substances from manufacturing operations and as consumer discards of manufactured products which presents unreasonable risk and/or injury to health and safety to the people or the environment4.

For 2020, the section has reached and exceeded their annual target for Hazardous Waste Management as presented in Table 6. The section has issued 720 Hazardous Waste Generators Registration ID (HWID) and a total of 342 of Permit to Transport (PTT). In terms of their physical accomplishment, the section has achieved 465% and 152% for Hazardous Waste Generators ID and Permit to Transport, respectively.




Figure 12. 5-Year Data of the HWID and PTT Issued

Based on the 5-Year data comparison, as presented on Figure 12, there is a decrease in the total issuance of HWID and PTT for the year 2020 compared to 2019 but can still be considered high compared to 2016 to 2018 issuance.

It can be assumed that due to the closure of non-essential establishments and factories during the lockdown in the region, there is less waste generator this requires PTT while there are less establishment operating to apply for a HWID

II. Environmental Monitoring and Enforcement Division

The Environmental Monitoring and Enforcement Division (EMED) is responsible for the enforcement of EMB mandated environmental laws and the inspection and monitoring of firms and industries to their compliance to the Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRRs) of environmental laws including the conditions stipulated in their environmental permits and clearances.

For 2020, the Division have conducted a total of 4009 monitoring activities throughout the region. Below are the accomplishments of the Sections under the EMED.




Figure 13. Summary of Monitoring Activity Vs. Firms Monitored

It can be noted that most activities under the EMED belonged to the Air Monitoring followed by the Hazardous Waste Generator Monitoring then the Water Monitoring.

I. Air and Water Monitoring Section

As the enforcement arm of the Air and Water Permitting Section (AWPS) of the CPD, the EMED Air and Water Monitoring Section (AWMS) is in-charge of monitoring the compliance of industries to the Implementing Rules and Regulation and other policies under the Clean Air and Clean Water Act. The Section also conduct validation monitoring and compliance monitoring activity to firms with Environmental Compliance Certificate (ECC).

a. Air and Water Monitoring

It is the function of the AWMS to conduct survey and monitoring activities for the enforcement of the Clean Air Act and Clean Water Act. Survey activities are conducted to inspect and determine if industrial and commercial firms have secured: (1) a Permit to Operate (PO) for their Air Pollution Source Equipment/Installation (APSE/I) and its Air Pollution Control Device (APCD) and (2) a wastewater Discharge Permit (DP) for the authorized disposal of their wastewater. On the other hand, monitoring activity is conducted to determine the compliance of the firms to the conditions stipulated in the issued PO and DP including the submission of quarterly self-monitoring reports (SMRs). In addition, the AWMS also conduct monitoring to Private Emission Testing Centers (PETCs), to check the validity of their permits including the equipment used for emission testing.

For 2020, the section has conducted a total of 2814 monitoring activities which is equivalent to 145% to their annual target. Despite the travel restrictions and the closure of some industries and firms during the community quarantine as an effect of COVID19, the monitoring team was able to meet the target by conducting document review and evaluation based on the submitted Self-Monitoring Report (SMR) by the stakeholder and permit holders. The section was able to implement an online method of accepting SMR online thru the EMB Integrated Information System (IIS).

For Air Quality, the section has surveyed and identified 352 firms for possible possession of air pollution source equipment (APSE) while the section also monitored 1232 firms with firms for their compliance to permit conditions and the implementing rules and regulation of the Clean Air Act.




Figure 15. 5-Year Data of Air Survey and Monitoring

Comparing the 5-Year data presented above, can be noted that Air Survey has an increasing trend since 2016. This means that more establishments are being surveyed to ensure no illegal operation of APSE. Meanwhile, for 2020, an increase in firms monitored was achieved compared to 2019 accomplishment which indicated that new firms who applied for a Permit to Operate have been included in the list for monitoring.

For Water Quality, the section has surveyed and monitored a total of 458 and 649 firm, respectively. The physical accomplishment is equivalent to 194% and 165% firms survey and monitored, respectively. The high accomplishment can be attributed to the focus monitoring of Eco-tourism areas for their compliance to R.A. 9275 or the Philippine Clean Water Act of 2005. Any establishment that has a potential to discharge untreated wastewater are required to treat their wastewater and secure a valid discharge permit and ensure that their wastewater is within the allowable standards as indicated in DAO 2016-008.




Figure 17. 5-Year Data on the Water Survey and Monitoring

Comparing the 5-Year Data of Water Quality Survey and Monitoring, it can be noted in Figure 17 that 2020 has the highest number of firms surveyed while 2018 and 2020 has the highest number of firms monitored. This increase could be attributed to the efficient and effective use of the online SMR system which reduced the time in the conduct of actual field survey and monitoring.

b. Hazardous Waste Management

The Hazardous Waste Management covers the monitoring and survey of firms for their proper transport and disposal of hazardous materials. Firms must have a Hazardous Waste Generators ID to determine the type of waste they are generating and determine the semi-annual volume of waste generated. In 2020 all targets & activities of the section has been accomplished and exceeded the 100% mark, as presented in table 10.

Comparing the 5-Year data for Hazardous Waste Monitoring and Survey, as presented in figure 222, it can be noted that for the past 5 years, the highest number of firms monitored and surveyed was during the year 2020. The increase in firms monitored were the additional firms that have applied Hazardous Waste Generations ID (HWID) from the previous years. The high HW Survey can also be attributed with the inspection of healthcare facilities including clinics, hospitals and quarantine facilities being surveyed if they have the necessary permits.

Reviewing the 5-Year data, Figure 23 presented in for Hazardous Waste Monitoring of Treatment, Storage, and Disposal (TSD) **Facilities** and of Transporters, it can be noted that there is an increasing trend of TSD Facilities monitored in the region from 2018 to 2020. This indicates that additional facilities have started to operate in the treatment of hazardous waste. Though 2017 recorded the highest number of TSD monitored some TSD facilities have stopped their operation




Figure 22. 5-year Data of HW Survey and Monitoring




Figure 23. 5-Year Data on TSD and Transporters Monitoring

Using the same figure above, it can be noted that there is a constant number of HW Transporters monitored from 2018 to 2020. This can be assumed that there are no new players or operators operating as a HW transporter in the region for 2018 to 2020.

iii. Ambient Air and Water Quality Monitoring Section

The Ambient Air and Water Quality Monitoring Section is tasked to monitor the ambient or normal condition of the surrounding air and water such as the regional atmospheric condition, and the water quality of fresh and marine waterbodies in the region. The section also acts as Secretariat to both Airshed Governing Boarding and Water Quality Management Area Governing Board.

a. Ambient Air Quality Monitoring (AAQM)

It is the function of the Ambient Air Quality Monitoring to maintain the operation of Air Quality Monitoring Stations and monitoring of Ambient Air Quality through the conduct of sampling and analysis of samples.

For 2020, the section was able to achieve their annual target as presented in Table 11. The region has five (5) Air Quality Monitoring Station which were operated, calibrated, and maintained in 2020. A more comprehensive report on Ambient Air Quality of the region will be provided separately.

Ambient Air Quality Monitoring

The region has five (5) existing monitoring stations consisting of four (4) manual method of sampling and one (1) Continuous Automatic Air Quality Monitoring Station (CAAQMS) to monitor parameters such as the Total Suspended Particle (TSP), Particulate Matter 10 (PM-10) and Particulate Matter 2.5 (PM-2.5).

The Ambient Water Quality Monitoring Unit is responsible in monitoring the status of different water bodies within the region. Together with the Regional Laboratory, the unit collect samples for analysis to determine the current parameters of a water body. Some of the activities under the AWQM are as follows:

- Monitor the Water Quality of Priority Rivers and Recreational Waterbodies including model sites such as Butuanon River.
- Implement the activities of the Adopt-an-Estero / Waterbody Program and establish additional sites for adoption.

It can be observed from Table 13 that the activities under the AWQM were met for 2020 since their accomplishments are not firm or application based driven. As their partner in water quality monitoring, the Laboratory section was unable to reach its annual target due to the suspension of water and wastewater sampling during the lockdown period as an effect of the pandemic of COVID19 in the region. Based on the 2017 DENR-R7 inventory of water bodies, the region has a total of 130 Water bodies with the following breakdown:

In summary, 29% of the region's waterbodies have been classified for better management. Out of the classified water bodies, 19 Principal Waterbodies have been classified. The Official List of the Classified waterbodies can be seen under Annex I. It is the goal of the Office to ensure that all water bodies have been classified for better management of the water resources. As of December of 2020, no additional water bodies have been officially classified for the region.

Ambient Water Quality Monitoring

One of the activities conducted by the AWQM unit is the monitoring of water quality of identified priority water bodies in the region. Samples from the different water bodies were collected in a monthly, quarterly, and semi-annually frequency depending on the prioritization assigned to the water bodies.

Presented in Annex II the water quality results based on the sampling conducted by the unit. Results were also forwarded to respective LGUs for their information and reference.

Beach Watch Program

The Beach Watch is one of the activities of the Unit where Recreational Water Bodies are monitored for its water quality. For 2020, the following recreational water bodies were monitored by the AWQM which are

- 1.) Panglao Island Coastal Water;
- 2.) Hilutungan Channel (East Coast Mactan);
- 3.) Badian Coastal Water;
- 4.) Moalboal Coastal Water;
- 5.) Anda Coastal Water; and
- 6.) San Juan Coastal Waters

Panglao Coastal Waters

The Panglao Island Coastal Waters is one of the recreational waterbodies under the Beachwatch program of DENR-EMB 7. Due to threats on water quality of recreational waters in Central Visayas, it was proposed to be designated as a Water Quality Management Area (WQMA) by its local government units and stakeholders. The Coastal waters of Panglao Island surround the municipalities of Panglao and Dauis, in the southern part of Bohol, Philippines. It is one of the centers of tourism in Visayas, popular for its white sand beaches and beautiful dive spots.

The Section has established 10 water monitoring stations for the collection of water samples for analysis as seen on figure 26. Fecal Coliform is the main parameter being analyzed as this can cause health issues to human's health for the presence of Ecoli. Presence of fecal coliform in the waterbody indicates contamination from sewage since fecal coliform comes from the feces of warm bodied animals.




Figure 27. Geomean of Fecal Coliform Count Panglao Coastal Waters

As seen on figure 27, there were months where the fecal coliform in the coastal water has exceeded the standard of 100 MPN/100ml. The section interpreted that the 1st peak during March is due to the start of the summer season where travel restrictions and provincial boundary closure to limit COVID19 was not yet implemented. From April to July, the whole Philippines declared a nationwide lockdown to stop the transmission of the virus thus the low fecal coliform load detection. The 2nd and 3rd peak on the months of August and October, respectively, was during the rainy season where possible run-off contributed to the rise in fecal coliform.

East Coast Mactan

The eastern coastline of Mactan Island is the famous location of beach resorts, both local and international class. Therefore, the water body is used for tourism purposes mainly, i.e. scuba diving, snorkeling, swimming, bathing, etc. In this way, the desirable water quality in the area according to DAO 2016-08 would be Class SB.




Figure 28. Sampling Stations in East Coast Mactan

As seen on fig. 28, the section has established a total of 12 water quality monitoring stations for water sampling. Same with Panglao, the section prioritizes the analysis of fecal coliform in the waterbody. The summary of the water quality sampling results is presented in Annex III

Badian Coastal Water

Badian is located at the south-west province of Cebu that is considered as one of the Eco-tourism sites because of its waterfalls and canyoneering activities. Badian also provide pristine coastal waters for beach activities. Badian Coastal Waters is not yet classified but based on its present beneficial use, it is classified as SB waterbody.

Eight (8) monitoring stations were established in Badian Coastal Waters as seen on Figure 29. The stations are selected based on their proximity to possible sources of pollution and accessibility. It is monitored in monthly basis with fecal coliform as a very important parameter.

Moalboal Coastal Waters

Moalboal Coastal is in the West Province of Cebu like Badian. Moalboal is famous for exceptional diving sites and beaches which attracts many tourists every year. For water quality monitoring, the section has established eight (8) sampling stations (figure 30) around four (4) barangays of the Municipality of Moalboal. The stations are selected based on their proximity to possible sources of pollution and accessibility. It is monitored in monthly basis with fecal coliform as a very important parameter. Sampling results for FY 2020 is presented in Annex III.

Anda Coastal Waters

Anda is located on a small peninsula at the eastern tip of Bohol. Anda offers a wide untouched and pristine white sand beaches, rich marine life, hidden waterfalls, enchanting caves and cave pools and many others.

The Anda Coastal Waters is currently in the process of Classification in support for its protection since it is considered as one of the popular beaches in the Province of Bohol. Its tentative classification based on beneficial use is Class SB, subject for further water quality analysis and public consultation.

Due to the limitations posed by the community quarantine protocols in the region, just like the 2nd quarter, samples taken from July to November 2020 were analyzed by the Bohol Provincial Health Office.

Nine (9) monitoring stations were established in Anda Coastal Waters. The stations are selected based on their proximity to possible sources of pollution and accessibility. It is monitored in monthly basis with fecal coliform as its priority parameter. Results from the sampling activities are reflected in Annex III.

San Juan Coastal Waters

Located in the Central Visayas region of the Philippines, Siquijor is locally known as 'Esla del Fuego', or the island of fire, not because of a raging volcano but because of its mystical fireflies. Siquijor is known of its waterfalls, beautiful corals, caves, big trees and the white sand beaches. Its tentative classification based on present beneficial use is Class SB, subject for further water quality analysis and public consultation.

Ten (10) monitoring stations are established based on their proximity to possible sources of pollution and accessibility. It is supposed to be monitored in monthly basis with fecal coliform as a very important parameter; but due to the limitations posed by the community quarantine protocols in the region, no sample taken for the month of March to December 2020. Water quality sampling results are presented in Annex III.

Designation of Water Quality Management Area (WQMA)

Another activity under the AWQM is to designate a water body as a Water Quality Management Area (WQMA). The program is one of the strategies identified to effectively enforce the Clean Water Act and improve the water quality of water bodies through focused interventions or actions that are designed to address specific water quality issues of the areas. Currently, Panglao Island was endorsed to EMB-Central Office for the designation as the 2nd WQMA in the region. Currently, no DENR Administrative Order have been issued designating Panglao as WQMA.

Water Body Classification

For 2020, the section aimed to determine the classification of eight (8) water bodies. This activity is to provide an official classification of the river based on its best intended use. Table 16 presents the water bodies aimed to be classified in FY 2020.

As part of the standard operating procedure, a 12-consecutive water quality sampling should be conducted to determine the water quality of the water bodies depending on its seasonal variation. Unfortunately, due to the COVID19 pandemic which resulted to lockdowns and transboundary restrictions, sampling activities during the months of April to October were not possible. This resulted that sampling results collected from January to March were considered invalid and a new sampling cycle should be conducted. Because of this, the classification activity for FY 2020 was considered incomplete or unsuccessful.

Adopt-an-Estero / Water Body Program

The Adopt-an-Estero/Water Body Program is a collaborative undertaking between and among communities along esteros or creeks and rivers, concerned local government units, private sectors and the DENR to achieve a cleaner, safer and healthier environment. Specifically, the program seeks to achieve to clean-up the esteros, debris, and silt; mobilize the local communities in cleaning the estero; institutionalize good sanitation and solid waste management practices through education and actual participation in the management of estero; ensure unimpeded flow of water during rainy season; reduce pollution loading to the rivers; and institutionalize public-privatecommunity partnership in environmental management.

For 2020, due to the COVID19 pandemic where mass gathering was discouraged to avoid the transmission of the virus, the quarterly coordination meeting with various stakeholders including the conduct of quarterly orchestrated clean-up together with partner-donors, various stakeholders and the immediate community surrounding the water bodies we temporarily suspended.

Ecological Solid Waste Management Section (ESWM)

Under the Ecological Solid Waste Management Act of 2000 or R.A. 9003, the EMB acts as the secretariat of the National Solid Waste Management Commission (NSWMC) in the region. The SWM Section of the Office is tasked to provide technical

assistance to LGUs in the implementation of R.A. 9003. For 2020, the following programs and activities were carried out by the Section.

a. Solid Waste Enforcement and Education Program (SWEEP)

The Solid Waste Enforcement and Education Program (SWEEP) is developed to extend the reach of the Environmental Management Bureau of the Department of environment and Natural Resource (EMB-DENR) as a National Government Agency (NGAs) to the Barangays which are the front liners in the implementation of the Ecological Solid Waste Management Programs. It aims to develop a strong partnership among the local government units (provincial, municipal/city), the barangays and concerned NGAs including the Department of Interior and Local Government (DILG), the Leagues and other concerned sectors that will help in promoting environment protection and ESWM.

In the implementation of the SWEEP, each SWEET-EnMOs has two respective main responsibilities: Enforcement and Education. In enforcement, 10 unclean sites are reported and monitored. For reported areas that remain unclean, a Notice of Violation and/or a Technical Conference is issued by the Office to call the attention of the Local Chief Executive, Solid Waste Focal Person and the Barangay Captain, or the private lot owner. As for the education aspect, SWEET-EnMOs facilitated and conducted IEC in their respective area assignment and they have selected two model barangays that will be assisted with regards to their solid waste management implementation, specifically in segregation at source, segregated collection, operation of the barangay materials recovery facility (MRF) and the creation of their barangay solid waste management committee (BSWMC). In addition, SWEET-EnMOs also perform other environmental tasks that may be assigned by immediate supervisor.

b. Ten Year Solid Waste Management Plan

The Environmental Management Bureau 7 is continuously providing technical and other capability building assistance to the Local Government Units in the development and implementation of local solid waste management plans and programs. This year, the EMB-7 Solid Waste Management Section (SWMS) assisted the LGUs in finalizing their 10-year Solid Waste Management Plans by conducting two batches Of Online Workshop on the Finalization of LGUs' Ten-Year Solid Waste Management Plan for selected LGUs in Region 7 last July and October, 2020. The list of LGUs with 10-year plans evaluated in 2020 is shown.

c. Sanitary Landfills (SLFs) And Alternative Technology Monitored

For 2020, the section monitored a total of 14 Sanitary Landfills (SLFs) however most of the monitoring conducted were done based on document review due to the pandemic. Table 19 presents the list of SLFs monitored for FY 2020.

Safe Closure and Rehabilitation Plan

As per Section 37of the Republic Act 9003 and its Implementing Rules and Regulations, "No open dumps shall be established and operated, nor any practice or disposal of solid waste by any person, including LGUs, which constitutes the use of open dumps for solid waste..." Local government units are required to close and stop the operation of their existing open dumpsites. With that, LGUs are mandated to submit a Safe Closure and Rehabilitation Plan that includes an official commitment by the concerned local government officials to close the open dump site within six (6) months from the approval of the plan. A detailed and time-bound checklist of pre- and post- closure tasks, actions and activities, and a commitment of readiness to be subject to audit and field verification of its compliance with the SCRP.

Table 21 shows the number of LGUs with approved (acknowledged) Safe Closure and Rehabilitation Plans; the number of LGUs that has already submitted SCRPs for evaluation by the DENR-EMB7; and the number of LGUs who did not submit their Plans.




Figure 34. Map of Nine Clean-up Sites

Environmental Education and Information Unit (EEIU)

The Environmental Education and Information Unit (EEIU) is a unit under the Office of the Regional Director in-charge in implementing the provisions of R.A. 9512 otherwise known as the National Environmental Awareness and Education Act of 2008. Together with the same unit of the DENR Regional Office, the goal of the unit is to spread awareness on environmental protection and preservation. For FY 2020, the unit has strengthened the presences of the Office using multimedia platform for spread the goal of the unit despite the COVID19 pandemic. Regular posting on the Facebook Page and conduct of Webinars where some of the activities conducted by the unit. Below are some highlights for FY 2020:

Financial Accomplishment

For 2020, the Regional Office have been granted a total budget of P137,849,000.00, through the enactment of the General Appropriations Act of 2020 (GAA 2020), for the implementation and enforcement of its mandated environmental laws. Table 26 presents the breakdown of the budget provided under the GAA 2020 as well as the percent change in the current allotment compared to the previous year.

It can be observed from the table above that, for FY 2020, only the Personnel Services (PS) gained 13% increase in budget allocation while the Maintenance and Other Operating Expenses (MOOE) and Capital Outlay (CO) both decreased by 38% and 80%, respectively. Overall, the agency budget for FY 2020 decreased by 26% compared to FY 2019. The increase in the PS is attributed to the Salary Standardization Law (SSL) 1st tranche while the decrease in MOOE and CO could be attributed due to the removal of budget allocation for the building construction, repair of technical and scientific equipment and financial assistance for the establishment of Materials Recovery Facilities (MRFs).



HIGHLIGHTS OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS FOR CY 2020

In conformity with RA 10121, Provincial Ordinance 2016-010 was passed and approved by the Sangguniang Panlalawigan of Bohol officially creating the Provincial Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Office (PDRRMO) and providing funds thereof, the office mandated to address the disaster prevention and mitigation, disaster preparedness, disaster response and disaster recovery and rehabilitation programs of the Provincial Government of Bohol. During the time of the administration of Gov. Edgar Chatto from 2010 until 2019 and the assumption of Gov. Art Yap, the Provincial Government of Bohol has been providing emergency preparedness and response measures thru the TaRSIER 117, Operations and Warning division of PDRRMO. With these mandates, the PDRRMO aims to upgrade its personnel's capacity and capability to fully serve the Boholano community by undergoing capacity development trainings.

For its in-house continuous skills development training, PDRRMO was privileged to undergo and participate in several trainings conducted by various national agencies and other organizations. Trainings include Lecture-Demonstration for Local Kayak Operator and Tour Guides at Abatan River Cruise; Demonstrations on Disaster Management for *Grade* 11 students of Carmel Academy; Newly Assigned Personnel of the 47th IB, Phil Army; Basic Water Safety and Rescue Training for TARSIER personnel held at Berracah Inland Resort, Santo Nino, Talibon, Bohol; Lecture-Demonstrations on First Aid and Basic Life of Boholano Cyclist Community; Dimiao Personnel and Alturas Supermarket Corporation Personnel; Naval Reserve Officers of PMI Bohol.







Various disaster risk reduction and management trainings, including Search, Rescue and Retrieval (SRR) Training; Capacity Development and exercises conducted every shift; Basic Water Search and Rescue Training held at Badiang Spring Resort; Standard first aid and Basic Life Support Training for Newly hired personnel of TaRSIER 117 Jagna Substation;

UPGRADING OF DRRM SERVICES, FACILITIES AND EQUIPMENT and Networking/ Linkaging with other LGUs, NGAs, others.

Upgrading of ambulances/ response vehicles: Procured 7 ambulances for TaRSIER 117 and province-owned hospitals. Construction of the first phase (building) for the Unified Command Center for the communication systems. Deployed standby medics to big churches during the 9-day Simba ng Gabi, visits PDRRMC partner agencies (PAGASA Doppler radar station); Provide Secretariat Services for PEMA/BIATF in the coordination among government agencies and local government units, particularly on the issuance of clearances for the smooth processing of inbound Boholanos and APORs; ongoing provision of the Extraction Services for the inbound Boholanos (OFWs, ROFs and private APORS) during the COVID-19 pandemic; coordinated and assisted the BISU in identifying areas where handwashing stations will be located for use by the masses; facilitated the 14-day quarantine of 163 LSIs from Bato, Leyte stranded upon the lockdown in March 2020; Provided/turned over disinfectants/solutions to BFP to be used in their disinfection of people/cargoes coming in at all seaports in the province; coordinated/linked with municipal focal persons and oriented with the protocols in receiving LSIs and APORs especially at the start of the COVID-19 operations and lockdown; physical site visits to airports and seaports to ensure health protocols are strictly followed;










IMMEDIATE PRE-HOSPITAL CARE/EMERGENCY DISPATCHES

As the Provincial ERT, PDRRMO also spearheaded and provided 6,952 emergency runs for all municipalities in the province for all six (6) TaRSIER 117 substations and the T-117 Headquarters in Tagbilaran City. The office Made emergency runs for motor vehicular accidents, trauma, medical, police assistance, fire assistance and other public assistance. Facilitated the donation drive/relief goods for Typhoon Ulysses victims in Bicol region (sent to OCD 7 for transport to Bicol).





Participated in the Great Bohol Earthquake commemoration program thru Sikad Kapitolyo. Continuous monitoring and systems check of LGUs during the rainy season and onset of tropical depressions/low pressure area. Continued IECs on DRRM thru radio and other forms of media and conducted review of the DRRM plans of the municipalities as requirement for approval of their budget.

Coastal Resource Management

To help achieve the province's ultimate vision, mission and goals of reducing poverty incidence and uplifting the living condition of the Boholano people, the Coastal Resource Management (CRM) Unit of the Office of the Governor- Bohol Environment Management Office (GO-BEMO), aligned with the Development Framework of the Provincial Government is looking for an effective strategy and alternative solution that can maximize the potential of our coastal/marine resources as source of economic activities that can generate income and revenues for the coastal LGUs and the communities. For 2020, the BEMO-CRM Unit initiated activities to provide livelihood opportunities to coastal communities and help address issues on the low productivity and ensuring food security for the Boholano people. We focused more on strengthening the management of Marine Protected Areas (MPAs), sustain collaboration and partnership on Coastal Law Enforcement and the establishment of Giant Clams Hatchery.

STRENGTHENING OF MARINE PROTECTED AREA (MPA) PROGRAM:

A. Awarding Ceremony of the best performing Marine Protected Area (MPA) and Coastal Law Enforcement (CLE)

In recognition of the efforts of key players in sustaining coastal monitoring and protection program of the province, the PGBh thru GO-BEMO CRM Unit awarded the Local Government Units (LGUs), partner agencies, institutions, MPA managers, law enforcers and Coastal Law Enforcement Council (CLEC) Clusters with exemplary performance. the conduct of underwater biophysical assessment of MPAs. The assessment results will provide MPA managers information that will guide them in their decisions and plan of action to eliminate threats and improve the management of the MPA. Coral reef assessment will establish baseline the conditions of the MPAs that are either soon to be established or are already established. Meanwhile, periodic conduct of coral reef assessments will indicate either positive or negative changes have occured within the coral reef ecosystem.

players and stakeholders in the management and protection of our coastal resources. Last January 16, 2020 at the Panda Tea Garden Hotel and Suites, CLEC members were convened for the Oath Taking Ceremony of the new chairpersons and officers of the CLEC Clusters. C. Coastal Law Enforcement Alliance in Region -7 (CLEAR -7) Meeting

The Coastal Law Enforcement Alliance in Region 7 (CLEAR7) is a multi-agency and multi-sectoral voluntary alliance formed to support sustainable fisheries management through effective law enforcement. CLEAR 7 members including BEMO as one of the members, convened to discuss their accomplishments, interventions, issues and concerns that occur along the coasts of the region. The CLEAR 7 meeting was conducted on June 5, 2020 and November 17, 2020 via ZOOM.

D. Deputation Training to Fish Wardens

Part of the initiatives for coastal law enforcement is to provide capacity development for law enforcers who are the coastal defense frontliners. Fish Warden Deputation Training is an activity in which fish wardens and local law enforcers are deputized and trained on basic coastal law enforcement, proper apprehension coastal violators, GPS reading and map plotting.

GIANT CLAMS HATCHERY PROJECT

To sustain the Giant Clams (*Tridacna gigas*) Dispersal Program, the PGBh thru BEMO established a giant clams hatchery in partnership with the Bureau of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources (BFAR). The construction of the said facility started in 2017. Five (5) units of spawning and larval rearing tanks with roofing in compliance with the environmental and engineering standards were constructed. There is also a Phycology Laboratory that provides natural food (micro-algae and diatoms) for hatchery cultures. The lab cultures and maintains primary and secondary stocks of good quality micro-algae for mass production.

In 2019, the team of BEMO researchers were able to perform 4 induced spawning to the giant clams where we had 2 batches of successful fertilization. On the 16thmonth of the first batch of fertilized clams, 541 pieces of giant juvenile clams with a length of around 8.9 cm. On the 13th month of the second batch of fertilized clams, 1, 602 pieces of giant juvenile clams with a length of around 8.6 cm.

This year, the construction of a storage area for the scuba dive equipment of the hatchery staff and installation of a groundwater tank in the hatchery for a fresh water supply that will be used in the operations of the hatchery was completed.

Last December 11, 2020 the Coastal Resource Management Officers (CRMOs) of the 30 coastal towns visited the Bohol Giant Clam Hatchery facility. They were oriented by the staff of the hatchery about its operations and about the giant clam project.

MARINE WILDLIFE PROTECTION PROGRAM

Bohol is not only known for its pristine beaches and amazing dive sites. The province is a place where the presence of different marine wildlife has been recorded in years. Marine wildlife that includes sea turtles, cetaceans (dolphins and whales), elasmobranchs (sharks and rays).

The Province of Bohol has revised the Bohol Environment Code in 2016 to ensure the protection, conservation and sustainable management of the environment. Thus, there is a need to ensure the conservation of the threatened, endangered and protected species of marine mega fauna in the municipal waters within the territorial jurisdiction of the Province of Bohol, in line with national and international conventions and legislations.

To address these, the provincial government reactivated the *Bohol Rescue Unit for Marine Wildlife* (*BRUMW*) thru Provincial Ordinance No. 2020-002 of which one of its duties are: responding to marine wildlife stranding, collect scientific information during stranding events, create and maintain a database of stranding events, conduct capability building trainings and seminars to improve skills and knowledge of rescue members and front liners, and salvage the carcasses of marine wildlife exclusively for scientific and educational use or ensure its proper disposition in accordance with existing national regulations.

The Province of Bohol was also in the limelight for marine wildlife interaction, and since this specialized form of tourism requires special planning, development, operations, procedures, regulations and training to ensure its sustainability, Provincial Ordinance No. 2020-03 was enacted by the Sangguniang Panlalawigan, entitled: "An ordinance Prescribing rules, regulations, governing the conduct of sustainable marine wildlife tourism interaction in the Province of Bohol".

a. Pawikan Conservation and First Response Training

Stranding and beaching of marine wildlife have been reported for years in coastal areas of Bohol for unknown causes which need proper rescue, salvage and management prior to the release to their natural habitat.

In addition, we lack data on the stranding and beaching of marine wildlife because the local conservation managers or rescuers are incapacitated to collect and record these data.

In order to take immediate actions on stranding occurrences, dispatch 24-hour response unit for emergency rescue operations, and rehabilitate afflicted marine wildlife as well as prevent hunting of marine wildlife, there is a need to conduct series of marine wildlife conservation and first response trainings, considering the need to capacitate the frontliners including the coastal resource

management officers and representative of the concerned agencies.

To realize this, the first phase of the training was conducted last February 2020 at Level 007, Tagbilaran City, Bohol to capacitate local conservation managers and first responders on Pawikan conservation where their knowledge and skills on rescue and response on marine turtles stranding will improve; including the DOs on nesting marine turtle; and develop appropriate data gathering, mapping of stranding and monitoring programs of marine turtles in the province.

The activity was in collaboration with the Large Marine Vertebrates (LAMAVE), a non-government organization which focuses on research and conservation of large marine animals, including marine turtles as well as specific outreach initiatives to advance conservation knowledge. The Pawikan Conservation and First Response Training was facilitated by Dr. Alessandro Ponzo, Executive Director of LAMAVE and the LAMAVE Volunteers.

b. Orientation on Blue Whale Survey

Last July 27, 2020 Dr. Jo Marie V. Acebes, DVM, the Executive Director of the Balyena.org/ Senior Researcher of the National Museum (NM) gave an orientation to blue whale survey. This is in compliance for their request to conduct a cetacean survey within the Bohol Sea.

The survey aims to photo-identify the whales, determine their movements and identify the reason of their presence in the sea waters of Bohol because these past few years, they have received reports of sightings of the blue whale.

c. Cetacean Survey

Last September 12, 2020, we joined the cetacean survey around the sea waters of Pamilacan Island in the coastal town of Baclayon, Bohol together with Dr. Jo Marie V. Acebes, with the volunteers. Data of abundance is much needed in ecology and conservation biology. Unfortunately most of the species of cetacean were provisionally classified as "Data Deficient" based on the Red List Status of Cetaceans of the International Union of Conservation Network (IUCN). While the need for high-quality abundance data is clear, the means of getting them is not. Thus, there is a need to conduct cetacean surveys.

d. Marine Mammal Stranding Response Virtual Training

The Philippine Mammal Stranding Network (PMSN) conducted a virtual training on Marine Mammal Stranding Response. The virtual training was conducted with participants coming from different agencies and LGUs of the Visayas and Mindanao. The training was conducted last November 14, 21, 28 and December 5, 2020.

Marine Wildlife Necropsies

All of the marine wildlife that we have responded were dead and some of them were necropsied which participated with Dr. Jo Marie V. Acebes, Senior Researcher of the National Museum Philippines together with some volunteers of the Balyena.org. During the necropsy found single-use plastics, nylon, and foreign objects in the gastro-intestinal tract of the Leather back sea turtle stranded in Talibon, Bohol, and Fraser's Dolphin stranded in the Figure 106. Ms. Pelindingue assisted Dr. Acebes during the sea waters of Panglao.

During the necropsy the Fraser's Dolphin stranded in Bahi, Alburquerque and Bil-isan Panglao, Bohol were pregnant and we found fetus inside their uterus. The fetus was brought in National Museum for preservation and the rest were buried.

f. Leatherback Sea Turtle Taxidermy

This is the first time that a Leatherback Sea Turtle has been stranded in the province. Thus, the National Museum of the Philippines-Bohol decided to preserve the bones of the marine turtle. Last November 18 and 20, 2020 we participated in the taxidermy spearheaded by NM Bohol spearheaded. *Taxidermy* is the art of preserving an animal's body via mounting (over an armature) or stuffing, for the exhibition/display and research/study purposes.

WATER QUALITY MONITORING IN PROTECTED AREAS (PAs)

Water quality monitoring was carried out in selected areas in Panglao Island Protected Seascape (PIPS) and Albur Loay Loboc Protected Landscape and Seascape (ALLPLS). Employees from DENR-CENRO Tagbilaran, the Provincial Health Office (PHO) and BEMO participated in the water quality monitoring. Last July 13, 2020 they conducted water quality monitoring in Tangnan, Panglao, Bohol as part of the Panglao Island Protected Seascapes (PIPS). They also had nother monitoring in 8 coastal barangays of Loay in October 10, 2020.



Forest and Water Resources Management

For 2020, the program implementation under the Forest and Water Resources Management Unit focused on tree growing and water resources development. Despite the onset of the COVID19 pandemic, it did not stop the technical staff to perform the marching orders of our Governor to ensure our watersheds are rehabilitated and potable water supply is provided to the waterless towns and barangays of the Province. The Provincial Water Resources Management Team was created with Four (4) newly hired Engineers on board. In coordination with the Local Government Affairs of the Office of the Governor, the FWRM Unit facilitated the inventory of waterless barangays in the Province for the provision of financial assistance amounting to One Hundred Thousand Pesos (P100,000.00) to assist the Barangays in their water projects.

Moreover, the Unit was able to validate 28 towns for the proposed waterworks improvement projects to be funded from the One Million Pesos (P1M) grant from the Provincial Government of Bohol thru Honorable Governor Arthur C. Yap. The Team provided technical assistance to the Barangays and municipalities for the development/rehabilitation of the water system. Identified water sources were validated, program of works (POWs) were reviewed and validation reports and technical suggestions and recommendations were prepared and submitted to Local Government Affairs (LGA) for the processing and release of financial assistance. For the major water development projects the FWRM Unit was able to identify, verify, study and investigated different water sources for individual municipalities, including sources for cluster of municipalities and conducted surveys to aid in the conceptualization drawings.

For the Tree Growing Program, guided by the provisions of Provincial Ordinance No. 2020-004, otherwise known as the "Massive Growing of Timber and Non-Timber Species in the Province of Bohol", the FWRM Unit continuously coordinated with the partners and institutions in promoting the program, assistance to tree planting activities, production of endemic species seedlings and provision of technical assistance to LGUs. For networking and linkaging, the FWRM Unit provided support to the programs, projects and activities of the different watershed management councils, technical working groups (TWGs) and committees such as the Carood Watershed Management Councils and TWG, alternate representative of the Provincial Wahig-Inabanga Watershed Management Council (PW-IWMC) and Monitoring & Evaluation Committee, Task Group Kinaiyahan, Anti-Illegal Logging Task Force, and responded to the demand-driven activities by partner agencies like DENR (INREMP & 3 PAMBs), Philippine Rural Development Projects (PRDP), Academe, Non-Government Organizations (NGOs) and Peoples Organization (POs). With a budgetary allocation of Three Million Two Hundred Ten Thousand and Nine Hundred Pesos (PhP 3, 210,900.00), the following projects, activities were implemented by the FWRM Unit:

I. **BIODIVERSITY CONSERVATION and MANAGEMENT/TREE GROWING PROGRAM**

A. BBC Endemic Plant Nursery: Seedling Production and Maintenance

In 2020, 149,770 assorted seedlings were produced/maintained at the Endemic Nursery. This is only 59% of the 250,000 assorted seedlings targeted for the year due to delays in the delivery of nursery materials. Nursery located at BBC Roxas, Bilar (see Fig. 1). A total of 62,509 assorted seedlings disposed/released to the Tree **Growing Program volunteer planters.**

B. Vermi-Composting Facility Operation & Maintenance

The FWRM Unit was able to produce **5,940 kilos of vermi-compost** or 118% increased from the 5,000 kilos target production. These were utilized as potting medium for the seedling production and the excess stocks were disposed to various clients/recipients who engage in backyard vegetable and ornamental plants production especially this time of COVID19 pandemic. Despite the present situation of the vermi-facility which need repair, still an increase in vermi-cast production was noted.

C. Tree Growing Program (TGP) Implementation

The Tree Growing Program was launched on **August 31, 2019** at the Bohol Cultural Center, Tagbilaran City. Together with the event launching was the signing of the Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) among the PGBh collaborating partner agencies like DENR, BFAR, DA, Dioceses of Tagbilaran & Talibon, DepED Bohol & Tabilaran City, CHED and BANGON.

A total of **556,576** assorted planting materials were planted in various upland and mangrove

areas in Bohol led by the Provincial Government of Bohol (PGBh) offices, national and local government agencies, civil society organisations like NGOs, POs, church organizations, business companies and other volunteer groups participated and supported the program. Of the 556,576 planted seedlings, 191,961 assorted seedlings (including fruit-trees and non-wood forest species) planted in the uplands and 364,615 assorted mangrove propagules/seedlings planted in the coastal areas.







Upland Areas Using Timber and Non-Timber Species (including Fruit-Bearing Trees)

Development Office (PYDO) together with the Bohol Youth last August 8; Backyard Tree Planting by private agencies like Atharra Primeland, Atharra Residence Development Corporation, CNC Institute, South Palms and etc.

Aside from that, the Diocese of Tagbilaran led by Most Rev. Alberto S. Uy initiated the tree planting activity four (4) years ago since he became the bishop of the Diocese of Tagbilaran, the tree planting and growing activity was among his many advocacies which continues to get an overwhelming support from parishes, communities, families and individuals. Since the start, the diocese relied on the provision of seedlings from agencies particularly the Provincial Government's BBC Endemic Plant Nursery at Roxas, Bilar, Bohol, Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR), Department of Agriculture/Municipal Agriculture Office (DA/MAO) and Bohol Island State University plant nurseries (See Fig. 7 & 8).

For 2020, they have targeted at least 1,000 assorted seedlings planted in every parish (with a total of 58 parishes) which sums up to 60,000 assorted seedlings planted in the 3rd and 4th quarter. For BEMO-BBC Endemic Plant Nursery alone, they have requested more than 25,000 assorted seedlings for their tree planting activities.



Series of tree planting activities conducted by every PGBh department and satellite offices during the celebration of the Philippine Civil Service Anniversary last September (See Fig. 9). GO-BEMO provided assorted seedlings to local residents during the HEART Caravans and Dagyawan sa Barangay in Candavid, Maribojoc (See Fig. 10 & 11); Canlaas, Quinapon-an, Antequera and Camias, Calape. Each household were given at least five (5) assorted seedlings to be planted in their backyard.

2. Mangrove Enrichment Planting

Table 1 shows the list of planted sites, responsible agencies/volunteer groups and the total

In 2020, thirty six (36) C/MLGUs submitted the list

of waterless barangays and out of 36 C/MLGUs, twenty-eight (28) municipalities with verified waterless barangays as determined by PPDO and BEMO. The identification of waterless barangay was based on the criteria set by the two (2) national water programs of Salin-Tubig (2011-2016) and the Bottoms-Up Budgeting (BUB) in 2013-2017, underpinned by an inter-agency collaboration with DILG, DOH, NAPC, LWUA, DSWD, and DBM which is defined as:

- ✓ More than 50% of the total household in a barangay don't have access to safe drinking water supply
- ✓ A barangay with incidence of water-borne diseases (data can be acquired from MHC/RHC)
- ✓ Household served by Level I and II water facilities in accordance with the Sanitation Code of the Philippines.

A total of 307 waterless barangays or 27% of the total number of barangays in the Province were identified in twenty-eight (28) MLGUs. Fifty-five (55) barangays from the first congressional district, one hundred eighty-three (183) barangays in the second district and only sixty-nine (69) barangays in the third district.

Of the thirty-six (36) C/MLGUs who submitted the list of water sources to PPDO and BEMO, nineteen (19) municipalities with Level I Water Sources, with a total of **380 existing/potential sources**.

A. Validation and Verification of the Existing/Proposed Barangay and Municipal Waterworks Projects

Based on the above-mentioned results, the Governor instructed the Provincial Water Resources Management (PWRM) team to conduct site validation and verification of the 380 existing/potential water sources which can be developed or improved to expand the services to other waterless barangays (See Fig. 16-18). The validation report of the PWRMT were submitted to the Governor and the Local

Government Affairs (LGA) for the release of a grant

A total of 151 barangays received the financial assistance from the Provincial Government of Bohol for the development or improvement of the waterworks system in the barangay. Aside from the

barangays, every C/MLGU were also given One Million Pesos (PhP 1,000,000) grant for waterworks system development and improvement. All the proposed waterworks projects of the 48 C/MLGUs were validated and verified based on the submitted Program of Works (POWs), SB resolutions and other supporting documents (See Fig. 19 & 20). Forty (40) C/MLGUs already received the PhP 1,000,000 financial assistance for the development or improvement of the waterworks projects and there is still eight (8) MLGUs financial assistance are still on-process due to lack of documentary requirements that are needed prior to the release of the funds.

President Carlos P. Garcia (PCPG) and Trinidad towns were both recipients of the financial assistance of one million pesos (P1,000,000.00) for water project and have initiated the development of a Coin Operated Water System (COWS) at Barangay Aguining and Coin Assisted Water System (CAWS) at Barangay Guinobatan, Trinidad, respectively. The first CAWS project of LGU Trinidad was constructed in Barangay Guinobatan and was inaugurated by Governor Art Yap last June 25, 2020 (See Fig. 21 & 22)

Due to the impact of the 7.2 magnitude earthquake in 2013 and the negative effects of the weak El Niño which started on the fourth quarter of 2018 until the second quarter of 2020, several towns and barangay waterworks system were greatly affected. Most of the shallow wells got empty and the water flow or

capacity of existing water sources significantly decreased. Municipal and barangay waterworks implemented water rationing while some LGUs declared the state of water crisis in the middle of 2019 (See Fig. 23 &24).

The PWRM team identified and proposed four (4) long-term waterworks projects for the clustered municipalities. These were the following, namely: (1) Earthfill Dam at Sikatuna, Talibon to serve the municipalities of Getafe, Talibon, Trinidad and Bien Unido (See Fig. 25); (2) Earthfill Dam at Lumangog, Ubay to serve the municipalities of Ubay, President Carlos P. Garcia (PCPG) and Alicia; (3)

Checkdam at Cambane, Candijay to serve the towns of Candijay, Anda and Guindulman, and (4) Checkdam at Togbongon, Garcia Hernandez to serve the towns of Garcia Hernandez, Valencia and Jagna.

Since the proposed water projects for the clustered municipalities is a long-term project which would take around two-three (2-3) years to construct, the Governor decided to set aside the long-term project and focus on individual municipality that can be implemented within a year in order to immediately address the problem.

Again, the PWRM team conducted site identification and validation to other potential water sources and was able to identify and proposed nineteen (19) medium-term municipal waterworks projects to be funded by the PhP1,000,000,000 loan from the Government Financial Institution (GFI) and 20% Development Fund of the PGBh (See 26-28). Table 2-A and 2-B shows the list of proposed municipal waterworks projects to be funded by the 1 Billion loan from Landbank of the Philippines and 20% Development Fund.

C. Conduct of Topographic and Profile Survey of the Proposed Waterworks Projects

One of the information needed in the preparation of Feasibility Study (FS) or the conceptual designs of the proposed waterworks projects is the conduct of profile to determine the elevation and sites of the proposed reservoir, treatment plant and other facilities including dam site. This data or information is very critical for the pipelines and submerged or flooded area in the case of checkdam or earthfill dam. The survey activities were conducted by the PWRM survey team led by Engr. Socrates Tutor and the team from the Provincial Engineering Office (PEO) led by Engr. Maximino Aton.

A total of nine (9) project sites were surveyed by both teams. These were the following sites, namely: Overland, Buenavista; Salog, Getafe; Nueva Vida Sur, Carmen; Marcelo, Mabini; Bayong & San Vicente, Pilar; Anas, Valencia; Zamora, Talibon and Catugasan, Dimiao.

For the Topographic survey of the two (2) long-term water projects, the Earth fill Dams of Sikatuna, Talibon and Lumangog, Ubay were out sourced from a private accredited surveyor.

D. Conduct of Coordination/Consultation Meetings to Municipal Mayors, PGBh Department Heads, MPDCs, Municipal Engineers, water service providers and other stakeholders.

Eight (8) coordination and consultation meetings conducted together with the bankers, PGBh department heads, mayors, MPDCs, Municipal Engineers and other stakeholders to discuss the payment scheme and terms of the loan, project concept, development of the water projects and other water project-related discussions. Figure 29 shows the discussion of the Governor with the mayors regarding the One Million Pesos (P 1,000,000) grant to all municipalities and One Hundred Thousand Pesos (P100,000) financial assistance to all the barangays for the development/rehabilitation of proposed/existing water project.

E. Preparation of Documentary Requirements for the Water Projects

A total of three (3) Purchase Request (PRs) prepared and submitted to PPMU-BAC for the topographic surveys of the proposed earthdam at Sikatuna, Talibon and Lumangog, Ubay and the Detailed Engineering Designs (DED) of the proposed package I water projects (e.g. Buenavista, Carmen, Getafe, Mabini and Pilar).

Along with the preparation of the PRs is the preparation of supporting documents like Project Profile, Work and Financial Plan (WFP) and procurement plans.

CAPACITY/CAPABILITY DEVELOPMENT ACTIVITIES

A. Capacity Development Activities for FRM Staff




Figure 33. Participated the Webinar on Forest Laws sponsored by DENR-EMB Region VII last October 19-23, 2020. This webinar was participated by various PLGUs and MLGUs in Region VII.

A total of 4 seminars/trainings attended and participated, to wit: Rain-forestation training at VSU, Baybay, City, Leyte Province last January 15, 2020 (See Fig. 32); Philippine Rural Development Project (PRDP) Project Proposal Preparation Coaching held at Reyna's Haven and Garden last March 4-6, 2020; Webinar on Forest Laws by DENR-BMB last October 19-23, 2020 (See Fig. 33) and Mangrove National Conference Webinar sponsored by Zoological Society of London (ZSL) last November 24-27, 2020 (See Fig. 34).

SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT AND POLLUTION CONTROL

The Revised Bohol Environment Code of 2016, mandates the Ecological Solid Waste Management (ESWM) Unit of the Bohol Environment Management Office (BEMO) to provide technical assistance to Municipal Local Government Units (MLGUs), provide secretariat to different bodies under Solid Waste Management Sector, respond to various complaints related to solid waste management and to attend other requests and demand driven-activities, including pollution control and prevention and liquid waste management.

A. Technical Assistance

In the provision of technical assistance to MLGUs, the unit was successfully facilitated Enforcement Training on ESWM to the enforcers of Local Government Units (LGU) of Duero, Ubay and Alicia. Enforcement Training is very essential in the Enforcement of RA 9003 and other SWM related laws and Ordinances. The training was attended by the deputized and volunteer enforcers of said municipality. See Figure 1& 2

B. Policy Formulation

The ESWM Unit coordinated with the office of Hon. Restituto Auxtero, Chair, SP Committee on Environment Protection and Management for the passage of Plastic and Styrofoam Regulation Ordinance and the Ordinance on Sewage and Septage Management of the Province. To date, 60% of 48 LGUs have legislated Plastic Regulation Ordinances. Initial coordination with the Plastic Free Bohol and other stakeholders for an upcoming activity of promoting Plastic Free Bohol Movement and Plastic Awareness Day this coming April 2021.

The ESWM Unit has also facilitated the issuance of Memorandum on the Alternative Disposal of Covid Related Waste, Monitoring of Illegal Septic Haulers/ Pumpers and other issuances and guidelines for the effective management of solid and liquid waste.

C. ISWM 10-Year Plan

Coordinated with the DENR-EMB on the status of LGUs 10-Year Plan and gave feedback to LGUs on the recommendation of the Review Committee of DENR-EMB 7. To date, there are 32 LGUs with approved 10-Year Plan, 11 LGUs having approved 10-Year Plan with conditions, four (4) LGUs are still on the process of complying the recommendations of the review committee and the remaining one (1) LGU is still on the writing stage. The Department of Science and Technology (DOST) conducted a Refresher Course on Waste Analysis and Characterization Study (WACS). WACS analysis is an integral part in the updating of 10-Year Plan.

Secretariat to PESWMB, TWG, ACSL and M&E of ESWM Best Practices

In the provision of secretariat to different bodies under SWM Sector, the ESWM Unit provided secretariat to meetings of Provincial SWM Board, Provincial ESWM Technical Working Group (TWG), Alburquerque Cluster Sanitary Landfill (ACSLF) Board and the Provincial Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) Team.

The ACSLF Board meeting was conducted on January 20, 2021, highlights of the discussion are as follows: Status of the Operation and Maintenance of the SLF; Approval of the application of additional 7 LGUs for the SLF Cluster namely: Alicia, Batuan, Carmen, Jagna, Garcia Hernandez, San Isidro.

The Provincial Monitoring and Evaluation Team convened on September 11, 2020 to finalize the criteria of the Best ESWM practices. It was attended by the Provincial M & E Team composed of Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR), Department of Interior and Local Government (DILG), Department of Education (DepEd), Provincial Planning and Development Office (PPDO), Provincial Health Office (PHO), Bol-anon United Sectors Working for the Advancement of Community Concerns, Inc. (BUSWACC), Bohol Environment Management Office (BEMO) as the secretariat.

To present the final criteria a joint meeting of the PSWMB and TWG was conducted on Sept. 16, 2020. Other important topics discussed in the meeting were handling of COVID related health care waste, updates on the status of 10-Year ISWM Plan and discussion on the newly enacted Plastic and Styrofoam Regulation Ordinance and Sewage and Septage Management Ordinance of Bohol.

The Provincial Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) Team conducted monitoring and field evaluation to LGUs on the Search for Best Practices of ESWM Implementation. As of December 28,

2020, there were 41 LGUs that have been monitored. The monitoring of remaining 6 LGUs will be continued this year 2021 Awarding of the top 10 best performing LGUs will be scheduled soon.





The LGUs are rated based on the following criteria: Functionality (25%) which includes Functional ESWM Organizations, approved 10-Year ISWM Plan, Ordinance and its enforcement and ESWM Cost Recovery System; and Implementation Status (75 %) which includes waste segregation, waste diversion, and efficiency of waste collection, transport, storage and disposal that is compliant to RA 9003.

The ESWM conducted IEC on solid waste management to other institutions such as PPA Tagbilaran, GHCOPA Community in Cogon District and to staff of Panda Tea Garden Suites and to the Waste Management Officers of the PGBh Offices at the Capitol.

Attendance to Capacity Development Training

To improve the knowledge and skills of the ESWM Staff, they attended to various online trainings and webinars namely: Refresher Course on Waste Analysis and Characterization Study conducted by DOST; Webinar on Innovative Wastewater Management conducted by DENR-EMB; National Solid Waste Management Conference 2020 (SWAPCCon2020).

An integral part of LGU's 10-Year is the data on Waste Analysis and Characterization Study (WACS). It is an effective way of determining accurate data in terms of solid waste generation per type and volume. In Bohol, most of the LGUS have conducted WACS in year 2014-2015, and it's about time to conduct a ReWACS to update the waste generation data of LGUs especially with the on-going health crisis. The WACS training was also attended by the LGU ESWM Focal Persons and other technical personnel.

Likewise, the SWAPCCon and the Webinar has been very helpful for the participants to be updated of the new laws, issuances and technologies relating to Waste Management.

H. Response to complaints related to SWM, attend to demand driven activities and among others.

The ESWM Unit conducted site inspection to Albur Dressing Plant in response to the letter request of Mayor Don Ritchie Buates to assess the facility for the compliance of mandatory requirements so that they can reopen and operate. The team were composed of DENR-EMB, PHO, BEMO, DOH and LGU personnel. Result of the inspection was provided to the LGU and the proponent, San Miguel Corporation.

Together with DENR PENRO and EMB, the ESWM Unit inspected the Modala Beach Resort and Moadto Strip in Doljo Panglao in response to complaints on easement and right of way. ESWM unit also conducted inspections at Don Emilio Del Valle Hospital on the sewage treatment issues; mangroves die-off in Sta Felomina Alburquerque, Bohol and visitation to South Palms in Panglao Bohol.

Likewise, in coordination with the Bohol Tourism Office, Office of Honorable Board Member Jade Bautista, Provincial Health Office and DOT-Bohol the Unit participated in the inspection of tourism establishments in Anda, Dauis, Loboc, and Panglao to assess the environmental compliances under the new normal.

Mr. Lafuente being deputized by the National Museum as Enforcer of Mineral Laws and Issuances, in coordination with National Museum, BENR-CENRO and PNP responded some complaints pertaining to illegal excavation and treasure hunting. Among the areas they have investigated are the following: Illegal Quarry in Quinapun-an Antequera, Illegal excavation in Cuasi Loon, Treasure hunting and illegal excavation in East Poblacion Alburquerque, San Vicente Baclayon and in Mansasa District Tagbilaran City.

Sustainable Inclusive and Resilient Tourism (SIRT) Project:

With respect to DOT-World Bank TouRIST Project, the ESWM Unit assisted the SWM experts from World Bank and DOT-Tourist Project Team in the conduct of site visit and project scoping. The team visited to Cluster Sanitary landfill in Alburquerque, Tagbilaran Closed Dumpsite in Dampas District, Material Recover Facilities in Panglao and other LGUs, Proposed Landfill site in Talibon and Ubay, respectively.

The ESWM Unit facilitate for the data collection of the Talibon SLF for the preparation of Pre – Feasibility Study and attended barangay council session of San Roque Talibon the site of the cluster landfill, as initial move for social preparation.

Likewise, the Unit assisted in the inspection of six (6) public markets to assess the status and areas that needs improvement for the Palengke Project of WB- DOT Tourist Project. The inspection team

was also assisted by the technical team from Phil- Japan Worldwide (PJW) Management Services, Inc., in identifying the appropriate technology for wastewater treatment in the markets.

POLLUTION PREVENTION AND CONTROL

The ESWM Unit also anchors the Pollution Control and Prevention Program of the Provincial Government. In partnership with DENR-EMB, PHO Sewage and Septage Laboratory , they conducted water sampling to areas subject of complaints.

Meanwhile, the commissioning of the Capitol Sewage Treatment Plant (STP) Sequence Batch Reactor (SBR) was started in February of this year untill the 4th quarter of 2020. The commissioning were facilitated by the Wasewater Management Experts form Phil-Japan Worldwide Management Services. Technical Staff from BEMO and GO were trained for the wastewater chemical analysis and for the operation and maintenance for the STP. On the third quarter of the year, they have sent water sample to third party in Cebu for the laboratory analysis and the result of seven parameters were passed the EMB standard. On the later part of 2020, coordination meeting with PEO, GSO, PCOs and BEMO were conducted to discuss the status of Capitol STP and finalization of documents for the turn-over.

Despite all these challenges, Bohol still stands to heal as one, hand in hand, as we journey towards achieving sustainable development of Bohol, which the Bohol Aspiring Geopark is espousing.

In these challenging times, the Bohol Island Aspiring Geopark together with the partners and stakeholders continue to extend and contribute collaborative efforts to achieve its main goal-to be the 1st UNESCO inscribed Global Geopark in the Philippines. The following are highlights of accomplishments of Bohol Island Aspiring Geopark:

I. COVID-19 PANDEMIC RESPONSE

(April – July 2020)

The Bohol Island Aspiring Geopark staff, Ms. Jessel Mae N. Polinar together with other BEMO staff were part of the Offshore Boholanos Coordinating Team who were tasked to validate the stranded Boholano respondents in other provinces (outside Bohol). Every day (Monday to Sunday) we validated an average of 16-20 stranded Boholano respondents per day, via phone calls.

II. GEOPARK MEETINGS

a. Meeting with NAMRIA & other Geopark TWG Advisers (October 20, 2020)

One of the recommendations highlighted was the need for a "Clear Map of Bohol Island Aspiring Geopark" that is officially adopted by the Philippine Administration. It is also added that both the terrestrial and maritime parts should be specified on the map.





VII. UNIMPLEMENTED TARGET FOR 2020

The procurement of fourteen (14) signages and seven (7) storyboards (MOOE) were not materialized due to the failure in getting interested suppliers and issues on the increase in the price of materials due to the Pandemic.

LAND AND RESOURCES MANAGEMENT

Pursuant to the pertinent provisions of Republic Act No. 7160, also known as the Local Government Code of 1991, Republic Act No. 7942, also known as "Philippine Mining Act of 1995", Republic Act No. 7076, also known as "An Act Creating a People's Small-Scale Mining Program and For Other Purposes", Provincial Ordinance No. 2008-025, also known as "The Bohol Mining Ordinance of 2008", the management of land and mineral resources in the Province is vested in the Land Mineral Resource Unit (LMRU) of Bohol Environment Management Office (BEMO).

This year's narrative report highlights the accomplishments of LMRU-BEMO), showcasing the unwavering commitment to good governance, accountability, transparency, and social responsibility. Also, it stays true to its thrusts to anchor on responsible mining to address poverty alleviation, environmental protection, and inclusive economic growth.

For the first few months of 2020, we have successfully sustained our productive partnerships with different sectors of society in different municipalities in the Province by way of various presentations, dialogues, forums, and consultations with the civil society organizations, Local Government Units, Department of Environment and Natural Resources, Mines and Geo-Sciences Bureau, Environmental Management Bureau, Bohol Environmental Protection Task Force and Philippine National Police for enforcement. Furthermore, by means of coordination and collaborative initiatives, we have effectively brought closer the services offered by the Office to its constituents.

To provide inputs to enhance the existing policies toward responsible and harmonious quarry operation for the Contractors, Mineral Traders, Sand and Gravel and Quarry Operators in the Province of Bohol, a Mineral Summit was conducted on February 17, 2020 with a theme, "Unlocking Bohol's Small Scale Mineral Development While Ensuring Environmental Protection."





Welcome Message

Atty. Kathyrin Fe D. Pioquinto, Provincial Administrator, Province of Bohol gave the Welcome Address to all the participants. She said that the Summit will be of great significance to everybody, as this will educate in more about the Bohol Mining Ordinance, the Bohol Environment Code and other environmental laws and policies against illegal quarry operations and other forms of mining activities. She said further that the theme, "Unlocking Bohol's Small Scale Mineral Development While Ensuring Environmental Protection" is relevant and timely, as we are on the verge of various environmental crisis affecting our people, natural and man-made calamities. PA Pioquinto left a message from the song by Asin entitled, Masdan Mo Ang Kapaligiran, "Hindi masama ang pag-unlad kung hindi nakakasira ng kalikasan." She reminded everyone to be responsible permittees so that



the next generation will still enjoy the beauty of our environment.

Overview and Rationale of the Activity

Hon. Restituto B. Auxtero, Chairperson, SP Committee on Natural Resources and Environmental protection said the Summit aims to provide inputs to enhance the existing policies toward responsible and harmonious quarry operation and for the Contractors, Mineral traders, Sand and Gravel and Quarry Operators in the Province of Bohol to increase their effectiveness and efficiency in promoting responsible mining. He also gave the following rationale of the Summit, viz:



- Enhance knowledge on the existing environmental laws and its corresponding penalties
 particularly on illegal quarrying activities and other forms of illegal practice against our
 mineral resources in Bohol;
- 2) Increase awareness of the quarry operators and traders on the mandatory and subsequent requirements for SAG and Quarry Permit application;
- 3) Hear differing opinions, approaches, views and concerns of miners and traders and to quickly agree on changes on direction/ solutions to operational problems; and
- 4) Towards an effective and efficient utilization, conservation, protection, management and development of Bohol's natural and mineral resources.

Messages

Hon. Dionisio Victor A. Balite, Acting Governor, Province of Bohol reminded all the participants that profit or gain should not only be considered in quarry operations but they should always consider rehabilitation of their respective quarry sites.

PCOL Jonathan A. Cabal, former Provincial Director, Bohol Province Police Office, encouraged all the participants to practice responsible mining. He reminded the participants of the PNP's duty of enforcing laws and they are always ready to

support all the developmental activities of the province for the protection of our environment.

- 2) Orientation of Presidential Decree No. entitled, "Establishing 1586 Environmental Impact Statement System including Other Environmental Management Related Measures and Purposes" and ECC for other Monitoring and Enforcement discussed by Ms. Cory Lyn E. Estavillo, OIC, PEMO-Bohol, DENR-EMB-7;
- 3) Salient Features of Provincial Ordinance No. 2008-025 entitled, "REGULATING THE ISSUANCE MINING SMALL-SCALE PERMITS, **QUARRY** PERMITS, **SAND** AND GRAVEL EXTRACTION PERMIT, GOVERNMENT **GRATUITOUS** AND **PRIVATE** GRATUITOUS PERMITS. COMMERCIAL AND GRATUITOUS GUANO PERMITS, **GEMSTONE GATHERING** PERMIT,



PEBBLE PICKING PERMIT, COMMUNAL EXTRACTION PERMIT AND OTHER SPECIAL PERMITS; ESTABLISHING THE MECHANICS OF ISSUANCE; IMPOSING A TAX ON THE EXTRACTED MATERIALS AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF PROVISIONS THEREOF" discussed by Atty. - iv) Executive Order No. 3, Series of 2019; Dated August 7, 2019. Creating and Operationalizing the Bohol Environmental Protection Task Force (BEPTF) to enforce, investigate, apprehend, and prosecute violations of Bohol Mining Ordinance and related environmental laws.

- 5) Presentation of Best Mining Practices of Quarry Operator in Province of Bohol was presented by Mr. Gerry Lou T. Dulang, Quarry Permit Holder & Awardee, Best Mining Practices; and
- 6) Plans and Programs of the Bohol Small Scale Mining Association (BSSMA) was discussed by Mr. Eduardo L. Labunog, President, BSSMA.





Monitoring of Quarry Areas

The Bohol Environmental Protection Task Force (BEPTF) was created pursuant to Executive Order No. 3, series of 2019 followed by the issuance of an Executive Order No.4, series of 2019 on August 7, 2019 which suspends all quarry permits and conduct of legal compliance audit of all quarry permit holders.







Monitoring of all Quarry Areas in Bohol by the Bohol

The BEPTF is tasked to enforce, investigate, apprehend, and prosecute violations of Bohol Mining Ordinance and related environmental laws. The BEPTF was created under the supervision of the Provincial Legal Officer while BEMO-Land and Mineral Resource Unit is the secretariat partnered with the Municipal Mayors, Barangay Captains and Philippine National Police (PNP) of each Municipality in conducting enforcement, prompt investigation as well as apprehending and prosecuting violations



of the Bohol Mining Ordinance and related environmental laws. A total of eleven (11) Quarry and Sand and Gravel areas were investigated and resolved and 28 active permit areas monitored.

Verification of SAG/Quarry Areas

Verification and Evaluation was done to areas of Forty-Five (45) Mineral Permit applicants. As for mining regulation services, our Office through Provincial Mining Regulatory Board - Bohol has issued Twenty-One (21) Permits for 2020, Quarry – 16 and CSAG – 5 bringing the total of active permit holders in Bohol to **28**.

Assessment of production reports/target is conducted and timely feedbacks are provided to answer immediate concern and appropriate course of action





Verification of all Quarry Areas in Bohol by the Bohol Environmental Task Force (BEPTF)

Technical Conferences

From January to December 2020, there were eight (8) Technical Conferences facilitated by BEMO-LMRU with proper documentation. A total of **49** respondents were called for Technical Conference before the BEPTF. The conference primarily aims to find out the veracity of the reports, settle some legal and environmental issues and obligations on the report on alleged illegal quarrying.

The total amount of administrative (compromise) penalties collected from respondents/violators of PO No. 2008-025 reached One Million Two Hundred One Thousand Fifty-Eight Pesos and Twenty Centavos (P1, 201, 058.20). The province thru the Provincial Treasurer's Office collected the total amount share of Four Million One Hundred Forty-Three Thousand Four Hundred Four and Twenty-Five Centavos (P4, 143, 404.25), 30% of P13, 811, 347.50 of the gross extraction tax collection.

Evaluation of Permit Applications by the Provincial Mining Regulatory Board Technical Working Group (PMRB -TWG)

Pursuant to Joint Special Order No. 2019-01, Series of 2019, the PMRB-Bohol was reorganized. The Provincial Mining Regulatory Board (PMRB) of the Province is fully operationalized. The PMRB -TWG is tasked to conduct the initial review of all applications and subsequently present its findings to the Board while the PMRB is tasked to monitor the compliance of Quarry and Sand and Gravel Permit Holders in their applied areas and to address issues and concerns



arising in the operations. The PMRB-Bohol is also tasked to review, evaluate and recommend all applications for Sand and Gravel and Other Quarry/Mineral Resources for the Provincial Governor's approval and disapproval of applications.

Provincial Mining Regulatory Board (PMRB) Meeting

The PMRB-Bohol through BEMO-LMRU conducted four (4) meetings and four (4) Technical Working Group meetings which constitute 33 % of its supposed target. This was due to the COVID-19 pandemic where safety protocols are observed. By virtue of the letter of former Regional Director of MGB-7, Dir. Alburo dated August 12, 2020, the PMRB meetings were resumed starting on September 2020.









The Revised Bohol Mining Ordinance No. 2020-035

In order to make the Bohol Mining Ordinance responsive and relevant to the current circumstances, Executive Order No. 4, Series of 2020 was issued by Governor Arthur C. Yap creating a Technical Working Group to study and propose amendments to the Provincial Mining Ordinance. One of the objectives of the TWG is to simplify permit processes for SAG and Quarry applications. The Composition of the TWG includes Provincial Legal Office, Provincial Treasurer's Office, Provincial Assessors Office, Mines and Geosciences Bureau-7, DENR-EMB, BEPTF, and GO-BEMO as Vice-Chair. A series of TWG meetings and consultations attended by the GO-BEMO Head and LMRU Section Head. The TWG invited different resource persons and their inputs were used in crafting the amendments of the Ordinance.

On December 3, 2020, Gov. Yap signed PO No. 2020-035 otherwise known as "The Revised Bohol Mining Ordinance of 2020" in compliance with the posting and publication requirements under Section 511 of Republic Act No. 7160 otherwise known as the Local Government Code of 1991.



Special Meeting and Orientation of all SAG/Quarry Applicants

Prior to the approval of permits, a Special Meeting and Orientation of SAG and Quarry Applicants was conducted on November 24, 2020 held at the Governor's Reception Hall, Bohol Provincial Capitol, Tagbilaran City. The said activity primarily aims to orient all permit applicants on the salient features of PO No. 2020-035. A total of 40 participants attended the activity. Atty. Julius Greg Delgado, Legal Officer, discussed the Salient Features of the Revised Bohol Mining Ordinance and Conditions of Permits while Ms. Aida Evangelista, Head, Cash Receipts/Tax Collection Division, Provincial Treasurer's Office, gave the lecture on the reportorial requirements and proper issuance of Delivery Receipt (DR). After the lectures, all permit applicants signed the Deed of Commitment and Undertaking to comply with the new requirements under the Revised Bohol Mining Ordinance.

Meeting of Commercial Sand and Gravel (CSAG) Applicants

This Office invited the two (2) Commercial Sand and Gravel (CSAG) applicants for a meeting on May 22, 2020 to discuss, settle, and determine the boundaries on their applied areas in Tanghaway, Guindulman, Bohol. The minutes of the meeting was forwarded to DENR - MGB-7 for information, appropriate action, and ready reference to clarify the two Area Clearances issued to Mr. Rodrigo Golosino and Mr. Lucresio Amora. The issue involved was resolved by MGB-7 concluding that there was no overlapping of the areas applied.

In updating the Local Road Network Development Plan of the Province of Bohol, LMRU staff is one of the participants of the Writeshop on October 28 & 29, 2020.

As we move on to another year, we are looking forward to positive results on achieving and accomplishing our targets through Bohol Environment Management Office- Land and Mineral Resources Unit united actions.

Issues and Concerns:

- 1. Absence of Mining Engineer who can assess the feasibility, safety, and productivity of small-scale mining and quarrying locations of Bohol;
- 2. Deputies of the Provincial Governor failed to monitor quarrying or mining activities in their respective area of responsibility;
- 3. Limited number of BEPTF personnel to enforce, investigate, apprehend, and prosecute violations of the Bohol Mining Ordinance;
- 4. Illegal quarrying in the guise of site development;
- 5. Non-issuance of Delivery Receipt by the Permittees/Drivers/Haulers;
- 6. Operating with expired permit; and
- 7. Streamlined process flow of Quarry/SAG Permit Applications.

ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

Environmental Management System plays an important role to protect public health & safety, and to improve the performance of the organization. In this time of pandemic, there were activities that were not realized. However, the EMS Team with the support of the top management we're able to push through some activities. The following are the highlights of 2020 accomplishments of the Environmental Management System.

I. HIRING EMS/QMS COACH

Allocated budget for the salary of the EMS Coach utilized. Since the start of the pandemic, the EMS Coach communicated thru emails and phone calls.

II. MEETINGS AND OTHER RELATED ACTIVITIES

a) EMS-IC Meetings

- March 5-6, 2020 of CPG Hall, New Capitol Bldg., Tagbilaran City.
- August 13, 2020 at Ceremonial Hall, New Capitol Bldg., Tagbilaran City.

The two meetings were realized because of the availability of the EMS-IC Officers. EMS-ICs supposedly convene quarterly but due to restrictions in face to face meetings, the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th quarters budget were cancelled and the amount allocated for the meetings were added to the budget for the 3rd Party Certifying Body.

b) Internal Audit Meetings and Management Reviews

No management review was conducted.

c) Quarterly Monitoring

The EMP Monitoring Team conducted the 1st to 3rd quarter monitoring to the PGBh offices last June 17-19, 2020 and random checking as agreed by the members of the team and the implementing offices for the succeeding months until September 2020.

III. CONDUCT OF ISO 14001:2015 CERTIFICATION AUDIT

Due to travel restrictions brought about by COVID-19, and considering the budget for miscellaneous expenses to comply with the requirements to travel to Bohol. Procurement for the 3rd certifying body didn't come to handy. Up to this, the 3rd Party Certifying Body has not submitted yet the bid documents to BAC.

IV. EMS/QMS CAPACITY DEVELOPMENT TRAININGS

a) Conduct of ERT training; Standard First Aid Kit and Basic Life Support – CPR
As part of the EMP, the training was supposed to be conducted by the PDRRMO but due to COVID-19 pandemic, the activities requiring physical contact were suspended/prohibited.

b) EMS Year-End Assessment

The assessment was scheduled on December 4, 2020, but this activity was cancelled due to a Memorandum no. 336-2020 issued by the Office of the Governor dated December 1, 2020 and was signed by Atty. Arthur C. Yap, Provincial Governor of Bohol stipulating the temporary suspension of national and local government programs, projects and activities (PAPs) that will require asking people to congregate in groups.

V. MEMO FORWARDED

 MEMORANDUM; THE REVISED PGBh ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT PROGRAM (EMP) 2020 (Dated July 15, 2020)

The revised PGBh EMP 2020, dated July 15, 2020, was approved by Gov. Arthur C. Yap and successfully forwarded to the 33 PGBh Offices, which covers the different strategies to achieve effective, efficient, and economical government operations as follows;

As the normal operations are mostly put on hold due to COVID-19 pandemic and in furtherance of the Environmental Management System (EMS) implementation, we directly requested the EMS officers in the PGBh offices thru a Memorandum approved by Atty. Kathyrin Fe D. Pioquinto (Provincial Administrator/EMR) to finalize and submit all the required EMS documents including the EMS Monitoring Forms and EMS Documented Forms.


To ensure the proper and timely implementation of strategies and conduct of the regular monitoring of EMS-EMP, the focal persons/officers were designated to discharge on their respective duties and responsibilities. The memo was approved by Atty. Kathyrin Fe D. Pioquinto, Provincial Administrator/EMR, forwarded and addressed to all heads of offices and EMS-EMP focal persons.

MEMORANDUM; SUBMISSION OF MONTHLY CONSUMPTION OF MINERAL WATER (Dated February 11, 2020)

All respective offices of the PGBh were requested to submit their monthly consumption of mineral water for consolidation by the Provincial Water Conservation Officer, Engr. Charlie Torremocha. According to the consolidated report of Engr. Torremocha, out of 42 offices in the PGBh only 29 submitted or 69.04%. The 29 offices submitted had a total consumption of 2,808.75 gal. per month and a total of Php 13,706.25 per month. This result will be the basis for further study of the possible installation of water purifiers in PGBh.

VI. EMS AWARENESS TO THE NEW OFFICES IN THE SCOPE OF PGBh-EMS

EMS Orientation is important because it lays a foundation for the employee's awareness in the EMS and provides an employee with accurate information about the Environmental Management System of the PGBh. Furthermore, a successful implementation of the EMS will help reduce environmental risk and improve environmental sustainability of the PGBh.

HIGHLIGHTS OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS FOR CY 2020

Technical support services to internal and external stakeholders (Representation/Extension of technical assistance to Various Committees, Bodies, Councils, ODAs and other stakeholders)

A) Implementation of the Philippine Rural Development Projects (PRDP) I-PLAN, I-BUILD, I-REAP/GEF, and I-SUPPORT sub-projects

The Province of Bohol is on the 5th year in the implementation the Philippine Rural Development Project (PRDP) funded by World Bank and implemented by the Department of Agriculture. The PRDP's development objectives are to increase farmers' income in agri-fishery sector in program areas and to develop a more market-oriented and climate-resilient agriculture and fishery sector. It further strengthened the conservation of the coastal and marine resource base through biodiversity conservation and fisheries resources management as well as enhanced LGU institutional, technical, management and financial capabilities and environmental governance system. In the year 2019, the project has gained a remarkable accomplishment through the effort from the members of the Provincial Project Management Implementing Unit (PPMIU) for PRDP Bohol. In addition, Bohol was awarded as the best implementor province in the Region, PSO Visayas Cluster and NPCO.

As of now, a total of five (5) subprojects of Farm-to-Market Roads were already implemented under PRDP, of which, three (3) of it were completed and formally turned over to the concerned LGU. Only the implementation of Dagnawan-Dagohoy FMR is on-going with a 72.98% actual physical progress (as of December 15, 2020). Target date of completion is March 17, 2021. In corresponds to the Alegria-Bugho FMR, still under suspension due to RROW issues, a Deed of Absolute Sale of a Portion of Land is still on process. Rest assured that the PPMIU is doing its very best to finally settle this issue.

Aside from the FMR under I-BUILD Component, construction of facilities/building of an Enterprise project is also part of it. The first two regular subprojects of I-REAP Component are PLGU concern matters, both in the procurement which is done through public bidding and in disbursements. As of December 2020, only the 15% mobilization advance payment of Bohol Seaweeds Production, Consolidation and Marketing Enterprise is reflected. The Batuan Native Chicken Breeding and Chicks Hardening Facilities and Marketing Enterprise still don't have a physical progress in their construction of the building. A must preliminary activity before the start of construction re: Orientation of the PG and the Third-Party with their obligation & responsibilities in the Construction of Facilities held last week, January 21, 2021. Regards to this, setting of the tentative date for the start of construction is on February 21, 2021. The disbursement on this matter is on the PG level and will be reflected in the liquidation of their financial transactions.

The I-REAP Component is composed of four (4) Regular Subprojects and twelve (12) Small Livelihood Projects with a total project cost of PhP 50,096,900.87 and PhP 11,920,855.00 respectively. The estimated physical accomplishment (%) per subproject indicates the percentage of the procurement process done (procured & paid) by the respective proponent groups. Only the BUFFC reached the minimum requirement of 50% liquidation of 1st tranche fund (60.51% submitted liquidation), the fund was already downloaded in the PLGU account and now waiting for the release of final fund to the PG

amounting to PhP 2,497,605. The rest of the regular subprojects still didn't reach the minimum 50% liquidation. The figures in red color indicate the exact amount of the actual disbursement of the proponent groups but not yet reflected in the liquidation of financial reports in the Accounting Office for these documents are for submission once it reaches the 50% minimum requirement. The BODPA of Bohol Dairy Processing and Marketing Enterprise target to submit their 1st tranche fund liquidation this month of January, 2021. The remaining item of BODPA's 1st Tranche specifically the Package 2: Refrigerated Van is a shopping mode of procurement, a responsibility of the PLGU. A successful open bid was held last Wednesday, January 27, 2021 and already in process for award.

The Global Environment Facility (GEF) is under the I-REAP Component composed of the Micro-Enterprise Projects (MEPs) and Marine Protected Areas (MPAs). The proponent groups of MEPs are also the beneficiary of the MPAs. Last November 4, 2020 during the Pres. Carlos P. Garcia Day, all of the eight (8) PGs of MEPs received their 2nd/final tranche fund total of PhP 806,440.00, and this was personally handed by our Governor, Arthur C. Yap. Procurement process of the remaining items are still on-going, same thing goes with the MPAs subprojects.

Other major accomplishments are the following:

- Facilitated in the preparation of the coordination meetings pertaining to the preparation of NOL2 issuances
- Technical training in the preparation of FS, DED, EFA for the proposed Potable Water System (Solar Powered Seawater Desalination Project) and the JIT for IREAP and GEF sub-projects with NPCO, PSO Visayas cluster and RPCO7
- Conducted series of meetings for discussion of COA AOM compliance
- Submitted to RPCO 7 & NPCO list of 3-Phased Action Against COVID 19 threats: Response, Mitigation and Transition to the New Normal to be funded by PRDP using 50% of the WB Additional Financing 2 to fund Department of Agriculture ALPAS program related to producing food, making it accessible and affordable
- Conducted video filming of projects under the new leadership of Governor Art Yap and Vicegovernor Rene Lopez Relampagos
- Participated virtual meetings for the 10th World Bank Implementation Mission for GEF projects
- Conducted sites visits and turn-over of projects to LGUs
- Facilitated video filming for the Governor's State of the Province Address at Dagnawan-Dagohoy, Inabanga FMR, Mahayag Norte-Baang Catigbian FMR, GEF Marine Protected Areas with 220 units artificial reefs at Pres. CPG
- Facilitated turn-over of completed artificial reefs projects and the turn-over of 4 units small boats and 12 units of fiber glass boats for Talibon and Pres. CPG.

B. Technical support services and Participation to Access to Sustainable Energy Programme Clean Energy Living Laboratories (ASEP-CELLs)

The International Council for Local Initiatives - Local Governments for Sustainability Southeast Asia, Inc. (ICLEI SEAS) under the ASEP-CELLs project has expressed interest in collaborating with the Provincial Government of Bohol (PGBh) for purposes of mainstreaming national energy policies and plans in province local development planning, and building the capacity of the PGBh to develop its Local Energy Efficiency and Conservation (EEC) Plan pursuant to RA 11285. The purpose of this partnership wherein Bohol is the pilot is to craft a project proposal for an energy project in the province of Bohol related to ASEP-CELLs agenda and link this to energy-related financing platforms and providing opportunities, venues or platforms for learning sessions to the PGBh through LGU-to-LGU cooperation.


The ASEP-CELLS is a joint undertaking of the European Union (EU) and the Philippine Department of Energy (DOE) to assist the Government of the Philippines to meet its rural electrification targets by means of renewable energy, and to promote energy efficiency. Under this project, Bohol Province is chosen as one of the 3 pilot demonstration sites in the Philippines. It is implemented by the Ateneo de Manila University (PMO and Luzon CELL), ICLEI - Local Governments for Sustainability Southeast Asia Secretariat, Xavier University (Mindanao CELL) and University of San Carlos (Visayas CELLs).











The project aims to empower stakeholders to effectively respond to energy challenges and seize opportunities for sustainable production and consumption, particularly in managing the country's transition to sustainable low-carbon energy pathway. ASEP-CELLs takes on a three-pillar approach:


- 1. Develop a sustainable **knowledge management system** for more relevant policy making and program interventions through energy access (EA), energy efficiency (EE) and renewable energy (RE);
- 2. **Build capacities of institutions** to respond to sustainable low carbon renewable energy challenges;


3. Increase **public awareness** and **stakeholder engagement** on RE, EE, and EA to sustain political support and commitment to low carbon renewable energy pathway, energy efficiency and energy access.

In the context of the ASEP-CELLs, a demonstration LGU- Bohol Province will receive assistance in the form of:

- a) mainstreaming national energy policies and plans at local planning and development;
- b) building capacity of a dedicated technical working group (TWG) or selected local government employees to develop a local energy plan⁵;
- c) assisting the LGU through a Technical Working Group to craft a project proposal for an energy project with an Energy Efficiency (EE) and Renewable Energy (RE) component;
- d) participating in learning sessions through LGU-to-LGU cooperation or expert guidance.

D. Technical Support Services to INREMP plementation

For Bohol, the Wahig-Inabanga Watershed has been identified for the implementation of the project considering that is a major and critical watershed due to its environmental and economic significance, covering almost 62,000 hectares (15% of Bohol's total land area of 411,726 hectares) and is host to important forest/timberland, water resources, both surface and underground, agriculture, major ecoadventure tourism destinations and locations of some agro-industrial/commercial facilities in the province.

Among the major accomplishments are the following:



A. Land Transport


A.1 Roads and Bridges:

As of end 2020, the total road length in Bohol is 6,146.42 kms. of which 12% is classified as national road, 14% provincial roads, 1% city road, 5% municipal roads and 68% barangay roads. Roads in the province are either paved with asphalt or concrete, or unpaved hence, gravel and earth. It classified according to type of pavement: 3% asphalt, 31% concrete, 49% gravel and 17% earth. Earth roads are those that have been shaped, but have not received engineering interventions like regravelling. The Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH) that builds and maintains national highways has the longest asphalt- and concrete-paved roads. The barangays have the longest gravel and earth roads.





Bohol has a total bridge length of 8,550.05 linear meters. Of this, the national government maintains 59%, the Provincial Government takes charge of 20% at 80 bridges with a total length of 1,685 linear meter, while the barangay and municipal bridges account for 21%. Combined, the national bridges have the longest length in concrete and steel-type bridges while barangay bridges have the longest length in timber and bailey-type bridges.




A.1.a Provincial Roads and Bridges.

The provincial roads are distributed to the three Project Management Divisions (PMDs), with the grouping just slightly different from that of the congressional districts.


At PEO, the roads linking Tubigon and San Isidro town belong to the 1st District, while roads linking Ubay and Mabini, and Mahayag in San Miguel and Katipunan in Alicia belong to the 2nd District. San Isidro is under the jurisdiction of the 2nd Congressional District while Alicia and Mabini belong to the 3rd Congressional District.

Of the total 835.55 kms., PMD 1 has 49 roads totaling 259.029 kms; PMD 2 has 38, totaling 221.440 kms; and, PMD 3 has 70, totaling 354.081



kms. Gravel roads used to hog the provincial roads at 62%, but the flurry of concrete-paving projects with the entry of the Conditional Matching Grant to Provinces (CMGP), Roads Leveraging Linkages to Industry and Trade (ROLL-IT) of DTI and DPWH, as well as the latter's convergence with the Department of Tourism for provincial roads leading to established tourism destinations, has reduced this to 46.14% as of this writing. Most of these still gravel road sections are in PMDs 3 and 2.

- A.2. The Provincial Government is fortunate to have many interventions on road governance reforms:
 - 1. PGBh Department of Tourism Department of Public Works and Highways Convergence for Provincial Roads/ Tourism Highways Development:
 - **42 Provincial Roads** funded by DOT-DPWH Convergence from 2016 to 2020




In the table shows, that motorcycles dominated the Bohol road scene at 61.24% and followed the cars/vans/UVs at 27%.

The preference for motorcycles consistently stayed on top because of its affordability and lower maintenance cost compared to four-wheeled vehicles. Besides, motorcycle payment schemes are now easy on the pocket compared to conditions 10 years ago. Some dealers offer low down payments; some offer straight amortization even on a daily basis — with no down payment to boot.

B. Seaport:


The province has one (1) base port located in the Port of Tagbilaran, six (6) terminal ports located in Tubigon, Talibon, Ubay, Jagna, Loon and Getafe while five (5) outports are distributed in strategic locations in Clarin, Tapal, Albur, Loay and Bien Unido and one (1) private port which the PMSC in Garcia Hernandez.



The total number of shipcalls have decreased from 2019 to 2020 by 61%. While, the total number of passenger's traffic from the province's baseport, terminal ports, outports and private ports also decreased by 80% in 2020 due to COVID 19 pandemic.

C. Airport

Bohol has two airports, the Bohol-Panglao International Airport (BPIA) and the Ubay Feeder. Only the BPIA handles commercial flights and passenger traffic with direct flights to and from Manila and the international flights through a number, making the province easily accessible to large numbers of tourists and investors.




The Bohol-Panglao International Airport (BPIA)

decreased the number of incoming and outgoing flights in 2020 it includes Air Asia, Cebu Pacific, PAL, Air Swift, Air Juan, General Aviation and Military for domestic flights and the international flight has one (1) commercial flight from Jeju Air while two (2) chartered flights of Pan Pacific and Royal Air. The number of flights and passengers' traffic for both the incoming and outgoing are decreased in 2020 due to COVID 19 pandemic.

There are 156 international flights this year. It decreased compared to last year has 241 international flights.

Power and Energy

Bohol is supplied primarily by power plants located in Leyte and Cebu, with more than 50% for Bohol Electric Cooperative I (BOHECO-I), 100% for Bohol Light Company, Inc. (BLCI) and BOHECO-II. The province has indigenous Hydro Power resources, as evidenced by the existing 7.5 MW hydro power plant (about 11% of current total demand of the island). The Visayas Wholesale Electric Spot Market (WESM) supplies up to 29% of energy mix for BOHECO-I. Majority of the power source of Bohol is coming from the Leyte-Bohol Power Interconnection thru submarine cables.



On the transmission system, Bohol is quite vulnerable owing to a single Bohol transmission interconnection with Leyte. There is also the problem of line congestion because the National Grid Corporation (NGCP) implements Manual Load Dropping (MLD).




The conservative forecast shows that the Province of Bohol will have a demand of 61 MW (50MW Base and 11MW Peaking) to 113 MW (93 MW for Base and 20 MW for Peaking) from 2015 to 2045. The graph shows the future demand of the island.

- Base demand will increase to 83 MW in 2024 and further to 132 MW in 2045.

Forecasted Base and Peak Demand of Bohol



Proposed Long-Term Power Supply Procurement for Bohol from 2024 to 2043

The province of Bohol through its power and businesses sectors have foreseen the need for a long-term power supply that will add new generating capacity. This indispensable need envisages the construction of a land-based power plant in Bohol that will serve its future power requirements. According to the BEDAG-TWG based on its forecast computations - by year 2024 the combined power load demand for the 3 DUs in Bohol shall be at an average of 100 megawatts. The 100 megawatt-threshold is the minimum requirement that Gencos require to enter into exclusive contracts with interested DUs according to the USAID Compete Team of UP consultants. This scenario is substantiated by the 1BP aggregation within the purview of its experience and expertise in the field of power supply distribution to electric consumers.

This policy framework will serve as a mechanism that will support and facilitate site identification, incentives grant offers and institutional processes in the form of assistance to potential power bidders in order to attract them. The concept of a power economic zone (power ecozone) is most likely appropriate and expected to address the abovementioned concerns. Furthermore, the proposed power ecozone is envisioned to be a key enabler for attracting power supply companies that would locate their facilities in Bohol. The idea of power ecozone in Bohol has been conceptualized through the collaborative efforts of the Bohol Power Investments Coordination Committee (BPICC), the BEDAG-TWG and the 1BP with technical assistance of the USAid Compete Team and facilitative support by PPDO.

Water and Irrigation


A. Water Supply:

Bohol's water supply system for domestic, agricultural and industrial uses is mainly based on 2,224 springs, 59 rivers and 200 creeks. There are 22 rivers basins/watersheds that are valuable sources of water for drinking and irrigation. Surface water from rivers and streams in these basins are impounded and distributed for irrigation, electric generation, industrial use as well as for domestic use.

The existing water supplies available in the province have a Level III (individual house


connections) system which is being operated by the LGUs. Most of the rural areas like barangays outside the Poblacion are being served by Level I (point source facility) and Level II system




Status of Irrigation

Bohol province has a total land area of about 411,730 hectares. It has a new potential irrigable area of 44,076.00 hectares. In CY 2020, the status of irrigation development is 60.09%. This includes the three (3) national irrigation systems namely, Bohol Irrigation System-Stage 1 (Malinao Dam), Capayas Irrigation System and





> Telephone Services

The province of Bohol is wired with the rest of the world through the state-of-the-art telephone facilities that provide domestic and international linkages through three (3) service providers, namely PLDT/SMART, CRUZTELCO and Globelines where the public calling stations scattered throughout the province. CRUZTELCO concentrates their telephone services in Tagbilaran City, Jagna, Calape and Tubigon. PLDT and CRUZTELCO also provide payphones capable of international direct dialing. The Digital Telephone Exchange funded of the DOTC operates in the municipality of Tubigon, Talibon and Ubay.

Mobile Phones

Smart, Sun Cellular and Globe Communications Incorporated have operated its cell sites in the entire province. With this mobile phone equipment, the connections can already avail of the efficient and convenient cellular telephone facilities. There are 174 units of cell sites such as 74 for Globelines, 71 for Smart and 29 for Suns Cellular located in some areas in the province. The people can make use of the regular services of the system such as domestic and international calls, text messaging, voice messaging.

Radio Services

Radio using transceivers is still a widely used mode of communication in the province. It provides back-up system, to telephone service. The Bohol Law Enforcement Communications Systems (BLECS) plays a consistent role in assisting both public and private individual needs of communication. All local, provincial and national government offices have operational radios. The PNP/Military and civilian sector assist them especially during emergency cases like insurgency related incidents, commission of crimes and occurrences of natural calamities such as earthquake, typhoon, fire and flood and among others.

Broadcast and Cable TV

There are four (4) broadcast media stations in Bohol namely: DYRD, DYTR, DYZD in Ubay and DYJP in Jagna. Two (2) FM stations (DYTR and DYRD) that are all operating and providing information and entertainment. The coverage for station DYRD is limited up to Clarin and Jagna with 5,000 watts capacity and DYTR has 10,000 watts capacity, has the widest coverage area equivalent to 80% provincewide. There is one relaying station based in Ubay, the station DYZD and one local station DYJP in Jagna, Bohol.

In the year 2020, Bohol has eleven (11) cable TV stations. The Bohol Community Cable Television (BCCTV) situated in Tagbilaran City, the Mantle Cable Station in Talibon, Alcyber Cable System which is located in the municipality of Loay, the Real Speed Cable TV Inc. in Calape, Southseas Vision in Tubigon, San Miguel Cable System in Jagna, Duero and Garcia Hernandez, Niña Cable TV System in Maribojoc, Zafra Cable in Panglao, Sto. Niño Cable TV System in Valencia and Dimiao, CCTN Cable System in Inabanga and DTV in Ubay.

➤ Messengerial/Cargo Services

There are messengerial and cargo services in the city, namely the LBC, 2GO, Air 21, Fast Cargo, Pambato Cargo Forwrders, AP Cargo, LIBCAP Super Express, JRS and DHL that handle package forwarding. Most of these offices are located in Tagbilaran City with branches in some major urban centers of the province.

> Internet Access

With the presence of facsimile machines and the internet, the patronage of telegram services has obviously decreased. There are four hundred nine (409) internet café providers operating in the province.

Agency : **Provincial Engineer's Office (PEO)**

I. Highlights of CY 2020 Accomplishments:

With the full support of the Provincial Government leadership headed by Gov. Art C. Yap with all the Acting Governors Rene L. Relampagos and Dionisio Victor A. Balite, this office allocated the amount of P208.780 M for the Road Upgrading (concreting) with a total length of 9.20835 kms. from 20 % Development Fund of the Province. Completed Four (4) road Sections with the total length of _____ kms. and in the total project Cost of ______.

Aside from Road upgrading Projects, this office undertook the Detailed Engineering Design (DED) until Implementation of our Hospital Modernization Program.

The provincial road network within the province has a total road length of 835.550 km. It consists of 483.407 km. paved road, 350.706 km. gravel. And bridge length of 1.685 kms. and consist of 80 bridges.

This office was also able to meet the demand of the riding public for repair and maintenance of provincial roads through our equipments despite of various damages caused by continuous heavy rains and old aged equipment.

I. Highlights of Accomplishments:

For approximately thirty (30) years of existence as a separate department, the Provincial Motor Pool Office (PMPO) has been operating to provide equipment support to various projects undertaken by the provincial government of Bohol that include maintenance of provincial roads and bridges, repair and shop servicing of province-owned equipment, and provision of equipment assistance to activities of other provincial government offices. Further, this Office generates income through rental of equipment from Municipal and Barangay LGUs at discounted rates and private individuals/entities that were in need of equipment support.

CY 2020 was remarkably a developing year for the Provincial Motor Pool in terms of duties and jurisdiction. Two major responsibilities were transferred to PMPO from other offices, namely: The Mini Motor Pool that was formerly managed by the Provincial General Services Office and the Service Vehicle Dispatching Unit that was previously under the Office of the Governor, both through Memorandum-80-2020 dated August 3, 2020. The first function is now among the sections of the Automotive Repair and Maintenance Division (ARM) while the Service Vehicle Dispatching is temporarily lodged under the Administrative Support Section.

PMPO is still composed of two (2) divisions, the Operations and the Automotive Repair and Maintenance, and one (1) Support Section, the Administrative.

Operations Division


In this Division, you can find active working coordination with the PEO and other offices of the provincial government; Municipal and Barangay LGUs; other government agencies, private entities and individuals who were at times in need of equipment support. As per yearly pattern, the PEO utilizes most of the equipment with a total of 95.72% for the period. Administrative Support Section

This support section controls the consumption of our office General Fund budget and for CY2020, the provincial government approved a total budget of P50,795,622.80. For equipment support, the total budget allotted was P13,500,000.00 for Repair and Maintenance of Heavy Equipment and P720,000.00 for Gasoline, Oil and Lubricants or a total of P14,220,000.00. On the same allocations, less 10% retention, the utilization/earmark posted a total of P10,744,990.82 or 75.56% utilization rate.

For special tasks, this support section facilitated the compliance of COVID-19 health protocols; submission of SPMS requirements for 77 regular employees; observance of various CSC and agency rules and policies; and cooperation to various PGBh programs and activities.

For its regular tasks, this division was able to facilitate the following: Human Resource Management; Budget and Records Management; Supply and Procurement Management; and preparation, carding, processing of 265 per diems/reimbursement vouchers, 87 wages payrolls, 12 bills payment vouchers, 47 job orders, 12 RATA vouchers, 3 clothing payrolls, 10 monetization vouchers/payrolls, 37 purchase orders, 32 purchase orders, 10 petty cash vouchers and 62 regular payrolls and vouchers for salary, uniform allowance, withdrawals, loyalty & last salaries. Regular tasks accomplished also include preparation of 327 various office communications and documents including documentation of various office activities and meetings; timekeeping with 864 attendance sheets and 57 HR monthly reports; 614 files recorded and filed; pre-audit of all financial documents; and daily janitorial works and maintenance of PMPO main building, repair bay and surrounding grounds.

For its newly added Vehicle Dispatching Unit, other offices (mostly from PGBH while some are from national offices and LGUs) come to our office for vehicle need and driver need. Later equipment need (PGBh offices except PEO) was also included in the responsibilities of the unit. For the meantime, the unit has 4 drivers and 5 vehicles on standby for assistance and will coordinate with the Operations Division for equipment requests. For the period September to December 2020, the following were its accomplishments:

This program is integrated into other PGBh-US programs (like PGBh - US Document Generator, Budget, Accounting, Treasury, and DTIS-Document Tracking Info. Sys.). The system is divided into two parts/modules: The Web application and the Desktop application.




Desktop Application

LTO 7 Jagna District Office is committed to work under the leadership and guidance of Regional Director Victor Emmanuel C. Caindec towards the mission of the Land Transportation Office to rationalize the land transport services and facilities to effectively implement the various land transportation laws, rules and regulations in coordination and collaboration with other government agencies, the business sector, civil society, and other stake holders.

LTO MANDATE AND FUNCTIONS

- 1. Inspection and Registration of Motor Vehicles;
- 2. Issuance of License and Permits;
- 3. Enforcement of Land Transportation Laws, Rules, and Regulations;
- 4. Adjudication of Traffic Violation Cases; and
- 5. Collection of Revenues for the Government

Accomplishments

In line with the mandates and function of Land Transportation Office and in support to the Road Safety Action Plan, the following are the accomplishments of Jagna District Office in CY 2020:

1. Inspection and Registration of Motor Vehicles

As mandated the conduct of inspection of motor vehicles are done prior to the acceptance of renewal of registration of motor vehicles wherein the owner will submit the motor vehicle for inspection as to its roadworthiness.

The Office was able to achieve the target for Motor Vehicle Registrations Handled with a total actual performance of 29,791 which is a 71.54% increase of the target for CY 2020 with the total performance target of 17,367.

2. Issuance of License and Permits

With the roll-out and implementation of Land Transportation Management System (LTMS) for license transactions in September 23, 2020 Jagna District Office can now accept and process New

License Transactions through the Dermalog System. This is an online transaction wherein applicants for new license undergo a paperless theoretical examination through the use of computer desktop link to the license system of the office.

Reviewers for theoretical examinations are available at the LTO LTMS portal to qualified applicants who wish to apply for a license or to anybody who wishes to learn more about driving examinations issued by the Office.

Tables at the examination area are designed to conform with the physical distancing protocol of the Office to ensure the safety of the applicants and transparency of the examination.



Personnel were trained to handle the processing and evaluation of application of license transactions through the Dermalog LTMS system



3. Enforcement of Land Transportation Laws, Rules, and Regulations

To address the request of PRO7 for deputation of PNP Personnel in Region 7, our LTO Regional Office Education and Training Service conducted a three (3) day re-orientation training last January, 2020 in Tagbilaran City attended by the PNP personnel from the different Municipalities of Bohol for renewal of deputation in CY 2020 as a force multiplier in the conduct of enforcement of Land Transportation Laws, Rules, and Regulations.

4. Adjudication of Traffic Violation Cases

Apprehended drivers may file a protest of violation within five (5) days from the date of apprehension as stipulated in Article 5 of Joint Administrative Order 2014-01.

All protests of violations from the drivers received by Jagna District Office are forwarded to the Regional Office Operations Division for proper adjudication of the case. Recommendations and approval of the resolution of the adjudicated cases are done at the Regional Office and will be forwarded back to the concerned office for the settlement of apprehension case/s based on the approved resolution.

5. Collection of Revenue for the Government

Collection of Motor Vehicle User's Charge of the Land Transportation Office goes to the account of Department of Public Works and Highways for the construction and improvements of Roads, Highways, and Bridges.

In spite of the limited acceptance of applicants to transact in the office to comply with the physical distancing and sanitary/health protocols, Jagna District Office was able to achieve its target for Collection of Revenue for the Government with a total actual collection of Php 19,078,000.00 which is a 175.82% increase of meeting the target of Php 10,851,000.00.

6. HIGHLIGHTS OF THE COVID 19 PANDEMIC RESPONSE INITIATED BY THE OFFICE

Like any other Front Line Government Office, the Land Transportation Office was among the front-line offices of the Government that responded to work hand in hand with other government agencies in Bayanihan to Heal as One Act.

At the start of the Enhanced Community Quarantine (ECQ) in April 2020 Assec Edgar Galvante ordered the shutting down of LTO Computer Servers throughout the country to safeguard the Motor Vehicle and Customer Data while the Office is closed for operation nationwide.

In line with the project of Department of Transportation to provide a free transport service for the medical personnel in hospitals throughout the country, the Land Transportation Office collaborated with other government agencies and stakeholders to provide a free transport service for the medical workers during the outbreak of COVID-19 virus while public transport was not allowed to operate.

In Region 7, Regional Director Victor Emmanuel C. Caindec entered a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) with the Officials of Cebu City Medical Center for free transport service for the medical personnel of the said hospital and the use of the 2nd floor of the old office building as temporary abode for those medical personnel who were living in a single house with their old and immunocompromised relatives.

Collaborated with the other Government Agencies such as the Office of the President and Provincial Government in the provision of free transport for front liners and medical personnel of Vicente Sotto Hospital and other government hospitals that are within Cebu City.

Pregnant Women also enjoyed the free transport service provided by the Office in going to the hospital and back to the staging area for their scheduled check-up.

The transport services are escorted by LTO law enforcers and personnel to assist the driver and medical personnel in passing the checkpoints and border areas along the highways.

Collaborated with PNP personnel as a force multiplier in the strict implementation and enforcement of physical distancing and sanitary/health protocols to help mitigate the spreading of COVID 19 virus.

In Bohol Province in line with the programs of the Regional Office, the Chief of LTO Offices and personnel collaborated with the LGU and PNP personnel in the Municipalities within the Geographical Area of Responsibility to act as a force multiplier to help mitigate the spreading of COVID 19 virus. This was done by conducting road side inspections, monitoring and enforcement of traffic laws, rules, and regulations, as well as information dissemination on the strict implementation of the physical distancing and sanitary/health protocols among the operators, drivers, and passengers of motor vehicles.

Civil Service policy on the Alternative Work Arrangement (AWA) is instituted in the Office, for Senior Citizen, pregnant women, lactating mothers, and immunocompromised personnel.

At the start of the Enhanced Community Quarantine (ECQ) Jagna District Office closed its operation to the public for the entire period of lockdown. Jagna DO Personnel who are young and healthy are directed to report to the office to work on the sorting, filing, and conduct of inventory of records for disposal.



The District Office also conducted a thorough clean-up and disinfection within the Office premises and surroundings to protect and prevent the possible contamination of COVID 19 virus.



Planting and Beautification of the front area of the office was also conducted to exude positive energy and foster a welcoming environment to the public.



PREPARATION FOR RESUMPTION OF WORK

Prior to the Resumption of Work in May 13, 2020, Assec Edgar Galvante issued a Memorandum Order no. 2020-2183 dated May 9, 2020 re: Office Protocol Upon Resumption of Work, to ensure that LTO Personnel and Clients are safe and protected against the COVID 19 Virus.

To ensure compliance of the order and to strictly implement the physical distancing and sanitary/health protocols, employees of Jagna DO conducted a thorough clean-up and disinfection in the office.

Stickers, signages, and markings for physical/social distancing were posted around the area for the information and guidance of the

visiting clients.

The space between the chairs were measured to ensure that the one meter physical distancing was followed. The chairs were also arranged to ensure optimal flow of clients to ensure that they do not come close to one another while traversing the premises.





Foot baths, door mats, disinfectants, hand soaps, paper towels, alcohol, face masks, face shields, nitrile hand gloves, and a thermal scanner were prepared for the resumption of work.

At the start of the resumption of work, LTO personnel and clients were required to observe and comply with the physical/social distancing and sanitary/health protocols.



The security guards on duty and the personnel in-charge at the Public Assistance and Complaint Desk (PACD) table were instructed to advise and guide the clients to observe the protocols for the safety and protection of every one.

Upon entering the office LTO personnel and clients have to pass at the front entrance for foot baths, hand sanitation, body temperature scanning and fill-up the health form for monitoring and contact tracing of clients.

Acceptance of Clients transactions were limited up to fifty percent (50%) of the allowable number of transactions in a day that can be processed based on the given procedural time for each transaction as specified in our Citizen's Charter.

In the months of June to October, 2020 the number of clients in LTO Jagna DO for motor vehicle registration increased by more than 100% of the performance target set by the office for the specified period, as clients from Tagbilaran and other Municipalities that were not accommodated in LTO Tagbilaran City DO traveled for an hour in going to LTO Jagna DO hoping to be accommodated and be able to transact for renewal of their motor vehicle registration within the day.

It was during that period that the Office requested the assistance of the PNP from the Municipality of Garcia-Hernandez for crowd control in the area as line-up of vehicles for inspection reached up to the National Highway. Personnel were required to extend time to cope with the workload and to accommodate all of the clients within the day while following the utmost of safety measures
